
What seems incredible is after the Greylord scandals the politicians are still selecting their cronies to serve as judges in our local courts.

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

# John Callaway to speak at **Elmhurst**

John Callaway, senior correspondent for WTTW, Channel 11. and host of "Chicago Tonight" a news-issue oriented talk show, will speak at Elmhurst College Thursday, April 10, at 8 p.m. in Hammerschmidt Chapel. The lecture, which is free and open to the public, has been made possible by a grant from Inland Real Estate Corporation, headquartered in Oak Brook.

Callaway will give his perspective on Chicago, U.S. and global business trends in a speech on "How to Succeed in Business by Really Trying." He plans to comment on observations from his recent trip to Japan, on the limits of national industrial policy, on business growth in Chicago despite political con-troversy, issues of the 1988 and 1992 presidential elections, and his thoughts on a new federalism.

In 28 years as a journalist, John Callaway has won the coveted Peabody Award, three Chicago Emmys in the past five seasons, and over 30 major national and local awards. While continuing his work at WTTW, he has undertaken the directorship of the new William Benton Fellowship Program in broadcast journalism at the University of Chicago.

# **Managing arthritis** through all kinds of weather

Folk wisdom to the contrary, vinter does not increase the pain arthritis, according to Dr. Scott Kale, rheumatologist and ordirector of Bethesda Hospital's Arthritis and Back Pain Center, 2451 W. Howard in Chicago.

Changes in barometric ressure, not in temperature, inensify pain and discomfort, Kale explained. He added, "there are two exceptions: "Raynaud's Phenomenon, a painful blood vessel spasm condition of the hands and feet and sometimes of the nose and ears, definitely becomes worse in cold weather; and getting around in winter often is more difficult for someone with arthritis because clothes are bulkier and heavier, and sidewalks may be slippery, increasing the possibility of falls which may lead to serious injurya by-product, not a feature, of ar-. thritis

During the Spring, wide and requent shifts in barometric pressure increase aches and pains. Kale pointed out that the higher the barometric pressure, the greater the force of gravity a person experiences. The more gravity, the greater the pressureand the worse the pain.

A simple experiment illustrates this. Stand with both hands pressed as hard as possible against the frame of an open door, one hand against each side. Keep up the pressure for about a minute. When the pressure is released, hands and arms feel light, almost buoyant.

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Arthritis flares up in cold the underlying cause of the pain may be quite different than arthritis, and easily remedied.

For those with arthritis, Kale suggested an arthritis management program such as the one at Bethesda's Arthritis and Back Pain Center. The program consists of structuring a personalized therapy with which the patient and family can live. A major goal of the therapy is to improve overall body conditioning. This often involves exercise and using physical devices such as canes or splints. Patients may be assigned to physical therapy. They may be asked to make some lifestyle changes, to switch the types of shoes they wear or to lose weight. When necessary, the physician prescribes medications.

The arthritis patient has a team of health care professionals working closely in all aspects of treatment. Radiologists, orthopedic surgeons, neurologist, podiatrists, nurse practitioners, physical, occupational and speech therapists, social workers, dieticians, laboratory personnel, pharmacists, visiting nurses and other diagnose, formulate and deliver therapy as no individual doctor can.

The warmth and concern of the managing physician, however, should not be underestimated. Kale's relationship with his patients is an example.




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# Pullen sponsors key school reform proposal

House Minority Whip Penny Pullen (R-Park Ridge) has introduced a legislative proposal that changes the harmful impact Senate when Senate Democrats of the new school consolidation

Introducing House Amendment 16 to Senate Bill 242 on Feb. 10, Rep. Pullen said this proposal would waive the law's requirement of forcing every elementary school district to send their eighth grade graduates to a single high school district. She has also introduced a fresh bill making the same proposal, H.B.

This amendment, she added, would help Pennoyer Grade School District 79, which currently sends its junior high school graduates to Maine Township High School District 207 and Ridgewood Community High School District 234. But the new law mandates that Pennoyer end that relationship and choose either Maine or Ridgewood.

"The new state consolidation law poses a harmful and severe burden on Pennoyer, which enjoyed a harmonious relationship with both Maine Township and Ridgewood. Both high school districts offer outstanding education to Pennoyer eighth grade graduates. I see no reason why an arbitrary state law should destroy this rapport," Rep. Pullen said.

The House passed several sidered in March.

legislative proposals, including Rep. Pullen's S.B. 242 amendment, but deadlocked with the sought to impose Adlai Stevenson's consolidation proposal onto the reform legislation. The state lawmaker said she expected the House to resume deliberations on March 4, when the General Assembly reconvenes to consider the state budget.

Rep. Pullen also supported another S.B. 242 amendment, which would have postponed the June 30 deadline set for school consolidation plans. This measure would have allowed elementary and high school districts to complete their consolidation plans by Sept. 30.

"This amendment would have also helped the Pennover situation, giving them and their corresponding high school districts more time to develop a rational and reasonable consolidation plan for these schools. The June 30 deadline places a gun to the administrations' and school boards' heads, forcing them to prepare a hasty and illadvised plan. I hope we can undo the entire consolidation proposal, the deadline change buys us time to do that," Rep. Pullen said.

**Continued from Page 1** Berman, submitted his decision on March 7, resolving the salary question and other issues that came up during negotiations.

Teachers will receive 5.6 percent increase this year, 6.25 percent the second year and 5.4 percent the third year. The board had offered a 19 percent increase over three years which would bring the average teacher's salary to \$48,700 per year by the third year. The teachers were seeking a 22 percent increase over two years which would bring salaries to \$51,000 in the second vear.

The support staff (custodians, secretarial, maintenance personnel) had already received a 7 percent salary increase and will receive a 6 percent increase next year and 5.5 percent the third year. The support staff was seeking an 8.3 percent increase and the board had offered 5.9 percent.

Berman turned down a union demand for make-up days caused by the teacher's strike, according to Berkel

The union claimed victory on the Fair Share issue in which nonunion staff will pay a proportionate share of union dues designated for collective bargaining. The amount will be fixed by the union.

On the question of management rights, Berman said that rights of the school board in educational matters is adequately covered by Illinois law and it was unnecessary to put into the contract.

Martin Tiersky, school board president, said he was satisfied "on the whole" with the decision. "We won a victory on the salary schedule which was close to what we offered at the last negotiating session in October. "I'm glad it's over," he said.

# Homestead

Exemption

Niles Township Assessor, Robert P. Hanrahan wishes to inform Niles Township residents that: Senior Citizens are now eligible for a Homestead Exemption during the year in which they turn 65. They no longer have to wait another year as was the situation with the Homestead Act prior to 1984. The Homestead Exemption has been increased from \$1,500, which it was prior to January 1, 1984, and is now \$2,000. However, this benefit will not be reflected on a Tax Bill until the second installment is due in the Summer of 1987. Therefore, the 1986 Homestead savings will not be received until the 1986 Tax Bills are paid in full with the second nstallment in the year 1987.

The Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption provides tax relief by reducing the equalized assessed valuation of an eligible residence by \$2,000 which can result in a tax savings of as much as \$200. This savings is in the form of a deducation on the Second Installment of the Real Estate Tax
