

Board scrutinizes approach to industrial need

Should Canton hire a full-time person to lure industry to the township? Or would a consulting firm do a good enough job — and cost less?

These questions may soon be answered. By a 7-0 vote, the township board Tuesday directed Supervisor Noel Culbert to make an "intensive investigation" into the alternatives and costs of

hiring an industrial coordinator.

CURRENTLY, there is an industrial and commercial committee and an Economic Development Corporation, which seeks financing for industrial projects. The committee is preparing a brochure on available land in Canton. Both groups are part-time, volunteer positions.

Canton's master plan, updated last November, proposes a total of 2,900 acres for industrial use. Most parcels are either north of Warren between Lilley and the C&O Railroad, or south of Michigan Avenue.

Access to water and sewer lines is "hit and miss," said Planner James Kosteva. "Overall, most areas do have direct access or reasonable access to

sewer and water," he added.

Kosteva noted that a student intern from Eastern Michigan University has been developing resource material, including drawings of available sites.

Opinions among township trustees were mixed.

Robert Greenstein said an industrial coordinator is a "sales specialist," and suggested that the slot could be com-

bined with other duties.

"We don't have Class A roads, water or utilities (in undeveloped areas)," said Daley. "What's he going to coordinate?"

"If we have a worthwhile industrial coordinator, he will be able to develop within our resources," replied Stephen Larson.

Other board members said current problems with water pressure and access to sewer lines will be eased in the next few years by construction of new systems in western Wayne County.

James Donahue and Culbert said Canton is close to Ann Arbor, a center for research and development. Because of that, the township would be a good location for light industrial firms.

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Barnette withdraws claim to township's top position

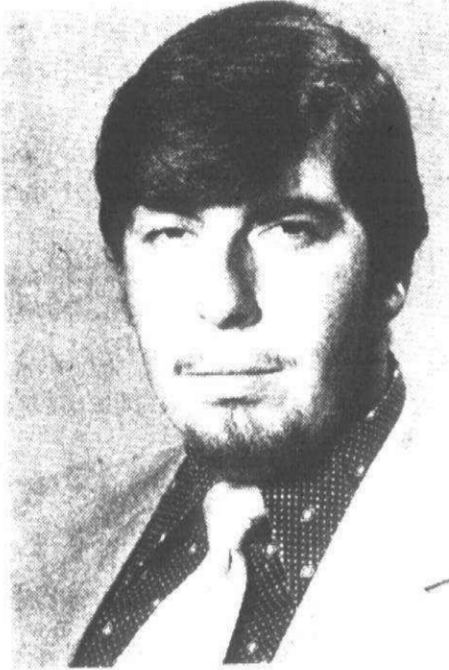
John Barnette — who became a candidate for township supervisor to "get even" with officials — is out of the race.

Barnette, a Democrat, announced Monday that he is pulling out of the Aug. 5 primary. However, Wayne County election officials say it is too late to have his name removed from the ballot.

His withdrawal leaves three other candidates for the Democratic nomination: Noel Culbert, Robert Greenstein and Harold Stein.

Culbert is the incumbent, while Greenstein currently is a trustee. Both Greenstein and Stein are former township supervisors.

The top vote-getter will run in November against James Poole, who is unopposed in the Republican race.

A partner in John and Dude's Towing, Barnette said he had run for office when township board members decided

to seek bids on towing services. Barnette's firm has performed that function for a couple of years.

"I thought I could help the businessmen and residents," said Barnette. "A politician should have an open mind."

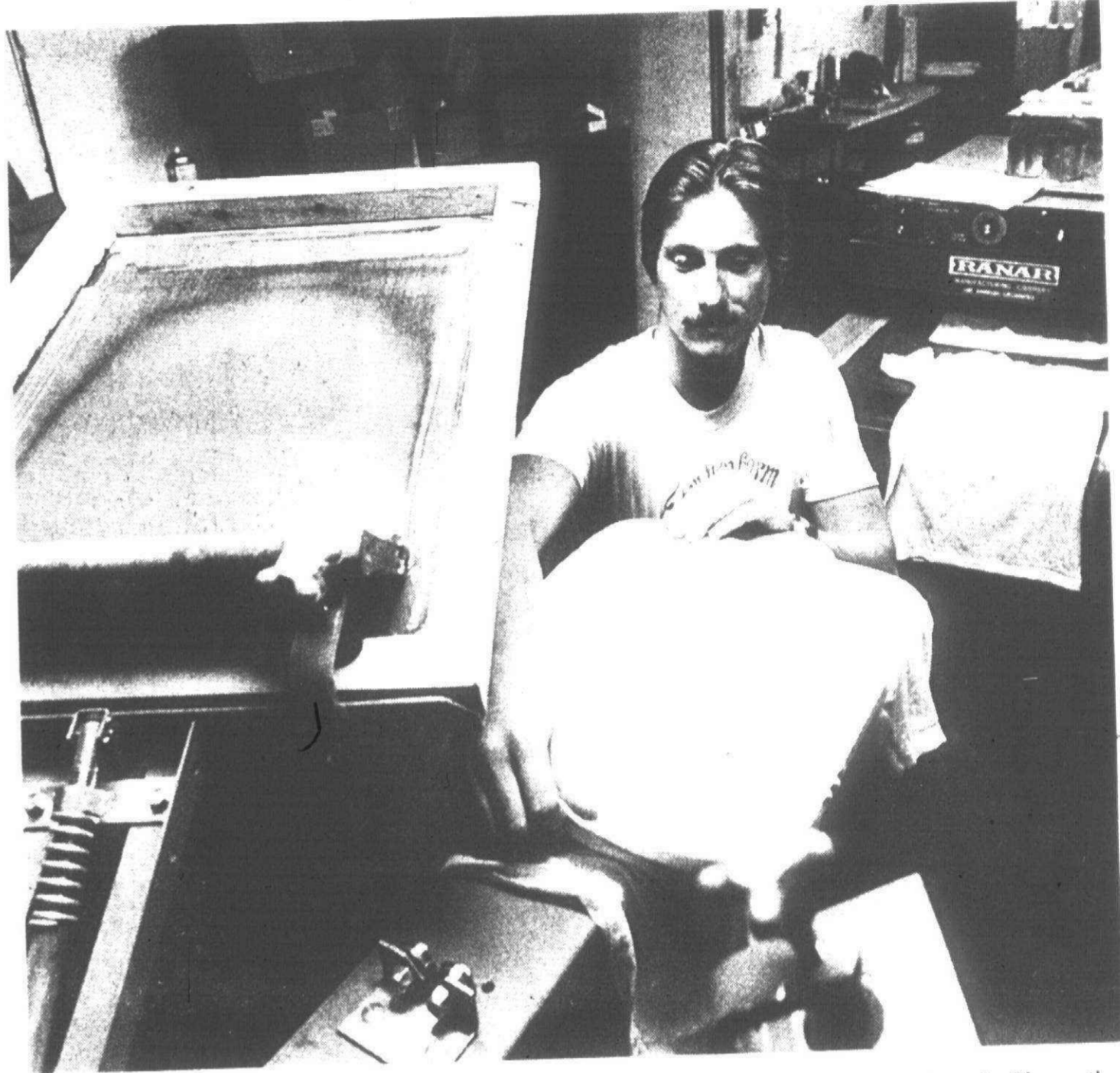
"I have too many angers and heartaches," he said. "I would try to get even with the guys (politicians) that have stuck me."

"I was told it would be unfair to the people and to not waste the votes," added Barnette.

Barnette said he isn't supporting any of the other candidates — Democratic or Republican.

"Being the true Democrat that I am, I cannot support a Republican," said Barnette. "Out of the other three candidates left, two of them are lawyers and are presently holding positions in Canton."

"They made no campaign promises during the last election, and they did just that — nothing," he added. "And I have heard no campaign promises again this election."

Man faces rap for radio theft

A former employee of the Plymouth Hilton Hotel faces sentencing next month on charges of breaking into the hotel room of a crime reporter covering the Republican National Convention for a Boston radio station.

Carl E. Schultz, 23, of Canton, was

arrested by an undercover Wayne County detective July 18 after he was discovered with \$1,800 worth of radio equipment belonging to Boston's WHDH radio reporter Steven Sbracci, 25.

He was apprehended by Det. Frank

Burton in the hotel's parking lot about 1 a.m. that Friday as Sbracci was checking out of the hotel to catch an early morning flight back East.

According to Burton, it's believed the suspect, who once worked as a bus boy at the hotel, ransacked the room and then escaped via a nearby fire escape leading to the rear parking lot of the Jolly Miller Lounge.

Schultz pleaded guilty to reduced charges of larceny under \$100 last Monday before Judge James Garber of the 35th District Court in Canton.

His sentencing date is scheduled for Aug. 27 on the misdemeanor charge that carries a maximum 90-days imprisonment.

Schultz most recently has been employed as a carpet cleaner for the 35th District Court in Plymouth, says Burton.

Vegetables on parade

Market set to blossom

The new Canton farmers' market T-shirts just might make your mouth water.

Placed on a white background are assorted kelly green "farm" pictures, including the sun peeking from behind a barn and silo. There also is a splash of green beans, tomatoes and flowers depicting what will be on sale at the market.

The shirts, which will be sold at the market for about \$5 each, are expected to provide operating funds for the fledgling market, which opens Saturday in the Kmart parking lot at Ford and Sheldon.

Hours are from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. or until the produce is sold out. The market will be held each Saturday through the end of September — later if there is enough variety of produce.

On sale will be fresh-picked sweet corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, squash, broccoli and other vegetables which are produced in Canton. Currently, about 10 farmers and two crafts persons will have stalls.

That information comes from Diane Neihengen, a member of the Canton farmland preservation committee and planning commission.

DESIGNING THE farm-flavored T-shirt was Lawrence Scott of Ann Arbor. The shirts are produced by American Logo Products of Plymouth, operated by Canton resident James Wauldron.

"I wish we could have had a contest to design the T-shirt," said Sarah Gill of Canton, who is active in promoting the market. "We just didn't have time."

Both time and money have been factors, as farmers and volunteers from the Canton farmland preservation

committee have worked to get everything done in time for summer harvest.

Donated wood and paint have been used to build stalls which can be taken down and carried away each week. The Township Board approved spending up to \$500 to promote the market, which was proposed by the committee in May.

There won't be a charge for vendors fee this year. Ms. Neihengen said the market "isn't proven."

"You really need to start in winter," she added. "The 10 farmers isn't a real measure of Canton's farmers. Some are committed to other markets or don't grow market crops."

MS. NEIHENGEN also expressed concern about weather, which already has delayed the opening of the market.

"Crops are slow," said Ms. Neihengen. "They had to replant because of June rain. The storm (two weeks ago) set back some farmers — it especially hurt the smaller farmers."

Committee members hope there will be "spinoff" business for stores in the Ford-Sheldon shopping area.

"We picked the location for the high visibility," explained Ms. Neihengen. "We hope there will be a spinoff from both directions."

2 shrug off Aug. 5 worries

James Poole

Clerk John Flodin won't worry about re-election this Aug. 5. No one is opposing the Democrat, who has held the clerk's position since 1956.

Before winning an appointment to fill the vacated clerk's job 24 years ago, Flodin worked as Canton's dog warden, building inspector and volunteer firefighter.

He was the township's second full-time employee.

"There was a guy in the fire department who was ahead of me," said Flodin, 59.

He was born in Canton and lived in his present home on Michigan Avenue until age 15. In 1946, he quit his job at Ford Motor Co., moved back to Canton and began working for the family's chicken hatchery.

MANY REFER to Flodin as the "dean" of the Township Board. This is his 12th election and fourth time that he is running unopposed.

Like many candidates, Flodin sees a pressing need to attract more industry to Canton.

He cautions, however, that industrial development will not necessarily lessen residential taxes. But with more industry, taxes will not rise as quickly or as much, he says.

Three years ago, Flodin voted to purchase industrial land at Warren and Haggerty, despite his belief that municipalities "should not be in the

real estate market."

The township is working on a plan with the Wayne County Road Commission for joint financing of a Haggerty paving project in order to spur development of the industrial parcel.

"I thought Canton could do more with Wayne County than the private sector," Flodin said of the reasons for his vote. "It would be nice if Canton Township could get it started and sell the land to private developers."

Flodin endorses the idea of creating an industrial coordinator position.

James Poole has stepped back in the political arena after a four-year absence.

He is campaigning for the supervisor's position, a post he sought unsuccessfully in 1974. As the lone Republican in the supervisor's race, he is assured a spot on the November ballot.

Poole served as a township trustee from 1972 to 1976. He won the Township Board seat after moving to Canton the previous year and retiring as an Air Force major.

In 1976, he lost a re-election bid by 11 votes.

Poole currently serves on the Governor's Emergency Preparedness Council and the Ann Arbor Ecology Group.

"I ATTENDED Township Board meetings for six months before I moved to Canton," said Poole, 50. "Either you try to change things or you shut up."

Poole cites the same reasons for seeking public office this year. He plans to present his ideas and programs to Canton's next supervisor if he meets defeat in November.

He views high taxes and the local economic picture as prime issues of this campaign.

"The economy has to change in Canton Township. The situation can't continue."

He complains of his own property

taxes, which "jumped from \$700 to \$1,700 in eight years."

Poole cites a pressing need for more efficiency at Township Hall and improved administrative procedures.

He maintains that several large businesses and industries in Canton are either grossly under-assessed or ignored on the tax rolls completely.

"These assessments and the fact that some aren't even on the tax rolls is a clear indication that someone doesn't know what the hell is going on down there," Poole said.

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Here's how to sign up for draft

Couple sets family roots

If ever you were in quest of the most unusual married couple in Plymouth, you would not be far amiss if you dropped in on the Grayes — Joseph and Sylvia — operators of the greenhouse at the intersection of Joy Road and Mill Street.

Married in 1938 in Our Lady of Good Counsel Church before it moved to its present location on Penniman Avenue, they have spent every day side by side since saying "I do."

Sitting in a swing just outside the greenhouse the other afternoon, Mrs. Graye commented on this unusual togetherness by saying that even when the children (they have two girls and a boy) were born, Joe was at her side every day.

"It is a bit unusual," she admitted, "but the only business we know is the greenhouse business. So we have every reason to be together."

"And the only home I ever have known is this one right here. I was born here and lived here all my life."

Delving in to the past, Mrs. Graye said her dad, Alex Wnuk, built the house in 1918 and she was raised on the greenhouse business.

"That's all we ever knew. It is a funny thing," she added, "but November has been a most unusual month for us."

"I was born in November 65 years ago, and baptized on Dec. 25, and my first child was born on my birthday."

Asked about her baptism on Christmas Day, she said she thought it strange that such a ceremony would take place on a Christmas, but when she arranged for a birth certificate some time ago the fact was verified.

"I don't suppose it is too unusual to tell that I met my husband, Joe, in a greenhouse. But that's where we met. He was working at the Tom Brown Greenhouse at Grand River and Shafer Road in Detroit, and I guess our interests in that type of life made the match all the quicker."

It wasn't long after their marriage that they bought her father's greenhouse and settled down to a life of caring for flowers and plants and helping to make folks happier with the use of the colorful combinations of plants.

Asked if there wasn't a lull in the business during the hot summer days, she smiled and answered, "that's when we have to be busy — even with the sun blazing in. Some of the flowers, like the cyclamen, require 18 months to bloom and they need attention all the while."

"One of the biggest jobs these hot days," she said, "is trying to keep cool. And it isn't easy in a hot house."

Her attention was drawn away from the flowers for a time recently when Joe fell down a flight of stairs while visiting friends in Mt. Clemens.

Most of the following information was compiled from a brochure published by the U.S. Selective Service System.

- If you are a man born in 1960, register this week. If you were born in 1961, register next week.

- Go to any U.S. Post Office, pick up a form, fill it in and hand it to a clerk who will check it. The clerk will also have to see some identification, such as a driver's license.

- The clerk will not give you a receipt. You will later receive a verification letter from the Selective Service.
- Postal clerks are not familiar with

the details of the Selective Service System. If you have additional questions or do not receive your verification letter within 90 days, write to Selective Service, 600 E St., N.W. Washington, D.C. 20435. Or you may call 202-724-0424.

- The information on your form will go into the Selective Service files.

- If you move, the law requires you to let the government know by mailing the new address on a change of information form obtained at a post office, U.S. embassy or consular office.

- There are no plans at this time for a draft. One could not begin unless the Congress decides that it is needed.

- If a draft were to be activated, you could be selected if you are not already a member of an armed service — active, reserve or National Guard. You could be selected in a lottery based on the date of your birth.

- Those who reach their 20th birthday in the calendar year of a draft would be the first group to be called. Others would be called as necessary.

- If a draft begins, the law says you should report for examination and induction if you are ordered to do so.

- You may request a postponement, deferment or exemption on the basis that you are a student, that it would

create a hardship on your dependents, that you are a minister of religion. You may object as a conscientious objector and be required to serve in either a non-combatant position or in a public service job.

- Instructions on how to file a claim will be included with letters of induction.

- You would be given the chance to present information to support your claim to a local draft board. You could not be drafted until you are offered all of your appeal rights under the law.

- Failure to register for the draft is a violation of federal law, punishable by up to five years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.

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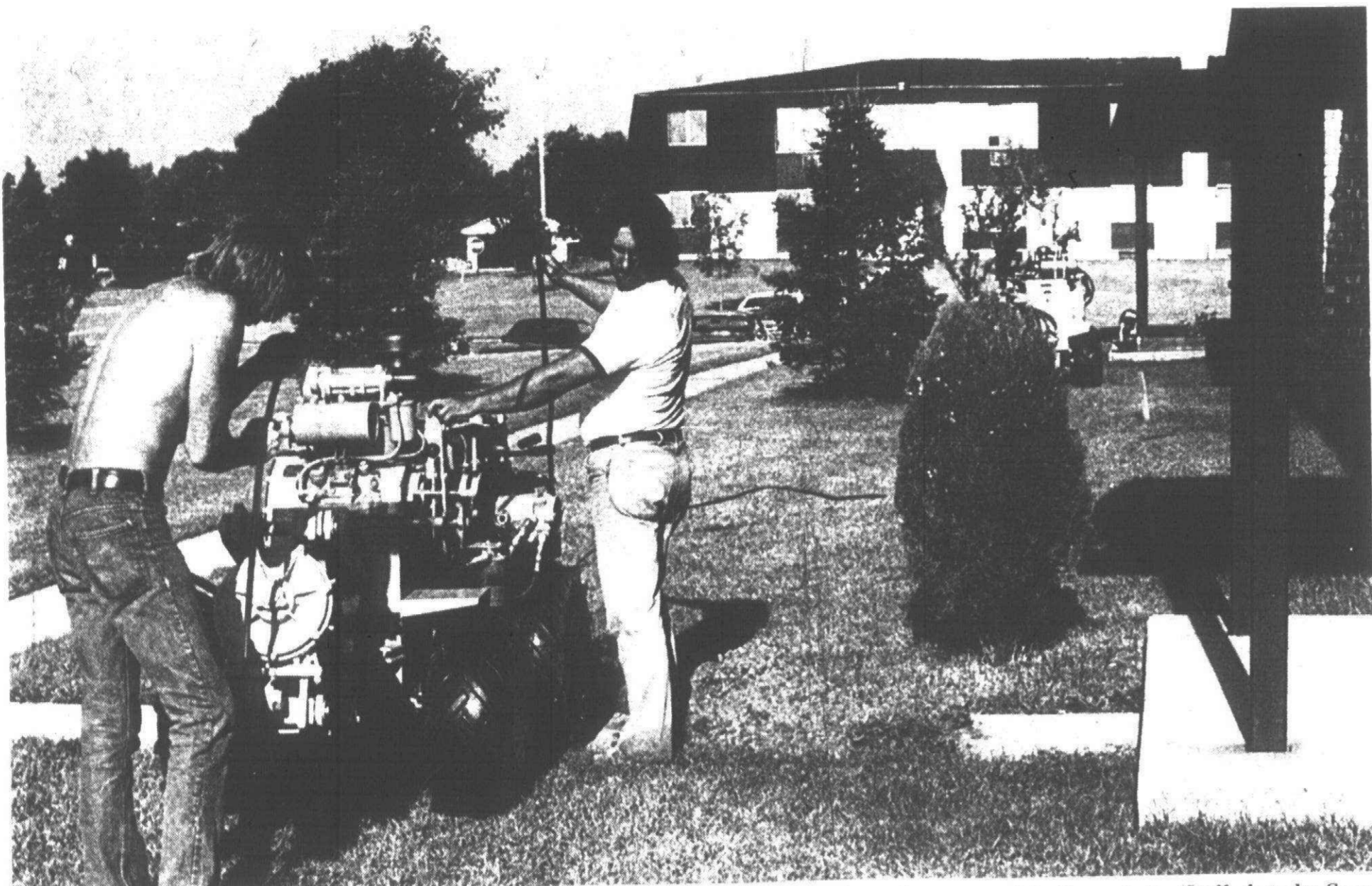

Cable TV firm plans August client sign-up

The first cable TV customers in western Wayne County will be "on line" and watching shows sometime in August.

Omnicom of Michigan, a Plymouth-based cable TV company, expects to have its first subscribers in Plymouth and Plymouth Township as soon as construction permits. From Plymouth, the system will "spray out like a spider web" to Canton Township, Northville and Westland, said Dennis Fasset, Omnicom regional manager.

"We aren't seeking subscribers," said Fasset. "We don't want to name a date because of construction."

"It will be in August," he added. "We're in the process of putting in taps and electronics necessary to amplify the system."

Cables will be attached to existing telephone and electrical poles. Canton's system will be connected to largely underground wires.

"We hope to have some subscribers in Canton before the end of the year," said Fasset. "Wiring will begin in three-four months. We can't do underground construction in winter." The cable TV plan offers up to 40 channels of sports, news, entertainment, business reports and local programming (school plays and government meetings) for a monthly fee of \$6.95, said Fasset. First-run movies will be available for an additional \$6.95, he added.

Installation is free during the construction period, which could last several months, said Fasset.

In contrast, over-the-air pay television such as ON-TV, uses broadcast facilities of Channel 20 in Southfield. The transmissions are scrambled to prevent non-subscribers from using the service.

Decoders unscramble the signals for subscribers who pay a monthly fee of \$22.50, as well as a \$50 installation fee and a refundable \$50 security deposit.

Omnicom has obtained franchise agreements in the cities of Plymouth and Northville, townships of Plymouth, Northville and Canton. Negotiations are under way to provide a cable TV system in Westland. That system would be owned by the city.

The firm, which was incorporated late last year, is a subsidiary of Capital

Cities Communications. Capital Cities owns WJR Radio and the Oakland Press newspaper.

Fasset said construction will be done in several communities at the same time. Those communities will be served by a receiver being built at Ford and Hix in Westland.

Each community in the system would be able to be connected to others served by Omnicom, he added.

Also available through Omnicom is a home security system which, depending on options, costs \$250-400, said Fasset. The security system will be available later.

Residents would be connected to Omnicom computers, which would monitor for break-ins, fires and emergencies for a monthly fee of \$14-16.

For example, a typical home with 11 "openings" (windows and doors) would cost \$400. That would include magnetic switch alarms, smoke and fire alarms and wall-mounted consoles to signal for help.

Omnicom would confirm the signal for help and dispatch the police or fire department. Alarms may be silent or audible.

"Generally, most people go for the audio (audible) because it scares off intruders," said Fasset. "These prices are coming down as technology develops."

Fasset believes people will buy the security system when they see its benefits.

"We have to market a lot of them to be profitable," said Fasset. "I expect it's going to be several months on home security."

OMNICOM'S NEGOTIATIONS with the various communities haven't been smooth.

For several months, members of the Canton Township board of trustees were unable to muster enough votes to award the contract to Omnicom.

Several board members had favored Canadian-based firm of Maclean-Hunter, but changed their minds. They had learned of the displeasure of several New Jersey communities with their Maclean-Hunter contracts.

In Westland, residents packed city council meetings to express fears that a two-way home security system was costly and could lead to snooping by officials.

Group pushes soccer for schools

"It's not what we wanted, but it'll do for now." That was the general response from a group of soccer parents who Monday night petitioned the local school board to register soccer as a varsity-played sport.

After some five years of approaching the board on this issue, the group was successful Monday in securing a commitment from the board to restudy the possibility with a report to be read Aug. 22.

They were not successful, however, in a commitment to begin varsity soccer this spring in the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

Explaining the school district's position was board president Carol Davis, who said:

"We're looking at budget cuts of over \$1 million

in our school programs, and you're looking at a program that was cost us as much as what we're trying to take out."

Elaine Kirchgatter, along with other members, said they were reluctant to begin varsity play unless there was a solid base of trained students in the middle schools.

"I'm in favor of working our way up," said Mrs. Kirchgatter.

"We really are supportive of the project, but we don't want to jump into it without a solid base," Ms. Davis added.

AS OF THIS FALL, soccer will be included in the school programs of seventh- and eighth-grade boys and girls.

It's the recommendation of the district's athletic

director, John Sandmann, that varsity soccer could be financially possible in 1981-82.

According to his estimates, the varsity program would now cost almost \$10,000 for four teams of girls and boys.

That recommendation comes at a time, when at least in 1980-81, the athletic department's budget has been trimmed by \$20,000.

Meanwhile, Dan Lee, a district parent and chief spokesman Monday of the group of area league soccer parents, said he opposed the concept of building the program up in the schools before offering competitive varsity soccer because, "that would take too much time."

"If you need the money, I'd be glad to donate it myself," said the recently unemployed parent.

It was recommended by board member Tom Yack that Sandmann study the matter with concerned parents and report back to the body at their Aug. 22 meeting.

District personnel director Norm Kee said it was important to insure that other districts within this area have varsity soccer programs if only to "cut down on the transportation costs."

The soccer committee probably will discuss ways to pay for soccer, as well as how many will play and where.

"In this area, we do have fantastic soccer players, and it would be a shame if we couldn't get them into a program," said Lee.

He opposes a Township Board decision to make the part-time treasurer's job full-time following the November election. He cites a recent decision in Oakland County Circuit Court, which eliminates one percent tax collection fees for communities with full-time treasurers.

"For Canton, that's a \$200,000 loss. It's nice for the taxpayer. But where are you going to make it up? I'm suggesting that maybe we don't need a full-time treasurer if it costs that much money."

POOLE MAINTAINS that Canton's anti-development image has cost the township \$50 million in potential assessed valuation. He cites the case of Don Massey Cadillac, which decided against moving to Canton some years ago because of the strict sign ordinance.

He cites a pressing need for more industry in Canton.

But he also expresses concern for the ecological impact of new developments. He suggests an environmental impact study for all large projects.

"We already have drainage problems in this township," said Poole. "If you take all the marshlands and flat lands and turn them into subdivisions, the flooding is going to get worse."

He says the township should put pressure on the Wayne County Drain Commissioners Office to clean drains in Canton and downstream communities.

He suggests a change in Canton's building ordinance to alleviate basement flooding. His proposal would require basement access to the storm sewer system — as well as the sanitary system — for easy cleaning of clogged drains.

According to Poole, only one community in Michigan makes that requirement.

POOLE CALLS farmland preservation "a beautiful program, but one that not a dime of taxpayers' money should be spent on."

He endorses continuing the search for non-local financing of a development rights program. But Poole says a definite time limit should be placed on the quest.

The issue then should be brought back to the people for a vote, he says.

"We're definitely vulnerable to lawsuits right now. Those people (landowners in the agricultural district) are in limbo."

"If the people aren't in favor of it, drop it. It's been pursued now for six years. It's a beautiful program, but it's pie in the sky stuff."

Poole promises that the "people will know a lot more about farmland preservation" if the issue is placed on the ballot again.

He says that 22 percent of the land in the agricultural district is owned by two speculators. Only 10 percent of the land is owned by working farmers, while a total of 40 percent belongs to speculators.

Poole maintains that a development rights program would subsidize land investors.

"My answer is to cut the taxes of farmers to \$1 an acre. Don't cut the taxes (of speculators)."

He promises to take political pressures out of Township Hall.

"I DON'T WANT the department heads worrying about political pressures by people on the planning commission or Township Board."

"I don't want them under the gun. I want them to tell us their professional best judgments. I don't want them telling us what they think we want to hear."

If elected, Poole plans to form an energy advisory committee to make recommendations on energy costs.

He says recreation is "very important — now more than ever."

"Spending a few bucks on recreation now will save money later in terms of arrests and court trials."

He wants to plan ahead for senior citizen housing and improve Canton's image.

Poole holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Southern Mississippi. He has taken graduate courses from the University of Michigan in business administration and "edible wild plants."

"Good industrial land is not unique to Canton. You really have to go out and compete."

He concurs with the charge of some candidates that the Township Board has treated developers poorly.

"But I don't think I'm the one who's been criticized," Flodin said. "I think an effort has been made to change that a little."

He said Township Board attitudes are prompted by "the zeal to get the best for this community."

FLODIN SAYS the farmland preservation issue has to be resolved.

The township should continue its search for non-local funding of a development rights program. But at the same time, Flodin sees a need to place the issue on the ballot to settle the financing question.

"There's a paradox here," he said.

The truth of the matter is that the land involved really can't be developed until the sewer capacity is there. I don't think developers will buy those lands until they know the sewer capacity is there.

"Certainly, the economy of the country needs to

be resolved before there's a market for those lands."

Super Sewer, with a target completion date of 1985, will increase Canton's sewer capacity.

"But it really won't provide the capacity for full development of those lands" in western Canton, he said.

He believes landowners in the agricultural districts need "fair" property assessments and tax reductions.

FLODIN BELIEVES "recreation is more important now than ever." Citizens laid off from their jobs need an inexpensive form of entertainment.

He endorses more spending for recreation.

"But certainly, crucial services have the priority. The police and fire departments should be expanded. The possibility of the Tisch amendment is a threat to all government. Revenues would be cut in half."

He says the township must plan ahead for senior citizen housing.

"All of us with any luck will live to become senior citizens. I would think having your parents near would be a comfort to people. In my life, I've cared for a number of aged people."

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Church people throw line to boat people

When 10-year-old Minh Quach thinks about his experience as one of the boat people fleeing Vietnam, he remembers the food he ate. "Bread and water," he says simply, but there's a twinkle in his dark eyes as he speaks.

Minh can smile now. His family has an apartment in Canton Township. There is enough to eat for Minh, his father Nam Quach, his mother Phuoc Lam and his brother and sister, Quang and Ly-Lan. Minh and Quang have resumed their interrupted childhood as pupils at Gallimore School.

In the same apartment complex live Tan Vuong and his wife Le Luong, also parents of two young sons who attend Gallimore.

Like the Quachs, they are Chinese who came from the area near Saigon. And again like the Quachs, they owe their presence here to an idealistic, hardworking refugee committee in Livonia churches, Rosedale Gardens United Presbyterian and Timothy Lutheran.

The church people went to bat for the boat people, making it possible for them to leave overcrowded refugee centers and come to this country.

THE QUACH family failed in two efforts last year to escape Vietnam.

For this, Nam Quach was put in jail for six months, and his two young sons went Phuoc Lam and 3-year-old Ly-Lan waited out the sentence at home, and eventually they all managed to board a small boat and set out for Indonesia.

For five days and nights they traveled with 500 Chinese and Vietnamese refugees on an old 75-foot vessel, eventually reaching their destination.

Quach found the water in the camp they lived in unfit to drink. He dug a well with a shovel he later brought it with him to the United States. To get enough to eat, the family harvested local plants, and planted their seeds for a second harvest.

Quach said his family felt it needed to leave because of repressive measures instituted by the Vietnamese government. Tan Vuong echoed his words.

Tan and his clan went from Saigon to

a Malaysian city of about 10,000 refugees and from there were brought to this country.

"When we came we were moved in by the church," said Vuong's wife, Le Luong. "I feel at home." (She and Quach's wife both have names different from those of their husbands because Chinese women retain their own names.)

"We're happy to be here," continued Le Luong, who was an accountant in Vietnam. "I get used to it. My husband and I are interested in school. The boys same. They love their teachers. I hope I can go to college. I want to work hard."

BOTH THE FAMILIES are getting off to a good start by taking English lessons at Whitman Center, the community education headquarters in Livonia.

In a class taught by Nancy Browning and Karen Sarna, they study with other refugees: Laotians, Thais, Lebanese, Taiwanese, Syrians, Iraqis, Palestinians, Poles, Koreans, Albanians and Greeks.

"We provide total support for our adopted family until it is able to be self-supporting," said Millie Dreisbach, coordinator of the Rosedale refugee committee that is looking after the Quachs. This means, she added, paying for rent, food, clothing and furniture. It also means that church members turn up to babysit or take the Chinese to the doctor or dentist, on shopping trips or to language class.

Michael and Sarah Conyer donated their truck to move furniture which had been collected by church members to the Quach apartment.

The Timothy committee raised \$2,000 before its members initiated the move to bring over the Vuongs. But its commitment was more than financial. Rita Gattos, a member, often stays with 7-year-old Hang Vuong when he comes home from kindergarten so his parents can put in a long day at Whitman.

Virgil and Carolyn Mueller take the Vuongs shopping each Sunday, and are trying to find a job for Ton Vuong, the father. Darlene Hutchison has been doing a good deal of driving taking them to their class at Whitman.

"Our job is to wean them to be on their own when one member of the family becomes employed and can contribute to the family upkeep," noted Mrs. Dreisbach. "When this happens, we gradually go off. Generally within a year they are pretty independent."

Mrs. Dreisbach said the Chinese entered the country as permanent residents under the Indo-Chinese Refugee Act. They can apply for citizenship after five years of residence.

She said that the obligation assumed by the church was a moral one not a legal one. "We help to get them here, but later on if they don't pay their bills, the sponsor is not responsible. However, they have a debt to pay for their air fare. They pay it back monthly so that another family can be helped."

MILLIE DRIESBACH would like to see other churches and community groups involve themselves in refugee relocation projects. Rosedale Gardens and Timothy made arrangements through Lutheran Social Services.

So did another Livonia Church, Holy Trinity Lutheran, and therein hangs a neat twist to the story of those who have sought refuge here.

When Le Luong, her husband and her two boys made the difficult journey by boat from Vietnam to Malaysia, her brother, Ha Sam, also departed with his wife and two children.

The two families took different boats and stayed in different camps. They wondered if they would ever meet again.

But Lutheran Social Services has a policy of trying to place relatives together. And when Le Luong and her family arrived, Sam's family was already living in the Canton apartment complex with help from Holy Trinity.

So when the new arrivals jetted into Detroit on a cold day last February, Le Luong had a big surprise.

"We took her brother along to meet them," reported Mrs. Hutchison, a member of the Timothy Lutheran committee working on the resettlement of Le Luong and her family.

"The TV cameras recorded their meeting," added Mrs. Hutchison. "Their faces absolutely lit up."

Two men charged in house break-in

Like father, like son

Children may go through a period of political rebellion, but chances are they'll end up adopting their parents' ideology and party affiliation, says a Michigan State University researcher.

Gaye Benson of MSU's political science department, explained that when both parents share a political ideology, their children will generally follow suit as they mature into adulthood.

Children whose income, education or careers differ markedly from their parents' are more likely to develop political differences such as switching to an independent party philosophy, Benson noted. However, radical variance is rare she added.

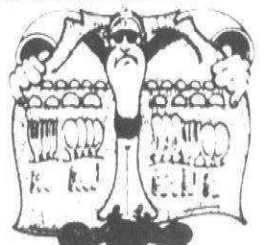
"Children have already developed political awareness by the second

grade," the researcher said. "They know the name of the president, have some understanding of laws and usually have adopted their parents' party affiliation."

Benson also indicated that the greatest increase in political awareness occurs somewhere between the late elementary and junior high school years. "Civics classes should be offered earlier for this reason," she suggested.

Benson feels that current civics classes taught in high school have very little effect on the majority of youngsters. Those who are affected the most are often disadvantaged children "who see how the system's supposed to work, and realize it's not working for them." This results in political mistrust and cynicism, she added.

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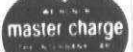
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Father Gabriel Richard, from the book jacket of his biography published by Wayne State University Press.

Remember pere Richard?

Drinan not the first priest to play politics

Second of two parts on priests and politics. By TIM RICHARD

Robert F. Drinan, a Jesuit, was widely called the first Catholic priest ever to serve in the U.S. Congress.

It wasn't so, as any student of Michigan history knows. The honor belongs to Father Gabriel Richard, a Sulpician, pastor of St. Anne Parish in Detroit, a founder of the Michigan Historical Society and first vice-president of the University of Michigan.

Richard's congressional service is usually ignored, however, because he wasn't actually a U.S. representative or senator. He was a territorial delegate, serving before Michigan became a state.

Like Drinan, Richard had to seek his religious superior's permission to run. Like Drinan, he had to come up with solid reasons for a Catholic priest's serving in political office.

Unlike Drinan, who was ordered by Pope John Paul II not to run this year, Richard was retired by the voters in an election laced with controversy.

RICHARD LEFT his native France in 1792, during the reign of terror, and was assigned to the Detroit parish in 1798.

The situation was sociologically delicate. His French-speaking flock had been conquered by the British, who in turn were beaten by the Americans. There was an abundance of ethnic, religious and political bias.

"Familiarity breeds tolerance." That was Gabriel Richard's principle, according to his biographers. How he applied it is told in "Gabriel Richard: Frontier Ambassador" by Frank B. Woodford and Albert Hyma (Wayne State University Press, 1958).

Richard sought to integrate all ethnic groups in every possible

way. He would entertain prominent British and American military and political visitors. He lectured to Protestant audiences.

He worked for abolition of bridge tolls, a burden to his farming parishioners. He sought public land for a poor house so the poor wouldn't have to depend on charity. He sought compensation for persons, especially his French flock, whose property had been damaged by the British in the War of 1812. He joined Henry Rowe Schoolcraft, namesake of the college, and C.C. Trowbridge, in forming the Michigan Historical Society.

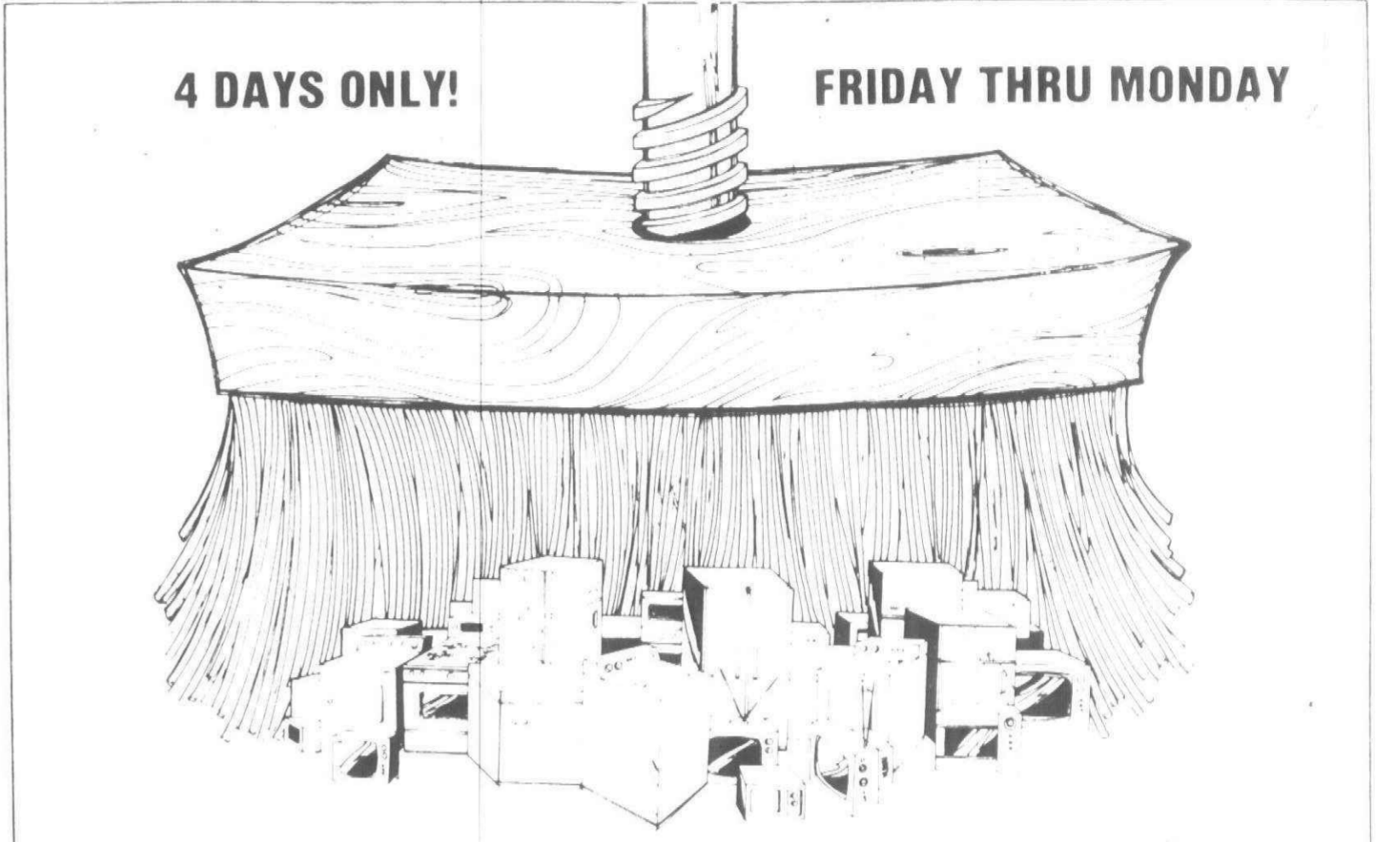
AND HE FORESAW that the French might be discriminated against.

When two citizens approached him in 1823 about running for Congress, Richard at first was angry. "Such a suggestion was so utterly unexpected that I bid them be off, telling them that it was folly to think of such a thing," he said.

But he changed his mind. Being a territorial delegate would allow him to push his plans for schools and missions for the Indians. And the \$8 a day salary could be applied to the building fund of the new St. Anne's church.

He wrote to Bishop Louis Dubourg at St. Louis who immediately replied: "You should not hesitate. Providence designs to use this extraordinary means to help you and the church in your district."

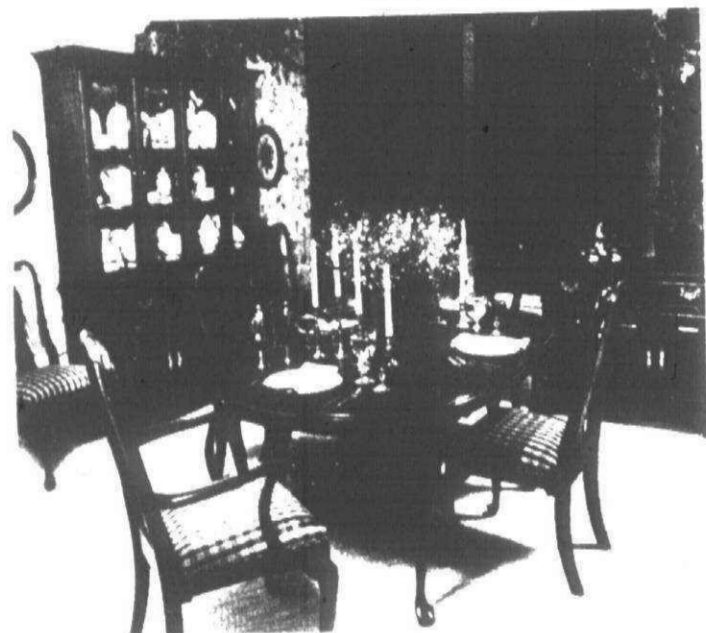

Killing your husband — part two

In my last column, I offered three socially approved methods to hasten widowhood. They were: fatten your husband, increase the saturated fats and cholesterol in his diet, and get him accustomed to more and more salted food to increase his blood pressure.

Three others were cut because of the heavy flow of Republican national convention news. They are:

1. Buy him cigarettes by the carton. Cigarette smokers develop heart disease at three to six times the rate of non-smokers. If heart disease doesn't get

him, lung cancer may. An expensive, engraved lighter gift from you may encourage him to use the lighter oftener.

2. Encourage him to be as inactive as possible. The sedentary man runs almost twice the risk of heart disease as the active man. It is important that the inactivity associated with his desk job extend into his leisure and weekend hours.

Discourage a deviation from his sedentary work schedule. Regularly ridicule any suggestion he may have for moderate exercise, games or active hobbies.

Encourage TV, cards, bowling and spectator sports. If he enjoys golf, buy him a motorized golf cart. Finally, buy him power tools for home landscaping chores or, better yet, hire someone to do it for him.

3. Promote stress and tension in his life. Stress and tension appear to be related to the development of heart disease. Some sure-fire ways to induce anxiety are to worry him about his children, work or home life. Overspending and related financial concerns are also quite good at promoting tension.

Finally, don't allow him to go on vacation. He may discontinue smoking, take exercise and relax his tensions away.

However, for those women who want their husbands around for some time, take the opposite course. It may postpone his departure for many years.

First Richard had to obtain U.S. citizenship. He overcame some political-judicial subterfuge aimed at delaying his citizenship past the Sept. 4, 1823 election date.

RICHARD WON a four-way contest, gathering 444 votes versus 421 for John Biddle, clerk of the Detroit land office; 335 for Austin Wing, sheriff of Wayne County; and 55 for John R. Williams, later a mayor of Detroit.

As territorial delegate, Richard had no vote and served on no committees. He could, however, speak from the floor and lobby the representatives on behalf of the neglected Michigan territory.

He saw himself not as the delegate of the French and the Catholics but as the servant of the entire territory. "My object is to render service to my constituents, not to court their popularity. . . to devote more time in paying visits to the members of the committees, before whom I have business. . ."

Records of the activities of a territorial delegate are scarce. Yet he was rubbing shoulders with Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, Thomas Hart Benton, John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson.

President James Monroe and particularly Secretary of War John C. Calhoun listened to his tales of negotiating treaties with the Indians and solicited his ideas on Indian education.

LACKING A VOTE, Richard nevertheless built up a record of accomplishments:

- The Committee on Public Lands was persuaded to speed up surveys and get lands on the market for settlers.

- Congress was persuaded to give public lands which, say Richard's biographers, "became the basis of real financial aid to the University of Michigan."

- His greatest achievement was to win a survey and the first \$3,000 in funding to upgrade the Old Sauk Trail into the Chicago Military Road. Today the road is known as Michigan Avenue and US-12. It was the route most early settlers followed into Michigan's southern tier of counties.

On the floor of Congress, Richard argued that such a road would have military benefit; that it would provide a means of transit when the Great Lakes were frozen; and that it would raise the value of adjacent public lands for sale to settlers.

The latter argument would be used in the 1950s by State Highway Commissioner John Mackie in favor of freeways and in the 1970s by the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority in favor of rapid transit.

HIS CHURCH position got him into one spot of trouble. Pastor Richard had to excommunicate a man named Labadie who had deserted a wife in Montreal, obtained a Michigan divorce and remarried.

Richard denounced Labadie with so much gusto that Labadie sued for libel. The case dragged on a long time, but ultimately Richard lost, and Labadie was awarded damages of \$1,116.

Arguing a state court had no right to interfere in a purely ecclesiastical matter, Richard refused to pay. When he returned from the first session of Congress, he was slapped in jail. As a condition of his bail bond for his release, however, Richard was ordered not to leave Wayne County.

House Speaker Henry Clay ruled Richard could claim congressional immunity to return to Washington. Except for that trip, Richard was unable to leave Wayne County the rest of his life.

Labadie's rights to damages were sold back and forth between Richard's political enemies, not because they wanted the \$1,116 but simply to hound the civic leader.

RICHARD SOUGHT a second term. Dirty politics defeated him.

The election was moved from Sept. 4 to May 31, when many of his fur trapping constituents were still in the woods and unable to vote.

His supporters were challenged at the polls for not paying head taxes, although other voters who hadn't paid went unchallenged.

Sheriff Wing won the election with 728 votes to 724 for Richard and 684 for John Biddle. Richard also lost the elections of 1827 and 1829.

Richard took the defeats not personally but as a sign of discrimination against French Catholics. Yet his civic efforts never ceased.

Father Gabriel Richard died from overwork during the cholera epidemic of 1832. However great he looms in history as a politician and cultural leader, he was first of all a Catholic priest.

Where were you when the earthquake shook?

Where were you last Sunday afternoon at about 3 p.m.?
If you were walking around it is possible that you never felt the earth tremor.
But if you were seated or resting in an easy chair or davenport, you may have felt the quake that shook this part of the country for about 10 seconds.
If you were in the delegation of Plymouth baseball fans sitting in the

upper deck of Tiger Stadium, you had the wits scared out of you.
These are the findings of a survey taken of community residents regarding their reaction to the first such earthquake in this area in years.
"I sure was scared," Ida Nairn, a baseball fan, recounted. "When I started to rock, I thought the entire steel structure was coming down. It was one of the most frightening things I have experienced."
"A funny thing was my husband, Jim, was out at the concession stand to get us a bottle of pop and didn't even feel a thing. In fact he thought I was fooling."
On the other hand, Ralph Lorenz, the owner of the Mayflower Hotel, was sitting in his easy chair at home listening to the ball game when the quake struck. "And I sure felt it," he said.
When asked about the tremor, Mrs. Mary Brooks, secretary to Tom Nobearta, the Plymouth Township supervisor, laughed and said, "I didn't know a thing about it until one of my neighbors told me. I was working in the kitchen canning pickles."
It was the same with Joe and Sylvia Graye at the Graye Greenhouse at Joy and Lilley roads.
"We were working in the greenhouse, walking around and did not know of it until later when the news came over the air." Mrs. Graye confided. "So we weren't scared."
Esther Hulsing, township clerk, was just as surprised when she heard about the tremor.
"I was busy walking around the house and didn't feel a thing," she said.

"I am just as glad I didn't. I have gone through two such experiences — out on the coast, and I don't like them."
Harold Fischer, the real estate man, smiled when he admitted that he felt the shock while sitting in the living room with his son listening to the Tigers baseball game.
Out in Canton Township, Clerk John Flodin was sitting in the living room with his wife, just chatting. "She felt it," he said. "But I didn't."
Inspector Carl Berry, of the Plymouth Police Department, didn't hear about the earth shaking for hours. "I

was out in the garage working on my motorcycle and nothing took my mind off that."
Ann Brown, of the Plymouth police department office, claimed she was walking around the house and didn't feel it.
"I was sitting out in our backyard," Mrs. Mary Ellen Kenyon, deputy township clerk, confided, "and didn't feel a thing." Meanwhile, Carolyn Dew, secretary to Plymouth City Manager Henry Graper, smilingly answered, "I was too busy cooking dinner to pay any attention to anything else."

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Circuit court hopefuls vie for spots on Nov. ballot

Fifteen candidates are running for 3rd Circuit Court seats that expire Jan. 1, 1987. Voters will be instructed to vote for no more than six candidates on the Aug. 5 primary ballot. Three candidates will be elected in the Nov. 4 general election. Observer special writer Donna Lomas compiled the following candidate biographies. Each candidate was asked: 1. Do you consider yourself a strict constructionist or a judicial activist? And, 2. What experience qualifies you for a seat on the circuit court?

Marianne Battani

Attorney Marianne O. Battani thinks a judge "must be innovative with the law, but you can't create a new law. You have to interpret the law as you see it."

Ms. Battani, whose practice focuses on family, civil and criminal trial work, wants to see circuit court handle more domestic cases.

"The Wayne County docket is one of the best in the country," Ms. Battani said. "But the circuit court doesn't like to handle domestic cases. I could handle domestic cases efficiently based on my experience."

Before receiving a law degree Ms. Battani designed computer systems for businesses and banks. She outlined a computerized system for handling more domestic cases. Ms. Battani wants to use that experience to administer changes in the docket system of handling the caseloads.

"My expertise will be beneficial to the court," she noted. "I can see some inequities in judging. I can help."

Ms. Battani, 36, received her law degree from Detroit College of Law in 1972 and has been in private practice since 1974, following two years as an associate. She is a member of the American Civil Liberties Union, National Organization for Women and the State Bar of Michigan, and is past president of Women's Lawyers Association and other similar groups.

She is endorsed by the Detroit Bar Association.

Richard Clark

Since graduating from the Detroit College of Law in 1973, Richard Clark has enjoyed "working with the people." The 35-year-old attorney from Wayne has been active in community organizations and activities such as the Civitans and Special Olympics.

"I'm a law activist," he said. "The law must be obeyed but the court must know when to temper it. There are circumstances when the law doesn't fit, since you can't make a law for every situation."

Since he spends most of his time in court, Clark says his experience there has given him skills necessary for judgeship. "The manner in which clients are treated is important," the attorney notes. "People deserve not to be treated like a herd of cattle being passed through. A judge must deal with problems individually."

Clark doesn't specialize in his practice and has experience in trial, divorce and criminal cases. That experience, he says, is important for a judge to have.

Stephen Boak

Attorney and circuit court candidate Stephen Boak thinks a judge "needs experience in several different areas: legal knowledge, trial, appellate and administrative experience."

Boak says that his experience with the areas above "at least partially qualify me for judge." Boak has been an attorney for 14 years, most of those with the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. He is currently chief of operations for the prosecutor's office, responsible for keeping the docket moving. "I have to make that work," he said.

The 38-year-old Plymouth attorney considers himself a strict constructionist. "A judge is there to apply the law as it has been approved by the appellate," he said. "Any action (to change a law) should come from the legislature. There are discretionary rulings," he added, "but it should be the use, not abuse, of discretion."

Boak is a member of the State Bar of Michigan, Prosecuting Attorneys Association of Michigan, Wayne County Detectives Association and others. He is a Major, Judge Advocate General's Corps Army. He received his law degree from the University of Michigan in 1966.

ness and courtesy," the former Peace Corp volunteer said.

Lubienski, 42, is a moderate on court issues. "I'm a little bit of both," he said. "The prison system needs reform, but the courts are too lenient. A lot of people should be caught that are getting away with things. That has to do with legislation, not judges. A judge gives everyone a fair chance for his case to be heard. Whatever the law is, I have to abide by it," he said.

Lubienski acted as visiting judge for two years in circuit court. He speaks three languages and received a law degree in 1962 from Wayne State University. He is a member of the Latin American Bar Association.

Richard Kaufman

Richard Kaufman, a lifelong Detroit resident and candidate for one of three vacancies in circuit court is "quite willing to use innovative techniques to bring justice. I draw the line at making a decision that is contrary to precedence," he adds. "Beyond that, anything I'll use."

The 29-year-old attorney states he is "neither liberal or conservative entirely. It is the duty of a judge to decipher what the law is. A judge has to use philosophical values in making a determination."

"I'm more in line with rehabilitating a person." (Continued on Page 12A)


Ricardo Lubienski

Re-elected recently to a four-year term as a Common Pleas Court Judge, Ricardo Lubienski is seeking a seat on the circuit court to "try to give everybody a fair chance no matter what."

His 16 years experience on the bench and as an attorney give Lubienski "an awareness of lawyer and client problems. There is need for basic fair-

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
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3rd Circuit Court candidates

Fifteen candidates are seeking three 3rd Circuit Court seats. Voters will be instructed to vote for no more than six candidates on the Aug. 5 primary ballot. Three candidates will be elected to six-year terms in the Nov. 4 general election. The state is divided into 48 judicial circuits, each consisting of from one to four counties. The 3rd circuit serves Wayne County. Circuit judges are elected on a non-partisan ballot. They must be lawyers and under 70 years of age at the time of election or appointment, and must reside in their judicial districts.

It's more constructive than imposing a jail term or fine."

Kaufman, a Wayne State University law graduate in 1977, says a circuit court judge should have experience enabling a thorough understanding of the law. He has worked in areas including anti-trust, civil rights, criminal and personal injury cases.

"Because of my trial work, I have a better ability to sit and judge efficiently. Honesty and integrity are also important ingredients in judging well," Kaufman said.

Lucille Watts

Common Pleas Judge Lucille A. Watts wants to bring 18 years' experience to the "broader" judicial arena of circuit court.

Citing her experience on the bench and in private practice in Wayne and Oakland counties, Judge Watts says, "My job is to make decisions based on law, not what I think should be done."

"I have a reputation as being a hard-working and fair-minded judge," the 57-year-old graduate of the Detroit College of Law said.

Active in community affairs, Judge Watts is chairman of the board of Focus: HOPE and a member of the YWCA-Northern Branch and Kappa Beta Psi legal sorority. She also belongs to the Womens' Economic Club of Detroit and several legal organizations. She is active in her church.

Ted Mrozowski

Wayne County Auditor Ted Mrozowski considers himself a moderate in judicial law. Mrozowski says his experience in law and as a former state representative give him the background for a circuit court seat.

"I'm neither a strict constructionist or judicial activist — each goes from one extreme or another," the 58-year-old lawyer said. "I take facts and circumstances and relate them to the law."

"A judge has to listen to two sides and make a judgment according to the law," Mrozowski added.

As county auditor, Mrozowski says he's had to make judgments on administrative matters, including budgets, which broaden his abilities.

"I've practiced law, I've helped make laws and I've dealt with people," he said.

Mrozowski has been a lawyer since graduating from Wayne State University in 1958. He lives in Grosse Pointe Woods.

Henry Szymanski

"The safest route for a judge to take is to view approaches liberally and be more or less conservative in execution," Common Pleas Court Judge Henry J. Szymanski says.

A candidate for a seat on the circuit court, Szymanski thinks a judge must be prepared to give up a "great deal."

"I have strong feelings about a judge belonging to organizations — these things tend to conflict with a judge's role," he said.

Szymanski has given up membership in the VFW and the American Legion among other clubs.

The 56-year-old judge has "no sympathy for out-and-out judicial activists. I'm a good deal less than a judicial activist-but I'm not necessarily a strict constructionist," he said.

Because he knows all the facets of a judicial operation of a multi-judge court and spent 14 years as a trial judge handling county cases, Szymanski feels qualified for a seat in circuit court.

"It is important to have some judicial experience in circuit court because you must be productive immediately," Szymanski notes.

The judge has been active in the reorganization of the Wayne County court system; a member of the YMCA and other professional associations.

Patrick McDonald

Experience as a lawyer plus a stint as Redford Township Supervisor have provided the basis of experience he will need for a Circuit Court seat, says Patrick J. McDonald, Detroit attorney.

"Circuit Court deals with everything from domestic to criminal cases. In my general practice of law I've had exposure to a number of areas plus practical experience from being involved in government," the 33-year-old attorney said.

McDonald described himself as a constructionist: "The role of the judiciary is to enforce, not make, laws under our form of government. The legislative branch makes it the judge's duty to enforce the law."

McDonald received his law degree from University of Detroit in 1972 and is in private practice. He has been a resident of Redford Township since 1965 and is involved in church and recreation activities in his community. He was on the executive board of SEMCOG (Southeast Michigan Council of Government), a member of the Health Planning Council and Redford Community Hospital.

William C. Hague

"I can improve the intelligence level of the circuit court bench," said Chief County Traffic Court Judge William C. Hague, running for a court seat despite recent disciplinary action from the Michigan Judicial Tenure Commission.

"I have more than experience. I have education and broad exposure in facts and interpretation of law," the 67-year-old judge elaborated. "My repu-

tation is excellent among lawyers and the public. Taking all into consideration, no one is better prepared than I."

Hague describes himself as a judicial activist who believes the law is made for the people.

"Laws are made based on common sense and are realistic. People who are subject to the law should be protected."

"If the law is unconstitutional, it is not enforceable," said Hague, who refused to enforce Detroit's anti-prostitution and gun control ordinance. The tenure commission recently said the judge was guilty of "judicial misconduct" and "lawless conduct" for not enforcing the ordinances.

"The higher court has the obligation to pass on the sufficiency of my decision (regarding the ordinance enforcement)," Hague commented.

Hague, who was an IRS agent before earning a law degree in 1951, has served on the bench for 12 years. He has been a city assistant attorney, President of the Ecorse Board of Education, and member of the Michigan Employment Security Appeal Board.

Steven Schoenberg

"I believe in people and the law, and the two conflict sometimes," Friend of the Court Mediator Steven Schoenberg said. As a candidate for a seat on the circuit court, Schoenberg said he can be more effective as a decision-making judge.

"I have ideas how to use Friend of the Court," he said. "I could communicate with them more expeditiously if I were a circuit court judge." (Friend of the Court mediators investigate domestic, divorce-related cases.)

Describing himself more of a judicial activist than a strict constructionist, the 44-year-old attorney notes that "the law doesn't always follow reason. There are circumstances where the rights of

people should prevail at the time." Schoenberg believes that discretion is "absolutely necessary" in handling domestic cases. "I'd try to resolve (the case) in the best interest of the people," he said.

The Livonia resident received an Outstanding Service to Family Law award in June from the Michigan State Bar Association. Part of his duties at Friend of the Court involve disputes over custody and property.

"You can learn procedure," Schoenberg stated. "You can't learn decisiveness and fairness."

Raymond Walsh

Judges are not architects, according to circuit court candidate Raymond P. Walsh.

"It is difficult enough to read and apply the law without becoming the architects of society," said the 34-year-old attorney. "That should be left to the legislators."

Entering his seventh year in the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, Walsh said his experience has been "extensive on all levels: from the trial court to the Supreme Court."

Walsh has taught several continuing legal education courses to other lawyers, has published for the

state bar association and taught law classes. The 1973 law graduate from Wayne State University is currently working in the juvenile division of the prosecutor's office.

The Detroit resident is a deacon of the Jefferson Presbyterian Church and a member of the Indian Village Association.

Robert Reuther

For the past 12 years, Robert Reuther has been an assistant prosecutor for Wayne County and has worked with "everything from criminal law to cases before the Supreme Court." That experience forms a basis for his candidacy for a seat on the circuit court.

"I believe in the interpretation of the law. I believe in following the law, but sometimes you have to apply the law to a new set of facts and decide the best for society."

Citing his background in criminal and civil work, as well as experience in private practice, Reuther says he will be "conscientious." I want to do a good job, work hard and be fair to people."

Reuther, 41, lives in Grosse Pointe and is second vice-president to Downtown Detroit Lions Club and the Wayne County Government Bar Association. He is a member of the Mio Federal Prison Ministry (Catholic-sponsored Marriage Encounter-Ecumeni-

cal Movement) and Cursillo, a short course in Christianity.

He received his law degree from Wayne State University in 1964 and was in private practice before joining the prosecutor's office.

Ronald Rice

City of Detroit Attorney Ronald Rice says: "I don't owe anybody and no one owes me."

Rice is running for an elected office, but he doesn't consider himself a politician.

"I want to bring to the bench a perspective of justice," Rice said. "I cannot compromise my honesty or integrity — I'd be useless."

Rice is being endorsed by the Detroit Bar Association and the Wolverine Association. The 38-year-old trial attorney believes there are alternatives to being either a liberal or conservative judge.

"A judge should — if he can — hold to the letter of the law if its clear. If he can't, he must go to the spirit of the law. That's being judicious."

"New issues are coming up with no traditional solutions. You must fashion new solutions, being careful not to tip scales. Be fair to both parties," Rice said.

A life-long Detroit resident, Rice received a law degree in 1975 from Wayne State University. He has spent four years as a trial attorney in circuit

court and handled negligence and personal injury cases.

He belongs to the Trade Union Leadership Conference, St. Scholastica Parent-Teacher Guild, Hartford Memorial Church, Detroit and Michigan Bar associations and the Wayne State Alumni Association.

George T. Ryan

County Traffic Court Referee George T. Ryan goes by the book. The circuit court candidate and frequent fill-in as a temporary Recorder's Court judge says: "I'm a constructionist. Cases are decided in law by a Latin term meaning 'you follow what is ahead of you'."

Ryan has served on the bench as a temporary appointee for 10 years and has practiced for 17 years in circuit courts in Wayne and surrounding counties.

Ryan was accused of soliciting funds for his campaign in violation of the Michigan Code of Judicial Conduct in June. Ryan also was accused of making racial slurs during an interview with a magazine — a charge he has vehemently denied.

At that time, the executive director of the Judicial Tenure Commission refused to confirm whether Ryan was under investigation for either allegation.

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On August 5th, Wayne County voters will have the opportunity to reform and streamline county government. Your YES vote on Proposal A will establish a Wayne County Charter Commission authorized to draw up a new Charter which will reorganize and restructure county government.

At the same time, voters in each of the 27 Districts will nominate candidates to serve on the charter commission. Voters will make the final selection of these charter commissioners at the November 4th General Election.

The charter commission will draw up two alternative county charters for presentation to the voters. The charters will be similar except that one will provide for a county executive elected by the voters and the other will provide for a chief administrative officer appointed by the Board of Commissioners. The voters may choose one charter or defeat both and send them back to the charter commission for revision and later resubmission to the voters.

Immigrants will flood U.S. by year 2000, expert says

In the next 20 years, about half the increase in the U.S. population will be immigrants, says a Michigan State University professor.

William Lazer, an MSU marketing professor, predicts one of the biggest influxes of immigrants in the past 75 years. He was one of five professors who recently completed a project looking at what the country would be like in the year 2000.

Lazer estimates that about 13 million to 14 million immigrants will relocate in the U.S. by the year 2000, including about six million who will cross the border unauthorized. About five million "illegal immigrants" are now

living in this country, he said.

The forecasters predict the official U.S. population, not including the 11 million illegal immigrants, will be 245 million by the year 2000, up from 220 million this year.

Hispanics, including the 114,000 Cubans who entered this country this year, will account for a major part of the immigration, say the forecasters, and Hispanics will become the largest minority in the country by 1990.

The immigrants will relocate mainly in the southwest and a few of the larger cities, says Lazer.

"It is quite possible that around the

year 2000 Los Angeles could become the nation's largest city, and the sun-belt cities could account for seven of the top U.S. cities."

The face of America will change in at least one other significant way — the population will be older.

The number of 20 to 35-year-olds will decline by 25 percent in the next 20 years, one of the sharpest and most sustained declines in our history, according to Lazer.

The number of people 75 and older will increase by 50 percent. But the big boom will come in those 35 to 54 years old, whose numbers will also increase by 50 percent.

"In marketing terms, the middle-agers represent years of the highest earning capacity for most adults," Lazer said. "These are the years when parents feel freer to indulge themselves."

And they will have money to spend, he added.

"Whereas the early 1970s began with good income increases and then fizzled, the 1980s are starting out weak and are expected to gain in strength over the decade and continue well into the 1990s."

The forecasters predict that per capita real income will grow at an annual rate of about 2 percent.

About 50 percent of all wives in families now work, Lazer said. By 2000, 60 percent of the wives will work.

About 52 percent of all families will have incomes, in 1977 dollars, of more than \$25,000, up from about 30 percent in 1980. About 10 percent of those families will have incomes of \$50,000 and over, up from 3.6 percent this year. And, says Lazer, these families will include a substantial number of skilled blue collar workers.

"Despite this growth, the lower middle income groups, those in the \$15,000 to \$20,000 category, may feel more financially strapped than ever," Lazer said. "Some other groups of society

may not fare as well relatively as they did in the '50s, '60s, and '70s when certain unions won unprecedented gains for their members."

While husband-wife working teams will see the greatest increase in earnings the percentage of husband-wife families will decline, the study predicts.

Husband-wife households now make up about two-thirds of all households. By the year 2000 they may account for about half of the households in the country. Households headed by single persons, as well as unmarried couples could constitute the new majority around 2000.

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Democrats cut hopes for tiptop supervisor

It would be nice if a well-rounded supervisor candidate fell from the sky and plopped in the Canton Township Democratic primary race.

That may come as a surprising assessment. Three of the four Democratic contenders have sat in the supervisor's chair before.

But none of the three — Noel Culbert, Harold Stein or Robert Greenstein — shows the simultaneous qualities of strong leadership, sound administrative abilities and the knack to pull Canton together.

The other Democrat — John Barnette — announced Monday that he would withdraw from the race. Barnette entered the campaign mainly to further his interests as a township businessman.

James Poole — the lone Republican in the supervisor's race — is assured a spot on the November ballot.

OF THE THREE candidates with supervisor experience, Greenstein is probably the most well-known in circles outside Canton as well as the most hated — and loved.

He is a brilliant man. His talent for examining issues from new and different angles is needed sorely by Canton Township.

He has done a great deal for Canton — perhaps more than any other person in recent history. He established the Canton Police Department and engineered the farmland preservation program.

But in taking a strong leadership role, Greenstein has alienated many. He often harasses those who oppose his point of view with barbed comments and courtroom-type debates. If elected supervisor, Greenstein would threaten to rip Canton apart and reawaken the political factionalism that marked his term as supervisor from 1974-1976.

A current trustee, Greenstein should have sought re-election to that post instead of staking a claim to

his old job in the supervisor's office. As a trustee and one of seven votes on the Township Board, Greenstein's abilities are put to a healthy use.

He should be encouraged to remain active in township affairs, particularly in the area of farmland preservation. Except for Greenstein's personality, he would make a superb chief administrator.

MANY OF THE SAME criticisms apply to Stein, who unseated Greenstein in 1976.

Like Greenstein, Stein was a capable administrator during his 1976-78 term.

But he also alienated many as the township's chief elected official.

Stein never seemed in tune with what the majority of Canton's residents wanted. He never showed a personal commitment to farmland preservation, despite the studies and work which were performed during his term of office.

When hundreds of homeowners complained about shoddy workmanship of builders, Stein took the attitude that government cannot interfere with the private enterprise system. He implemented a homeowner warranty program, which offered little help to residents who bought their houses before the program was established.

Stein's strongest points come in the area of industrial development — a topic that suddenly has become an election issue. He would handle Canton's industrial needs with competent hands.

Many distrust Stein, however. His election could lead to the same type of political turmoil that prompted a recall-Stein campaign during his term as supervisor.

THAT LEAVES only Culbert, the incumbent supervisor, in the Democratic race.

Culbert will never make the history books as a leader who aggressively pursues ideas and pro-

grams. Many have criticized the present supervisor for administrative incompetence — with good cause.

But sources inside Township Hall say Culbert's administrative capabilities have improved since he took office in November 1978.

More importantly, Culbert shows the ability to work with and listen to others. He shows the personal traits that are needed to heal the political wounds that were ripped open again and again during the Stein and Greenstein years.

Canton needs political stability, now more than ever. A return to the wild politics of the Greenstein and Stein eras could provoke an atmosphere of civil war. Nothing gets done when political factions are constantly at one another's throats.

Hopefully, Culbert will continue to mature in the administrative area.

Considering the candidates in the Democratic primary race, Culbert is the best choice on the ticket. The Observer recommends a yes vote for Noel Culbert Aug. 5.

Falkiewicz gets our vote; questions fog GOP race

One candidate shines over other Democrats in the treasurer's race.

She is **Maria Falkiewicz**, who has served as deputy treasurer for the past 1½ years.

Ms. Falkiewicz lacks a college degree in the financial or accounting field. But she has shown her competence in those areas since taking over administrative functions of the treasurer's job. She implemented an investment program, for example, which reaped \$1.5 million in interest last year.

Her capabilities are not limited to the administrative side of the treasurer's job.

On occasion, Ms. Falkiewicz has sat on the Township Board with full voting power in the absence of the elected treasurer, Jim Donahue. She has performed legislative tasks for the board, such as the compilation of liquor license regulations.

She is a hard worker who knows all the issues.

As a candidate, Ms. Falkiewicz's attitudes are refreshing. She refrains from the politicking and name calling that characterize too many campaigns in Canton.

One of her opponents — Anna Bradley — served as township treasurer from 1976-1978.

Mrs. Bradley has shown little interest in this campaign.

She failed to respond to a League of Women Voters (LWV) candidate questionnaire or to attend a candidates forum sponsored by the LWV. She has not shown the interest to attend Township Board meetings since filing for the treasurer's position.

THE REPUBLICAN RACE for treasurer is harder to assess.

Both candidates — Leo Knasiak and James

Kearney — possess the educational and employment backgrounds to be fine administrators. They both possess degrees in the financial field.

But serious questions surround both candidates.

Kearney attempted to withdraw from the treasurer's race because of a time conflict in running a campaign, working full time and writing a thesis for a master's degree. He decided to remain in the race after learning that his name could not be withdrawn from the ballot.

His efforts to withdraw from the campaign cast doubts on his sincerity and desire for the treasurer's job.

Those questions do not surround Knasiak. He has attended most Township Board meetings during the last few months. He sincerely wants the job.

But Knasiak appears unwilling to address the political issues facing Canton. He attaches more significance to the administrative side of the treasurer's job.

In Canton, the treasurer must address legislative as well as administrative matters. He or she holds one of seven votes on the Township Board. Sometimes, the treasurer's vote decides an issue.

Kearney seems more willing to address the issues than Knasiak. He is a member of the Canton Building Authority and makes suggestions on the issues.

For that reason, the Observer gives a cautious edge to Kearney in the Republican treasurer's race. He is juggling work on a masters degree, a fulltime job and an election campaign. If he wins election to the fulltime treasurer's position, he will be obligated to vacate his position at Ford Motor Credit Corp.

Hopefully, that will end the time crunch for Kearney.

Well-qualified candidates mean tough trustee choice

Canton's trustee races are a glory to behold.

Independent-thinking and hard-working candidates line both the Democratic and Republican tickets.

Those are impressive traits for any elected official.

But trustees — four of the Township Board's seven members — must exhibit those qualifications to maintain a balance of views and representation on the board. They must temper the efforts of any over-zealous administrator to gain too much political weight.

Canton voters must choose between nine Democrats or six Republicans in the Aug. 5 primary to nominate candidates for four available trustee positions.

It is a difficult task. More than four candidates from each party promise excellent tenure as trustees.

It takes a close examination to sort out the good from the best.

AMONG THE BEST of the Democrats are incumbent Carol Bodenmiller and planning commissioner Dianne Neihengen. Elizabeth Hamann and Larry Bowerman, a former merit commissioner, also top the list.

Ms. Bodenmiller already has shown her ability on the Township Board.

No one has worked harder. She serves as the board's representative to a number of organizations and committees, including the planning commission, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) and farmland preservation committee.

She votes according to her beliefs and maintains close contact with Township Hall and its happenings. Ms. Bodenmiller makes it a habit to know the full ramifications of issues before making a decision.

Ms. Neihengen promises the same excellent performance as a trustee.

She shows the ability to translate talk and goals into action. She knows the issues and makes meaningful suggestions on farmland preservation, industrial development, land use matters and the township's relationship to its business community.

Ms. Hamann demonstrates the rare ability to place issues in perspective — historical, legal, social and economic. She can objectively weigh all sides of an issue. As an attorney with a background in municipal law, she would be a valuable asset to the Township Board.

Bowerman — a constant audience member at Township Board meetings — advises planning ahead for such matters as growth control. Such attitudes are important on the Township Board, which will shape the future of Canton for years ahead.

Other candidates are worthy of mention.

They include incumbent Trustee Eugene Daley, who candidly admits his opposition to farmland preservation. He provides balance to the board. But Daley's failure to take an aggressive role in legislative matters places him behind some other candidates.

No one can question Gary Roberts' activity and involvement in the community. As a resident and businessman, he has taken aggressive steps to ad-

dress a number of issues, such as builder and mobile homeowner complaints. But Roberts' political maneuvering may make him a difficult person to work with on the board.

Mary Dingeldey has shown the interest to attend practically every board meeting during the last five years. She knows the issues.

But when all is considered, the best Democrats are Carol Bodenmiller, Dianne Neihengen, Elizabeth Hamann and Larry Bowerman.

IN THE REPUBLICAN RACE, trustee hopefuls are equally qualified.

The best are Robert Padget, Stephen Larson, Thomas Carman and Loren Bennett.

As chairman of the planning commission, Padget has demonstrated an ability to respectfully consider the views of others. He is an independent thinker who carefully weighs all sides of his issues. The Township Board could respect any judgment made by Padget.

Larson, an incumbent trustee, won his Township Board position by appointment last summer.

Like Padget, he has proven himself as an independent thinker. Larson has been an excellent trustee. His concerns about government spending add caution to the board.

Carman, a current planning commissioner, is an innovative thinker who can see different solutions to township problems. He is the only candidate who has suggested an investigation into cityhood to solve Canton's problems with unpaved roads, for example.

Bennett appears sincere when he promises an open trustee term and accessibility to Canton residents. He is chairman of the farmland preservation committee and shows knowledge of township issues.

Worthy of mention is Republican trustee candidates Robert Schaeztl. He pushed for more industrial development when "industry" was a dirty word. If his election bid fails, Schaeztl should retain his active role on the industrial and commercial committee and Economic and Development Corp. (EDC).

Schaeztl would make a good trustee.

But four other candidates — Robert Padget, Stephen Larson and Thomas Carman and Loren Bennett — show a more comprehensive knowledge of all township issues.

Hink, Foley top charter race

If a charter commission is going to convene to create a new form of government for Wayne County then the authors elected ought to have some knowledge of the function and operation of the present county government.

A number of Democrats would like to get elected to the charter commission. But not all of the candidates know much about county government.

The Observer believes that the two persons most knowledgeable about county government are **Walter Hink** and **Patrick Foley**.

Hink is a Belleville resident who practices law in Canton Township. He has an interest in county government which goes back more than four years. Hink ran for county commissioner in the 27th Dis-

trict, which includes Canton, Plymouth, Plymouth Township and part of Westland, in 1976 and again in 1978. Both times he warned of the county's financial position and strongly urged reorganization.

Foley lives in Canton and has almost eight years' experience in county government as an assistant prosecuting attorney. He also has experience in state government as an assistant to the secretary of state for six years and as an assistant attorney general for a year.

The Observer recommends either **Walter Hink** or **Patrick Foley** as the 27th District's representative on the charter commission. Either one would serve well.

CITIZENS MUST pay attention to what the charter commission members do once they take office.

They must hold those charter commissioners accountable for writing the strongest possible charter — once in which a chief administrator replaces the antiquated Board of Auditors as a budget writing authority; one in which the drain commissioner is abolished as an elective office.

At present, the thinking is that the charter commission would set a charter ratification date of November 1981. This would disadvantage many suburbs, particularly townships and even some large cities such as Livonia, because the Detroit mayor and entire city council will be elected at that time.

Suburban officials will need to work for a better date.

ONCE A CHARTER for Wayne County is written, voters will make the biggest decision of all — should the chief administrator be an elected county executive, like the mayor or governor, or shall we have a county manager, appointed by the board of commissioners?

Some persons want a weak, inefficient county government, for reasons we cannot fathom, and will opt for the appointed manager.

This newspaper will urge creation of an elected county executive. Voters here will need to flock to the polls, whenever the final election is held, and support a county executive.

FINALLY, WE should not expect too much from a charter commission and county executive.

The Charter County Act is a weak one. We cannot get rid of the independently elected clerk, prosecutor, register of deeds, treasurer and sheriff. We cannot get rid of the Road Commission.

We may not even be able to get rid of the kind of tinhorn politics that controls the appointment of so many Wayne County officers.

But we can make an improvement that will eliminate the massive and continuing deficits that have plagued Wayne County for the better part of a decade.

It will, however, take citizen and local officials' vigilance.

Eliminate the camera shakes — use a tripod

A good tripod is a valuable piece of photographic hardware that should be in every photographer's equipment inventory. Without it, many photographic opportunities will be forsaken, many exciting shots missed.

What do you look for when buying a tripod? First and foremost — quality. Don't skimp in your purchase. You have a good camera — get a good tripod to match.

Buy one that will support more weight than it is intended to hold. An extra strong tripod will lessen the chance of a blurred shot in a heavy wind.

Most tripods are constructed of metals such as aluminum. These are fine because they are lightweight and are easily folded for storage and traveling. Usually a maximum extension of four to five feet is sufficient and will handle most tasks.

When it's not fully extended, keep the thinnest, lowest legs retracted for greater stability. Also, to increase sturdiness, always place one of the tripod legs pointed forward under the lens.

Two kinds of tripod heads are available. The most common has separate handles for panning and tilting. A second kind contains a single screw that unlocks a ball joint to permit turns and tilts in any direction. Which is best for you is a matter of personal preference. There are many times you'll need to use a tripod. A general rule is that you should use a tripod when the shutter speed you'll be using is slower than the reciprocal of the focal length of the lens.

For example, the nearest shutter speed to your normal 50mm lens is 1/60 second. This means that you can hand hold your camera at speeds of 1/60 second or faster. If lighting conditions demand a speed of 1/30 second or slower, better get out your tripod.

When using your 200 mm. lens it's OK to hand hold at 1/250 second but with any speed slower, you'll need that tripod.

Many long telephoto lenses have their own tripod sockets for better balance, so check yours out before mounting the camera to the tripod.

When else will a tripod come in handy? Night shots. Beautiful photographs are obtained after dark not only of street scenes and store windows but also of floodlit buildings and monuments. More details will be forthcoming in a story devoted exclusively to night photography.

ANOTHER USE of tripods is in obtaining photographs that intentionally show motion.

It's common to "freeze" flowing water in a stream with a fast shutter speed, but what if that same stream was shot with a full two second exposure on a tripod? You'll get a totally different result with the water appearing as a soft blur and giving a feeling of movement and mood to the photograph.

Try it sometime. Of course, you will require a very small aperture setting and perhaps neutral density filters to accomplish this.

One other reminder. A cable release goes hand-in-hand with a tripod. Always use one every time you take a picture on your tripod.

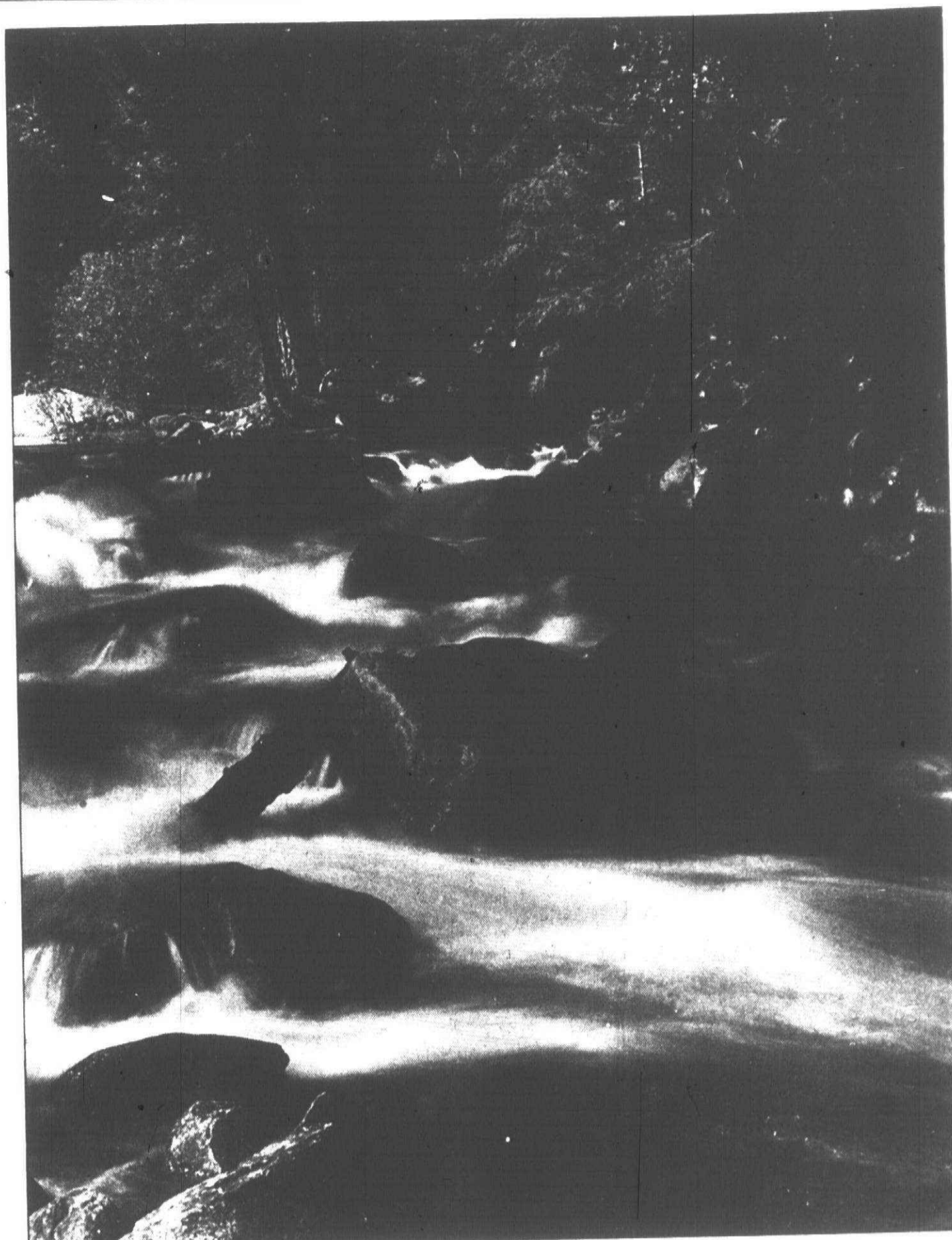
What if you're out shooting and a situation arises where you should use a tripod but you've left it home?

Try to improvise by tucking your elbows in and bracing yourself against a wall or tree. Or rest the camera on a fence or your car hood and use the self-timer.

Better still, keep your tripod handy at all times. Keep ready to get a steady.

Here are fishing tips for vacationers

For many vacationers, the opportunity to fish in a different location will be one of the reasons they travel.

For others, fishing may not be a major attraction, yet they would like to participate if they could.

Here are some tips which will enable you to take along some tackle and have time to fish when you arrive.

1. Write for information about the type of fishing

available. Don't fish for everything. Limit angling to one or two species.

2. Inquire about boat and motor rentals. A boat improves your chances of catching fish.

3. Be selective with tackle. Take only what is needed for the type of fishing you'll do. Plan on buying some local lures.

4. Pack tackle carefully. Protect rods with a stout case, or take along multi-piece travel rods.

5. Plan to allow time for fishing. Keep your schedule flexible to take advantage of local conditions.

6. Encourage your family to fish. If they don't fish, plan something for them while you do.

7. Talk to local anglers. Often, one will invite you to join him. At the least, you'll learn what lures to use and perhaps where to go for best action.

8. Consider a guide, especially if time is limited.

Treasurer's race: anything can happen

Wayne County's incumbent treasurer and the five challengers agree there is need for change.

Raymond Wojtowicz, the current county treasurer, faces his toughest challenge from a state legislator.

Wojtowicz won the office in a strange way. Aging Treasurer Louis Funk filed for re-election in 1976, and so did his chief deputy, Clark Finley. The effect of the incumbent's running was to scare off serious opponents.

After the filing deadline, however, Funk withdrew, checked into a hospital and within two weeks was dead.

FINLEY FIGURED to win in a walk. Wojtowicz fooled everyone by capturing the Democratic primary. Chief

Deputy Finley immediately retired and walked out of the office, leaving no one in charge.

Other county officials promptly appointed Wojtowicz treasurer.

Wojtowicz wants to streamline office operations by introducing word processing equipment. "That is a must for us to operate efficiently," he said.

Other goals Wojtowicz sees for treasurer include a "cooperative spirit among elected officials because of the future financial burden and a meaningful budget that indicates source of revenue, disbursement and capital outlay."

The former radiologist is a former mayor of Hamtramck and trustee of Wayne County Community College. He

is 51 and lives with his family in Hamtramck.

STATE SEN. George Hart is Wojtowicz's most visible opponent. His signs abound over local roads.

Hart served on the Dearborn City Council from 1958 to 1971 and later as a Wayne County commissioner. He was elected to the senate last year.

"I can serve better as an administrator by virtue of my familiarity with government," the 53-year-old Dearborn resident said.

CHARLES LASH, a comptroller for private industry, says he can provide some "new progressive blood" to the county. The 39-year-old Inkster resi-

dent worked up from clerical assistant to an accountant position in the county treasurer's office. "During those seven years, I gained a knowledge of the entire operation," said Lash.

Lash wants to reform the county tax sale process, which he calls "controversial. It results in people losing their property," he said. "The law related to it can be reformed."

Lash sees updating county computers to increase efficiency, long-range planning and forecasting for the county budget, and an increase of minority representatives in the treasury department.

Lash, 39, is active with his family and community organizations. Some are the Inkster Youth Athletic Associa-

tion, Northwest Detroit Jaycees and the Inkster Community Development Advisory Board, of which he is a former member.

GERALDINE SZYMANSKI, former Detroit teacher, has entered the treasurer's race for a "multitude" of reasons.

"I want to work for the community and with the people. I see a great need for women to participate in public work."

Mrs. Szymanski taught 10 years in the Detroit Public School System and during the last decade assisted the Stanford Research Institute and the Kettering and Mott Foundation in educational study.

Since 1954, she has raised a family

and been active in such educational and community organizations as the Friends of Polish Art, Girl Scouts and the Wayne State Alumni Chapter of Grosse Pointe, of which she was treasurer.

STANLEY F. ROZYCKI, now a publisher, held a Senate seat from 1954-74 for several districts. He "firmly believes" in a county charter commission to "revive responsible leadership."

"They need a lot of work up there and experience and know-how to straighten the county out," the 61-year-old former student of architecture said.

JoeDee A. Zajac of Belleville is also a candidate but could not be reached for comment.

Recovery — for many the way to mental health

ALL WOMEN who have lived in Plymouth or Plymouth Township for a year or less, are invited to attend an old English tea from 1-3 p.m. Monday. Members of the board of directors of the Plymouth Newcomers Club are hosting the tea in the Round Table Club, a private club in the Mayflower Hotel, Main Street at Ann Arbor Trail.

There was a time, 25 years ago (more and less) when a new family to

Mrs. Lamb Stranahan, who chaired last year's benefit, is assisting with the 1980 benefit. She said, "Lanin will again personally direct his 15-piece orchestra as it furnishes continuous dance music throughout the evening."

They gather in small groups, maybe once a week, maybe irregularly.

They come from varied professions and stations in life.

They talk about spotting problems, and moving muscles and endorsing and sabotaging and average reactions and trivial events.

What really concerns them is mental health — their own. And they seek to preserve it through a non-profit organization known as Recovery Inc.

"People do not do things to upset us — they do things THAT upset us," said Priscilla Murdock, Livonia mother of six who has been attending Recovery meetings for eight years and leading a group in Farmington for half of that time.

She said the groups discuss initial reactions to life's vexations and then how those among them have responded.

One who has been hospitalized for depression, Mrs. Murdock said she had found help through the discussions with "other ordinary people like myself" and the self-help methods outlined by the group's founder, the late Dr. Abraham A. Low, in his book "Mental Health through Will Training."

"I keep coming, Mrs. Murdock added, "because I feel mental health isn't something you can set aside. I need to work at it daily."

RECOVERY INC. had its beginnings in 1937 because Dr. Low was seeking a way to avoid relapse among those who had been treated for mental illness.

Since 1952 the group has been managed by its members. There is no charge for meetings, but a collection is taken to defray expenses and contributions are happily accepted.

"Doctors, psychologists, teachers and clergy cannot be group leaders or participate except as patients," said Mrs. Murdock. "And the group is non-sectarian, though supported by Protestant, Catholic and Jewish religions. Religion cannot be discussed at the meetings."

Anyone who is under the care of a doctor must have his approval to attend Recovery meetings, this leader said, but it's not necessary that those attending be under treatment. Although the book is available at local libraries, she emphasized that it is reading it and studying it in combination with interaction with others that forms the basis of the Recovery method.

"Our leaders are trained carefully so we all use the same method," she added.

Terminology too provides those in Recovery with a basis of understanding when discussing their problems. They mention "spotting" the problem that is bothering them, their "distressing but not dangerous" symptoms, keeping going in times of distress by "moving the muscles," and "endorsing" themselves when they react without "working it up."

They also seek to define as "trivial" the incidents they want to keep that way, and they describe as "average" that which has been experienced by one other person.

"It's average, not different," said Mrs. Murdock. "Some people might say normal. We say average."

PRISCILLA MURDOCK said her own experience with Recovery began after hospitalization for depression and later a setback.

A young son had died just three days after contracting meningitis, she said, and her symptoms surfaced after that.

"I felt helpless," she said. "I was sure I could not do a good enough job as a wife and mother. At the same time I was sure I was the only one who felt that way. I was crying all the time."

She said she also became obsessed with the matter of contamination. "I would try to keep my other children from germs by keeping them in the house," she remembers, "and then I got so I didn't want any of us to go anywhere."

In such situations, most people are aware of such symptoms but ignore them, said Mrs. Murdock. "Nervous patients wall themselves up," she added.

She said she was "uncomfortable enough" to pay some attention when a neighbor told her about Recovery meetings.

"I was afraid to go at first," she said. "Many feel that way. I thought I would see a lot of sick people. Then I found a lot of ordinary people like me."

Her own doctor, Mrs. Murdock said, didn't give any enthusiastic endorsement to the Recovery program. "He said he thought I could use my time better," she recalled. "But I decided he was not telling me NOT to go — I found a loophole."

RECOVERY MEETINGS provided no instant cure-all for this member.

"I was hospitalized two more times," she said, "and I developed some very distressing physical symptoms, including dizziness all the time."

That was when she put to work the methods she had learned.

"I moved my muscles," she recounted. "I told myself I knew how to do dishes and wash clothes, and I learned to do it in spite of the discomfort."

"And I endorsed myself — gave myself a pat on the back for each dish put away, each piece of clothing folded."

The problem lasted almost a year and for a while Mrs. Murdock wondered if she ever would function without feeling dizzy. At last it diminished and then went away.

"We learn that no matter how uncomfortable we feel, our muscles will pull us through," she said.

Mrs. Murdock said her work with Recovery now is mainly leading the once-a-week sessions at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, 12 Mile east of Farmington Road in Farmington Hills.

OCCASIONALLY, when feeling low for any reason, she may attend one of the four groups that function in Livonia for a session or so. Altogether Recovery Inc. has about 1,000 groups meeting in the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico, Ireland and the United Kingdom.

Those interested in the program may call the local Recovery Inc. office at 961-9085, to learn where a convenient group may be found.

"I get a great deal of satisfaction from helping myself and helping others," Mrs. Murdock said. "And that is what Recovery is all about."

Training into action

A perceived telephone snub, an everything-goes-wrong day at work, an unnecessary wait. All can rub raw the steadiest of nerves.

Three Recovery, Inc., patients who have had to learn the steady process explained during a recent meeting at Schoolcraft College how they handled such situations.

Experiences are shared and then discussed at Recovery meetings, said Priscilla Murdock, Farmington group leader.

ANNA FOUND herself getting hot and bothered over a telephone call.

"I had made the call," she related, "and my friend seemed to be enjoying talking to me. Then suddenly she ended the conversation very abruptly."

"I felt myself getting very upset. Then I decided to spot the trouble. I realized I was upset because I initiated the call and she ended it."

"Then I decided there might have been several reasons for her to end the conversation. I listed some of them in my mind."

"I thought I might tell my husband about it but decided it was trivial. I could handle it myself. I endorsed myself for that decision."

BILL'S DAY at work would have caused him real problems before Recovery, he told the session.

"I didn't have the stock built up," he said, "and then I started an angry temper against the person who had worked the job the day before. Then came a fearful temper that I wouldn't be able to catch up."

(Angry tempers, Recovery folks explain, blame others for circumstances; fearful tempers blame oneself.)

Bill said he stopped and looked at his situation as average, not different from the one faced by others. Then he noted his predecessor's failure as a triviality and proceeded to do what he could to improve the stock inventory.

"Before Recovery," he said, "I would have found some excuse to go home early, or if I had stayed, I would have been very irritable."

Teacher leaves music legacy

A friend quipped that Marion Stickels was "undoing more than 20 years of teaching piano in Livonia."

But the undoing is taking plenty of doing as this instructor of hundreds of budding musicians and organizer of scores of their teachers prepares to pull up stakes and head for Florida with her husband, George.

A garage sale of furniture and music, household goods and records, knickknacks and musical instruments will continue through Aug. 3, and then the Stickels will be ready to leave the home on Haller they have occupied since 1959 and head for the Penney Retirement Community 35 miles from Jacksonville, Fla.

Stickels has been retired since 1964. "I'm going to be semiretired; I'm not going to just quit," said this teacher of 50 years' experience. "I was a good teacher for just 35 of those years, though," she insists. "Up to then I was just learning."

BESIDES BEING a stickler for the basics well remembered by a lot of little fingers learning to play, Marion Stickels made her mark on music in Livonia by leading the organization of what is now a 67-member Livonia Piano Teachers Forum.

"We started right here in 1962," she said, looking around her basement filled with stacks of music and other items for sale.

"At first it was just a few of us getting together, playing together, picking each others' brains, enjoying each others' company."

"Then more teachers would hear about us and wanted to join. We never held formal meetings — we just threw out ideas."

"And it has been such a nice relationship and spirit of cooperation. That still exists though we have grown so much."

Seven years ago the Forum became a chapter of the Migan Music Teachers Association, and it has been sponsoring National Guild auditions for piano students in this area ever since.

THE COOPERATIVE spirit of the piano teachers became doubly apparent when the Stickels decided rather suddenly to make their move now.

Long active in Ward Presbyterian Church—Mrs. Stickels was organist there from 1959 to 1967—they qualified for residence in the community founded in 1925 by J.C. Penney for retired clergymen.

An apartment became available this summer and the house sold fast, Mrs. Stickels said, so her friends pitched in to help.

A piano and an organ have been sold, but Marion Stickels will take along her Steinway.

"That's my baby," she said.

She will need it, she figures, because she fully expects to have a few students in Penney Farms, her new home. "They've already asked me," she said. And she may be working with a long-time friend, already a resident of the retirement community and organist for its small church.

LOOKING BACK, Marion Stickels calls herself a "compulsive teacher — one who just has to impart knowledge."

She said she is proud to have had a part in the careers of many fine students who have gone on in music.

"But you know," she said, I think it's even more rewarding to hear about the ones who didn't do as well at first, may have quit, and then pick up their music later and write to tell me about it.

"To know what I have been able to give to them — well, that's a tremendous satisfaction."

Is it an ad you want?

The unhappy lady at the other end of the telephone made me decide to do a bit of public educating I've considered for a long time.

"I called your paper and said I wanted to put in an ad," she explained. "And then I brought in the information and when we were through, the woman I talked to told me how much it would cost."

"Our church can't afford that. We just want people to know about the program we're having. And I think you have put ads in for us before without charging us."

Of course we had reported on coming events before, and we would do so again, I assured my caller. Terminology was her problem. It's the problem of many who deal with a community newspaper, only usually the discrepancy gets caught before anyone is handed a bill.

SO MAYBE it's time to put into print the different functions of a community newspaper, how it operates with what staff and how it can best serve the readers.

This paper, like others throughout the business, has advertising and editorial departments. We print advertisements, and we print news stories.

The business of the advertising department is to provide space for those who wish to buy it to promote goods or services they are offering the public. The business of the editorial department is to tell the community's news, from the happenings that make the front page to the small notices of club meetings.

The two departments work together, of course. The sale of advertising space helps pay the employees so the news may be told. But the contents of the advertising portion of the paper never affects the contents of the editorial portion.

Advertising space is sold by the newspaper to those in the community. Editorial space never is sold.

SO WHAT DOES this mean to my church program promoter on the telephone? First, that people at this newspaper's office will understand her better if she asks about submitting a news story instead of an ad, if that's what she wants.

And second, it means she should understand her options whenever she wants to spread the word of her church's doings.

Her church might want to buy advertising space for a special meeting. Many churches, along with businesses and individuals, do it often and regularly. They decide the amount of space she want, pay the going rate and approve exactly what is to be said in that space.

Coming events also are reported in the editorial sections of the paper, because they are of interest to its readers. Editorial staffers write such notices and decide their length and content. Our aim is to serve the groups that submit the notices and the people who may be interested in them, because all are part of our reading public.

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



They were also on hand to join the church when it gathered recently to sing a mass and then to celebrate its 20th anniversary and "family reunion." On that occasion the choir members rose in number to 55 because the reunion attracted former members both from the area and out of town.

Bill Brink came down from Cheboygan to sing, and Rosemary and Tony Lawrence came north from Westfield, Ohio. "The Blessing of Aaron" and "Hail Mary, Gentle Woman" were

two of the songs that brought the 55 voices together.

"I do it because I enjoy it," said Bill Scruggs, who sings tenor. "It is part of my contribution to the church. We're a good group, in a good church with a good director."

He was willing to list what he believed crucial ingredients in keeping a choir together.

"We are doing it for a purpose, for the glory of God ultimately," he said. "We have developed into a fine musical group. We enjoy the challenge of the music. In the choir are pleasant, lovely people who have become close friends, who are singing for the same reasons."

Jeanette Sydowski directs the choir with the assistance of Joe Stevens. She is also organist. "Once you get involved, it becomes so much a part of your daily life that you can't imagine not doing it," she said.

"Our closest and fastest friends are members of the choir. But you also have to have a bit of dedication. Then, too, there are the times that you thrill to the results."

The choir has performed at two Madonna College graduations and at a variety of functions, including ordination ceremonies. It has also made a record, with Dr. Jerry Smith as guest conductor. The record is expected to be available in September.

Lutherans, Catholics move to unity

Two area clergymen have been active in the local commemoration of the 450th anniversary of the Augsburg Confession.

The Rev. David Paap, pastor of All Saints Lutheran Church in Livonia, and the Rev. Alex Brunett, pastor of St. Aidan Catholic Church, also in Livonia, helped prepare a tabloid publication discussing the confession. It was produced recently by the Michigan Catholic newspaper.

Interest in the issue has caused the publication to go into a second printing.

They have also participated in years of discussions on the subject. The Augsburg Confession took place in 1530 when Christian reformers who called themselves Lutherans initiated a unity move toward the Catholics. In their statement, they asked the parties in the dispute between the two religious groups to "put aside whatever may not

have been rightly interpreted or treated by either side, to have all embrace and adhere to a single, true religion, and to live together in unity in one fellowship and church, even as we are all enlisted under one Christ."

THE RESPONSE to the Confession among the majority of Roman Catholics was negative, according to the recent publication. The division between the two groups became hardened.

"Four hundred and fifty years later we have a heightened concern to heal the breach of the 16th century," said a statement signed by Catholic and Lutheran church officials. "A nationwide network of Roman Catholic and Lutheran ecumenical leaders has been established to encourage local initiatives, planning and resources in establishing intensive study and interaction between Lutheran and Roman Catholics."

Signing for Catholics were Cardinal John Dearden, archbishop of Detroit; Bishop Walter Schoenherr, Bishop Thomas Gumbleton and Bishop Arthur Krawczak, all auxiliary bishops of Detroit. Representing Lutherans were the Rev. Howard Christensen, president of the Michigan Synod of the Lutheran Church in America; the Rev. Harold Hecht, president of the English Synod of the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, and the Rev. Reginald Holle, bishop of the Michigan District of the American Lutheran Church.

In his article in the Confession publication, Paap mentioned that for 15 years official dialogues between Lutherans and Roman Catholics have been carried on by competent specialists in church history and doctrine. He quoted Paul Empie, Lutheran chairperson of the dialogues, who died last September. Paap said that Empie expressed the hope that these official talks would "clear out some theological underbrush and find out the extent to which obsta-

cles to understanding and fellowship between our respective traditions no longer existed."

He added that for the ecumenical move to succeed, its philosophy must be felt on the local level until the agreements "touch my heart, my life, my congregation."

IN WHAT HE titled "A Statement of Hope," Fr. Brunett, who is chairman of the Lutheran-Catholic Ecumenical Committee, emphasized his aspirations.

"We hope this observance of the Augsburg Confession will mark not an end but a beginning of a new relationship among our churches," he wrote. "We have discovered each other as friends in the Lord; may we continue to grow into that fullness of unity for which Christ prayed."

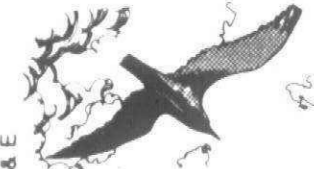

Our morality slips are showing

It is almost as American to carry a banner for morality as it is to carry a flag in the Fourth of July parade.

Upright citizens can be found toting picket signs in front of adult book stores to protect the morality of their neighborhoods while others insist on their moral right to publish.

Folks on both sides of the capital punishment controversy claim morality as the bases for their bias. Moral conviction leads some to call for war while it is the reason behind others becoming conscientious objectors.

Even when the boundaries of morality are defined, the ranks begin to split. That which is considered to be a moral issue by one group is said to have nothing to do with morality by another. Those who proclaim the right to a quality of life in one area unthinkingly trample on life in another area.

IT IS IN this context that religious groups are told to battle pornography and to whip teenagers into shape on the one hand but are told to stay out of political and social issues on the other hand.

Thus X-rated movie houses are seen as a threat to life as we would like it to be, while the prolifera-

tion of nuclear weapons is seen as a case of military strategy rather than moral concern.

By the same token, adolescent discipline is seen as having everything to do with morality while the maldistribution of food and other necessities which would allow starving children to become adolescents is passed off as being just the way it is.

Perhaps the greatest challenge to a people who proclaim themselves to be concerned with morality is that of consistency. Once we begin to pick our issues by insisting upon change in one area of life as a moral imperative while remaining apathetic to the diminishment of life in another area, the message of our efforts is weakened.

A stand against abortion coupled with a laize faire attitude concerning justice for those who pick grapes and lettuce does not ring any more true than an insistence upon prison reform coupled with an apathy toward the plight of needy senior citizens when we enter a voting booth.

FEW OF US have the time or the energy to become actively involved in every cause that comes along. However, that does not give us the luxury of wearing blinders when confronted with

the moral implications of those issues we find uninteresting or inconvenient. And sooner or later a consistent sense of morality becomes inconvenient.

When I become thoroughly involved in those issues which affect me personally, but refuse to recognize the moral implications of those issues which appear threatening or inconvenient, I might well begin to question whether I am acting out of moral conviction or personal need be it psychological or physical.

It may, for example, be inconvenient for me to change my buying habits in order to call attention to the unjust working conditions of workers who produce certain products, but such inconvenience does not erase the moral nature of the situation.

Morality does not have as much to do with chosen issues as it does with quality of life for an entire society. To be adamant about one issue and at the same time apathetic about another is to say in effect that the rights of some matter, while the right of others do not.

While blatant immorality of a few may be repulsive to our sensitivities, such behavior is not nearly as threatening to the moral fiber of a nation as is the amorality of the many.

When the child becomes the parent

The night was laced with loneliness and worry. Quietly, I crawled into bed beside my mother. Security and comfort were definitely needed.

Only I was no longer a child - I was a 40-year-old woman. It was my mother who required the security of loving arms and thoughts that long night.

I held Mamma and stroked her silky-soft gray hair until she was overwhelmed by sleep.

During Daddy's last illness, there were many times I needed to "mother" my own mother. I became sensitive to the delicate balance between parent and child which so often disrupts life's later years.

Suddenly, the child who was afraid to be alone and was rescued by a seemingly brave parent is confronted by that same parent. Only now it's the brave parent who is afraid to be alone.

IT WAS BECAUSE of weathering previous crises that I could be aware of

my mother's need that night. One incident in particular served as a haunting reminder of her fears.

We were standing together in an empty hospital elevator after visiting hours when Mamma whispered ever so quietly, "If anything happens to your father, what will I do? He was the only one who ever loved me."

Was I insulted? Did I protest and say, "But I love you!"

No. As a mother, I know we accept the love from the product of our flesh and blood almost the same as self-love. The love of one's mate or a friend is different. They have loved us without biological reason, only for ourselves.

My mother was an orphan at the age of 7. She met my father, a sophisticated concert organist two years her senior, when she was 14. Twelve years later, they were married and loved happily ever after.

Another night when Daddy was on the critical list, I watched Mamma as she slept on a couch at the hospital. How very vulnerable she seemed.

After a lifetime of mutual loving and care, nothing could fill the void. But I could provide a cushion to ease the fall.

RECENTLY, I watched a middle-aged Sassoon-bottomed daughter shopping with her elderly mother in a

supermarket. The diminutive older woman leaned on the shopping cart for support, indicative of the relationship.

"Now think, Mother," demanded Ms. Sassoon-bottom. "No. Put that back. You don't need that." She directed every move her mother made.

The mother glanced at me and shivered with shame. "I know how to shop," the mother protested.

What Ms. Sassoon-bottom didn't realize was that just because her mother's limbs shook it doesn't mean her mother's mind must jiggle like Jell-O. Older people may forget, but they can always remember.

An older person's identity is a most precious possession, and nothing should cause its loss.

My mother will always be my mother, and if she should ever mention that long night I held her in my arms, I would only answer: "I really needed you that night, Mamma. Are you sure I was holding you?"

Mixing mystery and mundane gives short stories added twist

A local radio script writer has added touch of mystery to mundane subjects, producing stories that are pure pleasure to read.

A baseball player is an angel. A cowboy looks for the face of God and finds his own.

A collection of 15 short stories by Birmingham resident and former Marine Corps Infantryman Charles Westcott are precious fragments of Americana, and the reader wishes they could come true.

"Dr. Pearlander's Marching Band and Other Stories" are now published in paperback by Mike Whorf, Inc. of Birmingham (\$4.95) and can be ordered from MWI, c Station WJR, 2100 Fisher Building, Detroit 48202.

The title story in this collection has inspired the author to write about the mythical town of Yucca Flats, the kids in the high school band, and "how we look back on the good old days," Westcott said last week. These will be published in a volume of their own.

Westcott has been writing five years for WJR's Mike Whorf Kaleidoscope program. This, his first published work, is a group of stories that run the gamut from comedy and the "absurdities of high school days" to mystery and horror. They are about people you will recognize — ball players, a concert violinist, a private detective, soldiers sailors, Westcott said in describing his work.

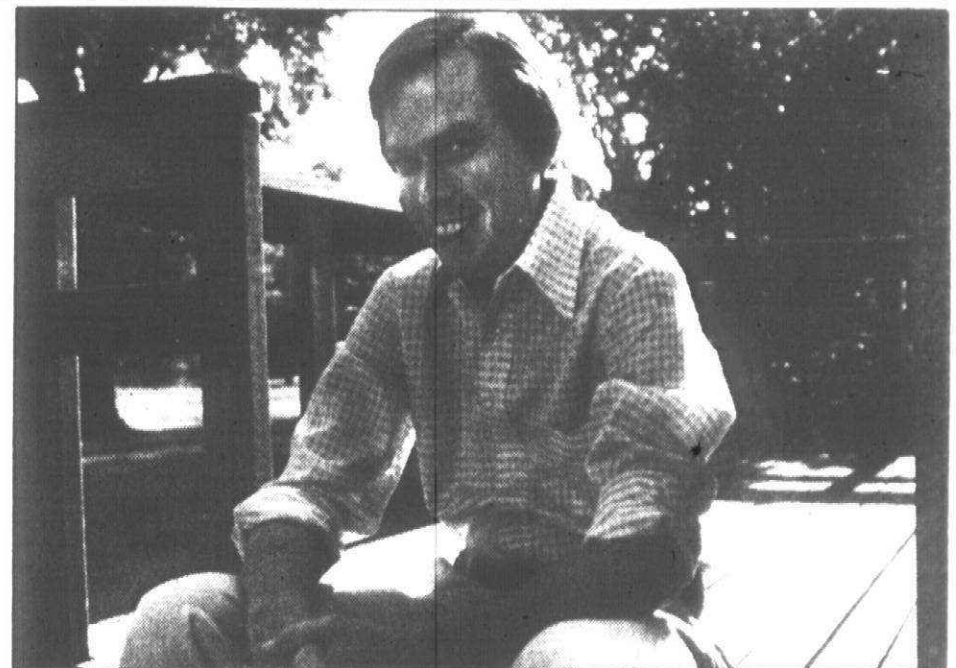
A 1968 GRADUATE of the United States Naval Academy, Westcott chose literature as a major "to get away from math and science that was required curriculum," he said.

"We had to write every day for five to 15 minutes on something like what is the deep, dark, secret meaning of a Tolstoy or Homer passage, and I hated it," he reminisced.

"I never thought of writing as a vo-

ca- tion. Mother was always trying to get us to read. I can remember her at our bedside, reading the classics to us when I was a kid," he continued.

Mike Whorf was looking for someone to help him on Kaleidoscope. I auditioned with five scripts and he liked them, so I came here from Washington, D.C."

At WJR, Westcott started writing historical stories that were traditional on the program. Then he began writing his own fiction. Whorf thought they added a new dimension to his program. For the last three years — 150 scripts later — Westcott has been almost exclusively devoting his writing to fictional narrative for Kaleidoscope.

After getting a few rejection slips from magazines, a good friend, Sandy Yolles, who is promotion manager at Wayne State University Press, read a few of Westcott's stories and encouraged him to do something with them.

Her friend, Alice Nigoghosian of Troy, was already producing books and

working on the history of Mt. Clemens. Ms. Nigoghosian agreed to become the editorial and production consultant for Westcott's first venture into the publishing world.

LIKE THE AUTHOR, Westcott's father, Col. Charles Westcott, was a career Marine Corps officer, and is now retired. The family, following Marine service assignments, lived in many small towns, "usually near a Marine base" in Ohio, Florida, Virginia, Massachusetts, Texas and California.

The writer said he has remained in Michigan longer than in any other place.

"Going to school in those places, I met all kinds of kids from all kinds of backgrounds. I hated moving all the time when I was a kid," Westcott said. "But looking back on it, my stories are about people I met and knew when I was growing up."

In 1969, young Westcott was in Vietnam. He does not intend to write war stories, he said. After reading "Fields

of Fire" by Jim Webb, with whom he went to school, he said, "there is nothing more to say."

There is a story in this first collection of Westcott's work about pain and paralysis. "Take Me to Green Valley" is about a young man in war who steps on a booby trap.

Pain is a subject the writer knows well. While in the Marine Corps, he developed arthritis — the crippling kind.

"That is a no-no in the infantry. They retired me and said I had better learn to do something sitting down," he said smiling.

Young Westcott was active in college baseball and boxing in 1966, when the disease was originally diagnosed. Ten years later, at age 28, he was retired from the Marine Corps.

Westcott had a total hip reconstruction in 1975-76, with plastic sockets and metal knobs. In time, these will wear out and he may face the pain of surgery again. Now he is completely functional, walks with a cane and plans to marry this fall.

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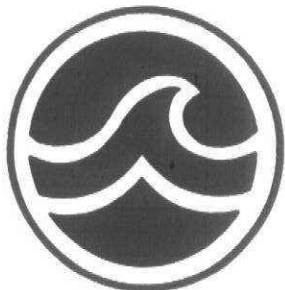

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Channel 62's "Movies All Night" series fills a void that's wider than the rift between Olivia de Havilland and Joan Fontaine. When you can't sleep at night, you'd rather count Zsa Zsa Gabor's husbands than stare at the ceiling. But you don't have to stare at the ceiling, because 62 offers movies all night long.

The movies offered are a fascinating mix of classics — many perhaps never before seen on TV — and the worst films imaginable. When you tune in 62, you can expect anything from a ripe Hedy Lamarr appearing in "Ecstasy" to an over-ripe Zsa Zsa in "Queen of Outer Space."

What's great about "Movies All Night," though, is that every film is treated equally. No favorites are played. So the series serves both as an insomniac's delight and a film buff's Valhalla. Either you don't care what's playing, and the movies keep you company on those long, lonely nights, or you're a film fanatic and the films worth seeing are received as heroes.

All you can expect for sure are movies all night long. Cases in point: a rather random look at what's coming up on 62 a few days from now.

"The Ape Man" (1943), Monday's movie I. Running time 64 minutes.

Bela Lugosi frightened children and chilled adults with "Dracula" in 1930, but by '43 the Hungarian import was a mere ghost of his former self. His films took on such titles as "Spooks Run Wild" and "Zombies on Broadway," both self-parodies. Lugosi died a drug addict in 1956, and he was buried in full Dracula regalia.

"Our Daily Bread" (1934), Monday's movie II. Running time 74 minutes.

King Vidor was one of the first major directors — he made his first film in 1918 and was active well into the '50s — but his earlier works amount to historicisms. "The Big Parade" (1925) was the first significant World War I film, and "The Crowd" (1928) pointed toward the inadequacies of big, impersonal business. "Daily Bread" takes that premise a step farther, seemingly suggesting a socialist society as a means of survival during the troubled '30s. While the film's hardly revolutionary in outlook, it is interesting for its Depression era approach.

"Sherlock Holmes and the Secret Weapon" (1942), Monday's movie III.

second runs Tom Panzenhagen

Running time 68 minutes.

Ah, the war years. Even Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson were transformed into freedom fighters. In '42 and '43, Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce fought the Nazis in "Secret Weapon," "Sherlock Holmes and the Voice of Terror" and "Sherlock Holmes in Washington." Oddly enough, the movies aren't bad, because Rathbone and Bruce are absolutely brilliant in

their portrayals of the gifted detective and his tubby sidekick.

"Those Darn Kids" (1930), Tuesday's movie II. Running time ??

In another game during the 19-point finals match between Wayne Drogseth of Las Vegas and Russell Sands of Los Angeles, this interesting position arrived as Sands (white) had but three checkers to bear in before beginning the bear off (the process by which checkers are removed from the board — end game).

Drogseth, black, already possessing ownership of the doubling cube, has one checker on the bar and trails in the 19-point match by a score of 15-3.

White, on roll, has a 6/1 to play. How would you play this move?

A possible gammon exists. If white succeeds, he will win the game and match. With black on the bar, white need only worry about a return fly shot (a hopper off the bar and into the field).

Double fours (4/4) seems to be the only number that would accomplish getting off the bar and hitting white. The odds of 4/4 happening is 1 out of

36. More importantly, however, is moving the checkers in carefully and safely, avoiding a 6/6 roll next time, which white would then be forced to leave a shot.

Sands played the checker in from the eight point all the way to the one point, careful to avoid 4/4.

But if Black then rolled 4/4 (which he did not) he would have been able to move two checkers in white's outer board on the eight-point. White would, no doubt, have left a shot anyway.

You certainly cannot protect against everything all the time, but you should play the odds. I would have run the checker from black's 12-point to white's six-point. In the event my opponent gets off the bar, I would (after the next roll) leave him only one indirect shot, plus, 6/6 plays very good and if my opponent stays on the bar one more roll, nothing can interfere with moving home safely.

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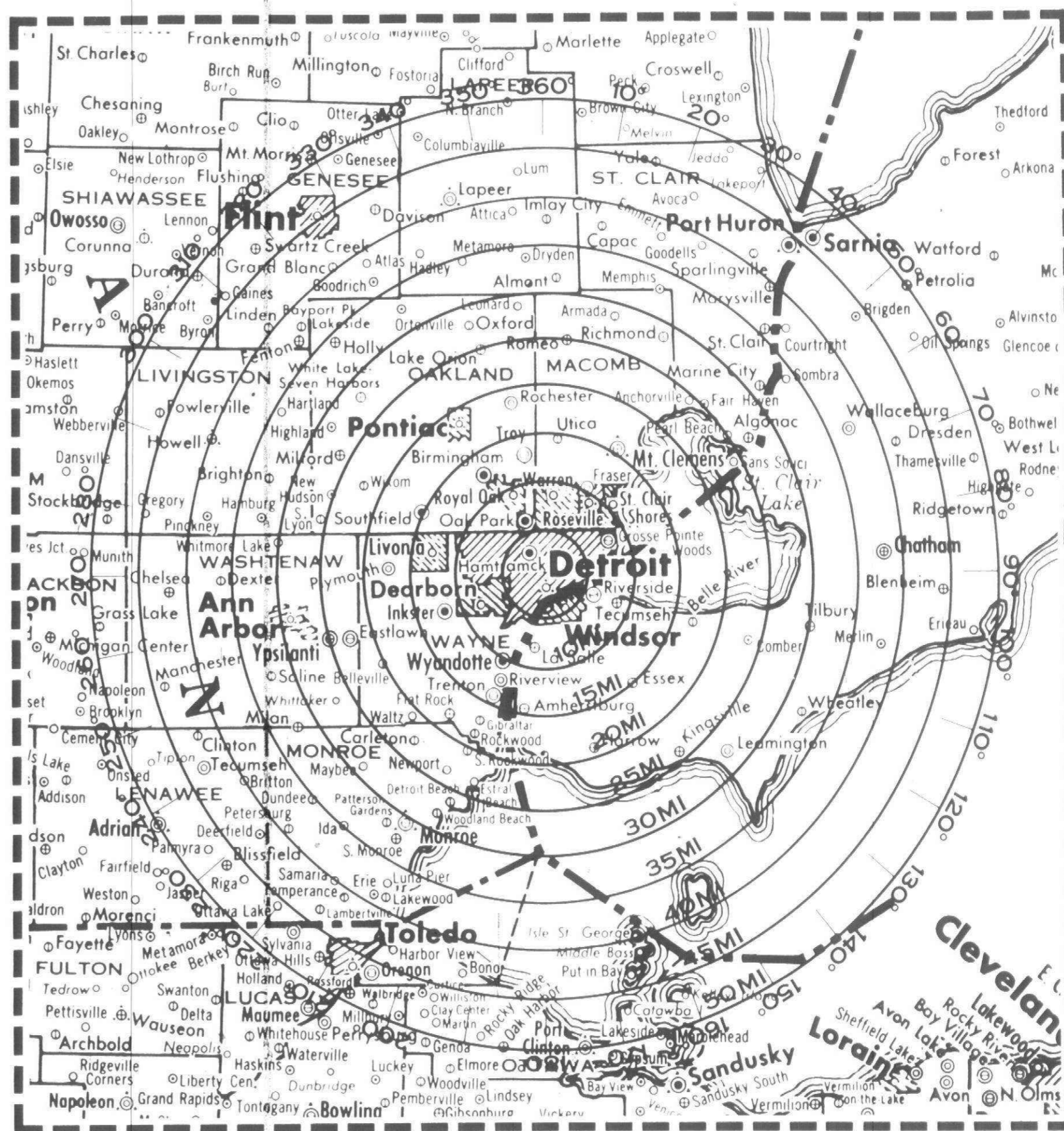

Check oil burners now

Is it necessary to have my oil burning equipment serviced annually?

J.M.

Home heating systems should be serviced annually and this is the time of year to do it.

Many people don't call for service until the heating equipment fails. Unless this occurs during normal working hours, the homeowner will usually have to pay for the service at higher hourly rates.

By having annual maintenance during the summer months, unexpected equipment failures are less likely to occur.

Also, burner performance can deteriorate over a period of time. Nozzles and oil filters should be replaced annually to assure proper burner performance.

Can I make pickles for freezing?

Debbie C.

Yes. The following recipe for freezer pickles comes from the Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service.

FREEZER PICKLES

- 25 medium, unpeeled cucumbers
- 10 medium onions
- 5 cups sugar
- 3 cups vinegar
- 1 tablespoon salt

Slice cucumbers and onions very thin. Add cold water to cover. Let stand 12 to 18 hours in a cool place. Heat sugar and vinegar to boiling, then cool. Drain cucumbers and onions very well and pack into freezer containers (preferably glass jars). Pour cooled sugar-vinegar solution over pickles, leaving one inch headspace. Freeze immediately.

ECO-TIP: Plastic containers with lids, and glass jars with screw tops can be used over and over again to store left-overs in the refrigerator or freezer.

Did you ever experience this situation? There are two drinking glasses. Both hold the same amount of liquid, but one of them is short and fat, the other tall and skinny.

You pour the same amount of liquid into each glass, then offer the short fat glass to your child. The child refuses to take it. Instead, he wants the tall skinny glass, insisting it holds more.

Even after attempting to demonstrate that the glasses hold the same amount of liquid, the child refuses to change opinions, still believing that the tall and skinny glass contains more.

This is not stubbornness. This is a childhood phenomenon being perception bound. When confronted with a problem where perceptions seem to in-

dicating one fact, while other cognitive processes tell another piece of information, the young child will make decisions based on his perceptions.

SO, WHILE the quantity of liquid was the same, the child's perception was that the shape of the container changed the amount of liquid. When a child has matured and is able to hold one fact constant in the face of changes

in other facts, he is said to be conserving.

Another kind of conservation is that practiced by many of us in daily living. Trying to keep our natural resources in tact in the face of changes in our society is another conservation task.

Recycling centers are fun for a child to visit. Some centers, like the one in Birmingham, collect only newspapers. Others, like the Southfield recycling

center, collect bottles, cans and newspapers.

The job of sorting the bottles and cans, and bagging the papers, can be entertainment for a child. The centers usually have large trucks for the deposit of these items. Standing next to the enormous quantity of glass and paper that would normally be thrown away is quite an experience.

IF YOU have several weeks worth of newspapers stacked up, take them to a local recycling center. Let your child help you unload the papers.

World traveler grabs 'slam'

Harris earns \$300

Experience conquered youth Sunday in the men's singles final of the Grand Slam Tennis Tournament at Livonia Family Y.

Ian Harris, 27, who has played tennis all over the world, downed lefty Mark Pinchoff, 6-3, 6-4, to claim the first place prize of \$300.

Pinchoff, who starred during his prep days at West Bloomfield High School, said, "I was hitting the ball all right, but didn't execute well enough to win."

"Key points were the difference," said the 19-year-old native of Bloomfield Hills. "He played them better than I did."

Harris, a teaching pro at Franklin Racquet Club this summer, used an oversized racquet effectively with his aggressive serve-and-volley style.

"This is our third meeting and I've won all three," said Harris, "and they've all been close."

"The conditions were slow here. I just wanted to get the ball back in play. That left-hand serve is tough. Mark's a helluva player and in a few years he'll be beating me."

Pinchoff, who played No. 5 singles this spring for Trinity University (Texas), could not accept the \$200 runnerup prize money because he is still an amateur.

"I thought I could have served and volleyed a little better," he said. "I rushed things a little bit."

HARRIS THRILLED the surprising turnout at Grand Slam with his pinpoint volleys and rocket serve.

He's played the past four months overseas, competing in the French Open and Wimbledon (England) qualifier: Harris spent three weeks playing in Nigeria.

Among his victims abroad this spring included top professional Ashok Aramtraj of India and NCAA finalist Bill Maze, the No. 140th ranked player in the world.

"I'm fortunate enough to get the free time off," said Harris, the tournament's No. 1 seed. "I came over here to Franklin two years ago from Kalamazoo with John Trump (head pro)."

"He's given me time to play and travel. I really appreciate that."

Harris will travel to Indianapolis this weekend to try and qualify for the U.S. Open Clay Court Championships. He will then head to Brazil for three weeks on another tour.

The Union Lake resident is sponsored by International Sports tennis promoter Tom Seavey. Harris' trip to South American will mean he'll miss trying to qualify for the U.S. Open in late August at Flushing Meadows, N.Y.

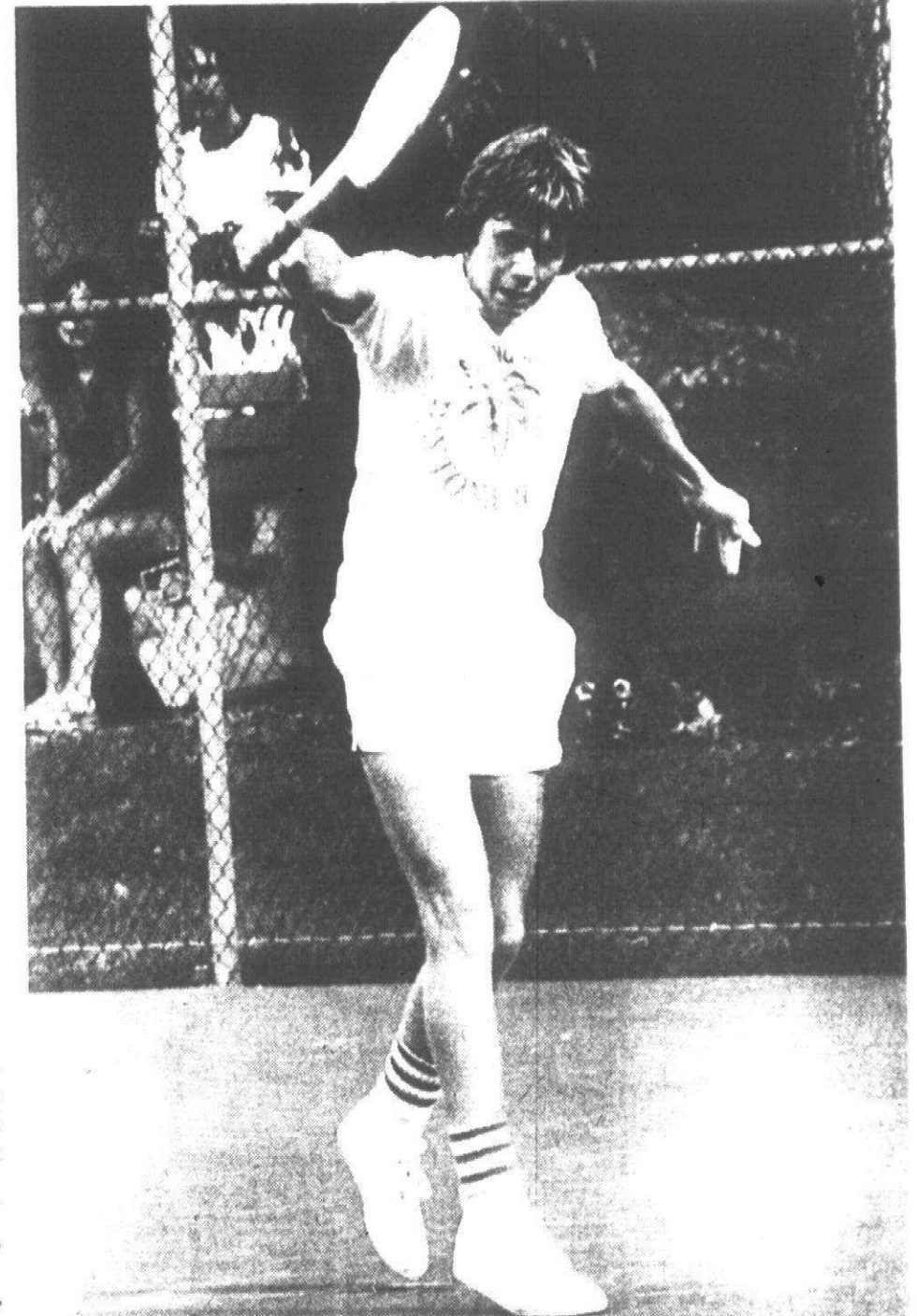
"I'm trying to improve my ranking," Harris said. "I'll miss the U.S. Open, but hopefully I'll play there next year."

Harris reached the finals with a 6-3, 6-4 triumph over West Bloomfield 16-year-old Ed Nagel. Pinchoff, meanwhile, struggled in his quarterfinal and semifinal matches.

At the finish line, an electronic digital clock, rented from a local sporting goods store, provided times.

"It kept people from running up to our timers to see how they did," Bush said. "After the race, I asked for a show of hands from the people who liked the clock. There were a lot of hands up."

THERE WERE 12 competitive classifications, six each for men and women. Age groups were: 13 and under, 14-18, 19-29, 30-39, 40-50 and 50 and over.

Wooden plaques were awarded to the winner of each age group. The first 200 runners to pre-register received T-shirts, and every entrant was given a commemorative patch.

"We gave away a lot of prizes," Bush said. "Every kid under 16 got two tickets to a Detroit Express soccer game. And we had a pair of Fatigue Fighter jogging socks for the oldest person to enter."

Bill Wright, a 60-year-old Farmington Hills resident, received the oldest-runner prize.

Redford Township's Andy Dillon, 18, a former track and cross country standout at Detroit Catholic High School, was the first man across the line in the five-mile race with a time of 26:55.

The top female five-miler was 20-year-old Anna James of Detroit. She crossed the line in 36:20.

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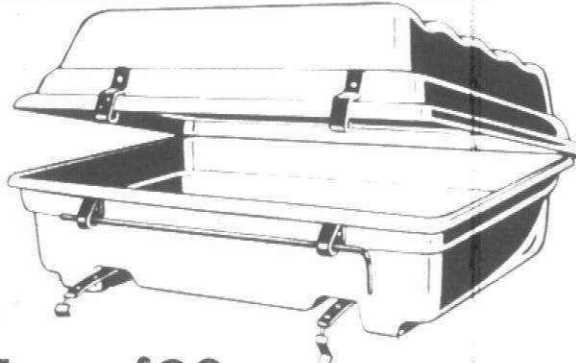
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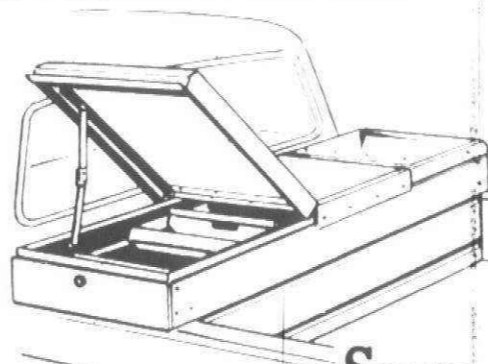
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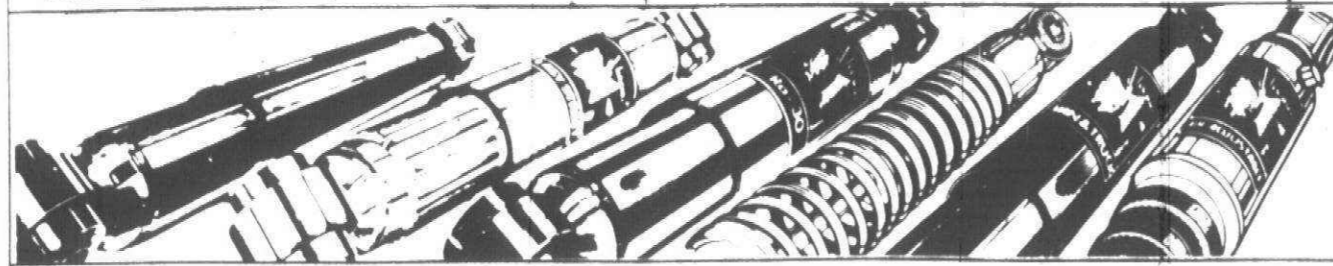
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Late season wins lift Redford Adray hopes
