

Eucalyptus amplifolia

(Cabbage Gum)

Description

A tall straight tree with mainly smooth white to grey blotchy bark that sheds in large flakes or patches. Looks similar to the *E. teretecornis*; the difference being the round broad leaves.

Uses

Shade, shelter & windbreaks on farms. Ideal tree that develops hollows for arboreal native animals. Yellow-Bellied Gliders favour it as a sap feeder tree. Primary food tree species for koalas.

Occurs

On swampy creek flats on low-lying poorly drained clay soils that are away from the main river system (floodplain).

Flower and Foliage

White creamy flowers November to January. Juvenile leaves broad & round, "cabbage like".

Maintenance

Minimal maintenance; remove dead wood. Prune to single trunk, or multiple trunks that are well spaced.
