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Local FedEx packages found dumped in ditches

Newly hired driver suspected

In a bizarre incident, local authorities have recovered 95 packages that were apparently dumped by a Federal Express driver on backroads throughout Randolph County.

Randolph County Chief

Deputy Jarrod Peters said he first learned of the incident Monday about 5 p.m. when a deputy called to inform him that 41 packages were found in the grass and in the ditch along Diamond Cross Road in rural

Coincidently, a package Peters was expecting was among them.

Another 44 packages were found on Lessley Road later that same evening between Sparta and Baldwin by Zach Allard of Sparta, who went looking for them after speaking

with FedEx employees in an attempt to locate a lost package.

Allard had been expecting a delivery of an expensive item—a \$750 XBox video game console. The item was listed as having been delivered, but it wasn't at his home.

After contacting FedEx, he learned that the package had been scanned on Lessley Road, so he went looking.

First, he saw one box. It wasn't his. So he searched again, finding dozens more. Thankfully, his package was among the 44 boxes strewn about in the grass, and it wasn't badly damaged. He said others may not have been so lucky, because some were in the mud.

"I've never seen anything like this," Allard said. "It's

He called police, and a sheriff's deputy collected the packages.

'The grass I found them in was pretty tall," Allard said. "There could still be more out there.'

Another 10 packages were found Tuesday morning on Plum Creek Road just west of Sparta.

Peters said the packages were handed over to a Fed-Ex representative Tuesday

Primary election in 2022 could be moved

Largely on partisan lines, lawmakers passed an elections bill Monday that would push back the date of the 2022 primary elections amid other major changes to the state's election code.

The 156-page bill, filed by Rep. Maurice West, D-Rockford, would also strengthen the state's cybersecurity surrounding elections and make Election Day a holiday among other provi-

The bill was filed Sunday night, passed the House 72-46 at about 6 p.m. Monday, then passed on a partisan 41-18 split in the Senate at about 10 p.m. It will need only a signature from the governor to become law.

Under the legislation, in 2022, early voting for primary elections would start May 19 and primary election day would be moved to June 28.

State primaries are typically held in March.

The dates for nominating petitions for primaries would also change, with those seeking office able to circulate petitions starting January 13. Congressional and judicial candidates must have petitions filed by March 14.

The provision changing these dates is set to expire at the start of 2023.

"The state has always had a really long window between the primary and the general, which makes the political season long and risky, negatively affecting public policymaking," West said to committee members Monday. "Our proposal is to do this one-time change

From March to June on a trial basis

just to see how it works and I think it will be beneficial to the state and then it can maybe be something we keep, moving forward.'

The bill would also make the date of the general election, November 8, a state holiday in 2022. It will be considered a legal school holiday, and any schools closing due to the holiday would "be made available to an election authority as a polling place for 2022 General Election Day." This provision would also expire

at the start of 2023. One provision would also create a permanent vote-by-

mail list. Under current law, voters must apply for a vote-bymail ballot for every election. While that process would continue, election officials would also offer an application for permanent vote-by-mail status. The application would allow vot ers choose to receive ballots for all partisan-locked elections, non-partisan-locked elections, or both.

The legislation would have voters who apply to be on the list remain on it until they request to be removed, change their reg istration or register to vote in another county.



Walker said he will argue for a prison sentence.

of Sparta was sentenced May 17 to two years of first offender probation.

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Obscurity's Magnet By Matt Meacham

Intellectual honesty, not ideology

Wouldn't you know it. Shortly after I devoted last month's Obscurity's Magnet to my favorite news analysis and commentary program, Rising, its hosts, Krystal Ball and Saagar Enjeti, announced - on my birthday, no less - that they're leaving to start an independently produced program, similar in content and format called Break-

TheHill.com, which produces Rising, is replacing them with Emily Jashinsky and Ryan Grim, capable commentators who have appeared on the show as guests and substitute hosts. I'll continue to follow Rising, and I'm especially eager to see what Enjeti and Ball do with Breaking Points.

Typically, when liberal and conservative commentators co-host such programs they either function as adversaries or find common ground based on their mutual allegiance to establishmentarian politics. Contrastingly, the commonalities between Ball, who represents a center-left perspective, and Enjeti, who speaks from the center-right, stem from their shared populism.

Their authentic, intellectually honest populist commentary represents a much-needed alternative to both the phony, intellectually bankrupt populism associated with our previous president and the combination of establishmentarianism and simplistic identity politics offered by many national political figures and corporate media outlets.

Among the many Rising segments that I find compelling is "How to End the Business Model of Division," January 15, 2021, featuring Eric Weinstein, a polymath who has become one of my favorite public intellectuals recently. Weinstein's interpretation of the general condition of our national political and media landscape closely resembles

"There are two cults, which I've called 'Wokestan' and 'MAGAstan," he comments. "Neither of these things is particularly serious, but they're both capable of taking the country down, and the key issue that we face is that the kleptocracy in the center between the left and the right is sponsoring this exciting live-action role playing event." To paraphrase, our socio-political sphere is dom-

inated to a troubling extent by two identity-oriented factions - one on the left, one on the right both of which have immersed themselves in their ideologies so fully that their perceptions are dis-torted and their capacity for intellectual honesty There is still a middle, but unfortunately, many

of the most influential people and institutions occupying it seem to be united largely by their commitment to accumulating wealth for themselves and others like them, often at the expense of those unlike them. Also unfortunately, many of them profit – electorally, monetarily or otherwise – from the conflict between the identity-oriented factions on the right and the left, and therefore are more inclined to fan the flames than to douse them.

Weinstein argues that the spirit in which many members of those factions participate in manifestations of that conflict, such as the January 6 insurrection at the Capitol, resembles that of live-action role playing. He likens much of the discourse surrounding the conflict to kayfabe, the fictional mythology associated with professional wrestling and the complex theatrics by which it's promul-

What is the antidote to the kayfabe, the live-action role playing, the reality-warping ideological zealotry, the artificially intensified polarization that, as Weinstein says, seems disturbingly "capaole of taking the country down?" I believe think Weinstein would agree - that a significant part of the answer to that question is rigorous intellectual honesty. In particular, we must assidu-

• Motivated reasoning: Deciding what we want to believe then seeking evidence and arguments to support it rather than assessing the relevant evidence and arguments honestly in order to determine what to believe. We're experiencing an epidemic of motivated reasoning. When I listen to representatives of the identity-oriented left and right, I constantly find myself thinking, "They couldn't possibly believe such a self-evidently nonsensical claim had they evaluated it with intellectual honesty rather than ideologically motivated reasoning.'

 Assuming that the opposite is the antidote and reacting to any idea or action that we consider objectionable by immediately asserting or doing precisely the opposite, forgetting that, in many cases, the opposite of an error is another error. In my view, this tendency largely explains why the identity-oriented right and left keep receding further

and further into absurdity.

• Assuming that anyone who rejects one ideology embraces its opposite. My rejection of identity-oriented conservative fanaticism does not indicate that I embrace identity-oriented progressive fanaticism, and vice versa, I assure you.

District maps fail compactness test

Democratic map-makers in Springfield have crafted new legislative district lines that are so laughably offensive to the Illinois Constitution that the state Supreme Court will either have to reject them outright or confirm the court's reputation for partisan political corrupt-

The state charter is crystal clear: "Legis-lative Districts shall be compact, contiguous and substantially equal in population. Representative Districts shall be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population. Merriam-Webster

defines compactness as "closely and neat-ly packed together; dense." Many of the proposed

northern Illinois House districts are the opposite of compact. They wriggle out from Chicago's city center

Districts are supposed to be compact, contiguous and equal in population

like skinny, arthritic fingers, clawing their way outward to find enough votes to provide districts for incumbent Democrats.

Think of the voters in these anti-compact districts. How in the world would they ever know which district they were in, who represented them and of whom to contact when they might have a problem with Illinois government?

Obviously, the Democratic mapmakers are, to use an old saying, selecting their voters, rather than letting voters select their representatives.

We wouldn't be facing such atrocious maps if the state high court had allowed onto the ballot in 2016 a proposal to allow voters to determine if they wanted an independent commission to draw maps, without partisan gerrymandering. But the court, in an opinion of four Democrats in the majority and three Republicans in the minority, blocked this opportunity, with probably the most contrived bit of jurisprudence since the Dred Scott decision, which prompted the Civil

Nor can the Illinois Supreme Court hide behind earlier decisions. Indeed, this court in 1989 declared a state legislative district invalid because it offended the compactness requirement of our state charter and forced a redrawing. The districts proposed in the map are as bad as that invalid district.

Because of requirements that districts be equal in population, valid districts can't, of course, always be perfect squares. But come on - the proposed, tortured district maps are the height of political arrogance. Democratic leaders obviously assume that the state high court will again play its partisan hand, as it did five years ago.

Democratic leaders in Springfield have overplayed this one badly. Mike Madigan would not have been so brazen.



License plate fees on small trailers could drop

It took all session but finally there was bipartisan agreement on legislation to lower the cost of license plates for small trailers, according to state Representative Paul Jacobs (R-115th).

Senate Bill 58 would reduce the license plate renewal fee for small trailers from the current \$118 to \$36 a year.

The \$100 a year license fee increase approved by the General Assembly and signed into law by Governor J.B. Pritzker in 2019 has had a chilling effect on the number of small trailer license plate renewals, Jacobs There have been as many as 150,000 fewer trailer renewals since the fee increase took effect.

"There were a number of bills to lower the license plate fees on small trailers, but eventually the compromise was to lower the fees to \$36 per year," Jacobs said. "I would have preferred reducing the license plate charge to a one-time fee, but at least we were able to get the cost lowered.

"This is something I hear a lot about from constituents, and I am pleased we were able to get this bipartisan compromise done before we adjourned.'

packages has been terminated.

"The safety and security of our customers' shipments is a top priority for FedEx Ground and service providers are expected to handle packages with the utmost care," the statement reads. "These packages will be delivered to their intended recipients and we apologize for any inconvenience caused by this situation. The individual responsible for this incident is no longer providing service on behalf of

The company declined to name the driver.

Peters said the FedEx representative he met with also told him that the employee had recently been hired and had only been on the job a few days.

A motive for the package dumping is unclear. It appears that, in each location, the driver scanned the packages as delivered then dumped them from the truck.

"Obviously, this wasn't an accidental

thing," Peters said. Peters said FedEx

has been unable to get in touch with the driver, but the company will continue an investigation into what happened. The FedEx representative also told Peters that the employee has been flagged to prevent him from obtaining employment in this kind

of work again. It's a good thing the majority of the pack ages were recovered when they were, Peters said, because they likely would not have survived the steady rains that drenched the area throughout the day Tuesday.

While many may have been waiting on items that weren't necessities, at least one woman called the sheriff's office because her medicine hadn't been delivered and was likely among the packages that were dumped.

Despite consequences through his employment, authorities in Randolph County are unsure if a crime had been committed. Peters said that is yet to be determined by the sheriff's office and state's attorney's office.

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

Bricktown Market now open

A partnership between a local businessman and the city of Sparta has brought a building on the south end of town back to

333 South St. Louis Street, which has housed many businesses over the years including Dandy's Deli, is now Bricktown Seafood, Meats and Deli.

The property has sat vacant for some time now, and the city had it slated for demolition for about two years. However, city manager Corey Rheinecker said that was never the avenue Sparta wanted to

The expense the demolition and cleanup was well over \$100,000, Rheinecker said, all to have a vacant lot on that corner.

"An empty lot with grass doesn't do a lot for the city," Rheineck-

After speaking with several interested parties about putting a business in the location, city officials were beginning to think an empty lot would be the outcome, because the work to rehabilitate the property was immense. It needed to be brought back up to code, compliant with the Americans with

"Not many people wanted to take on that kind of challenge," Rheinecker said. Then came Jus-

tin Hewitt, owner of Broadway Grille on Sparta's downtown Broadway Street.

Along with wife Ashley Hewitt and brother Eric Hewitt, Justin acquired the property and entered a TIF agreement with the city to rehab the property.

The city invested a total of \$135,000 into the property through TIF funds, as long as they

Under the agreement, the Hewitts had to invest a large sum of their own money into the project, which Rheinecker said they did.

Justin also said the business will do custom cuts of meat and large seafood orders on request.

The deli also serves sandwiches such as French rolls and sub sandwiches, and it will soon start serving daily hot specials such as smoked wings.

Having just opened May 25, Justin said the support and business he's gotten from the community has been tremendous-which goes to the heart of what he wants Bricktown to be.

"We are focused on quality, customer service and the community," Justin said.

In keeping with the value of the community, Justin said anyone in need can contact Bricktown about potential fundraisers.

One fundraiser that Justin plans to do as an annual event is a crawfish and shrimp boil to raise money for the fire department, an event that would feature live music, as well. He hopes to host the first one in August of this year.

Bricktown is open from 9 to 7 Monday through Friday, Saturdays from 9 to 4 and Sundays from 9 to 2.



On June 1, the Lady Panthers hosted Harrisburg in a first round game of the Class 1A Pinckneyville Section-

Pinckneyville sent home eight goals, five in the first, en route to an 8-0 victory, which was the first postseason win in the history of the young varsity program.

"That's a big start for us to win our first playoff game," said Pinckneyville coach Jay Ray. "The girls were pumped and very excited to get their first postseason victory at the high school level. I was pleased with the way we played."

Next on the docket for Pinckneyville (6-8) is a showdown Friday, June 4 at 4:30 p.m. at Massac County (5-7-2).






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Randolph County now has resource guide

Lawmakers pass \$42.3 billion budget after 2 a.m.

lawmakers worked into the early hours of Tuesday morning to pass a \$42.3 billion state budget plan for the upcoming fiscal year that Democrats say would fully fund K-12 education and the state's pension obligations while also paying down a sizeable portion of the state's

Lawmakers have been working on the budget since Governor J.B. Pritzker delivered his proposal in February, and it passed on mostly partisan lines.

The job became easier with better-thanexpected tax collections this year as well as passage of the federal American Rescue Plan Act, which will provide about \$8.1 billion that the state can spend over the next four fiscal years.

Lawmakers said they plan to use the money for one-time projects such as affordable housing development, public health improvements, violence prevention programs and infrastructure projects.

Republicans, however, complained that infrastructure spending was entirely directed by Democrats.

Highlights of the proposed budget include increasing funding for the evidence-based funding plan for K-12 public schools by \$350 million, bringing the total to \$9.2 billion.

It also calls for spending about \$7.5 billion in state general revenues on Medicaid, plus another \$7.4 billion for other human services; \$1.9 billion for higher education; another \$1.9 billion for public safety; and \$1.4 billion for general services. In addition to those

regular items, the plan calls for spending about \$2.5 billion of the ARPA money Illinois expects to receive. Of that, \$1.5 billion would go for things like economic recovery programs to help businesses hardest hit by the pandemic, public health, affordable housing and violence prevention programs like after-school activities, and summer youth employment.

Another \$1 billion of the ARPA funds would be directed into the ongoing Rebuild Illinois capital improvements program to accelerate some of the projects slated for construction.

Republicans posed the plan because it also relies on eliminating or delaying the implementation of roughly \$660 million worth of corporate tax cuts and business incentives, which Democrats have termed corporate loopholes.

One of those calls for delaying any further phase-out of the corporate franchise tax, which was a concession Democrats had made to Republicans in 2019 to reach bipartisan agreement on the budget and a \$45 billion "Rebuild Illinois" capital improvements plan.

The budget bill passed the House minutes before midnight, 72-24. But it took until the early hours of June 1 for the package to come up for a vote in the Senate, thereby triggering a constitutional requirement that it pass by at least a three-fifths majority, or 36 votes.

It passed the Senate with 37 votes after a short debate.

The budget package next goes to Pritzker for his consideration.


