# WYATT FAMILY: Wirtten by Leonardo Andrea, Easley Progress Issue: 10 Sept 1942

The Wyatts in England descend from an almost legendary Admiral Guyot which is the French spelling of Wyatt. After the Battle of Hasgins in 1066 William rewarded his followers by grants of land. To Admiral Guyot he gave a large estate in County Kent, England. This later became the seat of the Wyatt Family. Our generation begins with Adam Wiatt 1320-1385. His wife was Lady Agnes Wigton a d/o Sir Wigton de Norwoods. In 1621 the Rev. Haute Wyatt came to Jamestown VA. His oldest brother Sir Francis Wyatt, was twice the governor of Virginia. He brought the Rev. Haute to

Jamestown as his chaplain.

In the year 1800 Elijah Waytt 1774-1858 moved to Abbeville County SC from Fairfax Co VA and settled near Broadmouth Baptist Church where he and his wife are buried. In 1847 he took up a land grant of 947 acres near Shady Grove in Anderson Co SC where he died.

James Foster Wyatt 1801-1868, son of Elijah, and Nancy his wife the d/o Mary Rosemond and William Pyle are buried at Pisgah Church. Redmond Grigsby Wyatt 1806-1857, son of Elijah, and his second wife are buried at Pisgah Baptist Church His first wife was Elizabeth Richey 1810-1842 the d/o Elizabeth Agnew Dunn and James Richey.

John Newton Wyatt 1838-1914, Redmond Wyatts son, married Elizabeth McAlister Smith and is buried at Easley. Children: Dr. Edwards Franklin Waytt married Margaret Cox Findley, Dr Charles Newton m. Addis Sitton Pickens, Dr William Redmond Wyatt m. 1st Addis Ballentine Daniel 2nd Nancy Babb, Eva Elizabeth Waytt m. Edward Harleston Poore, Hattie Virginia Waytt m. William A. Mauldin, Joshua Kirby Wyatt died young.

Redmond Grigsby Wyatt m. 2nd Eleanor Ann "Nellie" Seawright d/o Margaret Stewart Richey and Col. Andrew Seawright.

Margaret Luani Wyatt 1844-1917, Redmond's daughter, m. John Henderson and is buried at Fairview Children: L. Ross m. Sarah Arial Craig, Redmond G. m. Laura Acker, James C. "Bud" m. Lelia Breazeale Pepper, Newton m. Mildred Cox Pinson, Samuel m. Maud Breazeale Pepper, William P. "Babe" died unmarried, Essie died unmarried, Jessie m. Oscar Breazeale Pepper, Zoe m. MRS WYATT'S BIRTHDAY: On Tuesday 27 March Mrs Andrew Grigsby Wyatt of this city celebrated her 92nd birthday anniversary. Mrs Wyatt and her late husband were early settlers of Easley coming here following their marriage in 1876. She is the d/o Richard Lenhardt and Sara Jane Garrison Lenhardt of the Lenhardt Community and prior to her marriage was Miss Lucinda Eveline Lenhardt.

When Mrs Wyatt came to Easley as a bride it was just 2 years after Easley had received its charter in 1874. The town then embraced a district one mile square with the depot in the center. It has been her privilege to watch her home town grow from a small country village to a modern little city of nearly 6,000 inhabitants. The one community public school built the year she and her husband came

here has been replaced by one of the best small public school systems in the state.

The few scattered stores have disappeared with the years and in their stead stand many fine modern brick structures. Textile plants and industrial community houses have long ago uprooted the chinquapin bushes, broom sage, scrub oaks and pines that ran rampant over the unkept land that Mrs Wyatt well remembers. Old Dobbin has been replaced by many many horseless carriages and there has been quite a transition in everything in general since 1876, she declares...

She is content to rest in her comfortable old home on South First Street with its yards full of old old box wood, old-fashioned flowering shrubs and fine old trees. Easley Progress Issue: 3 April 1947

WYATT PAPERS: Miss Mary Hendricks and her brother Ralph of Allington Farm, Easley have given to the Historical Commission of South Carolina, Columbia, a collection of about one hundred interesting papers which were taken from a trunk which belonged to their grandfather, Redmond Grigsby Wyatt 1806-1857. Some of the papers date back to 1790 and consists of receipts, letters, deeds and family data. The collection has been placed in seperate files and is given as a memorial to the late Mrs Rebecca Josephine Wyatt Hendricks, mother of the donors. Easley Progress Issue: 17 Aug 1944.

1766 Frances Newton b. 2 Nov 1747 d. 15 June 1783 who is buried in Prince William Co VA. William Wyatt Jr m. 2nd 25 Dec 1788 Elizabeth Snow b. 18 Feb 1754 d. 21 May 1842 and buried in Davies Co, MO. From tombstone at Greenville Presbyterian Church, Greenwood Co SC near Abbeville Co line.

WIAT\WYATT: From one of my long time friends: Guy R. Smith Jr., 11407 Cloverlawn Drive, Brighton, MI 48116. He sent me three photos of these Wyatt cousins in England. They would not copy to use in the Newsletter, as they are to dark. Guy acquired these photo's on one of his many visits to Lord Romney in England.

These photos were given to Guy by his Wyatt cousin, Lord Romney of England: Guy states that many of his Pendleton District, South Carolina Smith Clansmen and Women would be related to these three persons of "Olde."

Sir Henry Wyatt of Yorkshire, England later Allinton Castle, Kent Co., England. He had supported Henry VII against King Richard III and on the accession of Henry VII, was admitted to his privy council and later became one of Henry VII's executors and Henry VIII's guardian. Henry Wyatt later was admitted to Henry VIII's privy Council in 1509 and later became treasurer to the Kings Chamber in 1524.

Sir Thomas Wyatt, The Poet, Son of Sir Henry Wyatt and Anne Skinner of Pergate, Surrey, England, was admitted to St. John's College, Cambridge at 12 years of age. He graduated there with a B.A. in 1518 and an M.A. in 1520. He married Elizabeth, d/o Thomas Brooke, the Third Lord Cobham, sometime before 1520. He was Knighted on 18 March 1537 and thereafter his career was almost entirely diplomatic. The photo is of a plate by a famous artist. Lucus Cornelii.

George Wyatt, Esq., the son of Sir Thomas Wyatt, The younger, and Jane. d/o Sir William Hawte, of Bishopsbourne, Kent, England. George married Jane, d/o Sir Thomas Finch. They had five sons and four daughters. Only two sons lived a full span and left children of their own.

- 1. Francis the eldest married in 1618 Margaret the d/o Sir Samuel Sandys son and heir to Archbishop, Edwin Sandys. He later became the first Royal Governor of the Crown Colony of Virgina--this is the Earl of Romneys line.
- 2. The Rev. Hawte Wyatt named after the family of his maternal grandmother, was born in 1594. He attended Queens College, Oxford in 1611. He did not take a degree but was ordained sometime before 1621. He accompained his brother Francis to Jamestown, VA as a Preacher. Rev. Nimrod Smith married a Wyatt descendant, Lettice Wyatt and their daughter married Capt Aaron Smith.
- I (Guy) might add that the Wyatts of England were cousins to Queen Anne Boleyn, to Queen Elizabeth 1st and to Queen Catherine Howard. Bothe Boleyn and Howard were the two Queens

beheaded by Henry VIII. Even the present Queen Elizabeth II can't tie lines this far back in English History.

Capt. Aaron Smith was the s/o Jonathan Smith and his first marriage to Margaret\Katherine Guyton. Captain Aaron Smith's line goes back to a rather famous personage of Western Virginia Colony fame Viz: Col. John Smith and Margaret of Augusta Co., VA.

I am informed that by the appointment of Guardians by you for the children that the estate may be divided giving to the Guardian of each child his or her portion and that if the land is not worth more than a thousand dollars the widow may petition you its sale for partition and that the whole estate may be settled with the interception of the Court of Equity, I am inclined to think this will be the best thing that can be done both for the widow and children, she by special agreement with such guardian as she may select herself, she being a responsible indiviual, may still keep the children, and besides this she may buy the land and have her own share at her own disposal. She won't no longer be in bondage but free as air, to move, to marry or otherwise as she may think best? These views are given for her serious consideration and you will be so good as to communicate them. I have no doubt but that if she has her portion to herself and at command she won't marry directly and settle herself which is certainly desirable. At the age of 16 years or to be more exact she was happily married to Mr James B. Hester who was a widower with three children. They settled at his home on the Oolenoy River, whre he owned a farm of find bottom land, and when the War Between the State began, he like many of his neighbors was called to the front and until the surrender in 1865, his young wife had to care for his children and manage the farm. she was equal to the emergency and when he returned home from the war he found plenty of corn in his crib and bacon in the smokehouse. In 1884 Mr Hester moved to Easley to secure the advantages of the schools here for his children. The family had increased, Mrs Hester was the mother of ten children, nine sons and one daughter. One of the sons died in infancy and the daughter Sallie a beautiful and lovely young girl also became a victim of the grim reaper just as she was budding into young womanhood. The eight sons all of whom survive their mother are Balus M. Hester of Calhoun GA. James B. of Tryon NC, Elbert and Robert M. of Oklahoma, William B. and E.J. of Easley and Ralph M. of Texas. #### Individual biographical text for Basil Smith Porter

It is believed by some descendants that Basil Smith Porter was named after his Mother's brother, BASIL SMITH.

<u>PICKENS DISTRICT, S. C. 1830 CENSUS:</u> BASIL PORTER is household number 997, with one male between 20-30 and one female 15-20.

<u>PICKENS DISTRICT, S. C. 1840 CENSUS:</u> Name spelled BASDALE PORTER is household number 1230, with one male under five; two males between 5 and 10; one male between 20-30; one female under five; 2 females 5 to 10; and one female between 20-30. ALEXANDER COOPER is listed as household number 1229. PHILIP PORTER is listed as number 1231.

PICKENS DISTRICT, S. C. 1850 CENSUS: Number 767 is BASIL S. PORTER, male, age 47, occupation of farming with value of \$800, born in SC as is the entire household. Vashti, female, age 37; John T., 19, male; Alexander, 17, male; Mary S., 15, female; Nancy A.(or E.), 14, female; Philip A., male, 12; Martha A., 10, female; James H., 9, male; Hannah, 3 female; Warren J. (or I), 1, male; and David S., 2/12 (two months), male.

The signature of BASSEL S. PORTER is found on a receipt in the Probate papers of the Estate of SION COOPER. It is noteworthy that he wrote and spelled his name "Bassel." Unfortunately, his relationship to SION COOPER is not stated in the receipt: "Received of W. J. Parsons, O. P. D. two dollars & 18/100 dollars in full of my distributive share of the Real Estate of Sion Cooper, deceased. April 10th 1857." Signed: BASSEL S. PORTER.

In <u>SOME SOUTH CAROLINA COUNTY RECORDS</u>, VOL. 2, is an abstraction of the will of SION COOPER found in Box 3, #29, Pickens, SC. Will dated 23 Feb.1831 and proven 7 Nov. 1831. Children named are Ancel, Nancy, Polly, Lewis, Alexander, Rahab, Vincon, Delile, Sale Cooper. Wife, Polly Cooper. Executrix, wife Polly Cooper. Witnesses: Micajah Hughes, John Field, Sr., John Ferguson. Heirs listed were BASEL S. PORTER, grandson DAVIS COOPER. RAHAB FIELDS, WARREN COOPER, NANCY COOPER, HANNAH COOPER, MATILDA COOPER, ELIZABETH STACKY, ROBERT F. MORGAN, J. L. KILBY? Owned 132 acres on waters of Cane Creek adj. lands of Jacob Schroder and others, perhaps James Kelly? Inventory made 4 Jan. 1832 by John Field, Sr., Joshua Mansell, William Mayfield.

PICKENS DISTRICT, S. C. 1860 CENSUS: Number 288 is the household of SMITH PORTER, age 60, with wife VASHTI, age 50. Their household includes James H., age 18, male; Hannah E., age 14, female; Warren I. (or J), age 11, male; David S. (or A), 9, male; and twin sons, Elbert R. and Jeremiah, age 7.

Information: In 1868, Pickens District was divided into the present counties of Pickens and Oconee. Walhalla became the county seat for Oconee and the town of Pickens became the county seat for Pickens. BASIL SMITH PORTER was living in that part of Pickens District which became Pickens County. In the 1870 and 1880 census, there is another version of the name Basil Smith Porter - BASWELL PORTER.

<u>PICKENS COUNTY, S. C. 1870 CENSUS:</u> On page 21, BASWELL PORTER is listed as household number 147. His age is given as 70; wife VASHTI is 57. Four of their sons are still in the household, Alexander, age 35; Davis, age 19: Elbert and Robert are 16.

<u>PICKENS COUNTY, S. C. 1880 CENSUS:</u> On page 30 is the family of BASWELL S. PORTER, age 79; VASHTI, age 68; and Alexander, age 48.

In <u>A COLLECTION OF UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA GENEALOGICAL and FAMILY RECORDS</u>, Vol. I; pg. 248: BASIEL S. PORTER Estate of Basiel S. Porter. Box 123 # 9. Probate Judge Office. Pickens, S. C. 1 Basiel S. Porter being of sound mind and disposing memory, etc. I will and desire my executrix as soon after my death as possible to pay my just debts with funeral expenses. I give my loving wife Vashti Porter during her life or widowhood, all my property both real and personal, for the support and education of my wife and children. I appoint my wife executrix. Dated 13 July 1863. Wit: J. E. Hagood, Willie Waldrop, Benjamin Hagood. Signed Basiel S. Porter. Filed 22 May 1894.

Comment: It is interesting to note that this will was written in 1863.

From A COLLECTION OF UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA GENEALOGICAL and FAMILY RECORDS, Vol. I; pg. 249: B. S. PORTER. In Equity, Pack 243, # 6. Clerk of Court Office. Pickens, S. C. In the Court of Common Pleas; Nancy E. Sanders, Hannah Sanders, Martha Waldrop, and Mary Roper. Plaintiffs vs. W. R. Price, Defendant. The Plaintiffs shows that in the year 1894 B. S. PORTER died intestate seized of all that tract of land on waters of Twelve Mile Creek, adj. land of W. R. Prices, J. H. Porter, estate of John T. Porter and other containing 150 acres. That the plaintiffs are heirs in law of said B. S. Porter, decd. and are entitled to a one twelfth interest in said land. There is 32 acres that is subject to partition among the plaintiffs etc. And for such others and further relief as may be just. Date filed not given.

A COLLECTION OF UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA GENEALOGICAL and FAMILY RECORDS, Volume II, pg. 272: GEORGE ROPER. Pack 640 #3. Clerk of County Court Office. Pickens, S. C. On 23 June 1878 George Roper states that he is the husband of Mary Roper of Pickens Dist. and that her father B. S. PORTER died about 5 yrs. ago. That her father had 12 children but only 11 were living. (Believe 1878 to be a typo error.)

THE PICKENS SENTINEL, Thursday, April 12, 1894: A NONAGENARIAN. Mr. B. Smith Porter died on the 9th instant at the home of his son David at the age of 97 years. He was born at the Sam Porter Place about 1/4 mile from where he lived. Hence, all of the days of his long life was spent in Pickens County; while he was once respectively a citizen of Pendleton District, Pickens District and Pickens County. From the days of his boyhood he was a faithful member of the Methodist Church. His funeral was held at Porter's Chapel last Thursday.

Comment: The above obituary was transcribed from a handwritten copy sent by Michael Grant. There seems to be discrepancies in these days/dates.

#### Individual biographical text for Vashti Cooper

A list of heirs of SION COOPER are found on page 66 of A COLLECTION OF UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA GENEALOGICAL and FAMILY RECORDS, VOL. III: Book 1, Page 192. Clerk of Court Office. Pickens, S. C. On 21 Aug. 1854, he owned 132 acres on Cain Creek adj. land of Jacob Schroeder. Heirs: Nancy Smith, heirs of Absel Cooper, Robert F. Morgan, heirs of Alexr. Cooper, decd., heirs of Vincent Cooper, decd., James Kelly & wife Mary, Rahab Fields, Celia Nix, Lewis Cooper, John Ferguson, Warren Cooper, Hannah Cooper, Matilda Cooper, Eliza Starkey or Starkes??

On the 1850 United States Census of Pickens District - Eastern District:

BASIL S. & VASHTI PORTER are listed as house and family number 767.

House and family number 762 is WARREN COOPER, age 26, farmer; Nancy Cooper, age 27; Washington P Cooper, age 4, Vashti E. Cooper, age 2; Rebecca A. Cooper, age 9/12 (9 months).

Two females are found in house and family number 763. They are NANCY COOPER, age 33; and HANNAH COOPER, age 30.

Family and House number 764 is DAVIS COOPER, age 23; Elizabeth Cooper, age 22; and Alexander Cooper, age 2.

Number 766 is a female, CULPENA HEATON, age 30; Minerva Heaton, age 12; Vashti Heaton, age 5; and Lucy Heaton, age 8/12 (8 months).

In the same 1850 Census, number 765 is SAMUEL A. PORTER, age 35; and MARY PORTER, age 85. Mary was the widow of Philip Porter and Mother of Basil Smith Porter.

INFORMATION: The relationship between Vashti Porter and the Cooper and Heaton families living nearby is unknown. Reportly Vashti was a Cooper and the daughter of Alexander Cooper. It is interesting to note that there was a 5 year old Vashti Heaton in the Heaton household and a two year old Vashti E. Cooper in the household of Warren and Nancy Cooper. Davis and Elizabeth Cooper have a two year old ALEXANDER COOPER.

It is not known for sure that Vashti's maiden name was COOPER or that she was the daughter of ALEXANDER COOPER, but some descendents believe she was the daughter of Alexander. In a November 17, 1982 letter, Michael Grant of Greenville, SC writes: "Baziel married Vashti Cooper, daughter of Alexander Cooper who was the son of Sion Cooper. Vashti was supposedly of Indian ancestry. It has been said that she was so obese that the family had to make her a special chair and bed to accommodate her. She was born 30 August 1813. No record of her death."

In 1985, Mrs. S. C. Grant of Pickens, SC sent a copy of the History of Porter's Chapel. In an accompanying letter she stated, "Vashti Cooper was born August 30, 1813. I haven't been able to find a record of her death date. There are some graves at Porter's Chapel with markers so old you just can't read the names or dates."

In the short <u>History of Porter's Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church</u>, ALEXANDER COOPER is named as one of the first Trustees of the Church along with PHILIP PORTER and two of his sons, SMITH and THOMAS PORTER and Jacob Guyton.

# My Great Great Grandfather

Reuben Winfield Lee, Sr., <sup>1</sup> my great great grandfather, was born in 1823. (I think that he was born in North Carolina of James Lee and Nancy Elizabeth Wilson. This will be my next project!) Reuben was married about 1846 to *Gilley Caroline Ross*. Gilley was born on 26 July 1826 in Greenville District to John Henry Ross, Sr. (1804-1878) and Melissa Amelia Martin Hudson (1806-1880).

The Ross and Hudson families were both well known in the Greenville area. John Ross and his wife Melissa Hudson were living in Greenville District through the 1840 census, and they moved to the Pickens District about 1845. John and Melissa, along with several other children, lived in the Western section of the Pickens District (now Oconee County) in the 1850 census. Reuben and Gilley were married according to that census.

Reuben and Gilley had Nancy (age 13), Minerva C. (age 9), and Martha C. (age 2) in the 1860 census. Next door to them was the Elijah Calhoun family. Reuben and Gilley lived in the Cheohee Valley, and they seven children, one of who died at birth.

- 1) Nancy A. Lee was born on 18 April 1848 in Pickens District. She married William E. (Will) Orr (1850-1918). She died on 20 January 1920 and was buried next to Will in Bethlehem Baptist Church in Oconee County.
- 2) Mary Lee was born in 1849 in Pickens District. This infant died in 1850 and was buried in the Lee Family Cemetery.<sup>2</sup>
- 3) Minerva Caroline (Duck) Lee was born in November 1854 in Pickens District. Duck married Sheriff A. Haynes (1854-1928). She died on 05 March 1910 and was buried in the New Hope Baptist Church in Oconee County.
- 4) Martha C. (Mattie/Matt) Lee was born on 24 December 1858 in Pickens District. She remained single, died on 14 August 1929, and was buried in Cheohee Baptist Church in Oconee County.
- 5) Reuben Winfield (Sock) Lee, Jr., my great grandfather, was born on 05 April 1864 in Pickens District. Sock married Mary Catherine (Kate) Beaty (1866-1915) on 27 December 1886 in Oconee County. Sock died of typhoid fever on 12 September 1909 and was buried on 13 September 1909 in Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County. Kate was buried next to him later, surrounded by the graves of various Beaty families, including many of her father's family and her grandfather's family.
- 6) John James Lee was born on 06 April 1868 in Pickens District, which became Oconee County during the year. He married Mattie Emmeline Sheppard (1875-1956) on 28 September 1896 in Oconee County. John died on 18 Nov 1945 at Six Mile in Pickens County. He and Mattie were buried in the Cheohee Baptist Church. They had a bachelor son, Glen Austin Lee, who died early this year and was buried at the same church. This Lee Family is related to Carlos and Helen Lewis, members of this chapter. Carlos is the grandson of this John Lee and his wife Mattie.
- 7) Hattie Elmira (Hattie/Hatt) Lee was born about 1871 in what is now Oconee County. Hatt and Matt were both spinsters. Hattie died on 13 November 1909, also from typhoid fever<sup>3</sup> like Sock, and was buried in the Lee Family Cemetery. <sup>2</sup>


Gilley died on 29 September 1903 and was buried in the Lee Family Cemetery.<sup>2</sup> Hatt wrote a poem for the newspaper on Gilley's death. <sup>4</sup> Reuben's residence was burned on 14 April 1907. The origin of the fire was unknown.<sup>4</sup>

Reuben died in July 1910 and was also buried in the Lee Family Cemetery.<sup>2</sup>



### LETTER FROM: George Bowie, 900 Cleo Chapman Hwy., Sunset, SC 2965-9436

Dear Linda, (I have combined two letters)

My present BOWIE interest is centered on what happened to the descendants of Major John Bowie, a nephew of George Bowie, founder of the New England Bowie Dynasty. I have thought that my direct line Bowie ancestors, arriving in Abbeville District in 1805, were the first in South Carolina. Several items have turned up to prove otherwise. R.W. Simpson, in his "History of Old Pendleton District" mentions, among others, practicing law were Bowie and Bowie. Early census records show some Bowies residing in Old Ninety-Six District, SC.

While this line of Bowies are not closely related, I would like to further my study of this line. In addition Major John's and my own family line there are three others for which I have more satisfying information.

My children often remind me that I can use thousands of well chosen words to say nothing. I fear they speak the truth. That said, I will close with best wishes to you and yours.

Your item in the November 2000 OPD Newsletter credited me with age eighty-six and mentioned some areas of my family and history interests. Also, I must confess to being partially disabled, home bound with a hearing problem. Phone conversations are unproductive. Unfortunately, I must rely on the written word, a mode in which I am somewhat handicapped.

In addition to my own family lines, I have a great interst in the BIG EASTATOEE VALLEY; the scene of my birth and youthful years. My Lay-Anderson ancestors were very early, if not the first permanent settlers in the Valley.

I do not have a computer and I am not yet literate. My son, a project leader in the UNC, Chapel Hill computer operations, is trying to educate me and I look forward to replacing this Cannon Word Processor very soon. This processor had developed a mind of its own. It refuses to print some characters and to perform operations. Please excuse us.

All that having been said, the reason for this letter; The March Newsletter had a piece about Benjamin Hagood. That article brought to mind a piece; by my father, George Franklin Bowie (2), published in Pickens County Heritage. **VIZ:** 

### HISTORY OF THE NIMMONS POST OFFICE by George Franklin Bowie (2)

In the year 1889 George Franklin Bowie (1) applied for a Post Office in Big Eastatoee Valley, Pickens County, South Carolina. Colonel Ben Hagood, who owned land in the community, assisted in obtaining the Post Office; and suggested the name Nimmons in honor of Colonel Bill Nimmons. George Franklin Bowie (1) was appointed acting postmaster but died before he could give bond.

A man, whose name is not remembered, was then appointed postmaster. The office ran smoothly until he ran away because he was afraid of some bootleggers who accused him of reporting them. His wife collected all the material, tied it up in her apron, and brought it back to Mrs George Franklin Bowie (1), the former Mary Harriet Nimmons. She gave bond and served as postmaster for twelve years. She then resigned and people of Eastatoee traveled to Hazel Post Office, a distrance of four miles, to get their mail until 1902.

In 1902 Mrs Janie Robertson Bowie, wife of Erskin Calhoun Bowie and daughter-in-law of Harriet Bowie, reestablished the Nimmons Post Office and served for forty one years. She resigned 30 April 1943 because of ill health.

Mrs Grace Lewis Bowie, wife of George Franklin Bowie (2) and daughter-in-law of Harriet Nimmons Bowie, was appointed and served until 29 February 1960, the date of her retirement. The Nimmons Post Office was decomissioned on this date with operations being merged with the Sunset Post Office.

Thus the Nimmons Post Office has been in the Bowie family most of the time for the past seventy years.

Dear Linda,

I am pleased to report that my Quirie re Major John Bowie has produced some results.

Mary Mungo, a Reid descendant wrote with data taken from gravestones of both John and Rosa REID Bowie. The graves are located at Long Cane Cenetery near Abbeville. Also, from WILLS AND BONDS ABSTRACTS OF OLD NINETY-SIX AND ABBEVILLE DISTRICT: Will of Major John Bowie lists sons; George Jonathon, William, Alexander, and Samuel.

This information supports information from other sources not verified. When the New England kin lost contact, they knew of three sons: James, George and Alexander. Sources, not verified, tell that James died prior to 1 February 1 $\beta$ 20, the date the will as signed.

Number two son, George was a jurist Abbeville. Reportedly John C. Calhoun studied law in his office. Third son, Alexander, is said to have been Chancellor of Alabama. Perhaps, someone knows what that title encompasses.

From R. W. Simpsons HISTORY OF OLD PENDLETON DISTRICT; I read that Bowie and Bowie was one of the law firms in practice there.

More hearsay, not verified. I have been told of several Bowie graves in a church cemetery located in old Pickenville, just south of Easley.


Finding a present day descdendant of this Bowie line would MAKE MY DAY!

After a long and useful life , Captain Robert Pickens , died July 19th , 1830 ,and was buried in the family graveyard which had been located on his place .

Captain Robert Pickens , married Dorcas Hallum in Abbeville County , S.C. December 25th 1773 . Her long life wasone of devotion to her husband and children , and of usefulnessto her community , She was born February 1st ,1760 and died February 5th , 1828 , and liesburied by her husband in the Pickens graveyard .



Well! I guess buy now all of you have received your January 2001 Newsletter containing a stamp that stated .22 cents postage due, and some of you were required to go to the post office and buy your newsletter out of hock. I will now try to explain this to you.

When Old Pendleton went off of bulk mail and back to the postage stamp. I had the NL weighed and was told it cost .55 cents to mail. I mailed this NL for over one year at.55.

I took the Newsletter, to be mailed, to the post office on the 5th day of January, two days before the rate increase went into effect. By Monday I had received over 50 NL back asking for .22 cents postage. I then went to the post office and talked with the Post Master. He took the NL and weighed it and then said it cost .77 cents. I told him I mailed this NL on the 5th before the increase and he would not budge, so what to do! I had to put .22 cents on the ones that were returned and some of you had to pay the .22 cents. I am very sorry about all of this and hope this problem has been solved, at least for a while.

**So...**when the February NL came off the press, I took this to the PO and had them to weigh it (twice) and make sure that it cost .55 cents. I was assured it did.

At the January 16th OP Genealogical Meeting, some changes were approved for the NL. To keep from raising the dues, we voted to keep the NL at 24 pages. This can be mailed for .55 cents, with a small reduction in printing cost, we will be able to publish ten (10) Newsletter a year instead of nine (9). This will make up for some of the extra pages. It will cost less to publish 10 than to keep it at the level it is now. So you will be getting a Newsletter in December beginning this year.

Many "thanks" are extended to two people for getting in touch with me with most of the names of the Confederate Veterans picture posted in the January 2001 newsletter. They are: Alice Cox of Fairplay South Carolina and Fred Anthony of Pendleton, Interestingly, the picture had appeared in the newspaper, probably the Pickens Sentinel during the early 1900s. We aren't exactly sure the newspaper or it's date. But we did pinpoint that the date of June 3rd was a date set aside for Confederate Veterans reunions every year until there were no veterans left. The last ones between 1935 and 1941, with only two or three left. A Mrs T.J. Mauldin, President of the Pickens Chapter UDC, at that time, was responsible for keeping these reunions going. The names according to the old newspaper copy are as follows: Left to right (sitting): W.P. Davis, Matthew Hendrix, Rev. J.E. Foster, W.R. (Pete) Price, J -Calhoun Masters, W.E. McCollum, J.H. Gaines, H.D. Boggs, Charlie Childress, J.A. Abercrombie, --Jones, Robert Stewart. (Standing) Mrs T.J. Mauldin, president of Pickens chapter UDC holding the Flag, Elias Day, J. Tyre Looper, John Watson, R.B.A. Foster, D.L. Kay, W.T. Aiken, R.S. Orr, --Hendrix and D.H. Cotle. And yes there was another Confederate in my family line in the picture, Robert Stewart. FOLGER FAMILY: One of Pickens Countys most interesting citizens, Alonzo Trezevant "Trez" Folger of this city will mark his 90th birthday anniversary Monday. He was born at the home of his grandfather, Dr Alfred Moore Folger at Pickensville on 4 Oct 1864 before the town of Easley came into existance. His parents who made their home in Greenville at the Old Mansion House, where the Poinsett Hotel now stands, came over to visit dr and Mrs Folger at Pickensville two days before their son was born. When young Alonzo was 12 days old his parents took him to their greenville home. The trip was made in a carry-all simething like an old fashined surrey, with carpet and fancy trimmings. However the conveyance was open and during the trip the infant developed a serouis cold with complications. He was so ill that his parents were afraid of losing him and felt that the expert care and treatment that a physician Dr. Trezevant gave him was responsible for their son's recovering from his illness so they addred "Trezevant" to is name, and Mr Folger has been called "Trez" ever since. When the Folgers returned to the Old Mansion House with their baby in Oct 1864, greenville was a much different city from the present metropolis. Instead of pavement, there was mud--mud on all the streets and Yankee soldiers were all over town. Mr Folder was the first Justice of the Peace in Yavapi County, Arizona when there was no law and order in the territory, except the Vigilantes. I put on my six shooter as soon as I put on my pants each morning, he said. The Indians were still on the warpath at that time. He was appointed to the post by Chief Justice Waite, who was in charge of putting law in the territory. In 1888 Mr Folder went out to the Arizona Territory as train dispatcher for the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad and was stationed at Flagstall and Ash Fork. He became agent in charge of all ship supplies when the railway pushed its tacks across the mountains and desert from Albuquerque NM to Mojave CA. He returned to SC in 1895 and later moved to Ottawa Canada. Mrs Folger was Miss Essie Russell of this city before her marriage is no longer living, but they enjoyed 57 years and two months of married life before she died. Easley Progress Issue: 30 Sept 1954







#### NEW HOPE BAPTIST CHURCH

In the annuals of history there are many missing pages, whether it be in the history of a nation, community, or a church. So it is with New Hope Baptist Church. If only a few missing pages could be recovered we would have a glorious history of her long existence. If only the church book that was turned over to the church July 25, 1835 by Henry Cobb had been preserved or the historical account of the church written by Martin Moss in June, 1840 had been preserved we would have known more of the details of her early existence. Neither of these important records are in known existence today, but there are enough records available to give us at least a glimpse of New Hope's early life and a fuller picture of her life since 1835.


The first recorded conference dates back to July 25, 1835 but from other records we know that New Hope Church was organized before the nineteenth century began. It could possibly be the oldest Baptist church organized in Oconee County. If not the oldest Baptist church, it ranks among the oldest. The Chauga Church dates prior to 1796, but was located in Franklin County, Georgia as Shoal Creek Church until 1811, when it re-located in South Carolina and changed her name. Concross and Beaverdam also date as far back as 1796 and 1797 respectively. Before her name changed to Chauga, Shoal Creek was a very large and influential church playing a great part in the organization of many other Oconee County Churches including Concross, Old Liberty, and Beaverdam.

It is unblievable that a church so far away would throw light on the origin of New Hope. Head of Enoree in Greenvilla county was organized about 1789. This church has a long and glorious history. It produced leadership for many other churches and sent out many "Traveling" preachers during its early years. Its name was changed prior to 1827 to Reedy River and is today a very fine church.

Head of Enoree began recording her records in 1799 and the first conference states "A report was made of the constitution of the Keowee and Little River brethern, named Shoal Church." This church was constituted with thirteen members chiefly of the Yubb and Taber families. Most of them had been members of Head of Enoree. The charter members are: George Tubb, Solomon Taber, Jacob Waldon, William Taber, Genies William Taber, Mary Tubb, Susanah Taber, Sarah Tubb, Elizabeth Tubb, Mary Taber, Anne Reed, Lyda Shepperd. Anne Flor. Nothing is said as to when the church was constituted. Dr. Joe M. King of Furman University and author of A HISTORY OF SOUTH CAROLINA BAPTISTS assures me that it was in 1795. This date comes from research in connection with his book.

Since 1799 is the first recorded conference of Head of Enoree it is resonable to believe that the constitution could have taken place in 1795 and that it was recorded in 1799. This is not unreasonable since an illustration is found of such action in the 1835 New Hope records of recording actions that transpired before 1835.

Shoal Creek Church entered the Bethel Association in 1800 with 29 members; James Courtney and George Tubb being the delegates. Nothing is said about the Pastors during those early years other than that Isaiah Stephens became a member in 1800 and later became pastor. He was ordained by the Head of Enorce sometime after 1791 and sent out as an itinerant preacher. It is quite possible that he was instrumental in the organization of Shoal Creek.

In 1802 Shoal Creek left the Bethel Association to become a charter member of the Saluda Association. Item 13 of the 1802 Bethel minutes reveal, "Nine churches petitioned for a definition in order to form a new association: their request granted, the names of these churches are Big Creik, Fork Shoals, Burffy Creek, Cross Roads, Sicona, Keowee Woolenoy, Middlefork, Saluda and Shoal Creek. These churches are near the mountains in the south west part of this state." Messengers from these churches with a member of others met on November 5, 1803 at Old Salem meeting house, four and one-half miles northwest of the city of Anderson and formed the Saluda Association.

In 1811 Eden Wimpey was the only delegate to the association. The report stated that there were 56 members and \$1.87 gifts. The gifts in 1814 amounted to \$1.00 with Morgan Morgan and Henry Head as delegates. Benjamin Laurence was the delegate in 1815. That year there was one baptism, one excommunicated, two deaths and a total of 59 members. In 1818 'The name of Shoal Creek church in Oconee County, was changed to New Hope."

From 1815 to 1823 we have only two bits of information: the name change in 1818 and that Robert Kell was a delegate to the association in 1821. The gifts that year amounted to .50.

This brings us to a discussion of the location of the church. The first church stood near the Isaiah Hammond home place on the east side of Little River near Robinson shoals on the road leading from Old Pickens to the Jarrett bridge on Tugaloo River. Mr. J. L. Hammond has old deeds to verify the fact that James Morgan owned the land where the church stood. According to Mr. Hammond a farm building stands on a rock that the original church building was built upon. It is possible that with the shift of population the church was moved in 1818 and changed the name to New Hope. Tradition says that it was moved to what is known as the Bugaroo Field. A cemetary known as the old lew Hope cemetary marks the area of its location. The Bugaroo Field is about three or four miles from West Union and about three miles from the present location of the church.

It appears that there must have been some kind of difficulty during the period from 1815 to 1823 because the membership dropped from 59 to 23. It could have been the trouble and disagreement over the name change or about the location. Also in 1823 there were five members restored to fellowship which reveals a previous broken fellowship. The next few years reveal a process of excommunication of members and receiving people by letter with the membership going no higher than 27. It took many years to gain the membership to the number it was in 1815.

It is uncertain as to when the church moved from Bugaroo Field. From the tone of information at my disposal I feel that there are two possibilities: one is that the church moved sometime prior to 1826. The other possibility is that it was located near its present location in 1844 when a new church was built. I strongly favor the latter possibility because the church appointed a committee to see where the building should be built. We do know that the church came into its present property October 16. 1869 when "Brother Fringe offered a deed from the German Colonization Society signed by Jacob Schrader. President, and P. Breamon, Sec-Treas. Conveying to John C. Fringe, Robert Wilson, and E. G. Hunnicutt, trustees of New Hope Baptist church, two and one-half acres of land on which to build a church." This deed was recorded in the Clerk of Court's office in Peed Book A, page 460, on March 19 1870. The church was built by Mr. Fringe in 1870.

The colonization Society deed being unknown, the Knox family gave a clear title to the church for the property in 1881. The present Sanctuary stands on property given to the church in 1964 by Wilson E. Dodgens.



John E. Watson, of near Pickens, is one of the four living Confederate army veterans in Pickens county. The other three are Rev. J. E. Foster and Messrs. Matthew Hendricks and Buddy Evatt. Not many counties enjoy the distinction of having this many of the old heroes still ed ages of two brothers and two sisliving within their borders and Pickens county is proud of these men.

time, but upon arrival in Virginia hel John Watson (subject of this sketch), United States from Holland. was directly placed in the fighting ranks. He was a member of the Palmetto Sharpshooters and most of his active service was with General Jenkins' brigade, Longstreet's corps. He still recalls with pride the times he saw General Lee and the mighty "Stonewall" Jackson.

Mr. Watson cannot recall all of the battles in which he took part but remembers the Seven Days battles around Richmond which included Mechanicsville, Gaines' Mill, Savage Station, Frazier's Farm and Malvern Hill. He also fought at Second Mamassas, the Wilderness, Sharpsburg, Lookout Mountain, Chicamauga (the last great Confederate victory of the war); was among reinforcements sent' to Petersburg and surrendered with Lee's army at Appomatton. He was never seriously wounded and had only two furloughs during his three years of service-both on account of sickness, typhoid fever and pneumonia.

After the surrender Mr. Watson walked from Appomattox to Salisbury, N. C., and from there rode and walked back home to find a land of



Until 1835 few specific details are known about the church. Many unknown saints toiled hard to keep the torch of hope alive during those rugged years. We must remember that at the beginning of the church this territory had been the object of Indian trouble until only a few years prior, and the country's independence was barley 20 years old. We know only a very few of those great Christains who had the determination and faith to start something that would be one of the landmarks in Oconee County for all of these years and stand even today as one of the outstanding rural churches in the county.

Probably the Tubb Family ranks as the first great name. George Tubb was a charter member and messenger to the association in 1800. Evidently he had taken active leadership in his former church, Head of Enorge, and was a leader in the organization of Shoal Creek and of great influence. The Tubb name appears in various places as devout and active church workers, but by 1835 none of them appear on the membership roll. It is unknown just how much influence the Courtney's had during these years but most probably was very high. The Head family served well during the early years and continued for many years as outstanding members as also did the Cobb family.

It is not certain when Reverend A. A. Cobb moved his membership. He seemed to be a very influential person and most probably served as pastor during a period prior to 1835. John S. Cobb was given a letter of dismission September 12, 1835. Henry Cobb. cle. rk for a period prior to 1835. and his wife Abigail were given letters November 7, 1835 which removed the influential Cobb name from the church roll.

George Head and his wife Angelina were granted letters November 26, 1836. Henry Head was given a letter of recommendation October 29, 1836 because he was going to travel. Just what this traveling meant is not clear but there were preachers who "Traveled" preaching wherever

they found an oppertunity and witnessed to people. So, it appears that he was a preacher. On December 24, 1838, Henry, his wife Mary, and daughter Sarah were given letters, thus removing the Head name from the New Hope roll.

Eden Wimpey, Benjamin Laurence, Robert Kell, and Benjamin Head were all leaders whose names do not appear in 1835. Benjamin Sego was influential in 1823 and remained so until sometime after 1835.

The Morgan name has long been associated with New Hope. The first time it appeared in this connection was that Morgan Morgan was a messenger to the association in 1814. He died January 14, 1836. Thomas Morgan appears as messenger in 1825. The Morgans assumed many places of leadership down through the years thus making a great contribution to the ongoing of the church. The Brewer, Hunnicutts, and Hubbards share with the Morgans in a long series of leadership. The Moses, Garretts, and Cannons were also leaders for several years prior to and after 1835.

Joseph Brewer was ordained as a deacon in 1835 and remained a leader for at least 30 years. He was elected as the church's first treasurer in 1837 and served for many years. It is indicated by tradition that he served for more than 50 years. This could well be true because a "Nickel" treasury was begun in 1893 with J. A. Kelley as treasurer. Mr. Brewer was probably well on in years by that time and gave way to younger and more energetic men. Ezekiel Hunnicutt was ordained with him in 1835 and served for almost 20 years. He left New Hope in 1851.

The ordination of Brother Brewer and Hunnicutt reveals the procedure of ordination during the early years. They had already been elected to Serve and the following account is given from the records for November 1, 1835.

"The members of the Presbytry met, present Rev. A. A. Cobb, Rev. Benjamin Neighbors and Deacons Sego and John Ferguson, who invited Bro. Elder J. R. Smith to sit with them, and then they appointed Bro. Smith, Moderator and proceeded.

The Moderator read St. Paul's character of a Deacon. Enquiring of the Church whether the breathern set apart are the characters described which was unimously agreed to.

The brethern were then examined and found qualified and ordained. Prayer was led by Bro. Neighbours. The charge by Bro. Smith and the right hand of fellowship by the Presbytry."

Several of the men who served until 1885 served for several years including Moses Moss, R. A. O'Neal, James M. Morgan, A. R. Knox, Thomas Dodd, and D. H. Kennemur. J. M. Hunnicutt was an outstanding leader for more than 25 years. Others who were leaders for a shorter period include Patrick Hubbard, Jeremiah Hubbard, Joseph Gresham, R. M. Morgan, R. Hood, A. Jackson, John McAlister, John Bearden, R. Roberson, B. Garrett, William Hood, John Fringe, Robert Wilson, E. G. Hunnicutt, J. B. Crenshaw, Joseph Dawson, and J. E. Hunnicutt. E. H. Kennemur served as pastor from 1852 - 1854 and in other capacities at other times. John Garrett was active as a leader but several times had to confess for his wrong doings. The church manifested a forgiving spirit by forgiving him each time.

Shoal Creek must have been organized as a result of the revival spirit that was present toward the close of the eighteenth century. Churches were being organized and then men would be sent out as "Licentitates" and "Itinerants" with a "Letter of recommendation to travel". Had it not been for this type of spirit in Head Of Enorree Church that sent out at least eleven men during the period from 1791 to 1804, Shoal Creek and many other churches may never have been born.

It is unknown as to how far these early members traveled to meet for worship. It is reasonable that those first thirteen members could have lived reasonably close together. But by 1800 the church had grown TOBE to 29 members and by 1815 to 59. This would indicate that many of them CON'T

#### **EASLEY'S CEMETERIES: By C.T. Martin:**

When the town was first incorporated there was an old family burying ground known as the Mansell grave yard. It is located on the old Pumpkintown road, just north of the colored cemetery, on land that was set apart for the purpose by one Joshua Mansell, who owned and resided on a tract of one hundred or more acres now embraced in wards four and five of the city.

At the time of the incorporation of the town this was the only build ground in the town. The remains of the first citizens who died in the town were carried to the country church yards or family burying grounds in the vicinity. Some were carried to George's Creek, others to the Oates grave yard near old Pickensville, others to Carmel. One of the first deaths to occur in the city was Mrs Hendricks, wife of Mr Moses Hendricks, a merchant of the town. Mrs Hendricks died during the summer of 1875, and her remains were interred in the John Arial family burial ground two miles west of the city on the Pickens Road, as were also the remains of her husband a year later, August 1876.

They were the parents of Mr George Hendricks, now a well-known and successful farmer who resides four miles north of the city. George was only two or three years of age at the time of his mother's death.

The first person buried in the Methodist cemetery (Mt Olivit) was Miss Mary Jane Folder, the 17 year old daughter of Mr and Mrs A.M. Folger. Her death occurred on the 8 October 1879. A few days after Miss Folger's burial the remains of a child of Mr and Mrs J.B. Clyde's were exhumed from the Zion cemetery and reintered near the grave of Miss Folger. A few days later the body of Mrs Thomas Watson a member of the Mt Olivet M.E. Church was also interred nearby, and on the 27th of December 1879, the body of Mr Tobert Cook, a young Englishman, who came to South Carolina from London a few years before, and settled on a part of Mr R.O. Williams' farm a few miles south of here, was interred here.

Mr Cook who had married a daughter of Lemeul G. Hamilton and was managing a cotton ginning plant, which was run by water, while engaged in repairing the water wheel, fell and died from the injury received. These four graves stood in a row not more than fifty feet south of the M.E. Church for several months before others were added. By the year 1900 the plot between the church and the rail road had been covered with graves, and the subject of securing a lot for the town cemetery was being agitated. Mr W.A. Mauldin was one of the first persons in the town to take an interest in the proposition and he brought the matter to the attention of the town council. It resulted in the council purchasing a tract of five or six acres of land just west of and adjoining the M.E. Church property from the heirs of the late Luke I. Ariail and having it cut into lots which were sold to citizens as needed for burial purposes.

The first plot was sold to Mt W.A. Mauldin in 1901 and the body of his wife, Mrs Sarah Martin Mauldin, was interred there in February 28th, 1902.

A coincidence, however, is the fact that the body of the first person buried in the new cemetery which had been given the name "West View" was that of a young lady, Miss Kate Hudgens. She was a daughter of Capt. And Mrs A.W. Hudgens. Like Miss Janie Folger, she was a beautiful young girl just blossoming into maidenhood. She died on the 26 September 1901.

Since that time many of the citizens of Easley and surrounding territory have found their last resting place in this beautiful lot and it will not be long until it too will be filled with graves. Already two additions of space have been added thereto. Many beautiful and costly monuments adorn the various plots, telling in many instances only the time of birth and death of the deceased.

There are also the graves of a number of Confederate veterans in both cemeteries. They have been marked with marble slabs placed there by the WM (William Mauldin) Easley Chapter U.D.C.'s and once each year their graves are covered with flowers by the members of the organization. Jameson and wife Dorcas P. Jameson formerly Couch of Pickens District, Alexander

Orr and wife Melinda Orr formerly Couch of Anderson District SC, William Couch, John Couch and Sidney Couch all of Pickens District and the representatives of Ellender Baker formerly, Ellender Couch who died before her father leaving 8 children and a grandchild viz: John Baker who resides in Texas the representative of Mary Ann Williams fromerly Mary Ann Couch, names unknown, last heard of in Texas, Elizabeth Forrester and her husband who reside in Florida, William Baker, Lucinda Baker, Robert Baker, Richard Baker, Crawford Baker and Lewellen Baker the last four of whom are said to be minors and reside in Texas, and your oratrix the widow of the said John Couch. Your oratrix futher charges and believes that a fair and just partition of the said Real estate would be advantageous to all the distributees, whereupon your oratrix respectfully prays that a Writ in Partition may be issued in the usual form. Filed 30 April 1857. Pickens Co SC Equity No 40

It is unknown when slaves began to be accepted as members but by 1835 there were at least 12 "Colored female" members and 6 "Colored male" members. With 16 "White male" members and 21 "White female" members. The total membership September, 1835 was 55. At times the number of colored membership almost equaled the white membership. Some of those colored people were very devout which helps us to understand that the gospel is for all races. Glasgo, who belonged to Joseph Greshom, was baptized upon a profession of faith in 1835 with his master. His name remained on the church roll as late as the 1870's.

It is not unusual to find a church with a period of prosperity then something cause an unrestful period. It has already been noted that there was unrest during the period following 1815. It is unknown as to how long the period of unrest lasted but must have cleared up somewhat by 1830. An incident happened in 1835 that caused trouble: The case had been before the church prior to July 25, 1835 but the record begins by recording the outcome of the matter. Brother Hiram Wooten and the pastor, a Brother Chastain, had had some difficulty. Brother Wooten was guilty of other matters and gave the church and Rev. Chastain "Satisfaction." The church expressed their confidence for the pastor by a standing ovation. The church must have reserved some of their feelings because in October they voted that in case Bro. Chastain didn't want to serve another year they would choose Bro.

James R. Smith." This they did in January, 1836.

During those days churches would have "arms of the church", called today "Missions". New Hope had an arm at Pickens Courthouse. It is unknown as to when it legan but was withdrawn in 1835 after a lengthy discussion. On Saturday, September 2.

"Brether Gresham then submitted a statement of so much of the proceedings of the Arm Of The Church at Pickens Court House. He was informed that on the 18th. of June, 1834. Sister Lydia Hughey was received by letter; on Aug. 1,, 1834 Colored Sister Sarah Curtis was recieved by letter; on June 21, 1835 Colored Sister Jane, belonging to Maj. Keith, by letter; others July 19, 1835: Colored Sister Mary belonging to Tarleton Lewis by experience: Aug. 16, 1835 Frances Foster by letter; Sarah Ann Clayton and Elizabeth O'Briant by experience. Also colored Jack belonging to S. Reid; Colored Hannah belonging to A. Craig; Colored Pricilla belonging to Bro. Gresham. On Sept. 6, Patsy belonging to Col. Morton; Hannah belonging to Mr. Reid, and Milley belonging to Bro. Gresham were received. All by experience were baptized in Keowee River."

There was a discussion about estabilishing arms of the church and belief that there was no scripture to authorize such proceedings. It was unanimously resolved that the arm at Pickens Courthouse be called in and discontinued. A committee of seven male members was appointed to go to Bro. Dawson and assure him of their prayers and hope that his labors would be rewarded by the salvation of many souls and tell him of the church action. They were authorized to open the doors of New Hope for the reception of members and dismiss any who desired. (Brother Thomas Dawson was a great preacher and missionary serving there. He had been for many years a teacher among the Indians. He had a very fruitful ministry over the years.)

The people were not satisfied with this action for in November, they voted to have a monthly conference for six months, in co-operation with Keowee Church. These meetings ended in April 1836.

Elder James R. Smith began his services at New Hope in 1836. The monthly conference was changed from the second to the forth Lord's day and day before of each month. For a few months very little happened, but then there began to be additions to the church both by letter and by experience.

Joseph Gresham had joined the church by baptism in 1835. On September 29, 1836 he was licensed to the ministry as the sixth item of business: It was agreed to take Bro. Greshams gifts into consideration at the request of the Peacons. Bro. Gresham left the house and Bro. Welborn was appointed Clerk Pro-tem. It was then unamously agreed to liberate Bro. J. Grisham and do hereby advise him to exercise his gifts ministerially in the church and her bounds and elsewhere when legally called upon. On March 25, 1837 Elijah Collins was given the exhortation to use his gifts. These men and their ministry are discussed in another section.

Brother Brewer was elected treasurer of the church. He was the first to serve in this office.

Brother Smith served three years; much was accomplished during his ministry. Brother Thomas Dawson served as pastor for 1839.



And as to all other property such as household, stock with a negro girl which my wife had at our marriage and for which I then gave her a quit claim title or written contract with a condition thereto which she holds specifying the whole matter, which I never clained nor do claim as my right or personal property farther than the use and control of it for my support and the family according to the contents set forth in the said contract, all which I have nothing to do with or say here, but that she my wife dispose and manage it at her own discretion. Now as I believe that what is set forth in the above items to be justice and the same has been my will and plan for a number of years back. Because all the personal property and about two hundred dollars is notes and money I obtained with her my wife. The money with what I added to it about the same, we laid out for land--as such she is justly entitle to a home of her own when I am gone. In testimony of this my last will and testiment I hereunto subscribe my name this 25 June eighteen hundred and fifty and fifty-six. Wit: John Ariail and Micajah



I would appreciate if anyone could direct me to some one who knows what or who is the source of the information in the Old Pendleton database for Michael WHITMIRE (b. 1735 in Enzweihingen, Wurttemburg) birthplace and parents?

The published Whitmire sources I've seen (there are quite a few) all have Michael and his brother George Frederick coming from Stuttgart, Wuerttenberg. Based on correspondence with other Shitmire researchers and other information, I've concluded it is more likely that they were actually came from the area around Markgroeningen, near Stuttgart (the Village of Enzweihingen, reported in the Old Pendleton database is a few miles from Margroeningen). I have researched the family in the Markgroeningen area and have quite a bit of information back to about 1390. I have identified

individuals who could have been Michael and George Frederick Whitmries (they fit the documented facts and legends) but not the ones in the Old Pendleton database. I have no direct evidence linking Michael and George to the families in Germany. I would really like to get this right.

In 1840 the church chose Joseph Gesham and James Cannon to look after the church this year. This was done frequently during those days. Joseph Gresham and J. R. Smith served the Liberty church for many years and it worked out fine. It must not have worked too well in this case because the year closed with the granting of a host of letters, including James Cannon and his wife.

Lewis Fendley was elected to serve for 1841. There seemed to be some question about him because the church of which he was a member would not ordain him. He was ordained by New Hope in May 1841. He had been tried and found guilty by the church for taking their priveledges away from them. He confessed, but usually when a preacher and congregation are on the "Outs" he might as well move on in a hurry.

There were many accomplishments during his ministry; there were many additions; John Garrett Turner and Stephen Smith were liscensed to preach; It was decided to open the doors of the church at all preaching service, which indicates evengelistic zeal, and a new house of worship was erected in 1844.

For the next year and a half after Findley left the situation concerning a pastor, was in turmoil. In July 1848 they asked Andrew Magguffin to serve In September they chose Bro. Crumpton, then, in March 1849 agreed for J. R. Hunnicutt to take over. In November they asked Daniel Huttson of Keowee to serve but evidently he refused. So, in January 18 50 the problem was settled when J. R. Hunnicutt was asked to serve again. He served for two years. During his ministry things settled down. They agreed to appropriate funds for the support of the church for the first time. Elijah Deacon was licensed to the ministry in 1850.

Brother D. H. Kennemur began in 1852 and served for three years. Little is said to indicate much prosperity or decline during those years.

It seemed to be a time when the church was settling down but during the latter part of 1854 trouble erupted again with ill wills and harsh words being expressed by some of the leading members namely Brother Cannon and Brewer. Satisfaction was made but Brother Brewer called for his letter later but was recieved back in August 1855.

John Owens began the first of three pastorates in 1855. He served two years this time and the spirit of the church seems to be restful and unified.

Elder Daniel Butler began as pastor in 1857 serving three years.

The peaceful spirit continued to prevail. Brother Thomas Dodd was licensed to preach.

John Owens began his second term as pastor in 1860. It is unknown as to how long he served because the records from 1862 through 1865 are vague. It is probable that J. Chapman served for a while sometime between 1862 and 1865.

Brother Hix began in 1866. Brother T. H. Hays served in 1867. For many years people had tried for various reasons but in 1867 the number is stepped up with a more varied accusation against them. The names of some prominent women appear for the first time; Sister Morgan and Sister Roberson. Posey Roberson was licensed in 1867. In August the church voted to petition a letter of dismission from the Twelve Mile River Association to join the Fork Association. This is the first time the name of an association is given in the records. Delegates were appointed yearly but the names are not given.

Brother Holder was pastor in 1868 and 1869. The church seemed to be becoming more denominationally minded and more strict in their requirements of the members. James Huse was excluded for joining another denomination and the membership was revised according to the laws of the church. Property was recieved from the German Col. Society on which to build a church.

Brother J. Owens began his last Pastorate of New Hope in 1870. The records do not indicate how long he stayed but he must have stayed through 1872 making a total of seven years as pastor. He was one of the outstanding Pastors of New Hope. He walked 25 miles to serve. Accomplishments during this Pastorate was the erection of a new building in 1870. It was built by one of the members, John Fringe. It was evedently completed in the fall of 1870, because the building committee was instructed to notify him to have the "rufe" on the house by the associational meeting or he would lose the contract.

Brother H. Kennemur was elected to serve the year of 1873 and 1874. There was not much accomplished as far as outward events are concerned. There was a period of staleness, but we must remember that these periods will come in the life of a church and it may be a time of sowing.

The harvest was reached in 1875 during the protracted meeting.

M. Martin was the Pastor. He and D. Knox alternated as preacher for the week. There was prayer meeting at 9 o'clock, preaching at cleven and also at night. During the week there were 15 recieved by experience; seven by letter, and two by restoration. Making the total of 24 additions. With a membership of around 50 before the meeting, this was a great increase. At least one of those converted during this meeting, William Seaborn, entered the ministry and served for many years as an influential minister in Oconee and Pickens County.

Also in 1875 each member was requested to pay 15 cents for Missionary causes.


The records from the time of the great revival in 1875 until 1890 were lost and the only information that can be found is from association minutes. Jake Chapman was pastor in 1876 and it seemed that the evange-listic outreach of the former year stopped because there were no Baptisms that year and only .80 paid out.

No information is found for 1877 but H. N. Hays was pastor from 1878 to 1880. In 1878 there were 77 members. 1879 was a glorious year with 26 baptisms, 5 recieved by letter and one restored, brings the membership to 105. This is the first time the membership reached the one hundred mark. That year the Pastór's salary was \$30.00.80 cents was given to missionary, and \$1.85 to the association. The value of the church was \$200.00. The church continued in progress in 1880.

J. M. Sanders was elected as Pastor for 1881 and continued for three years. For the first two years under his ministry the church continued to make progress with the membership reaching 117 and \$4.06 given to missions in 1882. The next year things began to drop fast. Trouble must have erupted because the membership dropped to 91 in 1883. Pastor W. C. Seaborn was elected in 1884 and served for three years The only thing that went up was the pastor's salary. It reached \$60.00 in 1884 but seventeen letters were granted. By 1886 when 22 letters were granted the membership had dropped to 46.

There is no record of 1887 but Baxter Hays served as pastor in 1888. Evidently the church had lost more members in 1887 because it seemed to begin to climb in 1888 recieving six by baptism and three by restoration, bringing the membership to 49.

Rev. Hays was an outstanding minister in Anderson County for many years and at the time he served at New Hope was well on in years. He is described as a man who, "Preaches a pure and sound gospel, using but few illustrations, and none of the clap-trap methods so common now-a-days for getting people into the church; but simply holds Christ, and him crucified as the sinners only hope of life and salvation, and though he had passed his three score and ten years,

JAMES H. LAWRENCE: I enlisted in Co B 2nd SC Reg of Infantry Brattons Batt. Under Capt R.L. Lewis on 22 July 1862 and served in that command until 9 April 1865 when discharged at Appromattox. I was born in 1832 and reside at Calhoun, Pickens Co SC. Wounds is bad almost helpless. Sg: James H. Lawrence x dated 5 April 1919.

JOSEPH W. LAWRENCE: I enlisted in Co E of Orrs Reg. Of SC under Capt Miles M. Norton in June 1861 and served in that command until Jan 1864. I was discharged at Virginia on 1864. I am 73 years of age and reside at Central, Pickens Co SC and have lived there since the 23 Dec 1845. Sg: Susan F. Lewis dated 27 Sept 1919.

he still preaches with all the zeal and enthusiasm of a young man.

Baxter Hayes was followed by Drury T. Hays in 1889. He

stayed for two years with the membership growing very slowly.

J. M. Sanders began his second term as pastor in 1891 serving until February 1893. There seemed to be unrest in the church but the records are not legible enough to tell what it was about. It did go so far that a warrent was sworn out by J. A. Kelley for Will Harbin for disturbing public worship. They did vote to paint the church in 1892.

Rev. Sanders was very much interested in missions and did serve as a home missionary. Because of this interest his wife organized a Woman's Missionary Society in 1892. with the following officers and members: Mrs. Fannie Kelley, President: Mrs. Lou Pace. Vice- Presedent; Lizzie Elrod, Secretary- Treasurer and Mary Opperman, Senie Morgan, Lena McAlister, Nely McAlister, and Sally Tollison.

Mrs. D. A. Peritt later reconized it and put new life to the Organization Mrs. Annie Jones was the leading spirit in keeping the work going for many years.

On a motion by Noah Tollison the church voted to "go into a choise for a preacher", February 19. 1893. The vote was taken and Ezekiel Durham was elected to serve for \$50.00. He resigned in June because of ill 'realth and the church paid him the \$50.00.

W. G. Mauldin was elected in July and served through 1895.

Evedently things began to pick up about that time. The members subscribed to help pay the Pastor's salary and it was decided that no letter

of dismission shall be granted to any person who has not paid their Pastor's Salary." Each member was also expected to give .15 for State Missions. The "Nickel Treasury", was established with J. A. Kelley as treasurer. In 1894 they voted to "make an effort to paint the Church House." Which they had voted to do in 1892. Also the church "Resolve first that we the membership of the church do extend to Mrs. L. E. Knox our heartfelt thanks for a title to the plot of ground on which the New Hope church house now stands;" "Resolved second that we do accept the same with gratitude, feeling, and knowing that those who give in the proper spirit to the cause of Christ will in the end receive their just reward."

On the 19th. day of May 1894, a committee was appointed to decide how much to give to different "religious objects" and report back to the church. This reveals that they were making progress in the affairs of the church. It is the first reference to a budget type of opperation. It seems that money was used more because  $J.\ \Lambda$ . Kelley was instructed to take .50 out of the treasury to pay for sacramental use, \$1.40 to pay for insurance on the church.

W. C. Seaborn began his second term as pastor in 1896, serving through 1899. The church voted in 1896 to try to pay the \$7.50 which the Beaverdam Association had ask to help defray mission expenses in this area. They also designated as set apart the land belonging to the church on the South-west side of the public road running from Wolfstake to Newry, for burial purposes."

A committee was also appointed to ceil the church house and the Saturday meeting time was changed from 11 A. M. until 2 P. M.

J. B. Becknell and M. H. Wood were elected as Deacons in July 1897 and ordained in October.

For years the church had an investigation committee to investigate people and situations when the need would arise. In 1897 the old committee was discontinued and a new one appointed which consisted of the Deacons. The Pastor's salary was raised from \$50.00 to \$55.00 in 1897.

In 1898 a report was made that a table had been sold for .50 and this was to be put on the expense of the church Bible; .97 had been raised for State Missions which completed their "promised amount", and an offering was taken for Foreign Missions. The ladies of the church presented the Pastor with a "Crazy Quilt", which he received with grateful words of reception." This is the first record of a gift for the Pastor. In August a hand Bible was presented to the Pastor in appreciation for the work.

The church was getting along fine with a good spirit and progress in all area. J. A. Huff was "set at liberty to preach" in August 1898. The Pastor's salary was raised to \$75.00 for 1899.

The swer's spirit and period of progress exploded in July 1899 when B. P. Moore was charged with contempt to the church and during the next few months a series of charges was made on various members. Some were excluded, while others acknowledged their faults.

Apparently things cooled off somewhat and M. J. Sanders was elected for the third term November 11. 1899. He served from 1900 through 1902 making a total of more than 8 years at New Hope. In 1900, 17 persons were recieved by experience and 3 by letter which truly is a great harvest. Among those recieved was William Hammond.

Mrs. M. A. Wood was elected as organist that year. This is the first reference to any type of musical instrument.

The windows and locks were repaired at a cost of \$1.70, and the Pastor's salary declined \$50.00 for the year. In 1901 the treasurer was instructed to collect all dues from the members. After several months, there was a recommendation made in 1902 that the ones who had not paid be turned out of the church. Those turned out could be reinstated by paying their dues.

Rev. A. P. Marrett was elected as pastor for 1903 at a salary of \$50.00 and "as much more as we can raise."

The Beaverdam Association met at New Hope in 1903. This was a great event and much work went into the task of taking care of the delegates.

A comittee consisting of T. M. Elrod, J. C. Alexander, and J. M. Hummicutt, was appointed to take care of the delegates." The following were appointed to be in charge of 'arrangements, R. L. Boggs, J. A. Kelley, and E. P. Wood. An appeal was made in July for public to meet at the church on Saturday before the 4th. Sunday to arrange for the entertainment. The following people then subscribed for minutes of the association; J. M. Hunnicutt, E. P. Wood, Talley Patterson, M. A. Wood, J. W. Hunt, Eddie Tollison, Mrs. J. A. Tollison, J. D. Tollison, Mrs. J. S. Tollison, J. B. Becknell, A. P. Marrett, T. M. Elrod, and D. T. Hayes.

Eight members were recieved during the August meeting by experience. One-half acre of land was bought from Mrs. L. E. Knox for \$7.50 to be used for "more buring ground". A report was made in February 1904 that the money had been raised to pay for it. Also, the treasurer reported that the church had raised \$68.50 and outsiders \$1.25 for the pastor. Thirty-eight members had given nothing.

Miss Wonnie Morgan and Acy Wood were appointed as a committee to work in the interest of State Missions. Sixteen persons were accepted by

OLD PICKENS- The general aspect of things about "Old Pickens" to day strongly contracts with its appearance fifteen or twenty years ago--then at the zenith of its Ante bellum prime and importance as a country town, now all tumbled down and abandoned.

The dividing of Pickens District shortly after the war into Pickens and Oconee counties and then consequent removal of the county seat served to utterly anuibilate the old town. All the old residents as by one impulse and seemingly determination in common to remove the court house, migrated at once and settled exclusively in Walhalla and New Pickens mainly in the latter place. As a consequence a wonderful depreciation in value of town property followed and most if not all the old lots changed hands for a mere trifle. As an instance on lot of two acres on which was a good dwelling with a store room attached sold for only \$20.00. The Court House and Jail and nearly all the store houses and dwellings were torn down and moved away and now only a few weather beaten and desolate houses and most of these in the last stages of delapidation, remain to remind one of the former life or pretentions of the place. In fact everything has degenerated to so great an extent that the few remaining traces and relics would scarcely excite the curious interest of the passing stranger. The large hotel building is standing yet, but is fast going to ruin and the absence of all the door and window shutters and sash serves but to heighten the gloominess of the picture. Only one business sign remains of the old hotel bar, which holds on to the wall with a tension grip as if unconscious of the fact that the spirits have flown. The old academy is yet to be seen and the town could at one time boast of a flourishing High School, which is an easy and safe inference when it is know that the Rev. J. L. Kennedy was its principal. It may be added in this connection that your townsman, O.H.P. Fant, Esq., once trained the young idea of the Locality "how to shoot." There was never but one church immediately in the place, a neat and substantial brick structure which was originally intended for the use of the various denominations but it was used almost exclusively by the Presbyterian and until last years, when they abandoned it. Very lately it has been in cooperated in a Methodist Mission of the South Carolina Conference and a strong membership has been already established.

This is a remarkably healthy locality, a fine grain growing section and since the war, a considerable quality of cotton is raised. There are no stores nearer than central Station and Seneca City, on the Air Line Railroad each ten miles distance: and this fact together with the natural resources of the surrounding country makes this place a splendid opening for a country store. A merchant of Seneca City whom it would seem was encouraged by these inducements has very recently opened a general stock of goods here and is doing a profitable business. A store at Old Pickens is something a novelty and the natives hail its advent with rejoicing. About five families of white people and about as many of negroes are living in the "Old Place" at present, none of whom however reside within the incorporation prior to the breaking-up, save, perhaps one old negro man, George, who belonged to P. Alexander afore mancipation. George owns the largest part of Old Pickens now, and one broad smile betokening of his thrift, irradiates his sable features when he tells us that "things is turned around mightly." He rejoices in his freedom and vo'es the "publikin" ticket. Keowee--Pickens Sentine Issue: 11 Nov 1875.

#### Individual biographical text for Philip Porter

Two birth dates have been found for Philip. The Bible record has the birth date of 1 July 1764. The Revolutionary War Pension declaration of 7 Oct. 1834 states he believes he was born 1 July 1763. If the SAMUEL PORTER, living at Temple of Health in Abbeville District when he applied for a Revolutionary War Pension in 1834 was a brother to Philip, then the 1764 date is probably the correct one. Samuel stated his birth date was 25 June 1763. There is no conclusive evidence these two men are brothers but both say they were born in Guilford County, NC. The 1808 will found for HUGH PORTER in Abbeville names sons Philip and Samuel.

Evidence of Philip's Revolutionary War service was found in <u>Stub Entries to Indents issued in Payment of Claims Against South Carolina Growing Out of the Revolution, Books R-T, page 133: No. 171, Book S-Issued the 9 June 1785 to Mr. Philip Porter for Eight Pounds Eleven Shillings and five Pence Sterling for Duty done in the Militia as pr. Account Audited.... Original papers for Philip's Revolutionary War service claims are found in South Carolina Archives File #6044. He was paid the above Eight Pounds Eleven Shillings and Five Pence Sterling for "Militia Duty as Private since the reduction of Charleston." (1780)</u>

The Philip Porter Bible Record "page of births" was published in the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION MAGAZINE\* in the August - September 1967 issue. Phillip Porter Bible - Owned by Mrs. John Brock, Pickens Co., S. C. (South Carolina Records Comm. 1967.) Phillip Porter was born 1 July 1764. Mary Smith wife of Phillip Porter was born 1769. Elizabeth Porter - Daughter born 25 Feb. 1784. Hugh Porter - Son born 14 Feb. 1786. Rebecca Porter - Daughter born 25 Feb. 1788. William Porter - Son born 20 Feb. 1790. James Porter - Son born 20 Feb. 1792. Martha Porter - Daughter born 5 April 1794 - Also listed as Patsey. John Porter - Son born 20 March 1796. Joseph Porter - Son born 2 June 1798. Baziel Smith Porter - Son born 2 Sept. 1801. Job Porter - Son born 8 April 1804. Thomas Porter - Son born 2 Dec. 1807. Mary Ann Porter - Daughter born 12 Feb. 1814. "Comments by Andres: The death and marriage list is missing from this Bible - in fact only this page is preserved."

From OLD SOUTHERN BIBLE RECORDS: Phillip Porter b. 1 July 1764, m. Mary Smith b. 1769. Children: Elizabeth b. 25 Feb 1784; Hugh b. 14 Feb 1786; Rebecca b. 25 Feb 1788; William b. 20 Feb 1790; James b. 20 Feb 1792; Martha b. 5 April 1794 (called Patsy); John b. 20 Mar 1796; Joseph b. 2 June 1798; Baziel (Basil or Bazel?) Smith b. 2 Sep. 1801; Job b. 8 Apr 1804; Thomas b. 2 Dec 1807; Mary Ann b. 12 Feb 1814. (This Bible page is owned by Mrs. John Brock, nee Unity Porter, of Pickens County, SC. The marriage & death dates are missing from this record. Only this page is preserved. L. Andrea notes, "From my Clayton data, Hugh Porter above, m. Eleanor Clayton. James Porter above, m. Nancy Clayton. From James Porter's tombstone he died 16 Feb. 1892, lacked 4 days of being 100 yrs. old. Bishop Francis Asbury mentions Phillip Porter as a local Methodist minister. This Phillip Porter founded the Porter's Chapel Methodist Church in Pickens Co., S. (.")

SAMUEL A PORTER's birth is not listed in the above Bible records. He was named as a son in Mary Porter's 20 Jan 1851 will and found living with her on the 1850 Census. He was 35 years old in 1850.

Philip and Mary Smith Porter were the parents of thirteen children - nine sons and four daughters. Philip had five brothers named in his father's 1808 will in Abbeville - Hugh, William, James, John, & Samuel. Considering the fact that both his father and a brother were named Hugh, he named a son for each one of his brothers. Evidence indicates both Mary and Philip had brothers named William. Did William get special preference since they both had brothers named William or did they use the traditional custom of naming the second son after her father? Were the other four sons named after Mary's brothers and father?

In Frederick Van Clayton's thesis, <u>SETTLEMENT OF PENDLETON DISTRICT 1777-1800</u>, there is a list of people receiving land grants, the streams where the land was located, number of acres, date and the name of the person the land was "bounded by." A land grant was not found for Philip in this publication but he is named as "bounded by" in a land grant for Alex. Davis on Big Beaverdam Creek of Rocky River in 1795.

Philip Porter is found in the 1790 South Carolina <u>Heads of Families</u> Census in Ninety-six District, Pendleton County He is listed with one male over 16, two males under 16, and three females.

Next to Philip is the household of **Joseph Smith** with 3 males 16 and up; 3 males under 16; 4 females and 1 slave. The names appear in the same order as listed by the enumerator.

The following passage was found in <u>History of Old Pendleton District</u> and <u>Genealogy of Leading Families</u>: "By the Act of 1791, Vol. 7, p. 262, Gen. Andrew Pickens, Col. Robert Anderson, Capt. Robert Maxwell, John Bowen, James Harrison, Major John Ford and John Hallum were appointed to purchase land and superintend the building of a court house and jail for the district of Washington. Washington District was composed of the counties of Pendleton and Greenville. The Court house was located at Pickensville, near the present Town of Easley." The names of Gen. Andrew Pickens, Col. Robert Anderson, and Capt. Robert Maxwell are names that are mentioned in Philip Porter's Revolutionary War Pension Application.

Brent H. Holcomb compiled an INDEX TO THE 1800 CENSUS OF SOUTH CAROLINA. The following were listed as Heads of PORTER Households in Abbeville: Rev. Alexander Porter; Elizabeth Porter; Hugh Porter; Hugh Porter, Senior; John Porter, PHILIP PORTER. There were no PORTERS found in Pendleton District.

PHILIP PORTER was found in Abbeville on page 28 of the 1800 Census with 4 males under 10, 1 male 10 to 16, 1 male 26 to 45, 2 (?) females under 10, 1 female 10 to 16, and 1 female 26 to 45.

Philip must have moved his family back to Pendleton District by the time his son, Basil Smith Porter was born 2 Sept. 1801 for Basil's obituary states, "He was born at the Sam Porter Place about 1.4 mile from where he lived. Hence, all of the days of his long life was spent in Pickens County; while he was once respectively a citizen of Pendleton District, Pickens District and Pickens County. From the days of his boyhood he was a faithful member of the Methodist Church. His funeral was held at Porter's Chapel last Thursday."

The 1820 Census records for Pendleton District were published in <u>PENDLETON DISTRICT AND ANDERSON COUNTY</u>, S. C. WILLS, ESTATES, INVENTORIES, TAX RETURNS AND CENSUS RECORDS. Both Philip and his son Hugh Porter are listed on page 297. Philip's household has 2 males 10 to 16, 1 male 18 to 26, and 1 male over 45. Philip was 56 years old in 1820.

Philip must have followed the time honored custom of naming his first son after his father as the first son named in the Bible record was Hugh. In 1820, **HUGH PORTER** had four males under 10, 1 male 26 to 45; 2 females under 10, 1 female 10 to 16 years old, 1 female 26 to 45.

PICKENS DISTRICT, S. C. 1830 CENSUS: Philip Porter is household number 996. There is one male between 20-30; one male 60-70; one female 15-20 and one female between 60-70. Son, Basil Porter is next door at number 997.

PICKENS DISTRICT, S. C. 1840 CENSUS: Philip Porter is household number 1231. There is one male between 30-40; one male 70-80; one female 15-20; one female 70-80.


Pg. 20 of the GREENVILLE MOUNTAINEER: "Departed this life, on the 8th ult., at his residence on Twelve Mile, Pickens District, Rev. Philip Porter in the 77th year of his age. The deceased was a zealous defender of the great truths of Christianity as promulgated by the Methodist Episcopal Church. When quite young he embraced the cause of religion, thereby giving the best years of this life to the service of the Creator....At an early period of his life he engaged actively in the war which terminated in our freedom and independence as a nation; and has left a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn their loss." Temperance Advocate (June 4, 1841). The above obituary was found in THE SOUTH CAROLINA MAGAZINE OF ANCESTRAL RESEARCH, Volume IV, No. 1; Winter 1976. (Sent by Michael Grant).

In a 1983 letter FAITH CLAYTON states, "We do not know where Philip Porter is buried. At the time of his death, Pickens and Oconee counties were together and called Pickens Distric. Philip Porter lived close to the dividing line of these two counties and I am of the opinion that he was buried on his property."

Much can be learned about Philip Porter and his family from his Revolutionary War Pension Applications. These records are found in REVOLUTIONARY PENSION APPLICATION Number R8350 of Philip Porter, wife Mary, service in SC; Born in NC. The first application was made to the Sate of South Carolina in 1831: To the Honorable Senate and Members of the House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina. The Humble petition of Phillip Porter showeth that he is now in the 67 or 68 year or years of his age, has reared a large family and they have all become of age and doing for their selves and he has no family except himself and his wife and the petitioner showeth that he has for many years of his life been an ailing man and not able to accumulate property. He is now old and not able to work and without help from the State of South Carolina where he has rendered great service must of course soon become in a suffering situation or be dependent to the charity of his friends and as this Petitioner has been a faithful Soldier of the revolutionary struggle and all his aid was rendered in that glorious struggle for liberty, he hopes you take his petition in consideration and grant him a pension as is allowed to others in similar circumstances. The petitioner showeth that he was born in North Carolina, Guilford County and removed to South Carolina in the time of the war and settled in Abbeville Dist. in this State and there resided during the war and this petitioner showeth that he was early in our army when he came to the State. The first tour was a Volunteer Tour against the Indians under Col. Killgore and then home and then served three months longer under Capt. Roseman scouring the frontier and was stationed at NORRODS BLOCK House in Abbeville where he served a dangerous tour of duty in guarding and providing provisions for the benefit of the Fort and after he served his tour at that place he then volunteered under Capt. Robert Maxwell in the horse service for another tour in the said service scouring and ranging the frontier where he, your petitioner under went many hard trials and many dangers. Your petitioner showeth that he was ready at every beck and call of Capt. Robert Maxwell about the close of the glorious struggle for liberty to turn out and scour the frontiers and beat back the Indians in which service he often acted as a spy and if your honorable body shall hear the prayers of your petitioner he as in duty bound will ever pray---

The State of South Carolina, Pickens District: Personally came before me the subscribing Justice for the said District and appeared Phillip Porter, the above Petitioner and made oath in due form of law and sayeth on his oath that all the facts set forth in the above Petition is just and true. Sworn to and subscribed to this 18th day of November 1831 before me Bailey Barton, JQ. Signed: Philip Porter

The following is a just and true schedule of the Property of Phillip Porter......439 acres poor land, part Mountains .... given in to Tax Collector last quarily...13 head cattle...A stock of hogs supposed 30 head or upward, some of them being shy I can't exactly say...2 head of horse heast, not valuable...6 or 7 head of sheep and a few farming tools and the necessary house hold and kitchen furniture for a small family... no article of fine quality....as to cabinet work

experience, 7 by letter, and 1 by restoration in September.

W. C. Seaborn was elected for his third Pastorate for 1905. He remained there for 2 years, making a total of 9 years at New Hope. The salary was \$75.00.

On November 10, 1905 an announcement was made requesting all members to be present the next conference day to consider the possibility of building a new church house. They voted in December to take some steps to build it and elected a building committee of J. C. Alexander, J. A. Kelley, and M. A. Wood. A finance committee was elected consisting of Sister Janie Wood, Bennie Knox, And Miss Wannie Morgan.

In the spring of 1906 a number of men agreed to give timber and a day was set to cut and haul logs to the saw mill. Mr. T. M. Elrod gave this account: 'The first day, there were twelve? hourse wagons and 45 men ready for the work. In due time the timber had been sawed and hauled to the church. In August of 1906, just one month afterward, the church worshipped in the new building. To our knowledge, the labor was all voluntarily given and the new house was completed without one dollar being spent for labor." Very few rural churches and some small town churches were not equal to the building for many years. The building was dedicated August 10, 1907 with T. H. Posey preaching the dedicatory sermon.

Keels Moore was elected as "Sectston' in 1906 with the salary of \$10.00. Has duties were: "To open and close the house when it is called for to keep the house well swept, keep the lamps clean and oil in them and lighted when needed, make fires in the stove in cold weather, and keep cold water for the Pastor." The church was insured for \$800.00 and the contents for \$100.00.

Rev. W.C. Huff served as pastor during the years of 1907 - 1909. With the new building, the church was ready to make more progress. The Deacon's.

J. M. Miller, J. S. Tollison, and R. B. Becknell, were ordained August 11, 1907 with C. S. Blackburn preaching the sermon from Isaiah 52 and T. M. Cary leading the prayer.

On June 10, 1908 the church agreed to accept money from the mission society for the purpose of "buying a church bell and order it and put it up."

In August of this year the church had one of the greatest revivals in the history of the church. There were 33 members recieved by baptism and 2 by letter. The next year the church voted to recommend William Hammond to Furman University to study for Ministerial education.

Rev. Huff was elected for 1910 but in January he sent a letter of resignation. The church then called Rev. J. H. Ayers for the remainder of the year.

J. E. Grim served 1912-1914. New Hope had given to various mission offerings all through it's history. In 1912 the apportionment of giving to mission was: State Missions \$10.00, Home Missions \$15.00, and Foriegn Missions \$25.00. The Ladies Missionary Society was asked to organize a Sunbeam Band.

On April 25, 1914, New Hope Church saw some of the fruit of their labor. She set aside another young man, William Hammond, to the Gospel Ministry. Two months later Asa Wood, John Becknell, and Pink Vaugn were elected as Deacons. Evidently the members were getting behind with the payment of their dues because they had not paid Rev. Grim all that was due him when he left at the close of 1914. They paid him later and in May 1915, voted to give the delinquent members one month before prefering charges against them. Fourteen were turned out June 12, 1915 for not paying their dues.

L. D. Mitchell was elected as pastor in 1915. The Deacons were sent to help organize a church at Ebenezar the first Sunday in May. In July a committee was appointed to buy an Organ. The committee was Asa Wood, Pauline Kelley, Bessie Wood, Ada Morgan, Wannie Morgan, and Mrs. T. M. Elrod.

The revival of 1915 produced good results; Fourteen were recieved by baptism, five by letter, and three restored to fellowship.

W. M. Walker was elected as pastor for 1916 at a salary of \$150.00.

On August 12th. they "agreed to go into a series of meetings with services to be 10 A. M., Prayer; 11 A. M., Preaching; & P. M. Prayer; 8.30 P. M. Preaching. Eight were recieved for baptism and one by letter.

In September 1916, J. A. Kelley resigned as treasurer and the following resolution was passed: "Whereas Bro. J. A. Kelley has served something near 20 years as treasurer of New Hope and has offered his resignation and has been accepted, therefore, be it resolved that this church extend to Brother Kelley our thanks and appreciation for the faithful service rendered as church treasurer."

Rev. Walker stated that he could not serve the church for 1917 unless a field could be worked out. The first pulpit committee in the church's history was elected. This committee was composed of T. M. Elrod,

J. F. Hunnicutt, J. A. Kelley, H. A. Wood, and R. B. Becknell. The committee reported October 1916 that D. W. Hiott would serve and he was elected.

The method of securing a preacher prior to this was to elect a man from the floor. Many were elected in this manner, who would not serve.

They did at times contact a man to see if he would serve before the church officially elected him.

A church covenant was adopted in February 1917. In March the church agreed to observe homecoming and memorial day the third Sunday in July.

They also agreed to sell the old church Bible and give the proceeds to the W. M. S. A historical committee composed of T. M. Elrod, J. F. Hunnicutt, and R. B. Robinson was elected.

Rev. M. J. Stancil was elected for 1918 and the meeting days were changed to "the second Sunday and day before: Saturday at 3 P. M. and Sunday at 11 A. M."

In August 1918 the greatest number of additions in any revival was made. Forty-six by baptism, 6 by letter, and two by restoration. A total of 54 additions, enough for a church within the group.

On October 12, 1919 a resolution was adopted to take some steps to form a field between New Hope, Wolf Stake, and Pleasant Ridge Churches. The Deacons were instructed to meet with the general conference composed of the deacons of the churches composing the field and act for the church in the interest of New Hope.

During Rev. Stancils Ministry, the church continued to grow and make progress. The primary growth in numbers was during the revivals, in 1920 six were recieved: 18 in 1921: 21 in 1922; 17 in 1923 and 10 in 1924.

Nlex Harrison and Wife were baptized as a result of the meeting in 1922.

L. L. Sloan, George Wyatt, and J. H. Thomas were ordained as Peacons in October 1922. R. F. Jones preached the sermon and C. R. Abererumbie delivered the charge. A. C. Harrison was licensed to preach the next March.

Rev. M. J. Stancil resigned in 1924 and Rev. J. E. Burt was elected October 1924 at a salary of \$1000.60. This was the total salary in the Field. New Hope's part was \$445.00, based on membership. Money was becoming a little more plentiful and ushers were elected in 1925. The next year the field salary dropped to \$500.00, with New Hope paying \$220.00.

Frank Cappell served as pastor 1927-1929 J. F. Hunnicutt, Whit Knox, H. K. Morgan were ordained as deacons June 27, 1927, with Rev. Clyde Johnson

Died at his residence in Greenville district on Friday the 15th Jan last, Benjamin Arnold in the 78th year of his age. The subject of this notice was born in Virginia and when a small boy his father emigrated and settled near Petersburg in Georgia, Benjamin Arnold Sr (father) removed his family (from GA) and settled on Horse Creek in Greenville county in 1783. Here his son (Benjamin Jr.) lived and raised a large family. He had the misfortune to lose his wife in 1836. Early in life he was promoted to the command of the Regiment of Militia in the distict in which he lived and served in the office of Magistrate for upwards of thirty years. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 5 March 1847

The State of South Carolina, Pickens District: Before me the Subscribing Justice, Personally came and appeared Phillip Porter and made oath the written is a Just and True schedule of all his effects and says on his oath that he has not dispossessed himself of any property in order to obtain a pension from the State. Sworn to this 18 day Nov. 1831 before me Bailey Barton, JQ. Signed: Philip Porter.

I, Bailey Barton one of the Justices of the Quorum for the said District do certify that I have been long acquainted with Phillip Porter and can say he is a man of just character and that all faith and credit should be given to his affidavits as such. Signed: Bailey Barton, JQ.

The State of South Carolina, Pickens District: Before me the subscribing Justice of Peace for the said District, personally came and appeared JOSEPH CHAPMAN and took oath in due form of law and says on his oath that he knew Phillip Porter to be a faithful soldier in the Revolutionary War and that he frequently saw him doing duty and that he served with him under Capt. Maxwell and Roseman and says he knew Phillip Porter through the whole struggle and he was faithful to do his duty when ever called on. Sworn to and subscribed this 18th day of Nov. 1831 before me. Signed: Joseph Chapman with his (X) mark.

The State of South Carolina, Pickens District: I, Bailey Barton one of the Justices of Quorum for the said District do certify that I am well acquainted with Joseph Chapman whose name is above subscribed and that he is entitled to full faith and credit in my opinion. Signed: Baily Barton, JQ.

The following information about JOSEPH CHAPMAN was found in ABSTRACTS OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION FILES. Vol. 1, A to E; page 605. His file # is \$211691. He served in both the NC and SC line. He lived in Guilford County, NC at his first enlistment. Was at Turkey Creek in 96 District, SC for second enlistment. He was a resident of Pickens District on 12 March 1833 when he filed his application for a pension. He was born 25 Dec. 1745 in Halifax County, VA. Philip's comrade-in-arms and character witness of the 18 Nov. 1831 deposition, Joseph Chapman, died 18 Jan. 1836.

Evidence of Philip receiving a pension from the State of South Carolina was found in his file (#6044). He received a \$60.00 annuity in 1832, 1833, and 1834.

In 1832, Congress of the United States enacted legislation providing pensions for all servicemen, both in the Continental Army and the militia. These benefits were for servicemen who had been on active duty for six months Philip's application for these benefits are found in the declaration of 7 Oct 1843 below:

DECLARATION: In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th of June 1832..... State of South Carolina, Pickens District: Personally appeared on this 7th day of October 1834 before the Honorable Lt. P. Butler one of the associate Judges of the Said State in open court at Pickens Court House, Phillip Porter, a resident of the District aforesaid aged seventy one years, who being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the pension made by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832, that he entered the service of the United States in 1781 well as he recollects as he was then only about seventeen years of age in Ninety Six District, now Abbeville, S. C. as a drafted militia man in the company of Capt. Samuel Roseman and Col. Killgore's Regiment went one tour after the Cherokee Indians but before this My Father, Hugh Porter was taken prisoner by the British and I was exchanged for him and kept as a prisoner of war six months at New Bern, North Carolina, since at that time in Guilford County of the State and removed from hence to the District of 96 where I entered the service for 6 months under the said Capt. Roseman and Col. Killgore. He is positive at this time he served as scouts and in the service six months. He then volunteered as in the Cavalry under Capt. Maxwell was ready to start with him on an expedition when he was assigned by the Captain to stay and provide for the fort. He was then engaged in procuring provisions and guarding the said fort called Norrod's Fort and stood ready to be called out at any time ? 9 months, but says positively he was in the service 8 months at this time. This was in the year 1779 or 1780. He was a minute man under Capt. Maxwell till the close of the war and was always ready to reconnoiter and fight the Cherokee Indians on the frontier. He hereby relinquishes every other claim to a pension or an annuity except the present and he declares his name is not on the pension rolls of any agency or in any State and he answers this interrogatories required by the War Department to be part of the Court as follows:

Ist: He was born in Guilford County North Carolina on the first day of July 1763, he believes having no family register present

2nd: He has no family register but his Father had one in Abbeville, SC.

3rd: He lived in Guilford N. C. when exchanged to the British for his Father when he was 10 year old. His Father then moved after his return to Abbeville, SC where he entered the service under Capt. Roseman & Col. Killgore where he continued to live till about the year 1784 or 1785 when he removed to Pendleton District - now Pickens, where he has remained ever since and now lives.

4th: He was while in Abbeville always a volunteer and minute man.

5th: He was with General Pickens and Anderson and frequently saw them during the war.

6th: He never got a written discharge.

7th: He does not know any man who would dispute his word but is well acquainted with Bailey Barton, Esquire, Col. Benjamin Hagood, Major Keith, the Clerk of the Court, William D. Sloam, the Sheriff of this District. He would appeal with confidence to all whom he is known at this late period being measurably illiterate he can not so correctly recollect the particular dates as his memory is much impaired by old age and infirmaties. Signed Philipporter (typed as written). Sworn and duly in open court the day and year aforesaid before William L. Keith C. Presiding Judge.

I, William L. Keith, Clerk of the Court of the District of Pickens, S. C. do hereby certify that the foregoing contains the original proceedings of the said Court in the matter of the application of Phillip Porter for a pension.

In the testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal of Office this the 7th day of October 1834 and in the fifty-ninth year of American Independence. Signed: William L. Keith, Clerk of Court for Pickens District.

We, Robert Gains,\* a Clergyman residing in the Dist. of Pickens and Bailey Barton residing in the same hereby certify that we are well acquainted with Phillip Porter, who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration. We believe him to be seventy one years of age as he states that he is upright and believed in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution, and that we concur that opinion sworn and subscribed the day & year aforesaid in open court. before William L. Keith, C.C. Signed: Robert Gaines Signed: Baily\* Barton

And the said Court do hereby declare their opinion after the investigation of the matter and after putting the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary Soldier and served as he states and the Court further certifies that it appears to them that Robert Gaines who has signed the preceding certificate is a clergyman resident in Pickens District and that Bailey Barton, who has also signed is a resident in the same District of Pickens and is a credible person and that their statement is entitled to credit. Signed: A. P. Butler, Presiding Judge.

A copy of a letter from the DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, BUREAU OF PENSIONS, RECORD DIVISION, Washington, DC was included with the request for a copy of Philip Porter's pension application and declaration. It is a form (3-525) letter, "in reply to your request for a statement of the military history of PHILIP PORTER." An outline of his service as found in his application was entered in the appropriate spaces, with the final notation of, "....WAS REJECTED ON THE GROUND OF UNOFFICIAL PROOF OF THE ALLEGED

The evidence is somewhat confusing. It seems Philip received a pension from the State of South Carolina for the years 1832, 1833, 1834. Then he was denied a pension from the United States Government but his widow reapplies to the State of South Carolina and she receives a widow's pension from the State.

An enlightening article was found in <u>The South Carolina Magazine of Ancestral Research</u>, Volume IV, Winter, 1976, Number 1, page 3. Under the title "State Pensions to Revolutionary Survivors," was the following paragraph:

In 1842 the annual report of the Comptroller General to the General Assembly began to contain a "List of Annultants." (These reports are given in full in the printed Reports and Resolutions of the General Assembly, now found among the holdings of the South Caroliniana Library, the State Archives and other repositories.) Although not specifically so stated in the lists, these amnitants evidently were the beneficiaries of a State pension system which provided for veterans and widows of the Revolutionary and War of 1812 who for various reasons were not embraced by the Federal pension program. In 1834 the General Assembly had adopted "An Act for the regulation of the Pensioners of this State" which directed that "from and after the passing of this Act, all persons who are pensioners of the United States Government shall be stricken from the Pension Roll of this State." (ITHER sections of the Act provided that surviving officers, privates and widows of soldiers "who served in this State during the revolutionary war, although for a period of less than six months, who may have been wounded or disabled from such service" might reapply to the State for a pension, by petition to the legislature "setting forth that said petitioner has previously made application to the United States for a pension, according to an Act passed in Congress, in the year ... (1832) ... and shewing what was the result of such application..."

Under the <u>List of Annuitants</u>, 1842-1846, was the name of Philip Porter, residence of Pendleton and the year "1841" is entered in the column for 1842. Mary Porter, residence of Pickens and the year "1842" was written under the column for 1842. There is a number "one" under the columns for the years 1843, 1844, 1845, 1846.

Two years after Mary's death, son JAMES PORTER, was investigating the possibility of any additional claim due the legal representatives or children of his parents. There were probably some pages in this Pension file from the National Archives that were not included in the order as the last page ends abruptly; however, it is doubtful there was any more information of genealogical value.

POWER OF ATTORNEY: Know all men by these present that I, James Porter of Pickens District and State of South Carolina and one of the children and legal representatives of Phillip Porter, a Revolutionary Soldier and Mary Porter, his wife who is now deceased, do hereby irrevocably constitute and appoint John L. Neely of Washington District of Columbia my true and lawful attorney for me and in my name to examine into and prosecute any claim that may be due or found to be due the children and legal representatives of Phillip Porter and Mary Porter in virtue of said Phillip Porter's service in the Revolutionary War and the several acts and resolutions of Congress relative thereto and that might have accrued to either of the said parties and not drawn during their lifetime and now due to their legal representatives and to receive the certificate of Pension etc. when issued by the Department. Thereby confirming whatsoever my said attorney can do or cause to be legally done either in person or by substitution in the prosecution of said claim except drawing money on the said claim. I, revoking any other authority I may have given to any other person or persons in this premise whatsoever. In witness whereof I have hereto set my hand and seal this 5th day of September 1853. Signed: James Porter (Seal) Signed in the presence of L. B. JOHNSON (his signature) (nb) Elizabeth struck out & Mary inserted before signature.

State of South Carolina, Pickens District: On this fifth day of September in the year 1853, personally appeared before me, James Porter and acknowledged the written Power of Attorney to be his act and deed. Signed: J. W. NORRIS, JR Notary Public & Ex. Off. Magistrate for Pickens District, SC.

State of South Carolina, Pickens District: I, William L. Keith Clerk of the Court of General Sessions and Common Pleas for Pickens District in the State aforesaid, do hereby certify that J. W. Norris, Jr., Esqr. before whom the

preceding acknowledged agreement was made (as appears by his name in his own handwriting attesting) was at the date thereof a Notary Public and Ex Officio Magistrate for the District aforesaid who had been duly appointed and qualified and had signed the roll kept according to law in my office... (end of page).

There was an inconsistency in the spelling of Philip's name throughout the documents. It is interesting to note that Philip wrote and spelled his name *Philip* while the clerks usually used *Phillip*.

Records of Annuities and pensions paid by South Carolina to Revolutionary War soldiers, widows and orphans are found in the South Carolina Archives. They are entitled "House of Representatives Annuities, Claims, and Pension Reports." Philip Porter's Pension and Annuity file is number 6044. Included in these records are copies of the Audited Accounts and stub entries for Philip's service as a private in the militia "since the reduction of Charleston." He was paid eight pounds, eleven shillings, five pence sterling in 1785 plus eleven shillings & eleven pence for one years interest on the principal sum of eight pounds, eleven shillings, five pence. Apparently the General Assembly of South Carolina passed an ACT on the 16th of March 1783 authorizing the State Treasurer to issue interest-bearing certificates called principal indents for military service rendered "after the fall of Charleston."

Many of Philip's descendants believe his father, Hugh Porter, as a Justice of Peace in Orange County, North Carolina was somehow sympathetically involved with the 2,000 or more Regulators at the Battle of Alamance River, 16 May 1771. However, evidence found in Governor Tryon's financial records indicate Hugh Porter was in the Governor's Militia.

Some of the financial records of Tryon's militia force (pay rolls, enlistment certificates, and warrants for commissaries' claims), one journal and several order books of the 1771 campaign are now in the Military Collection found under the heading WAR OF THE REGULATION.

THE CORRESPONDENCE OF WILLIAM TRYON AND OTHER SELECTED PAPERS, VOLUME 2, edited by William S. Powell. "Expedition Expenditures Listed by Tryon" which were "Submitted June 30, 1771," covered "Expenditures made by His Excellency Governor Tryon for the Public Service from the Time of His Marching from Newbern with the Troops the 24 of April 1771 until their Return." On page 798, under the date June 7 in the following entry "Gave Hugh Porter for His Expenses....1" (pound). The name of Hugh Porter was followed by the number 8 indicating there was a footnote. Footnote # 8 found on page 800 reads as follows, "Little is known of Hugh Porter except that he was commissioned to be a justice of the peace in Orange County in May, 1757. Saunders, COLONIAL RECORDS, V, 813."

Hugh's offense against the British must have occurred about 1773 or 1774 since Philip says in his sworn testimony he was "ten years old" when his Father was taken prisoner by the British. Philip was exchanged for him and kept as a prisoner of war for six months in New Bern, NC.

A will for Philip's father, HUGH PORTER, was found in Abbeville District, SC. This will was written 2 May 1808 and was proven in Court 18 July 1808. Hugh was predeceased by two children, son James and daughter Violet. "Heirs of my son James" are mentioned in the will but not named. A grand daughter, Mary Chiles Brightman, was named and it is presumed this grand daughter was the child of Violet. Usually, when grandchildren are named in a will it is because the parent is deceased. Mary Chiles Brightman was not married and she was under the age of eighteen at the time the will was written. The other legatees were: son, Philip; daughter Margery; son William; daughter Mary; son Hugh; son John; daughter Martha; son Samuel. Hugh's wife must have predeceased him too as she is not mentioned in the will.

\*\*It is not known for sure that Joseph and Elizabeth Hallum Smith are the parents of Mary as she was not mentioned

in the will of Joseph Smith.\*\* It is troubling in that Mary and Philip Porter named a son, Basil Smith Porter, supposely after Mary's brother, Basil Smith and he, too, was not mentioned in the will.

The will of Joseph Smith (as typed by the WPA with some punctuation and spelling corrections)

In the name of God amen. It is appointed for men to die, 1, Joseph Smith of South Carolina Pendleton District am in a low State of health but am in my right mind think it proper to leave my will and testament and this being my last will and testament I first recommend my soul to God and my body to be buried in decent Christian burial. I will and bequeath unto my Daughter Elizabeth one black horse, a side saddle and bridle, also a feather bed and furniture. also a half dozen of earthen plates, also a cotton wheel, also set of tea ware, also two cows. I will and bequeath unto my daughter Milly forty five dollars, also a feather bed and furniture, also two cows. I will and bequeath unto my son Joseph my plantation houses, lands, and tenements and all my plantation tools and every article of sock (sic) or house furniture except what is given in this my will to the other legatees. It is also my will that my wife Elizabeth should live upon the plantation with my son Joseph her life time and to enjoy a comfortable living from the said plantation and stock (?) I will to Joseph my son. I also will and bequeath unto each of my children five shillings a piece and if my son Joseph should die before my wife Elizabeth, at her death it is my will that all the property I leave to my son Joseph be sold and equally divided among all my children. It is my will and testament that my Negro woman Lucy be free and at full Liberty at the death of wife Elizabeth. I will and bequeath unto the said Lucy, my Negro, one bed and furniture also one cow and calf also all her clothes, also a half dozen earthen plates the enter lines is taken in I also leave my son Job to be executor of the said will--Witnesses thereof I set my hand and Seal this 8th of April 1814....Joseph Smith (SEAL). Witnesses: John Hudson, John L. Weaver, Thos. Gassaway.

This copy was "Reproduced from document in South Carolina Archives Department Columbia, S. C. Anderson Co. Wills, Vol. 2, Floating Wills, page 17 - Joseph Smith."

Requests for a copy of Joseph Smith's original will were futile. Along with an identical copy of the same WPA typed will, the 23 May 2000 response from the Probate Court of Anderson County was: This is all that we have in Anderson County. This is a typed copy that was put into a book. We do not have anything else for this time period.

The 7 Sept. 2000 reply from S. C. Department of Archives and History was: The original, signed copy of a will is filed in an estate in the Probate Judge's office in South Carolina. Joseph Smith's estate, filed 1814, is Anderson (Pendleton) Estate #661. It appears that the original will has been removed from this estate, as it was not present when microfilmed in the 1950's.

Only four children are listed in Joseph Smith's will, three, Elizabeth, Milly and Joseph as legacies and son Job as executor. There are so many typographical errors and misspelled words in the WPA typed version of his will that one wonders if the credibility of the entire document has been compromised.

Some Smith researchers have credited Joseph and Elizabeth (Hallum) Smith with having more children than listed in the above will; however, documentation is missing. The following list of their children was found in <u>Smith Wills-Deeds & Family Histories</u>, Vol. I by Linda G. Cheek but Mrs. Cheek included the following disclaimer, "Concrete

proof is still needed on this line."

- 1. Mary Smith, 2. William Smith, 3. Milly Smith/Basil Smith, 4. John Smith, 5. Rev. Job Smith, 6. Charles Smith,
- 7. Dorcas Smith, 8. Martha Smith, 9. Elizabeth Smith, 10. Thomas Hallum Smith, and 11. Joseph Smith.

To add to the confusion the following names and dates have surfaced and they are thought to be from the "JOSEPH SMITH Bible:"

MARY SMITH, born 8 Feb. 1768;

WILLIAM SMITH, born 17 Oct. 1770;

BASIL SMITH, born 1 May 1772.

A 2 Aug. 2000 letter from Thomas E. Smith of Shelby, NC says, "The Bible that had the entries of Basil and Mary was referred to as the Joseph Smith Bible probably because it went to Basil's son Joseph and that Joseph and Basil lived next to each other in 1800."

However, MOLLIE (MRS. PHILLIP) PORTER was named in Grace Smith Pettyjohn's book, Memorial Tribute to John Smith and Martha Pickens, as a child of JOB SMITH. This book was written in 1912. The following list of children for JOB SMITH was found in this book: 1. JOHN SMITH, 2. DORCAS SMITH GASAWAY, 3. JOB SMITH, 4. WILLIAM SMITH, 5. BASSIL SMITH, 6. NANCY (MRS. JOHN D. TREADAWAY, 7. MOLLIE (MRS. PHILLIP) PORTER, 8. JOSEPH SMITH.

"WILLIAM, JOB AND BASSIL SMITH were all Methodist ministers. William Smith married Nancy Charles."

The introductory paragraph from this book is as follows, "Records of the Smith family are very meager. From the best evidence obtainable it is known that Job Smith, of Scotch-Irish descent, served through the Revolutionary War as a soldier form the State of Virginia, and afterwards went to South Carolina and secured a large grant of land from the State and settled by the waters of Three and Twenty Creek, on which land his body now lies buried."

Grace Smith Pettyjohn credits older family members, named in her acknowledgement, for supplying information about the early history of this "Smith family." It is important to remember this book was created in 1912, some hundred and forty-three years after the birth of Mary Smith. With the acknowledgement that records about the Smith family were very meager, it is presumed she relied on oral history passed from one generation to another for the conclusions presented in her book.

There doesn't seem to be any conclusive evidence that MARY SMITH, wife of Philip Porter was the daughter of either JOB SMITH or JOSEPH SMITH and his wife Elizabeth Hallum. It is entirely possible that both of these families had daughters named MARY SMITH and that they may not be the Mary Smith, who was the wife of Philip Porter.

Evidence that Mary Smith Porter was well acquainted with a JOB SMITH, prior to and during the Revolutionary War was found in Linda Cheek's Smith Wills-Deeds & Family Histories, Vol. 1: Mary Porter made an affidavit 17 Sept. 1834 in Pickens District, SC for Job Smith (Rev. War pension application #21983) "That she was personally acquainted with Job Smith in the time of the War. That she lived about 1/4 mile from said Job Smith and that her father and Job Smith entered the service together. Their families were so close that they were together almost every day."

Additional information about JOB SMITH was found in <u>GENEALOGICAL ABSTRACTS OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR FILES</u>, Volume III: N-Z, pg. 3196: # 21983 JOB SMITH: GA and SC Line. Soldier was born 25 Dec. 1748 in York County, PA and he lived in St. Paul's Parish in GA & in SC during the Revolutionary War. Soldier applied

for a pension 6 Oct. 1834 in Pickens District, SC where he had lived for 45 years. Soldier had also received a SC pension, soldier died 8 or 10 Nov. 1837 in Pickens District, SC. In 1856 Mary Right or Wright & Lourany or Lurany Smith were the only surviving children of the deceased soldier. In 1856, a Harvey A. Smith & William Smith were of SC but their relationship "if any" to soldier's family was not given.

A copy of the entire the JOB SMITH REVOLUTIONARY PENSION APPLICATION; FILE # S.21983 was ordered from the National Archives. Part of this pension application is included here as it may provide clues for finding additional information about the parentage of MARY SMITH PORTER.


PENSION OFFICE, April 12, 1834(?). Sir - The case of Job Smith of SC has been examined in connection with the additional evidence filed by you, - (????) (????) that Mary Porter declares that her father served with Smith. The records at Columbia should be examined for confirmation of this statement. It might assist in the adjudication of this claim. An administrator should be appointed upon his estate and proof of the date of his death & his widow, if he left one, and what children are now alive should be furnished. (Signature unreadable).

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, PICKENS DISTRICT: Personally come Mrs. Mary Porter before me James Osbourn, one of the Justices of Quorum in and for the State & District aforesaid and made oath in due form of law that she was personally acquainted with Job Smith the present applicant for a Pension in the time of the American Revolution, that he the said Job Smith was then called a true whig, that she (and) this deponent lived in the time of the revolution not exceeding one fourth of a mile from the said Jobe's residence, that she distinctly recollects of the said Job and this deponents Father entering the service of the United States together and was absent at that time as near as this deponent can recollect about seven months - that living so near the families were together almost every day, that she (k)new the said Job Smith was absent from home in the time of the revolution for several years and she believes he was in the service of his country. Sworn to and subscribed before me this 17th day of September 1834. Jas. Osborn, J. Q. Signed: Mary (X) Porter.

SOUTH CAROLINA, PICKENS DISTRICT: I, James Osborn, one of the Justices of the Quorum in and for the State and District aforesaid do hereby certify that I am personally acquainted with Mary Porter who hath subscribed and sworn to the above oath - That she is a Lady of known veracity and that due faith and credit ought to be paid to her oath - Given under my hand this 18th day of September 1834. Signed: James Osborn, J. Q.

The following declaration by Job Smith is found in his application: State of South Carolina, Pickens District. On this Sixth day of October 1834 personally appeared in open court before A. P. Bulter, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas now setting, Job Smith, a resident of said State and District, aged Eight five years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832, that he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated. That he entered the service of the United States in St. Pauls Parish Georgia, a private volunteer, under Capt. Benjamin Few, Col. Leonard Marbery and marched to S. C. to what was called Snow Camps. a service of only 20 days then returned home and marched to Savannah in Georgia at the time of the siege, and fought there more or less nearly every day for 15 days - returned home and immediately volunteered in a Company of minute men then called mounted militia, under Capt. NATHAN SMITH and performed the service of guarding the frontier against the Indians. After the expiration of that time was stationed for some time in Powels fort on Ogeehee under Capt. Jourdan. Then at Fews fort on Ogeehee under Capt. Bancies was dismissed from the fort and moved to S. C. and volunteered to guard Norrods Mills on Saluda river but does not recollect the name of the officer - from there was stationed at Reids Mills, an (?) (?) came under Capt. John Johnston - Then performed a short tour under Capt. Robert Maxwell after the Tories overtook and fought them in Saluda River that there were but few liberty men where he lived and he could not stay at home in any safety and therefore made it a point to volunteer during the campaign in almost every campaign during the war. Was under the command of Capt. Robert Anderson, Col. Andrew Pickens, afterward General Pickens. Marched to the neighborhood of Ninety-Six - employed in collecting men to besiege Ninety-Six and prevent the Tortes from entering the place was a soldier in the army at the siege of Ninety-Six, was sent an express from there to Georgia. That owing to old age and consequent loss of memory, he cannot recollect all his service but that it was six years from the time he entered the service until he was finally

James Hamilton. He hereby relinquished every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any other state. Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid. Signed: Job Smith.

Included in the Job Smith Revolution War Pension Application file is the following letter dated 6 December 1937 from A. D. HILLER, Executive Assistant to the Administrator to G. W. BAGWELL of Winder, Georgia:

Dear Sir: The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, S.21983, based upon the service of Job Smith in the Revolutionary War.

Job Smith was born December 25, 1748 in York County, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents were not stated.

While a resident of St. Paul's Parish, Georgia, Job Smith volunteered early in the Revolution, and served as a private in Captain Benjamin Few's company, Colonel Leonard Marbury's Georgia regiment, was in the Snow Campaign to South Carolina; he was in the Siege of Savannah, no officers' names shown for this service, after which he served in Captain Nathan Smith's company and guarded the frontiers against the Indians, was stationed at Powels Fort under Captain Jourdan, and at Fews Fort under Captain Banoi???). He moved to South Carolina about the time of the "fall of Charleston" and served under Captains John Johnston, Robert Anderson, James Hamilton, Pugh, Samuel Earle, John Wilson, Robert Maxwell, Colonels Fickens, Thomas Farrar, and Brannon; he was at the Siege of Augusta and the Siege of Ninety-Six. Length of his entire service about five years.

Pension was allowed on his application executed October 6, 1834, at which time he was a resident of Pickens District, South Carolina, where he had lived about forty-five years. He was also (\*222222) State of South Carolina

The soldier, Job Smith, died November 8 or 10, 1837 in Pickens District, South Carolina.

Reference was made to his wife and children as living during the Revolution, name of wife not stated.

In 1856, Mary Right or Wright and Lourany or Lurany Smith were the only surviving children of the soldier. Harvey A. Smith and William Smith were in South Carolina in 1858; it was not stated that they were related to the soldier.

In 1841 Mary Porter was petitioning the SC legislature for widow's benefits. These petition papers to the South Carolina Senate and House of Representatives for widow's benefits for a Revolutionary War Soldier were included as part of Philip Porter's South Carolina "accounts audited of claims."

THE PETITION OF MARY PORTER PRAYING FOR A PENSION: THE HONORABLE THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA: The petition of Mary Porter sheweth that she is a resident of Pickens District South Carolina and widow of Philip Porter deceased who was a Revolutionary soldier and pensioner of this State who departed this life on the eighth day of May last - that she shared the greater part of the perils of the revolution with him as his wife. She therefore prays your honorable body to be placed on the pension list as the widow of the aforesaid Philip Porter, deceased and as in duty bound will ever pray. Sworn to and (?) (?) before me the 17th of Nov. 1841, Philip Young, J. Q. Signed: Mary (X) Porter.

The Committee on the Military and pensions, to which was referred the petition of MARY PORTER, widow of Philip Porter late a revolutionary pensioner of this State; praying to be placed on the pension roll; begs leave to report, that the committee has had the same, under consideration, and recommends that the prayer be granted and that she be placed on the pension roll of the State. Ino. Buchanan, Chairman. The committee on Military & Pensions sent Mary's petition to the Senate 30 Nov. 1841 and to the House of Representatives 9 Dec. 1841.

It is not known just when Mary was placed on the pension rolls as there are only two surviving receipts from the Tax Collector of Pickens, John Brown, to R. C. Griffin, Treasurer of the Upper Division. Both Receipts are for \$30.00. One is dated June the 2nd 1849 and the other one is dated May 28th 1851. (See paragraph from SCMAR on page 7).

House and Family number 765 of the 1850 US Census of Pickens District - Eastern District lists Samuel A. Porter, age 35, occupation is farming with a value of \$800; Mary Porter, age 85 is in this household. Both Mary and Samuel list SC as their place of birth. (Basil Smith's place of birth is listed as GA on the 1850 Census).

Will of Mary Porter (as found in <u>A Collection of Upper South Carolina Genealogical and Family Records Vol. I, pg. 248</u>:) Box 24, Number 290, Probate Judge Office, Pickens Dist., SC. "As live is uncertain and death is sure, I make this my last will and testament. I give to my dtr. Mary Ann Perry one bed stead and feather hed and furniture and one stand of curtains, one large chest and one side saddle. I give to my son, James Porter two dollars and fifty cents in money. I also give to my son Bassell S. Porter one white cow and one small pot. I give to my son Samuel A. Porter two feather heds and furniture, one clock, one cupboard and all cooking ware, etc. I appoint my son Samuel A. Porter and James E. Hagood executors. Dated 20 Jan. 1851. Wit: Martin Gant, Isam X Simmons. Signed Mary X Porter. Proven 2 April 1851.

There is a lot of circumstantial evidence surrounding the parentage of Mary Smith Porter but no conclusive proof It is likely she was the sister of Basil and William Smith because of those three birth dates found in the fragment of a Bible Record.

It seems extraordinary that MARY SMITH PORTER lived to be between eighty three and eighty six year old. Two birth years have been found for her - 1768 & 1769 but her age was listed as 85 on the 1850 Census. She was a child during the Revolutionary War, a teenage bride and mother, a pioneer woman living much of her life on the frontier of SC. She was the mother of thirteen children - nine sons and four daughters. Evidence reveals several of her children lived to "ripe old ages." They must have inherited their hearty mother's genes.

#### Individual footnote for Mary Smith

Job Smith Revolutionary War Pension Application number S21983 was ordered from National Archives Trust Fund, Washington, DC 20408 (NWCTB). Approximately 15 pages were received 19 July 2000. These pages didn't include Mary Porter's affidavit. Copy of her affidavit was sent by Calvin P. McBroom, 6616 Peacock Blvd., Morrow, GA 30260. Cal viewed this file at the National Archives Branch in East Point, GA and says there are 37 pages.

His wife was Amelia (Millie), b. 12 June 1772 in VA. Who were her parents? Both died between 1850 & 1853 in either Pickens or Anderson, S. C. Suspect Basil's parents were Joseph and Elizabeth Hallum Smith, but can't prove."

The following dates were taken from the "JOSEPH SMITH Bible," so-called because it belonged to Basil Smith's son, Joseph Smith.
