

Cinnamomum oliveri - family: LAURACEAE

OLIVER'S SASSAFRAS

Large rainforest tree to 20 metres Small creamy-white flowers Fruit a blue or black berry

Cultivation: Good soil and ample water promotes growth in the early stages when it can be rather slow: shelter from frost and severe exposure.

Timber workers call this tree 'Camphorwood' for its fragrant timber. It grows into a large tree



with a beautiful crown of thick foliage with flushes of red new It is quite different in appearance from its close relative Camphor Laurel. The latter is a serious weed tree in subtropical areas. Laurels bear fruits of high food value for pigeons as do avocados (also in the Laurel family) for humans, but Oliver's Sassafras is rather sporadic in its fruit production.
