Public meeting on Tilden solar farm September 13

Would occupy 1,200 acres if approved

By Travis Lott A public hearing regarding the Tilden solar project, in which two companies intend to construct a large-scale solar farm, was postponed due to scheduling issues, according to the Randolph County Zoning Board of Appeals.

The meeting was originally scheduled for August 23. It will now be held Tuesday, September 13 at 7 p.m. at the Randolph County Courthouse.

The two companies, Sol Systems and Tenaska, have partnered to create Tilden Solar. The partners plan to place the solar farm on approximately 1,200 acres of land near Tilden.

According to the company, the project would increase Randolph County's gross domestic product by \$25 million during the construction phase, which is slated to take place between 2023 and 2024, with a target date of 2024 for the solar farm to be operational.

The company estimatess that the construction of the solar farm would temporarily provide more than 300 full-time jobs. It would employ two full-time and two part-time workers once the project is operational.

The September 13 hearing will provide the public an opportunity to learn more about the project and voice any concerns they may have with its construction. According to a representative from the Randolph County Land Resource Management office. company representatives had a scheduling conflict, which caused the postponement of the meeting. There are no known issues with the company's application for a special use permit.

Perry County board weighs options as energy costs rise

The news was not good when a representative from Affordable Gas and Electric of Mt. Vernon proposed a bid for energy procurement to the Perry County Board of Commissioners August 18.

Under the proposal from AGE, the electric supply rate of 4 cents per kilowatt hour has more than tripled to more than 13 cents.

This would be the price for a one-year contract.

AGE representative Bruce Wallace said the company is offering the fixed rate to counties as a way to safeguard against further cost which he are expected to continue to rise. According to information he distributed to the board and members of the media, sources at Ameren Illinois informed AGE and other energy distributors that costs are expected to continue to increase for up to four years. A letter from Ameren states that the increases are due to global market pressures and the fact that renewable energy generation such as solar and wind power has not kept

Solar and wind power cannot meet the demand

pace with the number of fossil fuel plants that have closed.

The letter states: This has created a capacity shortage in the region that covers linois cus driving up the capacity portion of the supply bill by approximately 47 times. AGE also noted that Russia's invasion of Ukraine has further stressed the global energy market, causing a spike in costs all over the world. Other factors include post-pandemic demand for energy and natural gas, which stalled on an industrial level during pandemic-related shutdowns, and low production and storage levels of natural gas across the United States.

All of this means that the average Ameren customer has been paying as much as \$41 more per month since June.

'It's a sad state of affairs," Wallace said.

AGE is offering 12, 36 and 48-month contracts, each that would decrease in cost. For example, the per-kilowatt-hour cost over 48 months would be nearly 11 cents, compared to more than 13 for a one-year deal.

The county commissioners thanked Wallace for the proposal, but because it was not on the agenda as an action item, the board could not act Thursday. ommiggionarg noted tha it would be on a future agenda. Wallace said the prices listed in the proposal would expire in November. In other news, the board approved moving the September 1 county board meeting to the Tamaroa Village Hall at 548 West 2nd Street. The meeting will take place at 5 p.m. This is a continuance of a plan to move the first meeting of every month to different locations in the

Semi leaks diesel fuel throughout Randolph County

By Travis Lott A semi was stopped by Chester police in the early morning hours of August 19 after reports that it had been leaking diesel fuel throughout the town.

According to Chester police, officers stopped a truck driven by Richard Hickox, 59, of Franklin, Arkansas at 1:44 a.m.

The truck, owned by Holt Transportation of Alma, Arkansas, was carrying grain, which was delivered to Gilster-Mary Lee in Chester.

Employees at Gilster reportedly informed the driver of the leak. However, police said the man told Gilster employees that he didn't know what could have caused the leak and didn't have anything to fix it anyway, so he kept going.

Hickox was supposedly headed to ConAgra to load up with more grain.

Gilster employees informed police of the situ-

ation, and the truck was tracked down by following the trail of diesel fuel. Police stopped the truck at the intersection of Kaskaskia and Water streets. A large amount of diesel fuel was spilling from the truck when police located it.

The Chester Fire Department was called to assist in the cleanup, and about 18 bags of Oil-Dri were used to soak up the fuel at the location of the traffic stop.

There were reports of a strong smell of diesel fuel all over town.

The fire department called E Environmental Solutions of Effingham to assist in the cleanup, and the Illinois EPA was called to investigate.

The leak was tracked all the way up to Conant Road near Pinckneyville, and diesel fuel had to be cleaned up along State Route 154 through Sparta

Water bills on the rise

No official ordinance has been written yet, but Willisville water customers will soon be paying more each month.

At the August 16 town board meeting, it was agreed to an increase in water fees to have the least effect on the minimum users.

Willisville has 327 customers, counting those out of town.

Mayor Clarence Warner noted that if the town does not raise rates to the state EPA's liking, it will be difficult to get grants. As of this fiscal year, the profit made by the sewer service is about \$20,000, while water profit is about \$12,000, according to a J.T. Blankinship engineer who was at the meeting.

In the end, it was decided to post no sewer charge increase, but water rates will go up some time after the board acts on the final ordinance, probably in September.

For in-town customers, the minimum charge will remain at \$20.25 for the first 2,500 gallons. For each 1,000 gallons thereafter, it almost doubles, from \$6.73 to \$11.81.

For out-of-town customers, the minimum remains at \$23.25 for the first 2,500, and goes up from \$7.91 to \$12.99 for each additional 1,000.

There are no price breaks for heavier us-

ers per 1,000 gallons. Another long discussion came at the end of the meeting, when the board decided on pay increases for town employees.

Warner and Treasurer Cheryl Salger left the meeting room for the discussion.

In the end, the board gave maintenance worker Derrick Vogel a \$2 wage hike. His hourly rate goes from \$14 to \$16.

Worker Alden Miller's wage goes from \$12.25 to \$13.75 an hour.

Clerk Maria Diamond's hourly pay increased from \$13.75 to \$14 an hour.

Salger is paid differently, and no pay increase was offered. Earlier in the meeting, she noted that she did not want a pay increase.

Diamond said there was a lot of discussion on the wage issue, with some motions made but not seconded.

Diamond commented on how she feels about her relatively small pay increase. She said she works 24 hours a week.

"I work part-time, and the others work outside," she said. "I'm not thrilled with (my wage hike), but I can't change it. I've been here for two and a half years with no pay increase."

Diamond said she will be looking around for other jobs.

In other action, the

board changed its liquor ordinance because of what was an apparent conflict between the Illinois and Willisville laws.

The village ordinance stated that no one under 21 could be in a bar after 9 p.m. unless accompanied by a parent.

However, Illinois law states that liquor servers can be 18.

Therefore, some Willisville bartenders could have been put out of work.

For consistency with the state, the board changed the ordinance to now say that no one under 18, rather than 21, can be in a bar after 9 p.m.

The owner of Broadway Corner Lounge said she has trouble finding bartenders as it is.

Warner announced that Police Chief Jeff Glenn will resign effective December 1, and Chad Howard will also be leaving whether or not he is elected Perry County sheriff.

It was agreed to advertise for a police chief.

The board continues to work on the zoning issue at the Walter Meeks property.

Meeks will be sent an order for zoning correction. Meeks is living in a building zoned for highway business.

No zoning hearing has been held on the matter.



Plants and weeds ordinance updated, library to be painted

The Sparta ordinance in regards to plants and weeds was officially updated during the city council's August 22 meeting.

The council also approved a bid to paint the library and discussed the purchase of a rescue pumper truck for the fire department. problem if people are reading it differently. In other news, the council accepted a \$17,500 bid from Bradley's Painting of Coulterville to paint the entire outside of the library.

Klausing said Bradley's recently did the painting at the Misselhorn Art Gallery. applying for grants. Schlimme was con-

Schlimme was concerned with the cost of the truck and that the council was not given this information sooner than several days prior to the meeting.

Schlimme suggested that Rucks get with Commissioner Alan Young, who heads the Financing Committee

Commissioner Nathaniel Ward introduced the plants and weeds ordinance amendment several meetings prior. During the council's August 8 meeting, Mayor Jason Schlimme

asked for the item to be tabled so he could consult with attorney Alan Farris about some questions he had.

This time, after some discussion, the amendment was approved, with Commissioner Bobby Klausing voting present.

Ward has stated that he is trying to overhall the ordinances that fall under his department. The ordinance relating to plants and weeds had not been updated since 1992.

One of the main changes to the ordinance is to make sure that everybody, those who work for the city and the residents, understand that three days is allotted for an issue to be resolved with plants or weeds at a residence once a notice is issued to the property owner with a clear explanation of the problem.

Ward read from the old ordinance, saying that it clearly stated that three days should be given before the city does anything at the property.

However, Farris contended that was not the correct way to interpret the ordinance.

To his point, Ward noted that too many times, the old ordinance was being misinterpreted, and he said there is a At that time, Klausing asked the company for a bid for the library.

Bradley submitted two bids, one for the entire outside of the building and one for a wall that is in need of attention. The price for that one wall was \$7,000.

Klausing noted that he did not seek any other bids because \$17,500 is under the amount that requires a formal bidding process.

"We have to keep things maintained," said Commissioner Michael Kelley.

The council approved a one-year agreement with Blue Cross Blue Shield for employee insurance benefits. The offer from Blue Cross represented a 10 percent increase. Blue Cross was the only company to submit a bid.

Fire Chief Tim Rucks opened a discussion with the council for the possibility of purchasing a new rescue pumper truck for an estimated \$750,000.

Rucks said, if the truck is approved to be purchased, the department would sell its 1983 truck that is out of service, as well as its 1999 truck.

Rucks said he has also obtained information from a finance company that is willing to help finance the unit through payments over 12 years.

Klausing asked if any grants were available. Rucks, as well as Ward, noted that the department is always for the council, to see if there is any money available for such a purchase.

Young stated that without some sort of grant, there would not be enough funds.

"If we're needing two or three trucks down the road and bind ourselves to this for 10 to 12 years, we won't be buying another one anytime soon," Schlimme said.

Schlimme indicated that he was not saying the department does not need a new truck, but he has seen surrounding towns purchase refurbished trucks for nearly half the cost of this one.

"We need to sit down as a group and discuss this," Schlimme said. "We need to find a way to get all that we can for what we can afford."

The council approved the reappointments of Peggy Petkas and Don Adams to the library board on terms to expire June 30, 2025.

Kelley reported that Richard Prest will retire soon after 37 years as the streets lead supervisor.

During public comment, two gentlemen raised an issue with the growth of weeds in ditches and along streets, asking for the city to do something about it.

Klausing asked them to get with him so the city can check out the situation and get it taken care of. **OPINIONS**

policy Chester's is that only school earned cords and stoles are allowed. Yet, military recruiters are allowed to recruit on school property during school hours. Doesn't that make recruiting a school sponsored event?

Graduates are given a dress code to follow. No jeans, no boots, no tennis shoes and black shoes only for girls. Every single one of those dress codes were broken by various students for the 2021 ceremony. Every student who broke the code was still allowed to partake in

the ceremony. Yet, enlisted students are threatened with being pulled from the ceremony if they display their military stole before the end of the ceremony.

Two school board members have the personal belief that the military makes it too easy to quit during boot camp and they don't want to honor potential quitters by allowing military stoles at CHS graduation. The same two board members have offered some sort of recognition at a future game or event if the graduated enlisted returns to Chester after boot camp. Too little too late, in my opinion.

Tick-borne virus found in Jackson

The Illinois Department of Public Health has confirmed that an older person who resides in a rural area of Jackson County recently tested positive for Heartland virus, the third reported case in Illinois since 2018.

The exact area of the county where the virus was found was not released.

Likely spread by the Lone Star tick, more than 50 cases of the disease have been reported in the Midwest and southern United States since 2009.

Heartland virus was first identified in 2009 when two Missouri farmers who had been bitten by ticks were admitted to a hospital. Almost all individuals with Heartland virus have been hospitalized.

Although most people infected have fully recovered, a few older individuals with more than two chronic diseases have died.

There are no vaccines to prevent Heartland virus infections. Signs and symptoms of infection are like those of other tickborne diseases and can include fever, headaches, fatigue, muscle

aches and diarrhea. Most people have reported becoming sick about two weeks after being bit by a tick.

While there is no treatment, doctors can treat some of the symptoms. If you have been bitten by a tick and think you may have Heartland virus or another tick-borne illness, visit a health care provider.

Ticks are commonly found on the tips of grasses and shrubs. They crawl and cannot fly or jump. The tick will wait in the grass or shrub for a person or animal to walk by then quickly climb aboard. Some ticks will attach quickly, and others will wander, looking for places like the ear or other areas where the skin is thinner.

To avoid tick bites, wear light-colored, protective clothing—longsleeved shirts, pants, boots or sturdy shoes, and a head covering. Treat clothing with products containing 0.5 percent permethrin.

Apply insect repellent that contains 20 percent or more DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 on exposed skin for protection that lasts several hours.

Walk in the center of trails so grass, shrubs, and weeds do not brush against you.



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

County finances tight, **COVID** money helping

The Randolph County Board of Commissioners received the 2021 county audit during its August 19 meeting.

While the overwhelming takeaway of the audit was favorable, there were some negative items of note.

CPA Jim Schmersahl of Schmersahl Treloar & Co. of St. Louis explained that it was a positive year overall for the county during a year that was impacted by COVID and COVID funding.

Schmersahl added that cash was up substantially over the last couple of years. The county benefited from COVID funds received and a decrease in pension liability costs.

"Things are still really tight financially, but they are better than they were," Schmersahl said.

Sales, income and replacement taxes received from the state were up for the county, but the majority of the reason for that was because these taxes were collected more slowly because of COVID.

Schmersahl commented on county facilities, including the Randolph County Care Center.

The care center saw a profit of over \$700,000, which is more than the last two years.

However, without grants received by the care center, it would have shown a deficit.

The care center received nearly \$900,000 in operating grants and contributions, whereas it received nothing in that item the previous year.

The charges for services received was also down around \$700,000, which is because of fewer residents.

In closing, Schmer-

sahl noted that a county that has \$23 million in revenues deserves to have a more robust accounting reporting system.

"This is a large sophisticated government entity with lots of moving parts," Schmersahl said. "You've gotten by, but you need a more sophisticated accounting structure. It's time to restructure it."

Schmersahl understood that the county had some turnover in employees who generally handle the accounting, in addition to the COVID situation, but he still thinks this has to be addressed.

Commissioner Dave Holder said he believes that the county needs an internal financial administration. He said that the county should hire an individual who is an accountant with a degree or something similar.

"The complexities of the system require a higher proficiency," Holder said. "How we can get that accomplished, I don't know yet, but we're pursuing it. We need to find the individuals and put the right structure in place."

The other issue from the audit is how late the real estate tax cycle has become the last few years.

Schmersahl noted that in 2019, the cycle ended in February and saw slippage to March in 2020 and 2021. He said the county needs to get it back to November. Holder said this year the cycle is looking at closing in January with the hope to get back to November in 2023.

"I can safely say we are six weeks ahead of last year," added County Clerk Melanie Johnson.

In other news, the board approved a resolution to partner with Monroe County in applying to join the Southwestern Illinois Development Authority.

The authority promotes, encourages and facilitates economic development in the southwestern Illinois counties of Bond, Clinton, Madison and St. Clair.

The only way for other counties to join is for them to apply and gain approval through state legislature.

The board also approved to designate September 1 as Retired Teachers Day in Randolph County.

During the 2021-22 school year, 42 members of the Retired **Teachers Association** donated 10,858 hours of volunteer service.

In personnel, appointments were made for Steve Gonzalez, Edgar Lakes Drainage District, expiring September 2025; Richard Guebert, Prairie du Rocher and Modoc Levee District, August 31, 2025; Derek Klein, Kaskaskia Island Levee and Drainage District, September 2025, and Laura Woodworth and Mike Schmitz, Randolph County Extension Board, September 1, 2023.

Circuit Clerk Julie Carnahan reported that her office recently received a \$33,000 technology grant, which will be used to get new video systems for the courtrooms.

Emily Lyons reported that the Randolph County Tourism Bureau is in the process of updating the county map. She asked that if anybody knows of any changes, especially in tourism areas, to let someone from the tourism board know.














Will Friedens try something similar again? You bet, maybe next quarter.



Du Quoin has made the playoffs 34 times since qualifying in 1984.

Football ready for fresh start with new coach

It has been a difficult road of late for the Pinckneyville High School football program.

The Panthers have not held a winning record since finishing 5-4 in 2015. Since then, the most wins the Panthers have had in a season is three, coming in 2018.

During the 2020-21 season, which was shortened by COVID, Pinckneyville was forced to play only a junior varsity schedule because of a lack of players.

This season, the Panthers will be coached by Ryan Lott, who is the team's third coach in the last four years.

Lott was the head coach at Massac County in 2015 and 2016. He also served as an assistant coach at several stops, including four years for Jerseyville High School and two at Carbondale High.

"One of my main goals this season is to be competitive week in and week out," Lott said. "We want to continue competing regardless of the situation in the game."

Over the last four weeks of the 2021 fall season, the Panther offense was able to put up at least 24 points in a game twice.

However, of the seven games they played last season, they allowed over 45 points in all of

them.

"I feel like the offense will continue to improve from week to week," Lott said. "It has shown flashes of not only moving the ball, but doing so in an explosive manner.

"Our defense will be solid and continue to improve as the players become more comfortable and familiar with the system."

Junior quarterback/ defensive back Jase Lee (6'1, 165) and sophomore quarterback/defensive back Brayden Cleland (5'9, 160) are battling things out for the starting quarterback role. Both will serve as the leader of the secondary on defense, as well.

Pinckneyville has

seven seniors returning that Lott expects to contribute in various ways. Those players are offensive/defensive lineman Adam Bochantin (6'2, 250), wide receiver/defensive back Asher Jausel (6'0, 155), running back/linebacker Chase Schneider (6'0, 210), wide receiver/ defensive back Kellen Scott (6'4, 170), offensive lineman/linebacker Bradley Denny (5'10, 215), running back/ defensive back James Deering (5'9, 150) and offensive/defensive lineman Andrew Jett (6'2, 350).

Two juniors who have established themselves as defensive leaders are linebacker/wide receiver/running back Karson Konkel (6'6, 220) and linebacker/ full back Jonah Tanner (6'5, 200). Junior linemen Jacksen Weatherford (6'2, 206) and Allen Irvin will contribute on both sides of the ball.

Three sophomores who will contribute to begin the season are running back/defensive back Marshawn Fisher (5'10, 155), running back/linebacker Logan Jausel (5'9, 170) and offensive/defensive lineman Ian Crawley (6'0, 226).

"The team is doing the things necessary to get the program going in the right direction," Lott said. "What has stood out to me is

Football Musketeers want defense to pave the way

The Red Bud High School football team missed out on the postseason for just the second time in the last five seasons when it finished with a 4-5 record last fall.

The Musketeers have made the playoffs seven times during the 20 seasons Dave Lucht has been coach, advancing as far as the Class 2A state quarterfinals in 2007, when they finished 10-2.

Red Bud achieved back-to-back winning seasons and playoff appearances in 2016 and 2017 and returned to the postseason in 2019. Last season, the Musketeers were 4-3 with two weeks to go, needing to win at least one of the games to become playoff eligible. They were turned away, though, with losses to **Chester and East Alton-**Wood River.

Red Bud has a slew of players returning from that team who know how close they were to a playoff berth.

Red Bud brings back seniors running back/ linebacker Nick Gantner (5'10, 170), tight end/line backer Devin Hall (6'2, 220), offensive/defensive lineman Noah Tepe (5'11, 185), offensive/defensive lineman Kyle Loughner (6'0, 210) and wide receiver/defensive back Evan Dressel (5'8, 160) and juniors wide receiver/linebacker Sam Easter (6'1, 180), wide receiver/defensive back Lucas Schwartzkopf (5'9, 135), offensive/defensive lineman Nolan Krack (6'1, 240) and offensive/defensive lineman Ty Carter (6'0, 200).

Gantner, Red Bud's leading rusher, was a Cahokia Conference Illinois Division allconference selection on offense, while Hall, the team's top tackler, was all-conference on defense.

"Compared to last year, our defense should be better," Lucht said. "We're looking at that being our strength, especially early on when we're trying to find a quarterback and help them get comfortable. Our running game should also be better than last year."

Perhaps the biggest question mark for the Musketeers is the quarterback situation.

During its scrimmage August 19, Red Bud took a look at seniors Thomas Friess (5'11, 185) and Ayden Shemwell (5'9, 150) and sophomore Dylan Oliver (5'10, 150). Shemwell did throw for 166 yards last season, but no matter who wins the starting job, it will be their first season as a starting varsity quarterback "The maroon-white night was a big night for all three of them," Lucht said. "They all bring different dynamics to the position.

Friess is more of a deep threat and is stronger and can run the ball. Shemwell is very smart, also gives us the run element and is capable of leading the offense. He and Friess are both captains. Or, with Oliver, being a sophomore, if he pans out, having him for three years at the position would be nice.

"Nobody has really bridged the gap so far. We'll have to make a decision, and hopefully it's the best decision."

No matter who the quarterback is, Red Bud has confidence in the players around him. In addition to Gantner, junior running back/linebacker Trace Wagner (5'10, 160), sophomore running back/linebacker Gavin Baldwin (5'8, 150) and senior running back/ linebacker Mitch Fleming (5'7, 165) are expected to see carries. Hall also has experience running the ball.


On the outside, Dressel and Easter are starting wide receivers, with junior wide receiver/ defensive back Owen Liefer (6'1, 160) and junior wide receiver/ linebacker Chase Lucht (5'10, 160) in the mix, as well.

"On the offensive line, we're kind of just replacing one player," Lucht said. "We're still kind of undersized compared to what we will see, but we were smaller at the position last year and did a pretty good job. All of them got better. If those guys execute, we'll have a chance."

Defensively, Hall, Schwartzkopf, Gantner and Dressel are some of the team's top tacklers from a season ago.

Several other players expected to make an impact are senior defensive lineman/tight end Jarrell Nesbitt (6'4, 230), who transferred in from Sparta, junior linebacker/offensive lineman Dylan Minemann (6'0, 210) and senior defensive/offensive lineman William Chausse (6'1, 290).

"We bring back both



"It could take a couple of games for our offense to get comfortable, so we're hoping the defense can get it done."

Those first three games of the season will be critical as it pertains to the postseason.

Red Bud opens with three nonconference games at home against Pinckneyville and Roxana and at Breese Central.

"Ideally, we come out of that 3-0, but those are three tough teams," Lucht said. "Going 2-1 still gives us a pretty good chance, but if we go 0-3, we will have a hard road and a lot of work to do. We're wanting to get back in the playoffs, so we have to

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

While progress has yet to show up in the win column, Gerlach is confident that things are moving forward.

Gerlach's first season took place during the shortened COVID season. The Bulldogs went winless in four games that season and were forced to cancel three other scheduled games because of a lack of players.

Last season, Sparta struggled again out of the gate and ultimately finished 0-9, including 0-5 in its first season in the Cahokia Conference Illinois Division.

One of those wins was a 21-0 shutout over Red Bud in Week 8 that clinched the conference title for Chester.

"The conference will be tough this year," Belton said. "Wesclin, Dupo and Red Bud are all returning a lot of players. It should be a very competitive conference this year.

State historians Kev Varney and Tom Sikorski have updated their list of the winningest high school football programs in Illinois state history.

Continuing to lead the charge is East St. Louis Senior, which has compiled 809 victories from 1925 through 2021. East St. Louis is the only program with greater than 800 wins.

The only other programs with more than 700 are Chicago Mount Carmel 780, Tuscola 742, Arcola 739, Chicago/Wilmette Loyola 728 and Wheaton/Central/Warrenville South 712.

Du Quoin sits at 31st in the state with 609 wins. The Indians have

an overall record of 609-322-29 from 1928 through 2021, good for a .649 winning percentage.

Chester has moved into a tie for 219th in the state with 392 victories, spanning from 1923 through 2021. Chester was tied for 221st going into last season, with an overall record of 392-443-21. Sparta, which has had a program since 1924, is tied for 339th, with 308 victories. The Bulldogs' career record is 308-534-26. They were tied for 329th going into last season.

Pinckneyville is tied for 345th with 303 wins. The Panthers, who have had a program since 1930, are

303-476-23 overall. Their state standing was tied for 335th going into last season.

Other schools of note are Harrisburg 574 wins, 41st; Murphysboro 561, 51st; Benton 534, tied for 69th; Johnston City 526, tied 74th; Carbondale 522, tied 78th; Carmi-White County 496, tied 103rd; West Frankfort 488, 107th; Herrin 487, 108th; Eldorado 444, tied 152nd; Anna-Jonesboro 444, tied 152nd; Carterville 439, tied 158th; Christopher-Zeigler-Royalton 431, tied 167th; Marion 398, tied 212th; Fairfield 391, 221st; Dupo 375, tied 237th; Sesser-Valier-Waltonville 361, tied 260th; and Nashville 361, tied 260th.
