**BYLAWS**

of

**THE J. PAUL GETTY TRUST**

*(Amended and Restated as of April 14, 2003,  
May 11, 2005, and May 8, 2006  
(Effective July 1, 2006))*

**INTRODUCTION**

The J. Paul Getty Trust (the "Trust"), formerly known as The J Paul Getty Museum, was established by Trust Indenture dated December 2, 1953. These amended and restated Bylaws shall provide guidance to the Trustees as they carry out the purpose of the Trust, which is the diffusion of artistic and general knowledge.

**ARTICLE I.  
OFFICES AND FISCAL YEAR**

Section 1.1 PRINCIPAL OFFICE. The Trust's principal office is located at 1200 Getty Center Drive, Los Angeles, California 90049. The Trustees (the "Trustees") may change the location of the principal office.

Section 1.2 OTHER OFFICES. The Trustees may establish other offices at other locations.

Section 1.3 FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year of the Trust shall begin on July 1 and shall end on June 30.

**ARTICLE II.  
TRUSTEES**

Section 2.1 POWERS. The affairs of the Trust shall be conducted by or under the direction of the Trustees. The Trustees shall have all powers permitted to them by law and the Trust Indenture. The Trustees may, by resolution, delegate any such powers to a committee of one or more Trustees or to other persons as permitted by law and the Trust Indenture, but the Trustees shall have continuing responsibility for any delegated matters.



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STATEMENT 16

Section 2.2 ELECTION OF TRUSTEES Trustees shall be elected and reelected by the Trustees in accordance with this Section 2.2 and Section 3 1(f) below (pertaining to the role of the Governance Committee).

(a) Number. There shall be at least three (3) Trustees at all times. The Trustees may, but need not, fix a specific, higher number of Trustees. If the Trustees fix such a number, they shall reasonably promptly fill any vacancies that may arise, or fix a new number (but never less than three). The Trustees may elect new Trustees from time to time as they see fit.

(b) Election and Reelection. The Trustees may elect new Trustees at any meeting of the Trustees. The Trustees shall reelect current Trustees to serve additional terms at the Annual Meeting (See Section 2.6 below).

(c) Term. A Trustee's term is generally four (4) years long, as modified by this Section 2 2(c). The term of a newly elected Trustee shall commence upon his or her acceptance of trusteeship, following formalities established by the Trustees. If a person who is elected Trustee does not formally accept election within sixty (60) days of election, the election shall be automatically revoked.

A Trustee may serve no more than three (3) terms. Reelection as Trustee is in the sole discretion of the Trustees

A Trustee's term shall extend as follows:

(i) For a new Trustee elected on or after January 1 of any fiscal year, until June 30 of the fourth (4<sup>th</sup>) full fiscal year following the election year. For example, the term of a Trustee elected in March 2001 would normally end on June 30, 2005.

(ii) For a new Trustee elected before January 1 of any fiscal year, until June 30 of the third (3<sup>rd</sup>) full fiscal year following the election year. For example, the term of a Trustee elected in December 2000 would normally end on June 30, 2004.

(iii) For a Trustee reelected to a second or third term at the Annual Meeting, such new term extends until June 30 of the fourth full fiscal year following the reelection year. For example, the new term of a Trustee reelected in June 2001 would normally end on June 30, 2005

(iv) For the President, as long as he or she is President

(d) Resignation or Removal, Record of Former Trusteeship A Trustee may resign by giving written notice to either the Chair or President (see Sections 4.5 and 4.6 below), specifying the effective date of the resignation.



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If, in the reasonable discretion of the Trustees, the clear best interest of the Trust would be served, the Trustees may take appropriate steps to remove a Trustee, but only after the Trustee has received reasonable notice and an opportunity to be heard by the Trustees.

The Secretary (see Section 4 8 below) shall maintain or cause to be maintained as part of the Trust's records a statement noting the beginning and ending dates of the tenure as Trustee of all former Trustees.

Section 2 3 CURRENT TRUSTEES. The Secretary shall maintain a list of current Trustees, including their addresses and contact information, and showing the dates when their service as Trustees began and when their current terms end. Current terms of Trustees serving when these amended and restated Bylaws are adopted by the Trustees shall end on the dates that were set at the start of the terms.

Section 2 4 TRUSTEES EMERITI. The Trustees may elect one or more Trustees Emeriti from among the former Trustees. Trustees Emeriti shall serve at the pleasure of the Trustees. They shall not vote on any matter, and shall have no rights, powers, privileges, or duties except those expressly assigned to them by the Trustees.

Section 2.5 CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY. The Trustees shall, by resolution, adopt and maintain a written conflict of interest policy regulating the interactions of the Trustees and the Trust.

Section 2 6 ANNUAL MEETING. The Trustees shall hold an Annual Meeting (the "Annual Meeting") in May of each year for the purposes of organization, election of officers, appointment of committees, and the transaction of other Trust business.

Section 2.7 OTHER MEETINGS. The Trustees may hold other meetings on such dates and at such times as may be reasonably fixed by the Chair or the President. Such meetings may be called by the Chair, the President, or any three (3) Trustees

Section 2.8 NOTICE. Annual and other meetings of the Trustees shall be held upon at least five (5) days' written notice, including time, place, and agenda, given to each Trustee by postal service, commercial express mail, personal delivery, facsimile, electronic mail, or other similar means of communication

Notice shall be addressed or delivered to each Trustee at the Trustee's address as shown upon the records of the Trust maintained by the Secretary, or as may have been given to the Secretary by the Trustee for purposes of notice. If a Trustee's address is not shown on such records or is not readily ascertainable, notice to the Trustee may be given care of the principal office of the Trust.



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Notice by postal service shall be deemed to have been given at the time that written notice is deposited in the United States mails, postage prepaid. Any other written notice shall be deemed to have been given at the time it is personally delivered to the recipient, delivered to a common carrier for transmission, or actually transmitted by the person giving the notice by electronic means to the recipient.

Section 2.9 PLACE OF MEETING. Meetings of the Trustees shall be held at any place designated by the Trustees. Absent a specific designation, meetings shall be held at the principal office of the Trust.

Section 2.10 ACTION AND QUORUM. In all matters pertaining to the affairs of the Trust, the Trustees shall act by a vote of a majority of the number of Trustees then in office. The same majority of the number of Trustees then in office shall constitute a quorum of the Trustees for the transaction of business, except to adjourn as provided in Section 2.13.

Section 2.11 PARTICIPATION IN MEETINGS BY CONFERENCE TELEPHONE. Trustees may participate in a meeting of the Trustees, or a committee meeting, by conference telephone or similar communications equipment, as long as all Trustees participating in such meeting can hear one another.

Section 2.12 WAIVER OF NOTICE. Notice of a meeting need not be given to any Trustee who signs a waiver of notice, whether before or after the meeting. All such waivers shall be filed with the Trust records or made a part of the minutes of the meeting.

Section 2.13 ADJOURNMENT. A majority of the Trustees present, whether or not a quorum exists, may adjourn any Trustees' meeting to another time and place. Notice of the time and place of reconvening an adjourned meeting need not be given to absent Trustees if the time and place is fixed at the adjourned meeting, as long as the meeting is reconvened within twenty-four (24) hours of adjournment.

Section 2.14 ACTION BY UNANIMOUS WRITTEN CONSENT. Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the Board of Trustees or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if all members of the Board of Trustees or such committee, as the case may be, consent thereto in writing, which writing may be executed in one or more counterparts, and the writing or writings are filed with the minutes of proceedings of the Board of Trustees or such committee.

Section 2.15 TRUSTEE COMPENSATION. Trustees and Trustees Emeriti shall not receive compensation for their services as such or as committee members; *provided, however*, that the President may be compensated for services rendered as President, notwithstanding his or her position as Trustee.



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Section 2.16 TRUSTEE REIMBURSEMENT. Upon submitting appropriate documentation, Trustees shall receive reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred in the course of carrying out their duties as Trustees.

Section 2.17 RIGHTS OF INSPECTION. Every Trustee shall have the absolute right at any reasonable time to inspect and copy all books, records, and documents of every kind and to inspect the physical properties of the Trust.

### ARTICLE III. COMMITTEES

Section 3.1 STANDING AND SPECIAL COMMITTEES The Trustees may from time to time establish one or more standing or special committees of Trustees. At the Annual Meeting, the Governance Committee (see Section 3.1(f) below) shall recommend to the Board of Trustees, and the Board of Trustees shall appoint Trustees as committee members and chairs, and shall prescribe committee duties and powers. In recommending committee chairs and members, the Governance Committee shall consult with the Chair and the President. A Trustee may serve on more than one committee. The Chair, the President, and all Vice-Chairs shall serve as *ex officio* members of all committees, except that the President shall not serve on the Audit Committee, and the Chairs of each of the Audit and Finance Committees shall not serve on the corresponding committee.

Notice of, and procedures for, meetings of standing or special committees shall be prescribed by the chair of each standing or special committee. Committees shall keep minutes of their meetings and shall keep the Trustees advised of their activities. Meetings of standing or special committees may be called by the Trustees or by the chair of the standing or special committee.

The standing committees shall include the Executive Committee, the Compensation Committee, the Audit Committee, the Finance Committee, the Investment Committee, the Governance Committee, and the External Affairs Committee. The responsibilities of these standing committees shall be as follows.

(a) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chair, any Vice Chairs, and the President. The Committee shall have power to take any action within the authority of the Board of Trustees and shall report any such action to the Board of Trustees no later than the next meeting of the Board of Trustees

(b) Compensation Committee The Compensation Committee shall assist the Board of Trustees in fulfilling its responsibilities for establishing and overseeing the overall compensation and benefit policies of the Trust



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(c) Audit Committee. The Audit Committee shall assist the Board of Trustees in fulfilling its responsibilities relating to management practices, internal control, accounting policies, and auditing and reporting practices.

(d) Finance Committee. The Finance Committee shall assist the Board of Trustees in fulfilling its responsibilities with respect to budgetary matters, financial management policy and capital expenditures of the Trust.

(e) Investment Committee. The Investment Committee shall assist the Board of Trustees in fulfilling its responsibilities to monitor and oversee the performance of the Trust's investment program. The Committee may include non-Trustees as non-voting members.

(f) Governance Committee. The Governance Committee shall assist the Board of Trustees in fulfilling its responsibilities with respect to matters of governance of the Trust and in identifying and recommending to the Board of Trustees candidates to be Trustees of the Trust.

(g) External Affairs Committee. The External Affairs Committee shall assist the Board of Trustees in fulfilling its responsibilities by overseeing the Trust's communications activities to ensure that they properly inform both its internal and external audiences of the extensive work of the Trust's programs.

Section 3.2 ART ACQUISITIONS. The Trustees shall act as a committee of the whole in reviewing and approving acquisitions by the Trust of works of art with a value of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) or more, and of such other works or categories of works as may be designated by the Trustees from time to time.

#### ARTICLE IV. *OFFICERS*

Section 4.1 OFFICERS. The officers of the Trust shall include a Chair, a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The Trust may also have, at the discretion of the Trustees, one or more Vice-Chairs, one or more Vice Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries, one or more assistant financial officers, and such other officers as may be elected or appointed in accordance with the Trust Indenture and these Bylaws. Any number of offices may be held by the same person except that neither the Secretary nor the Treasurer may serve concurrently as either the Chair or President. The Chair, any Vice-Chairs, and the President shall be Trustees. Other officers may, but need not, be Trustees.

Section 4.2 ELECTION. In advance of the Annual Meeting, the Governance Committee shall advise the Trustees of its nominations for Chair and Vice-Chair, if any, and the



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President shall advise the Trustees of his or her nominations for other officer positions, including Secretary and Treasurer. The Committee and President shall propose any duties not set forth in these Bylaws to be assigned to each officer so nominated by them, respectively. Giving due weight to these nominations, the Trustees shall elect officers and assign any duties not set forth in these Bylaws to these officers at the Annual Meeting. Each such officer shall serve at the pleasure of the Trustees. Each such officer shall hold office until the earlier of one year from his or her election or resignation, removal, or other disqualification.

At the meeting of Trustees at which these amended and restated Bylaws are adopted, the Trustees shall also elect the officers of the Trust under the procedures, and with the duties and for the terms, set forth in these Bylaws. These newly elected officers shall immediately take office, and the prior officers shall no longer hold their respective offices unless reelected.

**Section 4.3 VACANCIES AND ADDITIONAL OFFICERS.** If a vacancy unexpectedly occurs in the office of Chair, President, Secretary, or Treasurer, the Trustees shall act reasonably promptly to fill such vacancy, taking into account the nominations of the Governance Committee in the case of Chair or President, or of the President in the case of Secretary or Treasurer.

The Trustees may, in their discretion, elect other officers during the course of the year, taking into account the nominations of the Governance Committee as to Vice-Chairs and of the President as to other officers.

Any officer elected under this Section 4.3 (other than the President) shall hold office until the earlier of the next Annual Meeting or resignation, removal, or other disqualification.

**Section 4.4 REMOVAL AND RESIGNATION.** Any officer may be removed, either with or without cause, by the Trustees at any time. Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Chair or the President, but without prejudice to the rights, if any, of the Trust under any contract to which the officer is a party.

**Section 4.5 CHAIR.** The Chair shall preside over all meetings of the Trustees at which he is present. The Chair shall represent the Trust in a ceremonial and ambassadorial capacity when the dignity and interest of the Trust so require. He or she shall have such other duties as may be assigned by the Trustees or these Bylaws. If the Chair is not present at a Trustees' meeting, the senior Vice-Chair who is present, or otherwise the President, shall preside. The term of the Chair shall not exceed three (3) years plus any partial year if the Chair is elected between Annual Meetings.

**Section 4.6 PRESIDENT.** The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Trust, with all powers, rights, duties, and privileges that traditionally accrue to that office, subject to applicable legal restrictions and the Trust Indenture, and shall have such other duties as may be assigned by the Trustees or these Bylaws. The President shall nominate candidates



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for certain Trust officer positions as provided in Sections 4.2 and 4.3 above. The Trustees shall determine the term and compensation of the President.

Section 4.7 VICE-CHAIRS AND VICE-PRESIDENTS. Vice-Chairs and Vice-Presidents, if any, shall have the duties as may be assigned by the Trustees or President, respectively, or these Bylaws.

Section 4.8 SECRETARY. The Secretary shall keep or cause to be kept, at the principal office or such other place as the Trustees may order, a book of minutes of all meetings of the Trustees and its committees, with the time and place of meeting, whether regular or special, and if special, how authorized, the names of those present, and the proceedings thereof. The Secretary shall keep, or cause to be kept, at the principal office in the State of California the original or a certified copy of the Trust's Trust Indenture and Bylaws, as amended to date

The Secretary shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings of the Trustees and any committees thereof required by law or by these Bylaws, and shall have such other duties as may be assigned by the Trustees, the President, or these Bylaws

Section 4.9 TREASURER. The Treasurer shall keep and maintain, or cause to be kept and maintained, financial statements and adequate and correct accounts of the properties, and investments of the Trust. The Treasurer shall act as the administrator of the Trust's investment program, and shall advise the President and the Finance and Investment Committees on policies regarding investments, cash management, and debt management. The Treasurer shall have such other duties as may be assigned by the Trustees, the President, or these Bylaws

## ARTICLE V. *OTHER PROVISIONS*

Section 5.1 ENDORSEMENT OF DOCUMENTS, CONTRACTS. Subject to the provisions of applicable law, any note, mortgage, evidence of indebtedness, contract, conveyance, or other instrument in writing and any assignment or endorsement thereof, executed or entered into between the Trust and any other person, when executed by Trust officers in accordance with resolutions duly adopted by the Trustees, shall be valid and binding on the Trust in the absence of actual knowledge on the part of the other person that the signing officers had no authority to execute the same. Any such instruments may be signed by any other person or persons and in such manner as from time to time shall be determined by the Trustees, and, unless so authorized by the Trustees, no officer, agent, or employee shall have any power or authority to bind the Trust by any contract or engagement or to pledge its credit or to render it liable for any purpose or amount

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Section 5.2 REPRESENTATION OF SHARES OF OTHER ENTITIES. The Chair, the President, or any other officer or officers authorized by the Trustees, are each authorized to vote, represent, and exercise on behalf of the Trust all rights incident to any and all shares of any corporation or other legal entity standing in the name of the Trustees or the Trust. The authority herein granted may be exercised either by such officer in person or by any other person authorized to do so by proxy or power of attorney duly executed by such officer

Section 5.3 CONSTRUCTION AND DEFINITIONS. Unless the context otherwise requires, the general provisions, rules of construction, and definitions contained in the California Trust Law and other applicable California laws shall govern the construction of these Bylaws.

Section 5.4 AMENDMENTS. These Bylaws may be amended or repealed by the Trustees at a meeting of Trustees, *provided, however*, that at least five days written notice of any proposed amendments is duly provided to the Trustees under the notice procedures set forth in Section 2.8, above.

Section 5.5 MAINTENANCE OF CERTAIN RECORDS. The accounting books, records, and minutes of proceedings of the Trustees shall be kept at such place or places designated by the Trustees, or, in the absence of such designation, at the principal business office of the Trust. The minutes shall be kept in written or typed form, and the accounting books and records shall be kept either in written or typed form, or in any other form including electronic media capable of being converted into written, typed, or printed form.

Section 5.6 INDEMNIFICATION. The Trust shall, and hereby does, to the extent permitted by law and the Trust Indenture, indemnify each of its Trustees and officers, including persons who have served as such in the past or who are heirs, executors, or administrators thereof, against expenses (including attorney's fees), judgments, fines, settlements, and other amounts actually and reasonably incurred in connection with any actual or threatened proceeding of any kind, arising by reason of the fact that any such person is or was a Trustee or officer of the Trust, and shall advance to such Trustee or officer expenses reasonably incurred in defending any such proceeding as permitted by law and the Trust Indenture. Such indemnity shall apply, however, only if, in connection with the matter at issue, the Trustee or officer claiming indemnity hereunder acted in good faith and in a manner he or she reasonably believed was in the best interests of the Trust. This indemnity does not extend to any acts of the person seeking indemnity which involve gross negligence or willful misconduct, or are materially in breach of the Trust Indenture or these Bylaws, or which constitute an act of self-dealing or a taxable expenditure within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code sections 4941(d) or 4945(d), respectively. The Trust may obtain and may rely on a written opinion of



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independent legal counsel on any issues of good faith, reasonable belief, or breach, or on any and all other issues that may bear on the application of this indemnity.

**The Role of the Board of Trustees in Overseeing Senior Management Compensation**

The Compensation Committee, a standing committee composed of independent members of the Board of Trustees, establishes the terms of the President's contract and compensation, subject to the approval of the full Board of Trustees, as well as approves the compensation of the President's direct reports

Trustees of the J Paul Getty Trust receive no compensation for their service but are reimbursed for travel expenses incurred in fulfilling their duties as members of the Board. In addition, Trustees are eligible to participate in a matching gift program providing matching gift funds to qualified public charities on a four to one basis up to an annual maximum matching amount of \$60,000.

**The J. Paul Getty Trust Senior Management Compensation Policy**

The goal of the Getty's compensation process is to pay salaries that are competitive for comparable positions at organizations similar to the Trust in activities and scope.

Each year, the performance and compensation of the President and Chief Executive Officer is reviewed and set by the Compensation Committee and the Board of Trustees in executive sessions in the absence of the President and CEO. Annual compensation decisions regarding direct reports to the President are recommended by the President and CEO to the Compensation Committee for approval. The President's direct reports are eligible to participate in a matching gift program providing matching funds to qualified public charities on a four-to-one basis up to a maximum matching amount of \$32,000

The Compensation Committee reviews and compares compensation levels for the President and his direct reports with those reported for analogous positions at comparable organizations. The Compensation Committee relies on reports of a nationally recognized, independent executive compensation consultant (Mercer Human Resources Consulting), setting forth the comparative information as to compensation at leading cultural organizations, private foundations, and universities

The independent executive compensation consultant selects similar positions among organizations of comparable scope, scale and purpose. In its last report, completed in April 2006, the consultant used competitive data from two market sources: broad-based published surveys and information contained in the IRS Form 990s of a custom peer group. Organizations included in the peer group are set forth in the table below. All organizations in the custom peer group are not used for each position.

Annual compensation adjustments for other personnel are also merit based and are determined after an annual performance evaluation process conducted at the end of each fiscal year. Senior management makes recommendations to the President and CEO for salary adjustments for such employees within their organizational reporting structure, based upon ranges established in advance by the President and CEO and ratified by the Board of Trustees in the budget planning process.

**Cash Compensation of Officers and Highest Paid Employees**

The Getty is guided in the preparation of its annual tax return on Form 990-PF (the "990") and related compensation disclosures by advice from its tax accountants and outside tax counsel. The Getty's goal is a presentation that complies with IRS requirements and facilitates appropriate and meaningful comparisons among institutions by all interested parties.

In order to provide compensation information that would minimize distortion and be easily compared with that paid by other organizations, the Getty, beginning with the filing for fiscal year ending June 30, 2002, provided 'base salary' information in column one of the 990 and reported cash compensation other than salary in explanatory footnotes.

Tables two and three provide summary information regarding *cash compensation* and *total compensation* for all officers, as well as information for the five highest paid employees other

than officers, as reported in the Trust's form 990-PF tax return for fiscal years ending June 30, 2006, 2005 and 2004. Additional detail is provided in Table 4 regarding the components of cash compensation for each employee for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006.

Cash compensation includes salary and bonuses, payments for the ERISA limitation on compensation considered for benefit calculations, housing and automobile allowances, payments for taxes due on non-qualified supplemental employee retirement benefits vested, payments for taxes due on the imputed value of other benefits, and severance payments. The table also indicates if the employee received perquisites including automobile, housing, or participation in a supplemental employee retirement plan.

In addition to cash compensation, the annual 990-PF requires institutions to show all forms of compensation whether paid to the employee or not and including estimates of the value of benefits such as health and welfare coverage, referred to as "total compensation."

In general, the 990-PF separates compensation into three categories. The first column contains salary, fees, bonuses, and severance payments as well as current year payment amounts reported as deferred compensation in any prior year. This column is labeled "Cash Compensation" in Table 3.

The second column of the 990-PF contains all forms of deferred compensation and future severance payments, payments to health and welfare benefit plans, and any amounts earned but not yet paid during the fiscal year. These amounts are shown in the column labeled "Contribution to Employee Benefit Plans and Deferred Compensation" in Table 3.

The last category of compensation required on the 990-PF includes the value of both taxable and nontaxable fringe benefits, expense account or other allowances, payments made in connection with indemnification arrangements, and the value of the personal use of housing, automobiles, or other assets owned by the organization. These figures are shown in the column labeled "Other Allowances" in Table 3. The sum of all forms of compensation is reported as "Total Compensation" in the last column of Table 3.

**Additional Information**

*President and Chief Executive Officer*

James N Wood was appointed the Getty's President and Chief Executive Officer, as well as a Trustee of the J Paul Getty Trust, effective February 15, 2007

In general, employees of The J. Paul Getty Trust are at-will and their employment is subject to terms and conditions described in individual appointment letters and in the Staff Handbook. The Trust has entered into an employment agreement with James Woods. The agreement is for a period of five years, commencing February 15, 2007.

Under the terms of the agreement, Mr Wood earns a base salary of \$700,000 per year and a housing stipend of \$20,000 per month

Mr. Wood's agreement also provides for a one-time moving and transition expense allowance of \$150,000 and a sign-on bonus of \$250,000, each paid within 14 days of the commencement of Mr. Wood's employment under the contract.

Under the agreement, Mr Wood has agreed that he will not participate in the Trust's defined benefit retirement plan, will not qualify for any severance pay not provided for under the Agreement, and shall not qualify for any retiree medical benefits provided by the Trust

Mr. Wood receives deferred compensation as provided for under the agreement. The agreement provides that the Getty shall pay Mr. Wood a lump sum amount as deferred compensation of \$100,000 for each full contract year (February 15 to February 14) and a pro rata amount of such \$100,000 for any portion of a contract year that Mr Wood performs his employment services pursuant to the agreement for up to the first four contract years, up to and including February 14, 2011 (potentially four years and \$400,000). Such deferred compensation of up to \$400,000 shall not vest and shall not be payable to Mr. Wood until his employment is terminated or until he performs the agreement to its expiration date. Such deferred compensation shall not vest and shall not be payable to Mr Wood if he is discharged for "cause" or if he resigns without "good reason" (each as defined in the agreement). The Getty has also agreed to pay Mr Wood an additional lump sum amount of \$100,000 as deferred compensation if he remains employed and performing services on March 18, 2011

The agreement provides for a severance payment to Mr Wood if he is terminated without "cause" or if he reasons with "good reason" (all as defined under the agreement) in an amount equal to 12 months of base salary at the rate then in effect (or a pro rata amount if fewer than 12 months remain until the expiration date).

The agreement entitles Mr. Wood to six weeks' paid vacation per year.

The agreement provides that Mr. Wood will receive reimbursement for all reasonable travel, entertainment, and other expenses, and, except as provided above, coverage under the Trust's standard benefit plans as in effect from time to time, including health, life, and accident insurance programs and sickness, disability and defined contribution retirement plans.

*Interim President and Chief Executive Officer*

Deborah Marrow, Director of the Foundation, was appointed Interim President and Chief Executive Officer of the J Paul Getty Trust in February 2006 at an annual base salary of \$300,000 and served in that role from February 10, 2006 until February 14, 2007. During the term of her service as Interim President and CEO, she was paid a stipend of \$15,000 per month in addition to her base salary. Dr. Marrow received a bonus payment of \$25,000 at the conclusion of her services as Interim President and Chief Executive Officer. Dr. Marrow also receives estate and financial planning services and an annual payment to compensate her for the ERISA limitation on compensation considered for benefit calculations. In addition, as regular, full-time employee, Dr. Marrow is eligible for reimbursement for all reasonable travel, entertainment, and other expenses, and coverage under vacation, health, life and accident insurance, sickness, disability and pension plans as the Trust makes available to its employees as a group.

*Director of the J Paul Getty Museum*

In 2005, the Trust entered into an employment agreement with Michael Brand, Director of the J. Paul Getty Museum.

Dr. Brand's employment agreement with the Trust is for five years commencing December 1, 2005. Following the end of the five-year term, Dr. Brand's employment may be extended for successive one-year periods unless either party provides notice of termination. Under the terms of the agreement, Dr. Brand was initially accorded a base salary of \$482,000 per year, to be adjusted annually by recommendation of the President and Chief Executive Officer to the Compensation Committee, which reviews the recommendation in the manner described above.

Dr. Brand's agreement also provided a one-time transition payment of \$165,000 as well as an annual payment to compensate Dr. Brand for the ERISA limitation on compensation considered for benefit calculations. Dr. Brand's agreement provides for reimbursement for all reasonable travel, entertainment, and other expenses, and coverage under vacation, health, life and accident insurance, sickness, disability and pension plans as the Trust makes available to its employees as a group.

In addition, Dr. Brand is required to reside in an official Museum Director's Residence owned and maintained by the Trust at no cost to Dr. Brand. The fair market rental value of the residence is reported annually as compensation to Dr. Brand and the Trust pays state and federal taxes on this reported value and on the expenses of the residence not attributable to its business use, as well as the taxes payable with respect to such payments of taxes.

Dr. Brand's employment agreement provides severance benefits (unless Dr. Brand is terminated for "cause") that include a lump sum cash payment equal to twelve months salary, as well as health care coverage for him and his family for up to twelve months, both reduced by amounts earned by Dr. Brand from any successor employer within twelve months after his employment with the Trust ends.

*Interim Vice President, Finance and Administration and Chief Financial Officer*

Mr. Robert Abeles was appointed Interim Vice President for Finance and Administration and Chief Financial Officer at a monthly salary of \$30,000. As a limited term employee, his employment began November 6, 2006 and is currently scheduled to end on November 6, 2007. As an Interim Vice President, Mr. Abeles is paid at the annual rate of \$360,000. In his position, Mr. Abeles is eligible for reimbursement for all reasonable travel, entertainment, and other expenses, and coverage under vacation, health, and pension plans as the Trust makes available to its employees as a group.

*Incentive Compensation Plan for Chief Investment Officer*

In September 2006 the Trustees approved an incentive compensation plan for Mr. Williams and two other professionals in the Trust's investment office. For Mr. Williams, the plan provides for a "target bonus opportunity" of 30% of his base salary. Half of the bonus is to be determined by reference to the investment performance of the Getty's endowment compared to benchmarks determined by the Trustees' Investment Committee, the other half by reference to the fulfillment by Mr. Williams of individual goals and objectives approved by the President, as well as by the Investment and Compensation Committees of the Trustees. The portion of the bonus to be determined with reference to the investment performance of the endowment could be less (as little as 0%) or more than (as much as 200% of) the target amount depending on the extent to which the endowment under- or outperforms the benchmarks. The Committee has discretion to increase or decrease the recommended bonus by up to 20% to account for factors that are outside the plan objectives but are important given the internal and external context. The Trustees have approved the incentive plan for fiscal year 2007 only, they will evaluate its usefulness before deciding whether to institute a similar or revised plan for subsequent fiscal years.

**Benefits**

*Pension Plans*

The Trust provides a Defined Benefit Retirement Plan and a Defined Contribution Retirement Plan to all eligible employees.

The Defined Benefit Retirement Plan pays a specific monthly benefit upon retirement and is provided at no cost to eligible employees, who are entitled to receive plan benefits after a five-year vesting period. The plan provides for a lifetime annuity upon retirement equal to 1.4% times the employees average compensation over five years plus 0.55% times the years of credited service as an employee of the Trust up to a maximum of 25 years. This amount is reduced if payments begin before age 62.

The Defined Contribution Retirement Plan matches 100% of voluntary eligible contributions made by employees to a qualified 403(b) plan up to 4% of the employee's salary.

Certain senior management positions also receive an annual payment, subject to standard withholding, to compensate them for the ERISA limitation on compensation considered for benefit calculations. This amount varies each year depending on ERISA limits and the employee's base salary.

**THE J. PAUL GETTY MUSEUM AT THE GETTY CENTER**

1,045,688 people visited the Museum at the Getty Center free of charge during FY06. In addition to presenting works of art from the permanent collection and temporary exhibitions (a total of 20 exhibitions opened during the year), the Museum provided a wide variety of free interpretive materials, programs, and services on a daily basis. These included gallery and architecture tours; interactive and educational spaces including the Family Room, Art Information Rooms and the GettyGuide room; an orientation film; and a variety of printed materials including a exhibition brochures, maps, and visitor's guides.

In addition to the activities listed above, which are available to all visitors on a daily basis, the **Getty Museum** provided a variety of other activities and services at the Getty Center. They included:

- Four (4) large-scale free Family Festivals, which featured art-making activities, gallery activities, storytelling, and a variety of community-based music, dance, and theater performances related to current exhibitions. Approximately 23,906 people attended during the fiscal year.
- There were 31 free performing arts programs (23,342 attendees) in FY06 including the series Friday Nights at the Getty, Summer Sessions, Garden Concerts for Kids, Sounds of LA and exhibition-related film series. In addition to free performances, there were 11 ticketed performances (3,537 attendees) in FY06 including Gordon Getty Concerts, Selected Shorts, and special concert events.
- Storytelling, Getty Getaway Days, Artful Weekends, Art Detective Cards, Art Stops, and Art Adventures, free programs offered in English and Spanish, served families with children. A total of 1,195 visitors were served by Storytelling, 7,090 by Getty Getaway Days, 7,328 by Artful Weekends, 4,877 by Art Adventures, and 3,651 by Art Stops. In addition, the Family Room is a hub for families during their visit, and during FY06, 148,050 visitors were served in the Family Room.
- The School Program served approximately 82,119 students and teachers during FY06. We spent \$152,800 on bus transportation for Title I schools, providing approximately 449 bus rentals this year.
- The teacher development programs served local educators and community organizations to help them integrate art education into their activities. In FY06, 184 local K-5 teachers participated in the Art & Language Arts program, 529 K-12 teachers and chaperones participated in the Teacher Collaboration Workshops, and 528 utilized the Teacher Resource Center. The Open Workshops for K-12 teachers had 203 participants and the

- English as a Second Language program 3,259 teachers and students participate.
- The Museum provided 22 lectures (5,414 attendees), 13 seminars (626 attendees), and 53 Artist-at-Work Demonstrations (7,694 attendees) free of charge. In addition, the Museum provided 94 drawing-based and other artist-based programs attended by 2,536 visitors.
- The Museum provided gallery tours to 105 community groups (non-profit organizations), totaling 2,226 visitors. Transportation services subsidized 29 buses for these groups during the course of the fiscal year. In FY06, there were 43 staff-led college group tours with 890 students participants. In addition to presenting works of art from the permanent collection and temporary exhibitions (a total of 4 exhibitions opened at the Getty Villa during the fiscal year), the Museum provided a wide variety of free interpretive materials, programs, and services on a daily basis. These included gallery and architecture tours; interactive and educational spaces including the TimeScape Room, the Family Forum, the GettyGuide room, and a reading room; an orientation film; and a variety of printed materials including a visitor guide and exhibition and audioguide brochures.

In addition to the activities listed above, which are available to all visitors on a daily basis, the **Getty Museum** provided a variety of other activities and services at the Getty Villa. They included:

One (1) large-scale free Family Festival, which featured art-making activities, gallery activities, storytelling, and a variety of community-based music, and theater performances related to the exhibitions featuring the largest one-day attendance at the Villa (1,615).

There were 12 free performing arts programs (2,273 attendees) in FY06 including the new Playreading Series and exhibition-related film series. In addition to free performances, there were 2 ticketed performances (456 attendees) in FY06 with the new Concerts at the Villa series.

- Families with children are served by free Art Odyssey tours in both English and Spanish. In FY06, a total of 790 visitors were served through this program. The Family Forum is a hub for families during their visit, and during FY06, 55,097 visitors were served by the Family Forum.
- The Villa School Program served approximately 5,751 students and teachers during FY06. We spent \$33,339 on bus transportation for Title 1 schools, providing approximately 100 bus

rentals this year.

- The teacher development programs served local educators and community organizations to help them integrate art education into their activities. In FY06, the Villa served 257 teachers.
- The Villa provided gallery tours to 652 community group participants.
- The Villa provided facilitated tours and programs to 2,852 university students and faculty.

**Publications**

Getty Publications published 39 new titles and distributed three others during FY06.

**Paintings Conservation**

The Paintings Conservation department carried out study and in some cases treatment of several recent acquisitions, including Rubens' *The Calydoman Boar Hunt* and Guardi's *The Grand Canal, Venice*.

A number of outside projects were carried out as part of the department's ongoing program of providing conservation services to other institutions. These included study and treatment of two key paintings from the Museum of Fine Arts in Budapest, Hungary (Petrus Christus' *Virgin and Child in an Archway* and the *Martyrdom of Sts Paul and Barnabus* by an anonymous Flemish Renaissance master) Bouguereau's *Song of the Angels* from the Forest Lawn Museum of Art in Glendale, CA came to the Getty for study and extensive treatment as well. All of the paintings were placed on public view in the galleries for six months prior to their return.

As part of the Budapest project, a guest conservator from the Museum of Fine Arts, András Fáy, spent three months in residence at the Getty.

A great deal of time and effort was devoted to the exhibitions program, including two major loan shows: *Courbet and the Modern Landscape* and *Rembrandt's Late Religious Portraits*. Planning and coordination for a number of future exhibition projects also continued, including loans of paintings by Caspar David Friedrich from Dresden, paintings by Gerhard Richter from New York, a complicated loan of exceptional icons from the Holy Monastery of Saint Catherine in Sinai, Egypt; and other works of art for future exhibitions on Jean-Honoré Fragonard and Jean-Baptiste Oudry.

Several other projects continued or were developed:

- Two very large paintings by Jean-Baptiste Oudry, a *Lion* and a *Rhinoceros*, from the Staatliche Museum in Schwerin, Germany are currently undergoing complex conservation treatment. The

work involves cleaning, consolidating flaking paint, stretching on new strainers, filling, and retouching. The paintings will be displayed in a special exhibition at the Getty planned for May of 2007. The exhibition will travel to the Museum of Fine Arts in Houston prior to the return of the two paintings (and exhibition) to Schwerin. A third painting, a *Tiger*, from the same series, came to the department from Schwerin for study and treatment in late 2005.

- A monumental *Virgin and Child* by Nosadella, from the Norton Museum of Art in Palm Beach, Florida, was sent to the Getty in late 2005 for treatment and eventual exhibition.
- Two panels by Tommaso del Mazza were sent to the Getty from the Bob Jones University Art Gallery for study, treatment, and potential re-unification with the central panel from an early Italian Renaissance triptych by this artist (the central panel is in the Getty collection).
- A partnership with the Mellon Foundation exploring the complex issue of conservation documentation resulted in a meeting at the Metropolitan Museum of Art attended by museum directors and other key staff members (45 in total) from an international array of major museums.

All members of the department participated in a variety of symposia and offered specialist and public lectures in a variety of venues. In addition, department members offered time, expertise and advice to other organizations and institutions (serving as organization officers or serving on advisory boards), including The Wallace Collection, the Courtauld conservation program, and ICOM-CC.

David Bomford, paintings conservator from the National Gallery, London, was hosted at the Getty Center for three months as part of the Museum's Guest Scholar program.

Extensive conservation work was performed by several members of the Department in preparation for the special exhibition *Antiquity & Photography: Early Views of Ancient Mediterranean Sites* mounted for the opening of the Getty Villa. The Department also performed conservation work for special exhibitions such as *Painted Prayers Books of Hours from the Morgan Library*, *Degas at the Getty*, *Ensor's Graphic Modernism*, and *Courbet and the Modern Landscape*. Work for these exhibitions included the conservation treatment by Nancy Yocco of the pastel drawing *Miss Lala* by Edgar Degas.

The Manuscripts exhibition *A Masterpiece Reconstructed The Hours of Louis XII* included loans from 8 foreign lenders. Conservation treatments performed for the exhibition included the inlay mounting of the Getty's three Bourdichon leaves from the Hours of Louis XII to enable them to be displayed and sent on loan to the exhibition's second venue at the Victoria and Albert Museum, London. Analytical work on the painting techniques and materials of Jean Bourdichon and his contemporaries was continued and expanded to include research on two loan manuscripts from the Morgan Library, the Book of Hours (M. 732) by Jean Bourdichon, and a Book of Hours (M. 834) by Jean Fouquet. Reports of the analytical results were provided to Morgan Library.

In preparation for the 2006-2007 exhibition *Holy Image, Hallowed Ground Icons from Sinai*, Nancy Turner traveled for a second time to Saint Catherine's Monastery, Sinai to document and prepare a condition report notebook for the manuscript loans. This trip also involved the testing of materials for the possible consolidation treatment of flaking pigments as well as the design of mounts for six loan manuscripts from the monastery collection.

LOANS OF WORKS ON PAPER

Many collection objects were conserved for loan to other institutions. Loans of Manuscripts included the entire exhibition *Masterpieces in Miniature Italian Manuscripts from the Middle Ages and Renaissance from the Collection of The J Paul Getty Museum* to the National Gallery of Art, Washington D.C. Conservation treatments were performed on 37 of the 43 Getty objects lent, including such major treatments as the removal of the Pacino da Buonaguida leaf from an acidic mounting board, and 11 inlay mounts to Italian manuscript cuttings. Several consultations were made at other institutions. Nancy Turner, along with Karen Trentelman of the GCI, was invited by the Balboa Art Conservation Center, San Diego to identify painting materials used in a collection of Indian miniatures belonging to the San Diego Museum of Art. Reports of the analytical results on the objects studied were provided to both institutions. Marc Harnly advised Carolyn Peter, Curator of Photographs at the Armand Hammer/UCLA Museum of Art, on the process identification of a photographic print by Edward Curtis.

Nancy Yocco lectured on general paper conservation to the UCLA/Getty Program in Archaeological and Ethnographic Conservation. Nancy Turner lectured to the same group on "The manufacture and characteristics of paper, papyrus, parchment and leather". She also taught a portion of the UCSB seminar "From Scroll to Screen" on the materials of manuscripts.

Nancy Turner completed the final analytical work on the Martín de Murúa manuscript *Historia general del Peru*. This work was included in Nancy's article "Colors, textiles and artistic production in Martín de Murúa, *Historia General del Perú* in the J. Paul Getty Museum", prepared with co-authors Elena Phipps and Karen Trentelman. This will be included in the facsimile of the Murúa manuscript that will be published by the GRI in 2008. Nancy also prepared the article "A Romanesque Binding in The J. Paul Getty Museum" for the Festschrift in honor of Christopher Clarkson.

Bourdichon," expanding upon her article in the exhibition monograph of the same title. The work included the result of collaborative technical analysis done with Karen Trentleman at the GCI.

The book *Coatings on Photographs* was published by the American institute for Conservation (AIC) that contained the chapter "Coatings on the Photographs of Gustave Le Gray" written by Marc Harnly. This chapter was the result of two previous years of study and research on Le Gray and his photographs in the JPGM collection and the other major holdings around the world. The study was supported by analytical work performed by Dusan Stulik, Senior Scientist at the GCI.

Marc Harnly continued to serve as Chair of the Photographic Materials Group of the AIC. The largest job of this position was to plan the 2006 annual meeting of the group that was held in Richmond, VA. Plans were also begun for the group's 2007 annual meeting to be held at the George Eastman House in Rochester, NY. The PMG will meet jointly with the Photographic Records Group of the International Council of Museums – Conservation Committee (ICOM-CC) at this meeting. Marc also served on the nominating committee for the Western Association for Art Conservation.

Marc Harnly worked in the support of a number of other JPGM and Trust programs.

- Lecture and Seminar Advisory Committee of the Museum Department of Education
- Photographs Gallery Card Committee for the Museum Department of Education
- Reviewed grant applications for the Getty Foundation, an ongoing activity
- Presentation on Photographs Conservation to the Photographs Council at their semi-annual meeting

Marc also served on the Review Committee for the upcoming GCI publication *Readings in Photographs Conservation*. This included a two-day meeting of the committee at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, NY. Marc's participation is continuing with research into 19<sup>th</sup> century writings related to photographs conservation.

Many of the Department staff members were heavily involved in planning the expansion of the Photographs exhibition programs and galleries in Fall 2006. This included extensive work with the Department of Facilities to regulate the gallery environmental HVAC systems. There was also extensive participation in the ongoing plans for a cold storage facility for the Photographs color collections. Planning included:

- Weekly meetings and ongoing correspondence with representatives of the departments of Photographs, Facilities, and outside contractors
- Research on the present state of cold storage and the latest developments in the storage technology
- Consultation with outside conservators and collections with cold storage facilities and/or facilities for the storage of large-scale artworks, including consultation visits to SFMOMA, MOMA, NY, Metropolitan Museum of Art, and Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco

**Decorative Arts and Sculpture Conservation**

Head conservator Brian Considine continued his service as a reviewer for the Getty Foundation's 2004 Conservation Advisory Committee, studying dozens of submitted conservation-related grant proposals in July 2005 and serving on the selection committee in August 2005.

Associate conservator Julie Wolfe served as chair emeritus of the Objects Specialty Group (a subgroup of the American Institute of Conservation) from June 2006 – June 2007. In addition, she has been a volunteer for the AIC's Certification Committee.

Brian Considine traveled to New Orleans in November 2005 with a group from across the Getty to investigate ways to help New Orleans's cultural organizations. He then reviewed the applications for the Getty Foundation. In addition, he organized the donation by the J. Paul Getty Museum of used exhibition pedestals for contribution to the New Orleans Museum of Art. He also organized a lecture by associate conservator Arlen Heginbotham and Debbie Hess Norris from the University of Delaware on the preservation of collections in New Orleans.

Arlen Heginbotham gave a lecture and practical lab session in November 2005 to students of the Getty-UCLA Graduate Training Program in Archaeological and Ethnographic Conservation about the identification and conservation of wood.

In FY06 Brian Considine served on the Organizing Committee for the Triennial meeting of the International Institute for Conservation, which took place in Munich in September 2006.

Associate conservator Jane Bassett treated several collection items at the Huntington Library, Art Collections, and Botanical Gardens, including the vacuuming of three tapestries, and treating the sculpture *Bust of a Boy* by Vasse.

In January 2006, associate conservator Arlen Heginbotham, with Deborah Hess Norris of the University of Delaware, traveled to New Orleans to present "Salvaging from the Storm: Fixing Photos, Furniture and More," at a meeting of the Louisiana Landmarks Society, Loyola University, New Orleans.

Brian Considine advised the Conservation department at the Metropolitan Museum of Art on the conservation of the wall paneling in their Wrightsman galleries.

Julie Wolfe organized and ran a business meeting, and a tip session for the AIC annual meeting of 2006.

In March 2006 Arlen Heginbotham delivered a lecture for the Furniture History Society in London about the department’s research on the Getty’s Renaissance Cabinet (71.DA.89).

For the UCLA-Getty Conservation Training Program, Jane Bassett gave a lecture on “X-ray radiography as a tool for the examination of Renaissance and later bronzes.”

In June 2006 Arlen Heginbotham gave a 2-hour tour and lecture to the students of the Cerritos College Cabinetmaking Program about the exhibition “A Renaissance Cabinet Rediscovered.”

Brian Considine and the staff provided their annual conservation lab tour for students of the USC Summer Preservation Program. Various tours were also held for visiting colleagues, museum executives, international diplomats, and local students, including Olha Yarema, textile conservator at the Metropolitan Museum of Art; a pre-program student Lisa Ward; PhD candidates in Chemistry from USC; and Museum Leadership Institute attendees.

The staff members regularly handle inquiries from the public asking for advice on the care of personal artwork.

protect and preserve historic and artistic works throughout the world.

Jeff Maish, associate conservator, continued his service as an associate editor (Objects Conservation) for the Journal of the American Institute for Conservation. In this capacity he oversees the editing process for 1-3 papers a year and assigns peer reviewers.

Assistant conservator Erik Risser presented a paper on the conservation and re-restoration of the "Pouring Satyr" sculpture in the collection at the IIC congress in Munich.

Service to Universities, Colleges or other Educational Institutes:

In general the staff of the antiquities conservation department has been available to provide in-depth conservation tours and presentations to college groups attending seminars or instructional tours of the Villa galleries. To date the staff has given some 26 such tours and presentations.

Service to other Museums:

Jerry Podany, Eduardo Sanchez and Erik Risser undertook the treatment of six mosaics from Tunisian museums. The project required five months and was completed in association with the exhibition "Stories in Stone".

Eduardo Sanchez and Marie Svoboda have begun a project to conserve and re-back a mosaic from the Bardo museum. This is a collaborative project with the Tunisian museum. The treatment will be completed in approximately 4-5 months.

Marie Svoboda, Associate Conservator completed the conservation of a white ground lekythos from the Antiken Samalung in Berlin. The project spanned a period of 10 months and was completed in an agreement for the "Colors of Clay" exhibition.

Erik Risser returned to the archaeological site of Sagalassos in Turkey to assist the Turkish Ministry and the University of Leuven (Belgium) archaeological project team as the site conservator. This year Erik Risser has focused on the conservation of two monumental sculptures and discussions regarding collaboration between the Burdur Museum (where the site finds are exhibited and held) and the Getty Villa.

Erik Risser performed the re-restoration of a small vase for the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art in Kansas City. The work was done in conjunction with the exhibition Colors of Clay at the Getty Villa.

Jeffrey Maish completed the treatment of a vase from the Pergamon Museum in Berlin. The project required approximately 5 months.

Jerry Podany and Mountmakers McKenzie Lowry and BJ Farrar advised the Norton Simon Museum in Pasadena on the seismic protection of several major sculptures in their collection. The project is ongoing.

**THE GETTY RESEARCH INSTITUTE**

The **Getty Research Institute (GRI)** anchors the Getty's research mission and its goal of advancing scholarship in the fields of art and art history. It exists to bring together all the resources and activities required to advance understanding of the visual arts taken in their widest possible significance. The Research Library and the Getty Research Institute provide valuable support for scholars through a residential scholars program and extensive research collections, which include manuscripts, archives, photographs, artists' books, architectural models, two million study photographs, and 950,000 volumes of books, periodicals, and auction catalogues. Access to the collections and to scholarship conducted at the Research Institute is made available at the local, national, and international levels through active publications and exhibitions programs, online databases, and a wide range of public programming that includes lectures, performances, and symposia.

**The Research Library**

The *Research Library* was open to serve outside patrons more than 54 hours per week. 4,026 readers were registered to use the Library during those hours. *Research Library* staff answered 37,057 reference requests 77% (28,580) of which were made by outside patrons. The *Research Library* circulated 73,198 items, 45% (30,402) of which circulated to outside patrons. The Interlibrary Loan unit received 2,751 requests from other libraries and academic institutions and filled 70% (1,915) of those requests.

The *Research Library* recorded 13,413 visits by outside patrons to the collections. Outside browsers worldwide performed approximately 174,380 searches remotely on the Research Library's online catalog that is available via the Web. The *Research Library* loaned 195 items for public exhibition to outside institutions.

The *Research Library's* department staff members hosted meetings and provided mentoring, training, workshops, participated in symposiums, panel discussions, and lectures and classes for non-profit cultural and professional organizations, colleges and universities. Some examples of these were the California Map Society annual meeting; multiple instruction sessions for architectural students from SCI-ART and graphic design students from Otis graduate seminar, "Fluxus Means Change," co-taught with UCLA faculty; instruction session for UCLA Masters program in Archaeological & Ethnographic Conservation, instruction sessions for CSUN "Literature & Arts" graduate seminar; CSU/Channel Islands "Postmodern & Contemporary Arts" graduate seminar; Scripps College undergraduate seminar, "Typography and Make Booking," and instruction for older adults enrolled in "Artists and Books" at Santa Monica College. staff members provided leadership to the following non-profit organizations: the International Federation of Library Associations, RLG, the Art Libraries Association of North America, the American Printing History Association, the California Preservation Program, the American Library Association, the California Rare Book School Steering Committee, and the UCLA Information Studies Department.

*The Research Library's Special Collections and Visual Resources Department* waived its reproduction fees for the use of images and quotes in 163 scholarly publications.

*The Research Library's Technical Services Department* donated 92 auction catalogs to the Research Library at the Natural History Museum in Los Angeles; and 326 auction catalogs were donated to the Arts Library at the University of California, Santa Barbara.

*The Research Library's Research Databases Department* manages three projects:

The *Bibliography of the History of Art* (BHA), is jointly published by the Getty and by the Institut de l'Information Scientifique et Technique (INIST) in France, and collaborators in ten European countries contribute material to the Research Institute for inclusion in it. The BHA was increased by over 23,000 records this year, bringing the total to about 360,000 records. That database is available through CSA, DIALOG, OCLC, NISC International, Inc., and Ovid Technologies, Inc.

The *Project for the Study of Collecting and Provenance*, which includes the Provenance Index databases, provided training, photocopies, books, and software to local, national, and international collaborative partners. The Project staff also provided training and updates on the software system used by the Provenance Documentation Collaborative (an international project overseen by the Project focusing on the documentation of works of art). The Provenance Index Databases, totaling over 1,000,000 records, are available to the public free-of-charge on the Web site: [www.getty.edu/research/conducting\\_research/provenance\\_index/](http://www.getty.edu/research/conducting_research/provenance_index/) The Web site includes new guides on how to do provenance research and a guide to current conferences and other events related to the history of collecting and provenance. The staff continues to perform provenance research, at no charge, on paintings at the request of museums, curators, private individuals, scholars, and dealers.

The *Avery Index to Architectural Periodicals* produced at Columbia University added over 13,000 records to its database last year, and the database now includes over 575,000 records. The database is distributed through the distributors CSA, EBSCO Publishing, NISC International, Inc. and OCLC

**Digital Resource Management and Vocabulary Program**

The *Digital Resource Management and Vocabulary Programs* provided online resources; education and outreach activities; mentoring and training, including telephone and e-mail consultations,

seminars and workshops, and on-site meetings and demonstrations, to Web users as well as staff from non-profit cultural organizations during fiscal year 2006.

The digital library resources or image collections relating to the holdings in Special Collections, for which project management, asset management, and production are provided by the Digital Resource Management department, are available free of charge on the Getty Web site. Several of these resources are consistently in the top ten resources accessed on the research sub-site of the Getty Web site.

Staff from the two departments provided standards, vocabulary implementation, and digital resource management and preservation mentoring to staff from cultural heritage and educational organizations from the US and other countries, including workshops and seminars, and via e-mail, telephone or in person. Organizations that received mentoring and in-depth sessions in Fiscal Year 2006 include the Skirball Cultural Center, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, and the National Museum of Australia. Staff from the Digital Resource Management Department regularly assist visiting scholars and researchers with issues related to digital imaging and management and presentation of digital images.

Lectures and seminars in FY06, offered free of charge to members of the local cultural heritage information community, included a seminar co-taught on Cataloging Cultural Objects (CCO). The manual *Cataloging Cultural Objects* was published by ALA Editions, over the last few year's staff devoted significant amounts of time as part of the editorial team. They also provided CCO training at several conferences, including VRA and ALA.

The three Getty vocabulary databases (*Art & Architecture Thesaurus*®, *Union List of Artist Names*®, *Getty Thesaurus of Geographic Names*®) continued to be available on the World Wide Web free of charge. Average usage for all three vocabularies for fiscal year 2006 was approximately 302,000 queries per month, with users from all fifty United States and many foreign countries, the preponderance of usage of the Getty vocabularies on the Web is from dot edu and dot org institutions. The Getty vocabularies are used by catalogers, museum professionals, researchers, students, and the general public. The Vocabulary Program offers some fee-free licenses to non-profit cultural heritage organizations and research projects; this year, the vocabulary data was given to CLiMB (Computational Linguistics for Metadata Building), a Mellon-funded project with headquarters at the University of Maryland. The Getty also gave updated vocabulary data to ARTstor in this fiscal year

The publications of these departments, including *Categories for the Description of Works of Art*, *Introduction to Imaging*, *Introduction to Metadata*, *Introduction to Vocabularies*, *Introduction to Art Image Access*, are made available free of charge on the Web and are typically among the top 20 Research Institute online resources accessed by users. In FY06, an XML schema called "CDWA

Lite," with an accompanying data dictionary, for publishing and disseminating metadata records for art, architecture, and material culture, was made available via the CDWA Web site, maintained by the Digital Resource Management Department.

**Research & Education, Associate Director, and Contemporary Programs & Research**

The unifying theme for this scholar year, *Duration The Persistence of Antiquity*, celebrated the reopening of the Getty Villa in Malibu, with its notable collections of ancient Mediterranean antiquities, and the inauguration of exhibitions, programs, and performances related to the classical world. In September ten Getty scholars and six Fellows arrived at the Getty Research Institute. Fifteen Visiting Scholars also took part in the scholar year, working at the Research Institute for periods of two to six months. Participants pursued their individual projects, conversed in the weekly working group, attended lectures and other events, took part in workshops, and informally shared their ideas with staff and with one another. The annual retreat included a private tour of the collections of the Hearst Castle in San Simeon led by Museum Director and Chief Curator, Hoyt Fields

During Fiscal Year 2006 the Research Institute awarded a total of 56 grants to participants in the scholar year (31), the Intern and Graduate Intern Program (2), and Library Research Grants (23).

**Lecture Series**

*Restoring Michelangelo's David* (October 26, 2005). Conservator Cinzia Parnigoni discussed the complex undertaking of restoring Michelangelo's masterpiece. The lecture, presented in Italian with simultaneous English translation, was co-sponsored by the Getty Research Institute and the Los Angeles Italian Cultural Institute.

*Shooting Time Julius Shulman and the Image of Contemporary Architecture* (November 3, 2005). Sylvia Lavin (Architecture and Urban Design, UCLA) discussed how Shulman made modern architecture contemporary by exploring his strategies for what he called "dressing" the photograph, which releases his images from their conventional designation as producers of modernist icons and makes them available as momentary glimpses of life lived.

*A Continual Becoming Rudolph Schindler's Discordant Modernism* (December 1, 2005). Thomas Hines (History/Architecture and Urban Design, UCLA) made the argument that—at varying times in his career and occasionally in a single building—Rudolph Schindler worked in both the "Rationalist" and "Expressionist" modes.

*Beyond Virtuosity Patterns of Creativity in Old Age* (December 13, 2005). Museum Guest Scholar David Travis examined the inimitable character of the late works of photographers such as Eugene Atget, Alfred Stieglitz, Paul Strand, Edward Weston, and Josef Sudek.

Annual Lecture, Project for the Study of Collecting and Provenance: *Andrew Mellon. From Art Collector to Founder of the National Gallery* (March 14, 2006). Distinguished British historian and author David Cannadine discussed the collecting practices and philanthropy of Andrew W. Mellon.

*Researching Pliny's Laurentina at the Getty Villa* (March 30, 2006). Getty Visiting Scholar Jerzy Miziolek discussed his research on Pliny the Younger's villa at Laurentum, near Rome.

*Caesar and Cleopatra. From Lucan to Las Vegas* (April 5, 2006). Maria Wyke (Chair of Latin, University College London) considered the dissemination of the story of Julius Caesar and Cleopatra from ancient writings to twentieth-century popular culture.

*Courbet: A Conversation about Landscape* (April 10, 2006). In the galleries of the J. Paul Getty Museum, Tom Crow and Denis Cosgrove (Professor of Geography, UCLA) gave a presentation about the exhibition *Courbet and the Modern Landscape*. They offered a new perspective on the variety of ways in which Courbet used landscape in the paintings on view.

*Art and Neuroscience* (April 11, 2006) - John Hyman, former Getty Scholar and fellow at the University of Oxford, assessed the prospects for neuroaesthetics and discussed the relationship among neuroscience, art history, and philosophy.

*Works in Progress*. Each year the Getty Research Institute hosts a series of presentations—usually by local scholars—on work in progress in art history and the humanities. The purpose of the series is to promote discussion of current issues, topics, and themes among interested scholars and students. There were six of these events during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006.

**Workshops**

*Art History and the Unseen* (October 28-29, 2005). The Getty Research Institute collaborates annually with the Clark Art Institute on "Art History and . . .," a pair of workshops devoted to a problem of timely importance in the field of art history. In Williamstown, Massachusetts, on October 28 and 29 the workshop topic was "Art History and the Unseen."

*Art History and the Unseen* (January 20–21, 2006). At the heart of this workshop, which took place at the Getty Research Institute, was the seemingly paradoxical question, "To what extent is art history really engaged with visual reality?" Participants included scholars in residence at the Getty Research Institute and the Clark Art Institute.

*J Paul Getty Museum Workshop* (January 23, 2006). This workshop, linking the Getty Research Institute scholar year theme *Duration the Persistence of Antiquity* to JPGM collections, brought together a small group of invited participants to focus on Mantegna's "Adoration of the Magi" in the Paintings Galleries of the J. University led the discussion.

*The Persistence of Techne: Nature, Design and Early Modern Practice of the Arts* (March 15-17, 2006). This three-day invitational workshop brought together twenty-five international scholars to explore the intersection of artistic, mechanical, philosophical and technical knowledge in sixteenth-century Europe. Special attention was paid to treatise production and practitioners of the arts of design: painters, sculptors, architects, printmakers, and goldsmiths. The event included field trips to the Museum of Jurassic Technology and the Getty Villa.

Dissertation Workshop: *Writing the History of Art Now* (March 16-17, 2006). This two-day workshop provided twelve advanced doctoral candidates with an opportunity to present their work to each other and to two senior professors in the discipline. Participants discussed not only the significance of their individual projects, but also how they might position their work within an increasingly pluralistic professional world.

*Traffic, Velocity, Assembly, Dispersal and Networks* (May 17-18, 2006). This was the first in a series of four invitational workshops developed by the USC-Getty Program in the History of Collecting and Display. Guided by organizers Malcolm Baker of USC and John Brewer of CalTech, participants considered various aspects of the creation, interconnectedness, and dispersal of collections.

*The Fragment: An Incomplete History* (May 18-20, 2006). Held in conjunction with Research Institute's scholar year theme *Duration: The Persistence of Antiquity*, the workshop focused on the fragment in its multiple manifestations as object, evidence, concept, and condition. Sessions took place at the Getty Center and the Getty Villa and featured an international roster of participants.

*Art History and the Digital World* (June 8-9, 2006). This two-day invitational forum, organized in collaboration with the College Art Association, brought together a group of distinguished art historians, artists, librarians, and experts in technology, publishing and the law, to explore issues around advancing digital technologies and the study of art.

**Panel Discussions**

*Not a Cornfield* (October 5, 2005). The Getty Research Institute hosted a panel discussion to situate Lauren Bon's Cornfield project within an art historical context while at the same time exploring the complex and often controversial nature of large-scale, artist-driven public works. The panel also investigated the project's unique relation to the history and texture of a rapidly changing downtown Los Angeles. Discussants included project artist Lauren Bon, Matthew Coolidge and Ralph Rugoff.

*Shifting Relationships: Conservators and Collectors* (October 20, 2005). This forum focused on the interconnections between the varied approaches and practices of conservators, and the different

preferences and expectations of collectors. The Forum series on collecting is organized by the PSCP (Project for the Study of Collecting and Provenance) in collaboration with the USC-Getty Program in the History of Collecting and Display.

*Modern Art in Los Angeles A Tribute to Walter Hopps* (November 1, 2005). This event celebrated Walter Hopps, one of the most influential figures in postwar American art and inspiration to the GRI's "Modern Art in Los Angeles" series. Participants included artists Ed Ruscha, Robert Williams, and James Rosenquist, Curator Lynda Hartigan, conservator Carol Mancusi-Ungaro and Hal Glucksman. The event was part of the Getty Research Institute's ongoing "Modern Art in Los Angeles Project."

*Antiquity after Winckelmann* (December 14, 2005). This event celebrated the Getty Research Institute's new English translation of Johann Joachim Winckelmann's seminal *History of the Art of Antiquity*. An international panel of distinguished scholars (including Adolf Borbein, Elisabeth Decultot, Heinrich Dilly, Max Kunze, Suzanne Marchand, Alex Potts, and Whitney Davis) explored Winckelmann's impact on the field of classical studies in his own time and his enduring resonance in classical archeology and art historical scholarship.

*Sylvia Kolbowski Speaks with Thomas Crow and Mignon Nixon* (January 21, 2006). The scope of artist Sylvia Kolbowski's work encompasses the ethics and politics of history, culture, and the unconscious. At this roundtable event, Kolbowski spoke with Thomas Crow and art historian Mignon Nixon about her work, the relationship of art history to contemporary art, and how she interprets "Art History and the Unseen."

*Getty Panel at College Art Association* (February 24, 2006). Getty Scholars Robin Cormack and Yannis Hamilakis and Getty Fellow Caspar Meyer presented their work on the topic of *The Persistence of Antiquity* at a session of the annual meeting of the College Art Association, which took place in Boston

PSCP Forum IV: *Collecting Traces of Creativity The Afterlives of Oil Sketches, Drawings, and Sculptors' Models* (April 20, 2006). In this forum, organized by the Getty Research Institute's Project for the Study of Collecting and Provenance (PSCP) in collaboration with the USC-Getty Program in the History of Collecting and Display, brief presentations by Malcolm Baker (USC), Lee Hendrix (JPGM), and John Murdoch (Huntington Library) served as starting points for an informal, open, and lively discussion with the audience.

Minimalist composers and other artists. The day featured John Adams, Robert Israel, Peggy Phelan, and Glenn Branca as well as other artists. Pieces under discussion were performed live in the concert hall.

*The Aesthetics of Risk* (April 29, 2006). In collaboration with the Southern California Consortium of Art Schools (SoCCAS), this conference examined the notion of "risk" as an aesthetic category. Through lectures, dialogues, and a panel discussion, a prominent group of scholars and artists examined ideas of risk in the fields of painting, photography, performance, video, and activist political art. The day concluded with live performances by Red Krayola and Future Pigeon in the Museum Courtyard, which was attended by both the general public and conference participants.

*Radical Politics/Radical Aesthetics* (May 6, 2006). This symposium accompanied *Agitated Images John Heartfield and German Photomontage, 1920 - 1938*, the Research Institute's spring exhibition. Using Heartfield and the exhibition as a jumping-off point, *Radical Politics, Radical Aesthetics* inquired more broadly into the coincidence of avant-garde ideology and art. Speakers Andreas Huyssen (Columbia), Maria Gough (Stanford), and Todd Presner (UCLA) contributed papers on elements of Weimar culture; Juliet Koss (Scripps) and Christine Mehring (Yale) traced politically motivated artistic production in the Nineteenth Century and in postwar Germany.

The day consisted of lectures, dialogues and screenings, as well as an ambitious series of interactive short performances that took place across the Getty Center site throughout the day.

*An Evening of Short Performances* (June 3, 2006). Ortiz Torres, Ximena Cuevas, and Andrew Lampert, moderated by Rita Gonzalez from Center for Art of the Americas at LACMA.

*Between Sleep and Dreams* Warhol Under the Stars (October 8, 2005). This daylong event featured a screening of Warhol's five-and-a-half-hour film *Sleep* (1963) in the Harold M. Williams Auditorium, followed by a discussion with Warhol Superstars Mary Woronov and Viva. The program continued in the Museum Courtyard for a reception and film screening of Warhol's *Sunset* and various *Screen Tests*, and was accompanied by music from genre-defying New York DJ Adam Dorn.

*Left Coast Modernism: Architecture and Urban Form in Los Angeles* (December 7, 2005). A capacity crowd filled the Harold M. Williams Auditorium for a film screening of *Reyner Banham Loves Los Angeles* (1974, 52 min.). The screening was followed by a discussion with Amy Murphy, Assistant Professor of Architecture at USC, and Ed Dimendberg, Associate Professor of Film and Media Studies at University of California, Irvine. Artists Catherine Opie and Doug Aitken offered an artmaker's viewpoint on the proceedings. The event was held in conjunction with the Getty Research Institute's exhibition *Julius Shulman, Modernity and the Metropolis* and was part of the ongoing "Modern Art in Los Angeles Project." **THE GETTY CONSERVATION INSTITUTE**

In FY06 the **Getty Conservation Institute (GCI)** carried out work on several of its international projects. Field campaigns were successfully conducted in China at the sites of Mogao, the Maya region at the archaeological sites of Copan, Egypt, and in Tunisia. Most significantly, the GCI successfully launched the UCLA/Getty Masters Program on the Conservation of Ethnographic and Archaeological Materials. The three-year program—which will lead to a master's of art degree—will include two years of classroom-based teaching and laboratory work at UCLA and the Getty, followed by a one-year supervised internship at other museums or conservation facilities. The program will be the only graduate-level academic conservation program on the West Coast of the United States and the only U.S. program with its sole focus on archaeological and ethnographic materials. The program will be offered every two years, with an incoming class size of 10 to 12 students. In FY06 the GCI also filled three of its open positions in the Science Department. Some of the institute's more detailed accomplishments related to conservation, research, and dissemination are listed below:

*Mosaics Research & Testing*

The GCI and the Institut National du Patrimoine of Tunisia co-organized the 9th conference of the International Committee for the Conservation of Mosaics, in Hammamet, Tunisia, November 29-December 3, 2005. The theme of the conference was "Lessons Learned. Reflecting on the theory and practice of mosaic conservation."

**Mosaics Tunisia**

The second training campaign of the 3rd regional group of technician trainees for mosaic maintenance took place in Hergla, October 16 through November 26, 2005. The training team,

including several past trainees, provided instruction and supervision of practical work by the trainees in stabilization treatment techniques for conserving mosaics in situ. The technicians and their work were presented during a day and a half of site visits during the ICCM conference. The didactic materials developed for the training were translated from French into Arabic. The third training campaign for the 3<sup>rd</sup> regional group of technician trainees for mosaic maintenance, took place April 24-May 20, 2006 at Hergla, focusing on stabilization treatments and protection by reburial.

**China Initiative**

The Mogao Master Plan was approved and accepted at the national level in Fall 2005. The first collaborative 10-week session between Courtauld Institute of Art Wall Paintings Conservation course and Lanzhou University was also completed in Fall 2005. A 3-week workshop was held for Chinese heritage professionals who will be responsible for organizing training courses in the future on the China Principles. The workshop took place in May 2006 at Port Arthur, Tasmania (Australia) and at the Mogao Grottoes in China. Participants included 19 Chinese professionals in the fields of conservation, cultural heritage management, and cultural heritage legislation

**Egypt - Valley of the Queens**

The institutional Agreement for the first three-year phase of the six-year project between the GCI and the Supreme Council of Antiquities (SCA) was signed by Tim Whalen and Zahi Hawass, SCA Secretary General in Cairo on February 23, 2006. A coordination workshop was held on February 26th in Luxor between the GCI, the SCA to discuss current issues, needs, and opportunities for conservation, management, training, and professional collaboration. The first campaign was carried out from February 20th to March 20th. The project team began fieldwork and documentation on this project, including rapid assessment and condition recording in over 20 tombs, identification of site-wide infrastructure and features, discussion and recording of visitation statistics and patterns, and preliminary investigation of management structure and practice.

**Grouts Feasibility Study**

In March 2006, GCI hosted Dr. Giorgio Torraca, Conservation Scientist of the University of Rome to participate with the project team from Science and Field Projects to help design the initial testing program for evaluating grouts used in the conservation of architectural surfaces and wall paintings. Testing protocols are being developed and testing will commence at the GCI in summer 2006.

**Southern African Rock Art**

The GCI, the South African Heritage Resources Agency (SAHRA) and SANParks co-organized two courses at two World Heritage sites in South Africa - the Cederberg in the south and

Mapungubwe Cultural Landscape on the border with Zimbabwe and Botswana. The first course was a short accreditation course on rock art tour guiding for 20 participants, held August 1-21, 2005, at Clanwilliam, Cedeberg. The second course was a rock art site management workshop for 20 participants at the Mapungubwe National Park, held August 26 to September 9, 2005. The objectives of the SARAP/GCI initiative are to establish a long-term program that will create momentum for rock art preservation, conservation, accessibility and management in the Southern African region.

Iraq Initiative

In September the GCI and the World Monument Fund organized a course in Rapid Site Assessment Review, Condition Assessment and Recording, International Conservation Conventions, Charters and Organizations, and Site Management Planning through the support of UNESCO. The 4-week course was held in Amman, Jordan, and attended by 21 trainees from the State Bureau of Antiquities and Heritage (SBAH) of Iraq, including the directors of the SBAH offices from the governorates of Babylon, Basra, Kirkuk and Nineveh, as well as 3 staff members from the Jordan Department of Antiquities. On January 23, 2006 the GCI and the World Monument Fund met in Los Angeles to assess the status of the overall Iraq Initiative project and its key objectives; agree on a cost sharing mechanism; develop a comprehensive plan for 2006 and 2007 activity; and discuss the project in the context of the political situation in Iraq.

Organization of World Heritage Cities – Cuzco

The GCI organized the scientific component of the 8th international symposium of the Organization of World Heritage Cities, which took place in Cusco, Peru, Sept. 19-23, 2005. The theme of the symposium was "*Heritage of Humanity, Heritage with Humanity*". Five hundred fully registered participants attended from all parts of the world. GCI's contribution included a one-day workshop for 20 newly elected mayors, presenting issues related to the conservation of historical cities; and a one-day program of keynote presentations, case studies followed by small-group debates. The presentations focused on three themes – participation; intangible values; and tourism - and were followed by 1,150 attendants, including 650 students. Conclusions of this program were presented to the entire assembly.

Earthen Architecture Initiative

GCI staff participated in SIACOT, the Ibero-Americano Seminary on Earthen Construction, October 7 – 13, 2005. GCI helped design the conservation portion of the program in an effort to continue to support training programs for professionals in the field of conservation of earthen architecture in Latin America. In the third quarter, Field project managers and GCI Consultants participated in an evaluation of the Royal Palaces of Abomey, organized by the World Heritage

Center. The GCI team benefited from this mission by carrying out an evaluation of the bas-reliefs from the Palace of Glélé, which the GCI, in collaboration with the Benin Ministry of Culture and Communications, conserved from 1993-1997. The GCI hosted the GSAP Colloquium during April 11-13, 2006 at the Getty Center. The Getty Seismic Adobe Project 2006 Colloquium brought together sixty-two international professionals with expertise in the conservation of and seismic retrofitting methods and building standards for earthen structures. Program topics included the evolution of earthquake-resistant design criteria and testing methods for earthen buildings, building codes and standards specific to earthen architecture; traditional earthquake-resistant construction techniques for earthen buildings; retrofit case studies; and a series of roundtable discussions that attempted to identify knowledge gaps in the field and to articulate methods to fill those gaps.

**Museums Emergency Program (MEP)**

The nine-month pilot course *Teamwork for Integrated Emergency Preparedness*, was launched in late August with a two-week workshop in Bangkok, Thailand. Participants represented the national museums of eight Asian nations. The workshop is followed by a seven-month period of distance mentoring, and will conclude later this spring with a one-week follow-up meeting at a venue in Asia.

**Education Needs Assessment Asia**

During March 2-4, 2006 the GCI project team hosted a roundtable discussion on Southeast Asia Regional Training Efforts in Built Heritage Conservation. Five foreign experts with extensive experience in developing and implementing conservation-training programs in Southeast Asia were invited to attend. The roundtable was held at the GCI.

**Conservation and Management of Archaeological Sites Workshop – Tunisia**

In September 2005, at the invitation of our partner, the Institut National du Patrimoine (INP), the GCI organized and taught an introductory workshop on the conservation and management of archaeological sites. The workshop was held in Hammamet, Tunisia for approximately 25 newly appointed INP professional staff comprised of architects, archaeologists and art historians. This activity was a prelude for a longer and more comprehensive course that will probably occur in spring 2007.

**Scholars**

Three GCI scholars were in residence in the first half of FY06. Mary-Lou Florian, in residence from September 2005 through March of 2006 was working on the analysis of discoloration in the irregular shaped fungal fox spots found on paper. Lorenzo Lazzarini, in residence in September and October of 2005, was writing a portion of his manuscript on *The Colored Stones of Ancient Greece: History of Use, Characterization, Deterioration*. This residency led to his being asked to present a lecture at the Getty Villa in March 2006. Alan Phenix, in residence from October 2005 through

July 2006, was working on a two-part project. One part deals with environmental dynamic mechanical analysis of artists' and conservation materials, and the other deals with a textbook provisionally titled *Use of Organic Solvents in Art Conservation: Theory and Practice*. Henri Van Damme, professor at the Ecole Supérieure de Physique et Chimie Industrielles in Paris, began his residency at the GCI March through May of 2006 was researching *Traditional Mineral Materials: A Gentle Introduction to their Chemo-Mechanics*.

Post Doctoral Fellow

In September, the GCI welcomed its first postdoctoral fellow in conservation science Carrie Brindle joined the GCI's Science Department for two years, working on the Modern Paint and Canvas Staining projects.

**EDUCATION**

The **Getty Leadership Institute (GLI)** focuses on research, professional development training and dissemination of information related to the growing complexity faced by leaders of museums and other nonprofit institutions

Delivered *MLI. The Museum Leadership Institute*, July 9-29, 2005, an intensive residential program designed to both enhance the leadership of experienced museum executives and strengthen their respective institutions program in Los Angeles. Program attended by 32 senior executives from museums in the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdom.

Delivered *Museum Leaders: The Next Generation*, November 14-18, 2005, in Los Angeles This program dedicated to developing the career potential of individuals identified by senior museum leaders as promising professionals who have already responded impressively to additional sets of responsibilities and may someday lead museums. Program attended by 25 professionals from museums in the United States, Canada, Australia and Mexico.

SUMMARY OF DIRECT CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES--PART IX-A

Organized a New Orleans Workshop – April 13-14, 2006. Jeanne Liedtka (MLI faculty) led a two day workshop for visual art and cultural organizations in New Orleans entitled “Thinking Strategically in a World of Uncertainty.” Jeanne was supported by Jeffrey Barach from Tulane University Business School.

Convening of History Organizations – May 31-June 1, 2006 Gathering of 15 history museum leaders at the Getty Center to listen to the current challenges and opportunities they consider significant. Convening produced in collaboration with the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH).

Hosted an *MLI* and *Next Generation* alumni reunion event during the American Association of Museums’ annual conference in April 2006 in Boston. The event was attended by 117 alumni and their guests.

In addition to the above activities aimed at individuals, GLI also focused on a number of development opportunities for the benefit of partner institutions. On September 28-October 2, 2005, Phil and MiJin delivered sessions at WMA, Pasadena. On November 9-10, 2005, Phil presented at the annual Grant Makers in the Arts Conference in New York. On April 8-9, 2006 Phil delivered a session on Liberal Learning with other faculty and discussants at the University Continuing Education Association’s (UCEA) annual conference in San Diego. GLI established a listserv for faculty and discussants to discuss issues relevant to Liberal Education.

On April 20, 2006, Phil Nowlen gave a presentation to students from California State University, Channel Islands, as part of their museum studies course.

GLI hosted a graduate intern from Australia for nine months who worked on establishing the GLI’s management and leadership resources as an accessible library for staff and visiting scholars

The **Web Group** is responsible for managing the Getty’s main Web site, [www.getty.edu](http://www.getty.edu). This web site serves the Getty’s diverse audience, including the general public and professionals from the conservation, research, and museum fields. The Web Group measures much of its success by tracking unique users and visits to [getty.edu](http://getty.edu). Unique users are discrete individuals who have visited our Web site in a given time frame. Visits are the total number of times our Web site has been visited in a given time frame. Because many users come to our site more than once, visits always outnumber unique users. During FY06 the Web site saw over 4.5 million users, accounting for almost 11.5 million visits.

The Web Group works with all programs and departments across the Getty to realize projects on the Web site. Working with the Museum and the Research Institute, the Web Group creates online presentations for all the exhibitions that open at the Getty Center and the Getty Villa. During FY06,

more than 25 exhibitions were launched online, including *Agitated Images: John Heartfield and German Photomontage, 1920-1938* (<http://www.getty.edu/art/exhibitions/heartfield/>), *Courbet and the Modern Landscape* (<http://www.getty.edu/art/exhibitions/courbet/homepage.html>), *Antiquity & Photography Early Views of Ancient Mediterranean Sites* ([http://www.getty.edu/art/exhibitions/antiquity\\_photography/homepage.html](http://www.getty.edu/art/exhibitions/antiquity_photography/homepage.html)) and *Painted Prayers Books of Hours from the Morgan Library* ([http://www.getty.edu/art/exhibitions/painted\\_prayers/homepage.html](http://www.getty.edu/art/exhibitions/painted_prayers/homepage.html)). Through user surveys, we have found that many people who attend exhibitions at the Getty Center and the Getty Villa use the Web site either before or after their trip.

Working with Communications, the Web Group continues to write and create a monthly e-mail newsletter sent to over 30,000 recipients. Again, we measure the success of the newsletter by tracking how many people open the newsletter and how many people follow the links in the newsletter. On a regular basis, 73% of recipients open the newsletter and 23% of these visit our site as a result. In the world of e-mail marketing these percentages represent great success. Working with the Museum Education department and a local company, Numedeon Inc., the Web Group launched a virtual Getty environment for 8- to 14-year-olds at Whyville (<http://www.whyville.net>). Through interactive games, the Getty's environment on Whyville teaches kids about art and art history and reaches a potential audience of 2.2 million.

Also working with Museum Education, the Web Group continues to support and help create materials for teachers and educators, which together receive close to a quarter of all site visits. These materials include a listserv, lesson plans and curricula, and information on school visits

Line Relationship

1. The **Getty Leadership Institute for Museum Management** is an intensive, four-week residential program designed to provide middle- and senior-level museum professionals with training in the leadership, management and business skills required for the successful operation of museums

1 The **Getty** put on numerous public performances including "Selected Shorts" a series of readings of classic and contemporary short stories as well as theater and dance performances designed to attract an audience that might not otherwise visit the museum. The **J. Paul Getty Museum's** Summer Concert Series and Friday Night Concerts introduce audiences to music that might not otherwise be performed in the Los Angeles area. Certain concerts are accompanied by a lecture and extensive program notes to place the music in historical perspective against works of art in the Museum's collections.

1. The **Getty Museum** provides a variety of professional development workshops, community collaboration workshops and teacher collaboration workshops to help local educators and leaders integrate art education into their activities.

1 Royalties are received from three sources. The **Bibliography of the History of Art** provides the most comprehensive English language indexing and abstracting service for articles, books and exhibition catalogues on Western art from late antiquity to the present. **Art and Architectural Technical Abstracts** is a major source reference in conservation, publishing 2,500 abstracts per year covering technical examination, investigation, analysis, restoration preservation and documentation of works of historic and artistic value. The **Avery Index to Architectural Periodicals** contains 470,000 records and is distributed worldwide

1. The **Museum** makes audioguides available to its visitors for a small charge. These random access units allow visitors to take a personalized tour of the collections by offering commentary and perspectives on works of art in the collections by curators, scholars, educators, artists and local leaders in both English and Spanish

1. The **Getty** hosts educational events for certain local, national and international organizations operating in the fields relating to the **Getty's** mission in order to further the **Getty's** own priorities and as a service to organizations with common values and interests or with objectives that meet the public needs.

1. Upon request, the **Museum** and the **Research Institute** make available photographs and slides of works of art in its collections. These photographs are provided free of charge to scholars and arts institutions. A nominal charge is made for other requests to offset production costs. The **Museum** also received reimbursements for costs incurred in co-organizing exhibitions with other museums

10. The **Museum** bookstore makes available to the public a wide variety of general art books as well as publications, prints and postcards specific to the Museum's collections. Additionally, scholarly publications produced by **J. Paul Getty Trust Publications**, the **Research Institute** and the **Conservation Institute** are available from the bookstore.
