The names of John Frazer Chalker and Thomas Phelps Chalker were called, their characters passed, and they having been three years local preachers and one year traveling preachers, and having passed approved examinations in the class of the first year, were entitled to deacon's orders and were elected. Robert Andrew Wright and James Walter Kelly, Jr., being duly recommended by the Dothan District Conference, were elected local deacons.

Whereas, the last General Conference made an optional apportionment of \$40,000 upon the Church at large for our two General Assemblies, viz:

Mount Sequoyah and Lake Junaluska, leaving each Annual Conference free to accept or decline its *pro rata* of such apportionment; and whereas we do express ourselves and desire to go on record as favoring the great work being done for the Church through these agencies and urge all who can to both cooperate and attend the same; and whereas the conditions in the Alabama Conference, at this time, are both peculiar and critical with reference to our local work and institutions,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That we, for the present, wish to exercise our option in not accepting that part of the General Apportionment upon the Alabama Conference that was left optional with each Annual Conference leaving the apportionment for all our General Work upon the Alabama Conference of \$64,092.

Orphanage.—W. M. Curtis read the report of the Board of Directors of the Alabama Methodist Orphanage. After some discussion the report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ALABAMA METHODIST ORPHANAGE,
 OCTOBER 1, 1930

1. The Alabama Methodist Orphanage has just celebrated its fortieth anniversary, with gradual improvements in every department, until today it stands out in the forefront of all institutions of like kind.

2. Marked and much needed improvements have been made in the physical equipment, so that today it is an institution of which every Methodist in Alabama and West Florida may well be proud. This is true from a physical aspect, eminently true from a moral aspect and pre-eminently true from a spiritual aspect, the latter culminating this year in a glorious revival in which seventy tender, sincere young hearts were given to God and the advancement of the Christian religion. These improvements of which we are all justly proud are the results and due largely to the increasing interest and prayers of Methodists throughout the two Conferences. Never have our people been indifferent to the cause, but more recently have they espoused it, as an individual responsibility for which we have great occasion to thank God.

3. We have in the Home at present 166 children, 68 boys and 98 girls, ranging in age from nine weeks to nineteen years, all of which are in good health, fine spirit, properly fed, clothed and ministered to with care and consideration. We have lost by death only five children in the last nineteen years, showing the mortality rate of the Home far below the average State rate. We regard this as a special Providential favor. All our children of school age are in the Grammar and High Schools of the City with the same standing and on the same basis, as

the children of the wealthiest taxpayer and most highly respected citizen, and in their studies and athletic activities they rank among the best.

4. Our receipts for the year have been as follows: Cash and supplies from the Alabama Conference, \$17,818.38; from the North Alabama Conference, \$22,966.47; miscellaneous, \$4,648.07, a total of \$45,432.84. We have paid out \$39,351.17, leaving a cash balance, as of October 1, of \$1,972.16. Notwithstanding our cash receipts, our crops were a practical failure on account of the drought, which means that our resources for next year have been materially reduced, necessitating buying in the market to cover the shortage from our farm failure. We have a dairy herd of thirty-three cows which furnish ample milk and butter for the institution, fifty-nine head of hogs from which we expect to furnish most of our meat, and hens sufficient to furnish eggs for the children.

5. But all the success of the past will not suffice for the future, the task is not finished, there are continually recurring needs and problems that we must meet, and meet them like true Christians. The policy of the two Conferences for supporting the institution is and has been a Christmas and Workday Offering and the offerings from all Sunday Schools on the Fifth Sundays throughout the year. This policy, strictly adhered to, would provide ample support and maintenance, but sad to say it is, we think unintentionally neglected by some charges. Let us say in a loud voice that this plan should be emphasized and put faithfully before the people on its merits by the preachers and Sunday School Superintendents with the sure results that the laity will respond most cheerfully and generally to the work.

6. We are proud of the Institution's success for this and all the years of its existence. No matter how efficient the machine, no matter how complete the organization may be, there must be a controlling hand to realize practical results. In this hand we, as a Board, feel that we have in Brother Aldridge a man peculiarly fitted for the work and whose heart and life are being spent in the interest of the institution. To him is largely due credit for whatever success the Orphanage has achieved in the last three years. There is a beautiful affection between him and the children and they, especially the younger children, evidence their love for him in childlike sincerity. This, we think, means more than we could express in words of appreciation to him, but in behalf of the Board and the Membership of the two Conferences, we do wish to acknowledge our debt of gratitude to him and wish for him continued success in the cause.

7. The Institution, the North Alabama Conference and Southern Methodism have lost a most valuable man in the death of Rev. L. C. Branscomb. As a director of the Institution, his place will be hard to fill. His counsel, his directing hand will be sorely missed by us all.

8. The following officers of the Board were re-elected for another year: E. M. Elliott, Chairman; W. M. Curtis, Vice Chairman; H. F. Cooper, Treasurer; J. E. Wilkinson, Secretary, and Bruce Beveridge, J. E. Wilkinson and Mrs. Ed H. Hobbs, Executive Committee. Rev. F. L. Aldridge was elected Superintendent for another year, and we respectfully request the Bishop to appoint him to this office.

Therefore resolved, that the Pastors and Sunday School Superintendents appoint an Orphanage Committee in each Church and Sunday School just before Christmas to present to the entire membership and friends of the Orphanage an opportunity to make their offering before hand, same to be added to and counted with the regular White Christmas offering.

Bible Board.—R. K. Jones read the report of the Bible Board. Dr. F. W. Jackson, representing the American Bible Society, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of that cause. The report was adopted as follows:

The Bible Board submits the following report:

The Apostle Paul, writing to his son in the Gospel, admonished him to "preach the Word." We realize the greatest and most important task of the ministry of today is that of preaching the Word: Therefore, we warn our preachers of any demand or tendency to give pulpit time and speech to "book reviews," social service topics or any discussion not based strictly on Bible teachings.

We urge our pastors to try earnestly to get all the people of their congregations to study the Bible daily, and to help them to secure such Bibles as they need, either from the Publishing House or the American Bible Society, encouraging the patronage of our own Publishing House.

We were glad to have Dr. Jackson, representing the American Bible Society, meet with our Board and tell us of the work the American Bible Society is contemplating doing in Mobile. We call attention to his statement that copies of the Bible cannot only be secured at cost but free copies may be secured from the American Bible Society for those who are unable to buy them.

We call attention to Universal Bible Sunday, December 7, 1930, and urge some suitable observance of this day in all of our congregations.

We feel that it is but fitting for us to have at some of our Annual Conferences an outstanding and recognized Bible scholar to give a series of inspirational addresses setting forth the place of the Bible in the program of the church. Since the Bishop could not grant this request this year we ask that the Bible Board may be authorized with the aid of the Bishop to secure the service of some suitable speaker for the next session of the Alabama Conference; such addresses to be delivered at such times as will not interfere with the business of the Conference nor conflict with scheduled Board meetings.

Christian Literature.—The hour for the order of the day having arrived, C. C. Garner read the report of the Board of Christian Literature. A. J. Lamar, Dr. J. L. Decell, Editor of New Orleans Christian Advocate, Bishop Ainsworth and H. W. Rice addressed the Conference on the occasion of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Publishing House and the fiftieth anniversary of the Alabama Christian Advocate. The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The Board of Christian Literature begs leave to submit the following report:

The report of our publishing house is such as to fill our hearts with gratitude for the notable service rendered by it for seventy-five years. It has surmounted many difficulties and is now one of the outstanding publishing houses in America.

This splendid service rendered by our publishing house is the basis for soliciting the patronage of our people.

We urge our preachers to put forth an earnest effort to increase the circulation of the Nashville Christian Advocate.

We believe that the time has come when a united effort should be made to greater increase the circulation of the Alabama Christian Advocate; we have carefully formulated a plan at the suggestion of Bishop Ainsworth which we submit herewith and which we respectfully request the Conference to adopt.

The Alabama Christian Advocate Agrees

- (1) To send the paper free of charge for a period of two weeks to the heads of all the families in each charge whose names are to be furnished us by the pastors on blanks which the Advocate will furnish to each pastor, this to be done during the month of January.
- (2) To furnish the paper to each family in each charge at the special rate of \$1.00 per year, where 75% of the families subscribe for it, this to be paid in advance.

The Pastors of the Alabama Conference Agree

- (1) To promptly furnish the Alabama Christian Advocate the names and addresses of all the heads of families in their charges, same to be furnished during January on blanks provided by the Advocate.
- (2) Immediately following the two weeks period during which the Advocate is sent free to the heads of families not now subscribing, the pastors, in conjunction with their boards of stewards, agree to make a thorough canvass of these families, earnestly seeking to get every family to subscribe for the Advocate.

Pastors and Boards are requested to pay out of their budgets for any families who do not, during the canvass, subscribe for the paper up to at least 75% of the total number of families in the church or charge. This is done in order to make the dollar rate available.

It is understood that after April 1st the dollar rate will be withdrawn and the regular rate of \$1.50 will be charged for the paper.

We nominate B. F. Marshall as trustee of the Alabama Christian Advocate for the period of five years.

We request the appointment of H. W. Rice as business manager of the Alabama Christian Advocate.

We request the Budget Commission for an appropriation same as last year.

JOINT REPORT SEASHORE CAMP GROUND COMMISSION

To the Alabama, Louisiana, and Mississippi
Annual Conferences.

Dear Brethren:

Your Commissioners, appointed to negotiate concerning the Seashore Camp Ground Property at Biloxi, Mississippi, beg leave to submit the following report:

For two years we have studied the Seashore Camp Ground interest, and have met from time to time in joint sessions.

On June 19, 1930, the Joint Commission met with R. R. Ellison and E. R. Malone, Alabama; A. S. Lutz, T. S. Jones and W. A. McKennon, Louisiana; J. T. Leggett, C. W. Crisler, L. N. Dantzler and J. L. Decell, Mississippi, present. Plans considered at previous sessions being found impracticable, it was unanimously agreed to offer the property, subject to the approval of our respective Annual Conferences, to the General Boards of Mission, Christian Education, and Lay Activities, provided, they would assume the indebtedness and agree to operate the property as a Church-wide Assembly. R. R. Ellison, W. A. McKennon and J. L. Decell were appointed to interview the General Boards.

In July, 1930, the above committee of three met the General Boards of Christian Education and Lay Activities, and the Executive Committee of the General Board of Missions at Lake Junaluska, N. C. It was their unanimous opinion that, while they could not take the property over, "it should be given a broader place of service to the entire Southern Methodist Church." And to this end the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the General Boards of Christian Education and Lay Activities, and approved by the Executive Committee of the General Board of Missions: "We approve the suggestion that the Seashore Camp Ground should be given a broader place of service to the entire Church, and we will undertake to work out with the other General Boards of the Church a plan to promote a Winter program for the Seashore Methodist Assembly at Biloxi, Mississippi."

The three commissions met at Biloxi, October 16, 1930, to receive the report of their committee on interviewing the General Boards, and make the following recommendations:

First: That the purpose to create a Church-wide Assembly out of the property of the Seashore Camp Ground, to be known as the Seashore Methodist Assembly, be approved.

Second: That we express our appreciation to the General Boards of Christian Education, Missions, and Lay Activities for their interest and pledged cooperation in promoting programs for a Seashore Methodist Assembly.

WHEREAS, the control, management and beneficial interest of all property standing in the name of the Seashore Campground School, a Mississippi Corporation, are vested exclusively in the Mississippi Annual Conference, the Louisiana Annual Conference and the Alabama Annual Conference, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a religious society, and said property is held subject to, and can at all times be disposed of by the orders of said Annual Conferences; and

WHEREAS, said corporation, Seashore Campground School, was organized and incorporated pursuant to resolutions duly passed by said three Annual Conferences and its dissolution may be similarly ordered; and

WHEREAS, it is to the interests of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, within the bounds of said three Conferences, and is in furtherance of its Christian aims, purposes and objects, that the properties now standing, as aforesaid, in the name of the Seashore Campground School be made available as a place of church-wide service, and to that end that a central religious society, such as is recognized by the laws and decisions of the State of Mississippi, be created, constituted and established which shall organize as such and afterwards incorporate as such under the laws of the State of Mississippi, and then receive and hold all right, title and interest in and to all property now vested in, or standing in the name of, the Seashore Campground School, and function in an enlarged field of usefulness, according and subject to the further concurrent orders and resolutions of the said three Annual Conferences; and

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in regular annual session at Vicksburg, Mississippi, upon November 14, 1930, adopted a resolution with respect to the foregoing, which resolution expresses the will of this Conference and has its approval as a course of action;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Alabama Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in regular annual session at Mobile, Alabama, as follows, to-wit:

First. That this Annual Conference does hereby authorize and direct the creation, constitution and establishment of a central religious society, to be composed of four members elected from this Annual Conference, four members elected from the Mississippi Annual Conference and four members elected from the Louisiana Annual Conference.

Second. That the twelve members first so elected shall convene at Keller Lodge Building, upon the property commonly known and referred to as the "Seashore Campground" in the city of Biloxi, at 1:00 o'clock P. M., upon Wednesday, the 17th day of December, 1930, and shall organize as a religious society by associating themselves together and electing such officers as they may then designate for the purpose of managing the affairs of such society until it may be incorporated as further herein provided. A majority of said members so convening shall constitute a quorum and may act, provided that less than a majority may adjourn said meeting at that time, and from time to time, until a quorum is found in attendance. Said members may not enlarge the membership of the society, nor provide for succession, but the membership thereof shall be designated and maintained only as set forth and provided in Article Third next hereafter.

Third. That following organization, said central religious society shall, through its several members as incorporators, in such manner and form as may be required under the laws of the State of Mississippi, apply to the State of Mississippi for a charter of incorporation, under the corporate title of Seashore Methodist Assembly, wherein said members shall become Trustees. The domicile of said corporation shall be in Biloxi, it shall have no authorized capital stock, (with or without par value), shall have a period of existence of fifty (50) years and shall exercise the following, or equivalent, rights and powers, within the following restrictions, which shall be duly set forth in the application for such charter, to-wit:

(a) To receive and hold title as a religious organization and/or religious society and/or ecclesiastical body to the property, real and personal, now owned and held, in trust for the aforesaid Annual Conferences, by the "Seashore Campground School," a Mississippi Corporation, also domiciled in the City of Biloxi, Harrison County, Mississippi, and to receive and hold such other property, real and personal, as may hereafter be conveyed to it in connection with the functions and enterprises hereinafter authorized, ALL IN TRUST, that such property shall be used, kept, operated, maintained and disposed of for the use of the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a religious society, subject to the discipline of said Church, as from time to time authorized and declared by the General Conference of said Church, and by the Mississippi Annual Conference, the Louisiana Annual Conference, and the Alabama Annual Conference, of said Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

(b) Generally to foster, promote and develop Christian fellowship, evangelism and education, consistent with the Doctrines and Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and in furtherance thereof to conduct boys' and girls' camps, young people's assemblies, leadership training schools for all branches of Christian activity, divinity schools, Bible schools, Pastors' schools, camp meetings, college and university extension courses, and other assemblies for religious purposes.

(c) To conduct meetings, gatherings, conventions, assemblages and schools of every kind and character, for worship, for the inculcation and dissemination of missionary and other religious information and knowledge, for all religious, charitable and educational purposes, and for general community enterprises of all kinds, not inconsistent with the Doctrines and Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

(d) To operate and maintain, or provide for and/or permit the operation and maintenance, of Church Academies and/or Colleges, subject to the regulations provided in the discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

(e) To co-operate with the different boards, commissions and agencies, permanent and temporary, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, by

using the property held by the corporation so as to furnish facilities for the performance of the functions of such boards, commissions and/or agencies, within the bounds of the said three Annual Conferences.

(f) To do and perform any and all other acts, not hereinabove enumerated, not in violation of law, which will enable this corporation successfully to operate in the furtherance of religion, education, charity, benevolence, and Christian development, subject to the discipline of said church.

(g) The rights and powers that may be exercised by this corporation, in addition to the foregoing, are those conferred by the provisions of Chapter 100 of the Mississippi Code of 1930, and acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto.

The affairs of this corporation shall be managed and controlled and its objects and purposes effectuated, by and through twelve Trustees, six Clerical and six Lay, four of whom (two Clerical and two Lay) shall be elected by the Mississippi Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, four of whom (two Clerical and two Lay) shall be elected by the Louisiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and four of whom (two Clerical and two Lay) shall be elected by the Alabama Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, PROVIDED, that any other Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, may be permitted, upon the concurrent approval of three-fourths of the members present and voting in each of said three Annual Conferences, to elect four (4) Trustees to serve with the Trustees herein designated, with all rights and powers vested in the Trustees herein named, and elected from time to time by the said Mississippi Annual Conference, Louisiana Annual Conference and Alabama Annual Conference. Such Trustees shall, respectively, hold office for such terms as may be designated at the time of their election (subject to earlier removal, as hereafter provided) and until their respective successors are elected; provided that in the interims between annual sessions of said three Conferences, respectively, any vacancy, by death, resignation, removal from the Conference, or other disqualifying cause, may be filled by the remaining Trustees' electing a Trustee who shall be of the same class (Clerical or Lay) as his predecessor and a resident of the Conference by which his predecessor was elected, subject to confirmation by such next Annual Conference succeeding the time of his election. Said Trustees shall at all times be subject to the respective Annual Conferences by which they have been elected or from which they have been elected by the other Trustees, and may be removed by their respective Conferences at will. The foregoing incorporators, having already been so designated by their respective Conferences, are hereby constituted such Trustees to serve until their respective successors shall be elected by their respective Conferences, or elected by their fellow Trustees in filling vacancies.

Subject to the provisions hereof and to the orders of the Mississippi Annual Conference, Louisiana Annual Conference and Alabama Annual Conference, the Trustees shall have the powers and discharge the duties ordinarily held and performed by the directors of a corporation. They shall elect annually from their own number a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be filled by one person. They may enact by-laws for their own government and all laws, rules and regulations which they may deem necessary for the protection of the properties and for the good order and well being of the different enterprises of the corporation; but all such by-laws, rules and regulations shall be subject to amendment or repeal by the said three Annual Conferences.

They may hold meetings and transact business thereat not only at the domicile of the corporation, but also at such places in the bounds of said three Annual Conferences as may be from time to time designated in accordance with the by-laws. At all such meetings any Trustee may be represented by written proxy.

Said corporation shall never acquire any property except in trust as hereinabove provided, and it shall never sell nor encumber any property acquired by it, except under authority first had from each of the said three Annual Conferences.

Said Corporation shall be a religious organization and/or religious society and/or ecclesiastical body, and shall not be operated for profit, but all of its property, real and personal, shall be used exclusively for the benefit of the religious, educational and charitable activities of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

That should the Louisiana Annual Conference be unwilling to adopt the foregoing verbatim, then the representatives of this Conference hereinafter elected, as counselors, are hereby authorized in the name of this Conference to agree with the representatives (and counselors, if any) of said other Conferences, similarly authorized, to such amendments thereof as in their discretion they may deem proper; provided that nothing shall be abated from the right of this Conference to approve or veto any sale of or encumbrance upon the property of said corporation. Likewise, should the Governor and/or Attorney General of the State of Mississippi, demand any change in the language so used to set forth the desired powers of the corporation, or any limitation upon or clearer expression of such powers, or any other amendment, such representatives and counselors, may accede to same and accept such amended charter.

Fifth. That this Conference does hereby designate and appoint as its chosen members in said central religious society and as its Trustees for said corporation to be incorporated, the following members of this conference, to-wit:

W. D. Agnew, of Montgomery, Alabama; H. M. Andrews, of Dothan, Alabama; R. P. Roach, of Mobile, Alabama, and W. E. Kennedy, of Mobile, Alabama.

Sixth. That upon the incorporation of the Seashore Methodist Assembly, the Seashore Campground School shall execute its deed of conveyance to said Seashore Methodist Assembly, specifically conveying to and vesting in said Seashore Methodist Assembly all and every right, title and interest, legal and equitable, in and to all property and rights whatsoever now vested, or standing in the name of, said Seashore Campground School, all in trust that such property shall be used, kept, operated, maintained and disposed of for the use of the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, subject to the discipline of said Church as from time to time authorized and declared by the General Conference of said Church and by the Mississippi Annual Conference, the Louisiana Annual Conference and Alabama Annual Conference, of said Church. All the indebtedness against the said Seashore Campground School property shall be assumed by and become a legal liability of the Seashore Methodist Assembly.

Seventh. That the corporation, Seashore Campground School, be thereafter dissolved and that its present Trustees, when they shall have conveyed the property of said corporation to the Seashore Methodist Assembly, shall obtain a cancellation of said charter by due proceedings under the laws of the State of Mississippi.

Eighth. That this resolution shall not become effective until the Louisiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, shall have duly adopted resolutions to the same effect, and shall have elected representatives, with such designated authority as will enable them. and the representatives elected by

this Conference and the Mississippi Annual Conference, to co-operate and function as a unit, as members of such central religious society, and as incorporators and Trustees of said proposed new corporation.

Resolved: That the Trustees of said Campground School or the Trustees of Seashore Methodist Assembly, whichever is in control of said Seashore Campground School Property at the time the said \$15,000.00 is due, be, and they are hereby authorized and empowered to issue bonds and/or execute notes not exceeding the amount of \$17,000.00, and to secure the payment of said bonds and/or notes by executing a mortgage on said Seashore Campground Property to secure the payment of said bonds and/or notes.

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

MOBILE, ALA., November 21, 1930.

Opening.—Bishop Ainsworth called the Conference to order at 2 P. M., this day, pursuant to adjournment.

Devotional.—The Bishop announced Hymn No. 506, "I Need Thee Every Hour," after the singing of which Judge J. T. Ellison led in prayer.

Character.—The Selma and Pensacola Districts were reported charge by charge, after which Question 21 was called.

Question 21 (resumed).—"Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

Answer.—The names of C. E. Avinger, A. L. Sellers, A. V. Jones, S. R. Jones, J. M. Johnson, Carl Preer, J. R. Watson, H. M. Ellis, R. K. Jones, J. F. Bilbro, J. O. Grogan, E. W. Roberts, H. E. Wilson, J. H. Holloway, J. E. McCann, W. W. Jeffries, W. F. Calhoun, M. R. Evans, R. M. English, R. P. Cochran, A. T. Howington, G. W. Carpenter, H. W. Williamson, J. E. Northcutt, D. H. McNeal, J. T. Eckford, A. C. Lee, J. M. McKinney, E. C. Moore, W. M. Pickard, R. W. Greene, R. J. Haskew, and A. P. Segers were called, one by one, and their characters passed.

Hospital Report.—W. S. Guice read the report of the Hospital Board, which was adopted as follows:

HOSPITAL

The following report of the Conference Hospital Board of the Montgomery Memorial Hospital is hereby respectfully submitted:

Concerning the campaign for hospital funds put on last spring, we wish to heartily commend the vigorous and untiring efforts of our Hospital Commissioner, Dr. O. S. Welch. It is our observation that in almost every community where the plan of Dr. Welch was systematically and thoroughly worked, the result was very gratifying. The campaign yielded in cash and subscriptions, a total of about \$25,000. And while, of course, this was far below our hopes and expectations, it was a creditable showing considering the financial conditions existing as well as other considerations unnecessary to mention. We feel it is well to say that the amount collected from this effort has been the means of keeping the hospital open, and that the expense of the campaign was negligible. Our floating indebtedness has been reduced something like eight or ten thousand dollars.

Perhaps no other enterprise has suffered more because of hard financial conditions than hospitals. This is our observation and what we learn from others,

and the reason is obvious. In spite of this, however, we are pleased to say that during the past few months Memorial has succeeded in operating on practically a self-sustaining basis. And indeed would be doing more than this were we being reimbursed by the Golden Cross Society for the charity work done. Following is a brief summary of statistics for the past twelve months. Total number of patients, 2,275. Number of patients cared for wholly by Golden Cross, 133. Number of patients aided by Golden Cross, 554. Total amount charged to Golden Cross account, \$11,781.97. Amount received from Golden Cross, \$1,116.13. You will see that Golden Cross Charges have exceeded receipts by over \$10,000 and the record shows that in past years a similar condition has obtained though our receipts have been lighter from both Conferences this year than usual. We wish to submit to you that if the people of the Alabama Conference had paid an average of only fifteen cents per member, this amount would have reimbursed us for the free work done and our financial condition vastly improved. If the whole-hearted interest and endorsement of all of our ministers could by some means be enlisted we believe that a thorough and systematic organization of the Golden Cross Society would be secured throughout our Church, and result in generous support. It is our impression that our laymen as a rule will respond to an appeal which they feel the ministry is interested in and especially should this be true for a cause so worthy and so much in need.

It was with much regret that the Board of Trustees were called upon during March, 1930, to relinquish the service of Dr. John S. Chadwick as Superintendent and Chaplain of the Hospital. Dr. Chadwick's health was such that he felt that he must be relieved, and the Board accepted his resignation. J. A. Wylie was selected to fill the vacancy in the office of Superintendent thus created, and has served the hospital in this capacity since that time.

We take pleasure in reporting a bequest to Montgomery Memorial Hospital, of the sum of \$500.00 left by the late Mr. Edward Abraham. This money has not yet been paid to us, but no doubt will be received in the near future. We suggest that a suitable expression of thanks from the Conference be tendered the family of Mr. Abraham. Same should be addressed to Dr. Joseph H. Abraham, 130 West 58th Street, New York City.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, October 29, 1930, the following names were presented and we ask their nomination to the Conference for election to fill vacancies indicated:

Rev. W. S. Guice to succeed himself, for term ending 1934.

J. A. Wylie to succeed himself, for term ending 1934.

Dr. George Blue to succeed Gen. R. E. Steiner, resigned, for term ending 1933.

Dr. E. C. Moore to serve as Field Secretary and Golden Cross Director for the ensuing Conference year and we hereby recommend his appointment by the Bishop.

The Board wishes to express their confidence in Superintendent J. A. Wylie as Superintendent and Manager of the Hospital and pledge to him in every way, its undivided support in his business-like administration of all affairs pertaining to the Hospital.

J. E. Z. Riley offered a resolution from the Hospital Board, requesting the Commission on Budget to include in its budget for next year the sum of \$30,000.00 for the Hospital.

J. O. Grogan offered the following substitute: First, "Resolved, that the Conference levy a special assessment of \$30,000.00 for the Montgomery Memorial Hospital;

Second, that the Conference pledge its support to the Field Agent in his work in raising this amount.

After discussion of this substitute, J. O. Grogan, withdrew it.

O. S. Welch moved that the Riley resolution be referred to the Commission on Budget, with instructions that the budget scale be so arranged as to include the \$30,000.00 for Montgomery Memorial Hospital, provided that the entire askings for the next year do not exceed the askings for the past year. The motion was adopted.

Vote Rescinded.—R. R. Ellison moved that the Conference rescind its action of the morning session whereby the Conference Treasurer was instructed to pay to Marx and Company, of Birmingham, Ala., the sum of \$5,000.00, principal payment, and the amount of interest due on said note, this on the obligation of the Conference for Montgomery Memorial Hospital. The motion carried.

Temperance and Social Service.—Report No. 1 of the Board of Temperance and Social Service was read and adopted, as follows:

"Whereas, all matters pertaining to our educational institutions come before the Board of Education, and all matters pertaining to our other institutions, except our Orphanage, come before appropriate boards, and

"Whereas, child care is the very heart of social service, therefore, be it resolved and ordered by the Alabama Conference, in session assembled at Mobile, Alabama,

"First, That all reports from the Board of Directors of our Orphanage, the Superintendent, and all other matters pertaining to the Orphanage which hereafter are presented to the Conference for action, be referred to the Conference Board of Temperance and Social Service for consideration and report to the Conference.

"Second, That all nominations for membership on the Board of Directors of the Alabama Methodist Orphanage be made to the Conference by said Board of Temperance and Social Service.

Devotional.—The Bishop announced Hymn No. 312, beginning "O happy day," after the singing of which Bishop Ainsworth led the Conference in reading responsively the 32nd Psalm. Rev. W. H. Hasty, a local preacher, led the Conference in prayer.

Journal.—The Committee on the Journal reported that the minutes of yesterday morning and afternoon sessions had been read, examined, and after minor corrections, were approved.

Leave of Absence.—R. W. Judkins was granted leave of absence.

Board of Christian Education.—A. H. Howard was elected a member of the Board of Christian Education.

Superannuate Homes.—A. T. Wilkinson presented the report of the Board for Superannuate Homes, which was filed and ordered printed in the Journal.

Character.—*Question 21* (Resumed).—"Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" was called.

Spiritual Life.—D. H. McNeal read the report of the Commission on Spiritual Life. After a very earnest exhortation by Bishop Ainsworth the report was adopted as follows:

We, your Committee on Spiritual Life, make the following report:

The first emphasis of our Church and the primary purpose of our endeavor is to deepen the spiritual life of our own people and the enlistment of others in the Church of God and lead them to an acceptance of Jesus Christ. It is our conviction that the emphasis should be placed upon evangelism. We have read with interest the Program of Evangelism recommended by the Spiritual Life Commission of our own Church as given in the pamphlet by Bishop W. N. Ainsworth and Rev. R. L. Russell and urge our preachers to carefully read this pamphlet and distribute it among our people. We are quoting often from this paper in

this report. We urge our people to take advantage of the night of December 31 for a watch-night service emphasizing spiritual needs and renewed consecration.

That our people use the month of January in calling together in assemblies for prayer leaders of our organization until God shall be pleased to bless our people and churches with revival power. That this entire month shall be known as "Church Loyalty Month." During which time diligent efforts shall be made to enlist in attendance and activity every member of the Church. Too many of the membership of our Church are indifferent to its worship and program and the first duty of our people is to enlist these into the activities of the Kingdom. A revival among our own people should be the first goal. We should let this slogan ring in the hearts of our people: "Make Membership Mean More." The officials of the organizations of our Church should individually and collectively be brought to the realization that vows have been taken and must be paid. Membership in Methodism must mean more if it has dynamic power to spread the Kingdom of God.

We strongly recommend that the month of February shall be known as "Survey Month." During which every church shall carefully survey the field of its responsibility and this be carefully followed with an appeal to all such people for the realization of the claims of Christ and His Church.

During March and April or as near thereto as practicable, that all of our churches devote themselves to special revival services in every Church in which repentance and the Saviourhood of Jesus Christ shall be presented. Such services wherever possible should terminate at Easter in a great season of enrollment and decision for all that are on the Lord's side. In every case these meetings should be well-planned, remembering always that God alone is the source of His people's power.

We especially call attention to the following paragraph from the Program of Evangelism:

"We would earnestly recommend that each Annual Conference devise some means of reaching the unoccupied territory within its bounds with an adequate evangelistic effort.

It is time for Methodism to reassert itself in the name of the Lord as an evangelistic agency. It is high time for the outbreak of a new passion. Our sole business is to seek the lost, spread scriptural holiness over the land and reform the continent by reliance upon the spiritual agencies of redeeming grace."

We humbly suggest that in all the meetings of the groups of our Church during the Cultivation Period for our Missionary Interest that we shall stress these supreme purposes of our Church. That our Bishop, our Presiding Elders, our Preachers and Laymen shall come to feel all our problems, financial and otherwise, are linked up with this movement, and that we can never succeed at any point until we shall lead our people into a new offensive to bring men and women into the Church and salvation through Jesus Christ.

ALABAMA CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Annual Conference at Mobile, Alabama, November, 1930

The Alabama Conference Board of Lay Activities, in session at the Annual Alabama Conference, M. E. Church, South, Dauphin Way Methodist Church, Mobile, Alabama, having reviewed the work, submits the following report:

Owing to certain peculiar conditions, all aims have not been accomplished this year. However, this should in no way disconcert our work as distressing economic conditions have prevailed in many parts of the country.

We set as our goals for the coming year:

1. *Full Collection of Benevolences.*—We pledge all possible work for the consummation of this goal. We pledge co-operation to all Boards and to the Commission on Benevolences.

2. *Training of Men of the Church.*—To the end that the officers and men of the church may be best trained for their work, we pledge all possible aid to such a program, including Pastors' Schools, to which this Board has liberally contributed in the past; co-operation with the Board of Christian Education; plans for Men's work, and other worthy kindred endeavors. We urge from time to time programs for men.

3. *Conformity to Plans.*—Believing that a plan, to be effective, must be followed, we urge District, Church and Circuit Boards of Lay Activities to read carefully the chapter in the new Discipline in regard to Lay Activities and in their work to adhere to the plans. Benefit beyond measure can accrue for our church through the activity of our laymen, if they will but set themselves seriously to the tasks before them.

4. *Development of Christian Stewardship.*—We urge earnest work by the Christian Stewardship Committee in each church. Also the formation of classes for the study of Christian Stewardship.

5. *Laymen's Day Program.*—We endorse the second Sunday in June as Laymen's Day, at which time a program should be carried out by Laymen.

6. *Methodist Laymen.*—The Methodist Laymen, the official organ of Lay Activities, is one of the best and most interesting organs of our church. We ask all District, Church and Charge Lay Leaders to work diligently for the promotion of the

circulation of this paper. Assistance by pastors and Presiding Elders will be appreciated.

7. *Lay Speaking.*—Recognizing the value of achievements accomplished through lay speaking, we ask that our men be given the opportunity, at church services from time to time, to present to the congregations the programs of our church. This will not only acquaint our people with the aims of their church, but will also develop our men. Lay speakers in unoccupied pulpits, at opportune times, is advocated.

8. *World Conference on Stewardship.*—We have elected Hon. E. R. Malone, of Pensacola, official delegate to the World Conference on Stewardship and Church Finance, to be held at Edinburgh, Scotland, June 22-26, 1931.

We ask that space be given in the Conference Journal for the publication of the financial report of the Board.

We ask that we be granted, according to the arrangement prevailing for the past several years, Thursday night of Conference week in 1931, for our Anniversary program.

We recommend to the Conference for Lay Leader for the ensuing year S. H. Blan, Montgomery, Ala.

REPORT NO. 1 BOARD OF MISSIONS

Your Board has heard with pleasure, and we trust with profit, Dr. J. W. Perry, of the General Board, and Dr. J. W. Moore, our anniversary speaker. They have brought before us clearly and forcibly "the fields that are ripe unto the harvest."

We join heartily in the plans of the General Board in the cultural and collecting programs, both in the Kingdom Extension Offering and the General collections. In the future, we will have no source of income except our part from these collections and offerings.

It pains us that we could not pay more than one-half the appropriations that we had promised our heroic missionaries in the Home Field. We sincerely honor them, for they toiled on faithfully in spite of the privations they were forced to endure. Brethren, "this must not occur again!"

We recommend:

1. That Missionary Institutes be held in March and April, followed by an every member canvass, and that we earnestly endeavor to secure 100% collections.
2. That we accept our allotment of \$38,726.
3. That we give greater diligence to our rural sections, since they contain more than half of our population.
4. That Rev. L. A. Horn be appointed conference evangelist.

Board of Christian Education.—A. B. Carlton read the report of the Board of Christian Education. After an earnest address made by Dr. Walter D. Agnew, President of the Woman's College, the report was adopted, as follows:

Your Board has given most careful consideration to every phase of work carried on by the three merging Boards. Every one of the activities seemed important and merited the best support of our Conference. It was our desire to recommend the continuance of every one of these, but we were faced with a condition that makes retrenchment necessary.

In recommending the employment of an Extension Secretary attention is called to the fact that his support comes from the fourth Sunday offering in the Sunday School and not from assessments.

Since retrenchment is necessary and since under the new legislation the Executive Secretary is as much responsible for the program carried on by the Epworth League as for that carried on by the Sunday School, we recommend that the Executive Secretary be charged with that whole responsibility. If later it should seem wise to call to the assistance of the Executive Secretary another who could serve without salary but with necessary traveling expenses paid, we instruct our Executive Committee to enter into such a plan.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. S. M. Baker as Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the Conference, and also recommend the appointment of Rev. O. G. Pope as Extension Secretary.

Resolutions

1. In view of the Board of Christian Education having its membership increased by two members each from the three merging Boards, it deems it wise to ask that two additional members be elected by the Conference. We recommend the election of Dr. W. D. Agnew and Dr. H. M. Andrews. The Board recommends that the membership of the Board be limited to thirty members.

2. Rev. R. B. McGehee came before the Board of Christian Education and called attention to a school at Auburn for the benefit of rural pastors. The purpose of this school is to acquaint our rural pastors with the several agencies working for community betterment, improvement in agriculture, and health. This school to be given without cost to the pastors, or this Board. The Board heartily endorses this effort and urges the rural pastors to attend this school.

Birmingham-Southern College

The College reports a faculty of seventy members, a total enrollment of 2,169 for the year. A property value of \$1,745,933.00 and an endowment of \$761,785.00. This is indeed gratifying. President Snavely informed the Board that a prominent woman in North Alabama had made a substantial gift to the building program.

Woman's College

The President's report showed a faculty of sixty-three and an enrollment of 503, a property value of \$864,958.00 and an endowment of \$353,154.00. The Houghton Memorial Library was dedicated this year. The Board of Trustees has launched a campaign for one million dollars to be consummated in 1935 in celebration of the quarter centennial of the opening of the institution. It is hoped that the first unit of \$350,000.00 shall be raised very soon. A gift of \$50,000.00 has been announced conditional on raising a total of \$200,000.00 required for additional endowment by December 1, 1931, to keep the College in the list of "A grade" colleges.

Resolutions in re Woman's College of Alabama

Whereas, the Woman's College of Alabama has launched a campaign for one million dollars to be consummated in celebration of the twenty-fifth Anniversary in 1935—three hundred and fifty thousand of which is to be raised at the earliest possible date (two hundred thousand for endowment and one hundred fifty thousand for indebtedness and equipment), and,

Whereas, a friend of the institution has pledged fifty thousand dollars on condition that the required amount for endowment shall be raised in valid subscriptions by December 1, 1931, therefore,

Be It Resolved, that we heartily endorse this enterprise and pledge our hearty co-operation in every plan which the Board of Trustees may undertake in securing this money, and

Be It Further Resolved, that we extend our heartiest thanks to the friend who has made the conditional gift, pledging to her and to the College Board our unqualified support and co-operation until the condition shall be met.

Downing-Shofner Institute

The report of the President showed an enrollment of 123 for the year; value of property, \$125,000.00, with an indebtedness of \$35,000.00.

Sea Shore Methodist Assembly

The report shows some material improvements on grounds and plans in the making for this Institution to be of larger service to the Church. The Board urges the pastors to attend and co-operate in this enlarged program.

C. C. Wilkerson.—On motion, the action of the Conference on yesterday, whereby it referred the name of C. C. Wilkerson to the Committee on Conference Relations for the Supernumerary Relation, was reconsidered. On motion of his Presiding Elder, W. E. Middlebrooks, C. C. Wilkerson was granted a sabbatical year for the next Conference year.

Introductions.—Dr. John W. Phillips, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of this city; Miss Rogers, Deaconess, working among the Cajuns of this county, and Mrs. W. N. Ainsworth were introduced to the Conference.

Afternoon Session.—On motion it was decided that when we adjourn it be to meet in afternoon session at two o'clock.

Greetings.—W. M. Lantrip read greetings from the mayor of the city, Hon. Leon Schwartz.

Adjournment.—After the usual announcements the Conference adjourned with the Benediction by N. B. McLeod.

FOURTH DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

MOBILE, ALA., November 22, 1930.

Opening.—Bishop Ainsworth called the Conference to order at two o'clock P. M., this day, pursuant to adjournment.

Devotional.—The Bishop announced Hymn No. 492, beginning "O for a closer walk with God," after the singing of which Bishop Ainsworth led the Conference in reciting the 23rd Psalm, and C. Bates led the Conference in prayer.

Commission on Benevolences.—W. R. Bickerstaff read report of the New Commission on Benevolences and moved its adoption. The report was adopted by a rising vote.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES

The Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences begs leave to report its organization and action as follows:

Chairman Ex-officio, Bishop W. N. Ainsworth.

Vice Chairman, Dr. R. A. Moody.

Secretary and Treasurer, Rev. D. F. Ellisor. These officers, together with O. L. Tompkins, Judge G. O. Wallace, Capt. R. A. Burleson, Rev. W. R. Bickerstaff, constitute the Executive Committee.

Dr. C. C. Jarrell appeared before the Commission as the representative of the General Conference Commission on Benevolences and reported its recent organization at Nashville, Tennessee, and brought communications from that body.

Dr. Jarrell read the recent action of the General Conference constituting the Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences as follows: Chairman, the Presiding Bishop, the Presiding Elders, the Chairman of the various Conference Boards, and the District Lay Leaders.

This Commission under the law is to co-operate with the General Conference Commission on Benevolences and is to promote in the Annual Conference the full program of cultivation for the General and Annual Conference Benevolences and for the Voluntary Kingdom Extension Offering, as authorized by the General Conference. The General Conference has thus constituted the General Commission on Benevolences and the Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences as the regular agencies during the coming quadrennium for the cultivation of the Church with reference to its whole benevolent program and has charged these agencies with the primary responsibility of securing the regular Benevolences and the Voluntary Kingdom Extension Offering.

In view of this legislation of the General Conference, and the responsibility thereby conferred upon us, we, the members of the Alabama Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences pledge our earnest co-operation with the General Conference Commission on Benevolences in its effort to carry out the financial policy established by the recent General Conference.

(a) We note with interest and pleasure the purpose of the General Conference and the organized effort pursuant thereto, and of the General Commission on Benevolences, to stabilize the Benevolent Dollar in Methodist circles. We join with them in the passionate hope and Christ-like purpose to redeem this Benevolent Dollar until it is worth one hundred cents.

(b) We pledge our efforts and desire the co-operation of our entire Annual Conference in carrying out the wise and comprehensive cultural program inaugurated by the General Conference Commission in response to the instructions of the General Conference. We suggest, as requested by the General Commission, the months of January and February for the particularly intensive period of cultivation.

(c) We recommend that you authorize the Presiding Elders to distribute the Alabama Conference allotment in the Voluntary Kingdom Extension Offering among the various districts on the principle of their ability and willingness to pay. This allotment being \$38,726.00.

We believe that the instruction of the General Conference and the program of the General Commission on Benevolences to use the existing agencies of the Church

and to utilize the various meetings and Conferences of the Church as already constituted in a broad, Church-wide program of cultivation will so unify our forces and so inspire our people that the Alabama Conference will begin at once to resume its place of accustomed leadership among the foremost Conferences of Southern Methodism.

In view of these things and the fact that the Alabama Conference Missionary and Benevolent Dollar has been steadily declining in value until this year it has reached the low level of not more than forty cents,

Therefore, be it resolved: First, that we, the Alabama Annual Conference, deplore this fact and pledge ourselves to put forth every effort to get rid of this discreditable record.

Second, that we hereby accept our allotment of \$38,726 in the Voluntary Kingdom Extension offering, and agree to add thereto our apportionment for general and Conference benevolents and unite in an intensive campaign throughout the Conference in January and February in an effort to secure the full amount, thus raising the value of our Benevolent Dollar to 100 cents.

Third, that we pledge ourselves to do our utmost to have at least half of the amount in the hands of the treasurer by the first of May.

Fourth, that we request the treasurer to publish in the columns of the Advocate the second week in May the record of every charge in the Conference on this campaign.

Temperance and Social Service.—S. E. Spencer read the report of the Board of Temperance and Social Service, which was adopted as follows:

REPORT NO. 2, BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Section I, Nomination

We nominate to the Conference A. B. Carlton as a trustee of the Anti-Saloon League, and D. Y. Register as a member of the Interracial Commission.

We recommend to the Bishop that he appoint C. W. Northcutt Superintendent of the Masonic Home.

Section II, Social Service

The Church is not awake to the outstanding contradictions to its gospel which is involved in the increase of militaristic propaganda. There are 142,000 boys enrolled in the Reserve Officers Training Corps in 318 educational institutions in forty-eight states. Six thousand of these students hold student commissions, while the United States Army details 1,723 men and expends annually \$10,000,000.00 to teach our boys to fight and to share the militarist's attitude toward international affairs.

We cannot ensure peace through the teaching of the technique of war, and we rejoice in the ruling of Attorney General Mitchell to the effect that the federal law does not require that military training be compulsory in Land Grant Colleges.

We most respectfully request our Alabama educational institutions which have compulsory military training to make that training optional.

It is gratifying to note that at Teacher's College, Columbia University, Professor Heber Harper is developing a course in peace which will include consideration of the causes of war and the positive factors involved in securing peace. A similar course is being initiated at the North Carolina State College. In a war-torn world this is heartening.

Our greatest national enemy is the criminal element in our midst. "Our chief national defense must be in preventing crime." Crime costs our country about two and one-half times the amount of our federal income each year.

The present mood of disrespect for law is a challenge to the agencies of righteousness. Whether this mood finds expression in the violence of the mob or the brutality of officers of the law when dealing with defenseless minorities, it feeds upon its own excesses and results in more lawlessness. We are deeply grieved that the year 1930 has witnessed a marked increase in a number of lynchings in our land. Yet we see a promise of a better day in the attitude of courts and prosecuting officers as evidenced by the fact that about fifty persons are now under indictment and awaiting trial for participation in lynchings. This evil will be abated when the Church makes the lyncher to appear as the dastardly criminal he is, and makes the officer of the law know in advance that if he from weakness or timidity surrenders his prisoners to the violent mob he will be adjudged a coward, an incompetent and a miscreant.

We urge that the Board of Directors of the Alabama Methodist Orphanage raise the quality of the institution's child care to the plane of approved standards of child welfare. And to this end we recommend that they employ only such officers as are specifically trained for their tasks; and that they work in harmony and full co-operation with the Child Welfare Department of the State of Alabama.

Section III, Temperance

In submission, but in grief, we bow at the loss of our brother, Dr. L. C. Branscomb, President of the Alabama Anti-Saloon League, who has been a valiant leader in the fight on the liquor traffic.

We voice our appreciation of Dr. E. W. Gamble, who has succeeded to the presidency of the league. We express to him our confidence and hereby give to him and his colleagues the assurance of our loyal co-operation.

We hereby extend to Bishop Ainsworth an expression of our appreciation for his words of Thursday in which he so strongly asserted the right and duty of the Church to take leadership in public moral issues.

We reiterate our Church's historic stand on temperance and we appeal to our legislators to oppose any weakening of our prohibition laws or of their enforcement.

Whereas, the citizens of the United States of America have spoken in no uncertain terms, by their votes, on a great moral issue, placing the Eighteenth Amendment in the Federal Constitution by the suffrage of the forty-six of the forty-eight states of the Union, and

Whereas, the liquor forces are highly organized and financed to defeat the wishes of the majority of the citizens of the United States,

Be it resolved by the members of this ninety-eighth session of the Alabama Conference that we declare with emphasis:

DUTY IS NOT DEBATABLE.

Introductions.—Rev. A. M. Broadfoot, of the Mississippi Conference; Miss Grizzard, Deaconess at Dumas Wesley House, and Mrs. J. P. Roberts, this city, were introduced to the Conference.

Board of Finance.—R. J. Mills read Report No. 1 of the Conference Board of Finance, which was adopted, as follows:

REPORT NO. 1. CONFERENCE BOARD OF FINANCE

We note with pleasure that the Conference Endowment Fund, in the hands of the General Board of Finance, is gradually growing, and now amounts to \$76,421.89. This fund is working twelve months in the year at the rate of 6%. At this Conference your Board received a check from this Fund for \$3,555.98, to be distributed among the Conference claimants, which is \$916.42 more than received last year.

It is also interesting to note that the General Fund is growing, and that it now amounts to \$3,633,150.99. However, there is \$349,560.04 of this sum that is subject to annuity. Our claimants received from the General Fund this year \$3,132.96, which is considerably more than they received from the same Fund last year.

There is one feature about the Superannuate Endowment Fund that is very humiliating. That is the ranking of the Alabama Conference with the other Conferences as to percentage paid on amount assumed. Our Conference stands down near the bottom. Her place is 31. We are not satisfied with this, and do not believe that the pastors and congregations of the Alabama Conference are.

We therefore recommend that the pastors bestir themselves, and use whatever means seem best to them to arouse the conscience of our people on the question of Superannuate Endowment, and use the most practical plan to raise the amount assumed during the next quadrennium. Let each pastor make an honest effort to raise at least one-fourth each year of the amount of his congregation, until the whole shall have been paid.

We further recommend that the month of April, next year, be observed as Superannuate Endowment Month.

Thirdly, we recommend that Dr. R. R. Ellison be appointed as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment.

Southern Assembly.—E. L. Crawford read resolutions concerning Southern Assembly at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, which were adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON LAKE JUNALUSKA

The Alabama Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has received with interest the proposal of the stockholders and commissioners of the Southern Assembly to convey the ownership and administration of the Assembly to a Board of Trustees to be elected by Annual Conferences East of the Mississippi River. Since this proposal was received, sixteen annual Conferences have accepted it and have elected trustees.

Therefore, be it resolved, first, that the Alabama Conference accepts the offer of the Southern Assembly and agrees to co-operate with the other Annual Conferences in the administration of the affairs of the institution.

Second, that the Alabama Conference does not assume any liability for any financial obligations of Southern Assembly, nor is said Conference either legally or morally obligated for any present or future indebtedness of the said Assembly.

The trustees, their successors or the participating Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, lying East of the Mississippi River, or any other Board, body or corporation to whom said property may be conveyed, shall not become liable for the payment of the indebtedness, and the assumption of this deed of conveyance, or the conveyance authorized hereunder shall not be construed to make such conferences, or their trustees or boards liable for or obligated to pay any of said indebtedness.

Third, that Rev. W. M. Lantrip be elected as Trustee of the Assembly to serve one year, and that Mr. J. A. Bullock be elected to serve as Trustee for two years, and as their terms expire, one Trustee be elected for a term of two years at each session of this Conference hereafter.

Fourth, that the Board of Trustees shall submit annually to each of the co-operating Conferences a full report of the condition and operation of the Assembly together with such recommendations as the Board may deem advisable.

Fifth, that a standing committee of seven—four preachers and three laymen—consisting of C. A. Rush, O. V. Calhoun, Norman McLeod, J. S. Chadwick, O. L. Tompkins, Judge T. E. Knight, and S. H. Blan, be elected for the quadrennium, to which the Board of Trustees shall make the annual report.

REV. JOHN ALBERT PETERSON, D.D.

Rev. J. A. Peterson, son of Dr. Francis M. Peterson and Mrs. Amanda Shivers Peterson, was born at Greensboro, Ala., May 19, 1850. At ten years of age he joined the Church and at twenty-one was licensed to preach. He graduated with A. M. in 1871 at the Southern University. That fall he joined the Alabama Conference and was sent to the Citronelle Circuit. He was my father's nephew and boarded in our home during that year. He was fine looking, well educated, very friendly and exceedingly popular on the circuit. In the home he was kind and thoughtful and greatly beloved by the family. I recall vividly what a comfort he was to my invalid mother. His active ministry included fifty-one years, during which time he served the following charges: Citronelle Circuit, 1872; Mobile City Mission, 1873. During the summer of this year he was transferred to Union Springs, where he remained until the close of 1874. Troy, 1875; St. Paul, Mobile, 1876, 1877; Livingston, 1878; Gainesville, 1879-1882; Milton, Florida, 1883, 1884; Beulah, 1885, 1886; Evergreen, 1887, 1888; Uniontown, 1889; Mobile District, 1890-1893; Selma District, 1894-1896; Greensboro District, 1897-1900; Eufaula, 1901-1904; Tuskegee, 1905, 1906; Marianna District, 1907, 1908; Dothan District, 1909; Union Springs, 1910, 1911; Gadsden Street, Pensacola, 1912-1915; Forest

Avenue, 1916-1919; Evergreen, 1920; Geneva, 1921, 1922. Dr. Peterson was married three times. On December 16, 1875, he was married to Miss Mary Ellen Rush at Marion, Ala. She died June 15, 1895. Six children were born to this union, Francis Ruth, James Jesse, Edgar A., John Albert, Rivers Andrew, and Mary Ellen, who is now Mrs. James Ward, of Tuscaloosa, Ala. John died several years ago. Mary and Rivers were the only children who could reach their father at the time of his death. In 1897 he married Miss Hortense Baugh, who did not live a great while. On June 11, 1903, he married Miss Barnie May Wade, at Montevallo, Ala., who survives him. Dr. Peterson was a man of clean lips, his conversation was pure and chaste. He had a clear-cut conversation and never doubted his acceptance with God. His preaching was earnest and faithful. He spoke out of his own convictions. He firmly believed the fundamental doctrines of Methodism, and was never weary of proclaiming them. At the close of 1922 he superannuated and made his home in Montgomery until the time of his going away. As long as he was able he taught a class in the Sunday School of the Forest Avenue Church. For several years before his death he was weak and spent much of his time in the wheel chair. His wife was his constant and faithful companion during those days of forced confinement. She gave him every possible attention. His son, Rivers Peterson, writes me, "I never expect to see greater devotion than she has shown him. In fact, but for her love and constant care he would have died long ago." He was exceedingly anxious to attend the last session of the Alabama Conference at Montgomery. His physician advised against it, but he went down one day and watched the preachers come out of the church at noon and shook hands with some of his friends. I was guest in his home during that Conference and saw the end was near but I knew he was ready. Like Paul he knew in whom he had believed and was persuaded that he was able to keep that which he had committed unto him against that day. On a blessed Sabbath, just after the noon hour, March 16, 1930, God took his servant home. The end came quietly. On the following Tuesday he was buried in Greenwood Cemetery. Rev. I. W. Chalker and Rev. R. R. Ellison officiated at the funeral. The other Methodist preachers of the city acted as pall bearers.

OBITUARY OF REV. T. B. BARROW OF THE ALABAMA CONFERENCE

Rev. Thaddeus B. Barrow was born in Barbour County on the 12th day of March, 1866, being the eldest son of William and Louise McDonald Barrow. While Thaddeus was about two years of age the family moved to Ozark, Ala., and there he grew through the years of his boyhood and young manhood. There were six children in the home, one of whom died in infancy. A sister, Mrs. Britt, of Geneva, died in 1900. Three sisters survive him.

Those who knew him when he was a boy and a young man say there never was one better than he was. He had only the advantages coming from the local public schools in the community but he applied himself in fidelity and was well up with the best among his comrades. During his young life he loved the church and grew into all of her activities with the affection of his soul. He felt the call of God to preach the gospel for a number of years before he finally asked for this privilege, feeling that he was not worthy to assume this responsibility.

At the age of twenty-six he knocked at the door of the Alabama Conference for admission on trial, and at the session meeting in Eufaula in December of 1892 he was received. The years of 1893-4 he served the Oche circuit, 1895-6 Wewahitchka, 1897-98 Freeport, 1899-1900 DeFuniak Springs and Bonifay, 1901-2-3 Sweetwater, 1904-5 Butler and Mount Sterling, 1907-8 West Green, 1908-9-10 Pine Barren, 1911-12 Bells Landing, 1913-14 Pine Hill, 1915-16 Havana, 1917 Cottonwood, 1918 Slocomb, 1919 Daleville, 1920-21 East Brewton, 1922-23 Asbury, 1924 Rutledge, 1925-26 Vernon, 1927 Jay, 1928 Barrineau Park and 1929-30 Pittsview. While in the faithful discharge of his duties as a pastor he heard the summons—"It is enough, come up higher" and on the 12th day of April the laborer was called from labor to refreshment.

While serving the DeFuniak and Bonifay charge he was happily married to Miss Ola Owens on December 5th, 1900. In her he found his strength and

support as they journeyed side by side along the pathway of life. To them were born six children, Owens, Myrtle, Glenn, Louise, Thaddeus and Ralph—all living to follow in the example of their father. The mother, with the younger children have moved to Brewton, Ala., where they will make their future home, the body of Rev. T. B. Barrow having been placed in the cemetery there to await the coming of the resurrection.

The above dates and facts give to us windows through which we can look and behold one of the finest spirits of our Christian faith. Brother Barrow was a man of strong convictions and a man who possessed uncompromising ideals. He was strong and clean himself and he expected that all other believers should be as he was. He played the game of life as "An Outfielder," but no one can charge that he did not play it well. He never served any of the leading charges in his conference, but he served where the work was hard and where the sacrifices were great, but he did his best in his own way and his labors are not in vain in the Lord.

He loved his pulpit and was never too tired or too much interested in other things to fail to meet his appointments. He was like the hour hand that moves around the dial of the clock, and when the time came for him to meet his duty in the stand he was there on time, and he was ready to put his best into the effort. He loved his people. If there was sickness, or trouble, he never failed to be there to minister and to give comfort. The night was never too dark and the distance too long for him to refuse when his presence would prove a blessing. He served many charges, and thus he multiplied his friends into the hundreds and at the last day they are going to rise to call him blessed.

As a preacher he was safe and thoughtful. The Bible to him was the Word of God, and he believed it and preached it as such. He was not eloquent in voice and figure, but he was forceful in thought and in the power of the Holy Ghost. The most eloquent part of his ministry was not as much in what he said as in the way he lived. His life is an index finger that points us to the better world, and we know where to find him. "I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth. Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors."

D. D. REEVES

Dowdell D. Reeves was born near Tallassee, Ala., on May 29th, 1856. He was the son of Davenport G. and Mary Ann Lee Reeves. When about eighteen years of age he united with the Church under the ministry of the Rev. Lewis F. Dowdell, for whom he may have been named in infancy. The inspiration of a beloved pastor frequently directs and guides youth into the Church and its service.

We know little of his activity as a layman in the Church. In July, 1886, he was granted license to preach and at the session of the Alabama Conference held in Montgomery in December of the same year he was admitted on trial and appointed to the Cottonwood Mission.

On December 29th, 1885, he was united in marriage to Miss Leila E. Blanks, who was his faithful companion until about a year before his death. This union was blessed with seven children, who were a comfort to their parents during the evening of their earthly lives.

Brother Reeves served Cottonwood Circuit the two years of his Conference probation (1887 and 1888) and was admitted into full connection at the session of the Conference held in Mobile in 1888, and at the same time ordained to the office of Deacon by Bishop R. K. Hargrove.

Brother Reeves' service as an itinerant preacher was short. Some time in young manhood he had suffered a serious accident which crippled him for life and contributed to a condition of generally poor health. These physical afflictions unfitted him for the pursuance of an effective itineracy. In 1889, he served the Choctaw Circuit and Mission, and in 1890 the Clifton Circuit. At the Conference of 1890, quoting the record, "he was continued in the class of the fourth year, and on motion, his name was referred to the committee on Conference Relations for the Superannuate Relation," which relation he held at that time for a single year. In 1892 he served Harmony Circuit and Mission and at the session held at Eufaula

that year he was ordained Elder by Bishop O. P. Fitzgerald. In 1893 and 1894 he served the Pleasant Grove Circuit, after which he was again placed on the Superannuate roll, which relation he held until his death this year.

Brother Reeves was not well known by the brethren of the Conference. His short time of effective service and his uncommunicative attitude has kept him separated from the fellowship of the Conference.

He was true to the doctrines of the church. Of himself he said: "In all the years of my ministry no one has ever accused me of preaching anything contrary to the doctrines of the Church to which I belong and love."

His time of superannuation was spent in Tallassee, near his old home, and in Birmingham, among his children, doing what little he could for the Church to which he had hoped to give a life of effective service. On two occasions he supplied unexpired vacancies in the North Alabama Conference. God shall reward him according to the measure of his faithfulness.—*J. E. Tate.*

REV. JOHN A. THOMPSON, D.D.

JOHN ALTAMONT THOMPSON, son of T. W. and Mary Wilder Thompson, was born in Franklin, now Colbert County, Alabama, December 15, 1841. He was educated in the rural schools about his home and at the old Academy which was conducted by a scholarly Christian gentleman whose personality inspired the youth with an ambition to inquire into every branch of learning—a habit which went with him through his long and useful life. He was prepared for college and his parents had planned for his entrance to the University of Virginia when the Civil War broke out and forever ended that aspiration. In 1861 young Thompson volunteered in the Confederate Army and joined Rev. David Campbell Kelley's Cavalry Company which was a part of General Forest's original regiment. Colonel Kelley wrote a long letter to the War Department of the Confederacy commending young Thompson's bravery and ability and later Forest cited him for "conspicuous service." Young Thompson was severely wounded at Stone's River, Murfreesboro, Tennessee. From this wound he was a constant sufferer to the day of his death. His record during the four awful years of carnage and strife between the states is an enviable one, full of daring and notable service to the Confederacy.

Dr. Thompson was converted at the age of thirteen and licensed to preach at the age of nineteen by the Quarterly Conference of the Chickasaw Circuit on the fourteenth of August, 1860. At the same time and by the same body he was recommended to the Tennessee Conference, which then included Alabama, for admission on trial. He was duly admitted on trial at Clarksville, Tennessee, October 13, 1860. Bishop George F. Pierce presided at this Conference and often Dr. Thompson said that the greatest sermon he ever heard was preached by this Prince of Pulpiters on Sunday of this Conference. Bishop Soule was also present and preached during the Conference. The impressions made by those men, especially Bishop Pierce, endured the ravages of seventy years in the life of the youthful preacher. At this Conference he was assigned to Madison Circuit in the Huntsville District, as Junior Preacher with Rev. Milus E. Johnson as preacher in charge. During the stormy four years of war which followed, the youth was unable to attend a session of the Conference. However, in October, 1865, he with sixty-seven others, was ordained both Deacon and Elder by Bishop Kavanaugh who presided over the Conference that year. From that ragged and torn but impressive assembly Dr. Thompson was assigned to Farmington Circuit as Preacher in Charge. In 1867 he was assigned to Prospect Circuit where, as he afterwards said, he enjoyed the richest year of his ministry. He received over three hundred into the Church that Conference year.

In November, 1870, Bishop Robert Paine organized the North Alabama Conference at Gadsden, Alabama, and Brother Thompson became a charter member and was elected Secretary, a position he occupied for eighteen years. He was also Assistant Secretary to the General Conference which met in Nashville, Tennessee, with Rev. T. O. Summers as Secretary. Dr. Summers was taken desperately ill and died during the Conference and Dr. Thompson acted as Secretary in the place of his Chief. A little later on our subject was elected Associate Editor of the *Alabama Christian Advocate* under Dr. Christian, Editor-in-Chief.

In 1890 Bishop Haygood asked Dr. Thompson to transfer to the South Georgia Conference, and in this good Conference he served until he transferred to the Alabama Conference in 1904. In our Conference Dr. Thompson served the following Charges: LaPine 1905, Camden 1906, Marion 1907 to 1910, Tuskegee 1911 to 1913 and Forest Avenue, Montgomery, 1914 and 1915. At the conclusion of this year, Dr. Thompson took the Superannuate relation. For a time he resided in Montgomery, later moving to Dothan, Alabama, and during the last three years he lived at Huntsville where he had served as Pastor four years and Presiding Elder four years in his earlier ministry and from here he went home to join the Conference on High. In all he had labored in the active ministry fifty-five years. He had served five charges four years each, five charges three years each, five charges two years each and the remainder one year each.

Though deprived of a higher classical education, Dr. Thompson was a scholar of no mean ability. His fine intellect, splendid poise and extensive reading marked him as a superior man and an unusual preacher. In recognition of his ability and scholarship the University of Alabama conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Perhaps the happiest recollections of this hero of the cross clustered around Huntsville where so much of his ministry was spent, and where he met and married Miss Lenah A. Patterson, on December 11, 1884. She was the daughter of General Benjamin and Sarah Patterson. No truer helpmate ever traveled with an itinerant. She was the ministering angel of his life and one might say she closed his eye lids down when he fell on death, June 16, 1930.

Dr. Thompson was an unusual man. He was courageous, firm and aggressive, yet these were veiled with charity, a benevolent eye and a conciliating voice. It was a rare privilege to consult with him as the writer often did in his early ministry. His mental uprightness, his candor and love always made one go away saying "We took sweet counsel together." He judged himself severely, but others charitably, he scrutinized his own conscience and hence searched the conscience of another by his frankness with his own faults. Old age has its infirmities, and sometimes blunders in the closing days mar the work of earlier years. It was not so with Dr. Thompson. The older he became the sweeter he grew. The writer had the privilege of being his pastor for two years. He was always in his place at the church and a most sympathetic listener. Invariably he would have something helpful to say of the service. He was one man whose ability as a preacher and minister never hampered the ministry or preaching of his younger brethren, but rather stimulated every one who ministered to him. As a friend he was frank without being harsh, confiding without being embarrassing, and sympathetic without being gushy. Let the church give thanks that God vouched safe the influence of such a man to her through more than half a century of noble ministry. The soldier of Christ has put off his armor, his conflicts have ended, his work is finished, he rests in peace. His son, John A., Jr., and his noble wife remain to mourn his going, but "Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."—*A. E. Shafer.*

OBITUARY OF REVEREND CHARLES PRESCOTT ATKINSON

Charles Prescott Atkinson was born in Newton, Alabama, August 31, 1867, the oldest child of C. V. and Mary Eason Atkinson, whose high character and exemplary lives had created a Christian home for his growth and development, and transmitted to him the splendid heritage of a good name, and a brilliant mind, and a cheerful spirit. They brought him up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, placing his feet in the path of the just that shineth more and more unto the perfect day, and he walked worthy of his high calling. In addition to the Godly example of his father and mother, ministers and religious leaders were regular guests in the home.

At the age of twelve he joined the Methodist Church at Pleasant Hill, on the Ozark Circuit, under pastorate of Rev. E. M. Turner. In November of 1886 he was licensed to preach at Haveridge Church on Ozark Circuit. Rev. Angus Dowling was the pastor and Rev. Henry D. Urquhart was the presiding elder.

This step was not a surprise to his friends, for as they expressed it, "He was always a good boy."

After completing elementary school at Newton, Alabama, he entered Southern University. From this historical institution he obtained his B. S. and M. A. Degrees, and later when he had proven his great worth for his Master in the field of Christian service and education, his Alma Mater conferred upon him the Degree of D. D. He obtained his Ph.D. Degree from Wesleyan University.

He was admitted on trial at the Conference held in Pensacola in 1890 presided over by Bishop Granberry, and appointed to the pastorate of Marianna, Florida. At the Conference held in Eufaula in 1892 he was admitted into full connection by Bishop Fitzgerald. He served the following charges in the order given: Marianna, Geneva, Holt St. Church, Montgomery; Camden, Dayton, Uniontown. September, 1904, to 1918 he held the Chair of Philosophy in Southern University. When the two Conference colleges were united in the spring of 1918, Dr. Atkinson refused a Chair in the merger institution, and was appointed to the pastorate at Thomasville in 1919. He served Samson and Hartford from 1920 to 1922. In 1923-24 he served his last charge, Chipley, Fla. Here he did a remarkable work. It was during his pastorate that the first offering was taken for the magnificent Educational Building just completed. It was there in the midst of strenuous devotion to the things of the ministry that a nervous breakdown made it necessary for him to ask for Superannuate relation. All that medical skill could do was of no avail to bring back to health the worn body.

On the night of October 22nd, he retired at his usual hour. At one-thirty, he was called to resume his work, which John in his prophecy tells us is serving God continually about the Throne.

On October 14th, 1896, he was married to Miss Jessie Laird, of Geneva, Alabama. She helped largely to make his days of usefulness and popularity in the University and the pastorate. In his five years of illness he would have departed earlier had she not sustained the will to live. It is the comment of her intimate friends: "Her reward will be great in the other world." There were two children who came to gladden the home: Arthur Laird, of St. Louis, Mo., and Erin (now Mrs. Farmer), of Macon, Ga.

In the pastorate and as Professor in the University he found as his chief recreation and enjoyment association with the people of his congregation and the college students. No member of his flock was beyond his interest and concern. No college student, however, backward or at a disadvantage in culture, and the niceties of life escaped his encouraging words, and assurance of friendship.

He was not an opportunist in his pastorate. He did not use methods which might for the time being further his own interests, but tomorrow reflect on his brother successor, and place him at a disadvantage. The crowning excellency in the character of Dr. Atkinson was his Consecration to Christ. Thus whether in the pastorate administering to his people, or in the lecture room surrounded by college boys, or in his humble cottage in Chipley, with his natural strength abated, and disease gradually claiming him as its prey, he could join the ancient Hebrew writer who said: The Lord has given and the Lord has taken away, Blessed be the Name of the Lord.

Fifteen of his brother ministers were present at his funeral. Revs. D. Y. Register, J. F. McLeod, C. C. Wilkerson, and R. J. Mills, his old college students, and W. H. Venters, his former pastor, conducted the services. His brother ministers acted as pall bearers. About his cottage blooms a flower garden in which he loved to work, but more important are the flowers of faith and love which will continue to bloom in the hearts and lives of many who chanced to be associated with him, and were touched by his life.

It is a life like his that inclines his former pupils and associates to raise their voices in petitions to the Creator of the Universe and pray: "Lord keep us young enough to laugh with little children, and sympathetic enough to be considerate of old age, and when comes the day of darkened shades, the smell of flowers, the tread of soft footsteps, and the crunching of wheels in the yard, may we have been of some use to our fellowmen in pointing them to the 'Lamb of God who lives eternally in the Heavens!'"

FIFTH DAY—EVENING SESSION

MOBILE, ALA., November 23, 1930.


