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## Zak/Stoll sweeps to big UISG victory

■ Lana Zak's ticket won with what observers said was a surprisingly wide margin of victory — 400 votes.

It might have been the stickers. At least that's what Lana Zak jokingly said was the reason students elected her to be the next UISG president.

Just two hours after the polls closed Tuesday evening, the Student Elections Board announced that the Zak/Stoll ticket had won by a surprisingly large margin — Zak received 1,270 votes, 400 more than the nearest competitor.

Voter turnout for this year's election was the highest since 1996, with 3,028 students, or 11.27 percent, turning out at the polls.

Zak said she has many promises to uphold to both her supporters and the UI student body. Being dedicated to public service is one way she can prove she's up to the task, she said.

"I am most dedicated to keeping the students as interested and involved in UISG as they have been for the past two weeks," Zak said.

Despite the controversy surrounding this year's campaign, she said, each candidate did possess sincerity in wishing to serve UI students.

"Everybody did try to make the campaign clean," Zak said. "Everybody who ran was well-intentioned."

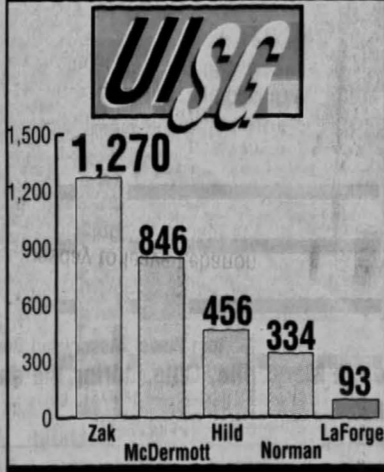
"People attempted to be fair," said Shanna Wycoff, who lost the vice president position. "Some are more fair than others."

The amount of research Zak put into her platform is one of the reasons she thinks students voted her into the executive office, she said.

"The right things don't always happen," she said. "But the students looked into our platform and made a decision."

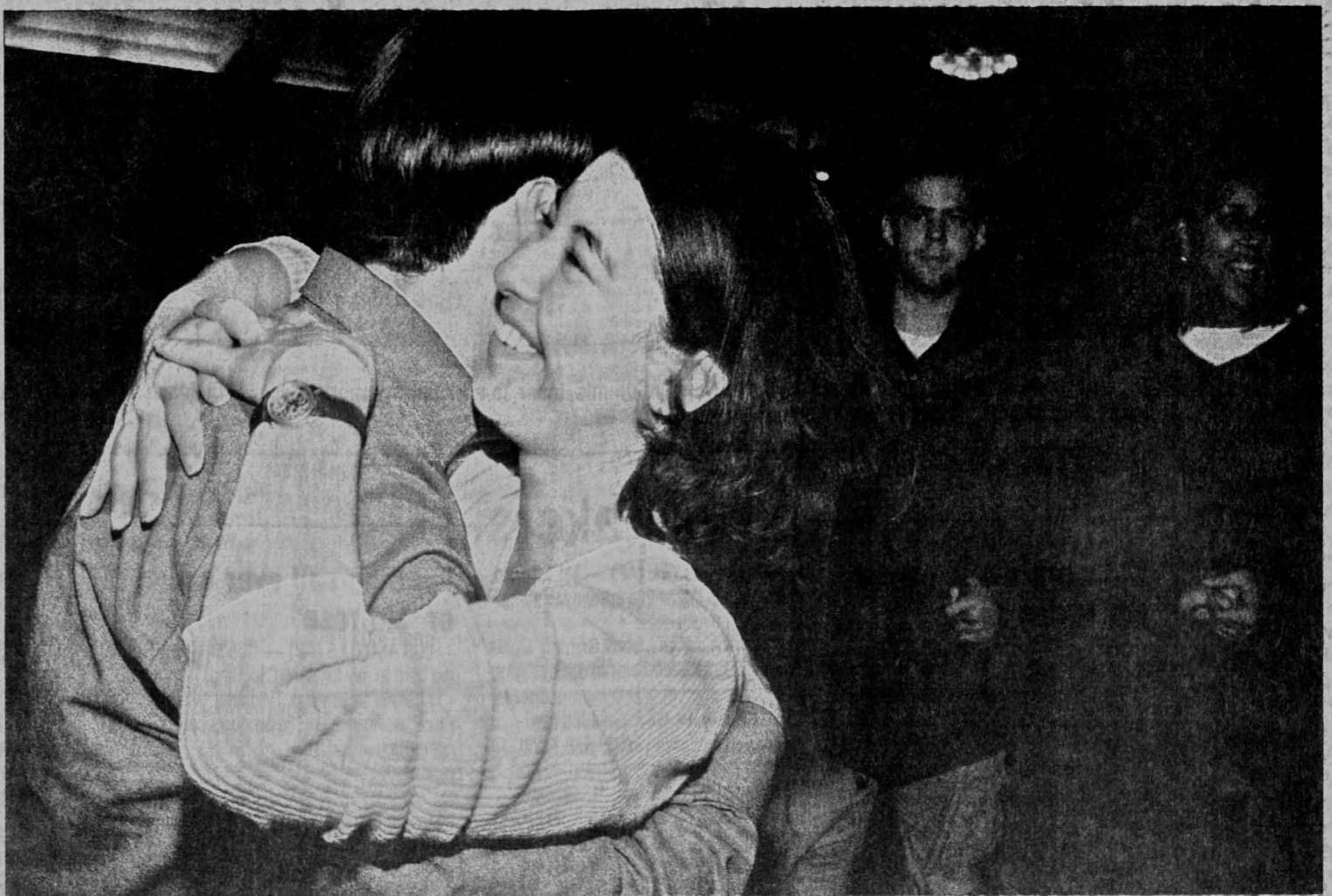
Andy Stoll, said relief was the only emotion he could express when he learned he would take over the vice presidential seat next year. And, he said, it couldn't have happened without Zak and the rest of the slate.

"We all had a burning fire inside that ignited us," Stoll said. "Together, we exploded."

Tuesday's election results came in around 9 p.m.; current Vice President Scott Schuman barely had time to adjourn the regularly scheduled UISG meeting before current senators started flocking to Zak to offer their congratulations.

"I'm glad so many people were involved (in the election) this year," said Sarah Pettinger, a UI senior and executive undergraduate activities senator.

## And in this corner ... long faces and disappointment

■ Some losing candidates support Zak's victory, while one complains of backstabbing.

Sad, angry and, in some cases, absent faces made up the losing tickets as the Student Election Board announced next year's UISG president Tuesday night.

Matt McDermott, who came up 436 votes shy in his bid for president, said he was disappointed about his loss.

"We got trounced pretty good," McDermott said.

McDermott said he hoped he could work on issues raised by winning ticket Lana Zak/Andy Stoll's platform in the UISG Senate next year.

"Lana and I have a lot of the same ideas," he said. "I wish her the best of luck."

Brian Norman, who received 334 votes in his losing presidential bid, said he felt Zak was a good choice for voters.

"She will do a great job as president," he said. "She has a lot of experience."

But not all of Tuesday night's losing office-seekers were so gracious in their defeat.

"Backstabbing is a good way to win," said Shanna Wycoff, who ran for vice president on the George Hild/Wycoff ticket. "I don't think it's fair to degrade another ticket when speaking in public."

Shaun Cassells, who ran for vice president, said he had reservations about Stoll's youth.

## UI lab looks to squash 'superbug'

■ The Hygienic Laboratory is working hard to win the race between medicine and mutation.

It sounds like the latest sci-fi novel: humans racing for survival against a bacteria known as the "superbug," which strains the medical industry's ability to treat disease.

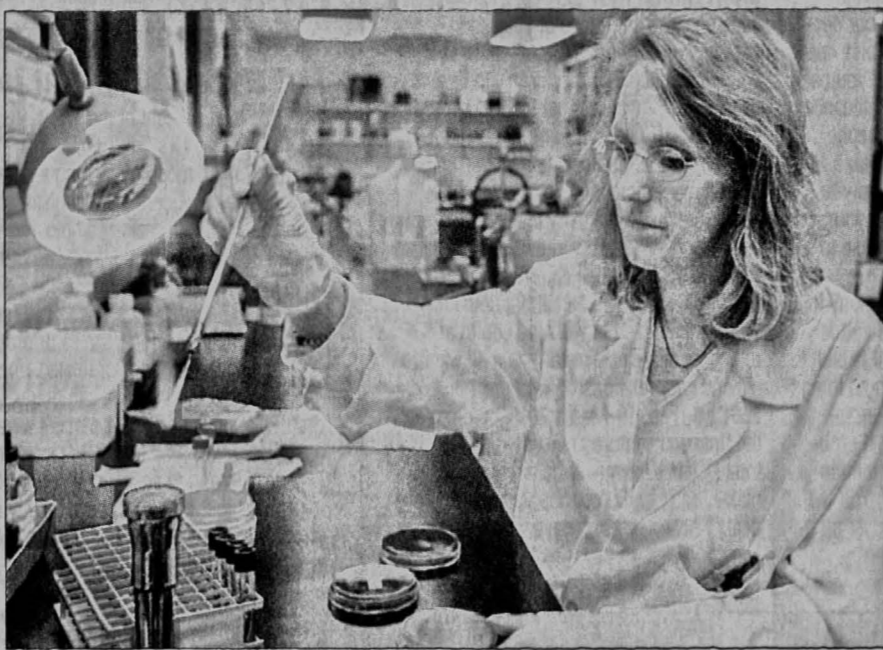
But the real work being done in the field popularized by novels such as "The Hot Zone" and "The Andromeda Strain" is much less glamorous, says Mary Gilchrist, director of the UI Hygienic Laboratory.

"This is hard, challenging work," she said. "It's not so romantic as it's depicted in novels."

The lab is the UI's only environmental and public-health laboratory. One of its current and most pressing problems is the so-called "superbug," bacteria resistant to all treatments.

"Bacteria are neck-and-neck with antibiotics," she said. "But the bacteria are pulling out ahead."

The bugs are winning the race for a variety of reasons, Gilchrist said. Patients generally use excessive amounts of antibiotics, and physicians

are pressured to prescribe the drugs more often. When more antibiotics are used, weaker bacteria cells are killed, leaving stronger, more resistant ones. The resistant strains then produce more of their own kind, she said.

The Hygienic Lab, which was established in 1904, was designed to research public-health issues. Besides its quest to stop the next "superbug,"

the lab also tests for sexually transmitted diseases, screens children for lead poisoning from house paint and screens newborns for genetic disorders.

The wide variety of work being done in the lab is uncommon compared with other UI labs, which are much more specialized, said George Breuer, a senior program manager.

## Guerrillas kill 8 tourists

■ The rebels, who came to Uganda after Rwanda's 1994 genocide, reportedly targeted Americans and Britons.

KAMPALA, Uganda — Rwandan rebels kidnapped and slaughtered eight foreign tourists, including two Americans, turning the Westerners' gorilla-watching expedition into a forced march of terror and death deep in a rain forest, survivors and witnesses said Tuesday.

The dead also included four Britons and two New Zealanders, according to diplomats. At least a half dozen other tourists survived the nightmarish rampage, which began with rebels systematically raiding campgrounds at a national park, killing rangers and rounding up foreigners.

"The rebels were looking for Americans and British," said Hussein Kivumbi, manager of one of five tented camps at the Bwindi Impenetrable Forests and a survivor of the attack. "They killed four women and four men with knives, machetes and axes."

Some of the victims were killed because they couldn't walk fast

enough, he said. At least one woman victim appeared to have been sexually assaulted.

Americans Rob Haubner, 48, and his wife, Susan Miller, 42, who worked for the computer company, Intel Corp., were slain, company spokesman Bill Calder confirmed. The Hillsboro, Ore., couple was on their third trip to Africa with another couple from the company.

All of the victims were brutally hacked to death Monday in the jungles of southwestern Uganda that were made famous in the film "Gorillas in the Mist."

Six tourists were rescued and were then flown Tuesday to safety in Kampala, Uganda's capital.

Events at the camps on the edge of Bwindi National Park unfolded rapidly, though the exact time they began was not immediately clear.

Approximately 200 Rwandan rebels charged into the camps, which are set along the mountainous border with the Congo, and separated the tourists in search of Americans and British, Kivumbi said.

A French diplomat was let go, Kivumbi said. The rebels, speaking Kinyarwanda and French and dressed in ragtag clothes, then forced hostages into the mountains of the Congo.

### Unrest over Lebanon occupation grows

**PETAH TIKVA, Israel** — Sensing public frustration with the government's 17-year occupation of Lebanon, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and his challenger made campaign promises Tuesday to leave Lebanon within a year, placing the debate at the center of the election campaign.

In 1982, Israel invaded Lebanon to drive out PLO guerrillas attacking Jewish border communities. Three years later, the army pulled back to a strip it has patrolled ever since. **PAGE 7A**

**Center for the Book wins national award**

The American Printing History Association has awarded its 1999 Institutional Prize to the Center for the Book at the UI. The award was presented at the organization's annual meeting on Jan. 30 in New York. It was given to the UI program because it advances the public's knowledge of printing history, said David Zeidberg, Avery director at the Huntington Library in California. The UI has made distinguished contributions to the recording, preservation and dissemination of printing history, Zeidberg said. The award indicates that we're doing something significant here, said Tim Barrett, director of the Center for the Book. "It means a lot to be recognized by the APHA. We're determined to make new contributions to the field of book studies by bringing the academic study of the book in culture together with the study of the physical book."

**Placement Office helps 91 percent of applicants find jobs**

Some 91 percent of the 1,521 students and alumni who registered with the UI's Educational Placement Office in 1998 found employment, most in teaching and related occupations. Another 5 percent of the registrants continued their education, 2 percent were still seeking employment and the remaining 2 percent were not seeking employment, according to the results of a follow-up survey released recently by the Educational Placement Office. Among newly licensed teachers (graduates who completed licensure/certification degrees or programs), 89 percent found full-time teaching jobs or related employment, 4 percent found other work, 4 percent were in graduate school, 2 percent were still seeking a position and 1 percent were not seeking employment. The survey also found that new teachers with bachelor's degrees reported an average salary of \$25,957, with a range of \$19,000 to \$35,000. College faculty salaries ranged from \$19,000 to \$65,000. The figures are for students who registered during the 1998 academic year.

# UI Libraries look for help in money crunch

■ The Libraries Committee wants to meet with state leaders to explain the crisis.

A visit to Terrace Hill may be the next step for members of the UI Libraries Committee, who are looking for ways to balance hefty periodical price increases with shrinking budgets.

"All of the regent universities — ISU, UI and UNI — have faculty members who are deeply concerned about this issue," said Carin Green, chairwoman of the committee and an associate professor of classics. "We do feel that this is a real crisis."

The committee garnered approval from the UI Faculty Council Tuesday to support a resolution to inform and educate Gov. Tom Vilsack and the Iowa Legislature about the problems that are plaguing UI Libraries, including lack of funding and continual increases in the price of periodicals.

Since 1994, the average cost of a journal subscription has increased by 56 percent, while the budget for the libraries has increased only 36 percent.

By 2000, \$440,000 in serial publications will be identified for cancellation. This will be the fourth time in nine years that the libraries have been forced to cut periodical subscriptions.

"We experience problems mainly due to inflation, and our budget never increases at the rate that our cost goes up," said Sheila Creth, UI librarian. "We are having to reduce our serial commitments by 15 percent."

In order for the libraries to keep stacks up-to-date, they must address the policy-makers who are responsible for allocating money,

Green said.

The problem is compounded because Vilsack has recommended only a 5 percent budget increase for the libraries; the increase has been 8 percent in each of the last three years.

"This is not just a local issue — it affects universities across the country," Green said. "The problem is only going to be solved if we put our concerns forward."

The budgetary crisis has also affected the quality of the current periodical selection, UI freshman Jill Schneider said.

"After I looked up a magazine, I would go to get it, and it wouldn't be there. Not a single one," she said. "The ones I did find, a lot of the pages were torn out of them, and they were in really poor shape. It is terrible."

The main objective in bringing the issue before the governor and the Legislature is to educate officials about what is happening, Green said. The committee would also like to request additional funding.

"The purpose of the visit is to educate, but not just for this year. This problem is not going to go away," she said. "We want to show the Legislature and the governor that we are working on this."

Although the outcome of a visit with the governor cannot be predicted, Creth said, talking with the state's leaders can't hurt — even though the libraries and the Iowa state Board of Regents have never received the full amount of funding that they have requested.

"I think it is fine that the members of the UI faculty want to go," she said. "I am in no position to predict how they will respond, but it can only help."

The resolution and proposal from the committee will also be considered at the next Faculty Senate meeting on April 6.

# Congressman Leach's office joins Ped Mall scene

■ The First District rep moves his office to a more visible location downtown.

Many Iowa City residents may be surprised by the recent changes taking place on the Pedestrian Mall. Retail businesses are moving out — bars and a congressman are moving in.

The office of Iowa's First District Rep. Jim Leach moved on Feb. 22 to a more visible location in downtown Iowa City, 125 S. Dubuque St.

Occupying the former site of Technographics Inc., the new congressional office is a few doors down from the Tobacco Bowl, 111 S. Dubuque St.

The congressional office used to be on the fifth floor of the Iowa State Bank & Trust's downtown location, 102 S. Clinton St. It was at that location beginning in the early 1970s, said Leach's scheduler, Rachel Schrepferman.

And because of the office's long history, it reportedly held a special place in Leach's heart.

"Congressman Leach was a little sentimental and teary about leaving," Schrepferman said.

But Leach recognized the need to move, she said. The new office's ground-level location has made it more accessible for both the disabled and people who may not have known Leach's Iowa City address.

With its larger size and more visible location, many constituents are now more aware of the presence of their congressman's office, said Doug Wagner, Leach's press

secretary, adding that people now drop in to inquire about possible services he can provide.

"Iowa City is mainly a pedestrian community," Wagner said. "The location puts us in a better position to serve the people in the area."

"Moving his office was a good idea," said Laura Larkin, vice president of operations for University Democrats. "The only reason I knew where (the old office) was is because I went to protest there once."

Many people may think occupy-

ing such a prime location on the Ped Mall might cost a pretty penny. But the cost of renting the space is "not that much greater" than the previous location, Schrepferman said.

And the expense of supporting Leach's three district congressional offices — in Davenport, Cedar Rapids and Iowa City — is "always under the given budget," she said.

Though the change may take a while to get used to, those frequenting of the Ped Mall will have ample time to adjust.

"I would say it's a safe bet that the congressman will remain at that location while he's still in office," Wagner said.

At the very least, Leach's staff will occupy the space until the next congressional elections, which will be held in 2000.

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## 'Accidental' band bridges more than 6 miles

### Q&A

With Six Mile Bridge

Tonight at 9, the Houston-based rock band Six Mile Bridge is scheduled to return to the Mill Restaurant. The band has performed at the Mill nearly a dozen times during the past several years, bringing a traditional Irish sound combined with modern rock and roll. Tickets are \$5 and can be purchased at the door.

DI reporter Stacy Atchison caught up with Maggie Drennon, lead singer of Six Mile Bridge, while she was in Milwaukee on tour and asked her a few questions about the five-member band.

DI: Your band used to be called Ceili's Muse but changed its name to Six Mile Bridge in

the summer of '97. Has the band's image or sound changed along with its name?

Drennon: Our music now has a much more rock 'n' roll edge to the traditional Irish music we play. It encompasses a huge number of Irish instruments along with a drum kit and electric guitar. Lately, we're finding that we're good at taking old Irish poetry and putting it to music. We get to give it our own kick in the butt that way.

DI: Who came up with Six Mile Bridge as the band's name?

Drennon: The band and I spent six weeks suicidally banging our

heads against walls trying to come up with a name, and I finally came up with Six Mile Bridge. It was the name of a tiny town in Ireland that's my favorite place to go. I started going to Ireland when I was 19, and that's one of the places I used to go to.

DI: Where do you picture your band one year from now?

Drennon: We're moving to upstate New York soon, and we've just been invited to play at a huge Irish bar there on St. Patrick's Day called Connolly's Pub - it's at 47th Street and Madison Avenue. It's the biggest opportunity we've ever had, and we're really excited.

DI: Why are you moving the band to upstate New York?

Drennon: It's two hours from Boston and two from New York City, and we need to be near those cities. We've targeted the Midwest and love it here, but now that we're real comfortable here, we have to go kill them in New York. Every artist knows that if you want to make it, you have to keep pushing it. And if we can make it in New York, we can make it anywhere.

DI: How did you become interested in traditional Irish music?

Drennon: All of us in the band have been led to Celtic music by accident. I found it 10 years ago when I was listening to a woman named Mary Maddux sing this beautiful music. After a while, I found out that my family had never talked about how I was 70 percent Irish, and I felt like I had been really deprived by not knowing that. I've never played anything but this type of music since.

DI: What songs are you planning to play at tonight's concert?

Drennon: Last year, we released two CDs within three months of each other, so we'll probably be playing music from those. We put on our own rock 'n' roll show, but really adapt to getting to know our crowds. We make them feel more like they're sitting in their own living rooms, watching a band, and not at a rock concert.

## Matisse & Picasso, back together again

An exhibit of the works of the modern art masters, who were friends as well as rivals, is on until May 2.

FORT WORTH, Texas — Henri Matisse and Pablo Picasso, who were both companions and competitors, helped to define modern art.

And the connection between the two masters becomes strikingly clear in "Matisse and Picasso: A Gentle Rivalry," an exhibit running at the Kimbell Art Museum through May 2.

Three years in the making, it comprises more than 100 paintings, sculptures and drawings from collections around the world.

Picasso and Matisse began their rivalry in 1906, but the exhibit tracks them through the later stages of their careers, up to and after Matisse's death in 1954. It illustrates how they mimicked each other, borrowed from each other, respected each other and became best friends.

"Picasso really looked at Matisse toward the end of his life and after, but it's far less known that Matisse looked at Picasso very hard, as well," said Yve-Alain Bois, the exhibit's guest curator and professor of modern art at

Harvard University.

Bringing these great works together for the first time "is like a dream come true. I'm so happy," Bois said.

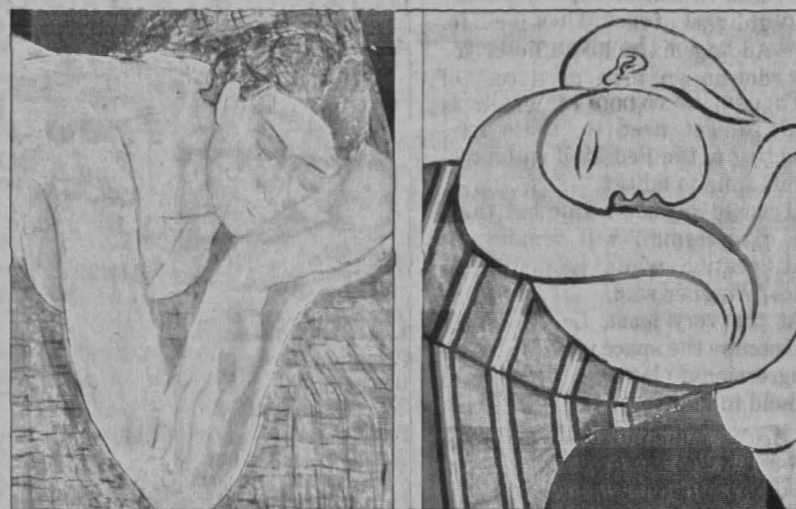
Kimbell's director, Timothy Potts, said the works have been studied and exhibited from many angles, but "there has not before been an exhibition that documents the keen and often touching rivalry, born of a strong mutual respect, between the two artists in the years of their maturity."

The exhibit begins with works from 1929, when Matisse lacked inspiration and was nearly unable to paint, and Picasso was in top form. The Spanish artist parodied Matisse's style by painting acrobats and dancers, which, observers have speculated, was an attempt to revive his inspiration.

A few years later, Matisse resumed work. Picasso became fascinated with a series of the older French artist's earlier sculptures and paintings and produced similar works.

By 1933, Matisse was ready to respond to Picasso's challenge. His "Daisies" of 1939 features flowers identical to the primitive white daisies in Picasso's "Basket of Flowers and Pitcher" of 1937.

Matisse and Picasso produced some of their most similar works during these years. Matisse's "The Dream" in 1940 is nearly a carbon copy of Picasso's "Woman With Yellow Hair"

from nine years earlier. Both are side views of blonde women leaning to the left and resting their heads across folded arms in sleep. Both rely heavily on yellow, pink and black.

The exhibit concludes with a series of Picasso's paintings after Matisse's death, which, Bois said, is the most moving part for him. Picasso, who had always been terrified by death, was devastated by the loss of his friend and rival and refused to answer the phone when he expected it would be a call with news of Matisse's death. He didn't even attend Matisse's funeral.

Picasso, who ended up outliving Matisse by 19 years, did, however, posthumously honor him through art. Reflective of Matisse's "Interior With Egyptian Curtains," the works use large amounts of black to create a

contrast with blank white canvas space. Many of them picture empty studios, reminiscent of Matisse's large interiors.

The final piece of the exhibit, Picasso's "Woman in a Rocking Chair" of 1956, fuses both artists' styles. It has Matissean bright colors, a faceless woman sitting in a patterned chair and a palm tree visible in the background through a window. But Picasso adds his signature twisted body parts: The woman has a sharklike belly, a phallic arm and neck.

"He really is able to tell the world, I really like Matisse," Bois said. "There's no irony, no pity. The way it's painted, the way the white of the canvas vibrates, the pattern on the back of the rocking chair, all that is pure Matisse."

### Extinguishing paternalism

A group of UI faculty members, students and local residents is igniting controversy over the smoking policy in the UI residence halls. These people are banding together to eliminate smoking from the UI's nine residence halls, but making residence halls smoke-free will cause more problems than it cures. The group, which calls itself Johnson County Citizens for Tobacco Free Youth, has good intentions — to protect UI residence hall dwellers from the dangers of smoking — but it is acting in an offensive manner.

Many of the students living in the residence halls are experiencing their first taste of freedom, and now this group opposing smoking is trying to regulate the residents' actions. This reeks of paternalism, in that this group is substituting its opinion of proper conduct for that of actual residence hall residents. Furthermore, forcing residence halls to become smoke-free could create more work for the building staffs, as resident assistants, hall managers and hall directors would be spending too much time enforcing the rules instead of addressing more important problems.

Smoking is smelly, unhealthy and potentially dangerous. But it should not be banned entirely from residents' individual rooms. The UI's current policies adequately deal with the problems of smoking.

The UI plans to make 26 floors, spread throughout the residence halls, non-smoking next year, in addition to its long-standing effort to pair smokers with smokers on other floors and in other rooms. This seems acceptable, accommodating both the smokers and non-smokers.

Smoking rooms are assigned in a random way throughout the campus. And even in otherwise non-smoking rooms everyone agrees smoking is OK, then the room is smoking. This makes sense and allows the roommates, who are in agreement, to smoke at will without infringing upon those who do not smoke. If everyone in the room can agree whether the room should be smoking, then it should be a student decision rather than a UI decision.

The group seems motivated by the depressing fact that 42 percent of UI freshmen smoke. But if students are 18 or older — and most residents are — then they should have the right to smoke in their rooms. If this decision is taken away from them, an uproar will break out. As a result, petitions, protests and the intentional breaking of the rules will certainly burden the UI.

The best solution is the one the UI already has implemented.

### No. 1 priority for UISG leaders

The UISG elections are over. And during the gloaming of the current administration is when the new UISG executive team should start working toward improving the UISG's relationship with UI students.

The UISG is one of the most powerful student groups — the group that allocates money to other student groups — but many UI students seem oblivious to its role. The UISG has the ability to voice student needs through lobbying and legislation — the administration and the state — but few students get fired up by the UISG. The UISG needs to push agendas that benefit the entire student body — without alienating particular constituencies — but it must also realize that time and bureaucracy may keep it from achieving all its goals.

To achieve a better relationship, there should be a three-pronged approach that includes communication, accessibility and public relations. Better relations will occur only when all three of these closely related pieces are fused.

The first is communication. Only through better communication can the UISG and the student body form a strong bond. To facilitate better communication, the UISG must maintain a system that allows students to voice their opinions to an open-minded audience. When an issue is raised before the student government, the students should be the first to know, via a student newsletter or another widely distributed announcement.

The second is accessibility. The UISG must ensure that students can freely access its offices and voice their opinions at any time. Students must know who the UISG people are and how best to reach them. More open forums and debates should be hosted by the UISG to build better, more representative ideas for approaching issues.

The third, and arguably the most important, is public relations. Few students know the UISG's role and its influence on UI policies. Even fewer students care. It is essential that the UISG shows students it can make a difference. The UISG members must convince students they care. The UISG should sponsor more entertaining activities and make sure everyone knows the UISG is making them possible.

These threeprongs can be easily combined. Many students don't consider the Union to be a convenient hangout. If the UISG would, at least occasionally, move outside of its hole in the Union to another location, UISG officers and students could more easily connect. The UISG has an uphill climb to achieve good relations with students, but it's a hill worth climbing. The newly elected UISG officials should feel the same way.

## UI officials can find a silver lining to any situation

I don't know whether it is the cows, the corn, the unremarkable weather or the fact that Iowa is best known for its septuplet babies, but it seems that the Hawkeye state has been suffering an inferiority complex as of late. That is, at least, if behavior at the UI is any indication.

Other questionable statements, such as

These examples are not mere aberrations. They are evidence that the UI has a disturbingly deep concern with its own image, and public relations appears to be as integral a program at the UI as business or engineering. 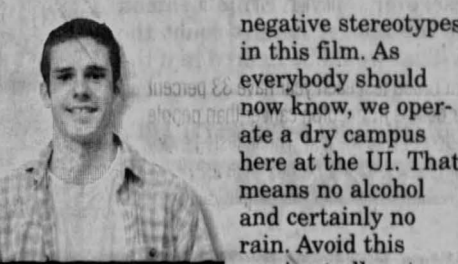

# Israelis weary of deaths in Lebanon

■ The two major candidates in the upcoming election vow an end to the policy, as the 901st Israeli soldier is buried.

PETAH TIKVA, Israel — When Baruch Axelrod thinks about his 21-year-old son, an Israeli army officer serving in south Lebanon, fear takes over and tears well in his eyes.

As the 901st Israeli soldier killed in Lebanon was laid to rest Tuesday, Axelrod made an emotional public plea to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to end 17 years of Israeli occupation there. "I don't want my son to be a hero. I want him home for the Sabbath," he said.

Sensing the growing public frustration with the government's Lebanon policy, both Netanyahu and his challenger made campaign promises Tuesday to leave Lebanon within a year, placing the increasingly heated debate at the center of the election campaign.

That's exactly where Axelrod wants to see it.

In an ad Tuesday in the newspa-

per Haaretz, the 47-year-old president of an Israeli high-tech firm called on Netanyahu to "get out of Lebanon."

"The politicians should know there are people who want to live long lives and be with their children," he said in an interview.

In 1982, Israel invaded Lebanon to drive out PLO guerrillas attacking Jewish border communities. Three years later, the army pulled back to a strip it has patrolled ever since in an effort to prevent cross-border attacks.

Since then, troops have been engaged in a costly battle with Iranian-backed Hezbollah guerrillas who aim to oust Israel from Lebanese soil. Hezbollah refuses to end its campaign against Israel, even if the Jewish state were to withdraw from Lebanon. Polls show the majority of Israelis still oppose a withdrawal.

Over 17 years, 901 Israelis have

died inside Lebanon, including Brig. Gen. Erez Gerstein, who was killed Sunday along with two other soldiers and a journalist when Hezbollah detonated a roadside bomb.

Gerstein, the highest-ranking officer killed in Lebanon since the invasion, was buried Tuesday at his family's kibbutz in central Israel.

"We're truly afraid. Sometimes, I'll think about my son in the middle of the day, and tears will just well up in my eyes. The times I know when he's there are impossible," Axelrod said.

Parents of other soldiers began calling him Tuesday after the newspaper hit the stands.

"One woman just cried and cried for half an hour," Axelrod said. "She said she had five sons, two serving in Lebanon, and she is so frightened she doesn't know what to do."

# Lewinsky airs it out on Clinton & sex

■ The president is a sensual man; she'd hate to be Tripp.

WASHINGTON — Monica Lewinsky is finally getting her say — about President Clinton ("a very sensual man"), Linda Tripp ("I pity her") and her regret for hurting Hillary Rodham and Chelsea Clinton ("I am very sorry").

In a two-hour interview to be televised tonight, the woman whose trysts with the president led to the Senate impeachment trial offers the nation her apology "for my part in this past year's ordeal."

"I wouldn't dream of asking Chelsea and Mrs. Clinton to forgive me," she says. "But I would ask them to know that I am very sorry for what happened and for what they've been through."

Rodham Clinton's spokeswoman, Marsha Berry, had no comment.

Barbara Walters, of ABC News, won the first interview with Lewinsky since the former White

House intern burst into the headlines on Jan. 21, 1998.

Lewinsky, who received immunity from prosecution for cooperating with investigators, was prohibited from speaking publicly until

Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr's office gave the go-ahead.

The interview was timed to help promote her book — "Monica's Story," written with the biographer of Princess Diana, Andrew Morton — which goes on sale Thursday.

ABC released brief excerpts from the interview Tuesday.

"Is Bill Clinton a sensuous, passionate man?" Walters asked the 25-year-old woman.

"Gosh, I'll probably get in trouble for saying this," Lewinsky said, before describing the president as "a very sensual man" who feels conflicted because of his "strong

religious upbringing."

"I think he struggles with his sensuality because I don't think he thinks it's OK," she said. "I think he tries to hold himself back. And then can't anymore."

Lewinsky had stinging words for former friend Tripp, who secretly tape-recorded their telephone conversations and turned them over to Starr's investigators.

"I pity her," Lewinsky said. "I would hate to be her."

Lewinsky confided the affair to Tripp, she said, after her co-worker kept saying such things as, "You're just the type of girl the president would like" and "I bet you could have an affair with him."

The Daily News in New York said Lewinsky called Clinton her "sexual soul mate" and insisted that their relationship was about a "man and a woman, not a president and an intern."

She told Walters the president never discussed his marriage with her and never told her that he loved her. She said she didn't feel cheap.

## FBI says it takes anthrax seriously

WASHINGTON (AP) — Virtually every day for several weeks, the FBI has heard about an anthrax threat somewhere in America. So far, all have been hoaxes, but the bureau responds seriously to every one.

"My personal fear is that someday there will be a real anthrax threat, and American society will react by saying, 'There's another hoax,'" said Neil J. Gallagher, FBI assistant director, in charge of the national security division, on Tuesday.

Sporadic threats of contamination with the potentially lethal anthrax bacterium date back several years. But beginning last fall and accelerating within the past few weeks, the FBI has seen a spate of letters, containing a sticky substance or dark powder and the ominous warning: You've been contaminated by anthrax.

The letters have been received in almost every region of the nation. They often arrive in bunches, at 10 or 15 similar targets in a city.

## Study: Test can cut colon cancer deaths

WASHINGTON (AP) — A simple screening test for blood in the bowel can reduce by up to one-third the death rate from colon cancer, the second leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States, a study says.

The finding, to be published today in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute, is prompting a national campaign to encourage people over age 50 to take the test, because they account for most of the 56,000 U.S. colon cancer deaths each year.

Minnesota researchers monitoring the health of 46,000 volunteers since 1976 have found that those who take the fecal occult blood test each year have 33 percent fewer deaths from colon cancer than people who do not take the test. Those tested every other year, the study found, have a 21 percent reduced rate of colon cancer death.

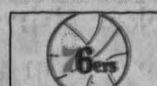

Hayden Fry's new book gives readers an insight into the former coach

Tonight at Carver-Hawkeye Arena, Sports Publishing Inc. will release Hayden Fry's autobiography, "Hayden Fry: A High Porch Picnic."

■ New Iowa football coach Kirk Ferentz will have a hard time filling Hayden Fry's shoes this fall.

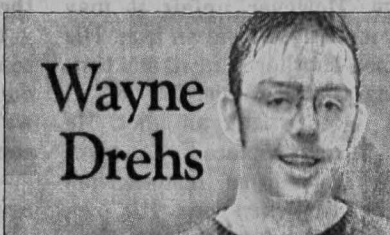
A little over three months ago, Iowa football coach Hayden Fry became a spectator.

He sat in the front row of the auditorium at the Jacobson Building and watched as his replacement, Kirk Ferentz, was introduced to the Hawkeye media and fans.

After the news conference, Fry said a few words of praise about Ferentz, autographed a couple footballs and told some jokes about his golf game. He then walked out the door as the "former" Iowa football coach.

Tuesday, with television lights and cameras flashing on his face, Fry returned — with a greater mystique and aura than when he departed.

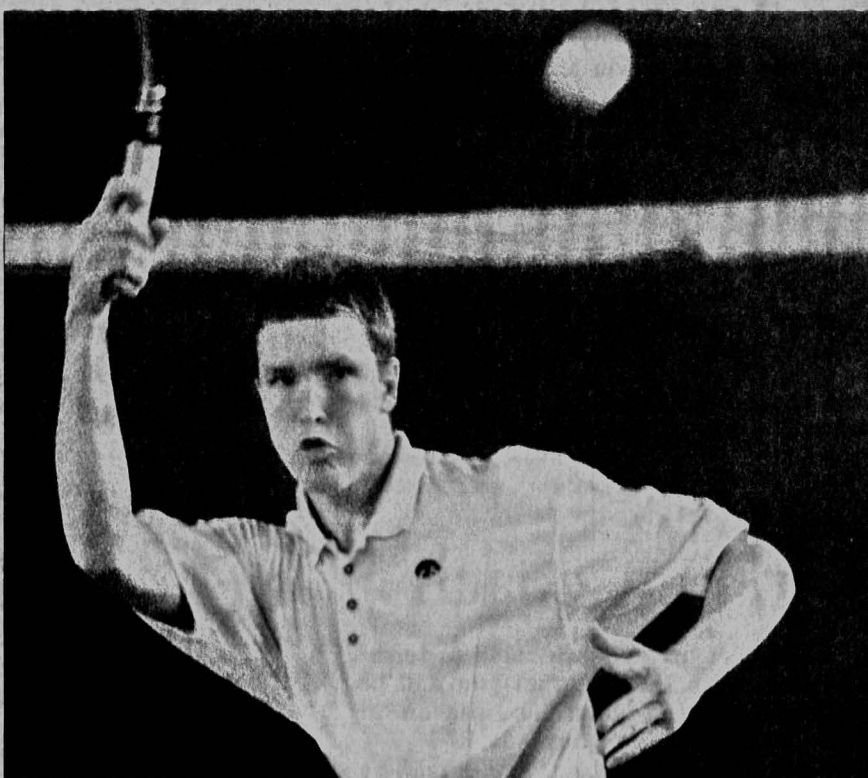

Sophomore Tyler Cleveland knew that his college years would provide him with the perfect opportunity to display his true talent.

He just did not know how right he was.

Cleveland finished his first year at Iowa with 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and 1998 Regional ITA Rookie of the Year honors. He also claimed the Iowa men's tennis team's No. 1 position and finished with a team-best 15-8 overall record, 8-3 in the Big Ten.

**Motivation from loss pushes Hawkeyes**

■ The Iowa women's basketball team doesn't want a repeat of this season's finish next year.

After Iowa's 75-71 first-round loss to Northwestern in the Big Ten Tournament last Friday, Cara Consuegra was absolutely distraught.

She was in disbelief that the Hawkeyes didn't play to their potential.

However, the sophomore point guard and her teammates aren't wallowing over their season-ending loss. Instead, they're looking at it as motivation.

The old adage that you must experience failure before you can achieve success is one the Hawkeyes are taking to heart. Coach Angie Lee illustrated this to a tearful Consuegra after Iowa's loss.

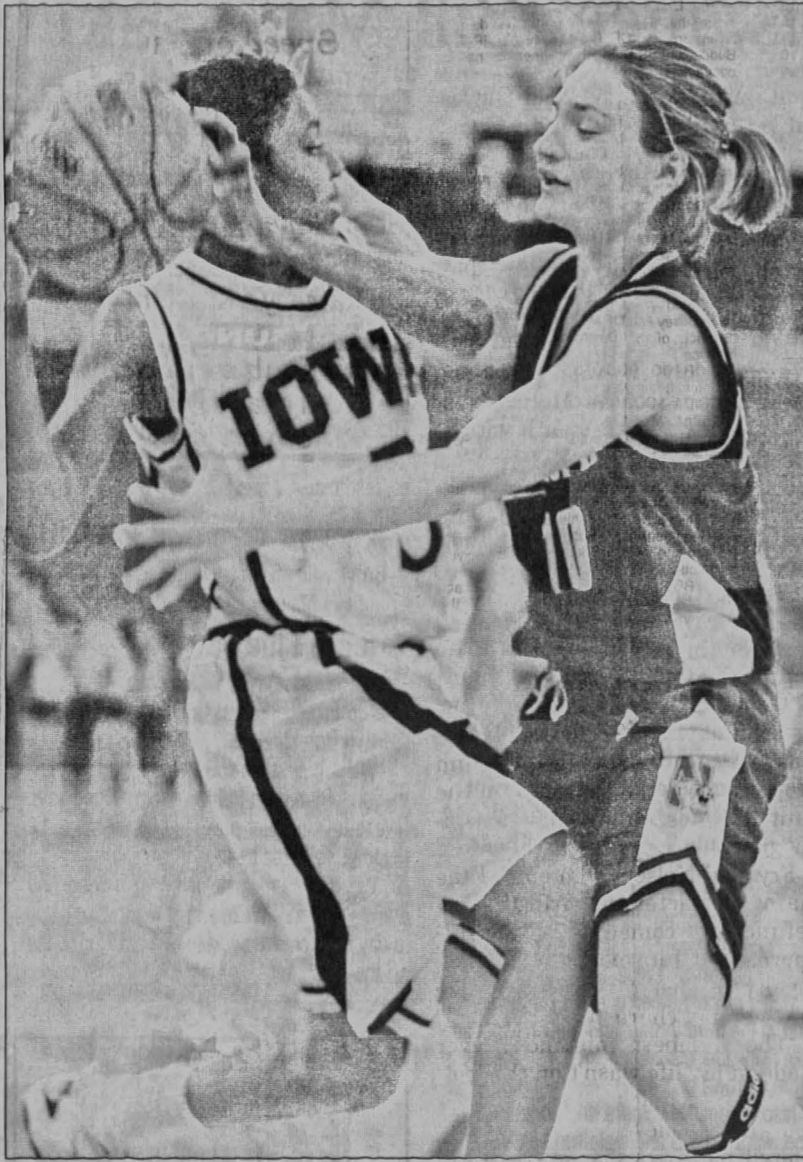
"I told her that we have to do this, we have to feel this way," Lee explained. "This is a feeling that will make you better and never want to be here again."

"It is necessary for (the team) to go through this. It's not fun, but it's necessary."

Consuegra was unsure at first, but now is beginning to believe what Lee said.

"I'm starting to. It always stinks when you lose," Consuegra said. "(The NU loss) will really help the freshmen and get them to realize it takes a lot more to get where we want to go."

Iowa finished the 1998-99 campaign with a 12-15 overall record, including 7-9 in Big Ten play.

The good news is that the Hawkeyes are losing only one player to graduation. The bad news is that it is 6-foot-4 center Amy Herrig, the conference's second leading scorer and top rebounder.

Replacing Herrig will not be an easy task, but Lee thinks sophomore forward Randi Peterson is ready.

"Randi is really looking forward to it," Lee said. "That's what Randi is going to have pumping through her veins this summer."

Peterson averaged 9.6 points and 6.8 rebounds in 25 games this season.

Both Peterson and Consuegra are keys next season. Consuegra has virtually assumed this role already, culminating with a career-

high 23 points Friday.

"The last five games she was All-Big Ten to me," Lee said of her floor leader. "She was just absolutely fabulous."

Lee will be "on the recruiting trail" for a good portion of the next month.

She said she hopes to sign five or six more players once the late signing period for recruits begins April 7.

The Hawkeyes inked Worthington (Minn.) High School senior Amber O'Brien to a letter of intent last November.

Iowa has 15 scholarships to offer. Only eight are currently used.

**Warren Morris, meet Bill Mazeroski**

■ Mazeroski, the slick-fielding infielder, is teaching the College World Series hero the intricacies of second base.

BRADENTON, Fla. — The player who hit the biggest home run in College World Series history was working diligently on his double play pivot with the player who struck arguably the biggest homer in World Series history.

Warren Morris, meet Bill Mazeroski.

Morris and Mazeroski are best known for two magical swings of the bat, but were concentrating on defense Tuesday now that the Pittsburgh Pirates have put Morris on the fast track to replacing Tony Womack at second base.

And what better defensive mentor than Mazeroski, who was denied entry into the Hall of Fame during Tuesday's Veterans Committee vote but is widely regarded as the slickest fielding second baseman ever?

"He's a good listener, he works hard — he can do some things," Mazeroski said of Morris, a rookie traded by Texas to Pittsburgh last season. "He does just about everything well. He's a pretty good athlete."

Didn't they say the same thing 43 years ago about a rookie second baseman named Mazeroski, who

went on to win eight Gold Gloves but is recalled mostly for his Game 7 homer to beat the New York Yankees in the 1960 World Series?

Just as Morris will never be forgotten for his dramatic two-run homer in the ninth inning that beat Miami 9-8 in 1996 and gave LSU its third College World Series title in six years.

Remarkably, it was the only homer that season for Morris, who was out for nearly a month with a broken hand.

"People always seem to bring that up," Morris said. "They say, 'Yeah, you're the guy who hit that home run ...'"

Sounds familiar to Mazeroski, who is working in the Pirates' camp for the first time since 1973 as an infield instructor.

"Unless I don't go out of the house that day, somebody almost always brings up the home run," Mazeroski said of the only ninth-inning homer to decide a World Series Game 7. "It's nice to hear."

**New York Mets**

In the first spring training exhibition of the year, the Mets beat St. John's University 12-3 Tuesday at Port St. Lucie, Fla.

Matt Franco homered during a seven-run burst in the third inning, and Melvin Mora and Mike Kinkade also connected for the Mets before a crowd of 1,431.

Jason Tyner, New York's No. 1 draft pick last June, went 3-for-5 and stole two bases.

"It shows they did a good job of scouting in the draft, he's exciting," manager Bobby Valentine said.

**San Diego Padres**

Garth Brooks was a miss — the country singer struck out in the San Diego Padres game at Peoria, Ariz.

After being reminded by manager Bruce Bochy to put on his batting helmet, Brooks managed to foul off two pitches before chasing a neck-high fastball from non-roster righty Salvador Rodriguez.

"It was cool. I guess four out of the five pitches I was proud of. The last one I wasn't. That's the one I'll remember," he said.

"I was there. That's why I was apologizing to my teammates. I was there," he said. "The guy on first has to be moved over and it was my job to do it."

Brooks did fine in left field, cleanly handling a single in his only chance.

**Toronto Blue Jays**

Left-hander David Wells, meanwhile, had back spasms and was in Toronto's training room in Dunedin, Fla.

"Wells has some lower right back inflammation," Blue Jays trainer Tommy Craig said. "We're treating him now, and he seems to be responding to the treatment and exercises."

"We don't anticipate it being a long and drawn-out thing. We're just going to take it day to day right now, then ease him back up to the on-the-field stuff."

VERO BEACH, Fla. — Pete Rose kept a low profile, sitting quietly in the stands at Dodgertown watching his son play in an intrasquad game. He hopes to be watching Pete Jr. playing in Los Angeles one of these days.

And Pete Jr. says it's going to happen, later if not sooner. "I think I've got what it takes," Pete Jr. said Tuesday. "I plan on making the team. I don't plan on playing in (Triple-A) Albuquerque."

And if manager Davey Johnson sends him down? "I'll bust my tail," Pete Jr. said.

"I'm going to be in LA at some time. I'm a guy who's got some pop. Left-handed pop looks to be a little scarce around here. I think Davey Johnson likes tough guys. I come to play."

The elder Rose, the career hits leader who agreed to lifetime ban for gambling, called Dodgertown general manager Kevin Malone during the winter to request a favor.

"Pete asked me to give his son a chance," Malone recalled. "I've known both of them for years. They both have huge hearts. I figured it was a win-win situation. I told Pete it would be tough for (Junior) to make the team. He said, 'No special treatment, all we ask is a chance.'"

And that's the deal. The younger Rose, a 29-year-old whose only major league experience was a

brief spell with Cincinnati Reds 18 months ago, signed a minor league contract with an invitation to spring training.

And here he is, giving it his best

shot.

"Nobody can tell me to stop chasing my dream," he said. "He knows how to play, he's not going to give up," the elder Rose said.

**Falcons' safety offered diversion program for solicitation arrest**

MIAMI (AP) — Atlanta Falcons safety Eugene Robinson, charged with prostitution solicitation the night before the Super Bowl, was offered a diversion program on Tuesday that, if completed, would clear the Pro Bowl player's record.

Robinson did not appear before Judge Teretha Lundy Thomas in Miami-Dade County Court for his arraignment. Robinson's attorney, Jeffery Allen, huddled briefly with prosecutor Marc Weinstein to strike the deal.

Pretrial diversion programs are often offered to first-time offenders of misdemeanors and require no plea. Robinson would be ineligible if Thomas discovers he has been convicted or charged with a crime in Florida or another state.

"I would say this is the standard resolution for solicitation cases," said Don Ungarait, spokesman for the Miami-Dade County State Attorney's Office. "We hope that Mr. Robinson will do what he needs to do on pretrial diversion, and he and this office can move on."

Under the agreement, Robinson has to have an HIV test and complete a course on AIDS. He will be able to complete the program in his home state of Washington where he lives in Woodinville with his wife and two children.

**Pele sees United States as growing soccer power**

NEW YORK — No less a soccer expert than Pele, merely the greatest player the world's most popular sport has known, sees the United States as a rising power heading toward the next World Cup.

Speaking during a conference call Tuesday in which MasterCard announced the renewal of its World Cup sponsorship and its deal with Pele, Pele also criticized the conservative manner in which games are played these days.

"With the clinics and training in the United States, I feel very proud to see the growing of football in U.S.," said Pele, the company's best-known spokesman. "When a national team has more experience, they have become more strong. For the next World Cup in three years in Japan and South Korea, no doubt the United States will be a good team."

"America beat England, Mexico, Germany, all these big teams. They have improved a lot since (France '98). Of course they need more experience and to play abroad. But no doubt today it is not easy to beat the American team."

Pele, who led Brazil to three World Cup titles, then ventured to New York to play for the Cosmos and build the sport in this country in the 1970s, would like to see a return to wide-open soccer. He's dismayed by the way coaches play not to lose rather than to win.

**IOC official contests Mitchell report finding**

LONDON — A senior IOC official Tuesday disputed a U.S. ethics panel's contention that the international committee fostered a "culture of improper gift giving" that led to corruption in the Olympic bid process.

The U.S. Olympic Committee panel, headed by former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, leveled most of the blame for the Salt Lake City vote-buying scandal on the IOC.

But Kevan Gosper, an IOC executive board member from Australia, said Mitchell's report failed to acknowledge that since 1987 the committee has had rules on gifts, travel and other items related to the bid process.

"It's quite unacceptable to say that the IOC has created an environment which has enabled gift giving and rewards to run out of control," Gosper said in a telephone interview from Melbourne. "I take strong objection to that."

In its report issued Monday, the panel said the conduct "tolerated by the IOC is potentially illegal and inevitably corruptive." It said leaders turned a blind eye to corruption that was "flourishing" even as the Olympics grew

into a billion-dollar industry.

The report said the International Olympic Committee created the atmosphere responsible for the scandal over cash payments and other improper inducements stemming from Salt Lake's winning bid for the 2002 Winter Games. Gosper said the IOC set "very specific" limits for bid cities, and "constantly refined" the rules.

**Husker QB gets extra year, Wiggins doesn't**

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Nebraska football team picked up one player and lost another in recent NCAA rulings.

Quarterback Jeff Perino, who had been on medical exempt status the last two years, was granted one year of eligibility after his recovery from three knee surgeries.

Wingback Shevin Wiggins was not granted his request for another year of football eligibility. He had the NCAA to extend his college career beyond the five-year limit.

"We applied to get an extension and it was denied based on the fact that you have to have documentation to show that it was not possible to attend school during that five-year period," said Al Papik, Nebraska's senior associate AD.

## Mavericks 112, Clippers 99

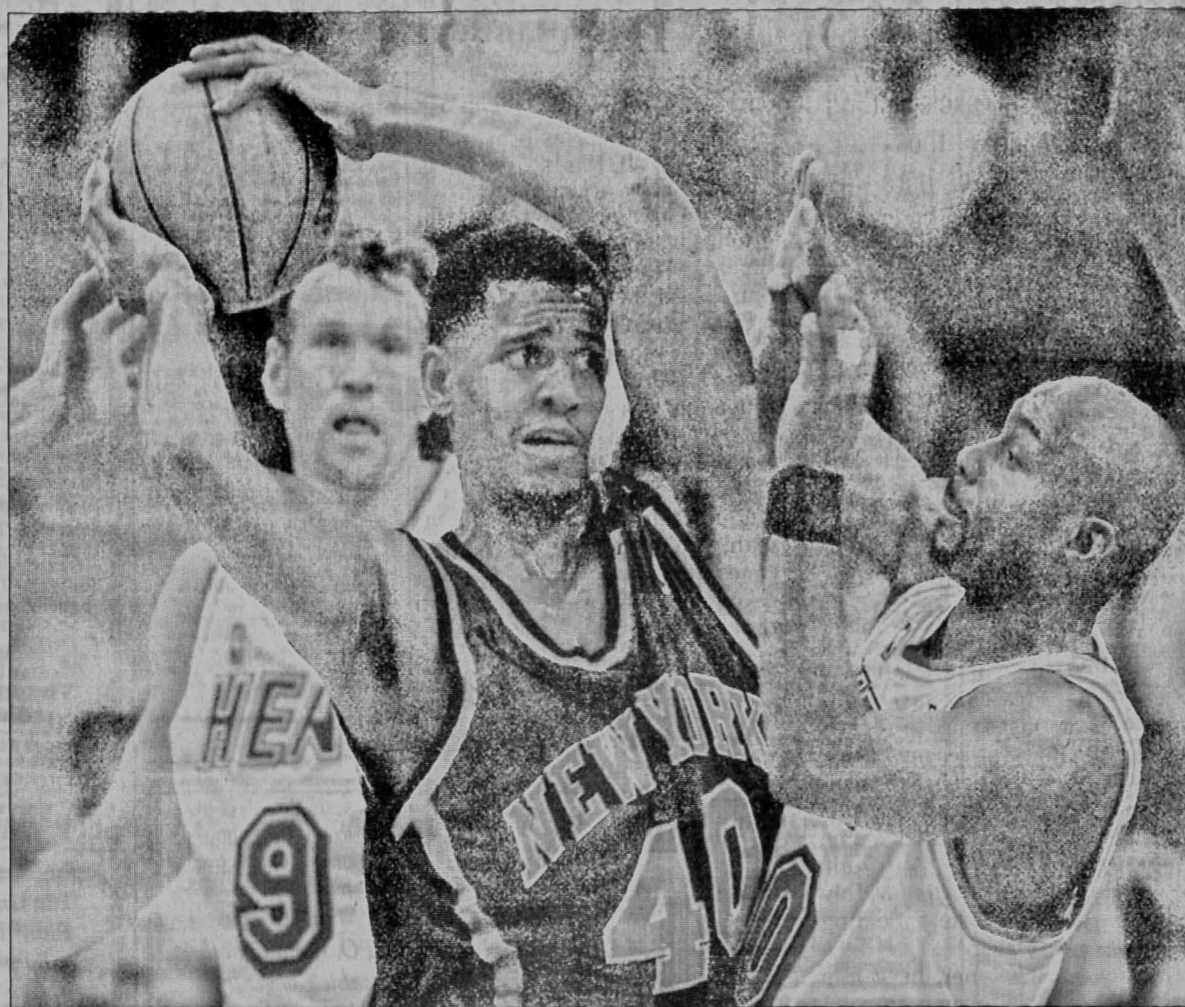
DALLAS — Michael Finley scored 20 points and A.C. Green had 19 points and 12 rebounds, both season highs, as the Dallas Mavericks won.

## Cavaliers 116, Celtics 99

CLEVELAND — One night after looking

like a longshot team to win anything, the Cleveland Cavaliers used the long shot to break the 100-point mark for the first time this season.

Shawn Kemp scored 22 points and Bob Sura added a season-high 19 in a 116-99 victory over the Boston Celtics on Tuesday — 24 hours after the worst shooting performance in team history.

## Pacers 88, Nuggets 81

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Once again Reggie Miller delivered in the clutch for the Indiana Pacers.

Miller scored seven points in a 16-1 run during the fourth quarter when the Pacers overcame a six-point deficit to defeat Denver 88-81 Tuesday night.

# Some things in match play never change

■ The no-name final is nothing new to match play.

Everything that is so compelling about match play, and all the reasons why it was abandoned until last week at La Costa, unfolded before the eyes of the squire.

When Jeff Maggert chipped in for birdie on the second extra hole to win the Match Play Championship, Gene Sarazen was watching from his home in Marco Island, Fla., his mind racing back to his dramatic victory over Walter Hagen in the 1923 PGA Championship.

"It reminded me a lot of the PGA in the early days when we played the same format," said Sarazen, who turned 97 last week. "I went 38 holes with Hagen, just like Jeff Maggert went 38 holes with ... what was the name of the player he beat?"

That Sarazen can remember faces in the gallery from 75 years ago but could not recall the weekend's runner-up (Andrew Magee) speaks to one facet of match play that even PGA Tour commissioner Tim Finchem would concede like a tap-in.

Getting the top 64 players in the world together is one thing. Getting the top names in the final is next to impossible.

Finchem offered no apologies for this.

"Look back 30 years ago, and each decade there has been a longer list of what we would regard as stars," he said. "That's the reality, and we have to communicate that reality."

Tiger Woods, David Duval, Ernie Els, Davis Love III and the other top seeds who were eliminated — some in the first round, all of them by the weekend — communicated this quite fine with the same explanation.

"On any given day ..."

And if no one is willing to buy into that, history certainly bears it out. Sarazen and Hagen were the best two players of their era. Hagen won the first of his five PGA Championships in 1921 and they swept the three professional majors a year later — Hagen the British Open, Sarazen the U.S. Open and the PGA.

Still, they went head-to-head only once, the finals of the 1923 PGA Championship at Pelham Country Club in New York.

"They always tried to put Hagen and myself in the finals, but we were only in the finals one time," he said. "Somebody always knocked us off. I remember the time Bobby Jones was eliminated in the first round (of the 1929 U.S. Amateur) in Del Monte. All the fans checked out of the hotel that night because the whole tourna-

ment wrapped around Jones."

The early exits by the most prominent players became commonplace as the years went on. Even in the era of Ben Hogan, Sam Snead and Byron Nelson, only once did any two of them make it to the finals of the PGA — in 1940, when Nelson beat Snead on the 36th hole.

Hogan's only PGA came at the expense of Mike Turnesa. Snead's victims included Jim Turnesa, Johnny Palmer and Walter Burkemo.

More often than not, the champions had about as much name recognition as Maggert and Magee — Tom Creavy, Jim Ferrier and Johnny Revolta.

"That's why match play is not practical with television," Sarazen said. "They lose the star players in the first round. And there are so many good players today, you can't pick any one player out. I thought Tiger Woods would win this tournament."

Standing on the first tee at La Costa as Maggert and Magee faded from view down the fairway, Finchem saw the silver lining.

# Seattle's Baker returns to star form

■ After a slow start in this shortened NBA season, Seattle Supersonic Vin Baker is slowly returning to form.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Vin Baker, stuck in the biggest slump of his career, sat in his hotel room and kept telling himself he was ready to break out. A few hours later, he was getting hugged as a hero by teammates.

The sense of relief was clear on the face of Baker, a four-time all-star whose poor shooting had left him in tears last week.

"This was definitely my best game of the year," Baker said after going 15-for-19 from the field and scoring 31 points in the Seattle Supersonics' 105-102 victory Monday night over the Sacramento Kings. "This was important to me."

It also was important to the Sonics, who have been stumbling recently after starting the season with six straight victories.

"He's been coming along,"

Seattle coach Paul Westphal said. "It was inevitable he was going to have a game like this in which he broke out, and we needed every point of his tonight."

Baker, who has averaged 18.5 points per game in a career that included four seasons in Milwaukee and last year in Seattle, was averaging just 11.3 points a game this season heading into the contest against the Kings.

He sat alone in his hotel room Monday afternoon and tried to bolster his confidence by saying, "This has got to be the game for me — quit thinking about it and just go out and play." Then he did just that.

The Kings focused on point guard Gary Payton, who drew attention inside by trying to post up. That gave Payton the chance to swing the ball outside to Baker, a 6-foot-11 forward.

"It was obvious they weren't going to rotate to me. After a while you would think they might adjust, but they didn't," Baker said. "I've prayed and worked more than anybody in the league. I'm just glad it is starting to pay

off."

Now Baker just has to hope that carries over to the foul line, where he continues to struggle. A 63 percent career shooter at the line, he began the season 0-for-18 on free throws — including an air ball that landed a foot short of the basket — and is still just 7-for-42 (17 percent) after going 1-for-5 against the Kings.

For Westphal and the Sonics, having more production from Baker is crucial on a team that has relied much too heavily on Payton for its offensive spark this season.

Westphal was particularly happy that Baker, who also had nine rebounds, three assists and three steals in 38 minutes against Sacramento, was able to keep up the offensive surge despite playing the last few minutes with five fouls.

"The ball was going in to him (Baker) and that got him confidence and he was feeling comfortable the whole night," Westphal said. "We just thought we'd ride him until he fouled out, and he did a great job on both ends, hit some huge shots for us."

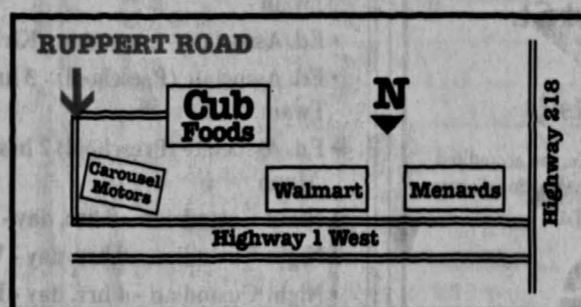
