# Court Halts Merger

the merger of the White Dog school (Wheatfield District No. 6) with the Williamston school district was issued last Friday by Judge Marvin Salmon in Ingham circuit court.

The restraining order was issued pending a hearing on alleged election irregularities. It halts transfer of the White Dog finances, records and property to the Williamston district pending a hearing on an order to show cause scheduled for next Friday,

The annexation was approved last Monday, June 20,

by a vote of 154 to 33. Attorneys for the White Dog board of education asked the restraining order, alleging certain errors in the ballot.

The Ingham Intermediate board of education has been named as defendant in the action. It is represented by the F.M. Thrun law firm of Lansing and the state attorney general's office is expected to intervene in behalf of the defendants, Alton J. Stroud. superintendent of the Ingham Intermediate district, said.

Rholand F. Reed, Lansing attorney, is representing the White Dog board. He said he will claim 2 errors in the election procedure.

His first allegation is that absentee ballots were available only at the Ingham Intermediate board of education offices in Mason and not at Williamston White Dog.

He also cited another election law which states that paper ballots may not be used in any election precinct having (See Merger Page A-2)

#### Clouds Show Silver Lining For Richeys

The Fred Richey family at 819 N. Phillips road knows now that every cloud has a silver lining.

The 9-year-old daughter. Ruth, who was seriously injured when struck by a truck near her home last April 15, is now on the road to re-

covery. For 10 long weeks she has been fighting a battle for her life at Edward W. Sparrowhospital in Lansing, but now has progressed to the point that she expects to be discharged in 2 or 3 weeks, her father said Monday.

Ruth was hit as she crossed a road in front of the Richeyhome. She was taken first to Mason General hospital and then transferred to Sparrow with a broken left leg, broken ribs on her left side and head injuries. The head injuries were the most serious.


Ruth now is in a rehabilitation ward of the hospital and is undergoing speech, occupational and physical therapy treatments.

# Extra Curricular Jobs To Be Paid on Percentage

A proposed contract between the Mason school district and the teachers was approved by the board of education this past Mason Education association lawyers. Teachers are expected to vote on the proposed contract September 1.

Under the proposed contract who were in charge of extra a person with no experience would receive \$5,300 with a bachelor's degree, \$5,500 with a master's degree and \$4,600 for a non-degree teacher.

If a teacher possesses 11 years of teaching experience and has a master's degree, his or her salary would be \$8,025. Under the contract a person applying for a teacher's position may be given a maximum of 5 years credit for experience outside the Mason school system.

"Each man is carrying his own load of responsibilities plus a little more."

The officer had many impressions of the country one of which was its overwhelming potential if it would once was given the chance to devel-

Stationed in the central highlands of the country, Shoemaker felt the country would make a wonderful resort area. "The country is beautiful with any number of water falls, beaches stretching for 30 miles and plentiful game for hunting in the hills," he said.

When asked if the bombing of North Viet Nam was serving any purpose, he replied it did help the South Vietnamese cause, but was not halting all the infiltration by the Communist troops from

The commander indicated he did not expect to see any drastic changes in the war conditions within the next 6 months and that there was no basis for making an estimate on how long the conflict would

Lt. Col. Shoemaker and his wife "Tuke" make their home wherever he is assigned. He will enter the war college in August to study on a doctoral level. Following his graduation in mid-June of 1967 he will be reassigned, possibly back in Viet Nam.





College Week for Women is the time when any Michigan homemaker may join the hundreds of her sister homemakers for an inspirational, educational and recreational change of pace. There's learning, but there are no tests to take, no grades to earn, no requirements of previous training to be met.

Any woman who registers for the entire conference may choose 3 classes to attend for 3 days -- and there are 28 different and widely varied subjects for her selection.

For inspiration there are morning devotions each day if she wishes to share them, there's music to sing or listen to there's the beauty of the campus to enjoy, and always the stimulating contact with old friends and new ones whose interests are like her

For recreation there are bus tours of the campus, a tour of the capitol building, a performance at the planetarium, or the ice arena, or swimming in the big outdoor pool. Then, too, it's recreation for most homemakers to have someone else plan and prepare her meals for several days and to have no dishes to wash.

# Poultry Graded, Inspected For Convenience, Safety

Housewives sometimes are confused by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's round inspection mark and shield-shaped grade mark that appear on officially inspected and graded poultry. They ask, "What is the difference between the two marks? What do they stand for?"

The inspection mark is a

symbol of safety, and the shield-shaped mark denotes quality, say marketing specialists at Michigan State university.

The Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA is responsible for inspecting all poultry passing through interstate and foreign commerce.

The agency also conducts a

say that the round inspection mark means that poultrychickens, turkeys, geese, ducks or guineas -- was examined by a Federal inspector to determine that it is wholesome. The symbol also means that it was processed in a plant meeting strict requirements of USDA for cleanliness, that it is not adulterated, and that it is truthfully labeled.

The shield-shaped grade mark shows that poultry has been certified by official graders under supervision of USDA. Poultry cannot be graded until it has been first inspected for wholesomeness.

U.S. grades for poultry are A, B and C. They are based on meatiness of a bird and freedom from defects. Poultry marked "USDA Grade A" is the highest table quality.

# Farm Views And News



Because of the cold, wet spring, more farmers than usual will be sidedressing nitrogen this year. And that's probably just as well.

Michigan State university research conducted over 7 years, showed that 40 or 80 pounds of sidedressed nitrogen produced 5 to 20 percent more corn than the same rate of nitrogen applied at planting time.

Furthermore, in 5 years out of 7 on the sandy loam soil in East Lansing, there was less than 5 percent reduction in corn yield when a 40-pound sidedressing of nitrogen was substituted for 80 pounds banded at planting

"Except for an essential 'starter application,' the efficiency of nitrogen fertilizer is increased by delaying its application until near the time of peak demand by the crop."

"This reduces the time during which the nitrogen is subject to loss by leaching or denitrification. This can happen when wet weather occurs while the young crop is establishing itself and not using nutrients in large quantities. (Corn consumes most of its nitrogen at the silking and tasseling period.)

"Thus, the farmer who has had no problems with nitrogen differcy with the rates of nitrogen he has been plowing down can probably decrease these rates by 10 to 20 percent with sidedressing."

To avoid injury by injection or sidedressing eugipment, sidedressing should be made before crop roots begin to fill the soil between the rows. This occurs when the corn reaches a height of about 18 inches. With crops like potatoes or

beans, the soil fills with roots somewhat before the tops fill the rows. Careful inspection, says the MSU soil scientist, will reveal the limits of the very fine feeder roots which should not be damaged.

In the county corn plots last year on the Diehlfields Farm, 100 pounds of actual nitrogen increased the yield of corn 25 bushels per acre. This would mean that corn at a \$1 per bushel, approximately \$10 worth of nitrogen would provide \$25 worth of extra corn. Few investments can be made on a farm that will return 250 percent interest on investment.







Across the United States this year, the gas industry is observing its 150th anni-The first manufactured gas

utility in the United States was formed in Baltimore in 1816. In Michigan, several cities can lay claim to being early users of gas, but commercial development was slow. "Indeed, it was real pioneering when the Kalamazoo Gas Light Company was organized in 1856," reports John B. Simpson, Consumers Power Company's vice president for gas operations. Consumers Power Company

began distributing natural gas in 1931, with a 40-mile pipeline connecting wells in the Broomfield area near Mt. Pleasant with the distribution system in Midland. Bay City and Saginaw lines followed in 1933, and by 1936 natural gas was being distributed in Lansing and Grand Rapids. By this time, many of the pioneering companies had merged with the Consumers Power

system. Prior to 1941, all gas distributed in Michigan came from Michigan fields or was manufactured in city plants. But with the advent of crosscountry pipelines, natural gas was brought to customers from distant sources in the Southwest. By the time World War II ended, gas was being stored underground, for use during the peak demand per-

iods of winter. Natural gas stored underground is commonplace today for Consumers Power customers. On January 27, 1966, a record one-day sendout of 1,470,000,000 cubic feet of gas was distributed, most of



# Michigan Mirror

POLICE PROBLEMS Anticipated difficulty in bringing criminals to justice hopefully will be offset in Michigan by steps taken by the state police and legislature this year.

Many law enforcement ofificials complain that several U.S. Supreme Court decisions regarding confessions, interrogations and presentation of proof add obstacles to the already difficult job of getting evidence to convict criminals.

The first step was undertaken by the state police some months back. Efforts began to hire an attorney with police training in his background.

Aim in this addition to state police personnel was to keep policemen current on the legal implications of U.S. and state court decisions regarding their difficult daily job.

It had already become apparent, even before the latest U.S. High Court edict, that policemen would need more familiarity with the intricacies of the law if they were to remain effective in criminal proceedings.

Earmarked for a special computer operation, a \$344,000 legislative appropriation is designed to help establish Michigan's hookup with a national communications network to exchange information on criminal activity.

Initially the computer will be set up to "remember" and distribute information about stolen cars and warrants issued in Michigan. Eventually it will provide police officers and the courts with descriptions of wanted criminals, unsolved crimes and prison records, all on very short notice.

One side benefit expected to be opened by use of the computer is that it will lessen the paperwork required of law enforcement officers, thus potentially freeing more menfor the important work of preven-






#### Weekend Crash Charles Elmer Hawkins, 24, Injures Woman

# Hasty Legislation Isn't Progress

Legislation hastily conceived, hastily studied and hastily passed quite frequently brings lasting headaches and sometimes unsolvable problems.

Washington observers, both inside and outside of the government fold, are mighty nervous about and fairly certain that expanded medicare is going to fall in that category July 1 or soon after.

Under pressure from proponents and opponents, the congress swallowed an administration program as an addition to medicare without studying the quality of the program, the scope of the program or the cost of the program.

Now the news is coming out that even the department of health, education and welfare, the agency charged with the responsibility of medicare, has some misgivings about whether the hospital and medical professions and the de-

partment of health, education and welfare can deliver what the politicians have committed.

The cost factor is one giving the administrators of the program the biggest headache. As presented to congress by the Johnson administration, the program expansion was to have cost the taxpayers an estimated \$230 million. This 6-months old estimate is now being revised to at least one billion dollars.

Groundwork is being done now on asking a supplemental appropriation of \$500 million and the program hasn't even started yet.

Congress was set up by the designers of our system of government to act as a check. A rubber - stamp congress which bows and scrapes and is subservient to the administration is shrinking its responsibility. Congress was not designed to parrot the thought of the administrative branch.

# Ode to the Super Patriots

When the super patriots of 1776 met in Philadelphia at Independence Hall on a hot July day, they had something else in mind besides creating a play-type holiday.

They never gave a thought to such things as potato salad and lemonade mixed with cold cuts and other picnic goodies.

The signers of the declaration of independence gave no thought to catching the big league doubleheader or spending the day on the family boat pickled in beer and sun tan lotion.

The boys who met in the Chestnut street building in Philadelphia were not worrying about whether they were going to get double time on the Fourth of July. They had no thoughts about the best way to beat the traffic on the way to the picnic. They weren't

sweating out getting to take their turn on the No. 1 tee at the golf course. They weren't thinking about just staying home and rocking away the day in the backyard hammock.

These "super patriots", a dirty word these days, were concerned about injustice, about the trampling of freedom and the lack of recognition of freedom of their day. They argued and debated and fought and compromised to come up with a young and vigorous nation.

It might do well for the American of 1966 to wonder just a little about the thoughts and the aims of those great patriots as they gave birth to the United States.

It might also help us if we could get some of that spirit of independence of which they had so much.

Federal spending in the field of education has surged 5 or 6 times in the last 4 years. The federal education budget for 1963 called for expenditures of \$660,000,000. The expenditure for the 1967 fiscal year will hit \$3.4 billion.

The labor department has a nother interesting figure when it is placed next to the education cost. Not only is the figure interesting—it is appalling. The labor department claims that high school dropouts rose last year by 75,000. The report shows that 680,000 boys and girls dropped out of high school before finishing. This was more than half the number who graduated in the same period.

The increase in federal education participation in tax dollars and the increase in high school dropouts are not cause and effect—but it should prove the point that the tough dropout problems of education can't be solved by doling out tax dollars in increasing quantities.

Dedicated teachers, responsive school boards and most important, concerned parents, still hold the key to the dropout problem.

Money from Washington is not going to work any miracles in keeping the nation's youth walking the education trail. The front line in the battle to keep the pupil in high school is the home front, particularly the home. No amount of money from the federal money tree is going to keep pupils in school.

#### **Automation Not Bad**

Recently there was quite a bit of concern expressed over the effect that automation would have on a number of jobs. It was feared that machinery would take over man's work and that as a result, people would be jobless.

Automation, in actuality appears to work quite the opposite way. In a recent magazine article we read these rather interesting facts that certainly seem to indicate automation has not detracted but has added to the well-being of the economy.

If Detroit had not been automating since the 1920's the modern car would cost \$65,000, a national authority believes. There would be precious few of them and hundreds of thousands of jobs in auto plants, tire factories, steel mills, gasoline refineries and road construction simply would not exist.

--Low priced Japanese transistor radios threatened to close American plants and throw thousands out of jobs. An American manufacturer automated his plant and so improved his product's value and salability that he employs a third more workers.

--An American company developed the automatic pin setter for bowling alleys in home neighborhoods, made bowling increasingly popular. Yes, the pin setters are gone, but the number of jobs in the industry was increased 700%.

--Washing machines, dryers, ironers, dishwashers and a dozen more items have automated our kitchens. That turned the lady of the house from a drudge to a partner and may have done away with the "servant class" but created a half million jobs in stores and automated appliance stores.

Automation is simply a means of doing things better with less effort and at lower cost. And lower costs increase markets which means more markets which means more workers are needed to fill the new and greater demand.
