Thousands of acres await you outdoors when you visit Indiana state park properties, state forests, fish & wildlife areas, and nature preserves.

That's a lot of room, but many of our recreation facilities in state parks are built in concentrated areas we develop more intensively for campgrounds, roads, inns and lodges, playgrounds, cabins, swimming facilities, and picnic areas. Doing so allows us to better conserve the natural and historical features that make our sites unique. We build trails to provide you access to many of the more fragile areas.

Because recreation facilities may be close together, guests may be concentrated in those areas, too. Our properties can become like small cities on weekends, creating a thriving environment that requires us to be considerate of each other. Think not only about your experience when you visit, think about sharing space with other campers, hikers, anglers, swimmers, and picnickers to help them make great memories, too.

Sharing space outdoors responsibly may be as simple as keeping your dog on a 6-foot leash when you hike or clearing your campsite and fire ring of litter before you go home.

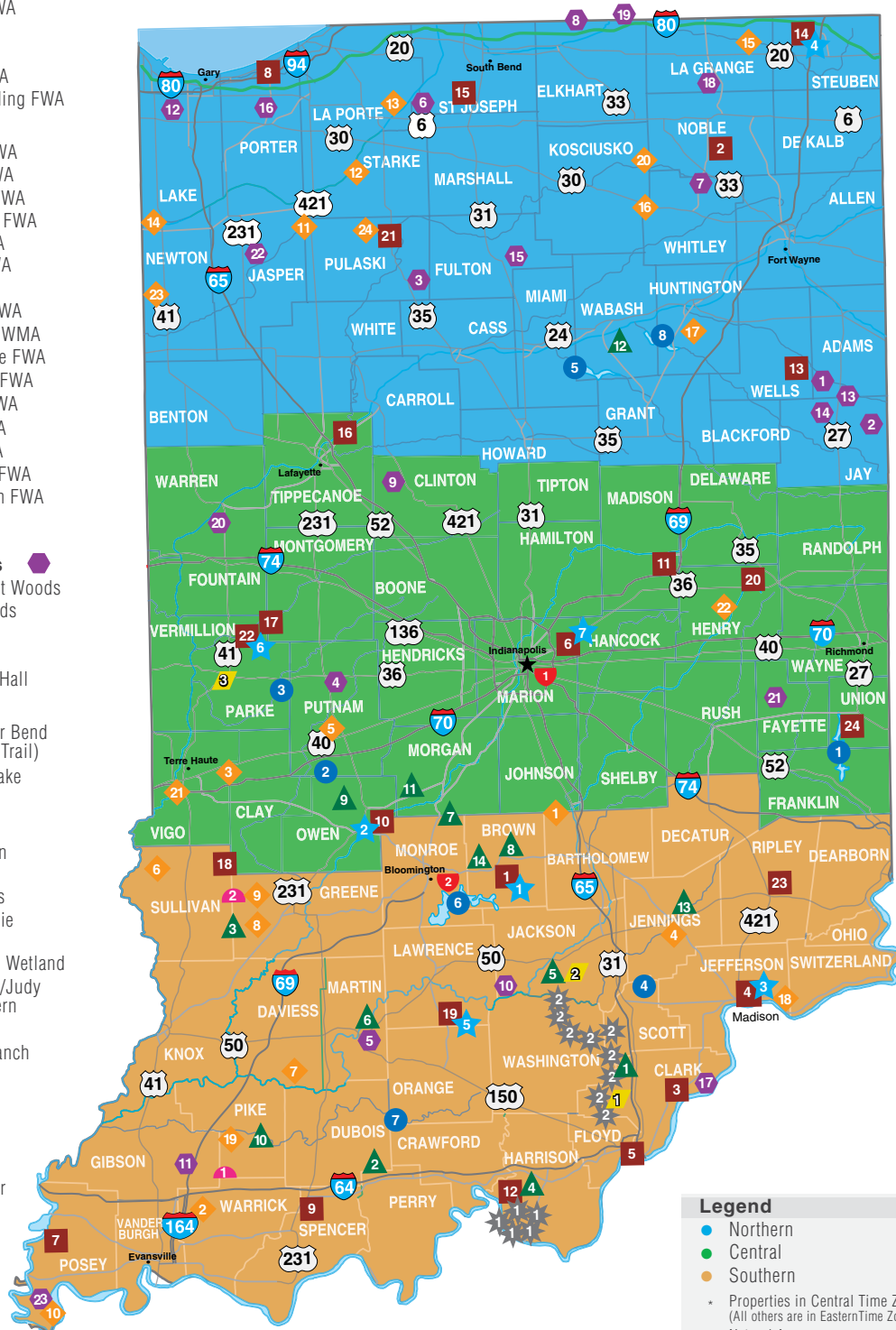

How to Recreate Responsibly

For nearly 40 years of her adult life, Jennifer Herring of Indianapolis has been camping at Indiana state parks.

She says she's never seen both tent and RV camping as consistently full as they have been since the height of the pandemic.

Patrick Haulter, assistant property manager at Brown County State Park, verified Herring's observations. He said camping at that park used to be full in May, then drop off some until October, but now the campgrounds are full nearly every weekend. He thinks many people bought campers, bikes, new hiking boots or other outdoor gear during or after the pandemic, creating new hobbies many of them are still enjoying.

This trend is not just evident at state park properties; nature preserves, state forests, and fish & wildlife areas are also getting more guests.

Some of the new visitors haven't been outdoors in properties like these before and may not be used to their guidelines, which are designed to help people share space and to conserve the natural and historic resources of the site. Haulter said most people who are outdoor novices are enthusiastic and learning. However, there can be growing pains as they adjust to what may be new ways.

Herring said she always makes sure to follow outdoor guidelines, and others should do the same.

"Outdoor ethics are important because it makes the experience great for all people," Herring said. "When adults don't know or understand what they should do, they can't pass it on to their kids."

When visiting any DNR area, always pick up trash at your site and deposit it in dumpsters if you camp or picnic, following the carry in, carry out rule. In addition, anything

that you bring into a DNR property for day use, you must take out. To cut down on the amount you need to carry out in either case, bring extra trash bags to put refuse in and use refillable water bottles.

Many DNR guidelines involve camping etiquette. Never walk through someone else's campsite. When a site is rented, campers think of it as their property for the time they are there. Treat the campsite as you would treat someone's private yard and ask before going on their space. Also, do not move a picnic table from another campsite to yours. There is one table per site, and borrowing a second one from another site can bring about bad feelings and create confrontations.

At night, be respectful of nearby campers. Greg Sanders of Evansville said he's had nights camping during which he hasn't been able to sleep because the site next to him has lit their site too brightly, and it's shone in on his area—even through his shades and blinds. To ensure this doesn't happen, turn your lights, music and video down or off, respecting the park's quiet hours as the evening stretches on. This will allow you and campers around you to enjoy sounds like those of a crackling campfire, katydids, and cicadas.

Always build campfires only in fire rings. Following the firewood rule, only bring in firewood if it's kiln-dried lumber with no bark or is from Indiana and has all bark removed or bears a USDA, Indiana, or other state compliance stamp. Most DNR campgrounds have an area where you can buy firewood on site. The purpose of these rules and procedures is to prevent the spread of emerald ash borer and other destructive insects and diseases that can be transported on or in the wood.

Golf cart use is allowed in campground areas, but only if the user is 65 or older or has a disability that is documented by the Social Security Administration. Golf

cart operators must have a valid driver's license. Do not drive them outside of designated campgrounds. Pedestrians and traffic are not looking for them on campground roads, and accidents can happen.

Haulter said whether at a campsite or walking, new visitors need to remember to keep an eye on their pets. On DNR properties, pets should be kept on a 6-foot leash at all times for the safety of the pet and wildlife, and for the comfort of other guests. Building temporary structures like corrals or cages on DNR properties to contain a pet does not meet DNR guidelines because the pet could easily jump out. Instead, pets can be put in crates.

Dawn Hanson of Greenfield has a dog and follows the 6-foot-leash rule but gets uncomfortable when others don't.

"The typical response from a dog owner when their dog comes running toward me is 'don't worry, he's friendly,'" she said. "It may be, but I am terrified of that, and my dog does not do well around other dogs when he's on a leash. We try to walk when others won't be around as much."

Many ethics and courtesy rules apply to other uses of DNR properties. Allen Hurst, trails coordinator with DNR, gave a few tips on ways to hike responsibly.

Always stay on the trail unless you need to get off to let other hikers pass or take a break. Hurst said most trails are designed specifically to limit their environmental impact and to make the trails as safe as possible for users. This is done by choosing a location that disturbs the least amount of plant and animal life, but also by designing the trail to prevent water damage. Water can erode trails and make them uneven and unsafe, so designing gradients and ways for the water to drain is essential.

While on trail, remember to leave things as you found them. Do not disturb plants. Leave rocks where they are because they are an important part of the ecosystem, and moving or stacking them can disturb insects and other ground-dwelling wildlife. Guests can collect berries, fruits, nuts, fallen cones, mushrooms, leaves, and greens, including asparagus, mustard, dandelion, plantain, or poke.

Walking single file helps to minimize a group's impact on the trail and allows room for other hikers to go around you.

When encountering hikers on a hill, yield to the uphill hiker because hikers going uphill can see less than those going downhill. Uphill hikers are also expending far more energy and may not want to interrupt their momentum. They may choose to let downhill hikers pass while they take a break, but that's up to the uphill hiker.

When hiking during hunting season on properties where hunting is allowed, it's a good idea to wear bright colors like blaze orange so you can be seen.

Be sure you always let someone know where you will be hiking and give them an estimated time that you'll be on the trail and return. Pick up a map, wear appropriate footwear, and always pack water and snacks.

By practicing these tips, Hoosiers and other guests at DNR properties can enjoy the benefits that getting outdoors can provide while sharing space with others, allowing everyone to have great experiences and make fond memories.

GET READY FOR INDIANA'S APRIL 8 SKYSHOW

On April 8, a once-in-a-lifetime event will cross Indiana skies.

The orbit of the moon will pass in front of the sun, completely blocking it and making the afternoon day look like night for the first time in Indiana since Aug. 7, 1869. Called a total solar eclipse, the darkness will last around four minutes in the center of the eclipse's path, also called its zone of totality, and all areas within the zone will experience a period of darkness. The zone will encompass about half of Indiana as shown on the map on page 14.

DNR has spent more than a year preparing for this event. It has 54 properties in the eclipse's path of totality, including 14 state parks, 14 fish & wildlife areas, 11 state forests, six state-managed lakes, three nature preserves, Starve Hollow State Recreation Area, the DNR's two off-road state recreation areas, Redbird and Interlake, and three satellite properties managed by state parks. All rooms at state park inns in the zone are booked. Reservable campsites may still be available in some locations; visit camp.IN.gov to check. Nonreservable DNR campsites, found only at a few state forest locations, will be first-come, first-served, as usual.

If you live within the zone of totality, you may want to stay home and view the eclipse from your backyard. The event is expected to draw many watchers from out of state, and the population in some towns within the zone of totality could increase threefold. The time it takes to drive back home could more than double. Parking will fill early, and entry to state park properties will close when those spots are taken. If you visit a DNR property the day of the eclipse, leave home early and plan to stay the entire day.

Ginger Murphy, deputy director of the Division of State Parks, suggests those going to DNR properties prepare by packing a bag like they would for carry-on luggage on an airplane, including food, water, medicines, and equipment—and a change of clothes, just in case. Most comfort stations will be open for use. At state parks, staff and volunteers will direct guests to the best areas for eclipse watching. Watch for these workers as you enter.

One of the best ways to safely view the eclipse is with a pair of eclipse glasses, which are specially designed to block the sun's rays. Make sure your pair comes from a manufacturer that has been approved by the American Astronomical Society, as listed at eclipse.aas.org/resources/solar-filters. You can buy AAS-approved eclipse glasses on the website shopINstateparks.com and in Indiana State Park offices and inns gift shops. Once in hand, make sure to protect the glasses so they don't get scratched or otherwise damaged. Some may be available for purchase at state park properties the day of viewing, but supplies will be limited, so don't wait until then. Cost for the DNR options is \$3 for one pair, four pairs for \$10.

Many state parks are offering interpretive programming that will address how eclipse day will affect Indiana. Those programs will kick into high gear on the weekends just before the eclipse. Some parks will have events April 8, after the eclipse ends, for those who want to stay and wait for traffic to let up before they leave.

However you plan to enjoy the eclipse, just don't miss it. You probably won't see anything like it again.

Annual Passes and Permits⁺

Important Information for Annual Entrance Pass (Resident and Nonresident) and Golden Hoosier Passport:

- Passes admit cardholder and all persons accompanying cardholder in a single private, family-type, noncommercial vehicle or two motorcycles to all properties administered by the DNR, State of Indiana, where entrances are designated and fees are charged.
- Passes are valid from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31 of year issued.
- Passes can be used for parking fees at Falls of the Ohio State Park, but cannot be used for entrance into its Interpretive Center.
- Passes are valid at Indiana Dunes State Park, but not Indiana Dunes National Park.
- Passes may not be used at Indiana State Historic Sites or the Indiana State Museum.

Golden Hoosier Passport* Types • \$25

For Indiana residents who meet one of the following criteria:

- Purchase a Golden Hoosier Passport if you are at least 65 years or older.
- Purchase a DHV if you are a Disabled Hoosier Veteran (DHV) who possesses or is eligible to purchase a DHV license plate.
- Purchase a SSDI if you are receiving or eligible to receive Social Security Disability Income (SSDI) under 42 U.S. Code 423 as described by the Social Security Administration.

The Golden Hoosier Passport (GHP) is not transferable to family members or any other individual. The eligible cardholder must be present in the vehicle at the time of use.

Permit is issued to purchaser only and valid for one Off-Road Vehicle per visit. The DNR reserves the right to revoke permit at any time if improperly used.

Annual Motorized Nonresident DNR ORV Permit • \$20

Allows nonresident pass holders use of ORV trails at Interlake and Redbird OSRAs. Valid for one calendar year. Does not meet Indiana requirements for ORV use on county roads open to ORVs. Does not cover entrance fee.

It is illegal to copy or reproduce any pass or permit, and doing so will be considered fraud. Individuals presenting a copied or reproduced pass or permit for sale or personal use will be prosecuted. There will be no refund or replacement of lost passes or permits.

Disclaimer: Fees, operating hours and other details may change during the year. Swimming pool operating hours are dependent upon lifeguard availability. Beaches may be unguarded; therefore, patrons swim at their own risk.

Reservation Transfer: A transfer from one campsite or date to another on a reservation will be allowed until close of business the day before arrival. **Transfers to another person are not allowed.** A fee for each site transfer will be assessed for this service.

Walk-up Rentals: Campsites that are not reserved become available for first-come, first-served camping on the day of arrival ONLY. Remember that camping reservations can be made until 2 p.m. ET on your day of arrival, so we recommend that you reserve ahead of time to guarantee your spot.

Length of Stay: Campers are limited to a maximum 14-night stay. After 14 nights campers must vacate the property for two nights before they can re-register for an additional stay. There is a requirement of two nights on non-holiday weekends, Thursday & Friday, Friday & Saturday or Saturday & Sunday. On holiday weekends, campers are required to reserve three nights unless otherwise designated. (See Holiday Minimum Stays on page 43.)

Set-up: May begin after checkout time on the first day, and the site must be clear by 2 p.m. on the last day, except Sundays (or Monday of a holiday weekend) when campers may stay

until 5 p.m. Campgrounds are closed at 11 p.m., and no set-up of campsites may occur during quiet hours. Generators or other similar equipment that produces noise may only be operated from 7 a.m. until 11 p.m.

Number of People/Tents/Vehicles per Site:

Six is the maximum number of people allowed at a campsite. Each site may have two tents, or one camper and one small tent. Vehicles are limited to either 1 or 2 per site, depending upon the property. Additional vehicles must be parked in designated overflow parking lots.

Age of Campers: At least one person at the campsite must be 18 years old. The responsible party registering for the campsite shall remain at the site for the entire stay.

Visitors to Your Site: Day visitors are welcome. They must park in the campground parking lot and may walk to your campsite. Visiting hours are 7 a.m. until 11 p.m. each day.

Accessibility for Persons with Disabilities:

For specific information about accessibility, please contact the property manager at the facility you wish to visit.

Firewood: Collecting firewood or cutting down standing trees is not permitted in state parks and recreation areas. Laws about the only types of firewood you can bring to DNR properties are below. You can purchase firewood at most state parks and reservoirs. Price varies by property.



FIREWOOD

ONLY the following types of firewood may be used on DNR properties:

- Kiln-dried scrap lumber
- Wood from your home or other location in Indiana with the bark removed. (Ideally ½ inch of sapwood beneath the bark should also be removed.)
- Wood purchased from a department store, grocery store, gas station, etc., bearing a USDA compliance stamp or a compliance stamp from Indiana or from another state.
- Wood purchased from a local firewood vendor outside the property that has a state compliance stamp with it.
- Wood purchased from the property camp store or on-site firewood vendor and has a state compliance stamp.

Failure to comply with this rule may result in a citation and fine of up to \$500.

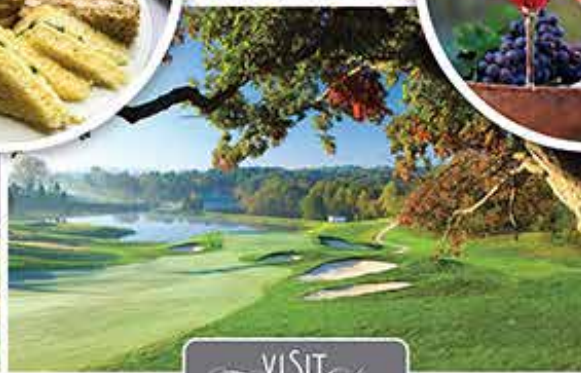
