Trip Report

David and Mary Gandini's garden, 19 May

It's been a few years since Cairns Branch of SGAP visited David and Mary Gandini's garden, a large rambling affair of interesting natives and unusual exotics overlooking the suburb of Earlville. A small group of us (2) gathered on the Gandini's balcony, and after a cup of tea we headed out for a wander.

Like any good garden, over the years it has progressed and grown and changed. It suffered badly in Cyclone Larry (though not as bad as some of our members from a little further south), but is recovering well. Many of Mary's magnificent collection of orchids have suffered during the dry conditions of the recent times. However, some of the dryadapted species in the garden are magnificent - a beautiful Neofabricia myrtifolia (4) grows near the back boundary, the magnificent Cape York endemic Hoya macgillivrayi drapes one of the shadehouses, and next to the fishpond is probably the only cultivated specimen of the as yet undescribed flat-leaved grass tree (3), Xanthorrhoea sp. (Cape Bedford M.Gandini AQ601576).

The Gandini's are also fortunate to have a healthy *Lithomyrtus obtusa* (1). Mary advises that this species, with it's delicate pink flowers and soft attractive foliage, is exceptionally difficult to cultivate, and modestly notes that it's probably due more to luck than skill that she has this specimen in her garden.

We took advantage of the Gandini's barbecue facilities to fry a couple of snags for lunch, then finished off our wanderings with a walk through the small, cyclone damaged rainforest that has been cultivated on the steep lower slopes of the property. Despite the damage, the forest contains a healthy diversity of large native trees, which support an equally healthy population of hungry mosquitoes. Thank you David and Mary for the guided inspection tour of your property.

Two new books have been brought to our attention this month through the state newsletter. They're both excellent publications, and deserved a repeat mention here.


Plants of Capricornia

A substantial gap in the published literature of the Queensland flora is being filled by the publication of *Plants of Capricornia* by Rhonda Melzer and Joel Plumb.

The authors were prompted to begin work on the book Plants of Capricornia approximately ten years ago because of the poor coverage provided by available plant books for Central Queensland, and in particular the Rockhampton - Capricorn Coast areas. The book has finally come to fruition, with assistance from the Capricorn Conservation Council.

Advance orders are now being taken for this book (to be published in September), which can be purchased through the Capricorn Conservation council (PO Box 4011 Rockhampton, 4700, 'phone 4927 8644). Prices are \$50 for the soft cover edition, \$80 for the hard cover, with \$11 postage and packing.

EREMOPHILA and Allied Genera



This book is the result of thirty years research by Dr R.J.(Bob) Chinnock, the world authority in the family Myoporaceae, in which he has produced a new classification of the family resulting in the delimitation of 3 new genera, 94 new species and 37 new subspecies, and a revised infrageneric classification of the genera *Eremophila* and *Myoporum*. Treatment of species includes a detailed description as well as analytical drawings, notes on distribution, ecology, conservation status and relationships.

The book has 672 pages, 335 colour plates, 300 maps and 325 line illustrations. The retail price is \$99.95, and it can be purchased from Rosenberg Publishing Pty Ltd, Box 6125 Dural Delivery Centre, NSW, 2158, or online at
