Edgar said his office would make the handicapped decals available on a statewide basis. Some local governments do not provide specific identification for handicapped drivers, and some municipalities do not recognize the cards of other municipalities.

Legislation creating handicap-ped license plates went into effect in 1975. Currently there are about 10,200 registered vehicles with handicapped plates and 2,800 with disabled veteran plates.

Subsequently, Todd met Sherman Lollar and Jim Rivera the catcher and right fielder on the same team. This west side boy became a dyed-in-the-wool Sox fan. Twenty-four years later he was suffering from those morning-after White Sox blues, brought on by Saturday's loss to Baltimore.

Down at Niles village hall Frank Wagner and Nick Blase have been two inveterate Sox fans who lived through the dog days of defeat in anticipation of a championship day. Their morning-after blues had to be is great as those manifested bý the s**uff**ering Bavaro.

Like Blase, I'm a south sider who never knew any better. In our younger days, splitting a doubleheader with the Yankees was a glorious afternoon. It was often the highlight of an entire baseball

Like many of depression's youngsters, baseball played a large role in our younger days. By the age of 7, I had already been a Yankee fan and a Cub fan. I remember coming out of the Southtown theatre on 63rd street on an October afternoon swearing I'd never root for the Cubs again if they lost their fourth straight game to the Yankees in '32. Across the street from the movie house, a scoreboard showed Babe Ruth Cubs for the fourth time sweeping the 1932 World Series. The Cubs lost four straight big ones. And they lost a believer who couldn't believe the score he was reading.

The next year my Dad. reported he had met one James Dykes, who had just come over from the Philadelphia Athletics, and was managing the White Sox. It wasn't long before my Dad had me down in the Sox dugout meeting Dykes and "Mule" Haas. I made the switch across town with nary a wink or a whine.

many Sundays at Comiskey Park, coming at 10 a.m. after a ride on 3 street cars. With 6 brown-bagged sandwiches already squashed together by too much tossing back and forth on the street car, I'd drink in the morning batting thusiastically than I would the game. The joy of a true baseballophile was to sit and watch Ted Williams pound ball after ball out of the park during those pre-game drills. Watching Lou Gehrig and Hank Greenberg and Jimmy Foxx (I had a bias for first basemen) hit the ball atop the park roof was awesome.


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
