Father R.G. Thelen to be honored at his 40th anniversary

WATERVLIET - Father R.G. Thelen, pastor emeritus of St. Joseph Parish, Watervliet, will celebrate the 40th anniversary of his ordination June 10th with a Mass of Thanksgiving and a parish open house and reception in his honor.

Due to Father's health, the 10:30 Mass may be said as Father Thelen is seated in a place of honor.

The open house and reception will be held in the parish hall, now named "Thelen Hall", from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. All are asked to come and honor the former pastor.

Father Thelen was ordained a priest on June 3, 1939 in St. Mary

Cathedral by Bishop Jospeh H Albers of Lansing. It is symbolic that his 40th anniversary fell on the Feast of Pentecost, which commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles.

His First Mass was at Holy Trinity Church in Fowler, Michigan on June 8th. The first seven years of his priesthood were spent in St. Paul's Church in Owosso. Then, on November 1, 1946 Father Thelen was assigned to Watervliet as pastor of St. Joseph's Church.


60 Years Ago







On Friday, each child had 30 minutes to make the final choice of which book they wished to have and then began reading it. A film about the importance of reading was also shown.



Section 117.5 (b), the ordinances of he City of Coloma be and the same are ereby compiled and codified and shall nceforth be known and cited as the Coloma City Compiled Ordinances"

It is the declared intention of this mmission that only those ordinances kpressly repealed by the repealing ordiance adopted contemporaneously herewith hall stand repealed, and that all other xisting ordinances, resolutions, rules and egulations of the City of Coloma, which are of inconsistent with this compilation, in arce at the time of the adoption of this ompilation, shall continue in full force and Hect although omitted from this compiltion: but all ordinances or parts of rdinanes of the City of Coloma in conflict ith any ordinance included in this code, re, to the extent of such conflict, hereby

No provision of any ordinance shall be avalid by reason of deficiency in any rdinance heading.

It is the legislative intent of the Commison in adopting this Compilation, that all rovisions and sections of this ordinance be berally construed to protect and preserve he peace, health, safety and welfare of the nhabitants of the City of Coloma and should ny provision or section of this ordiance be eld unconstitutional or invalid, such holding hall not be construed as affecting the alidity of any of the remaining provisions or ections, it being the intent that this rdinance shall stand, notwithstanding the avalidity of any provision or section thereof he provisions of this section shall apply to he amendment of any section of any rdinance whether or not the wording of this rdinance.

Copies of the Coloma City Compiled irdinance are available for inspection at the ffice of the City Clerk.

This ordinance shall be in full force and flect twenty (20) days after its adoption and ublication, it also being the intent that all evisions, amendments, and additions to xisting ordinances, as compiled herein hall likewise be in full force and effect wenty (20) days after their adoption ontemporaneously herewith and public





Voting will take place at Coloma township hall. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. All registered voters are eligible to vote on the millage question. Absentee ballots will be available at the administration office on Boyer road until 2 p.m. on June 9.

District voters being asked to rewnew a 2.5 mill levy for three years. The 2.5 mill levy which was approved in 1976, has expired. Voting to renew the levy is not voting for a tax increase. Renewing the 2.5 mill levy will not increase the extra voted millage for the school.

Superintendent William Barrett said the school is not seeking a tax increase this year. "We are making cut-backs in staff and in all possible areas to cover the increase in operating costs for the school for the 1979-80 school vear".

Voters are also being asked to elect two members to the board for four year terms. There is no contest in that election. Incumbent members Kay Erickson, and
