		<i>Acacia cognata</i> Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Bower Wattle or River Wattle</i> Graceful weeping small tree 4-6m with variable width. Creamy yellow ball flowers in spring. Protect from frost when young. Moist light to heavy soils. Suitable fast growing small ornamental tree or light screen.		
		<i>Acacia floribunda</i> [seed] Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Gossamer Wattle</i> Graceful, dense tree 6-8m x 2m plus. Scented cream rods in early spring. Well drained soils. Prune to hedge or screen. Fast growing. Grows well in coastal conditions.		
		<i>Acacia pravissima</i> 'Kurunga Cascade' Family: Fabaceae Weeping or prostrate 1m x 3m. Triangular grey-green foliage and masses of golden ball flowers in spring. Fast growing.	Frost tolerant	Unknown
		<i>Acacia viscidula</i> Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Sticky Wattle</i> Erect or spreading shrub usually 1-4m high and up to 4m wide. Light yellow flowers in spring. Prefers well drained soil. Fast growing and useful for screen or informal hedge. Dense habit ideal as nesting sites for small birds	Light frost	
		<i>Alyogyne huegelii</i> 'West Coast Gem' Family: Malvaceae <i>Common name: Lilac Hibiscus</i> Rounded shrub 2-2.5m x 1-5-2.0m. Deep purple flowers late spring to late autumn. Protected position with well-drained soil. Prune from young age to promote a dense habit and strong root system. Grows rapidly; performs well in pots.	Light frost	
		<i>Baeckea diosmifolia x imbricata</i> Family: Myrtaceae Shrub 0.3-1.0m x 0.3m. Solitary, small white flowers with 5 white petals, spring to summer. Small aromatic leaves, 'somewhat broader' than for <i>B. diosmifolia</i> . Needs good drainage; prune after flowering.		Unknown







































		<i>Baeckea gunniana</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Alpine Baeckea</i> Densely branched aromatic shrub to 2m or prostrate 0.3-1.0m x 0.3-1m. Masses of small white flowers in summer. Needs regular watering. Tolerates wet ground; leaves have pleasant tea tree smell when crushed.		No
		<i>Baeckea utilis var latifolia</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Mountain Baeckea</i> Slender shrub 1-3m high with arching branches. Small white flowers in summer. Found in the ACT, particularly in the Brindabella ranges near Mt Gingera. Hardy in moist situations. (Sometimes known as <i>B. latifolia</i> or <i>B. gunniana</i> var. <i>latifolia</i> .)		No
		<i>Banksia aemula</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Wallum Banksia</i> Usually spreading shrub to 3m x 3m but may grow to 8m high. Yellow-green cones in late summer-autumn which remain for some time. Stiff serrated leaves. Best in sandy well drained soil with access to moisture. Useful for screening; attracts native birds.	Frost tolerant	Unknown
		<i>Banksia ericifolia</i> 'Red Clusters' Family: Proteaceae Bushy shrub 5m x 4m. Long red flower spikes in autumn and winter. Distinctive bright green foliage similar to that of the genus <i>Erica</i> . Suits most conditions. Good screening plant.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia</i> 'Giant Candles' Family: Proteaceae Rounded shrub 5m x 5m. Orange flower spikes in winter can reach 40cm. Full sun results in better flowering. Well-drained soil. Good feature and screening plant, bird attracting. Can be used for cut flowers/fruit.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia marginata</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Silver Banksia</i> Rounded shrub or small tree 3-6m x 2-4m with yellow flowers throughout the year but mainly in autumn and winter. Silver backed leaves. Prefers well drained soil but tolerates moist sites. Attracts wildlife; useful screen or windbreak.		
		<i>Banksia oblongifolia</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Fern-leaved, Dwarf or Rusty Banksia</i> Open, multi-stemmed shrub to 2m x 2m. Yellow-green flowers in autumn and winter. New leaves covered with rusty fur. Prefers well drained soil. Needs pruning. May need extra water in dry weather, tolerant to salt spray. Bird attracting.		No
		<i>Banksia serrata</i> 'Pygmy Possum' Family: Proteaceae Low growing, mound-shaped shrub with arching branches 0.3-0.6m x 1-2.5m. Yellow/cream flowers in autumn and winter. Best in full sun but will tolerate some shade. Well-drained soil preferred. Suitable for coastal areas and bonsai.		
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Birthday Candles' Family: Proteaceae Low growing, cushion shaped shrub 0.5-0.6m x 0.5-1.2m. Short orange spikes with reddish styles from autumn to early spring. Full sun results in better flowering. Needs well-drained soil. Ideal for rockery, container or coastal planting; attracts wildlife.		
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Honeypots' Family: Proteaceae Hardy broad-domed shrub 1m x 1.5m. Golden spikes of flowers in autumn and winter. Dense foliage. Well-drained soil. Suitable for rockeries or containers. Attracts wildlife.		Some
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> var. <i>spinulosa</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Hairpin Banksia</i> <i>B. spinulosa</i> is a variable shrub and this variety grows to 1.5-2m high and similar width. Golden-yellow flower spikes from autumn.		Unknown






























		<i>Boronia muelleri</i> 'Sunset Serenade' Family: Rutaceae Dense bush 1m x 1m. Fragrant pale pink flowers mainly in spring. Full sun or semi-shade with some overhead cover. Well-drained sandy loam is best. Prune to keep compact. Good for rockeries, tubs or garden beds.		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Amethyst' Family: Asteraceae Bushy perennial 0.2-0.4 x 0.5-1.0m. Masses of lavender blue to purple flowers, mainly in spring and summer. Full sun and adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Good for pots, hanging baskets.	Frost tolerant	No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Breakoday' Family: Asteraceae Compact perennial herb 0.2-0.4m x 0.4-0.8m. Deep mauve daisy flowers with gold centres most of the year but best in spring and summer. Adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Suits baskets, rockery or pots.		Moderate
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Roulette' Family: Asteraceae Prostrate bushy perennial herb 0.1-0.4m x 0.2-1m. Blue-mauve flowers with yellow centres most of the year, best in spring and summer. Spreads by branching and underground suckers.		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome</i> 'Strawberry Mousse' Family: Asteraceae Groundcover 0.15m x 1m. Bright pink daisy flowers with gold centres, from spring through to autumn. Hardy in most soils with good drainage. Suitable for containers, hanging baskets, rockeries.	Frost tolerant	Moderate
		<i>Callistemon citrinus</i> 'Firebrand' Family: Myrtaceae Common name: <i>Australora Firebrand</i> Semi-prostrate or sprawling shrub 0.5-1m x 2.5m. Rich crimson pink bottlebrush flowers from spring to autumn. Best in full sun but will tolerate some shade and most soils. Good for hedging or embankments. Bird, bee and butterfly attracting.	Frost tolerant	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon pachyphyllus</i> 'Smoked Salmon' Family: Myrtaceae Erect, upright rigid shrub 0.5-1.5m x 0.5-1.5 m. Salmon pink to shell pink flowers most of year with peaks in summer and autumn/early winter. Tolerates both moist and dry conditions; prefers sandy coastal soil.	Frost tolerant	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon pallidus</i> 'Father Christmas' Family: Myrtaceae Dense rounded shrub 2-3m x 2-3m. White bottle-brush flowers with a red blush in spring. Grey-green tapered leaves. Will withstand moderate exposure to salt laden winds. Ideal for windbreaks, screening and hedging.	Frost tolerant	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon pallidus</i> 'Mt Oberon' Family: Myrtaceae Dense, rounded shrub 2-3m x 2-3m. Lemon-yellow bottle brush flowers in spring. Grey-green tapered leaves. Will withstand moderate exposure to salt laden winds. Ideal for windbreaks, screening and hedging.	Frost tolerant	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon recurvus</i> also known as <i>Melaleuca recurva</i> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: <i>Tinaroo Bottlebrush</i> Mainly rounded shrub 1-3m high or small tree to 7m. Bright red flowers tipped with yellow most of the year but mainly in spring. Tolerates range of soils. Attracts wildlife. Ideal for screens, windbreaks and hedging.		


































		<i>Callistemon sieberi</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: River Bottlebrush</i> Usually around 2.5 m tall but can range from 0.6m to 8m. Cream, pale yellow or pink flower spikes late spring to autumn. Prefers sunny position but copes with part shade. Tolerates most soils and conditions. Good for screen or hedge. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		
		<i>Callistemon viminalis 'Little John'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub 0.75-1 x 0.5-1.0 m. Red bottlebrush flowers prolific in spring. Grey blue-green narrow dense soft foliage. Shade or full sun but flowers best in full sun. Suits most soil types. Suitable for courtyards, pots and rockeries.		
	Unknown	<i>Callistemon viridiflorus also known as Melaleuca virens</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Lime Bottlebrush</i> Shrub 1-3m x 1-1.5m. Yellow or greenish flower spikes in late spring-early summer. Hard, leathery, sharply pointed leaves. Endemic to Tasmania where it commonly occurs in wet places in subalpine areas. May be pruned for hedging.		No
		<i>Calytrix tetragona (prostrate)</i> Family Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Fringe Myrtle</i> Prostrate 0.1-0.3m x 0.5-1m. Bright green, heath like foliage. Star-like flowers, white to deep pink over spring and summer. Well drained soil. Easily grown, very hardy shrub for small gardens. Attracts bees and other insects.		Unknown
		<i>Chamelaucium 'Eric John'</i> Family Myrtaceae Moderately dense shrub 1.5m x 1m. Masses of mauve/pink flowers in early spring. Low water needs. Best in a well-drained sandy soil. Much loved by bees, butterflies and other insects. Good cut flower.	 -4	
		<i>Chamelaucium uncinatum 'Cascade Brook'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Open erect shrub with secondary branches weeping 1.5m x 1.5m. Profuse mauve to purple flowers in summer and winter. Most well drained soils. Good for cut flowers or informal hedge.	Light frost	Some
		<i>Chamelaucium uncinatum 'Purple Pride'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Open shrub 2-3m x 2-4m with large, open dark and light purple flowers late winter and spring. Prefers sandy soils. Needs cover from frost. Prune regularly to maintain density and increase flower display. Excellent cut flower.	Light frost	Unknown
		<i>Coprosma quadrifida</i> Family: Rubiaceae <i>Common name: Prickly Currant Bush</i> Slender erect shrub 2-5m x 1-2m. Tiny, greenish flowers from August then bright red fruit in summer. Needs moist soil. Tolerates salt and poor drainage. Fire-retardant plant; windbreak or screening plant. Food and habitat for fauna.		No
		<i>Correa 'Cane's Hybrid'</i> Family: Rutaceae Low spreading shrub 0.6-1m x 1m. Large pale pink/cream tubular flowers with pale green tips in winter. Hairy leaves. Suits most soils with reasonable drainage. Protect root zone from hot sun. Great for small gardens and pots.		Unknown
		<i>Correa decumbens</i> Family: Rutaceae Groundcover 0.3-0.6m x 1.5m plus. Erect red bells with green tips mainly in summer. Most well drained soils. Ideal for covering banks. Attracts birds.		No





























		Correa 'Dusky Bells' Compact shrub 0.6-1m x 2. Long dusky pink bell flowers (2.5 cm) in autumn and winter. Tolerates full sun but prefers some shade. Best in moist but well-drained soil though is drought tolerant. Bird attracting.	Family: Rutaceae		
		Correa glabra 'Coliban River' Dense shrub to 1.2 x 1.2 m. Pale green flowers mainly in autumn and winter. Aromatic leaves; most well drained soils. Excellent low growing hedge for difficult conditions. Good in pots or as a feature plant. Useful for smaller gardens.	Family: Rutaceae		
		Correa 'Ivory Bells' Dense shrub 1-2m x 2-3m with profuse cream bells most of the year. Hardy particularly in moist, well-drained soil in a protected spot. Tolerates full sun but likes dappled shade in full or partial sun. Attracts honey-eating birds.	Family: Rutaceae		Unknown
		Correa 'Mannii' <i>Common name: Native Fuschia</i> Variable shrub 0.6-2m x 2m. Tubular flowers vivid red on the exterior and paler pink inside from April to July in Canberra. Likes dry or moist soils. Bird attracting.	Family: Rutaceae		No
		Correa 'Marian's Marvel' Open hardy shrub 1-2m x 3m. Flowers pale pink upper, lime green tips in autumn and winter. Requires extra water in extended dry periods. Suitable as a hedge or container plant. Bird attracting.	Family: Rutaceae		No
		Correa pulchella Dainty, dense shrub 0.2-1m x 1m. Orange, pink or red bells through autumn and spring. Prune for vigorous growth and good flower production. Mulch well and water deeply in extended dry periods. Good container plant; bird attracting.	Family: Rutaceae		No
		Crowea 'Festival' Compact dense shrub 1m x 1m. Bright pink star flowers in autumn and spring. Aromatic foliage. Best under tall trees or in pots with good drainage. Grows well in most well-drained, mulched soil. Good feature plant or cut flower.	Family: Rutaceae		Unknown
		Crowea 'Pink Blush' Small shrub to 1m x 1.2m. Pink buds open to white stars which age to pale pink from November to June. Most well-drained soils. Needs watering in summer. Ideal for rockery or feature plant.	Family: Rutaceae	Light frost	No
		Crowea saligna 'Rosy Glow' Neat bush 0.5-1m x 0.5-1m. Large rose coloured star flowers from autumn into winter. Will grow in sun but prefers protection from hot afternoon sun. Well drained damp soil. Suitable for a pot or feature plant.	Family: Rutaceae		No
		Darwinia citriodora <i>Common name: Lemon-scented Darwinia</i> Rounded shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Flower colour changes from white-yellow to orange-red during July to January. Lemon scented leaves. Best in semi-shade and good drainage is essential. Adequate summer water is necessary.	Family: Myrtaceae		No
		Diselma archeri <i>Common name: Cheshunt Pine</i> Erect, bushy shrub 2m x 1.5m. Very small male and female cones on separate plants. Well composted soil and plenty of moisture. Very hardy, slow growing. Suitable for large rockery or as potted plant.	Family: Cupressaceae		No















		<i>Common name: Narrow-leaved Hopbush</i> Erect, bushy shrub with fine, delicate foliage 2-3m x 1.5m. Plants may be male or female. Male plants have pretty circlets of anthers and female plants have colourful fruits in autumn. Needs well drained soil. Fast growing screen plant.	tolerant	
		<i>Epacris longiflora 'Nectar Pink'</i> Family: Ericaceae Upright, straggly shrub 0.5-1m x 0.5-1m. Pink flowers with lighter tips, most of the year. Likes moist but well-drained, light to medium soils. Suitable for containers and rockeries. Bird attracting.		No
		<i>Eremophila calorhabdos</i> Family: Scrophulariaceae <i>Common name: Spiked Eremophila or Red Rod</i> Erect, spindly shrub 1-4m x 0.5m but usually less than 2m. Unusual form - sends up several upright rods from a single stem if unpruned. Prolific pink, red or purplish tubular flowers October to December, sometimes longer. Well drained soil. Prune regularly to improve density and stability. Good cut flower; nectar plant; container plant.		
		<i>Eremophila glabra 'Kalbarri Carpet'</i> Family: Scrophulariaceae Dense groundcover 0.1-0.2m x 1-2m. Profuse yellow tubular flowers mainly in spring and summer. Soft silvery-grey foliage. Well-drained soil, dislikes excess humidity. Tip prune to improve foliage density and flower production. Use in rockeries or large containers or plant over retaining walls or banks. Attracts wildlife.	Light frost	
		<i>Eremophila glabra var. glabra</i> Family: Scrophulariaceae <i>Common Emu Bush</i> Compact low shrub or erect form up to 2m x 2m. Red-orange flowers from March to December. Leaves almost silvery white. Open, sunny position with good drainage. Grows on a variety of soils. Tip pruning helps to keep the plant rejuvenated.	Light frost	
		<i>Eucryphia lucida 'Ballerina'</i> Family: Cunoniaceae <i>Common name: Leatherwood</i> <i>E. lucida</i> usually grows 5-7 m in cultivation. Prefers a sheltered position from wind, ample moisture and well drained soil. Prune to keep as a compact, bushy shrub. Copious nectar favoured by bees. Great tub plant or feature plant. 'Ballerina' has very pale pink rose-like flowers with deep pink stamens.	Frost tolerant	No
		<i>Eucryphia lucida 'Pink Cloud'</i> Family: Cunoniaceae <i>Common name: Leatherwood</i> <i>E. lucida</i> usually grows 5-7 m in cultivation. Prefers a sheltered position from wind, ample moisture and well drained soil. Prune to keep as a compact, bushy shrub. Copious nectar favoured by bees. Great tub plant or feature plant. In summer 'Pink Cloud' has soft pink flowers deepening to rose in the centre.	Frost tolerant	No
		<i>Grevillea 'Canberra Gem'</i> Family: Proteaceae Moderately dense shrub 2.5-3.5 x 3-4m. Waxy pinkish-red spider-like flowers in spring. Best in well drained soils; responds well to mulching and occasional deep watering in dry conditions. Ideal for winter colour contrast, screening, feature planting, attractive to wildlife and quick to establish.		No
		<i>Grevillea diminuta</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Brindabella Grevillea</i> Spreading shrub to 1m x 3m. Striking pendulous clusters of rusty-red flowers outside and bright pink inside usually in spring and summer. Dry or moist well-drained soils. Considered rare. Attracts birds. Suits rockery.		No
		<i>Grevillea 'Forest Rambler'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading or sprawling shrub 0.3-1.5m x 1.5-3m. Pale pink and green flower clusters mainly in spring. Coppery new growth. Well drained soils either clay or sand. Dense cover, prune to shape. Vigorous so useful for covering large areas. Bird attracting.		
































		<i>Grevillea lanigera</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Woolly Grevillea</i> Variable shrub to 1.5m x 1.5m but may be larger or even prostrate. Red and cream flowers in semi-erect clusters in late winter and spring. Grey-green 'woolly' foliage. Dry or moist soils. Attracts wildlife. Good low screen or rockery plant.		No
		<i>Grevillea lanigera (prostrate)</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Prostrate Woolly Grevillea</i> Ground cover 0.5m x 1-2m wide. Red and cream flowers in semi-erect clusters most of the year. Neat grey-green, "woolly" foliage. Dry or moist soils. Bird attracting. Good container or rockery plant.		No
		<i>Grevillea 'Masons Hybrid'</i> Family: Proteaceae Bushy shrub, 2m x 2m. Attractive apricot-red flowers with divided leaves, long flowering. Well drained soil. Good low hedge or screen	 -4	
		<i>Grevillea obtusifolia</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Blunt-Leaved Grevillea</i> Spreading shrub, 1.5m x 3m. Reddish spider flowers, sparse and poorly displayed. Attractive lime green, blunt leaves. Well drained soil. Protect from frost when young. Suitable for hedge. Bird attracting.		
		<i>Grevillea 'Poorinda Diadem'</i> Family: Proteaceae Upright shrub 2-3m x 2-3m. Clusters of buff apricot and yellow flowers from late winter. Suits most well-drained soils. Best in a sunny site but will tolerate some shade. Bird attracting.	 -6	
		<i>Grevillea 'Red Wings'</i> Family: Proteaceae Low growing, spreading shrub, 1.5m x 2m. Bright red, spidery flowers in spring. Tiny, fine ferny leaves. Suited to most well drained soils. Attracts bees and birds.		
		<i>Grevillea rhyolitica 'Deua Flame'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub 1.5-2m x 1.5-2m. Showy red flowers most of the year. Prefers sun but will tolerate some shade. Adapted to low nutrient rocky soils. Ideal feature plant or screen. Attracts wildlife.		
		<i>Grevillea sericea subsp sericea (white)</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Silky Grevillea</i> Upright, spreading shrub, >3m x <3m. White flowers in autumn to spring. Narrow, pointed leaves, hairy underneath. Soil should be well-drained. Can sucker; good for hedges.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea 'Sid Reynolds'</i> Family: Proteaceae Dense, rounded shrub 2.5m x 3m. Profuse pale red and pink flowers in spring. Fine foliage, upper surface green, lower surface silvery. Best in well-drained soils. Screening and feature plant. Attractive to birds and insects.		
		<i>Grevillea wilsonii</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Native Fuchsia</i> Erect, compact to spreading shrub, 1.5m x 1.5m. Brilliant red flowers, late winter to early summer. Prickly, divided, showy leaves. Well drained soil. Bird attracting. Valuable habitat for nesting birds.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea 'Winpara Gold'</i> Family: Proteaceae Dense shrub 1.5-2.5m x 1-3m. Gold and pink spider-like flowers over winter and spring. Sandy or clay soils, dry or moist site. Withstands high pH and responds well to pruning. Suitable for hedging, screening or feature plant. Bird attracting.	Frost tolerant	Unknown













		<i>Grevillea x gaudichaudii</i> Family: Proteaceae Dense, prostrate shrub 0.1-0.3m x 3m. Deep red-burgundy flowers. Fern-like foliage, reddish bronze when new. Moist, well-drained soil. Useful as a groundcover beneath trees, cascading down an embankment or over a retaining wall		
		<i>Gynatrix pulchella</i> Family: Malvaceae <i>Common name: Hemp Bush, Aboriginal Hemp</i> Quick growing but relatively short-lived shrub, to 4-5m x 2m. White or cream flowers, mid spring. Leaves with a heart-shaped base. Moist, semishaded sites. Tough plant.	Unknown	No
		<i>Hakea 'Burrendong Beauty'</i> Family: Proteaceae Sprawling shrub 1.5m x 3m. Bright pink clusters of flowers in winter and early spring. Rigid, prickly, elliptical leaves. Needs good drainage. Bird attracting.		Unknown
		<i>Hibbertia empetrifolia</i> Family: Dilleniaceae <i>Common name: Trailing Guinea Flower</i> Low, scrambling shrub 0.3- 0.6m x 1.5m. Yellow flowers in spring. Shiny, dark green leaves. Prefers moist situation. Weed suppressant.	Light frost	Unknown
