Ichimi

With Our Thoughts We Make the World

“We are what we think. All that we are arises with our thoughts. With our thoughts we make the world.”
Shakyamuni Buddha from the Dhammapada.

I was talking with a friend recently about how we have become so disconnected with the suffering in the world and insensitive to the death and destruction that occurs near and far. My friend suggested that it was because the media has made these events part of our entertainment world and not perceived as real or relevant to our lives. If this is true then we should take a serious look at how we react to the news stories that reach our homes.

When the recent earthquake and tsunami hit Indonesia in October last year were you moved to act and moved by compassion? Did you shed a tear for the thousands of lives lost and the thousands left homeless? When Osama bin Laden was killed did you cheer? Did you feel relief? Did you feel happy or indifferent? These questions are not meant to judge but to make each of us individually contemplate on who we are.

I had relayed to my friend that I was not proud of the way in which some Americans cheered and celebrated the death of bin Laden. This may sound strange to some readers, however to me cheering the death of a human being is not something I feel we should be doing. Right or wrong, good or bad we should not lower ourselves to cheer and celebrate his death as he did on 9/11. I believe most of us were not sure what to feel. This ambivalent feeling probably stems from not wanting to feel joy at a death and yet knowing that this death meant so much to so many.

These are events in our lives that allows each of us to contemplate our reaction whether we overtly reacted or quietly responded, we have an opportunity to reflect on the type of person we are. In our reaction there is no right or wrong, but it is just as it is. And as the Buddha said, with our thoughts we make up the world in which we live. So the question is what type of world do we want to live in?

Minister's Report:

The Dharma School Teachers conference was held on April 26-28, 2019 in San Jose. 125 delegates attended. Rev. is encouraging schools who would like to visit the Temple. Rev. recently toured the CEIBA program. Gotan-E service will be held on Saturday, May 18 at 10:00 am, celebrating the birthday of Shinran Shonin. Rev. will be teaching a class through CSUMB extension on Thursdays mornings, starting May 9th.
