My LMH Story

"As a first-generation university student, I feel honoured to have been chosen as LMH's first Abelian Scholar. The scholarship has covered the majority of my second-year fees for my MPhil in English Studies (Medieval Period). Having accrued significant student debts already, the scholarship substantially eased my anxieties about funding and allowed me to thoroughly enjoy the work.

I study Old English and Anglo-Latin literature, dating from the seventh to the 11th century, to discover how the early English Church was understood by the first Christians on the British Isles, especially through their reception of patristic writings. In my first year, I wrote a dissertation under the supervision of Vincent Gillespie – the Tolkien Professor of Old English, based at LMH – on the late 14th century mystic Julian of Norwich, the first female identified as an author in the English language. This academic collaboration was particularly meaningful as I continued Julian's legacy of literacy as a student at the first Oxford college to admit women!

It is with immense gratitude that I graduated with a Distinction. This year opened up many amazing opportunities: I produced a podcast with The Oxford Research Centre for the Humanities on the modern-day importance of medieval institutions; published my first professional academic article in an established journal, making my debut contribution to the field; and I secured funding to continue to my DPhil at Oxford. I am very excited about pursuing my dream of earning a doctorate and teaching undergraduates, hopefully paving the way to a career in academia. I will continue my research into how Anglo-Saxon poetry reveals the earliest English understandings of the identity, meaning and theology of the Church.

The Value of Graduate Scholarships

Over recent years, we have strategically increased the number of graduate students and the Clore Graduate Centre is providing a wonderful base for the community. A substantial Middle Common Room (MCR) complements the undergraduate community, with graduate students providing aspirational role models for academic achievement and practical support through mentoring relationships.

The MCR at LMH is wonderfully diverse, recruited from 63 countries across the world, however, it is less socio-economically diverse than the undergraduate community. Government tuition fee loans and university bursaries now enable home undergraduates to be well-supported financially regardless of background. In contrast, no such loans or standardised bursaries are available for graduates and we have seen a high dropout rate for graduate offer-holders, with the most commonly cited reason being a lack of funding – they applied hoping for a full scholarship. For some overseas graduates, even if they are awarded funding from the University, it is at the home student rate and they cannot make up the significant shortfall to meet overseas student fees.

Many undergraduate students now feel that a Masters degree will distinguish them in the graduate jobs market, however without a substantial number of scholarships on offer, it is only those with independent financial means who can continue their education to this level. Even those not averse to increasing their student debt could only cover part of the cost of study through government loans.

The diversity issue across higher education in general is exacerbated by 'pipeline' issues. Academic and research careers start with graduate study, presenting a

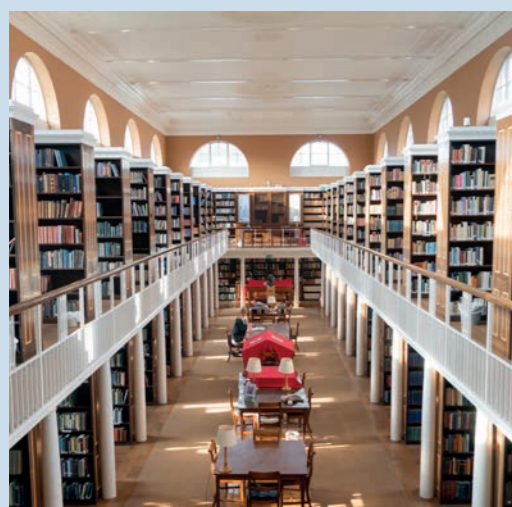


considerable barrier to many of the students we are now including at the undergraduate level.

We have been saddened to see some of the most academically able candidates unable to take up their places, but also delighted to see alumni support, like that from John and Valerie on the following pages, enabling candidates from disadvantaged backgrounds to take up their places when they otherwise could not. We are deeply grateful to all those who have made such personal gifts to graduates during the year. The students' gratitude is overwhelming for this life-changing opportunity.

The Chris Dobson Research Fund at LMH

In honour and memory of the late Professor Sir Chris Dobson to support the next generation of Junior Research Fellows and DPhil students

In May 2021 we launched a £350,000 fundraising campaign to support a Research Fund in Chris' name to continue his legacy of ground-breaking research. Once complete, this fund will support young academics to focus on researching the areas which Chris was so passionate about, namely biomolecular NMR spectroscopy; the structure, function and dynamics of proteins; the process of protein folding and misfolding and their role in diseases.

His lifetime fascination with how proteins fold and why they sometimes misfold to form amyloid deposits took him (leading many others) on an incredible journey – searching for possible causes, and prevention, of diseases such as diabetes, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's. Chris had a significant impact on the academic community – in Oxford, Cambridge and the US, and on the lives of the many he encountered along the way; the recollections of many alumni we have spoken to during the year are testament to this.

Our first Chris Dobson graduate student and Junior Research Fellow will arrive at LMH in Michaelmas 2022. Not long! We are incredibly grateful to the 30 donors have contributed almost half the funds we need and continue to seek support to raise the remaining funds.

Mapping Onesimos

“ This year I have been the very lucky recipient of the Warr Goodman scholarship. My doctoral research looks at Ancient Greek vases, tracking the productions of a particular workshop, and an artist named Onesimos, assessing different artisans’ interactions with one another 2,500 years ago. Whilst this year has been a little different, I’ve still loved my research, and consider it a real privilege.

This last year I have mainly been doing ‘book work’, looking at what has already been published on the subject. I have produced a catalogue of the vases from my painter’s workshop, and have explored stylistic comparisons between different painters. I have also mapped where Onesimos’ vases have been found, and have been able to suggest hypothetical trade routes for different workshops. I look forward to beginning to travel to see my painter’s vases which are scattered in various collections across the world next year.

I applied to LMH because of its friendly, relaxed atmosphere; it didn’t feel like other colleges. That was now six years ago. Having completed my undergraduate, masters and now conducting my DPhil, all at LMH, I consider it my home. I couldn’t imagine being anywhere else!

Postgraduate courses are not cheap. Scholarships and funding, particularly in the arts, are also incredibly hard to come by, and so this scholarship has been invaluable in supporting me at Oxford. With the lack of scholarships available in the humanities, I have known many students with innovative research ideas be unable to continue their studies to postgraduate level. This not only limits the research being undertaken by departments, but also the diversity of students at postgraduate level, which ultimately hampers diversity among those



entering academia. The lack of funding also forces some postgrads to take up employment, which comes with its own problems – academic expectations such as writing papers and participating in conferences, can also be limited by the need for paid employment, further limiting accessibility into academia. With further cuts to the arts and research expected in the coming years, this is set to get worse.

The Warr Goodman scholarship has been invaluable: it’s allowed me the time to work on publications, and conduct research on top of my DPhil. Ultimately it’s enabled me to stay on at Oxford, continuing to pursue the research I’m passionate about. I’m hoping to stay in academia after my DPhil, and the Warr Goodman scholarship has certainly helped me make a good start on that journey!”

Worldwide Impact: from Switzerland to Zimbabwe via LMH

“ In April, I was reading LMH News 2021 and was struck by the article about the world’s first Conservation Venture Studio by LMH’s Professor David Macdonald – founder of the remarkable Oxford WildCRU that has its collegiate base in LMH. I have always been passionate about the environment and wildlife and, like many of you I suspect, am concerned for the future of our planet and its ecosystems. I hoped that my connection to LMH would enable me to do something practical.



The research carried out by graduates at Oxford is world-class, and I am excited that I can make a real difference to their lives and to LMH’s graduate offer by providing graduate scholarships. I recently received a message from Godfrey – WildCRU’s newest doctoral student and the first recipient of my chosen area of support, whose work I hope you will be interested to read about. Godfrey’s arrival at LMH from Zimbabwe has made me realise just how far-reaching the impact of graduate support can be; as with other international students, Godfrey’s work will contribute to the knowledge-base within his own country, helping to change entrenched views and activities, and shaping policies and actions for the future – in his case in the vital field of wildlife conservation. It is important to me to be involved in LMH life 50 years after I started my own student career, and to know that I can make a difference above and beyond my own life experience.”

As a foreign citizen, scholarships to international students are very limited and I truly believed I could not meet the financial requirements. I am incredibly fond of LMH, having come to the College in 2009 to study for the postgraduate Diploma in International Wildlife Conservation Practice. So it is a very rare opportunity to be able to return to both LMH and WildCRU, and I will remain indebted to Valerie’s Mitchell’s benevolence. The research skills and leadership experiences will give me the tools to cultivate a deeper relationship with WildCRU and also greatly benefit my position as National TFCA’s Coordinator for Zimbabwe. I intend to use the results and findings from my DPhil to contribute towards science and policy and, upon completion, I hope to be strategically positioned to take future significant roles in African conservation and development.”

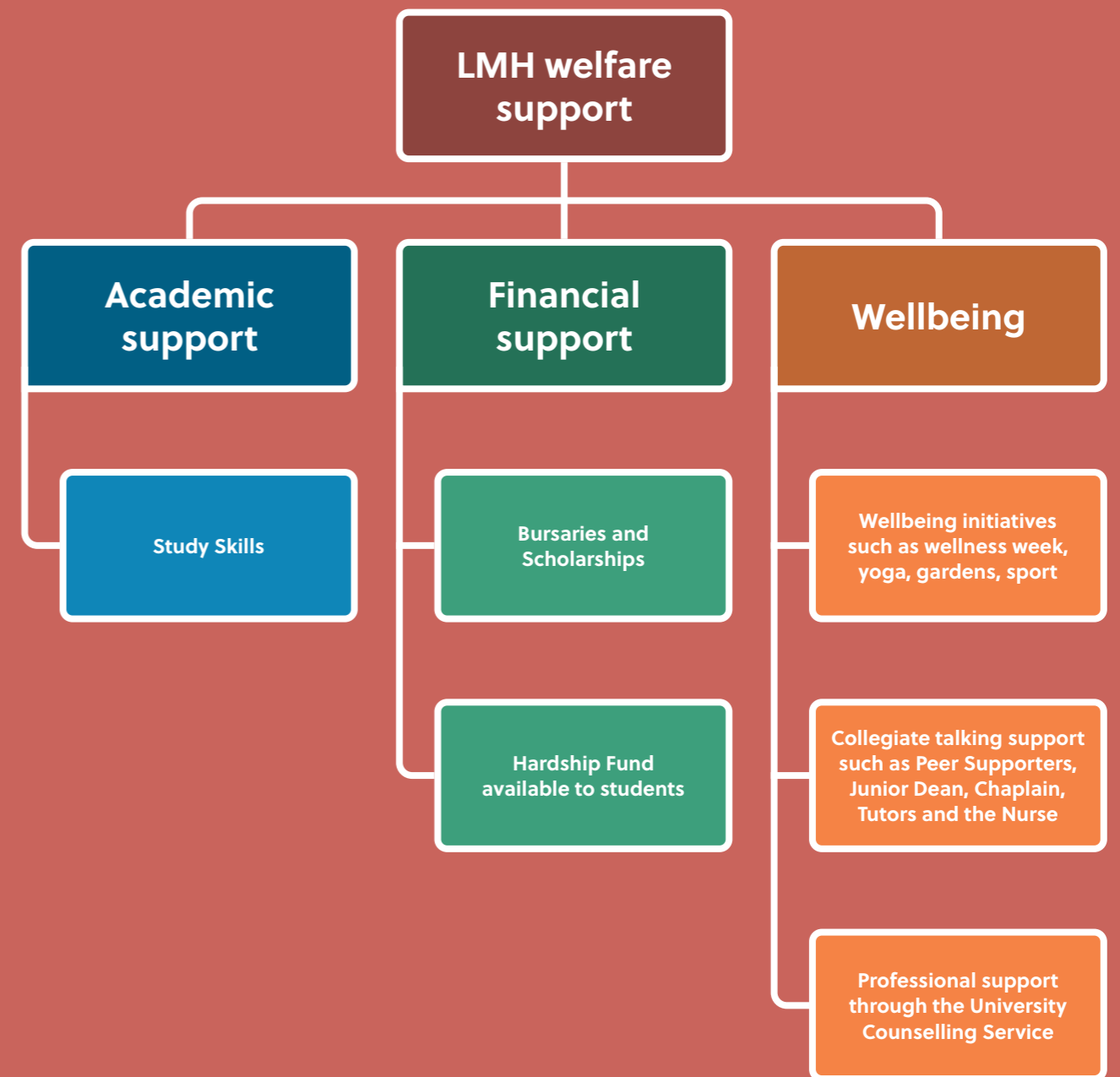

Interconnected: Welfare & Wellbeing support at LMH



Donations from alumni are absolutely central to the College's provision and future development of Welfare and Wellbeing support since there is no income towards this from student fees or government funding. We aim to endow these services to ensure they are secured for future generations.

A Snapshot of the LMH Community, 2020-21



We provided care and support for up to 70 students at any one time self-isolating during Michaelmas term, some repeatedly. Meals and medication were delivered to their doors, laundry was serviced and books from the Library supplied to ensure they were comfortable and could continue their studies.

We carefully kept up a steady flow of information and guidance amidst the shifting sands of government advice so that students, tutors and staff were well informed and knew who to speak to if they had concerns and questions.



Many of our overseas students commented on how our communications, both serious and light hearted, helped them feel part of the LMH community here even at such a distance.



In Trinity term we ran a wonderful, socially distanced and carefully risk-assessed, Wellbeing week that brought us together in groups for the first time in a year. It rained constantly but nothing could dampen the spirits of the students and the pleasure in seeing each other in person again.

Study Skills at LMH: Supporting Students to Succeed

As expected, we have had a very busy year supporting students with study skills teaching. We have seen a wide range of students and problems, helped hundreds of individuals, and ended the academic year with success. Almost all the students we saw gained a 2:1 or First Class degree, and they managed to face the new format exams well-prepared and in good heart. Of course, the constraints and challenges of the pandemic have taken their toll, but the support we have received this year has been the best yet. We have not had to turn anyone away for lack of resources, thanks to our donors. You have been amazing.

The central University, seeing what we have achieved here, has begun to develop measures and resources to help Freshers manage the difficult transition from school to Oxford. I have been fully involved in these discussions and our work has been widely adopted. There is a new annotated central reading list, a new website for Freshers, working groups and internships, all for study skills. I have been training staff at several other colleges, which will each have their own mini-hub similar to ours.

Although there are still challenges to overcome, such as staff shortages and a reduced office space, we are incredibly optimistic about the future. If fundraising

continues to go well, the provision of study skills will have been permanently embedded within the Academic Office here at LMH by the end of the academic year 2021/22. When that happens it will mean that future generations will always be offered the support they need to settle in, to do their best while here and to go on to careers fully able to write well, be critical but fair, listen, develop arguments and advice and present themselves professionally in every way.

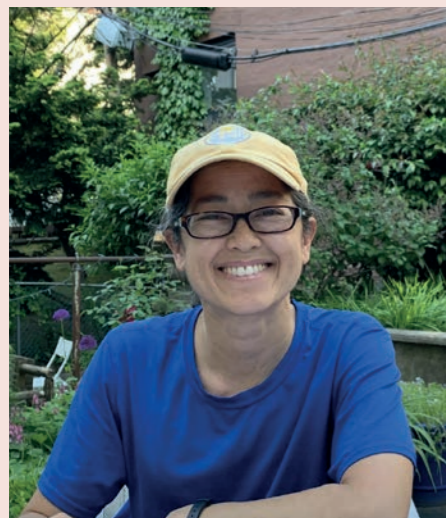

Find, Admit and Thrive: alumni help LMH launch new strategy

During the pandemic, a significant donation enabled LMH to launch its new Include Strategy. Include is a major initiative which builds on LMH's exceptional experience of widening access and inclusion, in particular the special insights we have gained from the pioneering Foundation Year, soon to enter its sixth year as it paves the way to the Oxford-wide programme called Foundation Oxford.

The Include Strategy's key objectives are Find, Admit and Thrive. 'Find' encompasses the aim of carefully identifying the most able potential students regardless of background by a range of approaches, including our experience of working with contextual data and schools; 'Admit' enables us to help prepare them for the process of applying to Oxford, through special outreach initiatives and courses which build confidence and skills; and 'Thrive' helps them, once they have arrived at LMH, to navigate their time as students here by supplying a steady stream of support which incorporates study skills, practical life skills and additional guidance and help to prepare for careers and opportunities beyond LMH.

Include has given new shape and impetus to the way that the College approaches Outreach, Admissions and Student Support. We are mapping out a series of new positions, which will be carefully integrated into our current structures, to help us deliver our key goals. These will include areas such as digital outreach, access and student recruitment, embedded within

our admissions targets. The 'Thrive' strand embodies a holistic conception of student support and welfare. It will enable all LMH students, not only the most obviously disadvantaged, to have guided help while on course with study skills, career support, mentoring and internship opportunities. Widespread student need has made the 'Thrive' strand particularly important. The Covid pandemic has had a severe and ongoing impact on student progress, morale and wellbeing, and we are fundraising to enable our students to overcome these challenges and to thrive on course and in the world beyond. Our Include Strategy also incorporates an academically robust research element which will contribute vital information to the widening participation landscape in higher education. We are also working with professional colleagues in the wider University in the fields of education and social sciences to recruit an exceptional new Junior Research Fellow to assist us in this important initiative, a post which will enhance LMH's profile and reputation for both academic rigour and educational innovation.

We are incredibly grateful for the generous donation which has enabled us to start this strategy, and to those alumni and friends who have since joined us in support of this ambitious and exciting journey, all helping us bring it to fruition.

A Springboard to Opportunity: LMH Foundation Year update

How time flies when you're leading the way in access to Oxford! This time five years ago, our first cohort of Foundation Year students (2016 entrance) were nervously awaiting the outcomes of their Oxford undergraduate interviews. They, and us, were in uncharted territory: would the LMH Foundation Year be good enough to prepare them for the Oxford Undergraduate course? Would they, as we hoped, go on to realise their potential and thrive? And would we, LMH, be able to effect any lasting change across Oxford? Fortunately, with a lot of hard work from students, Tutors and the Foundation Year Team the answer to all three questions has been a resounding yes. We could not have done any of this without the support of alumni and friends who believed in us, and in the students; thank you.

Out of 51 who started the course, a total of 50 students have now graduated from the LMH Foundation Year, with 44 progressing into undergraduate study at Oxford. The Final Examination results of the first two cohorts show that the Foundation Year works: despite having GCSE and A-Level grades that would have seen them rejected at direct-entry undergraduate admissions, two students achieved a First Class degree, 10 achieved a 2:1 and one graduated with a 2:2. For these students, LMH and Oxford have provided a springboard to further opportunities: of those who have graduated we already have a Harvard Masters graduate; a Law Conversion course student and, as of December 2021, we have our first published author. We look forward to following all of them and finding out what they do next!

The LMH Foundation Year programme will run until June 2023 and we welcomed our sixth cohort at the start in September. Students have been back to a full programme of in-person teaching, relatively untouched by Covid restrictions, and it was with complete joy that we were able to take them to the National Theatre and, with luck, next term we hope to visit to Parliament.

Looking to the future: we are currently recruiting for our seventh and final cohort, before we then welcome the first students to Foundation Oxford to LMH in 2023. This programme, which will see the Foundation Year expanded across a number of other colleges, is being led by LMH Foundation Year co-ordinator, Dr Jo Begbie. We will of course keep you updated as plans continue to develop.

Five years ago we couldn't have dreamt that our pioneering course would lead to Foundation Year programmes at Oxford and Cambridge: by 2023, our course will have led to 100 additional places for under-represented students across both Universities – and that is something that the whole LMH community can be proud of. We have learnt so much along the way and developed the programme as we learnt. Thank you again to everyone who has generously supported the College and the students and helped us build this incredible programme.

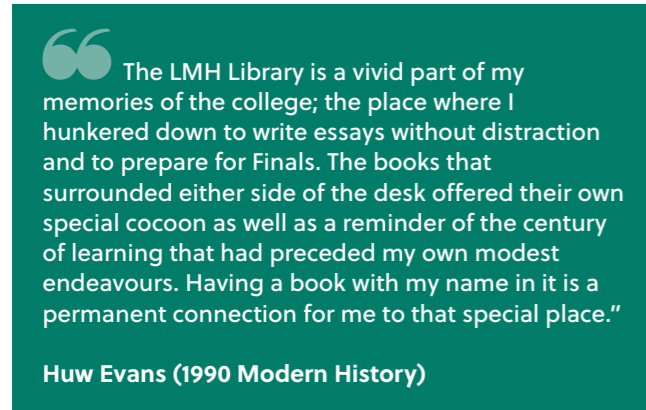
559 bookplates for those donors who were part of our *Souvent* group as at April 2021, bringing our total to 674 bookplates in donors' names.
