WEEKLY PRESS RELEASE

Each Monday a complete release previewing the upcoming game and reviewing the season will be available on the Utah State athletic website at www.UtahStateAggies.com. This release will also be e-mailed to media requesting this service on Monday.

PRESS CONFERENCES

Head coach Matt Wells will hold a press conference each Monday during the season at 11:30 a.m. (contact the USU Athletic Media Relations Office for locations). Selected players will also be available at the press conference. Quotes and video from the press conference will be available on USU's website (www.UtahStateAggies.com) each Monday afternoon and will also be e-mailed per request.

VIDEO HIGHLIGHTS

Utah State provides broadcast-quality video of Monday press conferences. Game highlights are also available upon request. Contact the Utah State Athletic Media Relations Office for more information.

LIVE STREAMING

Live streaming of all of Utah State's weekly press conferences and home post-game press conferences can be found on USU's Aggie Digital Network at www.UtahStateAggies.com/videos.

INTERVIEWS

All requests for interviews with Utah State players and coaches should be made directly through the Athletic Media Relations Office at (435) 797-3714 and should be made at least one day in advance. The best time for player interviews is after practice, while head coach Matt Wells should be available in the mornings, as well as before or after practice. Player interviews will be conducted through Wednesday each game week.

GAMEDAY INFORMATION

PARKING

Credentialed media will be allowed access to the C parking lot, located on the north side of the stadium. A parking pass is required for admittance to that area and should be requested at least one week in advance of the game.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Access to the press level (fifth floor) of the West Stadium Center is located on the northwest side of Maverik Stadium and is limited to those with working credentials. A pregame meal will be served approximately one hour prior to kickoff.

Game programs, game notes, flip cards, statistics and play-by-play information will be provided before and during the game. At the conclusion of the game, a complete statistical book, typed quotes and postgame notes will be available.

Final game statistics, notes and quotes will be e-mailed to media requesting the service.

Wireless internet will be available to media at the game. A limited number of telephones will also be available in the press box on a first-come, first-serve basis. Requests for personal phones should be made through USU Telephone Services at (435) 797-3201 at least one week prior to the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' ACCESS

Photographers are allowed to shoot on the sidelines outside the team bench area (team bench areas are between the 25-yard lines). Photographers must remain behind the second set of dashed lines. Team rosters are provided in the press box.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The Utah State locker room is closed to the media on game days. Postgame interviews will take place after a brief cooling off period in the Spetman Auditorium, located on the second floor of the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex. The Spetman Auditorium has wireless internet, so media and photographers can file from there or return to the press box.

Scott Garrard serves as the play-by-play announcer while Kevin Whimpey serves as the analyst.

MATT WELLS ON THE AIR

The Matt Wells radio show, hosted by Scott Garrard will be broadcast on Wednesdays on the Aggie Radio Network from 7-8 p.m.

DIRECTIONS TO LOGAN

Logan, Utah, is home to Utah State University and is located approximately 80 miles north of Salt Lake City, Utah. From Salt Lake International Airport: Take I-80 East out of the airport to I-215 North, which will run into I-15 North. Follow I-15 North to exit 362 (Highway 89-91) at Brigham City. Follow Highway 89 into Logan, where it becomes Main Street. Stay on Main Street until you reach 1000 North and turn right. Turn left at 800 East and the football stadium will be on your right. The parking lot is located on the west side of the stadium just off 800 East.

CREDENTIAL POLICY

Credentials for media members are issued at the discretion of the Utah State Athletic Media Relations Office, based on the following priorities and guidelines:

1. Daily newspapers regularly covering Utah State University, the current opponent or another Mountain West school. Wire services, regional and national publications are also afforded this priority.
2. Originating radio and television personnel involved in a live broadcast.
3. Officially recognized Utah State University student publications or student electronic media outlets.
4. Non-daily newspapers or publications reporting on the game.
5. Non-originating radio and television.

OTHER CREDENTIAL GUIDELINES

- ▶ Utah State University and the NCAA prohibit the issuance of credentials to representatives of an organization that regularly publishes gambling information.
- ▶ Credentials will be issued to websites that are affiliated with national or regional television and news media organizations, e.g. USA Today Online, ESPN.com, SI.com, CBSsportsline.com, etc., non-conference opponents and for the Mountain West Conference.
- ▶ Websites that sponsor "message boards" or "chat rooms" where people are allowed to post anonymous information or rumors are ineligible for credentials or access to media functions.
- ▶ Utah State University reserves the right to deny media credentials to any individual whose website is not affiliated with a recognized news-gathering organization.
- ▶ All credentials are non-transferable and are subject to immediate revocation if transferred to non-working members of a media outlet.

MERLIN OLSEN FIELD



To honor one of its greatest alumnus and the most decorated football player in school history, Utah State University named the playing field inside Maverik Stadium "Merlin Olsen Field," making the announcement at halftime of a men's basketball game in December, 2009. Olsen was in attendance for the ceremony. He passed away at City of Hope Hospital near Los Angeles on March 11, 2010, after a courageous battle with cancer.

An official dedication ceremony took place on Oct. 23, 2010, as part of Homecoming festivities in conjunction with the 50th anniversary of Utah State's 1960 Sun Bowl Team, led by Olsen. During the official dedication of Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium, a larger-than-life-size bronze statue of Olsen, which was sculpted by nationally renowned artist Blair Buswell, was unveiled in the southeast corner of the stadium.

Utah State and Maverik, Inc., owners of convenience stores throughout the Intermountain West, jointly announced a long-term naming rights partnership to its football stadium, which was previously known as Romney Stadium, beginning in the 2015 season.

This new partnership with Maverik was the catalyst for a major renovation to the stadium, which focused on greatly improving the overall fan experience. On the west side, the West Stadium Center, a new four-story premium seating and press box structure was completed prior to the 2016 season, which included a state-of-the-art media and game operations area, 24 luxury suites, 20 loge boxes, over 700 covered club seats and a premium club area that is also used to host a student-athlete training table. Major concourse work included significantly increased restrooms, upgraded concessions and an enlarged concourse for better pedestrian traffic flow.

Renovations also included new video boards on both the north and south ends of the stadium, along with a new public address system.

Maverik Stadium's original seating capacity through 1980 was 20,000. Thanks to a massive volunteer effort in 1980, approximately 10,000 seats were added to the southern bowl. Prior to the 1997 season, approximately 4,000 chair-back seats replaced wooded bleachers on the west side of the stadium. The modifications made to accommodate this seating upgrade placed stadium capacity at 25,513 prior to the 2015 season. Following the renovations made to the stadium with the addition of the West Stadium Center prior to the 2016 season, the seating capacity is now 25,100.

Ahead of the 1999 season, new scoreboards were added at each end of the stadium and additional bleacher seats were installed, as well. New aluminum bleachers replaced wooden bleachers on the lower sections of the east side of the stadium in 2001. In 2003, that project expanded to the upper sections.

Prior to the 2005 season, a new south end entrance, improved concession stands and restroom facilities, as well as a widened concourse on the east side of the stadium were completed.

Immediately after the 2006 season, the old north end zone complex was torn down and replaced with the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex. The Laub Complex is a three-story, 69,000 square-foot facility that serves to meet the academic and athletic needs of all 16 Utah State University intercollegiate sports. The state-of-the-art facility houses the Dale Mildnerberger Sports Medicine Complex and the Dr. John Worley Sports Medicine

Research Center, the Steve Mothersell Hall of Honor, J. Ken "Kenny" Seamons Equipment Room, locker rooms, coaches offices, meeting rooms, luxury suites, a student-athlete academic center and the Dr. Randall and Julianne Stockham Student-Athlete Academic Hall of Honor.

In December of 2009, USU Athletics renamed the playing field inside Maverik Stadium "Merlin Olsen Field."

In the summer of 2012, the synthetic SprinTurf was replaced with a state-of-the-art AstroTurf. The SprinTurf was installed in 2004, replacing the existing bent bluegrass field. In 2013, new south end zone seating was installed, and in 2014 chairback seats were added to the south end zone.

The stadium was designed specifically for football with all seats, until the 1980 expansion, located between the 15-yard lines and all directed toward the 50-yard line. The first row of seats on the east, west and south sides are elevated eight-feet above the playing field and within 30 feet of the sidelines. Like most stadiums, the field runs north and south.

The stadium was financed by a student body which believed in athletics to the extent of underwriting a special bonding assessment for both Maverik Stadium and the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum, which serves as home to USU's basketball and gymnastics teams.

The continuing growth of Utah State's campus prompted University planners to relocate the original Romney Stadium, which was built in 1927 on the grounds where the Health, Physical Education and Recreation building now stands. That facility was dedicated on Oct. 8, 1927, in recognition of legendary football and basketball coach, and athletics director, E. Lowell "Dick" Romney, who spent 29 seasons as the Aggies' athletics director and head football coach from 1919-48. Romney, who guided the Aggies to four conference championships (1921, 1935, 1936, 1946), compiled a 128-91-16 record (.579 winning percentage) in 29 seasons (1919-48).

That structure served as Utah State's home for 41 seasons (1927-67). USU played its final game in the old complex on Nov. 11, 1967, as the Aggies defeated Montana, 20-14.

Maverik Stadium was originally built in 1968 and officially dedicated on Sept. 27, 1969. The first game in Maverik Stadium history was Sept. 14, 1968, when Utah State defeated New Mexico State, 28-12. In 49 seasons, USU has posted a 138-102 (.575) record inside Maverik Stadium.

Utah State's largest crowd to witness a game in Maverik Stadium was 33,119 in a 45-17 loss to Brigham Young on Oct. 4, 1996.

Utah State's student section, known simply as The HURD, supports the Aggies' football team every home game. The HURD is Utah State's spirit club for all athletics. It is currently the largest club of Aggie students at Utah State. The HURD attends Coach's Shows, sports nights, tailgate parties, pre-, post- and away-game parties, pep-rallies, and even road trips are just some of the activities that The HURD provides at least once a week for all of its members.

Show 'Em Your "A"

In 1909, the first senior class gift was an "A" placed on the west side of Old Main tower. The "A," now on all four sides of the tower, can be seen throughout the valley, especially at night when lit in white. For special occasions and athletic wins, the "A" shines blue.



Utah State will be taking the field for the 120th season of football in 126 years in 2017. USU took the field for the first time on Nov. 25, 1892, and defeated intra-state rival Utah, 12-0.



GAME DAY



Utah State teams were nicknamed "Big Blue" by the *Logan Journal* as early as 1916, an apparent reference to the Blue Ox of Paul Bunyon stories. USU adopted the official school colors of Blue and White in a special meeting of USU faculty on Nov. 7, 1901.



The Utah State Spirit Squad, consisting of the Aggiettes Dance Team, the Cheer Squad and the Big Blue mascot, encourages enthusiastic student participation at Aggie athletic events, promoting USU pride through new ideas, traditions and activities. The USU Pep Band leads the Spirit Squad and the crowd with the "Hail The Utah Aggies," "The Scotsman" and other musical selections.

When USU athletics began, Utah State was known as the Utah Agricultural College. The first USU athletics teams were nicknamed the "Farmers." Aggies, a contraction of Agriculturalists, first appeared in the late 1890's.

Completed in June of 2013, Utah State's \$6.5 million, 26,329 square-foot ICON Sports Performance Center features areas for weight training, cardiovascular workouts and speed and agility training, as well as offices for staff. Built on existing university property at the northwest corner of Maverik Stadium, the state-of-the-art multi-level facility alleviated overcrowding in the previous 5,800 square-foot strength and conditioning center and accommodates almost 400 student-athletes from 16 sports programs.

The ICON Sports Performance Center is the largest such facility in the Mountain West Conference and rivals any strength and conditioning complex in the country. Of the schools Utah State competes against in the MW, Fresno State currently has the second-largest strength and conditioning center(s) at 12,500 square feet, followed by Air Force (12,000 sq. ft.), Boise State (12,000 sq. ft.), Wyoming (11,100 sq. ft.), Hawai'i (10,000 sq. ft.), New Mexico (10,000 sq. ft.), Colorado State (10,000 sq. ft.), San José State (10,000 sq. ft.), UNLV (8,200 sq. ft.) and Nevada (8,000 sq. ft.).

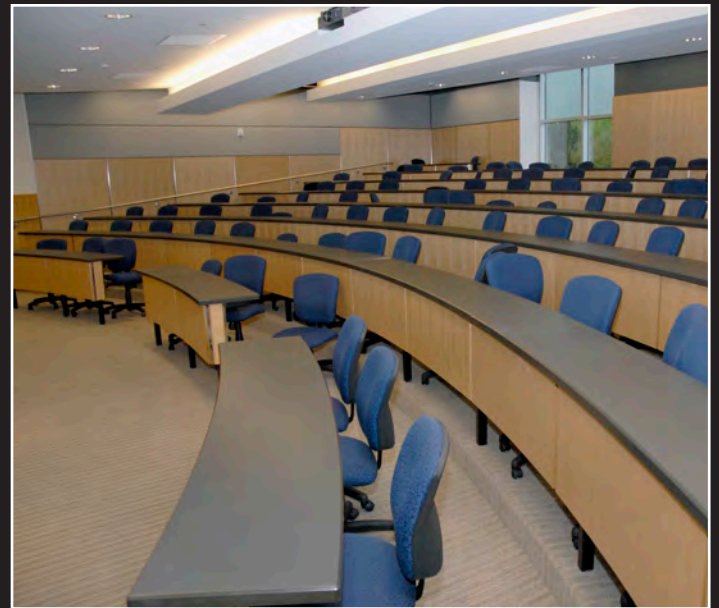

The three-story, 69,000 square-foot, Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex is a state-of-the-art multi-purpose facility that meets all of the athletic and academic needs of Utah State's 16 sports and 400-plus student-athletes. Within the facility, which was completed in the summer of 2008, is the 11,000 square-foot Dale Mildenerger Sports Medicine Complex and Dr. John Worley Sports Medicine Research Center, the Steve Mothersell Athletics Hall of Honor and the 7,000 square-foot J. Ken "Kenny" Seamons Equipment Room. Also located on the first floor are locker rooms for football. The second floor houses coaches' offices and meeting rooms for football, including a 120-seat auditorium, and the student-athlete academics center is located on the third floor, which includes numerous study hall and tutor areas, a computer lab and the Dr. Randall and Julianne Stockham Student-Athlete Academics Hall of Honor.



LAUB ATHLETICS-ACADEMICS COMPLEX



The Dale Mildenerger Sports Medicine Complex and the Dr. John Worley Sports Medicine Research Center is one of the finest in the nation with over 11,000 square-feet to provide maximum service to Utah State's 16 intercollegiate sports and 400-plus student-athletes. Among the many amenities are 24 treatment tables, a 2,000 square-foot physical therapy and rehabilitation center, and three hydrotherapy pools for non-weight or partial weight-bearing rehabilitation to enhance recovery. The Sports Medicine Complex also houses office space for five full-time staff members and numerous graduate assistants, a team physician examination room and physical therapy office.

With the addition of the new facilities and the continued cooperation between Utah State Athletics, Intermountain HealthCare and HPER/ Exercise Science, Utah State University is becoming one of the foremost sports medicine research institutions in the intermountain west.

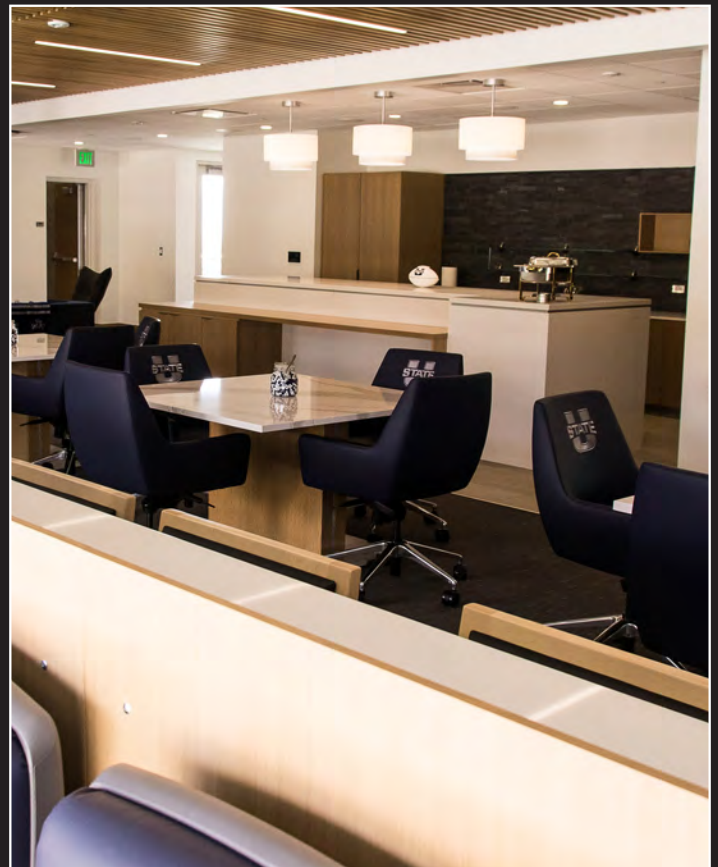
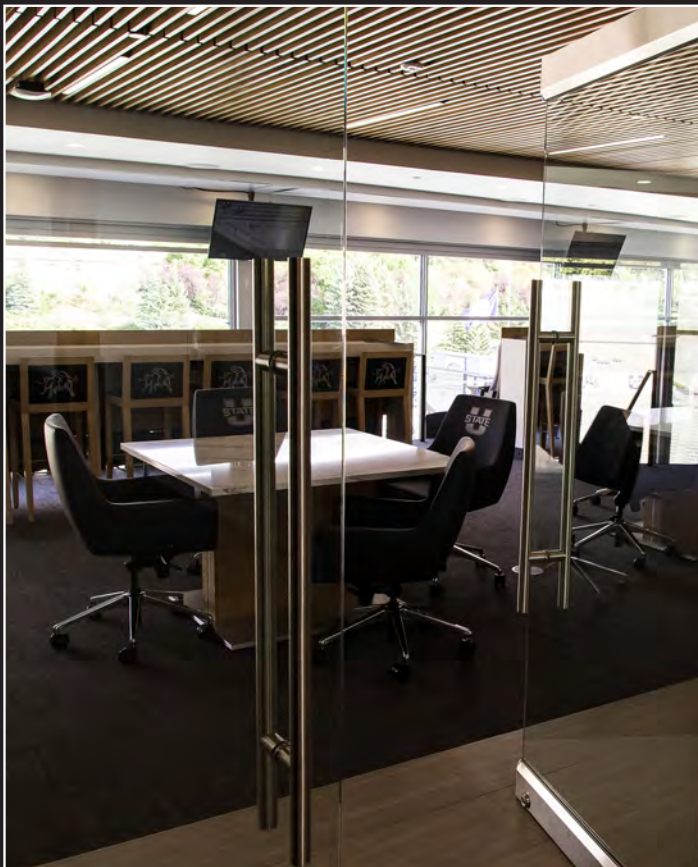

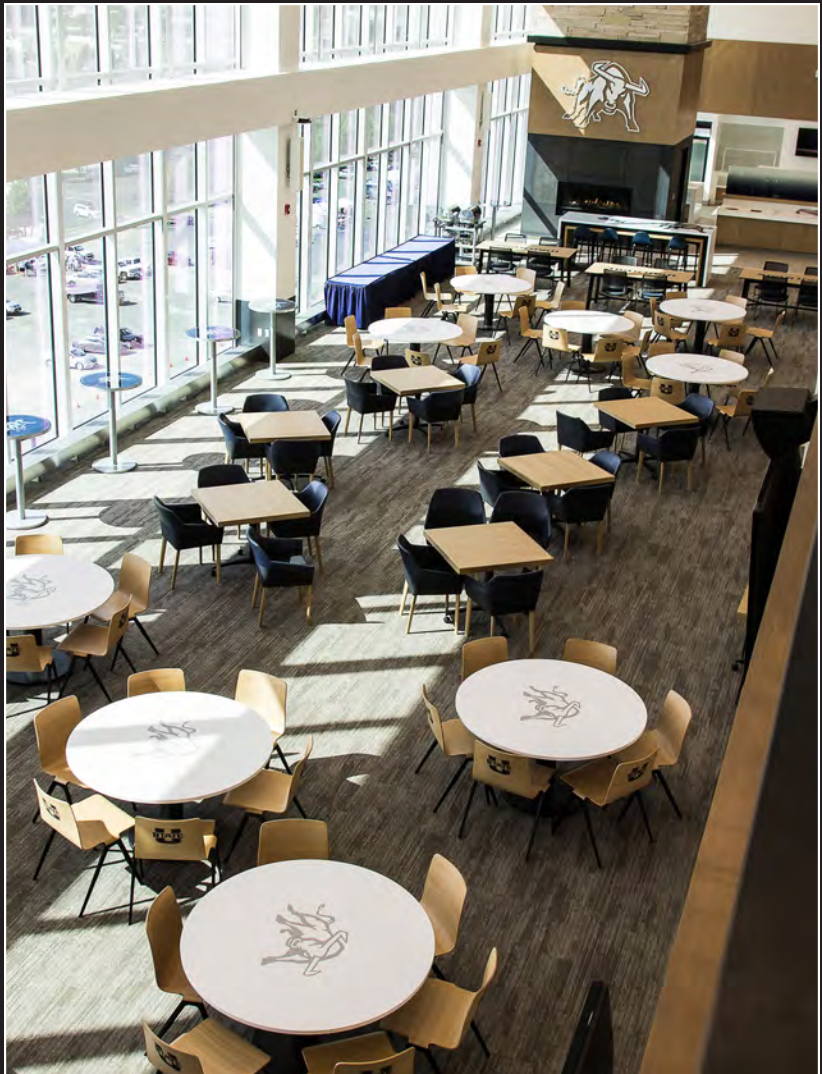

Utah State University's football team revealed its full line of Nike uniforms, along with the school's new logos on Saturday, April 28, 2012, as part of the athletic department's new brand and identity program. In all, Utah State will have nine different jersey and pant combinations manufactured by Nike, to go along with two different helmet options for a total of 18 different uniform combinations. Along with its traditional Blue and White uniforms, a new 'Pewter' uniform was also unveiled. Two helmet options were displayed, as well, including a new diamond pattern blue and black helmet with a black face mask, along with its traditional white helmet with a blue face mask. Utah State's helmets, which feature the new 'U-State' logo, are manufactured by Schutt and Riddell.

Home uniform options feature a traditional combination of blue jersey with blue or white pants, as well as an option of blue jersey and pewter pants. Road uniform combinations can be built around the newly-designed pewter jersey or the traditional white jersey. The road pewter jerseys can be combined with pewter, blue or white pants, while white jerseys can be worn with white, blue or pewter pants.

Both helmet options will also be utilized with the various uniform combinations for both home and away games.

The new "UTAH STATE" wordmark is featured in Pewter letters on the home jersey, while blue letters are displayed on the white and pewter jerseys. All jerseys feature the distinctive Nike "Swoosh" on the left front shoulder. All pants feature the Nike "Swoosh" at the top of the right leg, while Utah State's new secondary bull mark is displayed at the top of the left leg.

During the 2016-17 academic year, Utah State ranked second in the Mountain West in number of academic all-league honorees as the Aggies had 253 student-athletes recognized for academic excellence as 148 student-athletes received academic all-Mountain West honors, while 105 were named Mountain West Scholar-Athletes. Utah State's student-athletes traditionally rank among the best in the Mountain West with an 89 percent graduation success rate, which is the highest in the MW, and a cumulative 3.196 grade-point average. Additionally, Utah State's athletics department recognized 195 student-athletes for achieving a 3.2 grade point average at the 23rd annual Joe E. and Elma Whitesides Scholar-Athlete Luncheon. To be eligible for the honor, student-athletes must have a cumulative 3.2 grade point average or have posted a 3.2 GPA during the last two semesters. In all, approximately 54 percent of USU's student-athletes earned a 3.2 GPA to qualify for the awards.

The third floor of the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex houses the academic center for student-athletes. This center consists of a 24-unit computer center, a spacious study center, and several individual one-on-one tutor rooms. Additionally, there are three smaller classrooms that can be used for group study sessions, group tutoring, tutor meetings, and general meeting and study needs. Two of the classrooms can be opened to create one larger classroom. All classrooms have television monitors installed and have data connectivity for PowerPoint, internet and other useful presentations. The study center is completely wireless for student-athletes to connect to the internet anywhere in the facility, but also has sub-floor electrical and data connections throughout. The student-athlete services staff offices are also housed within the academic center.

The Utah State Student-Athlete Services office administers USU's NCAA Student-Athlete Affairs: Life Skills program and coordinates Aggie Ambassadors, Utah State's student-athlete outreach program. Additionally, the office works with USU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and Student-Athlete Mentors Program (SAMs). USU's NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program has guest speakers who address student-athletes, as well as several community service projects and group activities throughout the year, including working with local elementary schools.

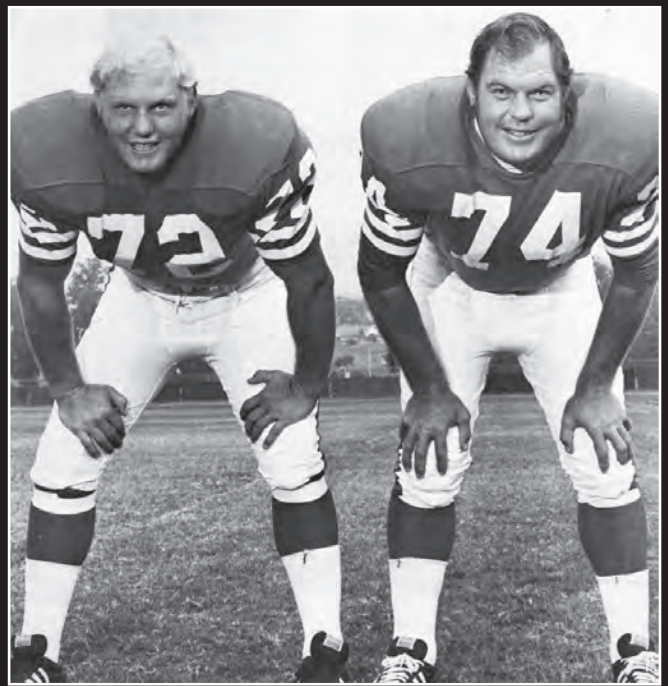

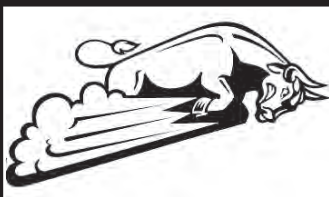

A sampling of the logos Utah State football has used. L-R: 1966, 1982, 1992, 1996, Alternative logo circa mid-90's, 2000, Present

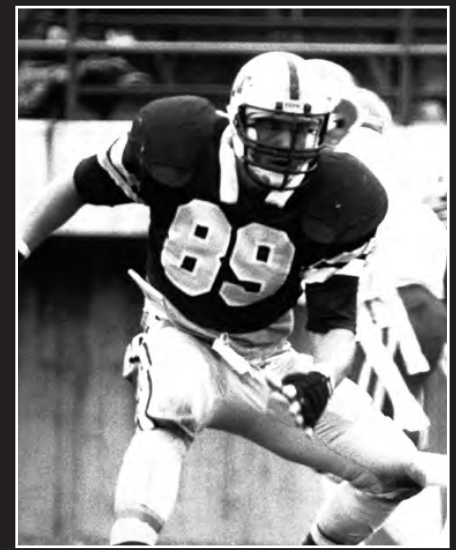

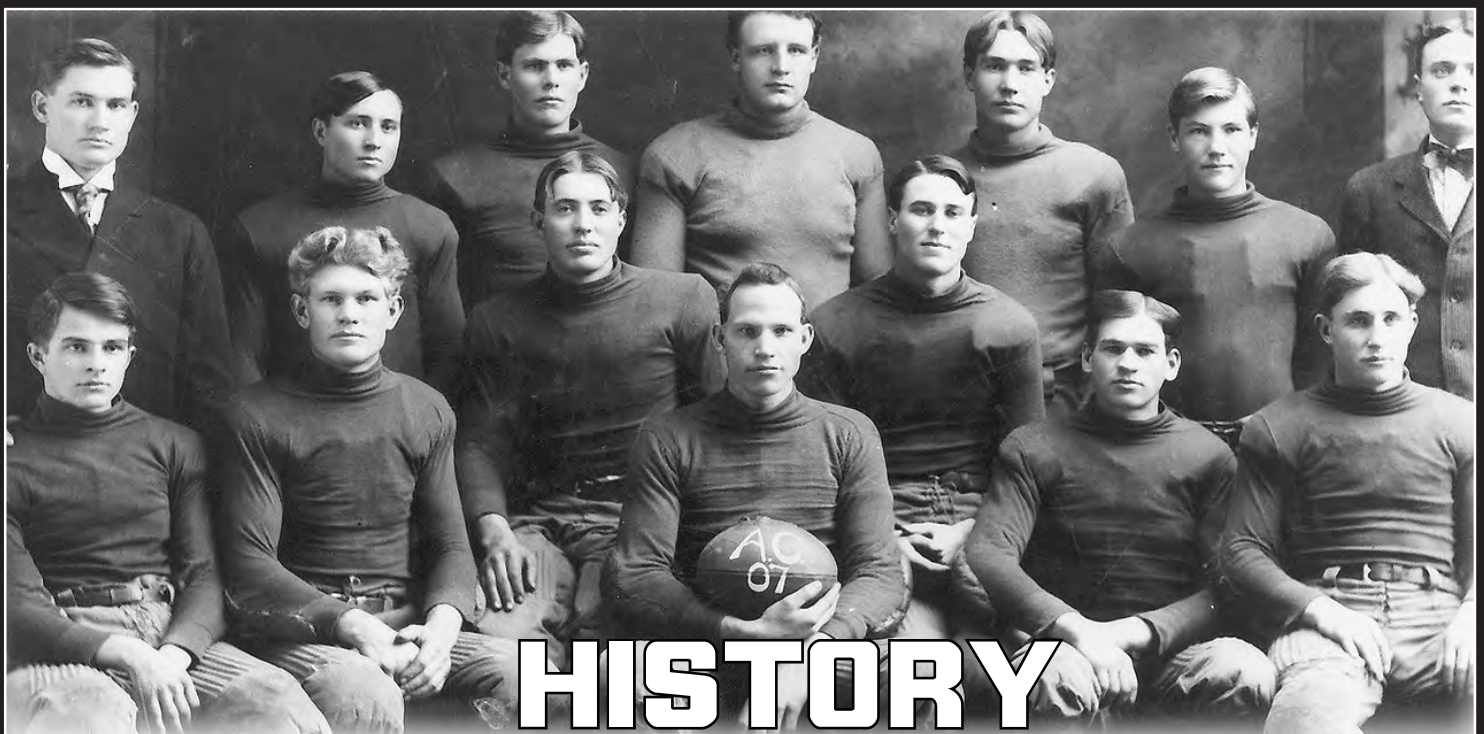

Utah State University honored one of its greatest alumnus and the most decorated football player in school history with the unveiling of a larger-than-life-size bronze statue of Merlin Olsen on Oct. 23, 2010, with a special ceremony on the South Plaza of Maverik Stadium prior to USU's Homecoming football game against Hawai'i. A large crowd attended the ceremony, featuring Olsen's family, friends, former teammates and former USU players among the dignitaries in attendance. Guest speakers for the ceremony included former USU President Dr. Stan Albrecht, former USU Vice President and Director of Athletics Scott Barnes, Steven Perry from the National Football Foundation, the statue's sculptor Blair Buswell, Douglas Mayberry, who was one of Olsen's USU teammates, along with Olsen's widow, Susan. Perry noted that the Super Bowl Pro Football Hall of Fame Luncheon, held the Friday prior to the Super Bowl, will be named after Olsen, one of only two Hall of Fame events named after former players. Buswell singled out his time spent with Olsen while working on the statue, noting that Olsen wanted the sculpture to show his pride in Utah State and Logan. Mayberry told a story about Olsen's hospitality before nearly knocking off your chin strap, noting the only time he saw Olsen relax was when he scored a rushing touchdown. Susan Olsen thanked Olsen's former teammates, friends and the University for their support of the family. She also read a eulogy written by Merlin Olsen prior to his death that wasn't found until after his passing, which talked about Merlin's appreciation of the love and concern from his supporters, former teammates and family throughout his time growing up in Logan, at Utah State, in the NFL and his broadcasting and acting career.

Merlin Olsen's statue was created by nationally renowned Utah artist Blair Buswell and is 25 percent larger than Olsen's 6-foot-4 frame. When mounted on its base the statue is over 11 feet high. The statue depicts Olsen during his college playing days at Utah State, in full uniform and pads, with his helmet under his arm. The base of the statue is adorned with two plaques. One lists many of Olsen's accomplishments as a college and pro football player, as an actor and member of the media, and as a philanthropist and humanitarian. The other plaque lists Olsen's personal mission statement, an inspiring list of Olsen's personal priorities. Additionally, a list of all donors to the Merlin Olsen Field Campaign whose gifts were received prior to August 1, 2010, are mounted adjacent to the statue base. The statue, when set on its base, has at least one unique element. According to Google maps, Olsen's gaze directly faces toward the Olsen family home in Logan where he grew up, roughly two miles in a direct line from where the statue rests. In preparation for the statue to be installed a small courtyard was created with seating areas for contemplation. The block cement was used to convey Olsen's personal strength, and the vertical columns represent his personal mission to celebrate others.



NFL Hall of Famer Merlin Olsen, the greatest athlete in Utah State University history, passed away at City of Hope Hospital near Los Angeles on March 11, 2010, after a courageous battle with cancer. Olsen was a three-year letterman on the offensive and defensive lines for Utah State's football team from 1959-61, earning All-American honors during both his junior and senior seasons. During his senior season in 1961, he won the Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding interior defensive lineman. Olsen also was a three-time academic All-American at Utah State and graduated Summa Cum Laude and Phi Kappa Phi in 1962 with a degree in finance.

HOME OF MERLIN OLSEN



Utah State University's Athletics Department unveiled the Steve Mothersell Aggie Athletics Hall of Honor on Sept. 26, 2009. In all, approximately 150 Aggie alumni and friends donated to the 1,800 square-foot Hall of Honor, including 115 former student-athletes. The Hall of Honor is housed on the first floor of the Jim and Carol Laub Athletics-Academics Complex, which is located in the north end zone of Maverik Stadium. Inside Utah State's Aggie Athletics Hall of Honor, fans will find various displays and trophy cases celebrating over 100 years of Aggie sports history. Among the items displayed within the venue are trophies from the 1978 national championship volleyball team, and the 1980 and 1981 national championship softball teams. Other items on display include the 2014 Gildan New Mexico Bowl championship trophy, the 2013 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl championship trophy, the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl championship trophy, the 2012 Western Athletic Conference championship trophy, the 1993 Las Vegas Bowl II championship trophy, the 1961 Outland trophy presented to Merlin Olsen as the nation's top defensive lineman and a discus donated by L. Jay Silvester from the 1968 Summer Olympics held in Mexico City. As fans tour the Hall of Honor, they will see exhibits displaying Utah State's 16 current sports, a display honoring its past sports and a display highlighting some "Great Moments" in Aggie Athletics. Fans will also see a display paying tribute to those select few former Aggie Greats who are now members of USU's Hall of Fame, the most prestigious honor afforded an Aggie athlete. Another key feature within the venue are two interactive video displays that will give fans an opportunity to watch video highlights of "Great Moments" in Aggie Athletics, as well as highlights of members of USU's Hall of Fame.



HALL OF HONOR

THIS IS UTAH STATE...



Utah State's annual Pro Timing Day regularly draws a number of NFL scouts, monitoring and evaluating the Aggies' pro prospects.

In the last 14 years, Utah State has had 15 players selected in the NFL Draft, while over four dozen more have signed free agent contracts. In 2017, RB Devante Mays was selected in the seventh round (238) by the Green Bay Packers. In 2016, LB Nick Vigil was selected in the third round (87) by the Cincinnati Bengals and LB Tyler Fackrell was chosen in the third round (88) by the Green Bay Packers. In 2014, S Maurice Alexander was selected in the fourth round (110) by the St. Louis Rams and CB Nevin Lawson was chosen in the fourth round (133) by the Detroit Lions. In 2013, CB Will Davis was selected in the third round (93) by the Miami Dolphins, while RB Kerwynn Williams was taken in the seventh round (230) by the Indianapolis Colts. In 2012, Utah State had three players selected in the NFL Draft as LB Bobby Wagner was chosen in the second round (47) by the Seattle Seahawks, RB Robert Turbin was selected in the fourth round (106) by the Seattle Seahawks and RB Michael Smith was taken in the seventh round (212) by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In 2011, CB Curtis Marsh was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in the third round (90). Two Aggies were selected in the 2008 NFL Draft, in Shawn Murphy and Kevin Robinson. Murphy, an offensive guard, was picked by Miami in the fourth round (110), while Robinson, a wide receiver and kick returner, was selected by Kansas City in the sixth round (182). TE Chris Cooley was the 81st overall pick by Washington in 2004. In 2003, WR Kevin Curtis was the 74th overall pick, going to St. Louis in the third round.

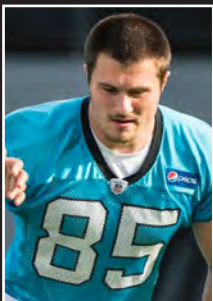

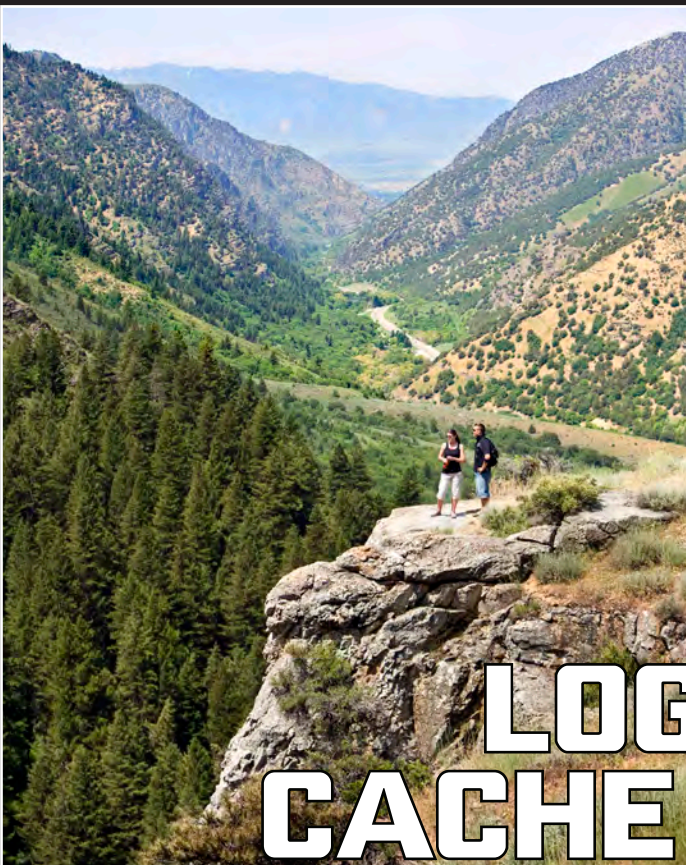


CAMPUS

FALL PREVIEW

After missing out on a bowl game for the first time in six seasons, Utah State enters the 2017 campaign with a hungry football team that is willing to do whatever it takes to find success on the gridiron.

Under the direction of fifth-year head coach **Matt Wells**, the 2013 Mountain West Coach of the Year, the foundation for that success was laid during spring practices with a work ethic and competitive spirit that impressed the coaching staff.

To accomplish its goals and return to a bowl game in 2017, Utah State will have to replace 25 seniors and 14 starters from a group that went 3-9 in 2016. Fortunately, USU returns 14 starters (O-6, D-8) as part of 38 returning letterwinners (O-16, D-20, S-2) from last year's squad that lost five Mountain West games by a combined 29 points (5.8 ppg).

Offensively, Utah State returns one of the best dual-threat quarterbacks in the conference in **Kent Myers**. The senior earned honorable mention all-MW honors as a sophomore and ranks among the best quarterbacks in school history in eight different statistical categories.

Utah State also returns five other starters on offense in senior OL **Preston Brooksby**, senior RB **Tony Lindsey, Jr.**, junior WR **Ron'quavion Tarver**, junior WR **Zach Van Leeuwen** and junior OG **KJ Uluave**.

Defensively, Utah State returns eight starters in senior CB **Wesley Bailey**, senior CB **Jalen Davis**, senior LB **Alex Huerta**, senior BS **Dallin Leavitt**, senior DE **Ian Togia**, junior BS **Gaje Ferguson**, junior LB **Derek Larsen** and junior FS **Jontrell Rocquemore**.

As for its specialists, Utah State returns two letterwinners here in senior LS **Emmett Odegard** and junior P **Aaron Dalton**.

Following perhaps the best spring practice period in Coach Wells' five years at the helm, USU football is poised and determined to compete for a Mountain West Championship in 2017 and qualify for its 12th bowl game in school history.

QUARTERBACKS

Utah State returns one of the most experienced quarterbacks in the Mountain West in three-year starter **Kent Myers**, who has played in 28 games and made 25 starts during his first three seasons at USU. The senior is 411-of-679 passing (.605) for 4,848 yards with 31 touchdowns and just 14 interceptions in his career. Myers, who earned honorable mention all-conference honors as a sophomore and was named the Offensive MVP of the 2014 Gildan New Mexico Bowl as a freshman, ranks fourth all-time in school history in completion percentage (.605), sixth all-time in total offense (5,963 yards), tied for eighth all-time with 31 career touchdown passes, and ninth all-time in career passing yards (4,848), career completions



(411) and career pass attempts (679).

Furthermore, Myers has rushed for 1,115 yards on 257 carries (4.4 ypc) during his career and ranks 25th all-time in school history in career rushing yards, including third all-time among quarterbacks. He also has a career interception percentage of just 0.021, which ranks first all-time in school history, with his 14 interceptions on 679 attempts.

In all, Myers has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 16 of his last 21 games and multiple touchdowns six times in his career, which includes five games with three or more touchdowns.

As a junior, Myers was 211-of-361 (.584) passing for 2,389 yards with 10 touchdowns and eight interceptions, and added 449 yards rushing on 116 carries (3.9 ypc) and six touchdowns. Those 211 completions rank ninth all-time in school history for a single season and he finished the year with 2,838 yards of total offense, which ranks 10th all-time in school history for a single season.

Another returner at this position is junior **DJ Nelson**, who has appeared in all 25 games over the last two seasons as the team's holder.

Utah State has one more quarterback with experience in the program in redshirt freshman **Jordan Love**, while true freshman **Henry Colombi** joined the program this summer.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Utah State returns a stable of wide receivers who combined to catch 107 passes for 1,304 yards with five touchdowns a year ago in seniors **Jaren Colston-Green**, **Braelon Roberts** and **Alex Byers**, juniors **Ron'quavion Tarver** and **Zach Van Leeuwen**, and sophomores **Chad Artist** and **Gerold Bright**.

In all, these seven wide receivers have combined to play in 111 games with 37 starts during their careers, which includes 75 games and 18 starts in 2016.

Tarver highlights this group of returners as he finished last season leading the team in every receiving category as he caught 46 passes for 602 yards (13.1 ypr) and three touchdowns. In fact, his 602 receiving yards are the most by an Aggie underclassman since 2009, while his 46 receptions are tied for the most by a USU underclassman in school history.

Tarver had a pair of 100-yard receiving games as a sophomore, including a career-high nine receptions for a career-best 143 yards against Air Force, as those 143 receiving yards rank as the third-most in school history by an Aggie underclassman and the most since 1994.

Roberts is the most experienced returning wide receiver as he has played in 28 games with eight starts and has caught 32 passes for 325 yards (10.2 ypr) with one touchdown during his career, while Van Leeuwen has played in 23 games with nine starts and has caught 14 passes for 131 yards (9.4

ypr) with one touchdown. Another player here with multiple seasons of experience is Colston-Green, who has played in 20 games and made three starts, and has caught eight passes for 230 yards (28.8 ypr) with two touchdowns.

Other Aggies who will have an opportunity for playing time at wide receiver in 2017 include senior **Connor McGuire**, who did not play last season, along with one freshman who redshirted a year ago in **Jordan Nathan**.

In addition to the nine returning players here, Utah State has added several newcomers who could make immediate contributions. Three of these players participated in spring practice for Utah State in sophomore **Dylan Spradling**, and freshmen **Taylor Compton** and **Preston Curtis**, while fellow freshman **Savon Scarver** joined the team this summer.

TIGHT ENDS

Utah State lost all four of its tight ends from last season in seniors **Wyatt Houston**, **Landon Horne** and **Joe Palange**, and sophomore **Derek Hastings**, but returns perhaps two of those most athletic players at this position in the Mountain West in senior **Damion Hobbs** and redshirt sophomore **Dax Raymond**.

Houston was the most productive of the three graduating players here as he ranked third on the team in 2016 with 35 receptions for 330 yards (9.4 ypr) and two touchdowns, and leaves the program as the second-most productive tight end in school history with 86 receptions for 933 yards (10.8 ypr) and nine touchdowns.

Hobbs, who moved from quarterback to tight end last spring, has played in 17 games during his first two years in the program and has carried the ball 44 times for 221 yards (5.2 ypr) with seven touchdowns, while completing 12-of-24 passes for 141 yards and one touchdown.

Raymond, who redshirted last season due to injury, caught four passes for 72 yards (18.0 ypr) as a true freshman in 2015.

Utah State also returns two other redshirts here in freshmen **Travis Boman** and **Tyler Thornock**, both of whom participated in spring drills.

Newcomers who could emerge here include junior college transfer **Emerson Woods** and freshman **Carson Terrell**.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Utah State must replace three all-Mountain West performers on the offensive line from a year ago in seniors **Austin Albrecht**, **Jake Simonich** and **Austin Stephens**. In fact, these three combined to play in 130 career games and made 106 starts.

Fortunately for Utah State, it returns two starters from last season in senior OT **Preston Brooksby** and junior OG **KJ Uluave**. Brooksby played in all 12 games last season, making 11 starts, while Uluave

has played in 14 games over the past two seasons and made four starts a year ago.

Other returning players with in-game experience here include senior OG **Jarom Ioane**, junior OT **Cody Boyer** and sophomore OC **Roderick Smith II**.

In all, the Aggies' offensive line returns five players who have played in a combined 37 games with 16 starts.

Utah State also returns six other players with experience in the program in senior **Andrew Chen**, redshirt junior **Sean Taylor**, and redshirt freshmen **Demytrick Ali'ifua**, **Viliamu McMoore** and **Ty Shaw**.

Newcomers who participated in spring drills and will compete for starting jobs in the fall include junior transfers **Roman Andrus**, **Rob Castaneda** and **Quin Ficklin**. Players who joined the team in the summer include sophomore transfer **Moroni Iniguez**, and freshmen **Chandler Dolphin**, **Alfred Edwards**, **McCord Meyers** and **Wyatt O'Banion**.

RUNNING BACKS

For the third straight season, Utah State returns its leading rusher as senior RB **Tonny Lindsey, Jr.** is back after gaining 763 yards on 148 carries (5.2 ypc) with six touchdowns last season. For his career, Lindsey has rushed for 856 yards on 160 carries (5.3 ypc) and six touchdowns.

Along with Lindsey, Utah State returns two other running backs with game experience in senior **LaJuan Hunt** and junior **Justen Hervey**. Hunt, who has played in 38 games with 12 starts during his career, has rushed for 1,018 yards on 259 carries (3.9 ypc) and seven touchdowns, while Hervey has gained 160 yards on 26 carries (6.2 ypc) and two touchdowns in 19 career games, which includes one start.

USU also returns senior QB **Kent Myers**, who rushed for 449 yards on 116 carries (3.9 ypc) with six touchdowns a year ago, and has 1,115 career rushing yards on 257 carries (4.4 ypc) and 14 touchdowns.

Utah State returns three other players who carried the ball last season, including senior WR **Alex Byers**, senior TE **Damion Hobbs** and sophomore WR **Gerold Bright**, while freshman **Morian Walker, Jr.** redshirted last season.

The only player not returning here from last season is **Devante Mays**, who was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the seventh round of the 2017 NFL Draft. Mays played in just six games a year ago, but rushed for 1,225 yards during his two-year career.

Three newcomers who could see time here include junior college transfer **Eltoro Allen** and freshmen **SJ Fehoko**, who participated in spring drills, and **Tre Miller**.

OFFENSIVE NOTABLES

- Utah State returns one player on its active roster who started at quarterback and led his team to a bowl victory in senior **Kent Myers**. Myers, who was named the Offensive MVP of the 2014 Gilman New Mexico Bowl, also earned honorable mention all-Mountain West honors as a sophomore in 2015.

- Utah State returns its leading rusher from last season in senior RB **Tonny Lindsey, Jr.**, as he gained 763 yards on 148 carries (5.2 ypc) and tied for the team lead with six rushing touchdowns. For his career, Lindsey has carried the ball 160 times for 856 yards (5.3 ypc) with six touchdowns and is just 144 yards shy of becoming the 31st player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards.

- Senior RB **LaJuan Hunt** has rushed for 1,018 yards on 259 carries (3.9 ypc) to rank 30th all-time in school history in career rushing yards.

- Myers** has rushed for 1,115 yards on 257 carries (4.4 ypc) during his career and ranks 25th all-time in school history in career rushing yards, including third all-time among quarterbacks. Overall, Myers has 14 rushing touchdowns in his career, which is just two shy of entering the career top 10 in USU history.

- Utah State returns 81.8 percent of its rushing yards (1,673 of 2,046), 86.1 percent of its rushing attempts (354 of 411) and 84.0 percent of its rushing touchdowns (21 of 25) from the 2016 season.

- Myers** is 411-of-679 (.605) passing for 4,848 yards with 31 touchdowns and 14 interceptions in his career, and that completion percentage ranks fourth all-time in school history.

- Myers** ranks sixth all-time in school history in total offense (5,963 yards), tied for eighth all-time with 31 career touchdown passes, and ninth all-time in career passing yards (4,848), career completions (411) and career pass attempts (679).

- Myers** has a career interception percentage of just 0.021, which ranks first all-time in school history, with his 31 touchdowns and 14 interceptions on 679 attempts. Myers has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 16 of his last 21 games and multiple touchdowns six times in his career, which includes five games with three or more touchdown passes.

- Utah State's 2,046 rushing yards in 2016 marks the eighth-straight season it has rushed for at least 2,000 yards. Prior to its current streak, USU went 33 years without rushing for 2,000 yards.

- Junior WR **Ron'quavion Tarver** finished last season leading the team in every receiving category as he caught 46 passes for 602 yards (13.1 ypr) and three touchdowns. In fact, his 602 receiving yards are the most by an Aggie underclassman since 2009, while his 46 receptions are tied for the most by a USU underclassman in school history. Tarver also had a pair of 100-yard receiving games as a sophomore, including a career-high nine receptions for a career-best 143 yards against Air Force as those 143 receiving yards rank as the third-most in school history by an Aggie underclassman and the most since 1994.

DEFENSIVE LINE

For the first time in numerous years, Utah State has some question marks and holes to fill along its defensive line after the graduation of three starters and four letterwinners from last season in **Ricky Ali'ifua**, **Edmund Faimalo**, **Travis Seefeldt** and **Siu'a Taufa**.

Ali'ifua played in 51 games and made 23 starts during his career and recorded 99 tackles, which included 8.0 sacks and 18.0 tackles for loss. Seefeldt earned second-team all-Mountain West honors as a senior in 2016 as he recorded 41 tackles, which included 1.5 sacks and 6.0 tackles for loss. For his career, Seefeldt started 14 games and played in 51, and finished with 95 career stops, which included 5.5 sacks and 15.5 tackles for loss.

Fortunately for Utah State, it returns six letterwinners and seven defensive linemen from last season that have combined to play in 97 games with 12 starts during their careers.

In all, Utah State returns 12 defensive linemen who were members of the program during the 2016 season, including one starter in senior DE **Ian Togiai**. USU also welcomes back five other letterwinners here in junior DE **Adewale Adeoye**, junior NG **Gasetoto Schuster**, sophomore NG **Mohelika Uasike**, fellow sophomore NG **Christopher 'Unga** and sophomore DE **Jacoby Wildman**.

Togiai, who has recorded 44 tackles including 2.0 sacks and 3.5 tackles for loss during his career, has the most returning game experience for Utah State as he has played in 38 contests with nine starts, while Schuster has appeared in 21 games. Wildman has played in 11 games and has made three starts, and Adeoye and 'Unga both played in seven games a year ago, while junior **Jake Templeton** appeared in three games in 2016.

Of the 12 returners along the defensive line, nose guard is Utah State's most experienced position with Schuster, Uasike and 'Unga having combined to play in 38 games with three starts.

Furthermore, Utah State welcomes back five defensive linemen who redshirted last season in freshmen **Caden Andersen**, **Ritisoni Fata**, **Logan Lee**, **Jake Pitcher** and **Keith Tambe**.

Newcomers who could see playing time this fall include one junior college transfer in sophomore **Devon Anderson**, along with freshmen **Connor Meyers** and **Nami Tuitu'u**.

LINEBACKERS

Traditionally, Utah State's linebacker corps

has been among the most talented positions on the field. For that to happen in 2017, some new and unproven players will have to step up and produce at a high level.

Seven returning letterwinners who will get that chance to provide an immediate impact include two starters from last season in senior **Alex Huerta** and junior **Derek Larsen**, along with five other letterwinners in senior **Patrick Lee Miranda**, junior **Chase Christiansen**, and sophomores **Dalton Baker**, **Justus Te'i** and **Mason Tobeck**.

Huerta has the most returning game experience for Utah State as he has played in 24 contests with seven starts, while Larsen has appeared in 21 games with seven starts. Christiansen has played in 13 games and made two starts, junior **Chasen Andersen**, who missed last season due to injury, has appeared in 13 games, Te'i has played in 12 games with four starts, Tobeck and Baker have both seen action in eight games with Tobeck making one start, and Miranda appeared in seven games a year ago.

Furthermore, Utah State welcomes back two linebackers who redshirted last season in freshmen **Kevin Meitzenheimer** and **David Woodward**, to go along with two others who practiced with the team but did not play in any games in sophomores **Mason Gajkowski** and **Braden Harris**.

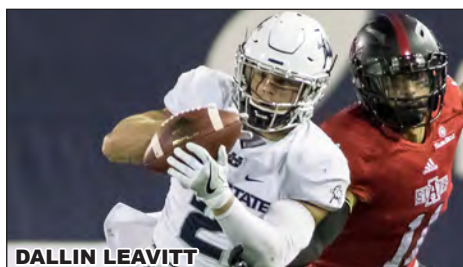
In all, this group has combined to play in 106 games with 21 starts during their careers.

Newcomers who will get opportunities during fall camp for immediate playing time include three junior college transfers in **Louy Compton**, **Ofa Latu** and **Suli Tamaivena**, one four-year transfer in sophomore **Sialao Mobley**, along with incoming freshmen **Jamaal Evans** and **Maika Magalei**.

Despite all the experience returning for Utah State at linebacker, it must replace two starters that were lost to graduation in **Brock Carmen** and **Anthony Williams**, in addition to a third departing senior in **Leki Uasike**. Williams led the team in tackles in 2016 with 96, which included 2.0 sacks and 6.5 tackles for loss. Carmen was second on the team in tackles a year ago with 64, which included 3.0 sacks and 6.0 tackles for loss, while Uasike finished last season with 43 tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Utah State returns a plethora of talent and depth in the back end of its defense for the 2017 season, highlighted by senior cornerback **Jalen Davis**, who earned honorable mention all-Mountain West honors following his sophomore season.

In all, Utah State welcomes back seven returning letterwinners in the secondary from last season who have combined to play in 120 games with 61 starts during their careers. In fact, USU returns 85.7 percent (6/7) of its interceptions and 60.6 percent (20/33) of its pass breakups from a season ago.

In all, Utah State returns 14 defensive backs who were members of the program during the 2016 season, including five starters in Davis, senior CB **Wesley Bailey**, senior BS **Dallin Leavitt**, junior BS **Gaje Ferguson** and junior FS **Jontrell Rocquemore**. USU also welcomes back two other letterwinners here in junior BS **Aaron Wade** and sophomore CB **Cameron Haney**.

The Aggies also return four redshirts in freshmen **Baron Gajkowski**, **Braxton Gunther**, **Ja'Marcus Ingram** and **Zach Swenson** in addition to one more returner in sophomore **Chance Parker**.

Furthermore, Utah State added one new player to the secondary this spring in freshman **Chase Nelson**, while four new players joined the program this summer in junior **Deante Fortenberry**, and freshmen **Andre Grayson**, **Jarrod Green** and **Zahodri Jackson**.

Davis has the most returning game experience for Utah State as he has started all 36 games he has played in during his Aggie career, while Wade has appeared in 24 games, and Rocquemore has played in 21 games with six starts. Haney played in 12 games last season and made one start, while Bailey appeared in 11 games and made six starts. Leavitt started all eight games he played in last season and Ferguson appeared in eight games, making four starts.

Leavitt was Utah State's most disruptive defensive back in 2016 as he ranked fourth on the team with 57 tackles, which included 2.0 tackles for loss, and led the team with three interceptions.

Overall, Davis is Utah State's returning career leader in every defensive statistical category as he has accumulated 147 tackles, 4.0 sacks, 12.0 tackles for loss, six interceptions, 21 pass breakups and three forced fumbles during his 36 games played. As a junior, Davis recorded 35 tackles, which included 2.0 sacks and 5.0 tackles for loss, to go along with one interception and a team-best seven pass breakups.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Utah State returns three of its five specialists from a year ago in senior LS **Emmett Odegard**, junior P **Aaron Dalton** and sophomore PK **Dominik Eberle**.

Additionally, USU welcomes back two other

players who were members of the team last season in sophomore P **Zach Lee** and redshirt freshman LS **Brandon Pada**.

Dalton is the most experienced player in this group as he has punted in all 25 games he has appeared in during the past two seasons and has career numbers of 134 punts for an average of 39.7 yards, including 46 punts downed inside the 20-yard line, with a career long of 69 yards.

As a sophomore, Dalton finished the season averaging 37.9 yards per kick as he punted 62 times for 2,348 yards. During the season, he had eight punts of at least 50 yards with 19 of his punts being downed inside the 20-yard line, while 25 of his punts were fair caught, and only four of his punts resulted in a touchback.

As a true freshman in 2015, Dalton punted 13 times for 463 yards (35.6 ypp) in his first career game against Southern Utah, as those 13 punts are the second-most in both Utah State and Mountain West history, and a freshman record in both school and conference history.

Odegard was Utah State's long snapper in all 12 games last season in his first year with the program.

Eberle appeared in four games during his first season with the program in 2016 and was 3-of-5 on field goal attempts, highlighted by a 3-for-3 performance at Nevada, which included a career long of 43 yards.

Utah State did lose two specialist to graduation in senior K **Jake Thompson** and senior PK **Brock Warren**.

Thompson kicked off 277 times during his career for an average of 62.5 yards per kick with 131 touchbacks, and was 4-of-13 (.308) on field goal attempts.

Warren was 17-of-24 in his career on field goals and that percentage of .708 ranks fifth all-time in school history. As a senior in 2016, Warren was 9-of-12 on field goal attempts and that .750 percentage ranks tied for 10th all-time in school history for a single season. Warren was also 79-of-84 all-time on extra points and that percentage of .940 ranks ninth all-time in school history. Warren also ranks sixth all-time in school history in extra points made (79) and attempted (84) in a career. As a senior, Warren was 35-of-36 on extra points to rank tied for ninth all-time in school history for a single season in extra points made.

Utah State has one newcomer here in freshman PK **Michael Smith**, who participated in spring drills.

DEFENSIVE NOTABLES

- Utah State returns one defender that has garnered all-Mountain West honors in senior CB **Jalen Davis**, who earned honorable mention honors in 2015. In 2014, Davis was named a True Freshman All-American by 247Sports.com.

- Davis is Utah State's returning career leader in every statistical defensive category as he has accumulated 149 tackles, 4.0 sacks, 12.0 tackles for loss, six interceptions, 22 pass breakups and three forced fumbles during his 36 games played.

- Utah State returns 49.8 percent of its tackles (943/470) from last season, including two of its top five tacklers from 2016 in senior BS **Dallin Leavitt** and senior LB **Alex Huerta**, who had 57 and 45 tackles, respectively.

- Utah State's defense finished the 2016 season allowing 176.5 passing yards per game, which ranked third in the Mountain West and 10th nationally. USU also ranked third in the conference in passing efficiency defense (130.9), fourth in the MW in total defense (379.8 ypg), sixth in the MW in scoring defense (29.3 ppg), seventh in the MW in rushing defense (203.3 ypg), and eighth in the MW in sacks per game (1.83).

- Utah State has forced 109 turnovers in its last 62 games, including at least one turnover in 48 of its last 62 games. USU has also recorded 53 interceptions in its last 49 games, including at least one pick in 26 of its last 49 games and multiple interceptions in 16 of its last 49 games. Overall, USU has forced three or more turnovers in 12 of its last 38 games.

Entering his fifth season as Utah State's head coach, Matt Wells is determined to lead the Aggies back into a bowl game and into the upper echelon of the Mountain West after a disappointing 2016 season.

Wells, who is the sixth-longest tenured coach in 120 seasons of Aggie football, holds a 28-25 record in his first four seasons at USU, including a 19-13 Mountain West record. Those 28 wins are the second-most by a USU coach in his first four seasons and the fifth-most in school history, while his 52.8 winning percentage ranks seventh all-time.

Utah State has also recorded three wins against top-25 opponents during Wells' first four years as head coach, one more than the program won in its previous 115 seasons.

During his six years at Utah State, which includes two years as an assistant, Wells has been part of a program that played in a school-record five-straight bowl games. In fact, Wells is the first head coach in program history to lead the Aggies to three bowl games and the only head coach with multiple bowl wins.

During the 2016 season, Utah State had six players earn various all-Mountain West honors as it lost five conference games by a combined 29 points (5.8 ppg). USU also had two players invited to postseason All-Star games, while one player was selected in the 2017 NFL Draft in Devante Mays. Furthermore, USU had eight other Aggies who signed free agent contracts.

In 2015, Wells led Utah State to six wins and its fifth-straight bowl game as the Aggies had 12 players earn various all-Mountain

West honors, which were the third-most in the conference. Furthermore, senior linebacker Tyler Fackrell was named a fourth-team All-American by *Phil Steele's Magazine*.

Utah State also had five players invited to postseason All-Star games/camps, while three Aggies participated in the NFL Combine in Fackrell, Hunter Sharp and Nick Vigil. Furthermore, USU had two players selected in the 2016 NFL Draft in Vigil and Fackrell, both in the third round, while six other Aggies signed free agent contracts and two more were invited to rookie mini-camps.

During the 2014 season, Wells led Utah State to 10 wins to rank as the second-most in school history behind the 2012 team that finished with an 11-2 record. USU also played in its fourth-straight bowl game in 2014 and won its third-straight bowl.

In his second year as Utah State's head coach, Wells mentored 15 players who earned 16 all-Mountain West honors, which were the most in the league and tied for the third-most in school history. Wells also mentored two All-Americans in 2014 in Zach Vigil and Jalen Davis. Vigil was named an All-American by four different publications, including being named a *USA Today Sports* second-team All-American, while Davis was named a true freshman All-American by 247Sports. Vigil was named the Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year.

In his first season as head coach, Wells led Utah State to the inaugural Mountain West Championship game after winning the Mountain Division of the conference with a 7-1 record in 2013. Wells also led Utah State to just its third-ever bowl victory as it posted a 21-14 win against No. 24 Northern Illinois in the 2013 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsett

tia Bowl.

For his efforts, Wells was named the 2013 Mountain West Coach of the Year as he set the school record for wins by a first-year head coach. USU finished the season with a 9-5 record, tying the 1960 and 1961 teams for the second-most wins in school history at the time.

Overall, Wells is the fifth USU coach in school history to garner conference coach of the year honors along with Bruce Snyder (1978), Chuck Shelton (1991), John L. Smith (1997) and Gary Andersen (2012). Wells is also the fourth individual to earn MW Coach of the Year honors in his first season along with BYU's Gary Crowton (2001), Utah's Urban Meyer (2003) and Air Force's Troy Calhoun (2007).

During his first year as Utah State's head coach, Wells mentored 14 Aggies who earned various all-Mountain West honors, including three All-Americans as Tyler Larsen was named a second-team All-American by *USA Today Sports*, Nevin Lawson was named a third-team All-American by *College Sports Madness*, and Fackrell was named an honorable mention Sophomore All-American by *College Football News*.

Wells also coached a school-record four players who were invited and participated in the 2014 NFL Combine in Larsen, Lawson, Maurice Alexander and D.J. Tialavea, while a total of 16 players from the 2013 and 2014 rosters were invited to NFL/CFL camps, including Alexander (St. Louis Rams) and Lawson (Detroit Lions), who were both selected in the fourth round of the 2014 NFL Draft.

Wells, who is one of 18 coaches to lead his alma mater, is just the second Utah State graduate to be appointed its head football

coach joining Chris Pella, who graduated from USU in 1965 and coached the Aggies from 1983-85.

Prior to being named the head coach at his alma mater, Wells spent the previous two seasons as an assistant coach at Utah State, including serving as the team's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2012 and quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator in 2011.

As offensive coordinator in 2012, Utah State concluded its most successful season in school history as it went 11-2 and set school records for wins (11) and home wins (6), while being nationally ranked in The Associated Press poll for three-straight weeks for the first time in school history. USU also won its first outright conference championship since 1936 and just its third in school history joining the 1921 and 1936 teams that both won Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference titles. All-time, Utah State has won or shared 11 league championships.

As offensive coordinator in 2012, Wells directed an Aggie offense that set single-season school records for total points (454), total offense (6,108 yards), completions (285) and total yards per game (469.8), while ranking second in points per game (34.9) and total passing yards (3,445).

Nationally, Utah State's 2012 offense ranked second in the Western Athletic Conference and 23rd in the country in total offense (469.8 ypg), second in the WAC and 18th in the nation in passing efficiency (153.21), second in the WAC and 25th in the nation in rushing offense (204.8 ypg), third in the WAC and 31st in the nation in sacks allowed (1.38 pg), third in the WAC and 33rd in the nation in scoring offense (34.9 ppg), and third in the WAC and 39th in the nation in passing offense (265.0 ypg).

Under Wells, Utah State finished the 2012 season scoring 38 or more points in its final seven games, which is a school record.

In 2012, Wells coached former Aggie Chuckie Keeton, who earned first-team all-WAC honors after setting single-season school records for touchdown passes (27), passing yards (3,373), completion percentage (.676), completions (275) and total offense (3,992 yards). Keeton also earned WAC Offensive Player of the Week honors four times in 2012, which is a single-season school record.

Under Wells' tutelage, Keeton ranks first all-time in school history in career touchdown passes (62), first in career total offense (8,808 yards), second in career completions (672), second in career passing yardage (8,695), second in career passing attempts (1,068), tied for second in career completion percentage (.629) and 14th in career rushing yards (1,415).

As the quarterbacks coach in 2011, Wells helped Utah State's offense establish then-school records for total offense (5,945 yards), rushing yards (3,675), total points (437) and total touchdowns (60).

Wells, a former Aggie quarterback and three-year letterwinner from 1994-96, was a member of two conference championship teams as a student-athlete as he was a redshirt freshman in 1993 when Utah State tied for first in the Big West Conference and defeated Ball State, 42-33, in the Las Vegas Bowl II for its first-ever bowl win. As a senior in 1996, Wells helped USU to another share of the Big West Conference title.

Wells, who has been a part of nine bowl teams and two conference championships during his coaching career, came to Utah State after two coaching stints at New Mexico, serving as the Lobos' wide receivers and kickoff return unit coach in 2010 and wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator from 2007 to 2008. In 2009, Wells served as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Louisville.

Prior to his first stint at New Mexico, Wells spent five years (2002-06) as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at Tulsa and five years at the U.S. Naval Academy (1997-2001) as its quarterbacks coach, fullbacks coach and wide receivers coach, while also serving as the junior varsity head coach and offensive coordinator for three years.

Wells, a native of Sallisaw, Okla., earned his bachelor's degree in business marketing from Utah State in 1996, graduating cum laude. He and his wife Jen have two daughters, Jadyne (14) and Ella (11), and one son, Wyatt (8). His brother, Luke, is USU's tight ends and inside receivers coach and recruiting coordinator.

Frank Maile, a 2007 Utah State graduate, is in his second season as the Aggies' co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. Overall, Maile is in his seventh year on the Aggies' staff, as he was a defensive graduate assistant from 2009-10, and its defensive line coach from 2011-13.

As Utah State's co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach in 2016, USU allowed just 176.5 passing yards per game, which ranked third in the Mountain West and 10th nationally. USU also ranked fourth in the conference and 47th in the nation in total defense (379.8 ypg).

In 2016, Maile coached a pair of Aggies to all-conference honors in Travis Seefeldt (second team) and Ricky Ali'ifua (honorable mention), who signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Prior to his return to Utah State, Maile spent two seasons as the defensive line coach at Vanderbilt. In 2015, the Commodores' defense ranked among the top-35 nationally in nine categories, including 28th in total defense (350.5 ypg), 22nd in scoring defense (21.0 ppg) and 33rd in rushing defense (143.2 ypg).

Vanderbilt's defense also ranked fourth nationally in both first downs allowed (206) and fourth down conversions (.235), sixth in both third down conversions (.282) and red zone defense (its opponents scored just 71.4 percent of the time), 20th in fumbles recovered (11) and 28th in passing efficiency defense (114.47).

As Utah State's defensive line coach from 2011-13, Maile coached five Aggies to all-conference honors in Levi Koskan (second team), Al Lapuaho (first team), B.J. Larsen (second team), Jordan Nielsen (second team) and AJ Pataial'i (second team).

During his three years as defensive line coach, USU posted a 28-13 record and played in three-straight bowl games, winning the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl and the 2013 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, and a 2012 Western Athletic Conference title.

During the 2013 season, Maile helped the Aggie defense rank first in the Mountain West and seventh in the nation in scoring, allowing 17.1 points per game, the second-fewest allowed by the Aggies since 1971. USU also ranked first in the MW and eighth in the nation in rushing defense (106.7 ypg), its fewest allowed since 1968, first in the MW and 12th in the nation in total defense (330.9 ypg), and first in the MW and 15th in the nation in passing efficiency defense (113.2).

Utah State's 2013 defense also ranked sixth in the nation in the red zone, allowing opponents to score 68.9 percent of the time, including just 19 touchdowns, to rank second nationally. Furthermore, USU's defense ranked seventh in the nation in forcing three-and-outs with 5.6 per game, while its 7.6 tackles per loss per game ranked 10th nationally. USU's defense also ranked 11th nationally in third-down conversions at 32.6 percent.

Utah State's defense finished the 2013 season holding five of its final seven opponents to 14 or fewer points and did not give up more than 24 points in its last seven games. USU capped its season with a 21-14 win against No. 24 Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl as the Aggies held NIU's high-powered offense in check and limited Heisman Trophy candidate Jordan Lynch to just 39 rushing yards.

Utah State was also the only team in the nation not to allow a touchdown run of 10 or more yards in 2013, and allowed just two 100-yard rushers, while limiting its opponents to just 13 points following 16 turnovers.

During the 2012 season, Maile helped Utah State's defense rank among the top-15 in the nation in five categories, including being ranked first in the WAC and seventh in the nation in scoring defense (15.38 ppg), second in the WAC and sixth nationally in sacks (3.23 pg), first in the WAC and 10th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (104.43), second in the WAC and 13th in the country in rushing defense (113.77 ypg), first in the WAC and 15th in the nation in total defense (322.08 ypg), and first in the WAC and 32nd in the nation in passing defense (208.31 ypg).

Utah State's defense also led the WAC and ranked second in the nation in red zone efficiency at 63.6 percent, allowing just 13 touchdowns and 15 field goals on 44 trips inside the 20. USU also ranked eighth in the nation forcing 5.08 three-and-outs per game in 2012.

In 2011, Maile helped Utah State lead the WAC in total defense (366.2 ypg) as well as ranking second in the league in both rushing defense (127.7 ypg) and tackles for loss (5.9 pg). The Aggies also were second in the WAC in opponent third-down conversions at 35.4 percent.

Maile was a standout defensive lineman for the Aggies from 2004-07, making 21 starts in 42 career games. He posted 71 total tackles (45 solo, 26 assists) with 19.0 tackles for loss and one fumble recovery. In his senior season of 2007 as team captain, Maile accounted for 8.0 tackles for loss, tying for second on the team.

A native of West Valley City, Utah, Maile was a first-team all-state defensive lineman at Alta High School in Sandy, Utah. He went on an LDS Church Mission to the Dominican Republic from 2001-03.

Maile earned his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from Utah State in 2007 and earned his master's in education in 2010.

Maile and his wife, Heather, have three sons, Maximus (12), Samson (8) and Titan (6), and a daughter, Cecilia (10).

Kendrick Shaver is entering his second season as Utah State's co-defensive coordinator and first year as the outside linebackers coach after coaching the safeties last season. Prior to that, Shaver was the defensive passing game coordinator and cornerbacks coach the previous two seasons. Overall, Shaver coached the secondary in each of his first six seasons at USU.

During his six years at Utah State, Shaver has been part of a Utah State program that played in a school-record five-straight bowl games, to go along with a 2012 Western Athletic Conference championship.

As Utah State's co-defensive coordinator/safeties coach in 2016, USU allowed just 176.5 passing yards per game, which ranked third in the Mountain West and 10th nationally. USU also ranked fourth in the conference and 47th in the nation in total defense (379.8 ypg). In 2016, Shaver coached Marquan Ellison, who signed a NFL free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks.

In 2015, Shaver coached a cornerbacks group that helped Utah State's defense rank 12th nationally, allowing just 180.5 passing yards per game, and 17th nationally in total defense, allowing just 332.5 yards per game. Highlighting USU's cornerbacks was sophomore Jalen Davis, who earned honorable mention All-Mountain West honors.

During the 2014 season, Shaver coached Davis, who earned True Freshman All-America honors from 247Sports.

Utah State's defense finished the 2014 season ranking among the top 30 in the nation in 10 categories, including ranking first in the Mountain West and 12th in the nation in scoring defense at 19.7 points per game. USU also ranked first in the MW and fourth nationally in both sacks (3.57 pg) and tackles for loss (8.1 pg), second in the MW and eighth in the nation in passes intercepted (19), second in the MW and ninth in the nation in defensive touchdowns (5), second in the MW and 11th in the nation in turnovers forced (30), second in the MW and 17th nationally in passing efficiency defense (111.42), first in the MW and 24th in the nation in rushing defense (130.7 ypg), second in the MW and 25th in the nation in opponents third down conversion percentage (.358), and second in the MW and 30th nationally in total defense (356.1 ypg).

In 2013, Shaver helped the Aggies' defense rank first in the Mountain West and seventh in the nation in scoring allowing just 17.1 points per game, the second-fewest allowed by an Aggie defense since 1971. USU also ranked first in the MW and eighth in the nation in rushing defense (106.7 ypg), its fewest since 1968, first in the MW and 12th in the nation in total defense (330.9 ypg), and first in the MW and 15th in the nation in passing efficiency defense (113.2).

Utah State's 2013 defense also ranked sixth in the nation in the red zone, allowing opponents to score just 68.9 percent of the time, including just 19 touchdowns, to rank second nationally.

Highlighting Utah State's defense in 2013 was senior cornerback Nevin Lawson, who was named a third-team All-American by *College Sports Madness* and a first-team all-Mountain West selection. Lawson was

selected in the fourth round (133rd pick) of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions, while Tay Glover-Wright is currently with the Indianapolis Colts after signing as a free agent with the Atlanta Falcons.

During his senior season, Lawson ranked third in the Mountain West and 25th in the nation with 1.21 passes defended per game and finished the season ranking first on the team with 13 pass breakups and second overall with four interceptions as he was named the Mountain West's Defensive Player of the Week twice.

Shaver, who was named FootballScoop.com's Co-Defensive Backs National Coach of the Year in 2012, mentored a pair of all-WAC defensive backs, including Will Davis, who was named a third-team All-America by CBSsports.com, a fourth-team All-America by SI.com. Davis was selected in the third round (93rd pick) of the 2013 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins.

During the 2012 season, Shaver helped Utah State's defense rank first in the WAC and seventh in the nation in scoring defense (15.38 ppg), second in the WAC and tied for sixth nationally in sacks (3.23 pg), first in the WAC and 10th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (104.43), second in the WAC and 13th in the country in rushing defense (113.77 ypg), first in the WAC and 15th in the nation in total defense (322.08 ypg), and first in the WAC and 32nd in the nation in passing defense (208.31 ypg).

Utah State's defense also led the WAC and ranked second in the nation in red zone efficiency at 63.6 percent allowing just 13 touchdowns and 15 field goals on 44 trips inside the 20.

During his first year at Utah State in 2011, Shaver's cornerbacks helped anchor an Aggie defense that finished the year ranking first in the WAC and 50th in the nation in total defense (366.23 ypg), second in the WAC and 31st in the nation in rushing defense (127.70 ypg), second in the WAC and 53rd nationally in tackles for loss (5.92 pg), third in the WAC and 48th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (125.58), and third in the WAC and 59th in the nation in sacks (1.92 pg).

Prior to joining Utah State's staff, Shaver spent four years (2007-10) as the secondary coach at Northern Colorado. Shaver was also the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M (2006), and defensive and special teams graduate assistant at Eastern Kentucky (2004-05). He began his coaching career at Hillcrest (Mo.) High School, where he coached defensive backs and wide receivers in 2002.

A native of Eufaula, Okla., Shaver played two seasons (1998-99) at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M Junior College before transferring to Missouri State, where he was a free safety and cornerback in 2000 and 2001. With 11 pass breakups in 2001, Shaver is presently tied for No. 6 on MSU's single-season pass defense list. Shaver spent the 2003 season playing for the Sioux Falls Storm of the NFL before coaching full-time.

Shaver, who graduated from Missouri State with a bachelor's degree in business in 2002 and went on to earn his master's degree in physical education in 2005 from Eastern Kentucky, served an NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship with the Oakland Raiders in 2014.

David Yost, who has 23 years of coaching experience, including four seasons as an offensive coordinator, is in his first season as Utah State's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Prior to his appointment at Utah State, Yost spent the 2016 season as the quarterback coach and passing game coordinator at Oregon. In his one season at UO, the Ducks ranked 16th nationally in total offense at 491.7 yards per game, 27th in the nation in both scoring offense (35.4 ppg) and rushing offense (226.4 ypg), 32nd nationally in passing offense (265.3 ypg), and 10th nationally with just six thrown interceptions.

Prior to his stint at Oregon, Yost spent three seasons as the inside wide receiver coach at Washington State under Mike Leach. In his three seasons at WSU, the Cougars set the top-three marks for most passes caught in Pac-12 single-season history, and twice led the nation in passing offense in 2014 (477.7 ypg) and 2015 (389.2 ypg).

In 2014, the Cougars' inside receivers accounted for 185 of the team's 510 receptions and 15 of the 45 touchdown catches. In his first year at WSU, the Cougars finished fourth in the country in passing offense, averaging 368.0 yards per game. Freshman receiver River Cracraft claimed all-Pac-12 honorable mention recognition in 2013.

Much of Yost's offensive influence resulted from a 17-year association with Gary Pinkel, who molded the 47-year-old Ohio native from a graduate assistant coach at Toledo in 1996 to the completion of a 12-year tenure at Missouri as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator in 2012.

Yost began his stay in Columbia, Mo., in 2001 as the quarterback coach and recruiting coordinator, and added the duties of offensive coordinator in 2009. He was also elevated to assistant head coach for his final two seasons at Missouri.

During his tenure that began in the Big 12 Conference and concluded in the SEC, Yost earned the reputation as one of the nation's brightest young tutors of quarterbacks. His run included a trio of signal callers (Brad Smith, Chase Daniel and Blaine Gabbert) who accumulated 12 different all-conference accolades between them beginning with Smith, who became the first Division I player to pass for 2,000 yards and run for 1,000 in the same season, a feat he accomplished in both 2003 and 2005. Smith completed his Missouri tenure in 2005 as the first-ever collegiate player to pass for 8,000 yards and run for another 4,000 before embarking on a nine-year NFL career.

Daniel emerged on the national stage in 2007 when he was a Heisman Trophy finalist, eventually finishing fourth in the voting. He enjoyed an amazing three-year run as a starter before finishing in 2008 as he left holding virtually every major passing and total offense record in Missouri history.

Gabbert followed Daniel and became an eventual first-round NFL Draft pick.

In 2011, Yost guided the Missouri offensive attack to a Big 12 Conference rushing title and finished the season ranked ninth nationally after averaging 244.0 yards per game. Missouri was one of only two schools in the country to average at least 230 yards rushing

and passing on the year.

Yost assumed the added role of offensive coordinator prior to the 2009 season and oversaw a Missouri offense that ranked No. 14 in the nation in passing at 285.4 yards per game. The Tigers followed that season with a 10-win campaign in 2010, finishing 35th nationally in yards per game (409.62).

Yost was instrumental in the development of Missouri's renowned spread attack. The Tigers broke numerous offensive school records in 2008, putting together only the third 10-win season in school history. The Tigers also established school records for points (591), points per game (42.2) and passing yards (4,625) that season.

During the 2007 and 2008 seasons, Missouri won 22 games to rank third nationally, behind only Oklahoma and USC. Furthermore, Missouri won three Big 12 North Division Championships in a four-year span (2007, 2008, 2010) with Yost on staff.

From 1997 to 2000, Yost held the same responsibilities for Pinkel at Toledo. He spent four seasons coaching two of the most productive quarterbacks in Rockets history in Tavares Bolden and Chris Wallace. Yost came to Toledo from Tiffin University, where he coordinated the offense, along with coaching quarterbacks and receivers in 1995. During the 1994 season, he coached wide receivers.

After graduating from Kent State with a bachelor's degree in early childhood education in 1992, Yost spent time coaching his former high school football team, Carrollton High School, in Carrollton, Ohio.

Yost and his wife, Carrie, have one daughter, Kennedy, and two sons, Keaton and Kamden.

Mark Tommerdahl (TUM-ur-doll), who has 33 years of coaching experience, including 22 years as a special teams coordinator, is in his first season as Utah State's special teams coordinator and running backs coach.

In all, Tommerdahl has served on coaching staffs of 14 bowl teams at some of the top Division I football programs in the country.

Prior to his appointment at Utah State, Tommerdahl spent four seasons at California, serving as the assistant head coach and special teams coordinator, while coaching tight ends, fullbacks and receivers.

During the 2016 season at California, Tommerdahl led a kickoff return defense that ranked first in the Pac-12 and 14th nationally (18.02 ypr). He was also part of a staff that helped the Golden Bears rank 10th in the nation in total offense (513.2 ypg).

Additionally, Tommerdahl coached placekicker Matt Anderson in 2016, as the Lou Groza Placekicker Award semifinalist tied a single-game school record with five field goals against UCLA and connected on a school-record-tying 22 field goals in 26 attempts (.846) on the year. He also set a Cal single-season record with his 117 points.

Another player who finished among the best in the country under Tommerdahl's tutelage was punter Dylan Klumph, who ranked eighth in the nation with an average of 44.8 yards per punt in 2016.

In 2015, Tommerdahl helped the Golden Bears to an 8-5 record, their first eight-win season since 2009, and its first bowl victory since 2008 in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, which was its first postseason appearance since 2011.

During the 2015 season, Cal's special teams blocked three punts to rank tied for second nationally, and allowed just six punt returns to rank second nationally to set a school record. The team's 62 punt return yards allowed tied for the second-lowest in the nation. Offensively, Cal finished the season ranking eighth in the nation in total offense (529.2 ypg).

Tommerdahl's 2014 special teams units were highlighted by Trevor Davis, who earned first-team all-Pac-12 honors, as he averaged a single-season school-record 32.6 yards per kick return to rank second in the nation. Davis also ranked tied for second in the nation with a pair of kick returns for touchdowns.

During the 2014 and 2015 seasons, Cal opponents posted the lowest net punting average in the Pac-12 at 34.2 and 35.0 yards per punt, respectively.

Prior to his arrival at Cal, Tommerdahl spent four seasons at Louisiana Tech from 2009-12. With the Bulldogs, he tutored a pair of All-Americans in two-time first-team punter Ryan Allen (2011, '12) and tight end Dennis Morris (2009).

Following his collegiate career, Allen signed a free agent contract with the New England Patriots and has punted in all 64 regular-season games and 10 postseason contests for the Super Bowl XLIX and XI champions.

Under Tommerdahl, Louisiana Tech's special teams units led the nation in 2012 in net punting with a 43.51 average behind the performance of Allen, who became the first back-to-back and second two-time winner of the Ray Guy Award.

During the 2012 season, Louisiana Tech led the nation

in total offense at 577.9 yards per game.

In 2010, Louisiana Tech led the Western Athletic Conference and ranked 10th nationally in punt returns with an average of 13.63 yards per return, while ranking fourth in the conference and 25th nationally in kick returns (23.52 ypg). Much of the Bulldogs' prowess was due to the play of Phillip Livas, who played his final two seasons for Tommerdahl during a career in which he tied an NCAA record with a combined eight kick and punt return touchdowns, bringing back four of each for scores.

Tommerdahl spent the 2008 season as an assistant head coach, special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Louisiana-Monroe.

For five seasons from 2003-07, Tommerdahl was the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas A&M. During his tenure with the Aggies, Tommerdahl helped lead the program to the Cotton Bowl (2004), Holiday Bowl (2006) and Alamo Bowl (2007).

He coached current New England Patriots tight end Martellus Bennett, who has been in the NFL since 2008 after ending his Texas A&M career as the program's all-time leader at the position in receptions and yards receiving. During the 2005 season at Texas A&M, Tommerdahl coached a pair of Freshman All-Americans in Bennett and punter Justin Brantly.

Tommerdahl spent the 2001 and 2002 seasons at Alabama as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach, helping the Crimson Tide to the 2001 Independence Bowl and 2002 SEC West Division title when the squad finished 11th in the final AP Top 25 poll.

Tommerdahl also served as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach during stints at TCU (1998-2000), New Mexico (1997) and Minnesota (1995-96).

TCU won a pair of WAC titles in 1999 and 2000 on its way to appearances in the Mobile Bowl each season.

A native of Fergus Falls, Minn., Tommerdahl began his collegiate coaching career in 1984 with a two-year stint as a graduate assistant at Wyoming, where he spent 11 seasons serving in numerous capacities, helping the Cowboys to four bowl appearances and three WAC titles during his tenure.

Tommerdahl earned a bachelor's degree in business and physical education from Concordia College in Minnesota in 1983, and an MBA with an emphasis in marketing from Wyoming in 1986. He is married to the former Annette Jondahl, who holds her Ph.D in counseling education with an emphasis in university administration.

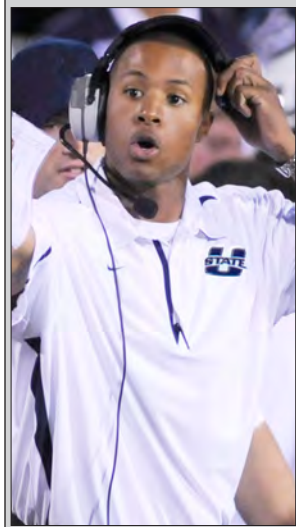

Jovon Bouknight (Juh-vonn Bo-night) is entering his ninth season as Utah State's wide receivers coach. He served as its co-offensive coordinator in 2016 and its passing game coordinator in 2014-15, along with being the team's offensive graduate assistant in 2009. This season, Bouknight will focus on the outside receivers.

During his eight years at Utah State, Bouknight has been part of a program that played in a school-record five-straight bowl games, to go along with a 2012 Western Athletic Conference championship.

As co-offensive coordinator in 2016, Bouknight helped Utah State's offense record its eighth-straight 2,000-yard rushing season. Bouknight also mentored one of the best young wide receivers in school history in sophomore Ron'quavion Tarver, who caught 46 passes for 602 yards and three touchdowns. Those 46 receptions are tied for the most by an underclassman in school history, while his 602 receiving yards are the most by a USU underclassman since 2009.

In 2015, Bouknight coached one of the most productive wide receivers in school history in Hunter Sharp, who earned second-team all-Mountain West honors, and is currently in the NFL with the Denver Broncos. Sharp finished his senior season ranking first in the MW and 28th in the nation in receiving touchdowns with nine, second in the MW and 19th in the nation with 71 receptions, and third in the MW and 41st in the nation with an average of 76.3 receiving yards per game.

Sharp finished his career ranking ninth all-time in school history with 137 receptions, ninth all-time in touchdown receptions with 16 and 14th all-time with 1,770 receiving yards.

In 2014, Bouknight coached a pair of all-Mountain West receivers in JoJo Natson and Sharp as both players earned honorable mention honors. Sharp finished the season with 66 receptions for 939 yards, which is the most receiving yards by an Aggie since 2002. Furthermore, Sharp had four-straight 100-yard receiving games, which is the most by an Aggie since 2002.

During the 2013 season, Bouknight was part of an Aggie offense that set school records for pass completions (297), total offensive plays (1,073), touchdown passes (30) and first downs (310), while its 445 points scored and 481 pass attempts both rank second all-time. Furthermore, USU's 56 total touchdowns rank third all-time and its 31.7 points per game average ranks fifth.

In 2012, Bouknight mentored two all-WAC performers in Matt Austin and Chuck Jacobs as Austin earned second-team honors and Jacobs earned honorable mention accolades. Jacobs spent three years in the NFL and is currently in the CFL with the Toronto Argonauts.

During the 2012 season, Bouknight helped coach an Aggie offense that set single-season school records for total points (454), total offense (6,108 yards), completions (285) and total yards per game (469.8), while ranking second all-time in points (34.9 ppg) and passing yards (3,445).

In 2011, USU's offense was statistically one of the best in the country as it led the WAC and ranked sixth in the nation in rushing offense (282.69 ypg). USU also ranked first in the WAC and 18th in the nation in passing efficiency (151.8), first in the WAC and 23rd in the nation in scoring offense (33.62 ppg), and second in the WAC and 20th in the nation in total offense (457.31 ypg).

Bouknight came to Utah State after one season at his alma mater of Wyoming, where he was an offensive graduate assistant, working with UW's wide receivers.

Bouknight concluded his college career ranked No. 20 in NCAA history in both career receiving yards (3,626) and career receptions (250). After graduating from Wyoming in the spring of 2006, Bouknight signed an NFL free agent contract with the Carolina Panthers and later played in NFL Europe in 2007, before signing as a free agent with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

During his senior season, he was one of 15 semifinalists for the 2005 Biletnikoff Award, which honors the nation's top college receiver. He also earned honorable mention All-America honors from *College Football News*, along with earning first-team all-Mountain West honors. For the 2005 season, he ranked No. 9 in the NCAA in average receiving yards per game (101.45 ypg), No. 15 in total receiving yards (1,116), No. 10 in all-purpose yards (160.45), No. 12 in average receptions per game (7.00), and No. 11 in kickoff returns (27.75). He concluded his career ranked No. 2 in Mountain West history in both receptions (250) and receiving yards (3,626).

In Wyoming school history, Bouknight ranks No. 3 in career receiving yards (4,446 yards), No. 2 in career receptions (250), and is UW's all-time all-purpose yardage leader (5,921 yards) and career kickoff return leader (2,016 yards). He caught at least two passes in 47 consecutive games, which was also every game of his college career and a UW school record up until 2014.

A native of Denver, Colo., Bouknight was an outstanding quarterback at Manual High School in Denver. He received his bachelor's degree in kinesiology and health promotion from Wyoming in 2006.

Bouknight is married to the former Jeanine Hernandez, who is a former USU softball player, and the couple has one son, Breeze Marcello Bouknight (1).

Julius Brown is entering his second season at Utah State and first as the defensive backs coach after coaching the cornerbacks in his first season with the program. Overall, Brown has been part of five conference championships and nine bowl games as an assistant coach.

During his first season at Utah State, Brown was a part of an Aggie defense that allowed just 176.5 passing yards per game to rank third in the Mountain West and 10th nationally. USU's defense also ranked third in the conference in passing efficiency (130.9), and fourth in the MW and 47th in the nation in total yards allowed (379.8 ypg), along with ranks sixth in the conference in scoring defense (29.3 ppg).

One player on the Aggie defense that Brown mentored during the 2016 season was cornerback Daniel Gray, who signed an NFL free agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals.

Prior to Utah State, Brown spent two seasons (2014-15) as the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Boise State.

During his two years at Boise State, Brown helped the Broncos to a 21-6 record, including a 12-4 mark in the Mountain West and a pair of bowl wins, as it defeated No. 10 Arizona, 38-30, in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl and Northern Illinois, 55-7, in the 2015 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. The Broncos also won the 2014 Mountain West title, defeating Fresno State, 28-14, in the championship game.

During the 2015 season, Boise State's secondary intercepted 22 passes to rank first in the Mountain West and fourth nationally and was led by safety Darian Thompson, who had five picks to rank third in the conference and 20th in the nation. Fellow defensive back Donte Deayon added four interceptions during the season to rank fourth in the MW and 23rd nationally. Thompson was selected by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft, while Deayon signed a free agent contract with the New York Giants in 2016.

Thompson concluded his Boise State career earning All-American honors as both a junior and senior, along with being named a two-time first-team all-Mountain West selection, while Deayon also earned all-Mountain West honors twice.

In 2015, Boise State's secondary helped the Broncos rank fifth nationally in rushing defense (108.2 ypg), 10th in the nation in opponent's third-down conversion rate (30.9 percent), 12th nationally in total defense (318.3 ypg), 14th nationally in pass defense efficiency (109.9) and 18th in the nation in scoring defense (20.2 ppg).

Boise State also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in 2014 with 22 interceptions as Thompson led the conference and ranked tied for third in the country with seven interceptions, including returning one for a touchdown. Deayon intercepted six passes during the year and returned two for touchdowns.

The secondary's coverage skills played a key role in the Boise State defense leading the conference with the lowest opponents' third-down conversion rate (34.8 percent), a mark that also ranked 18th nationally, and its second-lowest opponents' fourth-down

conversion rate (42.9 percent). Additionally, opposing quarterbacks posted a passing efficiency of just 116.6 in 2014.

Brown, who also coached cornerbacks and was the recruiting coordinator at Arkansas State in 2013 and coached cornerbacks at Troy (Ala.) in 2012, was a three-year starter and four-year letterwinner for Boise State from 2000-03, earning honorable mention All-Western Athletic Conference honors after leading the league in passes defended as a senior.

Brown was a member of the 2002 and 2003 WAC Championship teams, and helped lead the Broncos to victories in the 2002 Crucial.com Humanitarian Bowl and the 2003 Plains Capital Fort Worth Bowl. He then worked as an offensive graduate assistant at Boise State from 2006-08, and as the Broncos' Director of Player Personnel from 2009-11. He began his coaching career at Capital High School in Boise during the 2005 season.

Brown, a native of Stockton, Calif., is a 2006 graduate of Boise State with a degree in business administration. Brown and his wife, Cassidy, has one girl, Lyric.

Stacy Collins is in his second season at Utah State and in his first year coaching the inside linebackers after serving as special teams coordinator last season.

Overall, Collins has 19 years of coaching experience, including 14 years as a coordinator and four years as a head coach at the collegiate level.

In 2016, Collins coached a pair of kickers who performed at a high level in senior PK Brock Warren and sophomore P Aaron Dalton. Warren was 9-of-12 of field goal attempts and that .750 percentage ranks tied for 10th all-time in school history. Warren was also 35-of-36 on extra points to rank tied for ninth all-time at USU in extra points made. Dalton punted 62 times during the year with 19 of his punts downed inside the 20-yard line and 25 of his punts were fair caught. Overall, Dalton had eight punts of 50-plus yards, including a long of 56.

Furthermore, Utah State ranked third in the Mountain West and 38th nationally in kickoff return defense in 2016, allowing just 19.47 yards per return.

Collins came to Utah State after spending four seasons as the head coach and special teams coordinator at Division II South Dakota School of Mines.

As head coach at South Dakota School of Mines from 2012-15, Collins led the Hardrockers to winning seasons in 2013 and 2015, the last being just its third in the past 30 years. During his four years at SDSM, Collins notched 16 victories to become the sixth-winningest coach in program history.

Under Collins' direction in 2014, South Dakota School of Mines set single-season school records with 5,282 total yards, 3,540 passing yards and 286 first downs and led all of college football in red zone efficiency. SDSM also set single-game school records with 674 total yards vs. William Jewell, 481 passing yards vs. Northwestern and 34 first downs vs. Southwest Baptist. Furthermore, SDSM set the single-season school record for points scored with 386 during the 2013 campaign.

As members of the Great Northwest Athletic Conference in 2014 and 2015, South Dakota School of Mines had 14 all-conference honorees under Collins, highlighted by quarterback Trent McKinney, who twice earned first-team honors and was named the conference's Newcomer of the Year in 2014. During his first season at SDSM, McKinney set single-game school records with 535 total yards, 481 passing yards and 36 completions vs. Azusa Pacific, as those 535 total yards were also a GNAC single-game record.

McKinney also rushed for a school-record 206 yards by a quarterback and passed for 297 yards in setting a then-GNAC single-game record for total offense with 503 yards in a 62-44 win vs. William Jewell in 2014 as he rushed for four touchdowns and threw for two more. McKinney also set single-season school records with 3,666 total yards, 2,974 passing yards, 242 completions and 24 touchdown passes in 2014.

Collins also mentored a pair of record-setting kickers at South Dakota School of Mines in Devon Jones and Koltin Jelden. In 2013, Jones set single-season school records with 42 extra points made and 72 points scored, and made a school-record 53-yard field goal. In 2012, Jelden set the single-season school record for punting average at 41.6 yards per kick.

Along with all the success South Dakota School of Mines had on the field under Collins, the Hardrockers

were just as successful in the classroom as seven players earned GNAC All-Academic Honors in 2015.

Prior to his head coaching stint at South Dakota School of Mines, Collins served as the assistant head coach and special teams coordinator at Portland State in 2011, where he coached placekicker Zach Brown, who was named a first-team All-American by *The Associated Press*, the Walter Camp Foundation, the American Football Coaches Association and the Sports Network.

During the 2011 season, Brown made 24-of-27 field goals (.889) and ranked first in the nation in field goals made per game (2.18) and tied for eighth nationally in points per game (9.18). Along with Brown, Collins also coached punter Thomas Duyndam to honorable mention all-Big Sky Conference honors in 2011.

Prior to Portland State, Collins spent three seasons (2008-10) at Central Washington as the special teams coordinator and linebacker/defensive line coach. At CWU, Collins coached an All-American and two-time first-team all-GNAC kicker in Garrett Rolsma, as well as first-team all-conference kick returners Courtney Smith (2008) and Jerome Williams (2009).

Collins has also had coaching stops at Southern Oregon in 2007 (defensive coordinator), Idaho State from 2005-06 (linebackers coach), Western Washington from 2003-04 (linebackers coach), South Dakota School of Mines in 2002 (defensive/special teams coordinator) and Western Oregon from 1998-2001 (special teams coordinator and linebackers coach).

In addition, he spent time in Europe on the coaching staff of the Vienna Vikings (Austria) European League football team as the defensive coordinator and interim head coach from 1999-2001.

While the special teams coordinator at Western Washington from 2003-04, Collins coached punter Mike Koenen, who went on to play for 10 seasons in the NFL with the Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Collins played college football at Western Oregon from 1993-97 as a linebacker, graduating with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1998 and then a master's degree in education in 2001.

Collins, a native of Sutherlin, Ore., and his wife, Mandi, have four daughters, Kayla (14), Mackenzie (12), Kylee (6) and Mackenna (4).

Steve Farmer, who has 18 years of coaching experience including nine seasons as an offensive coordinator, is in his second season as Utah State's offensive line coach.

In his first season at Utah State in 2016, Farmer helped coach an Aggie offense that recorded its eighth-straight 2,000-yard rushing season. Farmer also coached three offensive linemen to all-Mountain West honors in Austin Albrecht, Jake Simonich and Austin Stephens. Following the completion of their collegiate careers, Simonich signed an NFL free agent contract with the Houston Texans and Stephens signed an NFL free agent contract with the Carolina Panthers.

Prior to his appointment at Utah State, Farmer spent the past six seasons as the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Louisiana-Monroe, coaching the offensive line and tight ends.

During his six years at Louisiana-Monroe, Farmer mentored 17 offensive players who earned various all-Sun Belt Conference honors including quarterback Kolton Browning, who was named a *College Football News* Freshman All-American in 2010 and the Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player of the Year as a junior in 2012, as he helped the Warhawks to eight wins and an appearance in the Independence Bowl, their first since transitioning to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level in 1995. During the 2012 season, Louisiana-Monroe set or tied 45 school records.

As a freshman, Browning tied the Louisiana-Monroe record for touchdown passes in a game (5) and consecutive games with 200-plus yards passing (8). Browning finished his career ranking first all-time in school history in passing yards (10,263), pass completions (951), pass attempts (1,577) and touchdown passes (81).

Prior to his six years at Louisiana-Monroe, Farmer spent the 2009 season as the offensive coordinator at Illinois State.

From 2004-08, Farmer also coached at Louisiana-Monroe as the offensive line coach for three seasons and as the offensive coordinator during his final two years. In Farmer's first season at the helm of the ULM offense (2007), the Warhawks posted their highest points-per-game average (23.5) since moving to NCAA FBS status in 1994. ULM also posted the sixth-highest yards-per-game average (385.7) in school history. The Warhawks finished the season ranked 16th in the NCAA in rushing (209.0 ypg) and 31st in fewest sacks allowed (1.5 pg).

Farmer led one of the best offensive lines in the history of the Louisiana-Monroe football program in 2007 as they paved the way for Calvin Dawson, a two-time Sun Belt Conference rushing champion and ULM's all-time rushing leader with 3,378 yards, to his best season as a Warhawk as he rushed for 1,414 yards.

In 2006, the Louisiana-Monroe offensive line ranked fifth nationally, and first in the Sun Belt Conference, with only 13

sacks allowed on the year. The 2005 Warhawk offensive line allowed quarterback Steven Jyles the opportunity to earn Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year honors and led ULM to a Sun Belt Conference Championship. ULM allowed just eight sacks on the season, which ranked third nationally, and only one in Sun Belt Conference action.

In 2004, Farmer's first season with the Warhawks, ULM added 41 yards per game to its offense and only allowed seven sacks, the lowest total in the Sun Belt Conference and second-fewest in the nation.

Farmer came to Louisiana-Monroe from Eastern Michigan, where the offensive line helped tailback Anthony Sherrell run for 1,531 yards, setting an EMU single-season rushing record.

Prior to Eastern Michigan, Farmer was the offensive line coach at Eastern Illinois, where in two years his lines allowed just 17 quarterback sacks and helped EIU average over 35 points per game. He tutored eight all-Ohio Valley Conference linemen in those two seasons as the Panthers won the 2001 and 2002 OVC titles and advanced to the NCAA I-AA playoffs both seasons.

Farmer spent four years at Illinois State, two as a player and two more as an assistant coach. He coached the ISU defensive tackles in 1999 and tight ends in 2000. In 1999, ISU reached the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Semifinals.

Farmer played center for Illinois State from 1997-98, and was a member of the Redbirds' 1998 FCS Playoff team. He earned first-team all-Missouri Valley Football Conference honors in 1998 and graduated from ISU in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Farmer began his collegiate playing career at one of the most successful junior college programs in the country, Northeastern Oklahoma A&M.

Farmer and his wife, Amy, have a daughter, Rebekah (14), and a son, Luke (12).

Luke Wells is in his fifth season as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Utah State. This season, Wells will coach in the inside receivers and tight ends after serving as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2016, and the co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach from 2013-15.

In his first four years at Utah State, the Aggies have played in three bowl games and notched bowl wins against No. 24 Northern Illinois (21-14) in the 2013 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl and against UTEP (21-6) in the 2014 Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

As co-offensive coordinator in 2016, Wells helped Utah State's offense record its eighth-straight 2,000-yard rushing season. Wells also mentored one of the best tight ends in school history in Wyatt Houston, who earned honorable mention all-Mountain West honors as a senior and finished his career with 86 receptions for 933 yards and nine touchdowns, all of which rank second all-time in school history for a tight end. Following his collegiate career, Houston signed an NFL free agent contract with the Carolina Panthers.

During the 2015 season, Houston ranked fourth on the team with 25 receptions for 307 yards and three touchdowns.

In 2014, Utah State's tight end combination of Jefferson Court and Houston combined to catch 25 passes for 204 yards (8.2 ypr) with five touchdowns. Houston finished the year ranking fifth on the team in both receptions (19) and yards (178), while Court ranked tied for second on the team in receiving touchdowns (3).

Following the 2014 season, Court was the 37th player selected in the 2015 Canadian Football League Draft by the Ottawa Redblacks.

During the 2013 season, Wells was part of an Aggie offense that set school records for pass completions (297), total offensive plays (1,073), touchdown passes (30) and first downs (310), while its 445 points scored and 481 pass attempts both rank second all-time. Furthermore, USU's 56 total touchdowns rank third all-time and its 31.7 points per game average ranks fifth all-time in school history.

Utah State's tight ends also set the single-season school record for touchdown receptions in 2013 with nine as D.J. Tialavea and Keegan Andersen each had three, while Houston had two and Kyler Fackrell had one. The previous record was seven set in 1993.

As tight ends coach, Wells mentored Tialavea, who participated in the 2014 NFL Combine and signed a free agent contract with the Jacksonville Jaguars of the NFL. Tialavea is currently with the Atlanta Falcons.

Prior to joining Utah State's staff, Wells spent four seasons at Iowa State (2009-12), working with the tight ends for two years after coaching the wide receivers during his first two seasons. Wells also helped the Cyclones to back-to-back bowl games as they played in the 2011 New Era Pinstripe Bowl against Rutgers and the 2012 Auto Zone Liberty Bowl against Tulsa.

At Iowa State, Wells mentored Cyclone tight end Ernst Brun, who earned honorable mention all-Big 12 honors as he caught 26 passes for 330 yards (25.4 ypg) with six touchdowns. Brun was also named ISU's Offensive Player of the Game at the Auto Zone Liberty Bowl as he had four receptions for 102 yards, which included

a 69-yard touchdown. Brun was invited to the Oakland Raiders camp following his senior season.

As wide receivers coach at Iowa State during the 2009 and 2010 seasons, Wells coached Darius Darks and Darius Reynolds, who finished their careers combining for 208 receptions for 2,396 yards and 16 touchdowns. Wells also coached Josh Lenz who had 96 receptions for 1,213 yards and 10 touchdowns during his ISU career. Lenz spent four years in the NFL.

Prior to his stint at Iowa State, Wells spent six years at Louisiana-Monroe serving as an offensive graduate assistant in 2003 before being elevated to a full-time assistant coach from 2004-08. During his last two years at ULM, Wells served as the Warhawks' recruiting coordinator, as well as wide receivers coach, and helped bring in the highest-rated recruiting classes ever.

The Louisiana-Monroe offense posted the highest scoring average in the school's NCAA FBS history in 2008 as Anthony McCall set a school record for freshman touchdown receptions that season.

Wells took over the wide receivers at ULM in 2007 and mentored all-Sun Belt second-team selection La-Gregory Sapp, who led the league in yards per reception with 19.6 on 40 catches for 784 yards. In all, Warhawk receivers caught 16 touchdowns that year.

In 2004 and 2005, Wells worked with the tight ends and all-Sun Belt first-teamer Joey Trappey, who was the top receiving tight end in the conference with 42 receptions for 425 yards.

Prior to ULM, Wells coached wide receivers at Denton High School in Texas, helping his team win the 2002 bi-district title.

Before that, Wells was a student assistant at Oklahoma from 1999-2001 as the Sooners won the 2000 Big 12 Conference crown and national title.

Wells earned his bachelor's degree from Oklahoma in secondary education in 2002 and did graduate work at ULM. He is married to the former Coby Groves and the couple has one son, Walker (10), and one daughter, Kinsley (8). His brother, Matt, is USU's head football coach.





WAQA DAMUNI
ASSISTANT AD / FOOTBALL OPERATIONS
Utah State, 1998 • Fifth Year

Waqa Damuni (Wonga Da-moo-knee) is in his fifth season at Utah State, serving as an Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations. In his current role, Damuni oversees the day-to-day operations of the football program.

His responsibilities include the overall management of the football budget, team travel, bowl game coordination and community outreach. Other duties include game day management, the coordination and planning of team events and special projects related to the football program.

Damuni, a former tight end and three-year letterwinner at Utah State from 1996-98, helped the Aggies win back-to-back Big West Conference championships, including a trip to the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl in 1997.

Damuni returned to Utah State after spending five years as the Director of Academic Support for Razorback student-athletes at Arkansas.

He went on to earn a master's degree in business information systems in 2005. He then graduated from the NCAA Ethnic Minority Leadership Institute in 2010.

A native of Hale, Hawaii, Damuni is married to the former Val Tonga of Millbrae, Calif. They have seven children - Emosi, Levani, Junior, Jovesa, Lavinia, Lusiana and Damien.

Second Year

Brad Kragthorpe is in his second year with Utah State's football program as a graduate assistant coach for the Aggies' offense. In his role, Kragthorpe assists the offensive coaches with daily football operations, primarily working with the wide receivers and outside receivers coach Jovon Bouknight.

Kragthorpe came to Utah State after spending four seasons at LSU, where he played quarterback and was the holder on special teams, helping the Tigers amass a 27-11 overall record and trips to the Outback, Music City and Texas Bowls.

Kragthorpe served as LSU's holder for all field goals and point-after touchdowns in 2014 and 2015. During his senior season in 2015, he was part of one of college football's best fake field goals that year when he threw a backward pass to kicker Trent Domingue, who raced 16 yards for what proved to be the game-winning touchdown in a 28-21 victory over Florida. The play drew national attention and appeared on SportsCenter as one of the Top 10 plays in college football that week.

As a junior in 2014, Kragthorpe played in all 13 games with no starts. He saw action at quarterback in one game, throwing an 11-yard touchdown pass in the Tigers' 63-7 win over New Mexico State.

He finished his career at LSU having appeared in 25 games and was a two-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll in 2014 and 2015.

Kragthorpe spent his senior season of high school at Holland Hall in Tulsa, Okla., where he completed 126-of-199 passes (63 percent) for 1,738 yards and 28 touchdowns for the Dutch. Holland Hall went 10-1 with its lone loss coming in the Southwest Preparatory Conference title game. Kragthorpe earned all-conference honors following the season.

Kragthorpe's father, Steve, is on the football staff at LSU as the special assistant to the head coach/chief of staff, and is the former head coach at Tulsa and Louisville. His grandfather, Dave, is in his fourth season as the special assistant to the head coach at Utah State. Brad Kragthorpe's older brother, Chris, recently joined the LSU staff as an offensive analyst.

The native of Tulsa graduated from LSU in May of 2015 with a degree in business.

Fourth Year

Naufahu Tahī (pronounced Now-fuh-who Tuh-hee) is in his second year with Utah State serving as an offensive administrative assistant, and fourth year with the program as he also spent the 2013 and 2014 seasons as an offensive administrative assistant.

In his role, Tahī assists the offensive coaches with daily football operations, primarily working with USU offensive coordinator David Yost, and specifically working with the running backs along with special teams coordinator Mark Tommerdahl, who also serves as the team's running backs coach.

Prior to joining Utah State's football staff, Tahī spent the 2012 season as the running backs coach at Granger High School in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Before entering the coaching profession, Tahī spent six years in the National Football League with the Cincinnati Bengals, Minnesota Vikings and Jacksonville Jaguars.

Tahī played collegiate football at BYU and led the Cougars in rushing as true freshman in 1999 with 445 yards. As a senior in 2005, Tahī had a career-best 872 rushing yards and scored eight touchdowns (6 rushing, 2 receiving).

A native of Fontana, Calif., Tahī prepped at Granger High School in Salt Lake City, Utah where he was a Prep Star All-American and named the *USA Today* Player of the Year as a senior. He earned all-state honors as both a junior and senior, and was a three-time all-league performer. For his prep career, Tahī rushed for over 5,700 yards and set the state record for rushing touchdowns.

Tahī, who served a two-year LDS Church Mission in Jacksonville, Fla., graduated from Utah State in 2015 with a bachelor's degree in sociology. He has five children: Maile (11), Lincoln (9), Jaden (6), Joscelynn (5) and Takai (2).

Cannova, who is originally from Wheaton, Ill., prepped at Benet Academy in Lisle, Ill., earning all-conference honors as an offensive lineman following his senior season.

Aman Anand (Ah-mun Ah-nund) is in his first year with Utah State's football program as a graduate assistant coach for the Aggies' defense. In his role, Anand assists the defensive and special teams coaches with daily football operations, primarily working with the defensive line and co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach Frank Maile, along with special teams coordinator Mark Tommerdahl. Anand will also help with the scout team, along with assisting with scouting reports and playbook responsibilities.

Prior to his current position at Utah State, Anand spent the 2015 season as a defensive graduate assistant at Northern Arizona, working with the defensive line and assisting the defensive staff with scouting reports, opponent analysis, and operations.

Anand also spent three years (2012-14) as a student assistant coach at South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, where he worked with the defensive backs and special teams.

Gustavo Manzanares (pronounced Gu-sta-vo Man-zan-ares) is in his first year with Utah State's football program as a graduate assistant coach for the Aggies' defense. In his role, Manzanares assists the defensive coaches with daily football operations, primarily working with the defensive backs and secondary coach Julius Brown.

Prior to coming to Utah State, Manzanares spent four seasons as the secondary coach at City College of San Francisco, where he had seven defensive backs earn Division I scholarships, and a total of 16 defensive backs earn scholarships to four-year schools, in addition to one NFL Draftee -- Shalom Luani to the Oakland Raiders.

At City College of San Francisco in 2013, Manzanares helped the Rams finish first in the state with 25 interceptions and eight defensive scores, and first in passing yards allowed with an average of 176.8 per game. CCSF also ended the season as San Francisco Community Bowl Champions.

In 2014, City College of San Francisco limited opponents to 16.0 points per game, while intercepting 15 passes and scoring eight defensive touchdowns. CCSF's defense also limited opponents to just 165.9 passing yards per game as the team finished as the California State Champion runner-up.

In 2015, City College of San Francisco won the California State and National Champions. Defensively, the Rams limited opponents to 17.4 points a game as it had four defensive scores and allowed just 207.8 passing yards per game, while intercepting 23 passes.

In 2016, City College played in the San Francisco Community College Bowl.

Prior to City College of San Francisco, Manzanares spent the 2011 and 2012 seasons at West Catholic Athletic Leagues St. Ignatius College Preparatory (San Francisco) as the defensive backs coach, passing game coordinator, and strength & conditioning coach. In 2012, St. Ignatius won the CIF Division I Central Coast Section Championship and advance to the 2012 CIF Division I Northern California Championship.

Manzanares played defensive back for City College of San Francisco as a member of the 2007 National Championship team.

Following his career at City College of San Francisco, Manzanares transferred to San José State, where he received his bachelor's degree in business management. Manzanares then earned his master's in communications management from USC.

Uani 'Unga (Wah-knee Oo-nga) is in his first year with Utah State's football program as a defensive administrative assistant. In his role, 'Unga assists the defensive coaches with daily football operations, primarily working with the linebackers and special teams, and working with co-defensive coordinators Frank Maile and Kendrick Shaver, and special teams coordinator Mark Tommerdahl.

'Unga comes to Utah State after spending the 2016 football season as a volunteer coach at Orem (Utah) High School, working with the linebackers and special teams.

'Unga began his collegiate career at Oregon State (2009-10) before transferring to BYU, where he redshirted in 2011 and then played in 2012 and 2013. As a senior, he led the nation with 143 tackles (62-solo, 81-assist). During his two-year BYU career, he recorded 171 tackles (78-solo, 93-assist), which included 1.0 sacks and 10.5 tackles for loss, while adding three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception, to go along with four pass breakups and one quarterback hurry.

Following his collegiate career, 'Unga signed an NFL free agent contract with the New York Giants and spent three seasons with the franchise. He made his first career start in the NFL against the Dallas Cowboys in 2015 and intercepted a Tony Romo pass during the game.

'Unga has two older brothers who also played college football as Paul was a defensive end at Arizona State and J.J. was an offensive guard at Midwestern State. 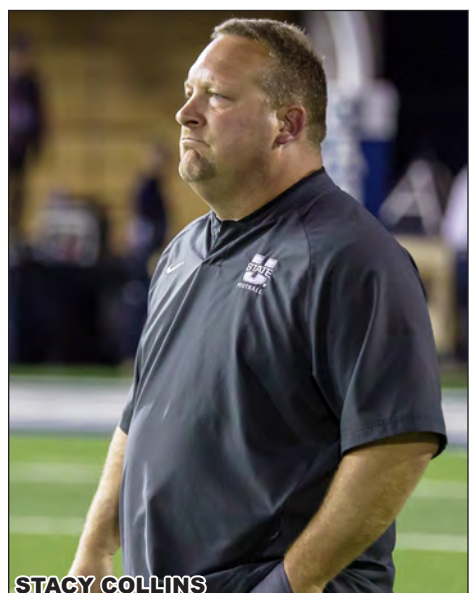

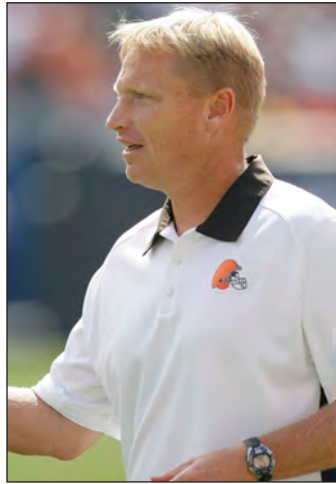

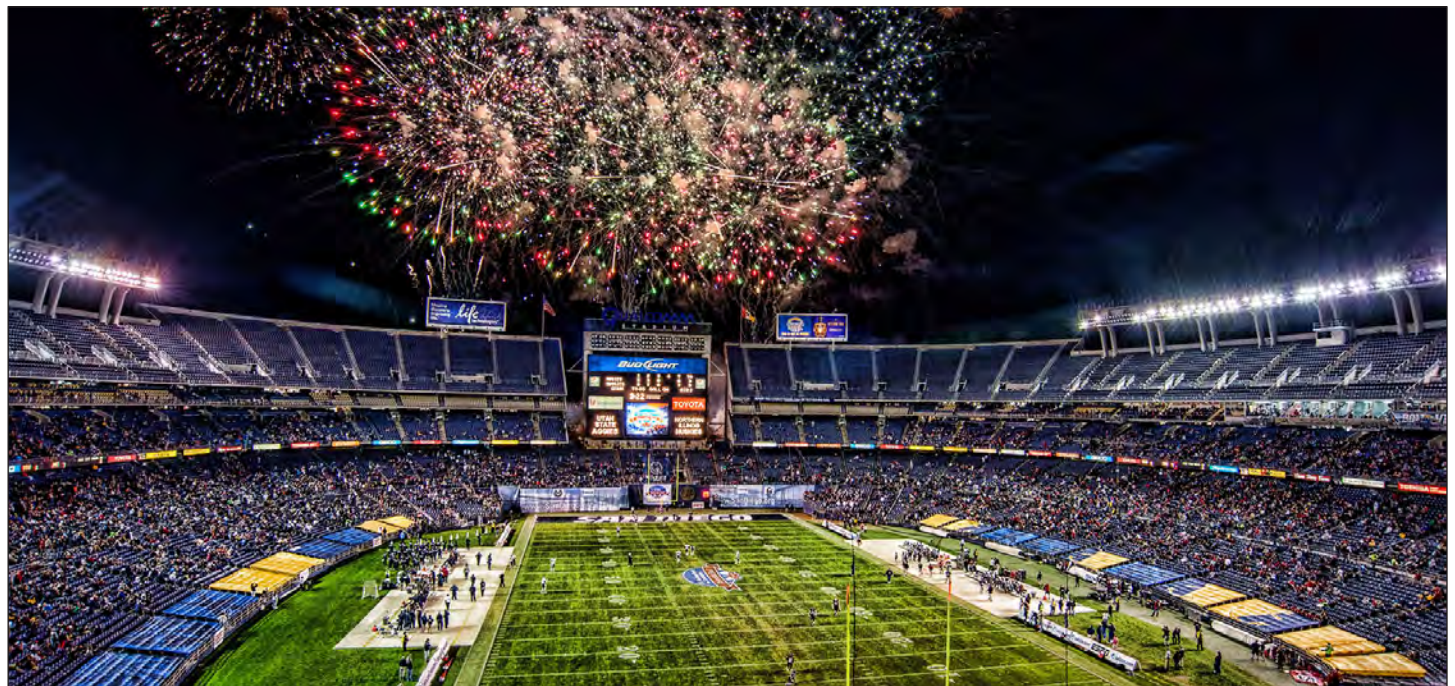

LOGAN, Utah - Utah State senior RB Devante Mays rushed for a career-high 208 yards and three first-half touchdowns to help the Aggies kick off the 2016 campaign with a dominating 45-6 victory against Weber State on Thursday, Sept. 1, 2016, on Merlin Olsen Field at renovated Maverik Stadium.

Mays became the first Aggie to rush for more than 200 yards in a game since Kerwynn Williams gained 235 yards in the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl against Toledo.

Utah State (1-0, 0-0 Mountain West) finished with 528 yards of total offense, including 428 on the ground. Junior QB Kent Myers was 11-of-17 passing for 100 yards. His favorite targets on the night were senior TE Wyatt Houston and freshman WR Rayshad Lewis, who both caught three passes for 32 and 26 yards, respectively.

Four different running backs scored rushing touchdowns for the Aggies. Mays had three of them, while sophomore Justen Hervey and juniors Tony Lindsey, Jr., and LaJuan Hunt, each had one.

Weber State (0-1, 0-0 Big Sky) finished with 245 yards of total offense, but only 89 yards in the second half.

Playing in his first-ever game, senior Leki Uasike started at linebacker for Utah State and recorded a team-best nine tackles. Fellow linebackers Anthony Williams, a senior, and Alex Huerta, a junior, added seven stops apiece. Redshirt junior BS Dallin Leavitt added six tackles and the game's lone turnover on an interception.

Utah State found the end zone on just its second play from scrimmage as Mays took the direct snap and scored on an 18-yard touchdown run to give the Aggies a 7-0 lead with 12:41 left in the first quarter.

Mays added two more touchdown runs of 18 and a career-best 66 yards, respectively, to help Utah State, which has defeated the Wildcats eight straight times, build a 21-0 lead with 14:35 to go in the second quarter.

Weber State cut into the lead just before the half when sophomore RB Treshawn Garrett scored on a 1-yard touchdown run with 26 seconds remaining in the second quarter. The Wildcats failed to convert on the extra point, though, when they bobbled the snap, and went into the locker room trailing 21-6. Garrett rushed for 96 yards on 22 carries.

The Aggies took the second-half kickoff and marched 70 yards in seven plays, capped by Hunt's 9-yard touchdown run to make it 28-6 with 11:59 left in the third quarter.

Following an interception - the first of his career - by Leavitt on a third-down play, USU turned the game's only turnover into three points. Senior PK Brock Warren capped the 11-play drive with a 31-yard field goal to give the Aggies a 31-6 lead with 5:19 remaining in the third.

Lindsey, Jr., recorded his first-career touchdown when he ran untouched into the end zone from a career-long 35 yards, giving USU a 38-6 lead early in the fourth quarter. The junior finished with 67 yards rushing on 11 carries, both career highs.

Hervey also made his presence felt on the ground as he scored on a career-long 80-yard touchdown run with 7:50 to go, giving the Aggies a 45-6 lead over the Wildcats. Hervey rushed for 84 yards on three carries.

Utah State, which went 1-for-15 on third-down conversions in last year's season-opening win against Southern Utah, was 9-for-12 this time.

Junior QB Kent Myers (2) was 25-of-37 passing for 204 yards with one touchdown and one interception in Utah State's 45-7 loss at USC. Myers also rushed for minus three yards on seven carries.

LOS ANGELES, Calif. - Senior TE Wyatt Houston caught his first touchdown pass of the season and redshirt junior BS Dallin Leavitt recorded a career-high 15 tackles, in Utah State's 45-7 loss to Southern Cal on Saturday, Sept. 10, 2016, at Memorial Coliseum.

Houston's touchdown grab, a six-yarder from junior QB Kent Myers on the final play of the third quarter, pulled the Aggies to within 31-7. Houston tied his career high with four receptions for 33 yards, while Myers was 25-of-37 for 204 yards and the one touchdown, to go along with an interception.

Sophomore WR Ron'quavion Tarver and freshman WR Rayshad Lewis each finished with a career-high four receptions for the Aggies (1-1, 0-0 Mountain West). Tarver led Utah State with 37 yards receiving and Lewis finished with 34.

USC QB Max Browne was 23-of-30 for 182 yards and two touchdowns on the day, while fellow signal caller Sam Darnold was 5-of-7 for 62 yards and two touchdowns. The Trojans (1-1, 0-0 Pac-12) tallied 422 yards of total offense and limited the Aggies to 253.

A scary moment occurred late in the first quarter when senior CB Daniel Gray was injured while making a tackle. He was carted off the field on a stretcher, but gave the announced crowd of 62,487 the thumb's-up sign. After the game was over, Gray was being greeted by his teammates as he stood just outside of the Aggies' locker room.

Leavitt, who was also shaken up late in the first half, recorded 10 of his tackles during the first 30 minutes of play. He also had a pass breakup.

USC struck first following a blocked punt by Michael Pittman, Jr. Quinton Powell recovered it for the Trojans and returned it nine yards to the Aggies' 6-yard line. Three plays later, Browne threw a 3-yard touchdown pass to JuJu Smith-Schuster to give the hosts a 7-0 lead with 11:50 remaining in the first quarter.

Both teams then traded missed field goals as Utah State's Brock Warren missed a 37-yarder wide left, while USC's Matt Boormeester missed one of his own from 47 yards out wide right.

The Trojans led 21-0 at halftime following a couple of second-quarter touchdown passes by Darnold and Browne. Deontay Burnett hauled in a 13-yarder from Darnold with 8:00 left until intermission, then Browne found Steven Mitchell, Jr. from two yards out with 19 seconds remaining on the clock. The second of those two scores came after Myers' pass was intercepted by Leon McQuay III.

Prior to Myers' first interception of the season, the defense created a turnover of its own when sophomore FS Jontrell Rocquemore picked off a pass by Browne.

USC increased its lead to 31-0 in the third quarter courtesy of two special teams scores when Boormeester kicked a 20-yard field goal and Adoree' Jackson returned a punt 77 yards for a touchdown.

Following Houston's touchdown grab, the eighth of his career, the Trojans capped the game's scoring when Smith-Schuster caught a 15-yard touchdown pass from Darnold and Aca' Cedric Ware scored on a 2-yard touchdown run.

Several Aggie defenders had career days including sophomore LB Derek Larsen, who had seven tackles, including 2.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack, all of which were career-highs. Junior CB Jalen Davis also had a sack and finished with six tackles.

Junior RB Tonny Lindsey, Jr. (4) rushed for a career-high 98 yards on a career-best 19 carries, and scored a career-high two touchdowns on runs of 28 and one yard, in Utah State's 34-20 home win against Arkansas State. Lindsey also caught one pass for 12 yards against ASU.

LOGAN, Utah - Junior RB Tonny Lindsey Jr. ran for a career-high 98 yards and two touchdowns as Utah State defeated Arkansas State 34-20 on Friday, Sept. 16, 2016, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

Junior QB Kent Myers completed 11-of-25 passes for 136 yards and one touchdown, to go along with an interception, to help the Aggies (2-1, 0-0 Mountain West) score the first 24 points of the game. His favorite targets on the night were senior TE Wyatt Houston and sophomore WR Ron'quavion Tarver, who both caught three passes for 28 and 24 yards, respectively.

For Houston, it was the third consecutive game he has led the Aggies in receiving. Furthermore, he has caught at least one pass in nine straight contests.

Warren Wand rushed for 61 yards and one touchdown on 15 carries for Arkansas State (0-3, 0-0 Sun Belt), which had its three-game winning streak snapped against Utah State.

J.D. Houston kicked a pair of fourth-quarter field goals from 23 and 22 yards out, respectively, to pull the Red Wolves to within 27-20 with 7:28 to go.

However, that's as close as they would get the rest of the way. Lindsey shut the door on Arkansas State for good when he scored on a 1-yard touchdown run with 29 seconds left, capping a 13-play, 91-yard drive that took 6:53 off the clock.

Utah State senior LB Brock Carmen led all defenders with a career-best 12 tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks. He also had two quarterback hurries. The Aggies forced three turnovers on the night as senior DE Siua Taufa recovered a fumble, while junior BS Dallin Leavitt and sophomore FS Jontrell Rocquemore each had an interception.

Utah State took advantage of stellar first-half field position to build a 24-0 lead by the break. In the first quarter alone, the Aggies had three drives start inside Arkansas State territory (9-, 37- and 25-yard lines).

The Aggies opened the scoring when Tarver hauled in his first career touchdown pass, a 4-yarder from Myers, to make it 7-0 with 11:29 left in the first quarter.

The defense helped set up the next score when Taufa recovered a fumble by Arkansas State quarterback Chad Voytik, returning it 10 yards to the Red Wolves' 25-yard line. Taufa then lateraled the ball behind his back to senior FS Devin Centers, who proceeded to make his way down to the 18.

Senior PK Brock Warren gave the Aggies a 10-0 lead when he drilled a 38-yard field goal with 4:51 left in the quarter. Warren later added a 30-yarder to give the hosts a 27-14 lead late in the third quarter.

Following another takeaway by the Utah State defense, this time courtesy of a Rocquemore interception – the second straight week he's had a pick. The Aggies took over on the Red Wolves' 25 and needed just four plays to find the end zone. Junior QB Damion Hobbs kept it on a keeper and scored from a yard out, making it 17-0.

Prior to Hobbs' touchdown run, Myers was injured on a shoulder-to-helmet hit at the goal line. He eventually walked off the field under his own power and returned to the game on the Aggies' very next series.

Utah State opened its 24-0 cushion when Lindsey took it untouched to the house from 28 yards out.

The Red Wolves only had 92 yards in the first half, but recorded 152 yards and two touchdowns in the third quarter to get back into the game.

Junior QB Kent Myers (2) was 29-of-47 passing for 360 yards with one touchdown and one interception in Utah State's 27-20 home loss to Air Force. For Myers, those 29 completions are a career-high, while his 360 passing yards are the second-most in his career. Myers also rushed 13 times against the Falcons and scored on a 1-yard run.

LOGAN, Utah - Sophomore WR Ron'quavion Tarver had his best game as an Aggie, but it still wasn't enough as Utah State lost its Homecoming game to Air Force, 27-20, on Saturday, Sept. 24, 2016, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

Tarver caught a career-best nine passes for a career-high 143 yards, including a career-long of 42 yards. His final catch of the night, a 35-yarder, set up junior QB Kent Myers' 1-yard touchdown run on third-and-goal that pulled Utah State (2-2, 0-1 MW) to within 27-20 with 32 seconds left in the Mountain West opener for both teams.

However, the Falcons (3-0, 1-0 MW) recovered the ensuing on-side kick and proceeded to run out the clock. Quarterback Nate Romine was 5-of-13 for 113 yards and a touchdown for Air Force.

Utah State finished the game with 414 yards of total offense (372 passing, 42 rushing) as compared to 326 total yards for Air Force (213 rushing, 113 passing). The difference in the game was turnovers, as the Falcons scored 14 points off two Aggie miscues and did not commit a turnover.

In all, Utah State's defense held the nation's top-ranked rushing offense to 219.5 yards below its season average as the Falcons entered the game averaging 432.5 rushing yards per game to lead the nation. AFA also ranked fifth nationally in total offense (566.5 ypg) entering the game, but was held to just 326 yards.

Myers completed a career-best 29 passes on a career-high-tying 47 attempts for 360 yards and a 43-yard touchdown pass to freshman WR Rayshad Lewis that gave Utah State a 7-3 lead with 6:53 left in the first quarter.

For Lewis, who caught three passes on the night for 52 yards, it was his first career touchdown. Fellow wide receiver, senior Andrew Rodriguez, had a career-best seven receptions for 64 yards.

Defensively, a pair of Aggie linebackers shined for Utah State as junior Alex Huerta recorded a game- and career-best 13 tackles, while senior Anthony Williams added a career-high 11 stops, including 1.0 sacks, to go along with two quarterback hurries and a forced fumble. Junior CB Jalen Davis also had a career-high in tackles with eight, which included a career-high-tying 2.0 tackles for loss, to go along with a forced fumble and pass breakup. Redshirt senior NG Travis Seefeldt was the fourth Aggie defender to have a career-night as he posted a career-high seven tackles, including 0.5 tackles for loss.

Utah State trailed 17-10 after the Falcons drove 88 yards in six plays, capped by a 12-yard touchdown pass from Romine to Ryan Reffitt with just 13 seconds left in the second quarter.

Defensive back Roland Ladipo helped set up the score when he intercepted Myers' pass in the red zone. The Falcons also cashed in on a fumble by Myers in the fourth quarter, turning the takeaway into seven points and a 27-13 lead with 2:57 to go.

After Lewis' first-quarter score, senior PK Brock Warren made it 10-3 in the second when he booted a 23-yard field goal. Warren added another 23-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to pull the Aggies to within 17-13 with 12:02 remaining.

Utah State finished the game converting 10-of-20 third down attempts.

Junior QB Kent Myers (2) was 29-of-50 passing for 287 yards with one touchdown in Utah State's 21-10 road loss to 24th-ranked Boise State. Myers, who also had 47 rushing yards on 12 carries, had a career-high in attempts and tied his career-high in completions.

BOISE, Idaho - Utah State's defense did something no other team has been able to accomplish this season against No. 24 Boise State, which was hold the Broncos to less than 30 points and fewer than 400 yards of total offense.

Unfortunately for the Aggies, Boise State's defense was also up to the challenge. Quarterback Brett Rypien passed for 163 yards and two touchdowns and the Broncos' defense made sure it held up in a hard-fought 21-10 victory over the Aggies on Saturday, Oct. 1, 2016, at Albertsons Stadium.

Utah State dropped to 2-3 overall and 0-2 in the Mountain West, while Boise State improved to 4-0 on the season and 1-0 in conference play.

Redshirt senior LB **Anthony Williams** had seven tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss, and senior CB **Daniel Gray** added a career-high-tying six stops as the Aggies limited the Broncos to a season-low 384 yards of total offense and 17 points below their average.

Junior QB **Kent Myers** was 29-of-50 passing for 287 yards and one touchdown for the Aggies, who were limited to 358 total yards. His completions tied his career high, while his attempts were a career best.

Myers' lone touchdown pass of the night came with 7:41 remaining in the game, a 30-yarder to senior WR **Andrew Rodriguez** that pulled Utah State to within 21-10. Rodriguez finished with six catches for a career-high 89 yards.

Freshman WR **Rayshad Lewis** led Utah State with a career-best seven receptions for a career-high 82 yards, while senior TE **Wyatt Houston** finished with three catches for 41 yards to extend his streak of catching a pass to 11 straight games.

Since being held without a catch in the season opener against Weber State, sophomore WR **Ron'quavion Tarver** has now caught a team-best 21 passes for 233 yards and a touchdown. Against the Broncos, he hauled in five receptions for 29 yards.

Myers also led the Aggies in rushing with 47 yards on 12 carries, including a season-long rush of 45 yards to open the third quarter.

Boise State WR Cedrick Wilson threw a touchdown pass and caught one, helping the Broncos open a 21-3 lead with 12:03 to go in the fourth quarter.

Wilson and the Broncos struck first on his 61-yard touchdown pass to RB Jeremy McNichols on a trick play with 5:56 left in the first quarter.

The Aggies got on the board when senior PK **Brock Warren** booted a 28-yard field goal early in the second quarter to cut the deficit to 7-3. The 12-play, 45-yard drive was kept alive by a 2-yard run from junior RB **Tonny Lindsey, Jr.** on fourth-and-1 from the Boise State 31-yard line. Utah State eventually moved the ball down to the Broncos' 13, where it had it first-and-10, but the Aggies only gained two more yards after that and had to settle for Warren's field goal.

Utah State had a golden opportunity to put even more points on the board right before half after redshirt-freshman WR **Gerold Bright** recovered a muffed punt by Boise State on the Broncos' 25-yard line with 2:33 remaining in the second quarter.

The Aggies moved the ball down to the Boise State 9-yard line, but Myers was sacked on a third-and-5 play and USU had to settle for a 32-yard field goal try by Warren. Unfortunately for the Aggies, the senior missed wide left as time expired on the half.

FORT COLLINS, Colo. - Junior RB **Tonny Lindsey, Jr.** rushed for a career-high 137 yards and junior QB **Kent Myers** rushed for two touchdowns – both in the first half – but Utah State came up short in a 31-24 loss at Colorado State on Saturday, Oct. 8, 2016.

The Aggies fell to 2-4 overall and 0-3 in Mountain West play heading into their one and only bye week. With the win, the Rams improved to 3-3 and 1-1.

Utah State finished the game with 456 yards of offense (251 rushing, 205 passing) and Colorado State had 464 yards (240 passing, 224 rushing). For USU, those 456 yards are its second-most in a game this season. However, the 464 yards by Colorado State are the most by an Aggie opponent this season, as are the 224 rushing yards.

Utah State also committed two turnovers in the game with one fumble and one interception, and did not force a Colorado State turnover, marking the second time in the last three games that USU's defense has not recorded a takeaway.

Myers rushed for 50 yards and the two scores on 15 carries, while redshirt freshman WR **Gerold Bright** scored on a 41-yard run to give Utah State a 7-3 lead with 11:28 remaining in the first quarter.

After Colorado State QB Collin Hill threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to Olabisi Johnson to give the Rams a 10-7 lead, Myers scored from four yards out to put the Aggies back on top, 14-10 with 1:25 remaining in the first.

Utah State increased its lead to 21-10 with 11:15 left in the second quarter following a 14-yard touchdown run by Myers. Senior PK **Brock Warren** made it 24-10 at the break when he made a 36-yard field goal into the wind with 1:09 remaining on the clock. Sophomore WR **Ron'Quavion Tarver** helped set up the score with a 36-yard catch down the east sideline.

However, the Rams erased the Aggies' two-touchdown deficit in the third quarter as Michael Gallup caught a 60-yard touchdown pass from Hill and Izzy Matthews scored on a 1-yard touchdown run to knot the game at 24-apiece.

Colorado State went ahead for good courtesy of another touchdown run by Matthews, this time from 10 yards out, to make it 31-24 with 10:33 remaining in the game.

Matthews finished with 73 yards rushing on 23 carries. Hill was 14-of-25 for 203 yards and two touchdowns before leaving with an injury in the second half.

Freshman WR **Rayshad Lewis** led the Aggies in receiving with a career-high-tying seven catches for a career-best 106 yards.

Senior TE **Wyatt Houston** caught three passes for 23 yards and has now caught a pass in a team-leading 12 straight games.

Sophomore FS **Jontrell Rocquemore** led Utah State defensively with a career-high 10 tackles and redshirt senior NG **Travis Seefeldt** added nine stops and 2.0 tackles for loss, both career highs. Senior DE **Siu'a Taufa** also recorded a career high in tackles with five, which included 1.0 tackles for loss. Junior CB **Jalen Davis** added three tackles and a team-high two pass breakups as the Aggies posted five pass breakups overall.

Colorado State finished the game controlling the time of possession, 32:18 to 27:42. CSU was also 5-of-17 on third downs as compared to 7-of-16 for the Aggies.

Junior QB Kent Myers (2) was 17-of-29 passing for 188 yards and a season-high three touchdowns in Utah State's 38-20 home win against Fresno State. Myers also carried the ball eight times for 66 yards against the Bulldogs.

LOGAN, Utah - Junior QB Kent Myers passed for 188 yards and three touchdowns to three different receivers as Utah State won its first Mountain West game of the season with a 38-20 victory against Fresno State on Saturday, Oct. 22, 2016, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

Myers was 17-of-29 and threw touchdown passes of 21, 5 and 25 yards, respectively, to junior WR Braelon Roberts, senior TE Wyatt Houston and sophomore WR Ron'quavion Tarver. It is the first time this season and fifth time in his career Myers has thrown at least three touchdown passes in a game.

Houston led the Aggies (3-4, 1-3 MW), who snapped a three-game losing streak, with a career-high five catches for 43 yards. His 5-yard touchdown reception with 11:50 left in the third quarter gave the Aggies a 24-14 lead. Just 35 seconds into the fourth, Tarver pulled down a 25-yard touchdown catch in the back corner of the end zone to make it 31-17.

While senior RB Devante Mays returned from injury and played briefly, it was junior RB Tony Lindsey, Jr. that led Utah State's rushing attack with a career-high 23 carries for 90 yards. Myers added 66 yards on just eight carries.

Junior QB Damion Hobbs capped the Aggies' scoring output with a 4-yard touchdown run midway through the fourth quarter.

The Aggies finished with 392 yards of total offense, including 204 on the ground and 188 through the air. Defensively, senior FS Devin Centers and senior LB Leki Uasike had 10 tackles apiece for Utah State. Uasike had eight of his tackles in the first quarter alone. Sophomore LB Chase Christiansen added a career-high nine tackles, while redshirt freshman CB Cameron Haney recorded a career-high eight tackles to go along with a career-best two pass breakups.

Fresno State (1-7, 0-4) recorded 319 yards of offense. Quarterback Chason Virgil was 27-of-44 for 205 yards and a touchdown, while RB Dontel James rushed for 80 yards and a touchdown on 29 carries.

Kody Kroening kicked a 27- and 49-yard field goal for Fresno State, which lost for the fifth straight time.

Utah State opened the scoring when Roberts caught his first career touchdown pass, a 21-yarder from Myers with 10:23 left in the first quarter. Fresno State followed suit with a 15-play, 86-yard drive that resulted in a 3-yard touchdown run by James to tie the game at 7-apiece.

The Aggies went back in front for good thanks to a nice special teams play. Senior CB Jentz Painter came in untouched from the left side and blocked a punt, which was recovered by fellow senior CB Austin Cheney in the end zone for a touchdown to give Utah State a 14-7 lead with 6:22 remaining in the first half. Painter forced the Bulldogs to punt one play earlier as he sacked Virgil on a third-and-12 play.

A career-long 43-yard field goal by senior PK Brock Warren made it 17-7 for the Aggies with 3:45 to go. However, the Bulldogs went into the halftime break with momentum as Jared Rice caught a 1-yard touchdown pass from Virgil to pull Fresno State within three.

Junior QB Kent Myers (2) was 11-of-26 passing for 181 yards with one touchdown and one interception in Utah State's 40-13 home loss to San Diego State. Myers also carried the ball nine times for 26 yards and one touchdown against the Aztecs.

LOGAN, Utah - Utah State found the end zone on its first possession of the game and junior QB Kent Myers moved into the school's top-10 list for career touchdown passes, but the Aggies couldn't overcome 40 unanswered points scored by San Diego State in a 40-13 loss to the Aztecs on Friday, Oct. 28, 2016, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

Myers completed 11-of-26 passes for 181 yards and a 23-yard touchdown pass to junior WR Jaren Colston-Green midway through the fourth quarter. He is now tied with Travis Cox (2001-04) for 10th in career touchdown passes with 29.

Myers was also the Aggies' leading rusher on the day with 26 yards, including a 10-yard touchdown run that gave Utah State (3-5, 1-4 Mountain West) a 7-0 lead with 8:08 left in the first quarter.

San Diego State (7-1, 4-0) rushed for 400 yards on 57 carries. A pair of Aztecs eclipsed the century mark on the ground as Donnel Pumphrey rushed for 223 yards on 32 carries, while Juwan Washington added 137 yards and two scores. SDSU finished the game with 414 yards of total offense.

Utah State allowed just 14 yards passing, which is tied for the fourth-fewest given up by the Aggies and the fewest since allowing one yard to Colorado State in 1976.

Senior TE Wyatt Houston led the Aggies with three catches for 40 yards. He has now caught at least one pass in 14 straight games. Sophomore WR Ron'quavion Tarver also had three catches in the game for 28 yards, while Colston-Green tied his career high with two receptions for 30 yards. Junior WR Alex Byers also had a career long catch of 43 yards in the game.

In his return from a foot injury, junior BS Dallin Leavitt recorded a game-high nine tackles and a quarterback hurry. Sophomore LB Chase Christiansen added eight stops, including 1.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks. Two other Aggie defenders had career nights as redshirt freshman NG Christopher 'Unga finished the game with a career best six tackles, while senior DE Siua Taufa had a career high five stops.

After forcing the Aztecs to punt on their first series of the game, Utah State marched 70 yards in seven plays, capped by Myers' 10-yard touchdown run.

However, San Diego State proceeded to end the first half by scoring 20 unanswered points, the final three coming on a 41-yard field goal by John Baron as time ran out on the clock. It was one of four field goals he booted on the night.

Utah State, which finished with a season-low 252 yards of total offense, had just 14 yards the remainder of the first half following its game-opening drive.

The Aztecs, who eventually scored 40 unanswered points before Colston-Green's touchdown, controlled the clock as they held the ball for nearly 37 minutes as the Aztecs had 20 first downs in the game as compared to just 12 for Utah State as the Aggies were 5-of-14 on third downs while SDSU converted 7-of-14 third down attempts.

For the sixth straight game, Utah State's defense did not force a turnover as the Aggies have just one takeaway in its last six games. Offensively, USU committed two turnovers in the game on an interception and fumble, both in the second half, as USU has now committed eight turnovers on the season with five interceptions and three fumbles.

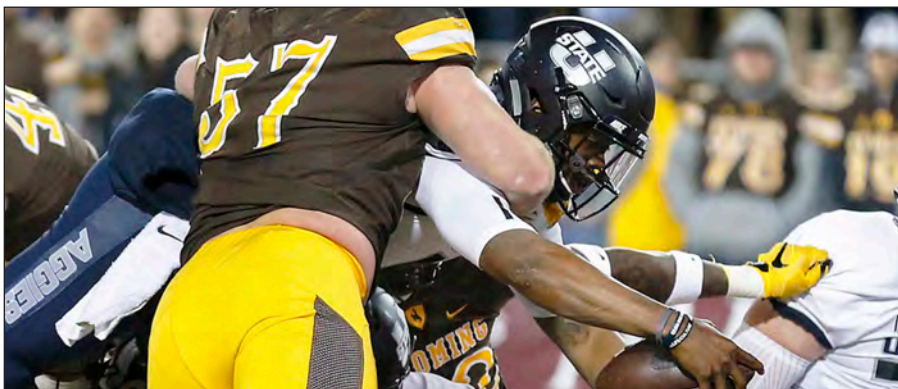

Junior QB Damion Hobbs (11) scored a career-high three rushing touchdowns in Utah State's 52-28 loss at Wyoming. Hobbs tied his career-high with six carries for 24 yards. He was also 7-of-16 passing for 68 yards with one interception in the game.

LARAMIE, Wyo. - Backup junior QB Damion Hobbs scored a career-high three rushing touchdowns and sophomore WR Ron'quavion Tarver caught eight passes for 104 yards, both game highs, but it still wasn't enough to help Utah State overcome a 28-point deficit at halftime.

Wyoming QB Josh Allen completed 16-of-26 passes for 261 yards and four touchdowns, to go along with 66 yards rushing and another score, to help the Cowboys beat the Aggies 52-28 on Saturday, Nov. 5, 2016, on Jonah Field at War Memorial Stadium in Laramie, Wyo.

Junior RB Tony Lindsey, Jr. led the Aggies with 75 yards rushing on just five carries. Utah State (3-6, 1-5 Mountain West) finished with 414 yards of total offense, including 241 in the third quarter alone.

Brian Hill accounted for Wyoming's other two touchdowns as the senior running back ran for a game-high 142 yards on 25 carries, scoring on runs of 56 and 15 yards, respectively. The Cowboys (7-2, 5-0), who are all alone in first place in the Mountain Division of the MW, tallied 528 yards of offense.

Trailing 35-7 at intermission, Utah State showed some fight in the second half and actually pulled to within a touchdown after scoring 21 unanswered points in a span of 2:41 during the third quarter. Hobbs accounted for two of those scores on touchdown runs of 2 and 10 yards, respectively, less than a minute apart.

Freshman WR Rayshad Lewis began the comeback bid when he caught a 5-yard touchdown pass from junior QB Kent Myers with 8:01 remaining in the third. Myers finished 17-of-29 for 235 yards and the one score before leaving the game with an injury.

Lewis finished with seven catches for 56 yards, while senior TE Wyatt Houston tied his career high with five catches for 37 yards. He has now caught at least one pass in 15 consecutive games.

After the Aggies pulled to within 35-28 with 5:20 left in the third, the Cowboys seized control for good by scoring the game's final 17 points.

Senior LB Anthony Williams led all defenders in the game with a career-high 13 tackles, including 0.5 tackles for loss. Redshirt sophomore BS Gaje Ferguson added a career-best 10 stops, including 1.0 tackles for loss, and a pass breakup in his first career start. And senior CB Daniel Gray intercepted a pass in the third quarter to help set up one of the Aggies' scores.

Wyoming scored touchdowns on four of its five first-half drives as Allen threw touchdown passes of 25 and 15 yards, respectively, and ran for a 1-yard score. Hill had the other touchdown on his 56-yard run.

After the Cowboys opened a 21-0 lead, Utah State cracked the scoreboard on a 1-yard touchdown run by Hobbs with 10:42 left in the second quarter. Lewis helped keep the drive alive when he caught an 18-yard pass from Myers on third-and-5 from the Aggies' 43.

Wyoming took a 35-7 lead into the break following a 46-yard touchdown pass from Allen to Tanner Gentry with 54 seconds left in the second quarter. Gentry was blanketed by USU junior CB Wesley Bailey, but made a diving catch in the left corner of the end zone for the score.

LOGAN, Utah - New Mexico's Jason Sanders kicked three field goals, including the game-winner from 40 yards out with 1:06 to go, to give the Lobos a 24-21 victory against Utah State on Saturday, Nov. 12, 2016, on Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium.

Sanders' third field goal of the night capped an 11-play, 76-yard drive that began inside the Lobos' 1-yard line after a goal-line stand by the New Mexico defense.

With the win, the Lobos (7-3, 5-1 Mountain West) won their fifth straight game. The Aggies dropped to 3-7 overall and 1-6 in league play.

Junior QB **Kent Myers** was 21-of-27 passing for 263 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Midway through the fourth quarter, his 41-yard pass to sophomore WR **Ron'quavion Tarver** gave the Aggies a first-and-goal at the Lobos' 9-yard line with the game tied at 21-all. A 7-yard run by redshirt freshman WR **Gerold Bright** gave Utah State a second-and-goal at the 2. Consecutive runs by junior RB **Tonny Lindsey, Jr.** moved the ball down to the 1, where the Aggies elected to go for it. Lindsey's number was called again, but New Mexico LB Dakota Cox made the touchdown-saving tackle inside the 1.

On the ensuing possession, the Lobos drove to the Aggies' 23-yard line, where Sanders made good from 40 yards out for the winning score.

It looked as if Utah State was going to answer on the very next possession, driving down to the New Mexico 19-yard line, where the Aggies faced first-and-10. USU appeared to have scored the go-ahead touchdown as Myers found Tarver in the left corner of the end zone, but an offensive pass interference penalty negated the score.

With the ball pushed back to the 34, Myers ran for 9 yards and Utah State tried to rush its field-goal unit team onto the field, but time ran out before the Aggies could try a game-tying field goal.

Tarver finished with six catches for 84 yards – both game highs – and a touchdown. Ten different Aggies caught at least one pass, including senior TE **Wyatt Houston**, who has now caught a pass in 16 straight games.

Defensively, Utah State limited the top rushing team in the nation to 249 yards – almost 110 yards below the Lobos' season average of 358.8. Senior LB **Anthony Williams** tied his career high with 13 tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss, while redshirt sophomore BS **Gaje Ferguson** added a career-best 11 stops.

The Aggies opened up a 21-6 lead with 12:35 to go in the third quarter following a 4-yard touchdown run by Lindsey, who finished with 26 yards rushing and two scores on 12 carries. However, the UNM scored the final 18 points to spoil USU's Senior Night.

For the first time since the season opener against Weber State, Utah State scored touchdowns on its first two drives of the game.

Lindsey gave the Aggies a 7-0 lead with a 13-yard touchdown run with 5:56 left in the first quarter. Just over three minutes later, Myers hooked up with Tarver for a 22-yard touchdown pass, making it 14-0.

Sanders booted a pair of second-quarter field goals from 36 and 37 yards out, respectively, to pare the deficit to 14-6 by halftime.

The Lobos dominated the time of possession in the opening half as they controlled the ball for more than 21 minutes. Despite that, the Aggies kept the visitors out of the end zone, marking the first time since Game 4 of the 2015 campaign that New Mexico has not scored a touchdown during the first 30 minutes of play.

RENO, Nev. - Nevada QB Ty Gangi scored on a 6-yard touchdown run with five seconds remaining in the game and Spencer Pettit tacked on the extra point as Nevada rallied for a 38-37 win against Utah State on Saturday, Nov. 19, 2016, at Mackay Stadium.

Redshirt freshman PK Dominik Eberle kicked the first three field goals of his career, including a 22-yarder that gave Utah State (3-8, 1-7 Mountain West) a 37-24 lead with 7:50 to go.

Tony Lindsey, Jr. had a career day for the Aggies. The junior running back rushed for a career-best 168 yards on 21 carries. His career-long 68-yard touchdown run with 11:03 remaining in the game made it 34-24 for Utah State.

Junior QB Kent Myers was 10-of-18 passing for 127 yards and an interception. He also had 90 yards rushing and two scores on just 11 carries. Freshman WR Rayshad Lewis added 83 yards rushing and a career-long 59-yard touchdown run on four carries, helping Utah State gain 396 yards on the ground. USU finished with 523 yards of total offense, while UN recorded 341.

However, the Wolf Pack (4-7, 2-5) rallied and scored the game's final 14 points. Elijah Mitchell began the comeback for Nevada when he recovered a muffed punt by the Aggies in the end zone with 7:19 to go and Gangi then scored the game-winning touchdown in the final seconds.

Senior LB Anthony Williams recorded 11 tackles for the Aggies, including 1.0 tackles for loss, while senior FS Devin Centers had 10 stops. Senior DE Ricky Ali'ifua had two tackles, including 1.0 sack. On his sack, Ali'ifua forced Gangi to fumble and freshman NG Mohelika Uasike caught it in midair, returning it 30 yards. The Aggies cashed in on the turnover as Eberle's third and final field goal of the day gave them their 13-point fourth-quarter advantage.

Nevada cracked the scoreboard first when Pettit drilled a 35-yard field goal with 3:37 remaining in the first quarter.

Utah State answered back on the ensuing possession as Myers capped the six-play, 79-yard drive with a 37-yard touchdown run to make it 7-3 with 1:02 left in the first.

Eberle gave the visitors a 10-3 lead with his first field goal, a career-long 43-yarder, with 9:52 remaining in the second quarter. The Aggies opened a two-touchdown lead with 5:25 left in the half on a 2-yard touchdown run by Myers.

However, Nevada cut the deficit to 17-10 at halftime as Wyatt Demps caught a 1-yard touchdown pass from Gangi with just 38 seconds showing on the clock.

Nevada got the ball to start the second half, but Utah State's defense forced the Wolf Pack to go three-and-out. On the very first play of the ensuing possession, Lewis scored on his 59-yard run, making it 24-10.

The Wolf Pack answered back with a Jaxson Kincaide 7-yard touchdown run, trimming the deficit to 24-17 with 9:09 to go in the third.

USU took a 27-17 lead into the fourth quarter after Eberle made another field goal, this time from 20 yards.

Nevada cashed in on the game's first turnover to pull within three early in the fourth quarter as Myers was intercepted by Jaden Sawyer, who returned it 43 yards to the USU 20-yard line.

The Wolf Pack found the end zone two plays later, when Butler scored on a 15-yard touchdown run. Whatever momentum Nevada gained following the touchdown was quickly lost, thanks to Lindsey's 68-yard touchdown run.

PROVO, Utah - Jamaal Williams rushed for 131 yards and one touchdown as BYU beat Utah State 28-10 in the battle for the Wagon Wheel on Saturday, Nov. 26, 2016, at LaVell Edwards Stadium. With the loss, the Aggies end the season at 3-9. The Cougars improved to 8-4.

Junior QB Kent Myers was 12-of-23 passing for 103 yards and one interception, and added 42 rushing yards on 12 carries. Junior WR Braelon Roberts and freshman WR Rayshad Lewis had three catches apiece for Utah State. Senior TE Wyatt Houston had two catches for 22 yards. He caught at least one pass in every game this season and finished his stellar Aggie career by catching a pass in 18 straight games. Junior RB Tonny Lindsey, Jr. led USU's ground attack with 47 yards on eight carries.

BYU QB Taysom Hill was 10-of-21 passing for 101 yards and a 10-yard touchdown pass to Mitchell Juergens that gave the Cougars a 21-10 lead late in the third quarter. Hill also had 46 yards rushing on 12 carries, but was injured early in the fourth quarter after landing awkwardly on his elbow. Tanner Mangum replaced Hill and threw a 5-yard touchdown pass to Colby Pearson for the game's final score with 12:55 to go.

Utah State finished with a season-low 200 yards of total offense, and only 46 in the second half, as the Aggies had 103 passing yards and 97 yards rushing. BYU recorded 355 total yards, including 249 on the ground. The Cougars dominated the time of possession, 36:48 to 23:12. BYU also had 15 more first downs in the game (26-11), while both teams committed two turnovers in the contest.

Defensively, the Aggies were led by senior LB Anthony Williams, who had a game-best 12 tackles, including 1.0 sack, to end the season with four-straight double-digit tackle outings. Redshirt sophomore BS Gaje Ferguson added eight stops and senior LB Brock Carmen recorded seven tackles.

Playing against his former team, redshirt junior BS Dallin Leavitt had one of two interceptions by the Aggies. Junior CB Jalen Davis had the other.

Utah State cracked the scoreboard first when senior PK Brock Warren drilled a 28-yard field goal with 9:39 left in the opening quarter. The Aggies had a chance to make it 6-0 on their next possession, but redshirt freshman PK Dominik Eberle missed a 46-yard field goal attempt into the wind wide right.

Sophomore P Aaron Dalton punted six times for 261 yards (43.5 ypp), with a season-long of 56 yards as two of his punts were downed inside the 20-yard line.

The Cougars opened up a 14-3 second-quarter lead following a 2-yard touchdown run by Williams and a 52-yard fumble recovery for a score by Michael Shelton.

With BYU leading 7-3 and the Aggies facing fourth-and-1 from midfield, junior QB Damion Hobbs picked up the first down on a rush up the middle. However, when it appeared as if his forward progress was stopped, BYU's defense pushed Hobbs back and stripped the ball. Shelton scooped it up and returned it for the score.

Utah State got some much-needed momentum back, though, when Davis intercepted a pass by Hill that bounced off a BYU receiver. Davis returned it 37 yards to the Cougars' 6-yard line. Two plays later, Hobbs scored on a 2-yard touchdown run with just 42 seconds remaining in the second. The Aggies trailed 14-10 at the break.

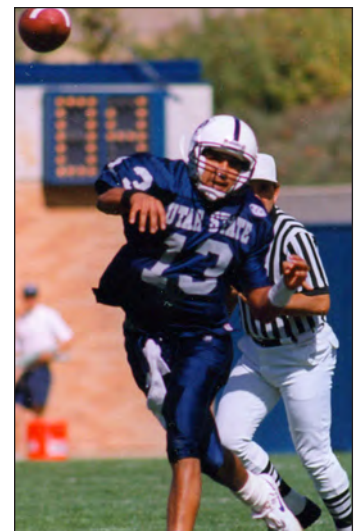

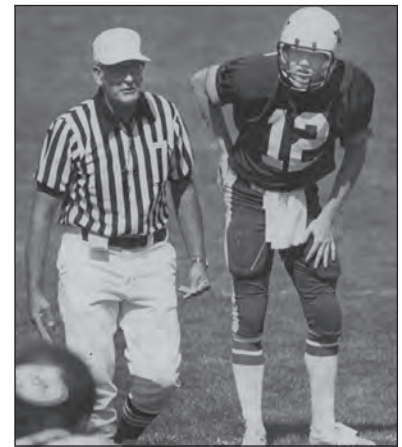

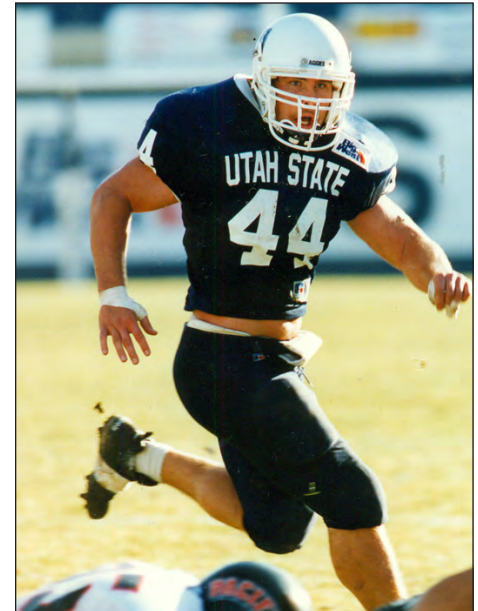

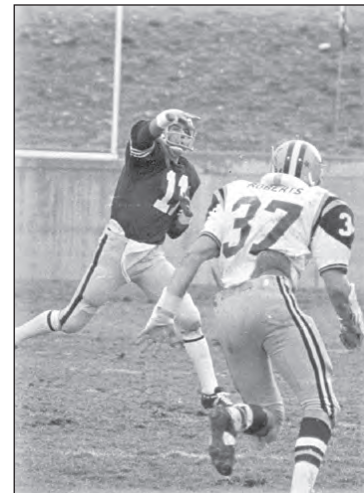

EMMETT WHITE'S NCAA RECORD-SETTING DAY

On Nov. 4, 2000, Utah State running back Emmett White produced one of the greatest single-game performances in NCAA history. The then-Aggie junior not only broke the NCAA single-game all-purpose yardage record, he demolished it.

The national record of 435 yards held by Brian Pruitt of Central Michigan, set against Toledo in 1994, was broken by an astonishing 143 yards as White accumulated 578 yards against New Mexico State.

White rushed 34 times for a school-record 322 yards, added 134 yards on seven receptions, had one punt return for two yards and four kickoff returns for 120 yards. That added up to 578 yards on 46 touches of the football that November night.

Not only did White amass all of those yards, he scored four touchdowns, including the game-winner, a nine-yard run, with just :28 left in the game as USU won the contest in Las Cruces 44-37.

He finished the season as the nation's all-purpose yardage leader averaging 238.9 yards per game (39 yards more per game than NCAA runner-up LaDainian Tomlinson of TCU). That average is still the sixth-best average in NCAA history.

White's 120.2 yards per game rushing that year ranked 13th in the country and his 322 yards on the ground against NMSU were the second most in a game in Big West history, as well as the most in USU history by 30 yards.

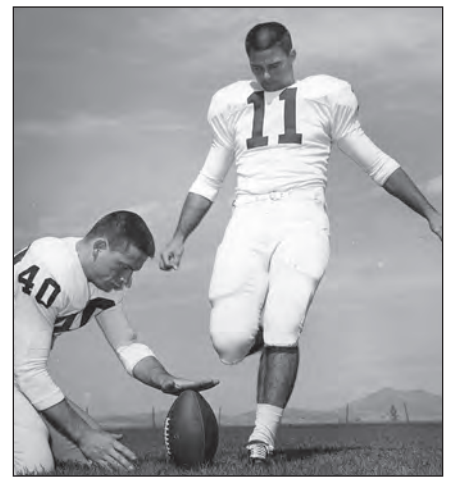

Utah State's 1946 football team played in the school's first-ever bowl as it lost to San Jose State, 20-0, in the Raisin Bowl played in Fresno, Calif., on Jan. 1, 1947. USU finished the 1946 season with a 7-2-1 record and shared the Skyline Conference Championship with a 4-1-1 league mark.

FRESNO, Calif. - A powerful San José State college grid team shut out Utah State, 20-0, in the second annual Raisin Bowl at Fresno, Calif.

San José State devastated the Aggies, 16-7, in first downs, 177-74 in yards rushing, and 110-49 in yards passing.

Utah State's all-conference OC, **Ralph Maughan**, could not offset San Jose's HBs Bert Robinson and Babe Nomura. San Jose State did all of its scoring in the second and third quarters. Bill Schemmel, a substitute halfback, passed to quarterback Bill Jackson for the opening touchdown, then took an aerial from Jackson for score number two. Bill Rhyne, another substitute halfback, crossed the goal line from the 1-yard line scoring the third touchdown.

Through the entire game, Utah State threatened to score twice, once in the first quarter when it reached the San José 1-yard line, and again at the end of the fourth quarter when the Aggies were again within a yard of the goal. Both attempts were denied and Utah State was confined to its own territory throughout most of the game.

Utah State's 1947 football team made it back-to-back bowl appearances as it lost to Pacific, 35-21, in the Lodi Grape Bowl. USU went 6-5-0 during the season and finished third in the Skyline Conference with a 3-3-0 record.

LODI, Calif. - All-American quarterback Eddie LeBaron led his Pacific Tigers onto victory, defeating the Utah State Aggies, 35-21, in Lodi's inaugural Grape Bowl football game.

Only six minutes into the game, Pacific fullback Harry Kane scored on a 72-yard run. Utah State answered with a 70-yard drive to land on Pacific's 1-yard line. Right HB **John Worley** fumbled, allowing halfback Bruce Orvis to recover the ball and run it back 99 yards for Pacific's second score. Early in the second quarter, LeBaron scored on a quarterback sneak from the one, and then threw for a 14-yard touchdown pass to left end John Rohde a few minutes later. Sub halfback Wayne Hardin completed all five conversion attempts.

Utah State came back from halftime facing a 28-0 deficit. QBs **John Caputo** and **John Sorensen** helped the Aggies with two touchdowns, and in the final period, HB **Ernie Groll** intercepted a long pass by LeBaron on the Pacific 42 and ran it back into the end zone. FB **Buss Williams** converted two of the three attempts.

Utah State ran up 15 first downs against the College of Pacific's 17. On the ground the Tigers gained 278 yards against the Aggies' 85.

The 1960 Utah State football team finished the season with a 9-2-0 record and won its first of two-straight co-Skyline Conference Championships.

EL PASO, TEXAS - New Mexico State, in winning its 15th-straight game, overcame Utah State, 20-13, in a bruising Sun Bowl football battle. USU owned a 7-0 lead in the first quarter when HB **Tom Larscheid** ran for 13 yards and a touchdown. The score was set up with a 53-yard punt return by **Ernie Reese**, which set a Sun Bowl record.

New Mexico State answered right back in the second quarter. Quarterback Charley Johnson's 3-yard pitch to Pervis Atkins along with Atkins' subsequent kick, tied the score in the second period.

USU then regained the lead by driving 80 yards in 15 plays with **Dolph Camilli** scoring from the 11. New Mexico State took the lead for the first time in the third quarter when Bob Gaitthers ran for a 32-yard touchdown. Johnson led the offense by completing 18-of-26 passes, including two for touchdowns.

Utah State's final effort for victory was denied in the fourth quarter when FB **Doug Mayberry** was stopped short of a first down on a fourth down play. New Mexico State then ran out the clock.

NMSU quarterback Charley Johnson threw for 190 yards and was tabbed the Sun Bowl's MVP for the second straight year. The NMSU defense held the nation's top offense to just 268 total yards.

Utah State's defense was equally as impressive. USU, led by future Hall of Famer **Merlin Olsen**, held the NMSU offense to only 224 yards, including just 44 rushing yards on 32 carries.

The 1961 Utah State football team is the last team in school history to go undefeated during the regular season as they produced a 9-0-1 mark before losing to Baylor, 24-9, in the Gotham Bowl played at the Polo Grounds in New York City. Tackle Merlin Olsen was a consensus, first-team All-America and won the 1961 Outland Trophy as the country's top lineman.

NEW YORK, N.Y. - Converting four-of-five fumble recoveries into three touchdowns provided Baylor with the win over previously unbeaten Utah State, 24-9.

Baylor's Ronnie Bull, picked up a 15-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Quarterback Don Trull contributed a 2-yard scoring plunge and a 39-yard touchdown pass to end Tom Plumb. Carl Choate kicked all three conversions and added three points with his 22-yard field goal.

Utah State's first score came in the third quarter when **Jim Turner** kicked a 36-yard field goal. Midway through the final quarter, Ronnie Stanley's pass was intercepted by Utah State's **Bob Novotny** on the Baylor 16. In three plays, Utah State produced a touchdown with **Bill Munson** scoring from the four. An attempted conversion run failed.

Senior QB Anthony Calvillo (13) was named the MVP of the Las Vegas Bowl II as he was 25-of-39 passing for 286 yards and three touchdowns in leading Utah State to its first-ever bowl win with a 42-33 victory against Ball State. Calvillo also rushed for 50 yards on eight carries in the game.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. - Senior QB Anthony Calvillo tossed three touchdown passes and junior RB Protail Grier ran for two scores as Utah State defeated Ball State, 42-33, in Las Vegas Bowl II on Dec. 17, 1993 in Las Vegas, Nev., marking Utah State's first bowl victory in its 96-year football history. For Utah State, it was just its fifth bowl game in school history and first since playing in the 1961 Gotham Bowl.

Utah State finished the game with 491 yards of total offense (205-rushing, 286-passing) as compared to 314 yards of total offense (73-rushing, 241-passing) for Ball State. USU recorded 27 first downs in the game and was 10-of-16 on third downs, while BSU had just 14 first downs and went 0-of-11 on third downs. USU also won the possession battle, 35:11 to 24:49.

Calvillo completed 25-of-39 passes for 286 yards to earn MVP honors. He also rushed for 50 yards on eight carries. Grier finished the game with 142 rushing yards on 33 carries to go along with his two scores, and caught two passes for 32 yards. Senior WR Tony Jenkins had five catches for 94 yards as eight different Aggies caught passes in the game.

Utah State scored on its first two possessions with drives of 73 and 82 yards, respectively. Calvillo, who completed his first seven pass attempts, hit senior WR Cotic McMahon from 22 yards out for the first score just 4:33 into the game. Eight minutes later, Grier reached the end zone on a 3-yard run capping a 13-play, 82-yard drive that took 5:26 off the clock. With 24 seconds remaining in the first half, senior WR Aubrey Thompson scored on a 3-yard pass from Calvillo to make the halftime score 21-0 for USU. On its last drive of the half, USU went 68-yards in 17 plays and used 7:43. The Aggie offense rolled up 329 total yards in the first half and produced 18 first downs.

Ball State scored 10 straight points to open the third quarter on a 7-yard touchdown pass and a 31-yard field goal in the first three minutes, but Utah State got a 15-yard touchdown run from Grier and another touchdown pass from Calvillo, this time to senior WR Mike Lee good for 16 yards. USU's first touchdown of the third quarter was a 12-play, 75-yard drive that took 5:24, while its second was just a 3-play, 24-yard drive in 1:26.

Junior CB Donald Toomer iced the game when he returned an interception 32 yards for a score to give the Aggies a 42-19 lead with 11:34 left in the game. In all, Toomer had two interceptions in the game that he returned 39 yards.

Ball State scored the final 14 points of the game on a 2-yard run with 10:34 to play and a 2-yard pass with 5:07 remaining in the contest.

McMahon finished the game with four catches for 54 yards, while Thompson had four catches for 28 yards and Lee added four catches for 48 yards for USU.

Senior CB Damon Smith and freshman LB David Gill led Utah State with eight tackles apiece, while senior LB Jermaine Younger had seven tackles and senior DE Scott Moala finished with six stops.

Senior WR Steve Smith (4) earned Utah State MVP honors as he had four receptions for 136 yards and a 75-yard touchdown, while also returning two punts for 26 yards and two kickoffs for 58 yards in Utah State's 35-19 loss to Cincinnati in the 1997 Humanitarian Bowl.

BOISE, Idaho - Utah State spotted Cincinnati a 28-point advantage before scoring 19 of the game's final 26 points as the Aggies fell 35-19 in the first Humanitarian Bowl at Boise, Idaho on Dec. 29, 1997.

The Aggies suffered through their second-lowest offensive output of the season in both scoring (16 at Oregon State) and yardage (283 vs. New Mexico) in the game.

Utah State finished the game with just 316 yards of total offense (63-rushing, 253-passing) as compared to 411 total yards (225-rushing, 186-passing) for Cincinnati. The Bearcats also controlled the ball for 42:17 as it converted on 14-of-22 (.636) third downs, while USU had the ball for just 17:43 as it converted just 2-of-10 (.200) third downs. In all, Cincinnati ran 40 more plays (90-50) in the game as it averaged 4.6 yards per play as compared to 6.3 yards per play for USU.

Utah State did not practice outdoors until the two days prior to the game as the Aggies worked out in the USU fieldhouse for the month between the end of the regular season and the bowl game. That rustiness was evident as USU went scoreless in the first half as Cincinnati put up a 21-0 halftime advantage.

Cincinnati's first touchdown of the game was on a 14-yard pass from Chad Plummer to Cornelius Bonner with 4:03 to play in the first quarter. Bonner caught another 14-yard pass, this time from Deontey Kenner, just 48 seconds into the second quarter. The Bearcats final touchdown of the first half was on a 1-yard run.

After Cincinnati extended its lead to 28-0 with 8:39 to play in the third quarter on a 15-yard run by Plummer, Utah State warmed up, scoring three touchdowns in an eight minute span, but the Aggies were controlled by a bigger, stronger Cincinnati team. USU's first score came on a 75-yard pass from senior QB **Matt Sauk** to senior WR **Steve Smith** with 7:31 to play in the third quarter. USU scored again late in the third quarter on a 3-yard run by senior RB **Melvin Blue**, and its final touchdown of the game came with 14:18 to play in the game on a 10-yard fumble return by freshman LB **Brent Passey**.

Cincinnati's final touchdown of the game was with 2:28 to play in the third quarter on a 7-yard touchdown run by Orlando Smith to make the score 35-7, before USU scored the final 12 points of the game.

Smith earned USU MVP honors as he had four receptions for 136 yards and a 75-yard touchdown, while also returning two punts for 26 yards and two kickoffs for 58 yards. The game was the final one for head coach **John L. Smith**, who had announced that he had taken the head coaching job at Louisville immediately after the final regular season game at North Texas.

Sauk finished the game 12-of-30 passing for 253 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions. Kenner passed for 124 yards as he completed 10-of-16 passes with one touchdown, while Plummer was selected as the Bearcats' MVP in the game after rushing for 53 yards, passing for 62 yards and catching four passes for 64 more yards. Sophomore RB **Demario Brown** was the Aggies' top rusher as he carried the ball 12 times for 56 yards, and senior WR **Nakia Jenkins** added 80 receiving yards on four receptions.

Junior LB **Tony D'Amato** led Utah State with 12 tackles, while junior CB **Johndale Carty** and junior LB **Craig Miller** each posted nine stops.

Senior RB Michael Smith (20) rushed for a career-high 157 yards on just 12 carries and scored two touchdowns in Utah State's 24-23 loss to Ohio in the 2011 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Smith, who added one reception for 10 yards, was named Utah State's MVP.

BOISE, Idaho - In a season full of close finishes, the outcome at Famous Idaho Potato Bowl was no different for Utah State (7-6, 5-3 WAC) as Ohio scored with 13 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to earn a 24-23 win against the Aggies on Dec. 17, 2011 at Bronco Stadium in Boise.

After much deliberation on the two plays earlier to get to the goal line, Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton scored on a 1-yard touchdown run with 13 seconds left to tie the score at 23-23. The ensuing extra point from Matt Weller gave the Bobcats their first and only lead of the game.

In the Aggies' first bowl game since 1997, senior RB Michael Smith ran for a career-high and USU bowl record 157 yards, scoring both of Utah State's rushing touchdowns. Junior RB Robert Turbin recorded his eighth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 101 yards.

Utah State ended its historic season with a 7-6 record, which is its first seven-win season since 1993. The loss snaps the Aggies' five-game winning streak, and gave the Bobcats their first ever bowl win in their sixth bowl appearance, improving to 10-4.

The Aggies jumped out to an early 2-0 lead in the first quarter after Tettleton fumbled in the end zone with 9:23 remaining in the first quarter.

USU expanded its lead to 9-0 later in the first quarter when junior QB Adam Kennedy connected with senior TE Tarren Lloyd for a 3-yard touchdown pass to give the Aggies the 9-0 lead after the first quarter. The USU defense pitched its fourth first-quarter shutout this season, and second in a row.

Ohio cut that lead to 9-7 early in the second quarter when Derek Roback scored on a 26-yard pass from Tettleton with 4:40 to play in the half. It would be the only score of the second quarter as USU entered the locker room with a 9-7 advantage.

Smith and the Aggies wasted no time getting on the board in the third quarter when Smith broke off a 63-yard run with 12:19 remaining to put USU up 16-7. It was the longest rush allowed by the highly-touted Ohio defense during the season.

Less than three minutes later, the USU defense was able to hold the Bobcats to a field goal when Matt Weller drilled a 32-yard field goal to cut the Blue and White lead to 16-10.

The high-scoring third quarter continued with Smith scoring his second touchdown of the game with an 11-yard scamper and sophomore PK Josh Thompson booted his third extra point of the night to put USU up 23-10 with 5:51 left in the third stanza. The frenzied third-quarter scoring wasn't done as Tettleton hit Ohio's MVP Brazill with a 44-yard scoring strike to pull the Bobcats within 23-17 at the 3:45 mark of quarter number three.

Kennedy was injured late in the third quarter, and freshman QB Chuckie Keeton returned under center for the first time since Nov. 5 after starting USU's first eight games of the season but getting injured himself in the Hawai'i game. Keeton ran for a 10-yard gain on his first play, but the drive later stalled at midfield.

On USU's first drive of the fourth quarter, Kennedy returned and the Aggies again reached midfield, but couldn't get into scoring territory. The USU defense held Ohio, but Bobcat punter Paul Hershey boomed a 59-yard punt, pinning the Aggies at the USU 7. Utah State couldn't get a first down and had to punt it away to Ohio, and the Bobcats began their winning drive with 2:02 left.

Senior RB Kerwynn Williams (25) rushed for a career-high 235 yards on just 18 carries and scored three touchdowns in leading Utah State to a 41-15 win against Toledo in the 2012 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Williams, who added two receptions for 34 yards, was named the game's MVP.

BOISE, Idaho - Utah State (11-2, 6-0 WAC) concluded its most successful season in school history with a 41-15 rout of Toledo (9-4, 6-2 MAC) in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl on Dec. 15, 2012 as senior RB **Kerwynn Williams** was named the game's Most Valuable Player as he ran for a career-best 235 yards and tied his career-high with three touchdowns on runs of 63, 5 and 25 yards, all in the fourth quarter.

Utah State led 13-6 heading into the final 15 minutes of play before Toledo cut it to 13-9 following a 29-yard field goal with 7:28 to play. From there it was all USU as Williams scored his first touchdown of the game on a 63-yard run to cap a 2-play, 70-yard drive. Following a three-and-out by the Rockets, Williams rattled off a 56-yard run and then scored from 5-yards out to give USU a 27-9 advantage. During the drive, Williams accounted for all 62-yards on three carries. Sophomore FS **Brian Suite** then picked off Toledo's Austin Dantin two plays later, which led to Williams' third touchdown of the quarter on a 25-yard run upping USU's lead to 34-9 following a 2-play, 39-yard drive. Toledo returned the ensuing kickoff 87-yards for a score, its only touchdown of the day, to cut the deficit to 34-15. Williams then rushed for 32 yards on USU's next offensive play and sophomore RB **Joe Hill** scored on the Aggies' next play with a 24-yard run for a 2-play, 56-yard drive making the final score 41-15 as the Aggies scored 28 points in just 5:15.

In the fourth quarter, Utah State gained 228 yards, including 221 on the ground, as Williams rushed for 198 yards on just seven carries to go along with his three touchdowns.

Williams, who end the game with 269 all-purpose yards, set the Western Athletic Conference record with 6,928 career all-purpose yards to rank 11th in NCAA history at the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level. Overall, Williams' 235 rushing yards were the second-most in Famous Idaho Potato Bowl history and the 19th-most in a single-game in school history.

Utah State finished the game with 582 yards of total offense (353-rushing, 229-passing) to rank as the third-most during the year and 14th-most in school history. USU's 353 rushing yards were a season-high and the 19th-most in a single-game in school history, while its 28 fourth quarter points are its most in any quarter since 2011 and tied for the most in any quarter in Famous Idaho Potato Bowl history.

Toledo finished the game with 315 yards of total offense (173-passing, 142-rushing).

Sophomore QB **Chuckie Keeton** scored Utah State's first touchdown on a 62-yard run in the first quarter to give USU a 7-3 lead after Toledo scored the first points of the game on a 37-yard field goal on its opening series. In all, Keeton rushed for 92 yards on nine carries and added 229 yards through the air as he was 21-of-31 passing to set single season school records for both completions (275) and passing yards (3,373).

The only other points scored in the first half were on a pair of field goals as Toledo cut the lead to 7-6 early in the second quarter on another 37-yarder, while USU sophomore PK **Nick Diaz** connected from 27-yards out on the last play of the first half to send the Aggies into the locker room up 10-6.

Diaz added a 44-yard field goal on the Aggies' first possession of the third quarter to up its lead to 13-6 for the only score of the period, before the two teams combined for 37 fourth quarter points.

Senior LB **Bojay Filimoeatu** led USU's defense with 11 tackles, while redshirt freshman LB **Kyler Fackrell** recorded his third interception of the year in the third quarter in the red zone on a pass that was tipped by junior LB **Jake Doughty**.

In all, Utah State concluded the year with seven-straight wins.

Senior RB **Joey DeMartino (28)** rushed for 143 yards on 23 carries and scored the eventual game-winning touchdown on a 1-yard run in the fourth quarter to lead Utah State to a 21-14 win against No. 24 Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. DeMartino, who added one reception for eight yards, was named the game's Offensive MVP.

SAN DIEGO, Calif. - Behind 143 rushing yards from senior RB **Joey DeMartino**, Utah State (9-5) posted a 21-14 win against No. 24 Northern Illinois (12-2) in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl here at Qualcomm Stadium on Dec. 26, 2013.

DeMartino was named the Offensive Most Valuable Player for his efforts, which included one touchdown and a 58-yard rush which is a new Poinsettia Bowl record. It was DeMartino's seventh 100-yard outing this season.

Senior LB **Jake Doughty** was named the Defensive MVP for his eight tackle, one forced fumble outing. Doughty added 1.5 tackles for loss in the game.

Utah State ended the game with 289 total yards, on 168 rushing yards and 121 passing yards, and Northern Illinois had a season-low 315 yards of total offense, tallying 216 yards passing a being limited to 99 yards rushing, also a season-low for the Huskies. The 14 points was also a season-low for NIU.

Freshman QB **Darell Garretson** was 17-of-28 passing for 121 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions for Utah State, while junior WR **Ronald Butler** and sophomore WR **Brandon Swindall** each had four catches, with Butler tallying 33 yards and Swindall amassing 28 yards and USU's lone touchdown catch.

Junior FS **Brian Suite** led the Aggies' defensive with a game-high 11 tackles, one interception and one fumble recovery. Junior LB **Zach Vigil** added nine stops, while redshirt-freshman LB **Nick Vigil** and junior SS **Frankie Sutera** had seven tackles apiece.

Utah State got on the board first with a 31-yard field goal by junior PK **Nick Diaz** for a 3-0 Aggie lead with 6:56 left in the first quarter. The field goal was set up by a fumble that was forced by Doughty and recovered by Suite.

Following a missed 37-yard field goal by Northern Illinois, Diaz connected on his second field goal of the game from 39 yards to tie the Poinsettia Bowl record for longest field goal and a 6-0 Aggie advantage just 51 seconds into the second quarter.

Northern Illinois got on the board with a 2-yard scamper by Jordan Lynch with 8:17 left in the second quarter for a 7-6 lead, which they held into halftime.

The Aggie defense made a sudden change on NIU's opening possession of the second half, as Suite intercepted Lynch on the first play from scrimmage, setting up the USU offense at the NIU 31. Later Garretson hit Swindall for a 5-yard touchdown and Diaz drilled the extra point for a 13-7 USU lead with 11:57 remaining in the third quarter.

Garretson was picked off early in the fourth quarter, giving the Huskies the ball at the USU 13, but the Aggie defense bowed up and held them to a field goal attempt, which they missed for their second miss of the night.

Utah State took over and drove 80 yards in 16 plays that culminated in a 1-yard touchdown run by DeMartino in a drive that took 7:19 off the clock. Garretson then hit sophomore WR **JoJo Natson** for the two-point conversion and a 21-7 Aggie advantage with 4:14 left.

Northern Illinois pulled to within 21-14 with 1:44 left following a 15-yard touchdown pass, but the ensuing on-side kick was recovered by Swindall to seal the win.

Lynch, who finished third for the Heisman Trophy, was 20-of-35 passing for 216 yards and one touchdown, but just 39 yards rushing on 18 carries, for his second-fewest rushing yards of the season. Lynch was also sacked twice by the Aggie defense, tying the most allowed by NIU on the year.

Freshman QB Kent Myers (2) rushed for 70 yards on a career-best 15 carries, including a 48-yard touchdown run in Utah State's 21-6 win against UTEP in the Gildan New Mexico Bowl. Myers, who was also 5-of-12 passing for 68 yards, was named the game's Offensive MVP.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - Freshman QB Kent Myers rushed a career-high 15 times for 70 yards with one touchdown and Utah State gained 279 yards on the ground en route to its 21-6 Gildan New Mexico Bowl win against UTEP at University Stadium on Dec. 20, 2014.

With the win, Utah State has now won a school-record three-straight bowl games, and finished the season with a 10-4 record for the second-most wins in a single-season in school history. USU was playing in its fourth-straight bowl game, which is also a school-record.

Myers was named the Offensive Most Valuable Player of the game as he was 5-of-12 passing for 68 yards to go along with his 70 rushing yards and one touchdown.

Senior LB Zach Vigil was named the Defensive Most Valuable Player as he finished with 11 tackles, which included 1.0 tackle for loss, while adding one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry. With his 11 tackles, Vigil ends his career with 389 tackles to rank fifth all-time in school history. Vigil also ends his career as the school leader in tackles for loss with 43.5, while his 20.5 tackles for loss this season tie the Mountain West single-season record. Overall, it was Vigil's ninth double-digit tackle outing of the season and the 20th of his career.

Utah State finished the game with 347 yards of total offense, as its 279 rushing yards are its third-most in a game this season, while its 68 passing yards are a season-low.

Senior WR Ronald Butler rushed for a career-high 69 yards on just two carries, which included a career-long rush of 61 yards. Senior RB Joe Hill added 50 yards on six carries and one touchdown, while junior WR JoJo Natson had 40 rushing yards on five carries, and sophomore LB Nick Vigil gained 34 yards on eight carries with one touchdown.

Utah State had just two players make receptions in the game as junior WR Hunter Sharp caught three passes for 21 yards, while Natson had two catches for 47 yards. With his three receptions, Sharp finished the season tied for ninth all-time in school history with 66 catches, while Natson becomes the 32nd player in USU history with 1,000 career receiving yards.

UTEP was limited to just 275 yards of total offense, the third-fewest allowed by USU this season. The Miners finished with just 126 passing yards, which is the second-fewest allowed by Utah State this year. Aaron Jones led the Miners with 88 rushing yards on 25 carries.

UTEP scored the first points of the game on a 32-yard field goal by Jay Mattox late in the first quarter after it completed a 53-yard pass on a third-and-10 from its own 26-yard line.

Utah State answered UTEP's scoring drive on its next possession as Myers scored on a 48-yard run to cap a three-play, 75-yard drive that took just 1:18 off the clock.

Both teams had a chance to put points on the board late in the second quarter, but UTEP fumbled the snap on a 25-yard field goal attempt and USU missed a 28-yard field goal attempt on the final play of the half.

Utah State scored its second touchdown of the game on its opening drive of the third quarter as Nick Vigil scored on a 3-yard run to cap a seven-play, 75-yard drive.

UTEP's final points of the game came late in the fourth quarter on a Mattox 34-yard field goal following a 16-play, 54-yard drive that took 6:56 off the clock.

Utah State put the game away on the next series as it drove 65 yards in just four plays as Hill scored on an 11-yard run to seal the win.

Senior FS Brian Suite had 10 tackles for his fourth-career double-digit tackle outing, while junior CB Deshane Hines added a career-high six tackles, and fellow junior CB Tyler Floyd had a career-high four tackles and recorded his first career interception.



Senior LB Zach Vigil (53) had 11 tackles, which included 1.0 tackle for loss, to go along with one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry against the Miners. Vigil was named the game's Defensive MVP.

BOISE, Idaho - In his final game as an Aggie, redshirt senior QB **Chuckie Keeton** set another school record, but it still wasn't enough for Utah State (6-7) to overcome three turnovers and several missed opportunities in the red zone in a 23-21 loss to Akron (8-5) in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl on Dec. 22, 2015 at Albertsons Stadium.

With the loss, the Aggies had their school-record three-game bowl winning streak snapped. Utah State was playing in its school-record fifth consecutive bowl game.

Keeton completed 14-of-25 passes for 109 yards with one touchdown and one interception. With his 108 yards of total offense against the Zips, the native of Houston, Texas, became the school's all-time leader in total offense with 8,803 career yards.

Keeton's lone touchdown pass came with 1:12 remaining in the game, a 2-yarder to senior WR **Brandon Swindall** that pulled Utah State to within 23-21. Overall, Keeton's 62-career touchdown passes are also a school-best.

After a failed on-side kick, Utah State forced an Akron punt and took over on their own 12-yard line with six seconds remaining in the game. Keeton completed an 8-yard pass to senior WR **Hunter Sharp**, but the clock ran out following a couple of backward laterals.

Sophomore QB Thomas Woodson was 14-of-29 for 168 yards and one interception for Akron, which won its first-ever bowl game.

Like Keeton, sophomore QB **Kent Myers** also completed 14 passes on 20 attempts for 123 yards and two touchdowns as USU had two quarterbacks each throw for 100 yards in the same game for the first time since 1996.

Sharp caught a Utah State bowl record 11 passes for 93 yards and a touchdown, while **Devante Mays** led all rushers in the game with 124 yards on 12 carries.

Defensively, the Aggies were led by senior LB **LT Filiaga** and senior NG **David Moala**, who had eight tackles apiece. Moala, who also had a career-best 2.5 tackles for loss and 0.5 sacks, tied his career high with those eight stops. Sophomore CB **Jalen Davis** recorded USU's lone turnover of the day when he intercepted a pass in the second quarter.

The Aggies took their only lead of the game as they marched 64 yards to paydirt in seven plays to start the third quarter. Sharp capped the drive with a 19-yard touchdown reception from Myers, giving Utah State a 14-13 lead. Myers set up the score with a 27-yard run on third-and-17 from the Zips' 46.

Akron cashed in on USU's third turnover and went in front for good on a 2-yard touchdown run by senior RB **Donnell Alexander**, making it 20-14 with 5:43 to go in the third.

The Zips increased their lead to 23-14 with 8:15 to go in the fourth when Robert Stein booted a 46-yard field goal, capping a 14-play drive that ate up nearly seven minutes.

Akron struck first on a trick play when redshirt junior WR **Tyrell Goodman** threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Woodson for a 7-0 lead just 4:22 into the first quarter.

The Zips made it 10-0 with 2:53 remaining in the second quarter courtesy of a 33-yard field goal by Stein.

However, the Aggies fought back on the ensuing possession when Myers threw a 9-yard touchdown pass to senior Swindall to pull the Aggies within 10-7 with 1:32 left in the half.

Akron added a 29-yard field goal on the last play of the half, following a USU fumble, to make the score 13-7.

In the first half, Utah State twice reached the red zone only to come away empty-handed as Keeton was intercepted and later muffed a snap on a 35-yard field goal attempt.

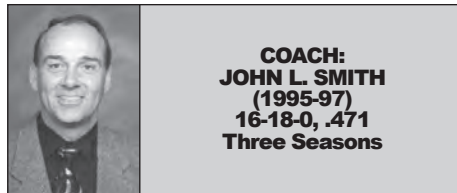

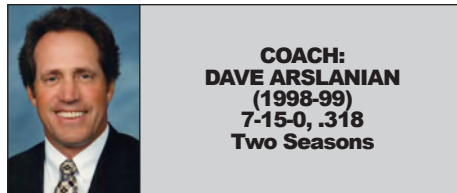

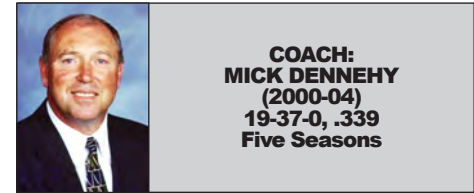

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT
Montana State, 1980 • First Year

Noelle E. Cockett was appointed as Utah State University's 16th President in October 2016, beginning her official tenure in January 2017. She is USU's first female president and the only female president with Utah's higher education system.

Since becoming president, Cockett has worked to improve the mission and vision of the university. The dedicated and award-winning faculty at USU are scholar-educators who have shared a commitment to teaching excellence and rigorous research to help students succeed. In March 2017, Jake Christensen and Thomas Hill were named 2017 Goldwater Scholars, and fellow undergraduate A. J. Walters, received an honorable mention, in the prestigious national competition that recognizes outstanding achievements in science and mathematics. Cockett has also been working to improve the facilities students enjoy as part of their education. In April, she was proud to be a part of the ground-breaking for the new Life Sciences building on the Logan campus that will benefit students in more than 30 majors taking foundational biology classroom and lab courses housed in the new facility.

As always, friends, alumni and donors of the university contribute to the livelihood of USU. In early May 2017, the university announced a major expansion of the highly selective Huntsman Scholar Program and the launch of the Center of Growth and Opportunity thanks to a joint \$50 million gift to the Jon M. Huntsman School of Business from the Huntsman Foundation and the Charles Koch Foundation. The joint gift is the largest in the school's history and enables the university to continue fostering innovative research and teaching to improve lives and communities.

Prior to being named Utah State's President, Cockett was serving as Executive Vice President and Provost at USU and has held that position since 2013. Prior to that, she served USU as Vice President for Extension from 2006 to 2013; Dean of the College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences from 2002 to 2013; and Director of the Utah Agriculture Experiment Station from 2009 to 2013.

Cockett has built a distinguished career in sheep genomics research, maintaining an active research program even while serving in various leadership positions at Utah State University. Her research program has centered on the identification of genetic markers associated with economically important traits in sheep, as well as the development of resources that advance research on the sheep genome. Cockett and her colleagues published an article describing the sheep genome sequence in *Science* in 2014. Her current project focuses on the identification of genetic regions associated with entropion in newborn lambs. Cockett has served as the United States coordinator for sheep genome mapping since 1993 and is an active member of the International Sheep Genomics Consortium.

As an active researcher, Cockett has received many awards and accolades throughout her career including a Young Scientist Award from the Western Section of the American Society of Animal

Science (ASAS), the Utah Governor's Medal for Science and Technology (2004 and 2015) and one of USU's top honors, the D. Wynne Thorne Research Award.

After receiving her master's and doctorate in animal breeding and genetics from Oregon State University in 1983 and 1985, respectively, Cockett spent five years as a research geneticist at the United States Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Research Service U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in Clay Center, Nebraska. She joined Utah State University in 1990 as a researcher and assistant professor in the Department of Animal, Dairy and Veterinary Sciences in the College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences.

Cockett, who earned her bachelor's degree from Montana State in animal science in 1980, grew up on a beef cattle ranch in eastern Montana and is married to John Cockett, Director of Technology in USU's Emma Eccles Jones College of Education and Human Services. Noelle and John have two children, Dylan and Chantelle.

JOHN HARTWELL

VICE PRESIDENT / ATHLETICS DIRECTOR
Citadel, 1987 • Third Year

Since being named Vice President and Director of Athletics at Utah State on June 2, 2015, John Hartwell has cast his vision for Aggie Athletics, which embodies maximum effort academically, athletically and socially to ensure success in both the classroom and on the fields of competition.

Hartwell has also focused on maximizing and increasing the department's revenue streams, along with planning for future facility renovations, which includes Maverik Stadium and the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum.

In his brief time at Utah State, Hartwell has already rebranded the fundraising arm of Utah State Athletics with the creation of Aggies Unlimited, which puts all giving under one umbrella.

Utah State also entered into a new partnership with the Larry H. Miller Sports & Entertainment Group to be its flagship radio station for Aggie Athletics, which gives USU additional advertising opportunities throughout Cache Valley and the Wasatch Front, in addition to more control over each broadcast.

Additionally, Hartwell has overseen the completion of the \$36 million, 85,000-square foot West Stadium Center on the west side of Maverik Stadium, which includes 24 luxury suites, 20 loge boxes, over 700 covered club seats and a premium club area that is also used to host a student-athlete training table. Renovations also included new video boards on both the north and south ends of the stadium, along with a new public address system, while major concourse work significantly increased restrooms and upgraded concessions.

Under Hartwell's leadership, Utah State has seen unparalleled athletic success during the past two academic years, highlighted by its men's tennis program winning the school's first Mountain West regular season and tournament championships since joining the Conference in 2013. In fact, men's tennis has won back-to-back regular season championships the past two years, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament as a team in 2017 for the first time in program history as it finished the season with a school-record 23 wins and a final national ranking of No. 45.

Aggie softball has also seen increased success over the past two seasons as they finished the 2017 campaign with a 33-18 record, including a 14-9 Mountain West mark, and advanced to the National Softball Invitational, marking the program's first postseason appearance since 1993. In fact, those 33 overall wins and 14 league victories are its most since 1996, as USU finished the 2017 season tied for third place in the league.

Other Utah State sports that have excelled the past two seasons in the Mountain West include its men's track & field programs, as they finished second at both the indoor and outdoor conference championships in 2016, and third at both championships during the 2017 academic year. Additionally, USU's football program played in a school-record fifth-straight bowl game in 2016.

Even more impressive is Utah State's continued successes by its student-athletes in the classroom as they have an 89 percent graduation success rate, which is the highest in the Mountain West, and a cumulative 3.196 grade-point average. During the 2016-17 academic year, USU had 148 student-athletes earn academic all-Mountain West honors, while 105 were named Mountain West Scholar-Athletes. Additionally, USU recognized 195 student-athletes at its annual Joe E. and Elma Whitesides Luncheon for earning a 3.2 or better GPA.

Hartwell came to Utah State after spending three years as the Athletics Director at Troy, where he laid the groundwork for the future of Trojan Athletics by spearheading several significant upgrades to its athletic facilities, including the addition of a new \$2 million practice facility for the golf teams, a \$3 million renovation and expansion of the softball facility and a \$2.1 million improvement to Veterans Memorial Stadium, while also securing funding for lights to be installed at the soccer and track complex. Hartwell also unveiled the North End Zone Project for Veterans Memorial Stadium, a \$25 million project that will be the new home for Trojan football.

Troy's athletics programs have also seen vast improvement on the fields of play due to Hartwell's leadership and oversight, including the football program that recorded its first 10-win season since joining the FBS and tied for the largest turnaround in the FBS in 2016, not to mention the Trojans being the first Sun Belt Conference team to ever appear in either the Associated Press or Coaches Poll. Men's basketball won the 2017 Sun Belt Conference Tournament and advanced to its first NCAA Tournament since 2003, while the women's basketball program has won back-to-back Sun Belt Tournament championships and appeared in two-straight NCAA Tournaments. Troy's golf programs have also excelled as the women's program has won three of the past four Sun Belt titles, while men's golf has advanced to three-straight NCAA Regionals. Troy's baseball team finished third in the Sun Belt in 2016 and defeated three ranked teams, including No. 5 Auburn.

Under Hartwell, Troy Athletics saw a significant enhancement in fundraising and external relations as he completely overhauled Troy's External Affairs division of the Athletics Department to increase revenues and enhance the fan and game day experience. As part of this makeover was the creation of a new external model,

negotiations that increased revenues with contracts for apparel and footwear (Nike), merchandise sales (Sports Avenue/LIDS), concessions (Centerplate), wireless provider (C Spire) and video boards (Daktronics). He served on the Southeastern Conference Ticket Committee and started the annual SEC Chief Financial Officers Forum.

A 1987 graduate of The Citadel, the 52-year old Hartwell spent four-plus years as a certified public accountant with Ernst & Young before returning to his alma mater to serve as the Director of Internal Audit in 1991. From 1994 to 1997, he was in private business as the Chief Financial Officer for a \$36 million beverage distributor on the South Carolina coast.

Hartwell's direct experience in athletics administration began as the Assistant Athletics Director for Business at Georgia State in 1997. He was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Internal Affairs in 1999, and his responsibilities expanded to include sport supervision for baseball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's track & field and cross country. He also had oversight over the Panthers' athletic facilities and game management in addition to his previous responsibilities of all financial aspects of the department. While at Georgia State, Hartwell earned a master's degree in sports administration.

Athletics has always been a big part of Hartwell's life, starting in high school where he was an all-state basketball selection at UMS-Wright in Mobile, Ala. The 6-foot-7 forward played alongside former North Carolina State and Alabama head coach Mark Gottfried in high school. Hartwell went on to play collegiately at The Citadel, where he was a three-year starter, a four-year letterman and captain of the team as a senior in 1987.

Hartwell is married to Dr. Heather Seale Hartwell, and they have two daughters, Lauren (8) and Madison (5). Hartwell also has a 25-year old son, Hunter, a Vanderbilt graduate who works for Deloitte Consulting.

which included the addition of a Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs; bringing corporate sponsorships in house with a partnership with Rockbridge Sports Group; and the development of the Troy Affinity Program to further engage Troy students in athletics.

Hartwell's strong business background also proved to be valuable at Troy as he negotiated a new footwear and apparel deal with Adidas, while also securing home-and-home football games with Duke and North Carolina State in addition to yielding a home basketball game with Mississippi. Hartwell's tenure at Troy also saw a record number of student-athletes earn a 3.0 grade-point-average, an upward trend in APR scores and additional staff positions in Troy's academic support department. During the 2014-15 academic year, Troy student-athletes finished with a 3.01 cumulative grade-point-average and over 57 percent of Troy's student-athletes had a 3.0 GPA or higher.

At Troy, Hartwell served on the NCAA Division I Basketball Issues Committee, the Division I-A Board of Trustees Executive Committee, and the NCAA Division I Council as the Sun Belt Conference representative. He has also been an instructor at the Division I-A Institute for aspiring athletic directors.

Prior to being the Director of Athletics at Troy, Hartwell spent nine-plus years at the University of Mississippi, where he was the Senior Executive Associate Athletics Director, serving as the number two administrator in athletics.

Hartwell served as the Treasurer and Chief Operating Officer of the Mississippi Athletic Association Foundation, a 501 (c)(3) organization that generated over \$17 million annually for the Ole Miss Athletics Department through priority seating and major gifts.

He was responsible for the day-to-day administrative oversight of the football, men's basketball and baseball programs, along with sport oversight of the softball and men's and women's track & field and cross country programs. Hartwell also oversaw the Rebels' business office, ticket office, equipment room, merchandise sales, concessions and football scheduling. Hartwell scheduled several marquee football games for the Rebels, including a home-and-home series with Texas that began in 2012.

Hartwell managed the growth of the Ole Miss athletic budget from \$26 million in the 2003 fiscal year to over \$47 million in the 2012 fiscal year. He also chaired the search to hire men's basketball head coach Andy Kennedy in 2006. He was heavily involved in

First Year at USU

Coleman Barnes is in his first year with Utah State Athletics as Assistant Vice President and Deputy Director of Athletics for External Affairs. Barnes will lead USU's athletic development staff, including the Big Blue Scholarship Fund and Aggies Unlimited. He will also oversee USU athletics' external departments, which include marketing and promotions, media relations, ticket sales and Aggie Sports Properties.

Barnes comes to Utah State after spending the past four years at Miami University, where he served as the Associate Athletics Director/Senior Director of Development for three-and-a-half years, before being promoted to Executive Associate Athletics Director/Senior Director of Development this past January.

During his time at Miami, Barnes served as a co-manager for the Graduating Champions Campaign, raising more than \$65 million toward the \$80 million goal. In 2015, Barnes' team raised a then-record \$28.3 million in gifts and pledges, including \$5.02 million in cash.

Barnes has also boosted Miami's Red & White Club membership to over 2,000 members, a 27-percent increase since his arrival in 2013 and has increased revenue by 24 percent, up to \$880,000 per year.

Prior to Miami, Barnes spent two years at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB), as the Associate Athletics Director for Development. Barnes oversaw Blazer Boosters, the fundraising unit for UAB Athletics, increasing the annual fund membership by 54 percent through a 16-month initiative.

Prior to UAB, Barnes served as the Executive Director of The Bulldog Foundation and Associate Athletics Director for Development at Fresno State from 2008-11. As an executive administrator, Barnes oversaw all components of the development office that raised approximately \$6 million annually. He also managed a development team that successfully secured funding for a \$6 million sports medicine center and a \$1.2 million turf project.

From 2005-08, Barnes served as the Assistant Director for the UMAA Foundation, the fundraising unit for Ole Miss Athletics, playing an integral role in raising nearly \$13 million annually.

Prior to Ole Miss, Barnes was a Development Associate for the Hurricane Club at the University of Miami (2004-05) and an intern in the Harvard University Athletics Ticket Office (2003-04).

Barnes graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in education from the University of Kentucky in 2002 with a major in kinesiology and a minor in business. He was also a three-year letterwinner as the long snapper on the Wildcats' football team. In 2004, Barnes earned a master's of science degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in sport management from Kentucky. He will complete his Ph.D. in higher education from Ole Miss in August.

A native of Bardstown, Ky., Barnes is married to the former Mary Beth Justice and the couple has two children, Caroline (6) and William (5).

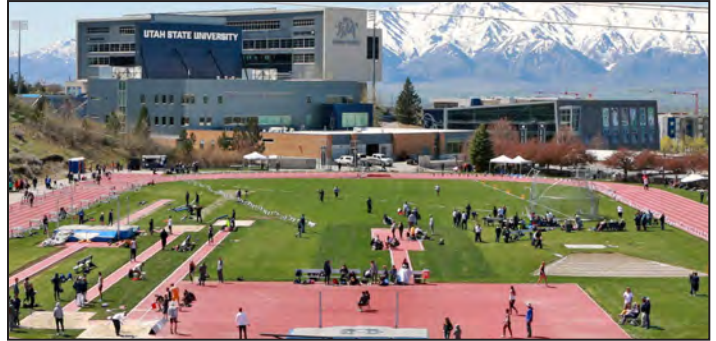

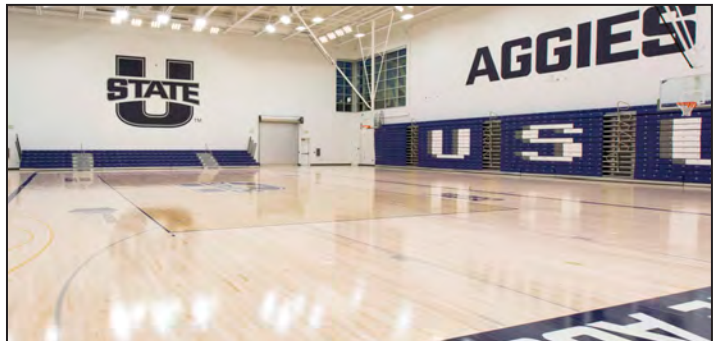

THIS IS THE MOUNTAIN WEST

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 19th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements during its first 18 years, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In the inaugural year of the new College Football Playoff system, Boise State earned the automatic slot into a New Year's Six bowl game as the highest-ranked champion from the Group of Five 5 conferences. The Broncos defeated then 10th-ranked Arizona 38-30 in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San Jose State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean, while the addition of the women's soccer program at Colorado College gives the MW an additional presence in the Rocky Mountains.

HISTORY OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. TCU re-joined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06. With conference realignment sweeping the nation in recent years, the MW has been proactive in addressing membership changes. Boise State University joined the Mountain West in 2011-12, followed by Fresno State and the University of Nevada on July 1, 2012. Also on July 1, 2012, the University of Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Conference. On July 1, 2013, the Mountain West further expanded when San José State University and Utah State University joined the Conference, bringing to 11 the number of full-time member institutions and 12 football-playing members. On July 1, 2014, the Colorado College women's soccer program became the first non-football affiliate member of the Mountain West, expanding that sport to 12 Conference participants.

When the Mountain West officially began operations on July 1, 1999, the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN, giving the broadcast entity exclusive national television rights to MW football and men's basketball, and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl. Commissioner Thompson also arranged a third bowl tie-in each of the first three seasons (1999 Motor City, 2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans) before securing a four-year deal with the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco in 2002.

Entering the 2017 season, the MW has agreements with seven (7) different bowl games that will generate at least five (5) guaranteed postseason opportunities for its member institutions. These include primary positions with the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Gildan New Mexico Bowl, NOVA® Home Loans Arizona Bowl, Las Vegas Bowl, and Hawai'i Bowl - and secondary positions with the Ticket City Cactus Bowl and the Foster Farms Bowl.

An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in seven inaugural bowl games (2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans, 2002 San Francisco (Emerald), 2005 Poinsettia, 2006 New Mexico, 2015 Arizona, 2015 Cure), as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying FBS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and into the College Football Playoff (CFP) with Boise State's selection to the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.
