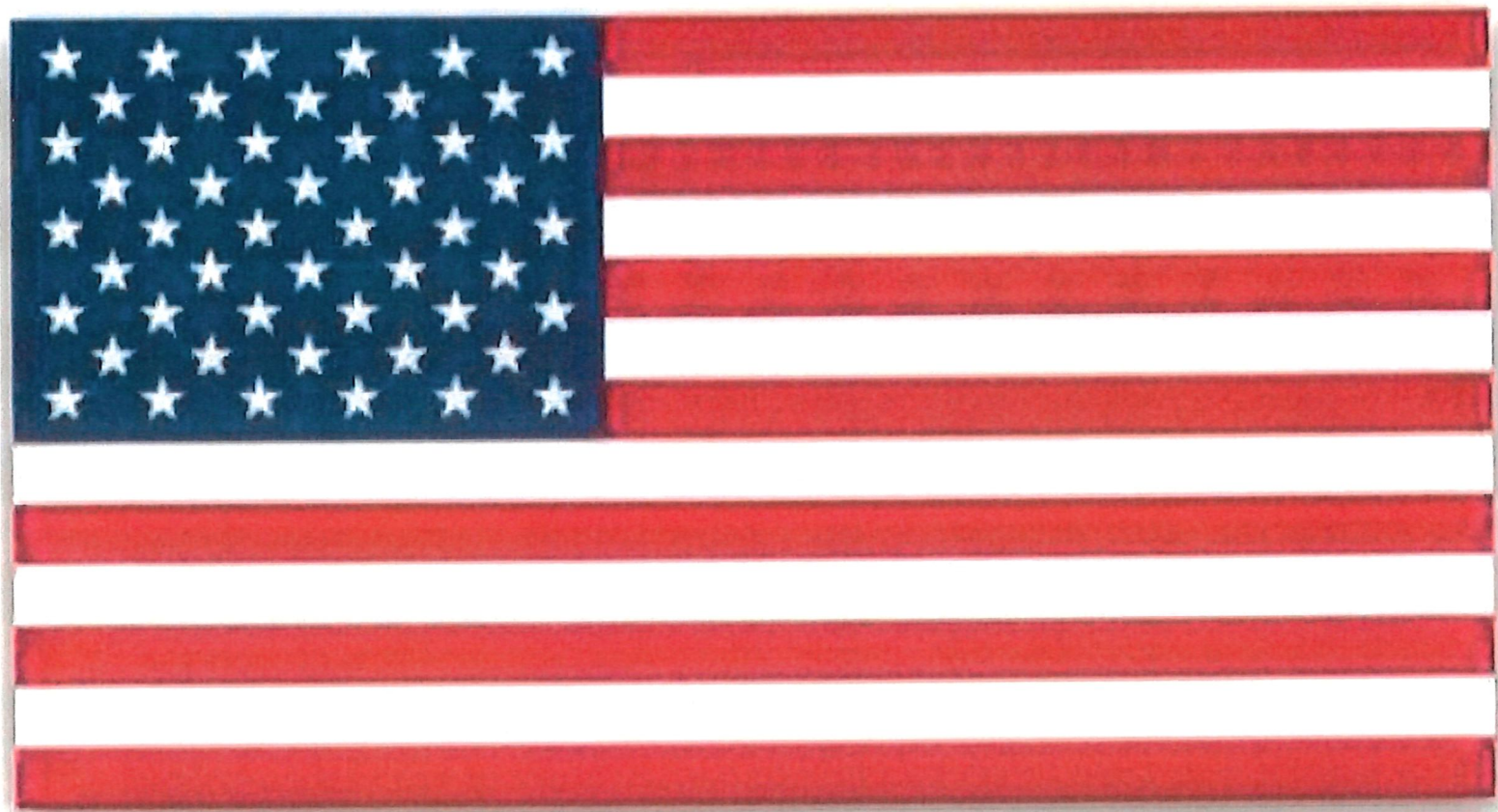

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Town of Troy was convened by Town Board Chairperson Dan Pearson at 7:05 p.m. on Tuesday April 16<sup>th</sup>, 2019. The meeting was held at the Troy Town Hall.

Board members present were Dan Pearson, Jan Cuccia, Cliff Jennings, and Lowell Enerson. Incoming Supervisor Jason Kjos was also present. Suzanne Van Mele was not present. The following people also signed the attendance sheet: Walter Riedel, Ruth Nelson, Gene Tschumperlin, Phyllis Albert, Nicole Bradford-Albert, Laurie Halberg, Jill Berke, Rob Feidler, Michael Kretz, Wayne Hanson, Mark Swanson, Randy & Wendy Nickerson, Judy Freund, Mary Lacer, Colleen & Doug Akerley, Jeff Cloutier, Gary Parent, Tim Blide, John Huber, Patrice Wernlund, David Brummel, James Ellis, Greg Johnson, Caleb Johnson, Ruth Knapp, Ray Knapp, Roger Hartwich Jr., Mary Jean Marnie, & Jim Marnie. Others may have been present that did not sign in.

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman Dan Pearson introduced the Board Members as listed above and the new Clerk/Treasurer Gail Anderson.

**REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF THE 2018 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES** - Copies of the Annual Meeting minutes from April 17<sup>th</sup>, 2018 were available. Mike Kretz, 256 Troon Ct., moved to approve the 2018 meeting minutes. Seconded by Jan Cuccia, 132 Skyline Dr. All in favor, Motion carried.

### PRESENTATIONS:

- Gail Anderson:** Reviewed the 2018 Financial Statements prepared by Clifton, Larsen, & Allen, CPA firm in Hudson, WI.
- Cliff Jennings:** Provided the town road report including the completed 2018 and upcoming 2019 road projects. Gary Parent, Town Shop Crew, also provided information on various road projects.
- Jill Berke:** Jill Berke summarized the Park Board Annual Report to residents. She acknowledged the other Park Board members, Park Rangers, & others. A survey regarding the Outdoor Rec Plan was announced and timeline explained.
- Dan Pearson:** Provided an update on Town Zoning Ordinance, Farmland Preservation Programs, along with the Commercial Corridor. Chairman Pearson also provided an EMS and Fire update.

### RESIDENT COMMENTS/QUESTIONS:

- Mike Kretz questioned if the Town foresees the need to take out long term debt.
- Ray Knapp, 521 Trillium Lane, brought up past County spreadsheet tool to help analyze forecast road building budget and wondered if Town of Troy ever went through that exercise. Spreadsheet formulas may need to be reworked to make it work for the Town.
- Jill Berke, 246 Carlson Lane, asked regarding status of combined TRIP grant with Kinnickinnic Township for Coulee Trail.
- Mike Kretz questioned status of file of River Falls Annexation case.



- Judy Freund thanked town board for their service and also raised concern about the narrowness of Glenmont Road especially during construction.
- Wayne Hanson also noted the bad condition of Coulee Trail.
- Doug Akerley on 376 Whitetail Lane wanted to know process for crack filling & maybe it should be evaluated as it appears not to be that effective.
- Greg Johnson, 589 Wyngate Dr., asked how roads are evaluated. Is it time, stress, traffic, etc. in order to get repaired?
- Unnamed resident mentioned concern with parking at Pemples Access when using his kayak.
- Randy Nickerson, 161 Glenmont Rd., was concerned about the County causing more damage to road when cutting trees during road restrictions. Why weren't our road restrictions enforced?
- Roger Hartwich, 688 Glover Rd., & other residents questioned criteria, funding, and timeline of Hwy 35/Glover Road interchange due to high traffic and potential accidents.
- Roger Hartwich also thanked Suzanne Van Mele for all her time and effort that she and Park Board put in for Glover Park Pavilion Project.
- Bob Fiedler introduced himself as 9<sup>th</sup> District Representative & invited all to a Listening Session on 4/17/19 at Town Hall from 6:30 p.m.-7:30 p.m.
- Mary Lacer, 299 Plainview Drive– Questioned trimming of smaller bushes unnecessarily while the County was tree trimming.
- Jim Marnie, 175 Glenmont Rd., proposed the creation of a Village Center may help drive other decisions and help prioritize building of the Hwy 35 interchange.
- Ray Knapp stated that more plat review should be done to test if commercial corridor is economically viable.
- Mark Swanson, 208 Glenmont Rd. encouraged support from Town of Troy & St. Croix County about case with Magellan Pipeline, to not judge easement from air, but to walk it to safeguard Riverway property.

Jan Cuccia moved to adjourn the annual meeting at 8:40pm. Seconded by Mark Swanson. All in favor, **motion carried.**

A short meeting followed with the residents present living on Glenmont Road affected by the upcoming road construction project. No specific date was set for annual meeting in 2020, so it will by law be the third Tuesday in April, which is **April 21, 2020.**

## How Does Absentee In-Person Voting Work?

- Simply come in during office hours with a valid ID, request a ballot, fill it out in the office, and leave it with staff
- Additional hours will be posted on the website and in local papers to try and accommodate as many voters as possible
- Don't worry about putting in your request for a ballot
- No waiting for the mail to get your ballot to you
- No worry that it gets back to the polling location by the deadline

## 2020 So Far.....

- Absentee numbers
  - February – 118 absentee ballots
  - April – 1061 absentee ballots (110 not returned, cost of \$137.50 in postage for unreturned ballots)
  - May – 896 absentee ballots (184 not returned, cost of \$230 in postage for unreturned ballots)
  - August – 903 absentee ballots (227 not returned, cost of \$283.75 in postage for unreturned ballots)
- Costs for absentee ballots have skyrocketed, due to the number to be sent out, copies to be made, labor hours to process, outgoing and return postage, the cost to the town and tax payers is beyond what election costs have ever been.
- Total cost for just postage for 2020 is already over \$3000 with the highest voter election yet to come

## 2019 Annual Report to Residents - Town of Troy Park Board

Sept. 1, 2020

Year 2019 was very eventful for our parks, including the construction of the new community building (multipurpose building), and the initial steps to upgrade trails at Glover Park. Town Board approved a cooperative agreement with St. Croix County for new bike/pedestrian signs on designated bike routes.

### **Cove Boat Ramp:**

2019 opening – the boat ramp/gangway was installed later due to high water. 2020 opening – ramp was busy in May and gangway and ramp adjusted as necessary due to high water. Repairs are currently in process on both ramp and gangway. Boat ramp is closely monitored by our Park Rangers; individuals who violate parking and other rules may be ticketed. Rules are available at the town hall or recycling center.

### **Glover Park:**

Community Building/Multipurpose Building Project – Derrick Building Solutions, New Richmond, Wisc. who was awarded the project, began clearing the construction site in mid July, 2019. Project includes modern restrooms, community kitchen, attached West Pavilion, and connecting asphalt path to south parking area and to park roadway.

In Sept., 2019 a decision was made to remove the existing volleyball court, and replace with a paved area for two pickleball courts. The court is being painted currently for use this fall.

DNR stewardship grant, Fred and Katherine Andersen grants and other local donations were received toward funding project. Park Impact Fees are being used to for remaining costs. The town was awarded a second Andersen Foundation grant for \$80,000 in Aug. 2019 (written by S. VanMele, grant contractor), which helped to reduce costs for designated building amenities and increased project costs.

The community building was substantially completed in November, 2019, with a few adjustments in subsequent months. Cedar Corp. engineering and architectural staff worked closely with the Building Subcommittee (Park Board Chair Berke, Supervisors Enerson and Cuccia) and Park Board throughout the planning and construction phases.

Trail Maintenance/Restoration Project- A second grant was received through the DNR (Recreational Trails Act) for restoration and maintenance of Eagle Trail, Eagle Pass and Red Tail Cutoff. The town received DNR grant funds for up to approx. half the project; the low bid of \$62,000 was awarded to BS Construction, Elmwood, Wisc. by the Town Board. Project construction was primarily completed in Oct., 2019 and finished by the end of July, this year. We invite you to enjoy a hike on the restored trails!

Buckthorn eradication project was completed late last fall, in annual phases of a long term plan.

### **Pemble's Access:**

Updated signs – rules signs were updated installed in 2019. Visitors are reminded that parking is allowed only in designated parking spaces.

### **Outdoor Recreation Plan 2020-25**

The Park Board thanks the 249 residents (12.8%) who participated in the on-line park survey, as part of the Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, completed in late 2019. We use the guide for acquiring and developing our current parks and recreation facilities. The plan is available on the Town's website.

## Town of Troy Park and Recreation Activities

### **COVE BOAT RAMP Open daily, year-round, 6am – 9:30pm; fee for use; limited parking as posted**

Rate fees: Daily fees: \$6 - residents; \$8 - non-residents. Annual fees: \$50 - residents; \$80 - non-residents

Informational bulletins - fee rates, regulations available at the Town Hall and Recycling Center. Parking is allowed only in marked areas. Regulations are posted at boat ramp and on the town website under "township parks." Park Rangers may ticket violators.

Winter use - access to the river by foot, UTV, ATV, and snowmobile ONLY across the boat ramp. No vehicles are allowed across the ramp. The town crew removes snow (as possible) throughout the winter months. Parking is limited to parking stalls near the ramp and is clearly marked. NO PARKING in any other areas during the winter months, please.

### **GLOVER PARK Open Daily, year-round, 8am – ½ hour after sunset; ample parking**

Drinking water, modern restrooms, 2 pavilions with electricity (West Pavilion has attached community kitchen), 2 regulation-sized ball fields, 2.5 mile trail system with benches and interpretive signage, large playground with accessible play activities, pickleball courts, picnic tables, native and other flower gardens, restored prairie remnant, established pine and hardwood forest, and "pet stations" for dog waste pick-up.

Water Fountain – water bottle filler at West Pavilion and fresh water can be accessed by "push of a button," located on electrical panel near E. Pavilion; or, use the hand pump. Annual spring water testing is completed by County Health Inspector.

Dog Rules – Dogs must be leashed at all times; violators may be ticketed and park rangers can assess a penalty. Waste bags are available at "pet stations."

Pavilion – Pavilion and fields are available for group reservation; games are scheduled at the ball fields by the Hudson and River Falls youth teams; Mon.-Fri. evenings from April through July 31.

**RESERVATION POLICY for pavilion, volleyball court, and ball fields.** Contact the Town Clerk's office at 715-425-2665, or email to request a Use Application Form. Fees assessed, plus refundable security deposit if facility is left in good condition after use. Deposit only, for Troy residents. Refer to town website, under parks.

**PEMBLE'S ACCESS - OPEN only week-ends in May (unless there is high water) and Sept.; OPEN DAILY Memorial Day through Labor Day; 10am - ½ hr. after sunset; limited parking; portable restroom available.** Parking ONLY in designated area near the beach. Bike rack available.

**BIKE & PEDESTRIAN TRAILS** -Troy has extended and paved shoulders on North and South Glover Roads (connecting routes to River Falls and Hudson); and on Townsvalley Rd., north of East Cove Rd. to Coulee Trail. Available also is a paved path off E. Cove Rd. between the Meadow Valley and Deer Valley residential areas. Extended paved shoulders on Cty. U and Mann Valley Dr., connecting route into River Falls.
