Why is the NWR Important?

- COORDINATE initiatives at the watershed scale for efficiencies and to avoid duplication

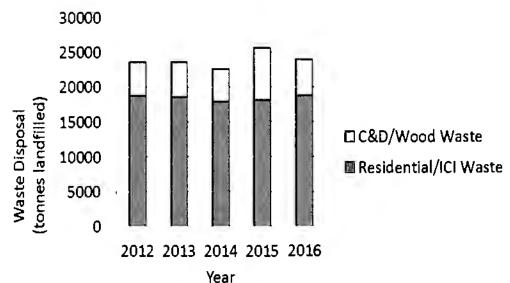

Discussion took place in regard to the 2009 Waste Composition Study and if the study would be updated to better understand the current waste stream. Ms. McIver noted that waste composition studies are a snapshot of the situation at that time and since the study in 2009 there have been notable changes such as the cardboard ban that was implemented. That snapshot and the knowledge of what has occurred during 2009 to 2017 will allow for considerations to be made without having to complete a new study. With considerations and constraints to the budget conducting another study at this time may not be required.

Discussion took place in regard to the inequitable differences between some of the guidelines for residential and ICI (Industrial, Commercial, Institutional) packaging and printed paper (PPP). Ministry of Environment has indicated that including ICI and the business sector is a very complicated process. Chair Miller commented that it would be beneficial to include ICI with residential recycling in order to balance inequities in recycling between northern BC and southern BC. The need to continue to raise the issue in discussions with the Ministry of Environment and Recycle BC was discussed.

Chair Miller thanked Mmes. Molver and Quan for attending the meeting.

Director Bachrach mentioned that the Town of Smithers Council received the Regional Emergency Support Services (ESS) report at its last council meeting. He spoke of the Town of Smithers Council potentially considering the report for further discussion.

Discussion took place in regard to having joint municipal/RDBN ESS teams and what future agreements could look like. Discussion took place that the ESS system and structure requires more resources to respond adequately throughout the region at both a regional and municipal level. Tasks which benefit from economies of scale could be performed by the RDBN and tasks which are more efficiently and effectively performed at a local level could be performed by municipalities. Director Repen brought forward the challenges of small municipalities having the capacity to provide ESS staffing allocations. Director Bachrach spoke to bringing agreements forward at municipal council meetings in the future.

The importance of having volunteer recruitment and retention, along with the ESS Director (ESSD) at a local community level was discussed. Director Bachrach identified the need to take into consideration the responsibility of an ESS volunteer in regard to regional responses similar to Fire Department Memorandums of Understanding. He also noted that volunteer recruitment is often based on local relationships and communications and that trying to develop a volunteer base at the Regional District level would be challenging. Jason Llewellyn, Director of Planning and Protective Services noted that options could be established for ESSD's for localized sub-regional teams and potentially working with Red Cross or Victims Services teams at the discretion of each local government.

Mr. Llewellyn noted that staff intends to work with member municipalities to determine specific details and potential cost allocations moving forward at the Regional Board's discretion. The importance of consulting with current ESS volunteers in moving forward with agreements was also discussed.

Director Fisher mentioned that in moving forward a more detailed cost analysis and options would need to be discussed. He also spoke of the possibility of having an ESSD Coordinator. Discussion took place in regard to the potential options for the provision of a municipal ESSD and the roles and responsibilities at both the Regional District level and the municipal level in line with the recommendations outlined by Mr. Llewellyn's January 15, 2018 staff report titled "Regional Emergency Support Services (ESS).

Director Thiessen brought forward concerns in regard to the impact to the Vanderhoof Fire Department with the recent announcement from EMBC not issuing task numbers to reimburse fire departments for road rescue services in areas covered by a local government road rescue service. The original intent of the Road Rescue Service Bylaw was to provide a small compensation to the Vanderhoof Fire Department for the heating of the building and storage for the road rescue vehicle. Director Petersen noted that it also provided the ability for rural areas to provide small compensation to road rescue. Director Thiessen also noted that the cost for equipment damaged while on scene can be quite substantial. He spoke of the need to change the bylaw to allow for Vanderhoof Fire Department to submit reimbursement to EMBC for road rescue services.

Jason Llewellyn, Director of Planning noted that staff will work with Topley Fire, Fort St. James Fire, Fraser Lake and Vanderhoof Fire Departments to develop recommendations for Board consideration regarding the amendment or repeal of the three road rescue bylaws.

Mr. Llewellyn reported that in 2017 EMBC awarded funding to the Fire Chiefs' Association of British Columbia to develop a proposed governance framework for road rescue services in B.C. Staff are seeking clarification in regard to the scope of the review and to identify opportunities for local government to provide input into the review of road rescue services.

Discussion took place in regard to the absence of an identifiable provincial government agency being responsible for road rescue in B.C. and the need to encourage the Provincial Government to review the issue. Chair Miller commented that road rescue service is provided to whomever may need it. Travelers from all parts of the world utilize provincial roadways not just local residents/taxpayers and there needs to be a provincial solution to address the issue.

Director Repen mentioned that the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure identifies that having Highway 16 travel through communities in the region is a benefit but he noted that there is a significant cost and liability associated with having roadways and there isn't adequate compensation for road response.

Discussions took place in regard to the time line and challenges to complete potential changes to the bylaws.

Discussion took place regarding the importance of bringing the road rescue issue forward to the Honourable Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General.

Staff contacted EMBC in regard to reasons for establishing the road rescue service bylaws. EMBC clearly indicated that if a service establishment bylaw exists with the RDBN the responding fire departments do not qualify for EMBC reimbursement. EMBC has also indicated that they will only accept a formal process to either amend or repeal the bylaw before they will consider issuing task numbers to reimburse fire departments for road rescue services.

Director Lindstrom indicated Fraser Lake Fire Department is experiencing similar issues. Director Brienen will follow-up with the Houston Fire Department to determine if they are experiencing issues.

Director Brienen spoke of forwarding resolutions to NCLGA and/or UBCM in regard to road rescue service. Chair Miller noted that the issue is a very important safety matter and needs to be addressed.

Staff will have further discussions with Electoral Area Directors in regard to road rescue services.

Mr. Llewellyn mentioned that the RDBN has been invited by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to attend a meeting February 1, 2018 with the Town of Smithers in Smithers to discuss the four at-grade rail crossings (West and East) of Smithers identified as a Transportation Trade network priority. There is also opportunity for the Regional Board to forward additional areas of concern to the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI). Discussion took place in regard to the intent of the Transportation Trade Network Analysis and its review of long-term efficiencies and movement of goods along the transportation corridor including both rail and truck.

Director Brienen brought forward concerns regarding cost implications to municipalities in regard to crossing upgrades within communities. In the past there were very few trains that travelled through communities and now there is an average of 26 trains a day travelling through Houston. He also raised concerns in regard to the safety of communities with the number of trains travelling through municipalities. Discussion took place in regard to the need and importance of mitigating the impacts to communities. Frustrations were expressed regarding the lack of responsibility and open communication with the companies using and responsible for the railway system.

Director Thiessen and Brienen expressed the need to have further discussions in regard to the issue of railway safety issues and mitigating impacts to communities.

SUBJECT: Canada Summer Jobs Attestation

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board generally applies each year to the federal government under the Canada Summer Jobs program for funding to hire summer students. These funds are important in enabling us to create student employment for young people interested in exploring opportunities in the field of local government and completing prioritized organizational projects.

New this year, the federal government requires signature of an attestation before an application will be considered; no funding is available unless the applicant signs the attestation. Given the contentious nature of the wording of the attestation, and the Board not having taken a position in relation to the content in relation to the Regional District's core mandate, staff is seeking a decision of the Board with respect to this year's application. The wording of the attestation is as follows:

Attestation

- I have read and understood the Canada Summer Jobs Articles of the Agreement and referred to the Applicant Guide as needed;
- The job would not be created without the financial assistance provided under a potential contribution agreement;
- Both the job* and my organizations core mandate* respect individual human rights in Canada, including the values underlying the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms as well as other rights. These include reproductive rights and the right to be free from discrimination on the basis of sex, religion, race, national or ethnic origin, colour, mental or physical disability or sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression:
- I have all the necessary authorities, permissions and approvals to submit this application on behalf of myself and the organization.
- * Please refer to the Applicant Guide for further information regarding eligible activities and organization's mandate.

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A copy of the 'eligible activities and 'organization's mandate' sections are attached to this report. Staff is seeking a resolution of the Board on the organization's core mandate and whether Staff is authorized to sign the attestation.

Should the Board be supportive of the content of the attestation, a resolution is required as follows:

That the RDBN Board of Directors agree to enter into a contract with Employment and Social Development Canada for Summer Student wage subsidies, should the funding be approved.

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3.4.2 Mandatory Employment Related Costs

Employers are required by law to pay the Mandatory Employment Related Costs (MERCs) for their employees. These costs include Employment Insurance premiums, Canada or Quebec Pension Plan contributions, vacation pay, Workers' Compensation premiums or equivalent liability insurance (if applicable), health insurance and parental insurance premiums in Quebec and Ontario, the Health and Post-Secondary Education Tax in Newfoundland and Labrador, and the Health and Education Levy in Manitoba.

For your information, payroll deductions tables can be found on the <u>CRA</u> website. Check with the appropriate provincial or territorial authorities to ensure that you have the most updated rate information.

Not-for-profit employers are eligible for reimbursement of Mandatory Employment Related Costs for up to 100% of the minimum hourly wage in the province or territory where the activities will take place. All other employers are not eligible for funding to cover Mandatory Employment Related Costs, in whole or in part.

3.4.3 Overhead Costs - Students with Disabilities

All employers may be eligible for additional funding of up to \$3,000 per student with disabilities to accommodate the student within the workplace. However, only personal tools and adaptations and professional support services (e.g. visual language interpreters) that the student requires to accomplish tasks covered under the agreement will be considered eligible.

3.5 Eligible Activities

The job must provide meaningful work experience for the student. It must not contribute to the provision of a personal service to the employer (e.g. the job must not involve gardening, domestic services, child care services, etc., for the employer).

To be eligible, the job must respect individual human rights in Canada, including the values underlying the <u>Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms</u> (Charter) as well as other rights. These include reproductive rights and the right to be free from discrimination on the basis of sex, religion, race, national or ethnic origin, colour, mental or physical disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression.

The students must work in Canada for the entire duration of the approved funding period; work that takes place outside of Canada is ineligible.

10. Organization's Mandate

Indicate your organization's mandate and also provide a summary of its main activities.

The core mandate of your organization must respect individual human rights in Canada, including the values underlying the <u>Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms</u> as well as other rights. These include reproductive rights and the right to be free from discrimination on the basis of sex, religion, race, national or ethnic origin, colour, mental or physical disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression.

11. Number of Full-Time Employees Working in Canada

Indicate the total number of full-time employees working for your organization across the country (not only those working in your branch). Full-time employees are those who work 30 hours or more per week.

If there are only part-time employees working for your organization, enter "0".

12. Mailing Address of Employer

Indicate your organization's mailing address to which all correspondence will be sent, including any payments.

13. Address of the Location of the Proposed Activities

Indicate the main address where the student will be working if this address is different from the mailing address. This address cannot be a post office box (PO Box); it must be a civic address.

If the proposed activities will take place in multiple locations, you must ensure that these locations are in the same constituency. To determine the constituency, consult the <u>Elections Canada</u> website. Indicate all the other addresses where the student will be working. These addresses cannot be post office boxes (PO Box); they must be civic addresses. If the locations of the proposed activities are in multiple constituencies, a separate application must be submitted for each constituency.

Important: The employer must offer the job within the constituency for which the application is submitted. This includes cases where the student will work remotely, at a personal premises (e.g. employer's home), or away from the supervisor's location, or from somewhere else outside of a traditional workplace. Essentially, the location where the student will perform the job duties must be within the constituency for which the application is submitted. If the location of the proposed activities changes after you submit your application or after you are approved for funding (e.g. once the student is recruited and the remote work location can be confirmed), you must inform Service Canada. If the change occurs after you are approved for funding, Service Canada and the employer must both agree on the change, otherwise the job may be considered ineligible for funding.

If the work will be performed remotely, at a personal premises (e.g. employer's home), or away from the supervisor's location, or from somewhere else <u>outside of a traditional</u> workplace, the employer is responsible for ensuring that the location respects provincial

Last year the Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine (RDKS) requested Hazelton and area be included in the Farmers Markets and Producer listings. The extra cost to produce the pages and printing of the brochures was covered by the RDKS. The RDKS has requested that Hazelton be included in the brochure again this year. The feedback they received was positive.

The benefits of including Hazelton are the added exposure for the producers, especially for Electoral Area A, Smithers and Telkwa. Working with the RDKS also strengthens relationships between the two regional districts. The concern with including producers and farmers markets outside of the RDBN is the confusion about boundaries and the need to clarify the services the Agriculture Coordinator can offer. There is also the possibility that the benefit to the RDBN producers may be diluted with including out of region producers in the directory.

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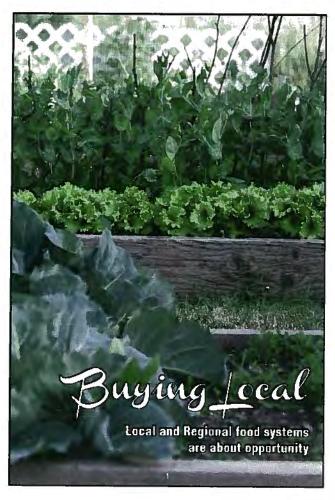
introduction

Agriculture continues to play an important role in the region's economy. Due to increased globalization of the agriculture industry and increased health regulations, the agriculture sector has been identified by the RDBN as an area of focus. The 2012 RDBN Agriculture Plan addressed the need to create a marketing campaign for locally produced food. Section 3.5.1 of the RDBN Agriculture Plan states:

"The RDBN should undertake a long-term low level marketing compaign to maintain public awareness of the benefits of purchasing local food products. This may include the development of information posters and brochures, the purchase of local food products for events, and the inclusion of reminders notes in newsletters and other promatianal materials"

The Connecting Consumers & Producers project was developed to address this direct action. This marketing project supports local agriculture by connecting consumers with producers in the eight municipalities and seven rural areas within the RDBN.

In the first year of the project (2014) three activities were completed; purchase of agriculture resources for libraries, sponsorship of community events, and development of an agriculture brochure. The second, third and fourth years of the project (2015, 2016, 2017) have seen the completion of community event sponsorships and updates and reprinting of the agriculture brochure.

Connecting Consumers & Producers Agriculture Brochure

This project activity involved research, updates, printing, and distribution of the Agriculture Brochure designed by the Regional Economic Development Department in 2014. The intent of the brochure is to provide a resource for consumers that encourages preservation of food as a means to eat local all year

round and provide a directory of local producers inclusive of all communities in the RDBN.

In 2017, research for the brochure was done inhouse by RDBN staff, and design of the brochure was done by local graphic designer Erin Martens of EM2. Content was reviewed by the Lakes District 4-H Senior Council, and the Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine. The brochure was distributed at Connecting Consumers and Producers Community Events and Farmers Markets throughout the region. The brochure is also available on the project website. Feedback from community groups on the design and relevance of information in the brochure was very



positive. New to the 2017 brochure was the participation of Producers from the Hazelton area, as requested by the Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine, who partnered with the RDBN for production of the 2017 Brochure.

Contact is made with each producer listed in the directory during the design phase of the brochure to ensure accuracy. In 2017 producers were contacted by phone in May with follow-up emails. Producer lists were reviewed for omissions. Any producers not listed were asked to contact the Regional Economic Development Department if they wished to be listed in the directory.

Interest in listing in the directory is anticipated to increase among producers in the region with engagement created through the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako's Agriculture Coordinator position.

Connecting Consumers & Producers Community Events

This project activity involved a funding application process for community groups to host events in their communities that facilitated connecting consumers with the producers. This activity identifies sponsorship monies in 15 areas in the region (8 municipalities and 7 electoral areas). In 2017 a total of seven applications were received from potential host partners (6 were approved) and events included partnerships between 20 additional organizations. Events included workshops on preserving local products, harvest celebrations, and extended farmers' markets. In addition to grant funded events, the Bulkley Valley and Fraser Lake Farmer's Markets distributed Brochures and Local Promo Items. Mayor McDougall also delivered Brochures for distribution at the Fort St. James Community Market.

The community events provide opportunity for "face-to-face" exposure with producers and as a long term outcome they will increase producer's long-term sales. Short-term sales were increased through the products purchased to host the events. There was an increase in community spirit for those participating in the Connecting Producers & Consumers Community Events. By providing opportunities for producers and consumers to meet, the project supported the long-term viability of the local agriculture industry. Promotional items for events were purchased from three local producers; Blue Mountain Honey provided flavored honey samples, Wild Thyme Farm provided a powdered hot



pepper spice, and Tilted Heart Gifts provided wild tea. Spin-offs from this project will support the food producers and will encourage others to sell their locally produced products.

We were really happy to be able to provide fresh vegetables for the Children's Festival this year, and the exposure to our new market garden was fantastic."

Community events exposed producers to a large number of consumers. Consumer demand for local food products is on the rise, however, many consumers do not know where to purchase locally produced goods. This project was designed to make initial contacts to be followed by continued consumer purchases.

The challenge in 2017 was with community event participation in multiple areas of the region. Electoral Area 'D' (Fraser Lake Rural), Fort St. James, Electoral Area 'C' (Fort St. James Rural), Telkwa, Smithers, Electoral Area "E" and Electoral Area 'G' (Houston Rural) did not host events. The Houston Public Library was approved to host a Locavore Dinner, but due to challenges securing caterers for local produce in time, the event did not occur. The Fraser Lake Community Garden was also approved to host a Garden Tour and Lunch, but due to scheduling conflicts with partner organizations, the event was unable to occur. The Agriculture Coordinator will be a valuable resource for promoting the Community Event Funding, and an increase in Community Events is expected for 2018.

Connecting Consumers & Producers Social Media

A Facebook Page was added to the project in 2016. The short-term goal of the page was to engage with an online community. The page currently has 144 likes, and engagement with posts continues to improve.



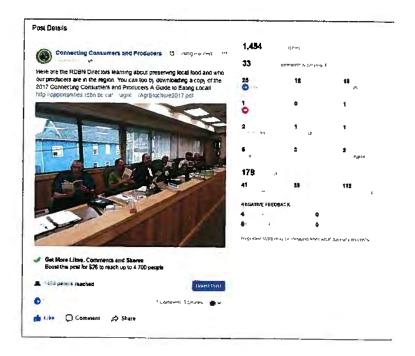
Posts were focused on connecting consumers with producers in the region. They included posts about the following:

Results of the Connecting Consumers and Producers Project

The Connecting Consumers and Producers project has been an initiative of the Regional Economic Development Department for four years. The project has promoted the region's producers and increased awareness of locally produced food.

There appeared to be a decrease in overall attendance at community events over 2016, which was mainly due to unusually high numbers in 2015 and 2016 reported from attendance at the Bulkley Valley Fall Fair and Exhibition. The number of producers involved in providing food for community events increased from 62 in 2016 to 63 in 2017.

We are excited about the anticipated increase in engagement with local producers in 2018 with the participation of the new RD Agriculture Coordinator. It will be highly beneficial to have the additional contact and relationship that the Ag Coordinator position fosters, which we anticipate will result in increased engagement with all aspects of the Connecting Consumers and Producers Program, including Brochure listings, Community Event participation, and overall increased sales in the industry.

By assisting marketing of small scale agriculture in the region through the Agriculture Brochure, the project increased consumer knowledge about eating locally produced food year round. The four-year total for Agriculture Brochures distribution is 4,290.

There were positive supports and feedback for the Connecting Consumers and Producers project in 2017. Community groups hosting events continue to be appreciative and feel the project makes a positive impact on increasing consumer's awareness of purchasing locally produced food. The Facebook page created a following on social media that will further engage producers and make connections with consumers.

The RDBN's commitment to the agriculture sector is evident through the success of the Connecting Consumers & Producers Project. Continued support of the agriculture industry will increase public awareness of the benefits of purchasing locally produced food.

The Environmental Services Department has requested the Regional District's assistance in the form of Federal Gas Tax Funds to purchase and install a backup generator for the Fort Fraser Water Supply.

The power outages to the community water supply have become more frequent in past years. To prevent potential damage to the water supply infrastructure and to minimize the delay in providing potable water to the residents both for drinking and firefighting purposes, the backup generator has been identified as a priority.

The cost of the purchase and installation of the generator has been estimated at \$65,000 plus GST, and we have allowed a 10% contingency to allow for fluctuations in the pricing.

Total uncommitted Gas Tax Funds remaining in Electoral Area 'D' allocation is \$350,231.45. Director Parker is supportive of this project and accessing Federal Gas Tax Funds in the amount of up to \$71,500 (plus recoverable GST). A Board resolution is required to contribute Federal Gas Tax Funds to this project.

BY-LAW NO. 736

A By-law to establish a local service within Electoral Areas "B" and "E" to provide a financial contribution for emergency response services

WHEREAS a Regional District may, by by-law, establish a local service under Section 788 (1) (g) of the <u>Municipal Act</u> to provide a financial contribution to the provision of assistance in response to classes of circumstances that may cause harm to persons or property;

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako wishes to establish a local service for the purpose of contributing to the cost of emergency response services through the Village of Burns Lake;

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board has obtained the assent of the electors under Section 797 of the <u>Municipal Act</u>, on the basis that the annual cost of the local service will not exceed FIFTY (\$.50) CENTS per ONE THOUSAND (\$1,000.00) DOLLARS of net taxable value in the Service Area;

AND WHEREAS the number of counter petitions against the by-law represents fewer than five (5%) percent of the electors in the Service Area;

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako hereby establishes a local service for the purpose of contributing to the costs incurred through the Village of Burns Lake in providing emergency response services within Electoral Areas "B" and "E" and known as the "Lakes District Emergency Response Contribution Local Service Area".
- 2. Riectoral Areas "B" and "E" are the sole participating areas for the Local Service Area.
- 3. The annual cost of the Local Service shall be recovered by a requisition of monies under Section 804 (1) (a) of the Municipal Act to be collected by a property value tax on improvements only in the participating areas.
- 4. The maximum amount that may be requisitioned for the cost of the Local Service shall be ONE THOUSAND (\$1,000.00.) DOLLARS.

5. This By-law may be cited for all purposes as the "Lakes District (Electoral Areas "B" and "E") Emergency Response Contribution Local Service Establishment By-law No. 736, 1993".

Re: Budget for Major Services for Five Year Financial Plan

The budget has been updated from the first draft budget presented on January 12, 2018.

The 2017 financial year is closed and staff have updated the budget with actual surplus (or deficit) amounts. The proposed budget for shared major services currently is \$5,949,393 (an increase of \$134,614 from the 2017 budget). This is a 2.3% increase over last year's budget.

The non-market change for the Regional District this year was 2.1%. Therefore, about 90% of the increase in the overall budget is expected to be recovered from new (taxable) construction that happened between July 1 of 2016 to July 1 of 2017.

Due to the increase in overall assessments (both market assessments and non-market assessments) in 2018, the tax rate will drop this year from \$119.32 to \$116.15 for a \$100,000 assessment for rural taxpayers and from \$93.02 to \$91.87 for a \$100,000 assessment for municipal taxpayers.

Changes in the rural budget from last year include \$49,000 for the 2018 elections, an allowance of \$7,000 for Director's electronic devices and a contingency of \$21,700 for special projects (including an allowance to investigate liability issues with Licenses of Occupation held by the Regional District).

In addition this budget reflects greater staff time allocated to emergency services to implement the ESS strategy.

The Regional Wide Services include increases in taxation to cover the new Agricultural Service (much of the total cost of this service is recovered through grants). In the general government administration budget, new costs include \$13,000 for the new internet fibre, \$25,000 for new software including \$12,000 budgeted for board agenda software (that staff are currently investigating), and \$40,000 for information technology hardware replacement (that is expected to last between four and six years). In the general government finance budget, new costs include two new previously approved staff positions — an accounts receivable clerk and a ½ time position dedicated to information technology (IT tech).



The complete budget for 2018, including the local services (but excluding the non-cash amortization), is \$20.600 million.

The sources of revenue for 2018 are mostly property taxes but also includes fees and charges (for such things as building permits and landfilling fees) and the surplus from 2017. Other sources of income labelled as 'Other Income' in the chart is mostly made up of grants in lieu of taxes and competitive grants such as the capital grant used to fund the Fort Fraser water system but also include other income such metal recycling and transfers from municipalities for debt financing.

Expenditures for 2018 are 70% operational expenses including transfers to other organizations such as those providing many of the local services. Capital expenditures this year are largely made up of landfill related expenditures in Environmental Services and the construction of the Fort Fraser Water System. Debt payments make up 7% of the budget (891K in municipal debt and \$588K in Regional District debt).

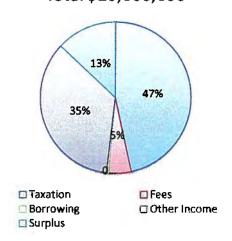

Regarding: New Northern Development Initiative Trust Funding Programs

This memo is to provide the RDBN Board of Directors with information about the new funding programs recently announced by Northern Development Initiative Trust (Northern Development).

Northern Development recently announced three new funding programs to support innovation projects in traditional northern B.C. industries, key community based strategic economic priorities and support First Nations Internships in northern B.C. The programs are:

Northern Industries Innovation Fund

The Northern Industries Innovation Fund will support applied research and development, new or improved products and services and testing of innovative equipment or technologies to support capital investment decisions.

Eligible Applicants: Privately owned businesses with less than 500 employees operating in the NDIT region, and Not-for-Profit organizations whose sole purpose is to create jobs and economic benefit in the industrial sectors.

Objective: The program's objective is to support the diversification and expansion of the northern B.C. economy as measured through increased business competitiveness, incremental revenue and job creation.

Maximum Grant: Up to \$50,000 in rebate funding to a maximum of 50% of the total project budget.

Applicant Contribution: The applicant must contribute a minimum 25% of the project budget.

Strategic Initiatives Fund

The purpose of Strategic Initiatives Fund is to diversify and enhance the economies of central and northern B.C. communities, particularly those communities impacted by Mountain Pine Beetle.

Eligible Applicants: Local Governments, Registered First Nations Bands, Partnerships with not-for-profit or private sector where either the Local Government or First Nation Band is the lead applicant.

Objective: To diversify and enhance the economies of central and northern B.C. communities, particularly those communities impacted by Mountain Pine Beetle. The Strategic Initiatives Fund is a flexible program that aims to capitalize on the unique



opportunities and strengths that exist in these communities to invest in projects that strengthen innovation, partnerships, and diversification of economic activities.

Maximum Grant: No Maximum. The total available in the program in 2018 is \$900,000. Maximum 80% of total project budget.

Applicant Contribution: Preference will be given to projects that leverage incremental funding from local government, First Nations, the provincial government, federal government, the private sector and other non-government sources.

First Nations Government Internship

This program is meant to parallel the success of Northern Development's existing Local Government Internship Program by allowing rural, indigenous communities to recruit and retain talented young professionals in the north.

Eligible Applicants: First Nations bands, national governments or tribal councils within the NDIT region.

Objective: To prepare young people for an exciting career in First Nations government, while supporting capacity building and succession preparation in smaller, indigenous communities.

Maximum Grant: \$40,000

Applicant Contribution: Statutory Benefits, Training and Travel expenses

Tax Implications of Possible Nechako Watershed Service

[updated February 6, 2018]

At the January 25, 2018 Board Meeting the Nechako Watershed Committee made a request for the Regional District to investigate a service encompassing four municipalities and five electoral areas to provide ongoing funding to support the Nechako Watershed Committee. The request is a total of \$70,000 shared between the Regional Districts of Fraser-Fort George and Bulkley-Nechako.

This service would require electoral assent for the participating rural areas.

The Nechako Watershed Society indicated that the taxation amount could be based on hospital assessments, population or a parcel tax. If the \$70,000 was to be shared equally between the regional districts and the collection was based on hospital assessments, the estimated tax rate for the \$35,000 request would be \$0.0141/\$1000 for improvements only and \$0.0106/\$1000 for land and improvements.

The cost per \$100,000 improvements would be \$1.41 for the example for improvements only and for \$100,000 in total assessment would be \$1.06 for the example of land and improvements.

These final service budgets will be included on the supplemental agenda for the February 22 meeting.

PURPOSE

The Regional District has received three referrals from TransCanada regarding their request to extend their permits issued by the BC Oil and Gas Commission (OGC) for Section 2 (as amended), Section 3 and Section 4 portions of the proposed PRGT pipeline route as shown on the attached maps. There are no proposed changes to the certified route.

TransCanada's PRGT Project is a proposed 900 kilometre natural gas pipeline that will deliver gas from Hudson Hope, BC to a LNG facility on Lelu Island near Port Edward BC. The Environmental Assessment Certificate for the PRGT project was issued on November 25, 2014. The RDBN Board previously provided comments to the Environmental Assessment Office and the OGC regarding the PRGT.

DISCUSSION

Staff recommend that the attached letter be sent to TransCanada and the OGC as the RDBN's response to the Permit Expiry Extension Notification. The comments in the proposed letter are in line with the comments previously provided regarding the PRGT project and other proposed pipelines in the region.

This letter is sent in response to the Permit Expiry Extension Notifications our office received on January 30, February 6 and February 9, 2018. Please note that the issues discussed below focus on the Prince Rupert Gas Transmission (PRGT) project. However, the issues discussed below are applicable to some degree to all potential pipelines developed in our region.

The Board wished to emphasize that the RDBN is not objecting to LNG pipeline development in the region. The potential opportunity to our region is recognized; however, it is our responsibility to work with the Province and industry to maximize the benefits to our residents, and minimize the potential negative impacts associated with the construction process. We are hopeful that this letter will lead to discussions and actions that benefit the pipeline development process and our residents.

Worker Camps and Pipeline Facilities Locations

The RDBN recommends that TransCanada confirm whether there are any land use and zoning regulation issues that should be addressed. Work camps, temporary storage areas, contractor storage yards, disposal sites, compressor stations, borrow sites (if crushing occurs), and other uses may not be permitted in certain areas. Therefore, it is requested that TransCanada confirm the location of the above noted uses and undertake the necessary RDBN approval process, where required. This will allow the RDBN to consider the socioeconomic and infrastructure impacts associated with the specific location of worker camps and other facilities.

It is noted that the RDBN's approval is discretionary, and approval is not guaranteed. Initiation of the RDBN's land use approval process for proposed pipeline related land uses should begin as soon as possible to avoid the potential for project delay or unnecessary inconvenience.



Liquid Waste Disposal

TransCanada should explore options for cooperation with the RDBN or member municipalities in the disposal of liquid waste from work camps. It would be a shame if money is spent unnecessarily on hauling waste long distances, or building on-site disposal facilities which will be abandoned, rather than investing in local community infrastructure.

Invasive Plant Control

TransCanada should provide annual funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council (NWIPC) given that the pipeline will facilitate the long term spread of invasive plants, and the cost of combating invasive plants outbreaks outside of the pipeline right-of-way is bome by the residents of the RDBN.

Fire Protection and Emergency Response

TransCanada should develop emergency response plans in consultation with the RDBN as soon as possible. These plans should address fire protection and emergency response based on an understanding of the services available in the region, and in consultation with the RDBN. Specific areas of interest to the RDBN include consistent communications protocols between work camps, evacuation plans for workers that do not use resources needed by local residents, and confirmation that TransCanada is not relying on the use of local fire departments where that service is not available.

Log and Wood Fiber Utilization

The long term loss of forested lands associated with pipeline construction represents a negative impact to the long term sustainability of the region's forest products industries. The impact of this loss should be mitigated through the full use of wood fibre harvested along the pipeline route. The RDBN is concerned that where the cost of harvesting and transportation are too high the wood fibre will not be utilized in support of the forest products industries. The RDBN requests that TransCanada be required to ensure that all wood fibre harvested for pipeline construction is utilized.

An additional issue related to the use of wood fibre, relates to the potential facilitation of the spread of the Spruce Beetle. Our understanding is that the Spruce Beetle takes advantage of fallen logs and wood debris in their reproduction process; therefore, an increase in the availability of such materials facilitates Spruce Beetle population growth. For this reason the RDBN requests that TransCanada, be required to ensure that all wood fibre harvested for pipeline construction is utilized, and that wood debris is not left in place.

Employee Training and Apprenticeships

The RDBN would like TransCanada to make specific commitments regarding the use of local employment in the pipeline construction process, and the provision of apprenticeship positions for local employees.

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Use of Local Business

The RDBN would like TransCanada to make specific commitments regarding the use of local business, and the actions that will be taken to allow local business to take advantage of the opportunity offered by pipeline construction.

Public Communications during Construction

The RDBN is concerned that TransCanada and the OGC will not have an adequate plan in place to accept, evaluate, and respond to public complaints associated with pipeline construction. It is expected that the Province and industry may look to the RDBN to play a role in accepting public complaints and representing those concerns to the OGC and industry. This will allow the Province and industry to avoid being directly accountable for adequately responding to the public regarding negative impacts associated with the pipeline construction process. There is no indication of the role the OGC or the Environmental Assessment Office will play in ensuring that public concerns regarding this provincially approved project are adequately addressed.

The RDBN recommends that TransCanada be required to develop specific procedures and processes by which they and the Province will accept, evaluate, and respond to public complaints associated with pipeline construction.

The Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako looks forward to addressing these issues with the OGC and the EAO.

Proposal

This memo is regarding a request from the property owners to discharge Covenant CA1634238 and Covenant Modification CA3788958 from the title of their properties that are located west of the Smithers Regional Airport. The legal description of the properties are Lots 2, 3 and 4, Section 14, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District, Plan EPP42101; and Remainder Lot B, Section 14, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District, Plan EPP25548, Excluding Plan EPP42101.





Covenant CA1634238 Background Information

In 2009, the Covenant was placed on title of the parent parcel as part of the process to rezone a 3 ha portion of a property from Agricultural (Ag1) to Light Industrial (M1). The covenant was offered as a means to address land use concerns related to the visual impact and location of the industrial use.

Covenant CA1634238 does the following,

- 1. Restricts the location of the industrial use on Lot 1;
- 2. Restricts the further subdivision of proposed Lot 1; and
- 3. Restricts the removal of trees on the property, as shown on the site plan.

The Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako approved adoption of "Smithers Telkwa Official Rural Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1530, 2009" and "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1531, 2009" at the July 15th, 2010 Board meeting.

Covenant Modification CA3788958 Background Information

In 2014, the property owner removed a significant portion of the treed buffer area from the property and the industrial use area was extended beyond the specified location, contrary to the restrictive covenant. The property owner requested that the RDBN agree to modify covenant CA1634238 by replacing the requirement for tree retention with berms which are properly graded and vegetated. The covenant amendment also made changes to the proposed subdivision layout on adjacent lands and restricts the use of any industrial related uses on the lots within the subdivision layout except for Lot 1. Staff held a public hearing for the covenant amendment on April 9th, 2014 and the modification covenant was subsequently supported by the Board, and registered on title of the properties.

It is noted that although Covenants CA1634238 and CA3788958 are specific to Lot 1, the covenants are also registered on the property titles of Lots 2, 3, 4 and Lot B, because the Covenant was charged to the property prior to subdivision.

Discussion

The removal of the restrictive covenant will remove the clause that restricts the industrial use of all of the properties. Covenant Modification CA3788958 clause 3.1.2 states,

"notwithstanding broader or greater uses, density or other regulations in the Grantee's zoning bylaw, the Grantor covenants and agrees the Lands must not be built upon or used for industrial uses, except for the Industrial Use Area on Lot 1, Plan EPP42101 as shown on the Sketch Plan attached as Schedule II to this Agreement."

Lots 2, 3 and 4 are zoned Small Holdings (H1) and Lot B is split zoned Small Holdings and Large Holdings (H2). Home occupation is a permitted use that allows the properties to be used, in a very limited manner, for industrial related home occupations. From a



land use planning perspective the proposed changes are not expected to have a negative impact on surrounding area. This potential restriction on home occupations was not the intent of the covenant, in staff's opinion.

RDBN Planning staff have received a subdivision referral from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure that is potentially affected by the covenant. The owner of Lots 3 and 4 wish to do a boundary adjustment between the two lots that will increase Lot 4 and decrease Lot 3 by 0.4 ha. The Covenant Modification document states that "the lands must not be subdivided except in accordance with Plan EPP42101." It could be argued that the boundary adjustment is not allowed as it is a notable enough change from the plan in the Covenant Modification document. Removal of Covenant documents CA1634238 and CA3788958 from the titles would allow the boundary adjustment to proceed.

Regional District Board Consideration

Since the covenant documents primarily serve to control development and use of Lot 1 staff have no objection to the request for the removal of the covenant from the title of Lots 2, 3, 4 and Remainder Lot B. As there is no substantive change from the stated intent of the covenant documents at the time of rezoning staff do not recommend that another public hearing be held prior to removal of the covenant documents from the titles as proposed.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board authorize the discharge of Covenant CA1634238 and Covenant Modification CA3788958 from the title of the properties legally described as Lots 2, 3 and 4, Section 14, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District, Plan EPP42101 and Remainder Lot B, Section 14, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District, Plan EPP25548, Excluding Plan EPP42101.

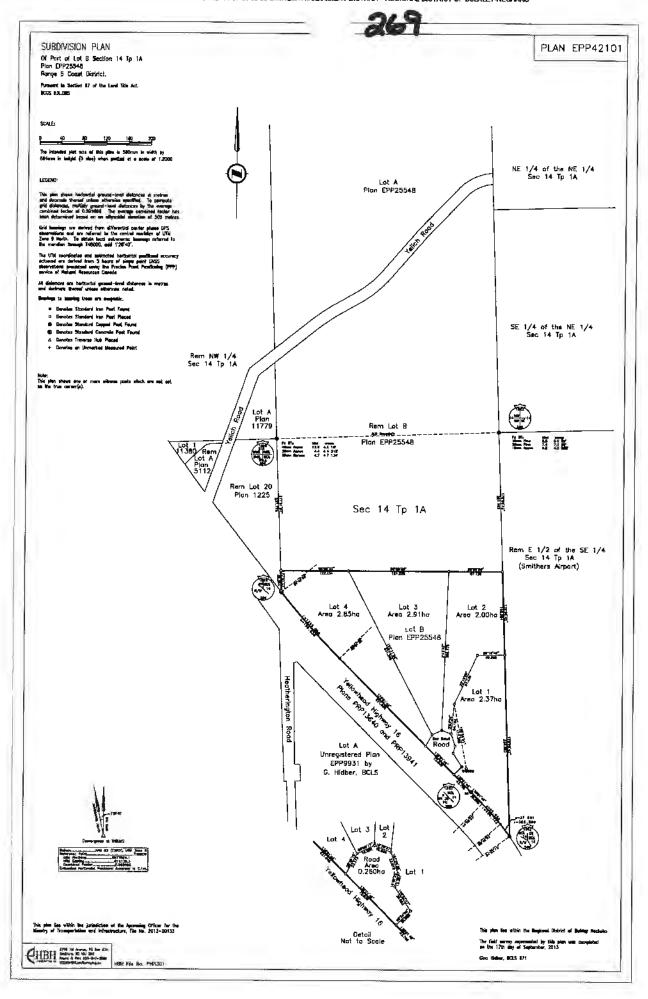
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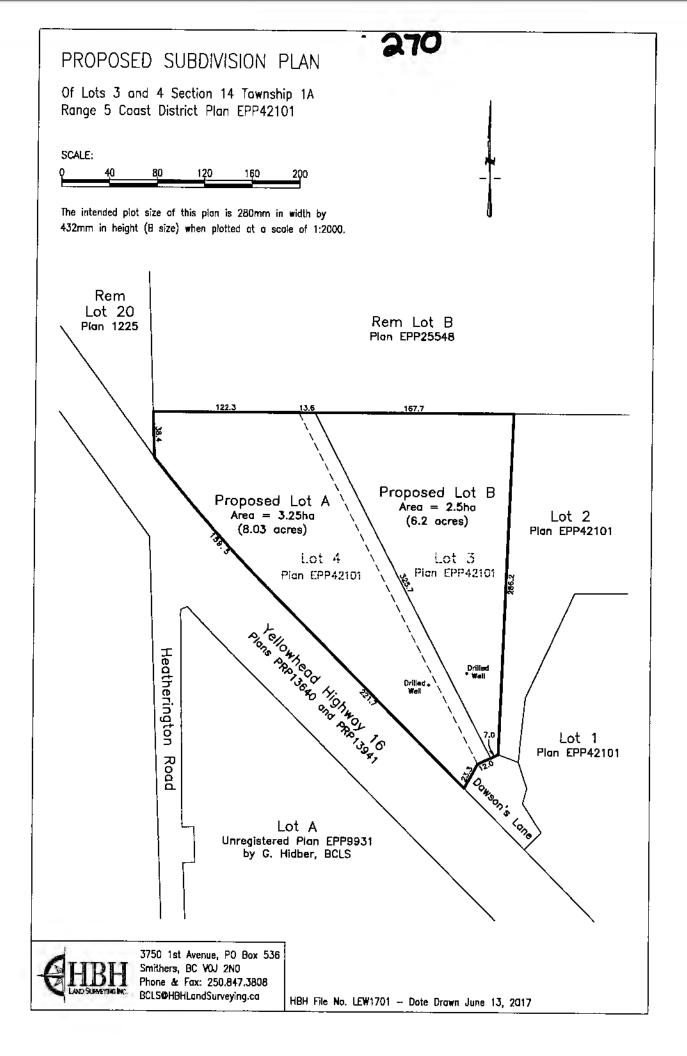

TERMS OF INSTRUMENT - PART 2

COVENANT

WHEREAS:

- 1. Phils Boxes Ltd., BC Incorporation No BC0767660 (hereinafter referred to as the "Grantor") is the registered owner of the lands having a parcel identifier of 010-257-764 and legally described as the West ½ of the Fractional Southeast 1/4, Section 14, Township1A, Range 5, Coast District except Plans PRP13640, PRP13941 and PRP42895 (the "Lands").
- 11. The Grantor has applied to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (hereinafter referred to as the "Grantee") to amend the zoning of the Lands to light industrial, and acknowledging that it is in the public interest that the development and use of the Lands be limited, the Grantor has freely offered this agreement and wishes to grant this Covenant to the Grantee as part of the Grantor's application to amend the zoning of the Lands;
- III. Section 219 of the Land Title Act provides that a covenant, whether of negative or positive nature, in respect of:
 - the use of land or the use of a building on or to be erected on land;
 - that land is to be built on in accordance with the covenant;
 - that land is not to be built on or subdivided except in accordance with the covenant;
 - that land is not to be used, built on or subdivided;
 - that separate parcels of land are not to be sold or transferred separately;
 - that land or specified amenities be protected, preserved, conserved, maintained, enhanced, restored or kept in its natural or existing state;

may be granted in favour of a regional district and may be registered as a charge against the title to that land.

- IV. The Parties agree that the covenant herein contained will address land use issues that will arise when the Lands are re-zoned or subdivided.
- WITNESS THAT, in consideration of the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and other valuable consideration now paid by the Grantee to the Grantor (the receipt and sufficiency whereof is hereby acknowledged), the Grantor agrees to grant a covenant over the Lands, pursuant to Section 219 of the Land Title Act, to the Grantee on the following terms and conditions:
- The Grantor covenants and agrees that:
 - a) the Lands may be subdivided only if in any subdivision plan one lot is created that is in substantial accordance with the lot shown on the Sketch Plan of Proposed Industrial Lot Location in Schedule "A" and labeled therein as the Proposed Industrial Lot (the "Proposed Industrial Lot")



- the Proposed Industrial Lot shall be the only lot in any future subdivision of the Lands to contain industrial use.
- the Lands may not be subdivided in any manner that would create more than one lot containing land zoned for industrial use.
- d) within the Proposed Industrial Lot, industrial activity may only take place within the area marked Industrial Use Area on the Sketch Plan of Proposed Industrial Use Area and Berm location in Schedule "B" (the "Industrial Use Area").
- e) the Grantor shall not, and shall not permit anyone else to, remove live trees from the area of the Proposed Industrial Lot not included in the Industrial Use Area, except that the removal of such trees as reasonably required to allow for the construction of water, septic and sewer facilities on the Proposed Industrial Lot shall be allowed.
- f) The Grantor covenants and agrees that it will construct and maintain a dirt berm a minimum of 2 meters high in the location set out in Schedule "B".

General Provisions

- 2. The Grantor and the Grantee agree that the enforcement of this Agreement shall be entirely within the discretion of the Grantee and that the execution and registration of this covenant against the title to the Lands shall not be interpreted as creating any duty on the part of the Grantee or to any other person to enforce any provision or the breach of any provision of this Agreement.
- Nothing contained or implied herein shall prejudice or affect the rights and powers of the Grantee in the exercise of its functions under any public or private statutes, bylaws, orders and regulations, all of which may be fully and effectively exercised in relation to the Lands as if the Agreement had not been executed and delivered by the Grantor.
 - 4. The Grantor acknowledges that the Grantee, or its officials, employees or agents, has not stated, held out or implied any expectation or requirement that the covenants must be provided in order for the Grantor's rezoning application to be approved, but rather the Grantor hereby expresses its intention to voluntarily donate the covenants in this Agreement to the Grantee, and be bound by them, without any expectation of payment or reward of any kind. The Grantor further releases, waives and forever discharges the Grantee from and against any claims, actions, or causes of action, whether based in contract, tort or equity, for damages, deprivation or losses, or for the recovery of costs incurred, whether known or unknown, in connection with the provision of these voluntary covenants. The Grantee agrees that if the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1530, 2009 and Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw 1531, 2009 are not adopted by December 24, 2010 and development applications for the Lands



are abandoned, the Grantee will execute a discharge of this Covenant from the title to the Lands.

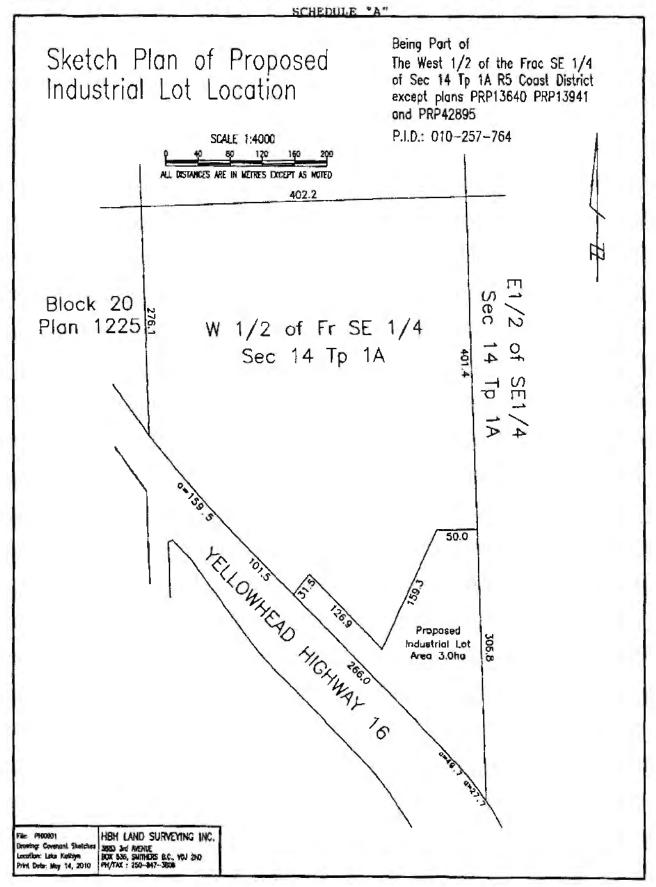
- 5. The Grantor covenants and agrees that the Grantee may withhold development permits, building permits and occupancy certificates as necessary to ensure compliance with the covenants in this Agreement, and that the issuance of a development permit, building permit or occupancy certificate does not act as a representation or warranty by the Grantee that the covenants of this Agreement have been satisfied.
- 6. The Grantor hereby releases and forever discharges the Grantee of and from any claim, cause of action, suit, demand, expenses, costs and legal fees whatsoever which the Grantor can or may have against the said Grantee for any loss, damage, deprivation or injury, including economic loss, that the Grantor may sustain or suffer arising out of the restrictions or requirements in this Agreement, the provision of or lack of services to the Lands, Development Parcels or Lots, or the use, operation, deterioration or breakdown of the Systems, or connected with the breach of any covenant in the Agreement.
- 7. The Grantor covenants and agrees to indemnify and save harmless the Grantee from any and all claims, causes of action, suits, demands, expenses, costs and legal fees whatsoever that anyone might have as owner, occupier or user of the Lands, or by a person who has an interest in or comes onto the Lands, or by anyone who suffers loss of life or injury to his person or property, or whatsoever which anyone has or may have against the Grantee or which the Grantee incurs as a result of any loss, damage, deprivation or injury, including economic loss, arising out of the restrictions or requirements in this Agreement.
- No term, condition, covenant, or other provision of this Agreement will be considered to have been waived by the Grantee unless the waiver is expressed in writing by the Grantee.
- 9. Any waiver by the Grantee of any term, condition, covenant, or other provision of this Agreement or any waiver by the Grantee of any breach, violation, or nonperformance of any term, condition, covenant, or other provision of this Agreement does not constitute and will not be construed as a waiver of any further or other term, condition, covenant, or other provision of this Agreement or any further or other breach, violation, or non-performance of any term, condition, covenant, or other provision of this Agreement.
- 10. It is mutually understood, acknowledged and agreed by the parties that the Grantee has made no representations, covenants, warranties, guarantees, promises or agreements (oral or otherwise) with the Grantor other than those contained in this Agreement.
- 11. The Grantor covenants and agrees for itself, its heirs, executors, successors and assigns, that it will at all times perform and observe the requirements and restrictions hereinbefore set out and they shall be binding upon the Grantor as



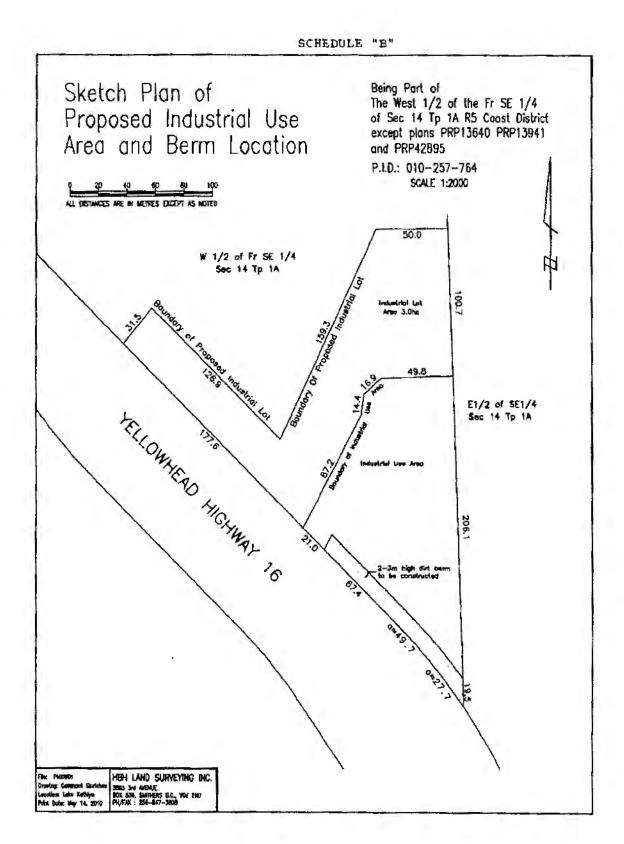
personal covenants only during the period of its respective ownership of any interest in the Lands.

- 12. In this Agreement, unless the context otherwise requires, the singular includes the plural and vice versa.
- This Agreement will be interpreted according to the laws of the Province of British Columbia.

"Treeline" and "Dirt Berm", may be determined and are subject to revision in accordance with subsequent surveys, approved by the Grantee in its sole and unfettered discretion, and until such time any imprecision in definition shall be resolved in favour of the Grantee, in favour of protection of treed and vegetated areas and restriction of industrial use areas. The parties may modify the Covenant or this Covenant Modification from time to time to reflect the more accurate description of the areas shown on the Sketch Plan, and the Grantor agrees that these covenant restrictions shall be registered against the whole of Lands.

- 4. The parties agree that paragraphs 1(d), (e) and (f) of the Covenant shall be replaced with the following provisions intended to apply only to Lot 1, Plan EPP42101 of the Lands once subdivided, and to that portion of the Lands until subdivision occurs:

Lot 1 Plan EPP42101 Restrictions and Requirements

- 1.3 On Lot 1, Plan EPP42101, and with reference to the Sketch Plan in Schedule II, notwithstanding broader or greater uses, density or other regulations in the Grantee's zoning bylaw, the Grantor covenants and agrees there must be no building or use except as follows:
 - 1.3.1 Any industrial building, use or activity permitted by the Grantee's zoning may only be undertaken in the "Industrial Use Area";
 - 1.3.2 No building, use or activity other than protection, preservation, conservation, maintenance, enhancement and restoration of trees and natural vegetation may be undertaken in the "Treed Area", and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Grantor covenants and agrees:
 - (a) to protect, preserve and conserve in its natural state the vegetation and trees in the Treed Area;
 - (b) not to cut, trim, prune, damage, defoliate or remove any vegetation or tree from the Treed Area;

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- (c) not to excavate, remove soil or place fill from or on the Treed Area;
- (d) not to use pesticides, herbicides or any other deleterious substance of any kind in or around the Treed Area;
- (e) not to build, place or install any building or structure of any kind on, over or under the Treed Area; and
- (f) not to do, omit to be done, or knowingly permit to be done or omitted, anything that does or could reasonably be expected to destroy, impair, diminish, negatively affect or alter the Treed Area and vegetation and habitat therein;
- 1.3.3 No building, use or activity other than open air storage, if and as permitted in accordance with the Grantee's zoning, may be undertaken in the "Storage Area (Non-Work Area)".
- 1.4 The Grantor shall not, and shall not permit anyone else to, remove live trees from the portions of Lot 1, Plan EPP42101 not included in the Industrial Use Area.
- 1.5 The Grantor covenants and agrees to establish and maintain for as long as industrial uses, buildings or activities exist on Lot 1, Plan EPP42101, whether in active operation or not, dirt berms in the areas shown on the Sketch Plan in Schedule II, and which must:
 - (a) range from no less than 3 4 metres in height;
 - (b) be smoothly graded and regular in shape;
 - (c) covered in natural vegetation; and
 - (d) be hydroseeded in areas facing and adjacent to public highway.
- 1.6 In addition to all other remedies available to the Grantee at law, the Grantor has provided security in the form of an irrevocable and unconditional letter of credit in the amount of TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) in order to secure landscaping and berming installation and establishment (the "Security"). The Grantee shall be entitled, but not obligated, in its sole and unfettered discretion to draw upon the Security in accordance with the terms therewith and its customary practices.
- 1.7 Upon the completion of the landscaping and berming installation and establishment, the Grantee will release to the Grantor the Security or any remaining portion thereof.
- 1.8 If a subsequent purchaser of the Lands replaces the Security pursuant to the conditions of paragraph 4.1.6, the Grantee will release the original Security.
- 5. In paragraph 6 of the Covenant, the parties agree that the following terms shall be deleted: "Development Parcels or Lots, or the use, operation, deterioration or

- 6. The parties agree that the following shall be added to the end of paragraph 7 of the Covenant: ", the breach of any covenant in this Agreement, or the use of the Lands contemplated under this Agreement."

The Grantor releases and forever discharges the Grantee of and from any claims, causes of action, suits, demands, fines, penalties, costs or expenses or legal fees (on a solicitor-client basis) whatsoever, in law or equity, which the Grantor can or may have against the Grantee for any loss, damage, deprivation, enrichment or injury, including economic loss, arising out of or connected with the restrictions or requirements of this Covenant Modification, the breach of any covenant in this Covenant Modification, or the use of the Lands contemplated under this Covenant Modification.

Registration

- The restrictions and requirements in this Covenant Modification are covenants running with the Lands in favour of the Grantee and intended to be perpetual, and shall continue to bind all of the Lands when subdivided.
- At the Grantor's sole cost, the Grantor must do everything necessary to secure priority

The Grantor covenants and agrees that the Grantee may withhold development permits, building permits and other approvals related to the use, building or subdivision of land as necessary to ensure compliance with the covenants in this Covenant Modification, and that the issuance of a permit or approval does not act as a representation or warranty by the Grantee that the covenants of the Covenant or this Covenant Modification have been satisfied.
- 18. The Grantor covenants and agrees that:
 - if the Grantee advises of a breach of this Covenant Modification, as determined in its reasonable discretion, the Grantor must promptly remedy that breach at it sole cost;
 - (b) if the Grantor has not remedied the breach to the reasonable satisfaction of the Grantee within fifteen (15) days of notice or other time longer period specified by the Grantee, the Grantee may, but is under no obligation to, remove or rectify the breach at the expense of the Grantor without further notice; and
 - (c) any costs to the Grantee of such removal or rectification is a debt due from the Grantor to the Grantee together with interest at a rate of 3% per annum in excess of the Prime Lending Rate of the Royal Bank of Canada in effect from time to time, and:
 - (i) the Grantor shall pay such costs and interest to the Grantee forthwith upon demand; and

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- (ii) failing payment, the Grantee may add such costs to property taxes for the Lands.
- 19. No remedy under this Covenant Modification is to be deemed exclusive but will, where possible, be cumulative with all other remedies at law or in equity.

If any part of this Covenant Modification is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court having the jurisdiction to do so, that part is to be considered to have been severed from the rest of this Covenant Modification and the rest of this Covenant Modification remains in force unaffected by that holding or by the severance of that part.
- 22. This Covenant Modification is to be construed in accordance with and governed by the laws applicable in the Province of British Columbia.

23. Bulkley Valley Credit Union (the "Chargeholder") is the registered holder of a charge by way of MORTGAGE against the Lands, registered under No. CA927473 extended by No. CA3026801 and a charge by way of ASSIGNMENT OF RENTS against the Lands, registered under No. CA927474 extended by No. CA3026802 (the "Charges"), agrees with the Grantee, in consideration of the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) paid by the Grantee to the Chargeholder (receipt and sufficiency acknowledged), that the Covenant Modification shall be an encumbrance upon the Lands in priority to the Charges in the same manner and to the same effect as if the Covenant Modification had been dated and registered prior to the Charges.

The Grantor and Grantee acknowledge that this Covenant Modification has been duly executed and delivered by the parties executing Forms C and D (pages 1 and 2) attached.

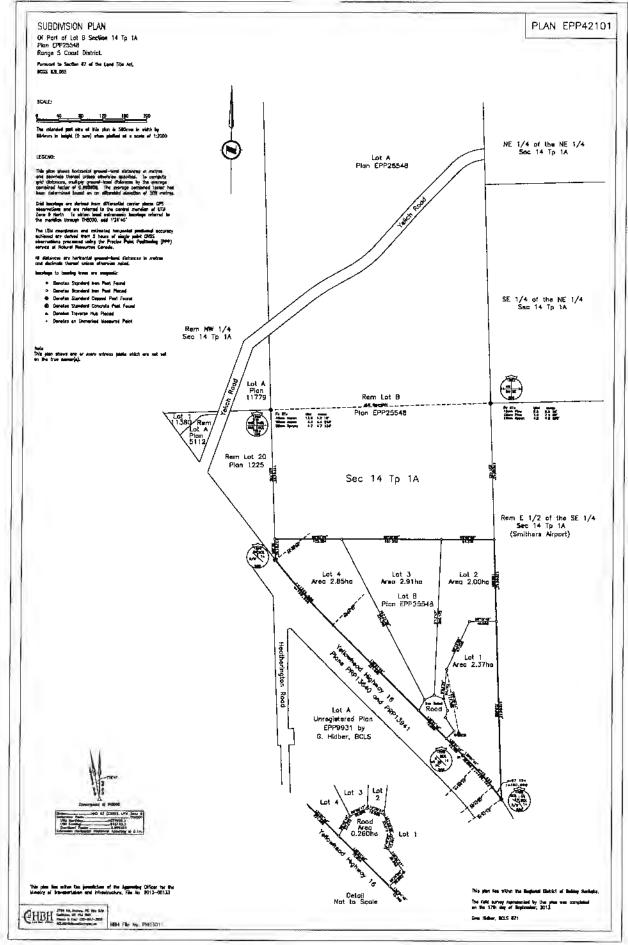
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SCHEDULE I PLAN OF SUBDIVISION

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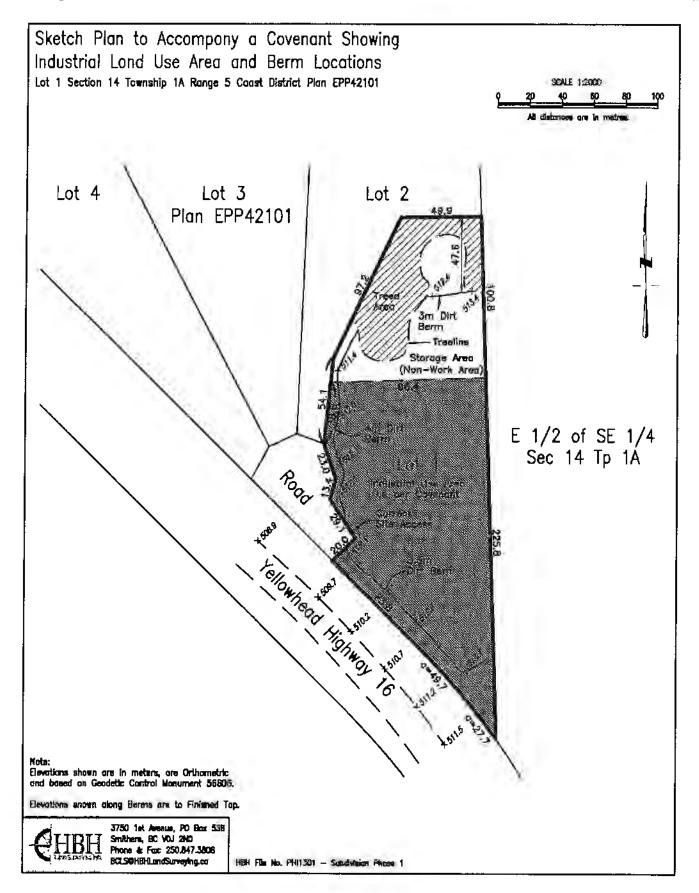
SCHEDULE II SKETCH PLAN FOR LOT 1, PLAN EPP34565

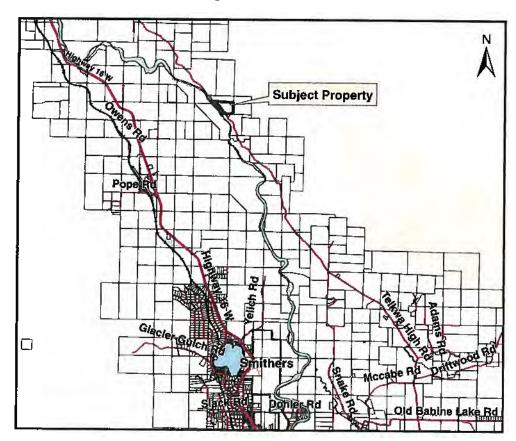

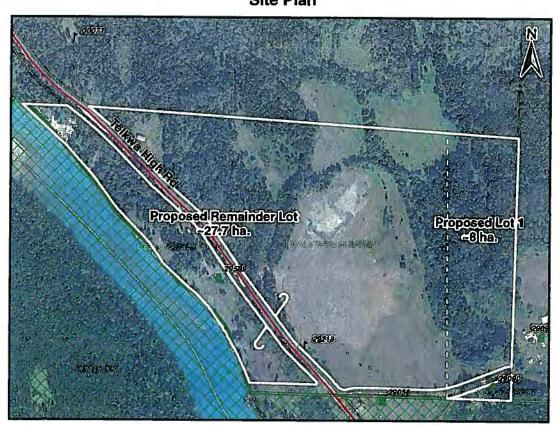

The subject property was rezoned from Rural Resource (RR1) to Large Holdings (H2) in 2017 to allow the subdivision of an 8 ha. parcel from the parent parcel. However, the proposed remainder, zoned RR1, is only 27.7 ha., which is less than the 28 ha. minimum parcel area requirement in Section 15.02 of the Zoning Bylaw. Therefore, the applicant has applied for a Development Variance Permit to vary the minimum parcel area from 28 ha to 27 ha to accommodate the proposed subdivision.

The subject property consists of one primary residence built in 1998 and a rental cabin built in 1975. Accessory buildings include a workshop, storage building, shed and pole barn. Each proposed parcel will contain a dwelling.



Site Plan

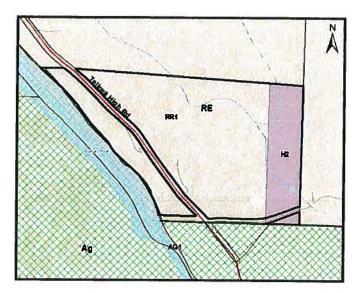


PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

OCP and Zoning

The OCP designation for the property is Resource. This designation is intended to protect the resource values of the designated area and to minimize resource conflicts among recreation, grazing, mining and wildlife by discouraging settlement on Resource designated lands.

With regards to subdivision in the RE designation, Section 3.9.2 (5) of the OCP states that rezoning applications to allow subdivision, subject to the 8 ha. (19.77 acres) minimum parcel size, may only be considered under the following circumstances.



- (a) The proposed subdivision will not lead to a conflict with, or otherwise negatively impact forestry, agriculture and grazing, mineral or aggregate extraction, fish and wildlife management, trapping or wildemess oriented recreation.
- (b) The proposed subdivision will not unnecessarily increase community greenhouse gas emissions
- (c) The proposed subdivision will not increase demand for provision of Regional District services into a new or remote area
- (d) The proposed subdivision will not result in an unacceptable loss of public access to an area of Crown Land.
- (e) The proposed subdivision will not have an unacceptable negative impact on the environment
- (f) The proposed subdivision will not have an unacceptable negative impact on neighbouring land uses.

A very limited amount of low density residential use may be permitted within the Rural Resource (RE) Designation, where appropriate. The proposed Development Variance Permit is compatible with the intent of the RE designation.

The RR1 zone and the H2 zone both allow two dwellings per parcel. The proposed subdivision would allow for two new dwellings to be constructed in the area.



Land Use Issues

The variance requested, and the proposed subdivision would not allow for the creation of parcels that are out of character with the area. The Planning Department does not expect that the proposed subdivision would have any negative impact on the area or any neighbouring uses.

It is noted that Development Variance Permit A-01-18 requires that the subdivision be substantially completed within 3 years of the issuance of the permit, or the permit will lapse. It is also noted that all property owners within 50 meters of the subject property have been provided notice of the application and will have an opportunity to comment on this application at the Board meeting on February 22, 2017 when the Board considers this application.

Recommendation

That the Board approve Development Variance Permit A-01-18 for the property located at 29218 Telkwa High Road to vary Section 15.02 of "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993" to reduce the minimum parcel area from 28 ha. (69 acres) to 27 ha. (66.71 acres) to allow the proposed subdivision of the property.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Official Community Plan

The property is designated Commercial (C) in the Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan (OCP). This designation is intended to provide opportunities for tourist and neighborhood commercial development throughout the Plan area where those services are necessary and do not conflict with exiting uses.

The proposed rezoning is not consistent with the current Commercial Designation; therefore, the applicant



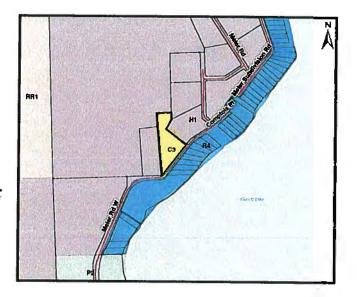


must amend the OCP to Rural Residential (RR).

Zoning

Zoning in the area is mainly comprised of Small Holdings (H1) and Waterfront Residential II (R4) zoning. The following uses are permitted in the proposed H1 zone:

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) two family dwelling;
- (c) agriculture;
- (d) horticulture, nursery, greenhouse;
- (e) silviculture:
- (f) kennel and veterinary clinic;
- (g) home occupation;
- (h) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.



Land Use

Meier Road West is dominated by residential uses. The lakeshore is comprised of small half acre lots, while the lots across Meier Road are larger sized lots. This property is the only commercial property in the area.

The Rural Residential (RR) designation in the Vanderhoof Rural OCP is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting while protecting and preserving the rural character of the area.

The proposal fits with the surrounding land uses, and the character of the area.

Consultation for OCP amendments

 - The board of any regional district that is adjacent to the area covered by the plan,
 - The council of any municipality that is adjacent to the area covered by the plan,

 - · School district boards, greater boards and improvement district boards, and
 - The Provincial and federal governments and their agencies.

Also, the *Local Government Act* requires that local governments consult with the local School District regarding any amendment to an OCP.

A further Local Government Act requirement is that all OCP amendments be considered in conjunction with the financial plan, and any waste management plan that is applicable or Regional District.

Recommendations:

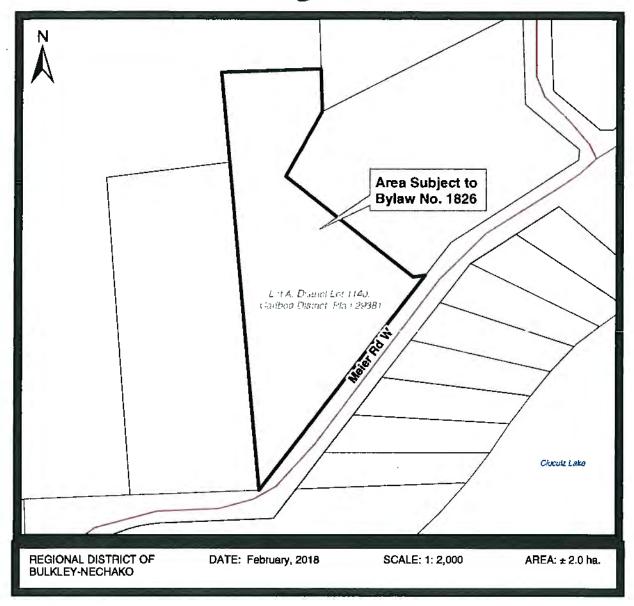

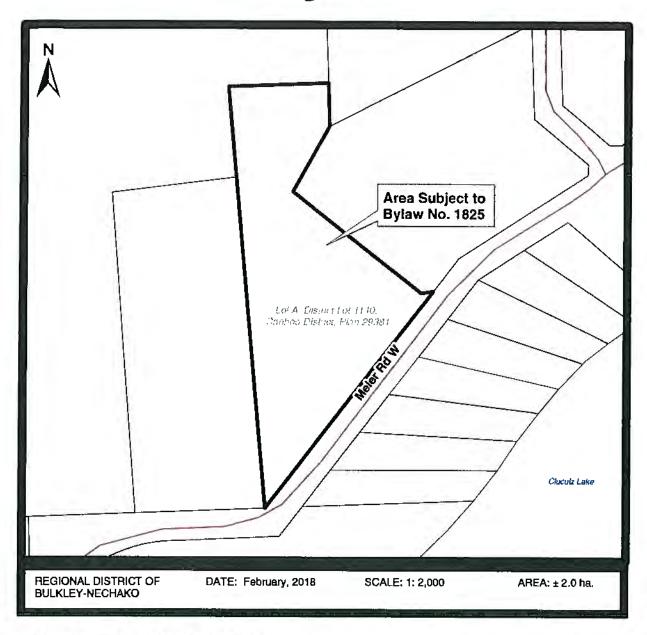

BACKGROUND:

At the January 25th, 2018 Board meeting staff reported on the EMBC policy to not issue task numbers to reimburse fire departments for road rescue services in areas covered by a local government road rescue service. At this meeting the Board passed the following motion.

"That the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Directors direct staff to work with the District of Vanderhoof staff and other communities wanting to draft an amendment or repeal Bylaw(s) for road rescue services; and further, that staff bring forward the information to the February 8, 2018 RDBN Committee of the Whole Meeting; and further, that the RDBN Board of Directors direct staff to schedule a meeting with the Honourable Mike Famworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General in regard to road rescue service."

Staff contacted the effected municipal CAO's, and have confirmed that the District of Vanderhoof and the Village of Fraser Lake wish to move forward with having the Bylaws rescinded. The Electoral Area Directors for the impacted electoral areas have no objections to the bylaws being rescinded. It is not proposed that the road rescue related bylaws impacting the Fort St. James and Topley Fire Departments be rescinded at this time.

This report asks the RDBN Board to consider rescinding "Area F Emergency Extrication Contribution Local Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1113, 1999" and "Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Electoral Area D Emergency Extrication Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1516, 2009."

DISCUSSION:

EMBC's Position

As noted EMBC has recently informed the RDBN that they are not issuing task numbers to reimburse fire departments for road rescue services in areas covered by any type of road rescue service supported by local government bylaw (EMBC reimbursement is at a rate of \$330.00/hour for apparatus and crew, including a portion of the cost for equipment damaged while on scene).

EMBC has also taken the position that a local fire department will not qualify for EMBC reimbursement where a bylaw for road rescue exists, even if the taxation is not collected for the service. EMBC has also raised the possibility that local fire departments will not qualify for EMBC reimbursement where they are providing road rescue in an area that was previously covered by a rescinded bylaw related to road rescue.

RDBN staff have informed EMBC that the RDBN Board are going to consider rescinding "Area F Emergency Extrication Contribution Local Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1113, 1999" and "Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Electoral Area D Emergency Extrication Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1516, 2009" on February 8th, 2018.

RDBN staff have requested that EMBC confirm in writing whether the Vanderhoof Fire Department and the Fraser Lake Fire Department will again qualify for an EMBC task number and reimbursement for road rescue services in the areas previously covered by these bylaws, if they are rescinded. EMBC have indicated that they are hoping to have an answer prior to February 8th, 2018. The e-mail communication with EMBC on this issue is attached.

Staff Comment and Concern

Road rescue is not a responsibility of local government. It appears that the intent in creating road rescue related bylaws was to assist fire departments in their efforts to support the RCMP and BC Ambulance Service. The intent was not to take responsibility for road rescue. The amount of money raised through taxation is small and is not adequate to cover the cost associated with providing the service.

The RDBN has, as a good will gesture, agreed to assist local fire departments by making limited financial contributions to help support their road rescue efforts. Unfortunately, this is resulting in the Province reducing their support for local fire departments providing this service.

In staff's opinion the Province should issue task numbers to reimburse fire departments for road rescue regardless of any bylaw in support of road rescue, and regardless of whether the response is in a fire protection service area or municipality. In the longer term the Province needs to establish a reasonable and responsible system for the provision of road rescue services in BC, in close consultation with local governments. This system needs to support local governments when they choose to assist the Province in providing road rescue service. The current system does not encourage local governments to continue to provide any type of service.

Recommendation

Should the Board wish to repeal "Area F Emergency Extrication Contribution Local Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1113, 1999" and "Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Electoral Area D Emergency Extrication Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1516, 2009" The repeal bylaws should be given 1st, 2nd, and 3rd readings. The bylaws will then be sent to the Province for approval. If approved they will be returned to the board for consideration of adoption.

Recommendation

That the Board consider 1st, 2nd, and 3rd readings for:

- "Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Electoral Area "D" (Fraser Lake Rural) Emergency Extrication Service Area Establishment Repeal Bylaw No. 1822, 2018; and
- 2. Area F Emergency Extrication Contribution Local Service Area Establishment Repeal Bylaw No. 1823, 2018

Can you please confirm in writing whether the Vanderhoof Fire Department and the Fraser Lake Fire Department will again qualify for an EMBC task number and reimbursement for road rescue services in the areas previously covered by these bylaws, once they are rescinded.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to update the Board regarding staff's attempts to have a representative from the Ministry of Energy, Mines, and Petroleum Resources (MEMPR) attend a Board meeting to discuss the approval process for the Equity Mine Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan (EPRP), and the RDBN's concerns with that plan.

DISCUSSION:

RDBN Discussions with Equity Mine Representatives

On March 1st, 2017 Protective Services Staff attended a meeting with other emergency response agency representatives to give input into Equity Mine's draft EPRP. At this meeting and in a subsequent e-mail staff provided the following feedback regarding the draft plan.

The draft plan does a nice job of outlining protocols for contacting response agencies in the event of a potential emergency. However, I would like to see the plan take the next step and deal with the response activities that would be necessary after the agencies are informed of an emergency.

For example it would be good to have draft evacuation plans associated with each of the emergency scenarios including maps showing the extent of the recommended evacuation area, road closure locations, checkpoints that will require staffing, etc. These plans should be developed with input from the RDBN and the RCMP. There will also be many questions related how evacuees are dealt with.

There should also be a response plan that outlines the response likely to be necessary to deal with water quality and health issues for each emergency scenario. What is the extent of the area where residents should be advised to not drink surface water? What is the drinking water distribution plan? It would be good to include Northern Health and the Ministry of Environment in this planning process.

These are all issues the RDBN, and other response agencies, will be trying to answer if an event occurs. The more work that can be done to answer these questions in advance the better. The RDBN looks forward to working with Equity Mine further on this, and reviewing future drafts of the plan.

On April 27th, 2017 staff followed up with the Equity Mine representative to determine the status of the draft EPRP. Staff were informed that a number of the RDBN's requests were not included in the plan as they are beyond the scope of the plan. Staff asked for a copy of the draft EPRP. It was not provided.

On November 15, 2017, Equity Mine distributed their "final" version of the Equity Mine EPRP. The EPRP does not incorporate most of the RDBN's recommendations. This plan is available from staff on request.

Equity Mine's position is that their primary responsibility is to plan for their response to an emergency at the mine site. They see their responsibility to plan for and respond to the off-site impacts associated with an emergence as being limited.

The EPRP contains protocols regarding contacting emergency response agencies, and it outlines the area potentially inundated by a tailings pond breach. It also makes recommendations regarding road closure and evacuations. However, much of the information the RDBN, and other response agencies, will be trying to answer during an emergency event are not provided. Also, the necessary information should be presented using maps which are easily understood and interpreted by response agencies during an event.

RDBN Discussions with MEMPR Staff

On March 4th, 2017 staff made contact with the Howard Davies, Regional Director for MEMPR. He was made aware of the situation and wase asked to explain the process by which the Ministry will review and approve Equity's draft Emergency Response Plan, and indicate how the RDBN can best provide formal input to the Ministry regarding the plan. To date the Ministry has not responded to these questions.

Staff reported to the Board on the situation in May, and on June 7th, 2017 RDBN staff sent Howard Davies, Regional Director for MEMPR a letter inviting him to attend a Board meeting to discuss the following issues:

- The content of the "Equity Mine Emergency Response Plan"
- 2. Information Regarding the Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan approval process and how the RDBN can formally express our concerns to the Ministry.
- 3. The concentration of gravel pits surrounding the Town of Smithers Adjacent to the Bulkley-River.

On June 20 - 21st, 2017 RDBN staff followed up with MEMPR staff regarding their attendance at an RDBN Board meeting. RDBN staff also asked if MEMPR staff could answer the RDBN's questions regarding the process for approval of the Equity Mines Emergency Plan and how the RDBN formally provides input into that process prior to the meeting. MEMPR staff indicated that they would get back to RDBN staff.

On July 18th, 2017 RDBN staff again followed up with MEMPR staff regarding their attendance at an RDBN Board meeting. MEMPR staff indicated that the MEMPR was still working on the RDBN's request.

RDBN Discussions with the Minister of Energy, Mines, and Petroleum Resources

At the 2017 UBCM convention in Vancouver RDBN Board representatives met with the Honourable Michelle Mingall, Minister of Energy Mines and Petroleum Resources. This meeting was followed by a November 21st, 2017 letter from the RDBN Board Chair to the Minister restating the RDBN's concerns regarding the Equity Mine EPRP, and the outstanding request for MEMPR staff to attend an RDBN Board meeting.

Peter Robb, Assistant Deputy Minister, responded to the RDBN's November 21st letter. This letter is attached. It indicates that Howard Davies, Regional Director for MEMPR will make himself available to meet with the Board regarding the RDBN's concerns. It is unclear from the letter whether the MEMPR will require Equity Mine to amend the EPRP to the RDBN's satisfaction.

Recommendation

That the RDBN Board direct staff to .send the letter attached to the staff report dated February 14th, 2018 regarding the Equity Mine Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan to Howard Davies, Regional Director for the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources.

This letter is a follow up to our June 2017 request that the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources send a representative to attend a future meeting of the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako. The intent of this meeting is to discuss the following issues.

• The content of the "Equity Mine Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan." As you are aware the RDBN has concerns regarding the content of the plan and believe that important information is missing from the plan. For example the plan should include mapping showing areas to be evacuated during each emergency scenario, and the details of these evacuation plans need to be developed in consultation with the RDBN and the RCMP. The plan should also address and provide information regarding the water quality and health issues for each emergency scenario. A key question during an event will be the extent of the area where residents should be advised to not drink or otherwise be exposed to surface water? Also, it would be good to include Northern Health and the Ministry of Environment in this planning process.

These are questions that issues that the RDBN, and other response agencies, will be trying to answer if an event occurs. More work needs to be done in advance of an emergency event.

• Information regarding the Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan approval process and how the RDBN can formally expresses our concerns to the Ministry. The RDBN has been asking for this information from your Ministry since May 2017, and we have not yet received a response. In 2017 the RDBN was concerned that the Equity Mine Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan development process was proceeding without adequate consideration of our concerns. Now we have recently been informed by Equity

Mine that the EPRP has been finalized. The RDBN Board would like to know how we can have our concerns considered and addressed by your Ministry.

The attached January 30th, 2018 letter from Peter Robb, Assistant Deputy Minister ensures us that you will make yourself available to meet with the RDBN Board. We look forward to working with you to ensure that our concerns are heard and addressed as indicated by Mr. Robb in his letter.

The Regional District of Bulkley Nechako is available to meet with you on the following dates: March 15th, April 19th, or May 24th. We look forward to confirming your attendance.

Thank you for taking the time to write to Honourable Michelle Mungall, Minister of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources on November 21, 2017 regarding the Equity Mine Emergency Response Plan.

I understand your concern around the issue of tailings storage and emergency preparedness for your community. We are certainly happy to discuss our process in reviewing these plans and ensure your concerns are heard and addressed.

Dealing with risks arising from tailings storage requires a coordinated approach between the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources (EMPR), Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (MoE), Emergency Management BC (EMBC) and other agencies such as Northern Health, the RCMP and local communities.

EMBC and MOE have a significant role in managing emergency planning and crisis management, and would be the principal agencies for immediate downstream impacts during a breach.

MEMPR's Mine Emergency Response Plan Guidelines (Guidelines) requires 'Affected Community Consultation' regarding the hazards associated with an incident that could pose a threat to surrounding communities, and specifically mentions tailings failures and spills. The Guidelines can be found at the following link:

Further to this, Section 4.3 of the Health Safety and Reclamation Code (the Code) Part 10 Guidance requires an Emergency Preparedness and Response Plan (EPRP) to complement a MERP and may include community outreach and identifies mitigations and responses related to Tailings Storage Facilities. General Funding Terms & Conditions

The purpose of the Terms & Conditions is to provide basic information on grants administered by the Union of BC Municipalities through Local Government Program Services (LGPS). For specific information regarding the terms and conditions of each funding program, please refer to the relevant Program & Application Guide.

1. Definitions

- Approved Applicant In general, LGPS grants are awarded to local governments (regional districts and municipalities). However, under some programs, First Nations can be the approved applicant. The approved applicant is the primary contact for UBCM and is responsible for overall grant management.
- **Approved Partner(s)** Are organizations that contribute directly to the approved project, are identified in the application and are approved by UBCM. Possible partners include, but are not limited to, boards of education, health authorities, First Nations or aboriginal organizations, non-profit organizations and local governments (other than the applicant).
- Approved Project Is the activity or activities described in the application and approved by UBCM.
- Cash Expenditures Are direct costs properly and reasonably incurred and paid for with money by the
 approved applicant or approved project partner for the development or implementation of the approved
 project. For example, catering and consultant fees can be cash expenditures.
- In-Kind Expenditures Are the use of resources of the approved applicant or approved project partner
 for the development or implementation of the approved project. For example, the use of meeting rooms
 owned by the applicant or approved partner can be an in-kind expenditure.

2. Eligible & Ineligible Costs

Eligible costs, including cash and in-kind expenditures, are direct costs properly and reasonably incurred by the approved applicant or approved partner as part of the approved project. To be eligible, these costs must be outlined in the detailed budget submitted by the approved applicant as part of the application process and be approved by UBCM. Requests to change the budget must be made to UBCM, in writing, by the approved applicant (see below). Please see the relevant Program & Application Guide for specific notes regarding eligible and ineligible costs.

3. Post-Approval Terms

Notice of Approval

UBCM will inform all applicants of the status of their application by letter. Approved applicants will be informed of specific conditions of the grant approval and if a specified percentage of the approved grant amount will be forwarded to the approved applicant upon approval. The balance of the grant will be paid on satisfactory completion of the project and receipt and approval of all final reporting requirements.

Applicant Responsibilities

LGPS grants are awarded to approved applicants. When collaborative projects are undertaken, the approved applicant remains the primary organization responsible for the grant. Due to this, the approved applicant is the primary contact for UBCM and is responsible for:

- Ensuring that approved activities are undertaken as outlined in the approved application and within the required timeline
- Providing proper fiscal management of the grant and approved project (see below)
- Submitting final reports, using UBCM forms where available, as required by the Program & Application Guide (see below).

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Accounting Records

Acceptable accounting records must be kept that clearly disclose the nature and amounts of eligible expenditures (cash and in-kind) incurred as part of the approved project. Financial summaries are required to be submitted as part of the final report and must be signed by a representative of the approved applicant (or as required in the Program & Application Guide).

<u>In all cases, the final project expenditure must be net of any rebates (such as GST/PST) that the approved applicant or approved partner is eligible to receive.</u>

Changes to or Cancellation of Approved Project

Approved applicants need to apply to UBCM, in writing, for any significant variation from the approved project as described in the approved application, including any major changes to:

- Start or end dates
- Cash and in-kind expenditures or matching funds (when required)
- Project purpose, goals, outcomes or milestones
- Project partners

UBCM's approval is required in advance for such changes. If an approved project is cancelled, the approved applicant is responsible for ensuring any grant monies that have been advanced are returned to UBCM within 30 days, or as outlined in the Program & Application Guide.

4. Reporting Requirements

Submission of Reports

Approved applicants are required to submit final reports as outlined in the Program & Application Guide. When UBCM forms or templates are available, they are required to be used. Please note the following when submitting a report:

- When completing a UBCM report form please ensure that each question is answered and that all attachments are complete. Follow any sample templates that UBCM provides.
- Submit all documents as Word or PDF files. Note: files over 20mb cannot be accepted.
- Submit all digital photos or images as JPEG files. Note: files over 20mb cannot be accepted.
- If a hardcopy of the report is required, do not bind reports or submit in binders or folders.
- When you are ready to submit your report, please e-mail it directly to lgps@ubcm.ca or mail it to Local Government House: 525 Government Street, Victoria, BC, V8V 0A8.

Extensions and Outstanding Reports

In order for an approved project to continue past the approved end date – or for a final report to be submitted after the established deadline – approved applicants must contact UBCM to request <u>and be granted</u> permission for an extension.

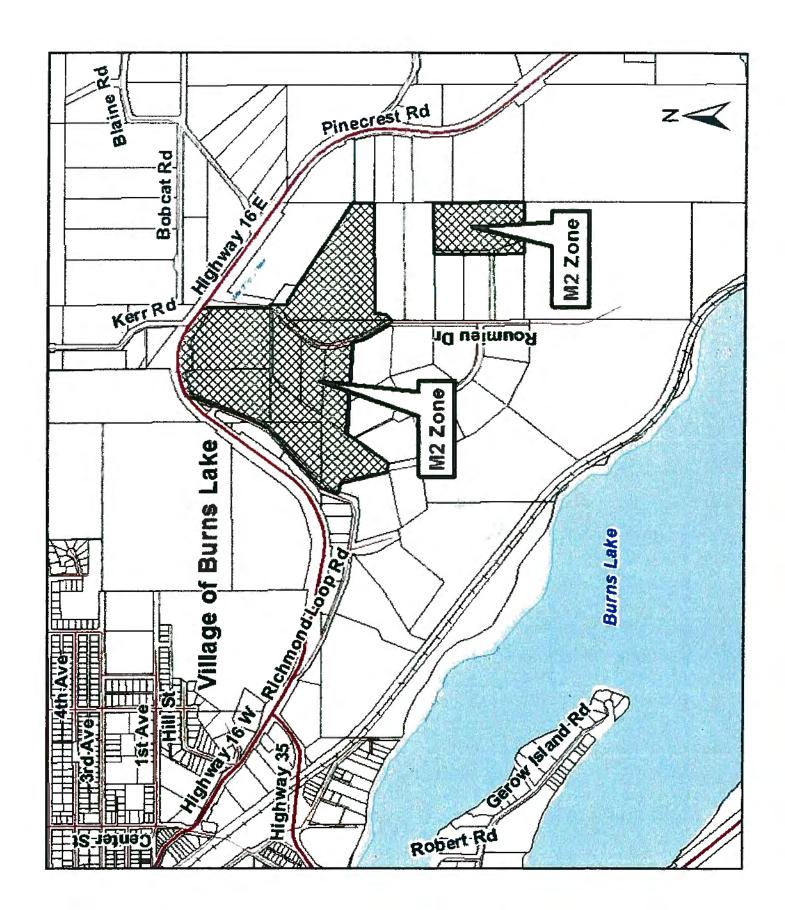

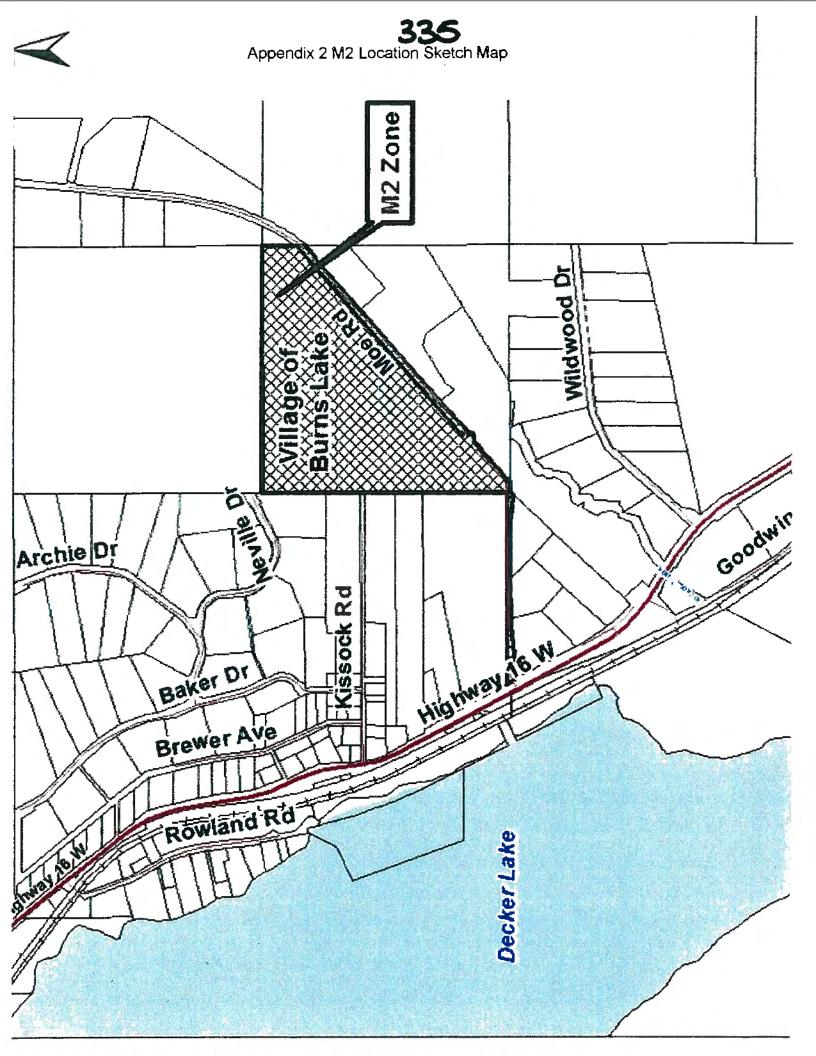

 - Chapter 12 IMPLEMENTATION

Section 12.2 Present and Proposed Land Use Plan Designations

The Heavy Industrial designation includes manufacturing, assembly, processing machining, fabricating, repair, trucking storage, public utilities and medical cannabis production facilities.

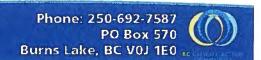

 - a) Section 2.3 Definitions
 - a. The definition of "agriculture" be revised to add the words "and also excludes medical cannabis production facilities" after the words "fish hatcheries" at the end of the existing definition.
 - b. The definition of "green house and plant nursery" be revised to add the following new sentence at the end of the existing definition:
 - "This use excludes medical cannabis production facilities."
 - c. The definition of "home industry" be revised to add the following new sentence at the end of the existing definition:
 - "This use excludes medical cannabis production facilities."
 - d. The definition of "home occupation" be revised to add the following new sentence at the end of the existing definition:

"This use excludes medical cannabis production facilities."



e. The definition of "industrial uses, general" be revised to add the following new sentence at the end of the existing definition:

"This use excludes medical cannabis production facilities."

f. The definition of "manufacturing establishment" be revised to add the following new sentence at the end of the existing definition:

"This use excludes medical cannabis production facilities."

g. The following new definitions be added, in alphabetical order;

"cannabis" means connabis as defined in the Contralled Drugs and Substances
Act (S.C. 1996, c. 19) and includes any plants, parts of plants, plant seeds, plant
materials, oils or products containing cannabis;

"licensed producer" means the holder of a producer's licence;

"medical cannabis production facility" means any use of any land, building or structure, or a part thereof, for growing, cultivating, horvesting, producing, processing, packoging, storing, destroying, providing, transporting, shipping, delivering, distributing or selling of cannabis. This permitted use may only be undertaken by a licensed producer within the scope of any applicable producer's licence. This use does not include the retail sale or dispensing of cannabis;

"producer's licence" means a cannobis production licence or similar authorization issued under the licensing requirements, lows and regulations applicable from time to time to cannobis for medical purposes;

- b) Section 10.2.2 Heavy Industrial Zone (M2) Principal Permitted Uses
 - a. That a new subjection "(dd) medical cannobis production focility" be added to the list of Permitted Uses for the Heavy Industrial Zone M2, with all following subsections to be renumbered so that they remain in consequential alphabetical order.

Cannabis Regulations Safeguard Local Choice, Jurisdiction

Feb. 7, 2018

The Province has released additional regulations as part of its framework for legalized cannabis. The new regulations focus on the retail sale of non-medical cannabis, and outline policies to address public consumption, personal cultivation and drug-impaired driving. The new rules align with UBCM's advocacy and recommendations provided by the Joint Provincial-Local Government Committee on Cannabis Regulation (JCCR).

UBCM President Wendy Booth, part of the joint committee, praised the province for its ongoing consultation with local government. "Our members have been seeking confirmation that we will be able to regulate cannabls retail as we do for the sale of alcohol. We also have supported separating the sale of cannabis from alcohol for reasons of public health. The regulations the province has brought address these concerns and are good news for local government."

Retail Framework

Non-medical cannabis will be available for purchase through government-operated outlets, private stores and online. The Liquor Distribution Branch will assume responsibility for operating standalone government retail stores, while the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch will be in charge of licensing private retail operations,

Retail co-location of non-medical cannabis with alcohol or tobacco will not be permitted in urban areas, along with other products such as food, gas, and lottery tickets. This approach is consistent with the prevalent viewpoint in the medical community, including that of former Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Perry Kendall, and was supported by the JCCR in its first submission to the Province.

At the same time, the JCCR has also advocated for smaller communities to be eligible to receive an exemption to this rule, given that some smaller jurisdictions lack the capacity or demand to warrant a separate location for both liquor and non-medical cannabis. The Province, as members of the JCCR, concluded that exceptions be established for rural non-medical cannabis retail stores, similar to exceptions that currently exist for rural liquor stores.

The Province will launch its registration process for those seeking a non-medical cannabis retail licence this spring. As part of this process, there will not be a cap on the number of retail licences issued, although licences will not be issued without local government support through a council resolution, based in part on a required public consultation process. Local governments will have the ability to impose security and distance requirements for retail outlets. Retail outlets may operate from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. unless additional restrictions are put in place by a local government.

Through this process, local governments will have the ability to restrict, and if they so choose, completely ban cannabis sales (including public stores).

"It makes good sense to model the retail sale of cannabis on the current framework for alcohol," said Councillor Kerry Jang, JCCR Co-Chair. "The proposed model prevents the download of licensing while providing local governments with the tools to locate and manage the number of stores in their communities. Clarifying these issues lays the groundwork for sorting out the appropriate sharing of tax revenues."

The Province has also released a Private Retail Licensing Guide, providing additional information regarding its retail system for nonmedical cannabis.

Public Consumption

Adults 19 years and older will be permitted to consume non-medical cannabis in public spaces where tobacco smoking and vaping are allowed. Exceptions to this rule include a ban on consumption in areas frequented by children, such as beaches and parks, as well as inside vehicles. Similar to tobacco use, additional restrictions will be at the discretion of local governments. The JCCR has previously advocated for all these changes, as well as a strong enforcement regime for restricting cannabis smoking/vaping.

The Committee also supports the development of licenced establishments where individuals can consume cannabis. The Province has decided not to immediately licence consumption venues/lounges; discussions will continue with the JCCR.

As part of its restrictions on public consumption, the Province has permitted landlords and strata councils to restrict or prohibit consumption at tenanted and strata properties.

Personal Cultivation

Consistent with proposed federal restrictions, British Columbia will permit adults to grow a maximum of four plants per household. The plants must not be visible from public spaces located outside the property. Personal cultivation will not be permitted in dwellings used for daycares. The JCCR directly advocated in favour of all these policy decisions, and going forward supports the use of provincial resources and strong administrative penalties to act as a deterrent for those who violate restrictions on personal cultivation.

As part of its restrictions on personal cultivation, the Province has permitted landlords and strata councils to restrict or prohibit cultivation of non-medical cannabis at tenanted and strata properties.

Drug-impaired Driving

The Province will increase training for law enforcement in order to manage drug-impaired driving. Consistent with JCCR recommendations, the Province will also introduce new measures to deter drug-impaired driving, including a new 90-day administrative driving prohibition for drug-affected driving and zero-tolerance restrictions for the presence of THC in drivers who are part of the Graduated Licensing Program.

The Union of BC Municipalities recently endorsed resolution 2017-B88 which requests funding for police agencies to increase the number of certified drug recognition experts. It is unclear how much of the recently announced federal funding to support law enforcement will be allocated to British Columbia for police officer training.

Next Steps

The JCCR will continue to work with the Province of British Columbia to analyze and discuss policy decisions, including the distribution of taxation revenue, in advance of legalization.

Thank you for your letter regarding the timeframes for responding to requests for input from local government on Provincial initiatives.

Meaningful dialogue with local governments is an important issue to me. I understand that regional district boards, and other local governments, face challenges in responding to these requests as it takes time to gather input and to fully consider how complex issues affect communities. I also understand that the timing of board and council meetings can make these requests even more challenging.

In the fall of 2017, all local governments were asked by my colleague, the Honourable Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General, to comment within short timeframes on the impact of cannabis legalization to local governments for the purpose of informing the development of the Provincial regulatory framework. Timelines for this request were driven by the time required to allow our new government to form as well as the need for a Provincial response to be ready for cannabis legalization in July 2018, as mandated by the federal government.

Please note that our starting point for the Province of British Columbia is to always provide local governments with sufficient time for meaningful consultation. However, in some circumstances, like that noted above, the time available will be dependent on the nature of the proposed action.

I appreciate you bringing this matter to my attention. If there are other specific examples you would like to discuss please feel free to raise them with myself or Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing staff, notably Tara Faganello, Assistant Deputy Minister, Local Government Division. Another venue for making such a request would be through the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) resolutions process.

The Province considers and provides a formal response to all adopted UBCM resolutions.

I understand the amount of information you receive at the regional district level from provincial and federal agencies as well as from the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) can be a large workload that is challenging to time around board meetings.

I have asked ministry staff in offices across Northern BC to try to accommodate the meeting schedule of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako when setting review timelines. If these timelines are set by legislation or regulation, my staff will clarify this in the letter and let you know if there are opportunities to request additional time.

I also encourage you to bring this forward through UBCM as you have planned.

The purpose of this letter is to request that your Regional District consider writing the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy in support of the GVS&DD Commercial Waste Hauler Licensing Bylaw No. 307, 2017.

At its November 24, 2017 regular meeting, the Board of Directors of the Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District (Metro Vancouver) approved the GVS&DD Commercial Waste Hauler Licensing Bylaw No. 307, 2017 and approved forwarding the bylaw to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy for approval.

Metro Vancouver's Commercial Waste Hauler Licensing bylaw would help increase waste diversion by requiring Commercial Waste Haulers in Metro Vancouver to ensure recycling containers are provided for all multi-family and commercial/institutional buildings. The multi-family and commercial/institutional sectors have lower recycling rates compared to the single family sector where municipalities typically directly provide waste and recycling services.

Commercial Waste Hauler Licensing would also facilitate the collection of the Generator Levy, which was approved by the GVS&DD Board on the same date as Commercial Waste Hauler Licensing. The Generator Levy is now in effect. The Generator Levy ensures all waste generators contribute to the fixed costs of the region's transfer station network and solid waste planning, which benefit all waste generators in the region.

The Generator Levy, set at \$40 a tonne for 2018, is incorporated into the Tipping Fee at Metro Vancouver and City of Vancouver disposal facilities and will not affect the total cost of disposal. If waste is delivered to other facilities, haulers will be required to collect the Generator Levy and remit it to Metro Vancouver, thus ensuring that all waste generators contribute to the system regardless of where the waste is ultimately disposed.

Enclosed is an infographic describing the Generator Levy, Commercial Waste Hauler Licensing and updates to Bylaw 181, a bylaw regulating private facilities that manage solid waste and recyclable materials. Together, Metro Vancouver's regulatory framework updates aim to reduce waste, increase recycling, ensure current and future infrastructure is equitably funded and modernize the way private facilities are regulated.

I am sending you this letter with the expectation that you will take some action regarding its contents and that I will get a written reply to my concerns and proposal. Thank you.

The Telkwa River flood of October 2017 caused a lot of erosion and loss of land to property owners on both sides of the Telkwa River at Telkwa. The uprooted trees and debris left behind when the water receded are a potential hazard in that future flooding may redeposit it who knows where, causing more damage. If the climatologists are correct, we can expect more of these extreme weather events, so it is not reasonable to sit back and wait for these events to happen and then spend millions of dollars cleaning up afterwards. It is time to plan and prepare ahead of these events.

The hands off approach to waterways out of concern for fish habitat is not working. Letting nature take its course and cleaning up after is absurd. Instead, we should be managing the river, directing its course and removing debris that could alter that course. This, in my opinion, would be far less destructive to fish habitat and the whole river basin.

I personally had over 2 acres of land and timber washed away in the October 2017 flood. Proper river management could have prevented that. BCHydro, I'm guessing, spent close to \$500,000.00 saving the main transmission tower at the lower end of our property. That tower was on dry ground until Mother Nature changed the river's course and it wound up in the middle of the Telkwa River. (see attached photo) The village of Telkwa is planning to spend many thousands of dollars to repair damage done to the dyke system from that flood. A fraction of that amount could have been spent on river management to prevent that destruction.

On the accompanying air photo, I have marked with a dotted red line, a man made course that the river could follow. It would require clearing a right of way and removing all debris on that right of way, then excavating a canal. The best time to do it is in the winter when the river is at its lowest and equipment can work on frozen ground. As well, it would have the least impact on resident fish and fish habitat. It would have to be maintained, but the cost of an excavator for a few days every winter to clear any debris

accumulations would be minimal. There definitely would be less erosion and deleterious material going into the river than if left to nature to take its course.

My hope is that the agencies responsible will review their policies and consider alternative actions regarding our waterways. Rivers are being dammed and diverted for hydro electric projects. Why not for flood protection?

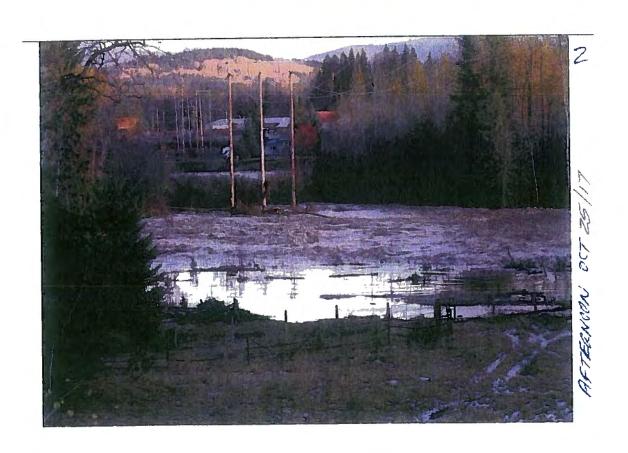

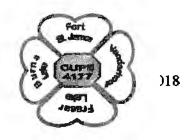

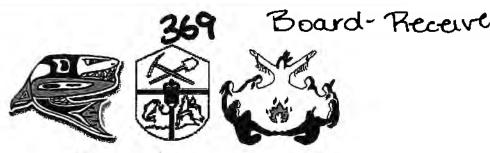

Mayor Dwayne Lindstrom called the meeting to order at 6:10 pm. Mayor Lindstrom welcomed those in attendance to the forth Tri Council Meeting of our three communities.

Highway 16 Bus Transit System update

RDBN Director Mark Parker provided an update on the Highway 16 Bus Transit System. The updated provided statistics of bus ridership to the end of September 2017. The transit service from Burns Lake to Prince George serves Stellaquo, Fraser Lake, Nadleh and residents of Area D. Of note, this segment of the Highway 16 Transit Service experiences the highest use. Over the past



summer, ridership was significant with 261 passengers in July, 316 passengers in August and 288 passengers in September. Most days the vehicle being used has adequate capacity, however, in August 2017 there were 3 instances where the bus was full and passengers were turned away. Consideration is being given to increasing the size of the transit vehicle to a 30-passenger unit in 2018.

A Transportation Committee meets regularly to identify challenges or "kinks" in the system. They are collecting information through rider surveys and public input. The committee recognizes minor adjustments will be needed to ensure the service is meeting rider needs. The Transportation Committee meets every two months. A winter bus schedule has recently been released. The winter schedule includes minor changes to pick up and drop off times. Copies of the winter schedule are available on the Regional District website and at most locations where bus tickets can be purchased.

Fraser Lake Community Vehicle

Mayor Lindstrom provided an update on the Fraser Lake Community vehicle. The Community Vehicle is an 11 passenger Mercedes van. Delivery of the vehicle is expected within the next month. Route maps were provided of the planned routes. Our own Community Transportation Committee is being established to help establish the system. This Community Vehicle will provide service two days per week. One route will provide service to Francois Lake east, Endako, Stellaquo, and Fraser Lake. One a separate day of the week, the second route will provide service to Stellaquo, North Shore, Nadleh Whut'en, Fort Fraser and Fraser Lake. Each route will include pick up in the morning and a return route in the afternoon. Mayor Lindstrom invited representation from Stellaquo and Nadleh to the Community Transportation Committee.

Sandra Nahomoff reported she had been contacted by Deneve of the RDBN. The RDBN has asked Stellaquo to contribute toward the \$81,000.00 annual cost of the Highway 16 Transit bus. Sandra Nahomoff asked if the Fraser Lake Community vehicle and the Highway 16 bus were one in the same.

Mayor Lindstrom confirmed they were not.

Director Mark Parker offered to make himself available to the Chief and Councils of both Stellaquo or Nadleh, should they want a presentation on the Highway 16 Transit System or any other Regional District activities.



Youth Fire Department Program

Councillor Tyrel Ray introduced the idea of holding a one day Youth Fire Department orientation for First Nations High School students from Stellaquo and Nadleh. Councillor Ray stated the idea was conceived following the September Tri Council Meeting. Tyrel has been working with Fire Chief Joe Pacheco on this initiative.

Fire Chief Joe Pacheco explained he would like to run an eight hour, one day "Introduction to Firefighting" course. This day will introduce the students to ladders, ropes, turn out gear and apparatus. The Fire Departments of both Stellaquo and Nadleh are asked to supply turn out gear for the students. Fire Chief Pacheco invited Chief Patrick, Chief Nooski and Mayor Lindstrom to attend the day. Fire Chief Pacheco feels it's important the students see this as a significant and important endeavor.

Chief Larry Nooski asked Fire Chief Pacheco if he would be available to present to the Nadleh Band Council. Chief Nooski would like to obtain the full support of the Nadleh Whut'en Council.

Fire Chief Pacheco hopes this is just phase 1. An invitation is open to the Fire Chiefs and interested community members from Stellaquo and Nadleh to attend and participate Monday evening fire practices alongside the Fraser Lake Fire Department volunteers.

On a separate note, Fire Chief Pacheco provided an overview of the Fraser Lake Fire Rescue Society's plans to develop a fire training facility on the lands of the Fraser Lake Airport. This facility is intended to benefit area Fire Departments and Industry. This facility will allow Fire Departments to practice structural and interface firefighting.

Chief Archie Patrick likes and supports this initiative. He has requested Fire Chief Pacheco make a presentation to the Stellat'en Band Council. Band Manager Sandra Nahornoff is to confirm the date.

Band Manager, Sandra Nahomoff voiced her concern about the safety of the youth participating in the "Introduction to Fire Fighting course". She asked for assurance the youth training camp will stress the importance of safety and protecting themselves.

Fire Chief Pacheco stated this would be emphasized. This one day orientation initiative will not teach in depth skills. It is more about creating an interest in participating in the community fire department.



Lejac Camp

Chief Nooski asked Mayor Lindstrom about the comments made by Marie Sam during her presentation to the Regional District Board in reference to the Lejac Camp.

Mayor Lindstrom stated NDP Candidate Marie Sam had presented at a recently Regional District Meeting. Mayor Lindstrom described it as a good presentation until the last few minutes. Ms. Sam referred to a 200-man camp near Fraser Lake. She alleged there had been many episodes of sexual assault at the camp. Mayor Lindstrom was disturbed by these allegations. Following the meeting, Mayor Lindstrom discussed his concerns about these remarks with Director Mark Parker. Both were surprised by these comments as neither were aware of any significant problems at the camp.

Later that afternoon, Mayor Lindstrom contacted Chief Nooski to advise him of Marie Sam's statements and to share Mayor Lindstrom's concern with Chief Nooski.

Mayor Lindstrom noted the local RCMP provided quarterly reports to Mayor and Council throughout the time the Lejac camp was in place. There were no reports of such criminal activities. Mayor Lindstrom heard of a fight at the Legion and understood the person involved was dismissed from his employment the following day.

Mayor Lindstrom stated it was his belief the Lejac Camp was well run. He also felt the camp was beneficial to the businesses of Fraser Lake. Mayor Lindstrom had received feedback from at least one local businesses of the economic benefits of the camp being close to Fraser lake.

Chief Nooski indicated he was also surprised by the comments. Chief Nooski believed a responsible camp had been maintained. Horizon North was the contractor. They claimed to bave a zero-tolerance policy regarding alcohol and abusive behavior. Following the conversation with Mayor Lindstrom, Chief Nooski contacted a representative of Horizon North. Chief Nooski asked for further information; if it was available. Horizon North was unaware of the problems alleged by Marie Sam relative to the Lejac Camp.

Chief Nooski furthered his inquiry by speaking with a couple of security people who'd been employed at the Lejac camp. Chief Nooski felt these folks were on top of things during their employment at the camp. Neither were able to add anything to explain the comments of Ms. Sam.

Chief Nooski was of the belief the Lejac Camp was good for his community. Looking to the future, Nadleh Band is working with the Coastal GasLink through their SEMP Management Plan



to establish another camp at Lejac. Chief Nooski is concerned about the statements of Marie Sam as he does not want to support anything that is abusive. Chief Nooski would like to ensure any camp installed at Lejac is safe. Chief Nooski feels being proactive and preventative is the appropriate way forward for this project as Nadleh and Coastal Gaslink work toward a proper solution.

Chief Nooski will approach Marie Sam and inquire as to where she got her information.

Mayor Lindstrom agreed. He thanked Chief Nooski for the manner in which he is dealing with this concern.

Councillor Cheryl Barneston stated she was happy to hear the concern for safety.

Regional District Relationship Protocol with First Nations

Chief Archie Patrick asked RDBN Director Mark Park about the status of this document. With reference to the Community to Community meeting that was hosted by Nadleh Whut'en in June 2017, a *Relationship Protocol* had been proposed. Chief Patrick noted the document, as presented, was a first shot at developing a protocol that would unite all. Chief Patrick felt the vote on the document was close to unanimous, however, it was not adopted.

Chief Patrick notes there is always a notion that education needs to take place. For such a protocol to succeed, we need to understand each other's background and thought patterns. In the first 100 years, following colonization, First Nations were under the thumb of settlers. Prior to that time, First Nations were accustomed to having use of all the lands. They were required to move to smaller places. When this occurred, the older people didn't understand what was happening.

Today, control has heen handed over to the Chiefs. Chief Patrick feels this was done to maintain the status quo. Chief Patrick stated it is important to share this information about our backgrounds but wondered who is responsible for this task. Another question; with whom should this information be shared?

Chief Patrick stated as a community leader, he would like the same things for his community as what he sees in other communities; children attending school and adults with johs.

Chief Patrick wonders whether the protocol in its current form is too big?

Band Manager Sandra Nahornoff included there are thirteen bands within the Regional District. Although all 13 Bands were invited to the Community to Community meeting in June, not all



bands were represented at the meeting. It is often difficult to get everyone in the room at the same time. The protocol is a big undertaking.

Mayor Lindstrom agreed with Chief Patrick that it is a good thing to meet and learn about each other. The Tri Council Meetings help with that pursuit.

Old Business:

RCMP Tripartite Agreement update

Councillor Sarrah Storey reported speaking with Sgt Jason Slater of the Fraser Lake RCMP. Sgt Slater has been told there is no money for this initiative at this time.

Band Manager Sandra Nahornoff was asked for a letter of support. Unfortunately, due to other developments, she was unable to provide the requested letter. Sandra feels the application would benefit from the support of community service providers. She added the RCMP Tripartite position is as much about community education as it about enforcement.

Elders and Mountain Bike Program

Councillor Cheryl Barneston reported a general information session was provided in Nadleh by Patrick Lucas. He has indicated the next step in this initiative is to speak with community elders to identify the hest trails for this purpose.

Band Manager Sandra Nahornoff commented that Patrick Lucas approached Stellat'en Band; asking them to apply for the Community Trails grant. Sandra felt Patrick Lucas' proposal was significant and she is concerned whether the community would be able to afford the proposed trails.

Councillor Barneston reports Nadleh has signed a BCR authorizing Patrick Lucas to apply for grants on their behalf.

Regional District OCP update

Director Mark Parker provided an update. The OCP review is an ongoing process. The Regional District is working on a draft proposal that will be presented for discussion. Director Parker offered a presentation on the OCP to any Council upon request.

Chief Nooski requested the schedule for Regional District meetings. Chief Nooski would like to present on the spending power of First Nations. First Nations are significant contributors to local economies. Chief Nooski adds his community is also working on land use planning. Chief Nooski believes this information may assist the Regional District with their OCP update.



Director Parker announced the Regional District has recently hired an Agricultural Coordinator. Her name is Debbie Evans. She has a breadth of experience; including a background in First Nations agriculture.

Band Manager Sandra Nahornoff noted the Regional District's OCP has no jurisdiction on First Nations Land; however, the Regional District has requested input for First Nations. From her position, Sandra would like to see our communities and the Regional District working together to create an extremely attractive highway corridor.

Adam Patrick commented, in terms of economic development, tourism is the next thing to look into. Tourism has the potential to provide significant economic benefit.

Next Meeting Date: February 15th, Nadleh to Host

Band Manager Sandra Nahomoff encourage everyone to identify agenda items for the next meeting. She suggested identifying capital projects and working together with the goal of obtaining better pricing from contractor through economies of scale.

Re: Prevention of Quagga and Zebra Mussels

At a meeting on Monday, January 8, 2018 New Westminster City Council passed the following resolution:

THAT Council endorse the concerns expressed by the District of Sicamous regarding the threat of Quagga and Zebra mussels; and

THAT a letter of support be sent to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy with copies to the Deputy Minister, the President of the UBCM, and UBCM members (via email).

At the 2017 UBCM Annual Convention, the District of Sicamous submitted the following resolution, which was endorsed by the UBCM:

Whereas British Columbia's lakes generate international tourism business totaling millions of dollars each and every year;

And whereas the Zebra and Quagga mussel infestation poses a serious threat to the economic welfare of British Columbia's tourism industry:

Therefore be it resolved that the provincial government provide increased educational funding and increased monitoring efforts to combat the invasive mussel infestation threatening the pristine lakes of British Columbia's tourism areas.

385

The resolution requests more funding from the provincial government to increase awareness and education regarding this issue. Quagga and zebra mussels are highly invasive; only one mussel can produce one million mussels per year. Should BC become infested with these mussels, the impact will not ever be reversible. All BC lakes would be contaminated and there is currently no solution to destroy the mussel population.

It is our belief that the effects of these mussels would be devastating to BC freshwater eco-systems. Zebra and quagga mussels filter water to the point where food sources such as plankton are removed, altering food webs. This also causes clearer water, allowing sunlight to penetrate deeper, increasing growth of aquatic vegetation. Toxic algal blooms may negatively impact native fish and wildlife. Large mussel colonies affect spawning areas, impacting the survival of fish eggs.

With the eco-system compromised, beaches will be destroyed. Water intakes may become clogged with mussel colonies and there is no research on how these mussel populations may affect water quality. Recreational users may no longer wish to access lakes due to the environmental changes, which would negatively impact the vital tourism industry in BC. The cost to British Columbia government, taxpayers and businesses will be billions if these mussels manage to infiltrate our ecosystem.

Fortunately, there is still time to prevent this disaster. The District of Sicamous submitted a comprehensive list of preventative measure to keep these mussels out of BC waterways, including stricter border patrols, increased conservation staffing, intergovernmental collaboration and improved boater education. It is our hope that the Government of BC will heed this warning and implement some of these suggestions before it is too late.

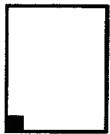

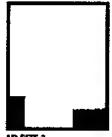

Consultation on Amending the List of Species under the Species at Risk Act: Terrestrial

Species

Hello,

The Government of Canada has launched consultations regarding the potential to amend Schedule 1 of the *Species at Risk Act* (SARA). These consultations seek the public's input into the federal Minister of the Environment's response to assessments of species at risk submitted by the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC).

In British Columbia there are 7 terrestrial species for which COSEWIC's assessments could lead to amendments to SARA Schedule 1 (the List of Wildlife Species at Risk):

- Evening Grosbeak (Coccothraustes vespertinus) a bird found broadly across Canada
 - Potential new addition to Schedule 1, listed as Special Concern
- Monarch (Danaus plexippus) a butterfly found primarily in central and eastern Canada, with occasional occurrences in southern British Columbia
 - Potential change in status from Special Concern to Endangered
- Pink-footed Shearwater (Puffinus creatopus) a bird found off British Columbia's coast
 - o Potential change in status from Threatened to Endangered
- Rusty Cord-moss (Entosthodon rubiginosus) a moss found in British Columbia's central and southern interior
 - Potential change in status from Endangered to Special Concern
- Sonora Skipper (Polites sonora) a butterfly found in south-central British Columbia
 - Potential removal from Schedule 1 (currently listed as Special Concern)
- Transverse Lady Beetle (Coccinella transversoguttata) an insect found broadly across Canada
 - Potential new addition to Schedule 1, Special Concern
- <u>Western Painted Turtle, Pacific Coast pop.</u> (*Chrysemys picto bellii*) a turtle found on Vancouver Island, some Gulf Islands, the Sunshine Coast, Metro Vancouver, and the lower Fraser Valley
 - Potential change in status from Endangered to Threatened

An additional 5 terrestrial species at risk found in British Columbia had their current status under SARA confirmed by COSEWIC. These are not included in this consultation process, as no regulatory amendment is required. Please note that Fisheries and Oceans Canada is also conducting related consultations for aquatic species. The full list of Ministerial Response Statements outlining how the Minister of Environment intends to respond to CO5EWIC's assessments is available at https://www.registrelep-sararegistry.gc.ca/document/default_e.cfm?documentID=3200.

You are invited to submit comments on the potential impacts of amending SARA Schedule 1 according to COSEWIC's assessments. Comments can be submitted via email to ec.LEPreglementations-SARAregulations.ec@canada.ca. The comment period ends on May 22, 2018 for most species found in BC, and on October 22, 2018 for Monarch.

Further information regarding the listing and consultation processes for terrestrial species can be found in "Consultation on Amending the List of Species under the Species at Risk Act -Terrestrial Species: January 2018" (posted here http://registrelep-sararegistry.gc.ca/document/default_e.cfm?documentID=3200). This document also includes a questionnaire that provides guidance on the types of information and comments Environment and Climate Change Canada is seeking.

We are currently working on a suite of research projects that have emerged in response to concerns and issues voiced by communities in northern BC. Many of the following projects are happening in partnership with various agencies with interest in cumulative impacts in northern BC. 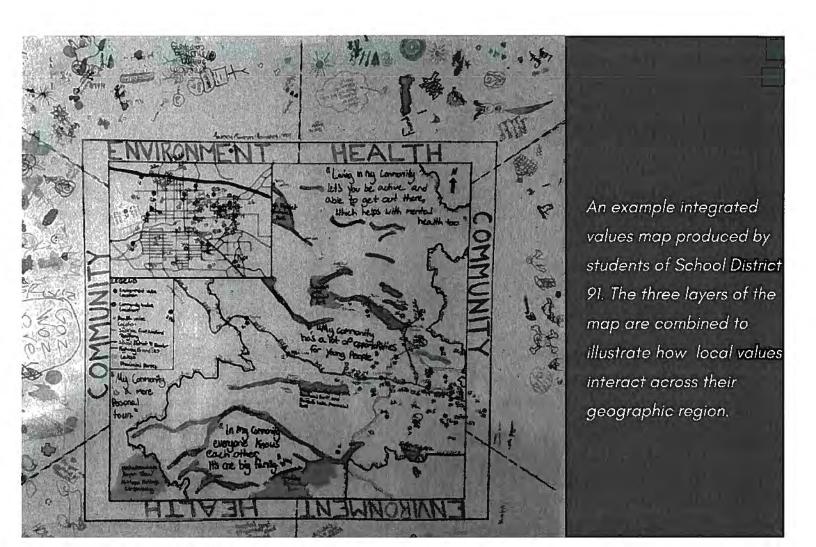

Integrated Values Mapping

Youth perspectives are often under-represented or missing entirely from conversations about the future of resource governance. Recognizing that decisions of today will leave a lasting impact on future generations, we endeavoured to pilot a process to engage youth on the kinds of values that are important to protect indefinitely. In May 2017, CIRC stoff led an arts-based workshop with grade 8 students from School District 91. The overall goal of this workshop was to learn about the kinds of health, community and environmental values that are important to youth living in SD91, and to locate those values on a regional map to discuss how those values interact across time and space. 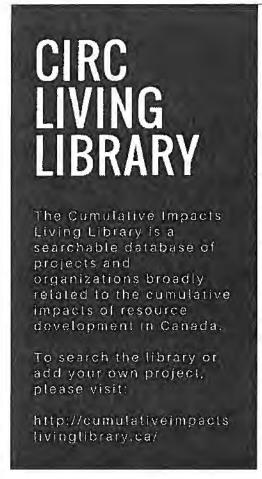

Data-driven Storytelling

Throughout 2017, CIRC staff facilitated a series of community workshops using a "data-driven storytelling" research and facilitation tool. CIRC stoff compiled regional data into a 30-year retrospective on cumulative environmental, community and health impacts of resource development. In response to these "integrated regional profiles", workshop participonts were asked to respond to the following question:

How do we make better land-use decisions that account for long-term impacts to environmental, community and health values?

Our method:

- 1. Seeks to explore areas of convergence and divergence between narratives, and other kinds of information around community, environmental, and health values.
- 2. Attempts to 'make sense' of cumulative impacts across different areas of northern BC, and across past experiences, ongoing realities and visions for the future.
- 3. Provides a space for participants to share issues they feel go 'unnoticed' in conventional land use decision-making processes, holding space for both researchers and community members to hear and hold multiple perspectives of a region's lived reality at the same time, in dialogue with one another.

"I guess for me it was the flooding of the Williston Reservoir...And that's had a huge impact on the whole area. The forest base has been destroyed, the impact on residents, on First Nations, the residents who have waited 40-45 years to claim settlements. The change, I mean it's a piece of land that's basically inaccessible by most people now. It has had an enormous impact on the area, both social and environmental. I made money off that, I worked at the dam, I was employed in construction. It has changed our world."

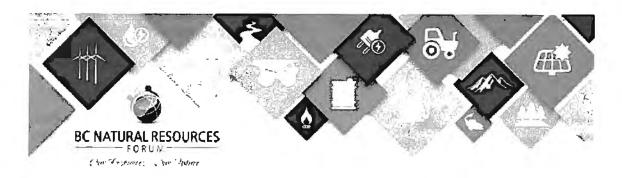

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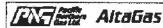
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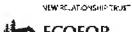

Community Tenures in the WUI: BCCFA Mapping & Analysis

The BCCFA is looking for comments on a new idea for an expanded WUI in the 10 km critical zone for community protection. The preliminary analysis area includes the land within BC Fire Protection Districts that is also within the Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis (PSTA) 2km WUI buffer, plus an 8 km buffer. There are 13.6 million hectares in this 10km WUI buffer. Currently, community forest agreements operate on 5.7% of that area (they account for 1.8% of the landbase provincially). The BCCFA contends that community-based tenures - the community forest agreement and the First Nations

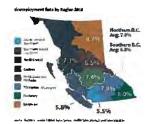

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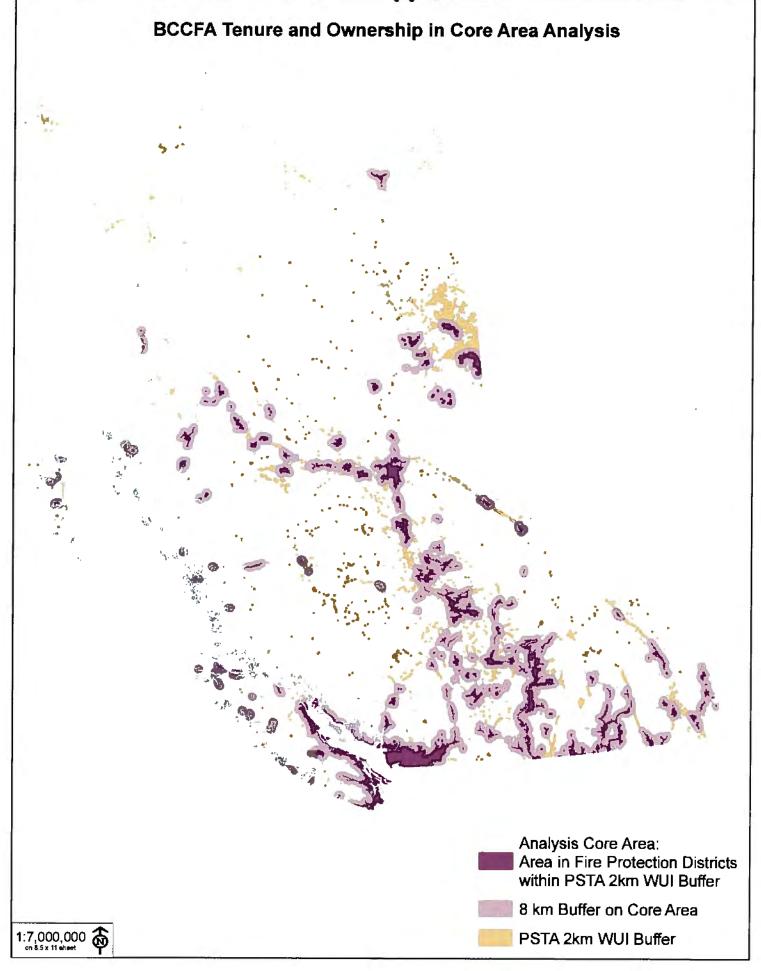

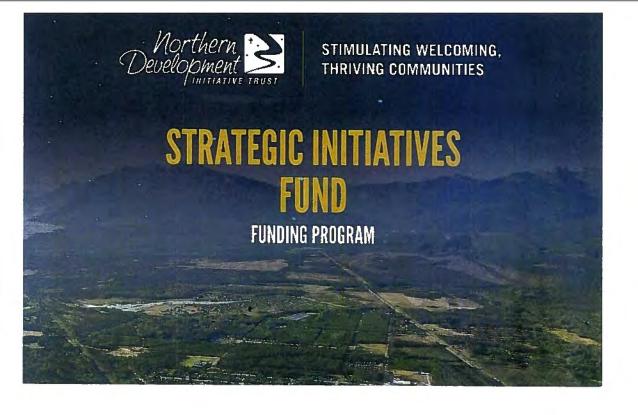

BC Poverty Reduction Strategy Consultation

Jan. 30, 2018

The provincial government is seeking input on the development of its BC Poverty Reduction Strategy. There are several ways to participate as outlined on the Province's website and feedback will be collected until March 30, 2018.

Interested parties can participate by attending one of the 20 community meetings across BC; submitting feedback by email, mail or phone; completing the online feedback form; or hosting a small group discussion. More information is available on the Province's website.

Key questions to consider include:

- · What does success look like in a BC Poverty Reduction Strategy?
- What do you think are the best ways to reduce poverty in BC?
- What can we do as a province, a community or as individuals to reduce poverty and contribute to economic and social inclusion?

Feedback will be collected until March 30, 2018.

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Province Changes Liquor Event Policy

Jan. 30, 2018

The provincial government has amended its policy regarding Special Event Permits (SEP). General Managers may exempt SEP holders from donating profits to a charitable purpose if events are deemed to be of municipal, provincial, national or international significance. Local governments will be responsible for determining whether a proposed event is municipally significant.

Previously, if a SEP holder charged over the liquor cost recovery price list, all profits had to be transferred to a charitable purpose. Under the new policy, the General Manager may exempt SEP holders from donating event profits to a charitable purpose if events are deemed to be of municipal, provincial, national or international significance. While the Province will consider exemption requests for events that are provincially, nationally or internationally significant, local governments will be responsible for determining whether a proposed event is municipally significant.

As of February 26, 2018, local governments may designate an event to be municipally significant by municipal resolution or a letter from a delegated municipal official. Local Boards and Councils will have the ability, through bylaw, to delegate staff to comment on behalf of a local government.

This policy change follows provincial engagement with local governments and the Local Government Working Group on Liquor Policy in August and September 2017. On September 19, 2017, following discussions among the local government members of the Working Group, UBCM sent a letter to the Province providing feedback towards this proposed policy. Citing concerns including the administrative burden on local governments, verifying promoters have received approvals, and negative impacts on charities and other liquor establishments, the letter made the following recommendations:

- That the Province work with local governments to create a more detailed SEP policy proposal that provides some clarification and addresses all major concerns brought forward by local governments.
- 2. More specifically, that the Province work with local governments to create a more detailed set of guidelines for declaring a "municipally significant" event, which local governments may choose to accept, modify or reject based on their discretion and desire to opt-in to this proposed SEP policy.

The Province announced this policy change on January 10, 2018.

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In Memoriam - Ray Brady

Jan. 30, 2018

Former Kitimat councillor and mayor, Ray Brady, passed away on December 31, 2017. Brady's 27 years of municipal service spanned over 40 years; serving first as an alderman in 1973, mayor between 1985 and 1988, and retiring from political life in 2008.

In a statement, the District of Kitimat extended its condolences to the Brady family:

"We would like to recognize and commend his commitment to improving our community, which is exemplified by the 27 years he served as a member of council, including four years as mayor. Ray leaves behind a legacy that will not be forgotten, and he will truly be missed by many."

A service will be held on February 3, 2018 at the Kitimat Catholic Church.

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RCMP Contract Management Committee Update

Jan. 30, 2018

On November 22, 2017, the Local Government Contract Management Committee (LGCMC) met with provincial and RCMP representatives to discuss issues related to the RCMP contract and policing in British Columbia. This article highlights key issues discussed at the meeting.

Please note: this information is accurate as of November 22, 2017.

1) Working Group Discussion Items

RCMP Outstanding Issues Update

Provincial representatives provided an update on the status of three long-standing issues (Severance, Green Timbers, IHIT). The Province most recently met with Public Safety Canada in November 2017 with the objective of resolving these issues.

RCMP Labour Relations Update

There was very little new information to provide on this issue beyond Bill C-7 receiving Royal Assent on June 19, 2017. Local government members were concerned about having a local government voice at the table and being able to provide local government perspectives and input into the new system.

Municipal Companion Document Update

The Province is currently in the process of updating the Municipal Companion Document to reflect changes made by the Working Group and other pertinent changes (e.g. those from the Five Year Review), and having BC legal counsel provide a review. Once these tasks are completed, the Working Group will conduct another review prior to submitting the document to the LGCMC for review.

CMC Standing Committee Updates

Much of the Standing Committee's work has been focussed on completing the Five Year Review and implementing outcomes approved by CMC. In response to the need to improve mental health support for members, the RCMP is recommending mandatory psychological health assessments every three years, to be conducted at the same time as the Periodic Health Assessment. Additionally, the Investigator Development Program, targeting front line members with 1-5 years of service, is being considered. It has been piloted in BC since 2014, intending to develop "fundamental investigation skills" among officers.

5 Year Review

Working groups are currently focussed on implementing recommendations; a large portion of this work has been tabled for ADMs to consider in December 2017. Big themes coming out of the Review are the need for improved consultation, clarifying roles and responsibilities (e.g. through edits to the Companion Document), and improved implementation of the agreements. The Province re-iterated that the Review was a review of the contract, not a re-negotiation. All issues had to be agreed to by



the provinces and territories. An update was provided on all municipal issues that were either specific to BC or considered out of scope for the 5 Year Review.

Vacancy Management

LGCMC members discussed issues with replacing members in their detachments. Concerns varied from the length of time it takes to replace a member, to members being persuaded to join other municipal police agencies. Depot is currently ramping up as much as possible, but even at maximum is barely able to produce enough new members to meet the demand caused by normal attrition. RCMP is also trying to improve disability case management to get more members back to work as soon as possible.

Cannabis Legalization Update

Local governments have formed a standing committee (Joint Provincial-Local Government Committee on Cannabis Legalization) to provide local perspectives and advise the provincial government as it develops a provincial framework for legalized cannabis. With regards to inspections and enforcement, provincial representatives indicated that a robust inspection regime, funded by provincial and federal governments, would be in place to manage the new system. The main policing issues are related to impaired driving, with the federal government working on a device that detects the presence of cannabis, not the amount. The Province is hoping that devices and officer training are paid for through a recent financial commitment by the federal government. Moving forward, these will be ongoing local government costs.

Naloxone Funding

The Province has the funds to provide naloxone, at no cost to local governments, for at least the next 12-18 months. Intranasal kits cost \$99, and injectable devices cost \$12. Since being provided with naloxone, police officers have administered over 250 life-saving doses.

Local Government Policing Hub

UBCM and the Province are working to develop a local government hub of information, called the *Local Government Policing Communications Portal*, to provide broad information on contract policing in BC. LGCMC members supported this initiative.

2) RCMP Update

Acknowledgements - BC Wildfire Thank You

RCMP representatives showed appreciation for the cooperation of local governments, including councils, staff, non-profit organizations and volunteers. There were over 4,200 single deployments of members into the wildfires. Costs are still being tallied, but currently sitting at \$33 million (including salary dollars) with other details being worked through by the Province and RCMP.

Acknowledgements - UBCM Recap Thank You

"E" Division received 23 meeting requests during the 2017 Convention (two of which were withdrawn for various reasons). Meetings were well organized and very informative. Commitments made at these meetings are being addressed internally, and letters forthcoming to relevant local governments. There were several themes that emerged during these meetings, in particular staffing and vacancy management. Another theme was mental health issues and calls. A big message during UBCM 2017 was the need for RCMP collaboration with communities on these types of issues.

Jordan Decision

The Supreme Court Decision on *R. v Jordan* set hard limits on time between charge and trial. The corresponding BC Supreme Court Practice Directive has been in place since September 1, 2017. Similar rules are likely coming to provincial courts. Moving forward, the Crown will only approve charges if they have "substantially complete" disclosure to seek approvals and detention. Law enforcement and Justice are still assessing the full impact of the Jordan Decision. More information will be shared when it becomes available.

40 MM Less Lethal – Extended Range Impact Weapon

A less lethal option to replace the 12 gauge extended range impact weapon (ERIW). This weapon has longer range, is more accurate, and overall is more effective by firing a blunt impact projectile. The Province has approved a one-year pilot. As part of this pilot, 37 40 MM ERIWs and necessary member training will also be provided. Roughly 92 members will be trained as part of the pilot project. Results of the pilot project will be communicated to the LGCMC.

Opioid Response Update

From January 2017 to October 2017, the RCMP recorded over 1,000 suspected illicit drug overdose deaths (compared to over 600 at the same time last year). However, there have not been any deaths at supervised consumption sites or overdose prevention sites. \$14 million over three years has been provided for an Operation Anti-Trafficking Task Force, and another \$5 million over three years for Provincial Tactical Enforcement projects. Fume hoods and ion scanners have been purchased where most needed. As of November 2017, 96% of RCMP "E" Division's operational members have been trained on how to administer naloxone. RCMP members recorded over 255 naloxone deployments between January and October 2017.

Auxiliary Program

Tier 1 and Tier 2 are ready and may be signed off on in the near future so that the RCMP may roll them out. Tier 3 is still under development, likely to be ready by early 2018. Reviews and consultations with various stakeholders were held at National Headquarters with respect to insurance, medical clearance, training and policy. The costs of proposed additions to the existing uniform are \$600 per current Auxiliary, and \$2,500 for incoming Auxiliary. RCMP members will also have to take a course before they are able to have an Auxiliary in their vehicles.

Drug Recognition Experts (RCMP Preparations for Cannabis Legalization)

The RCMP expressed difficulty in getting oral fluid screening devices, training members on how to use them, and getting these devices in use prior to July 2018. There are currently 92 certified Drug Recognition Experts in British Columbia (65 from "E" Division), with the legalization of cannabis requiring another 400 or so over the next 5 years to meet the Public Safety Canada recommended target. BC is hoping to utilize federal funding to train members and provide devices, hopefully mitigating start up costs (but not ongoing costs) for local governments.

Vacancy Management (Protocols for Filling Vacancies & Labour Relations Update)

BC is exceeding its recruiting goals by getting more back than it is providing to Depot. The Province is on track to exceed recruiting goals at 140% level. There is also an added focus on getting people back to work as part of the Disability Management Program. One LGCMC member noted how the length of time to fill detachment commander positions is too long.

Investigator Development Program

A non-mandatory program that includes online and classroom components. The online course includes 9 modules and 3 days in the classroom (total of 42 hours of training). This program is targeted towards General Duty Members with 1-5 years of service. Thus far, 40% of members with less than 5 years of service (655) have been trained. It is funded through the existing core training budget and unit travel budget.

Shared Services Canada

The RCMP is waiting for a decision from the Minister in regards to what the future will hold for Shared Services Canada.

Emergency Response Team Update

Currently, there is a full-time Lower Mainland Emergency Response Team (ERT), and three part-time teams for the three other Districts. The part-time team delivery model is not sustainable with team members having difficultly completing the required training and attending the ERT calls for service while maintaining their full-time job requirements at their home units. The RCMP has submitted a business case to move to a full-time team. In the meantime, the RCMP is proposing a hybrid team (8 full-time members, remainder part-time). Also, a number of equipment pieces are being considered, namely night vision goggles (\$12,000 per set) and new body armour system (\$7,000 each). The Province is working with the RCMP to develop options for a full-time ERT outside the Lower Mainland. There will be consultation and communication with local governments as options are developed.

Police Dog Service Review Update

The RCMP has submitted the Police Dog Service review to the Province, who are currently reviewing and providing feedback. There is also an ongoing cost-comparison study between the RCMP's police dog program and similar programs of other Canadian law enforcement agencies (e.g. VPD dog program).

Multi Year Plan Process Update

Public Safety Canada is looking to streamline the provincial multi-year plan, while the process with respect to municipalities will experience very little change. The provincial process will be enhanced with a more comprehensive and detailed planning process. The new process aims to better appraise all contract partners of medium and long-term investment and operational cost pressures to better help inform their annual and long-term budget plans.

Homelessness

Since 2014, the number of people living in the Lower Mainland without a permanent residence has risen 30%. The RCMP is aware of increasing concerns and a desire from local governments to address homelessness and associated camps, particularly in the Lower Mainland District. The RCMP is looking at a process to engage with local governments on this issue. Local government LGCMC members expressed a desire to help with this issue.

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Smart Communities Challenge Webinars

Jan. 30, 2018

The Intelligent Community Forum (ICF) in partnership with the Province of BC will be hosting two free webinars related to the Smart Cities Challenge.

Both webinars will be held on February 15, 2018, and are designed to help communities learn more about the program and how to make applications.

The Challenge encourages communities to adopt a smart cities approach to improve the lives of their residents through innovation, data, and connected technology.

Participants in the morning webinar will learn from industry experts about what BC communities need to consider in order to benefit from the digital economy and become a smart community. The webinar runs from 9 am to noon PST.

The afternoon webinar will focus on the award program, how to apply, and how best to construct a winning application. The webinar runs from 1 pm to 2:30 pm PST.

Registration is open now for both webinars.

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Cannabis Regulations Safeguard Local Choice, Jurisdiction

Feb. 7, 2018

The Province has released additional regulations as part of its framework for legalized cannabis. The new regulations focus on the retail sale of non-medical cannabis, and outline policies to address public consumption, personal cultivation and drug-impaired driving. The new rules align with UBCM's advocacy and recommendations provided by the Joint Provincial-Local Government Committee on Cannabis Regulation (JCCR).

UBCM President Wendy Booth, part of the joint committee, praised the province for its ongoing consultation with local government. "Our members have been seeking confirmation that we will be able to regulate cannabis retail as we do for the sale of alcohol. We also have supported separating the sale of cannabis from alcohol for reasons of public health. The regulations the province has brought address these concerns and are good news for local government."

Retail Framework

Non-medical cannabis will be available for purchase through government-operated outlets, private stores and online. The Liquor Distribution Branch will assume responsibility for operating standalone government retail stores, while the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch will be in charge of licensing private retail operations.

Retail co-location of non-medical cannabis with alcohol or tobacco will not be permitted in urban areas, along with other products such as food, gas, and lottery tickets. This approach is consistent with the prevalent viewpoint in the medical community, including that of former Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Perry Kendall, and was supported by the JCCR in its first submission to the Province.

At the same time, the JCCR has also advocated for smaller communities to be eligible to receive an exemption to this rule, given that some smaller jurisdictions lack the capacity or demand to warrant a separate location for both liquor and non-medical cannabis. The Province, as members of the JCCR, concluded that exceptions be established for rural non-medical cannabis retail stores, similar to exceptions that currently exist for rural liquor stores.

The Province will launch its registration process for those seeking a non-medical cannabis retail licence this spring. As part of this process, there will not be a cap on the number of retail licences issued, although licences will not be issued without local government support through a council resolution, based in part on a required public consultation process. Local governments will have the ability to impose security and distance requirements for retail outlets. Retail outlets may operate from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. unless additional restrictions are put in place by a local government.

Through this process, local governments will have the ability to restrict, and if they so choose, completely ban cannabis sales (including public stores).

"It makes good sense to model the retail sale of cannabis on the current framework for alcohol," said Councillor Kerry Jang, JCCR Co-Chair. "The proposed model prevents the download of licensing while providing local governments with the tools to locate and manage the number of stores in their communities. Clarifying these issues lays the groundwork for sorting out the appropriate sharing of tax revenues."



The Province has also released a Private Retail Licensing Guide, providing additional information regarding its retail system for non-medical cannabis.

Public Consumption

Adults 19 years and older will be permitted to consume non-medical cannabis in public spaces where tobacco smoking and vaping are allowed. Exceptions to this rule include a ban on consumption in areas frequented by children, such as beaches and parks, as well as inside vehicles. Similar to tobacco use, additional restrictions will be at the discretion of local governments. The JCCR has previously advocated for all these changes, as well as a strong enforcement regime for restricting cannabis smoking/vaping.

The Committee also supports the development of licenced establishments where individuals can consume cannabis. The Province has decided not to immediately licence consumption venues/lounges; discussions will continue with the JCCR.

As part of its restrictions on public consumption, the Province has permitted landlords and strata councils to restrict or prohibit consumption at tenanted and strata properties.

Personal Cultivation

Consistent with proposed federal restrictions, British Columbia will permit adults to grow a maximum of four plants per household. The plants must not be visible from public spaces located outside the property. Personal cultivation will not be permitted in dwellings used for daycares. The JCCR directly advocated in favour of all these policy decisions, and going forward supports the use of provincial resources and strong administrative penalties to act as a deterrent for those who violate restrictions on personal cultivation.

As part of its restrictions on personal cultivation, the Province has permitted landlords and strata councils to restrict or prohibit cultivation of non-medical cannabis at tenanted and strata properties.

Drug-impaired Driving

The Province will increase training for law enforcement in order to manage drug-impaired driving. Consistent with JCCR recommendations, the Province will also introduce new measures to deter drug-impaired driving, including a new 90-day administrative driving prohibition for drug-affected driving and zero-tolerance restrictions for the presence of THC in drivers who are part of the Graduated Licensing Program.

The Union of BC Municipalities recently endorsed resolution 2017-B88 which requests funding for police agencies to increase the number of certified drug recognition experts. It is unclear how much of the recently announced federal funding to support law enforcement will be allocated to British Columbia for police officer training.

Next Steps

The JCCR will continue to work with the Province of British Columbia to analyze and discuss policy decisions, including the distribution of taxation revenue, in advance of legalization.

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Revitalization of the ALR and ALC

Feb. 7, 2018

The Ministry of Agriculture has formed an independent committee to lead a public engagement process and provide regarding opportunities to revitalize the Agricultural Land Reserve and the Agricultural Land Commission. A discussion paper and online survey are now available. The deadline to submit is April 30, 2018.

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Proposed Spill Response Regulations

Feb. 7, 2018

The provincial government has announced its intention to develop a second set of regulations to protect BC's environment from spills. The regulations will focus on five areas: response times; geographic response plans; compensation for loss of public or cultural use of land; maximizing application of regulations to marine spills; and restrictions on the increase in diluted bitumen.

The first set of regulations were approved in October 2017, and focused on preparedness, response and recovery. An advisory panel will also be created to make recommendations to the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy on if and how heavy oils can be safely transported and cleaned up, if spilled.

Consultations on the proposed regulations will begin in the next few weeks and months. The Province will also release an intentions paper by the end of February, and interested parties will be able to submit comments once the paper is released.

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Funding & Resources Update

Feb. 7, 2018

Each month we provide an update on UBCM funding programs and information on other programs or resources that may be of interest to local governments and First Nations.

Local Government Program Services

Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative: Applications are invited by February 23, 2018, under the fuel management Prescription, Operational Treatment and FireSmart Planning & Activities program streams of SWPI.

Asset Management Planning Program: Matching grants of up to \$15,000 are available to support activities that advance a local government's asset management planning or practices, and that facilitate better integration of asset management planning with long term financial planning. Applications will be reviewed following the March 31, 2018 intake deadline.

Structural Flood Mitigation: Funding is available to support eligible applicants to prevent, eliminate or reduce the impacts of hazards through construction of structural flood mitigation projects. The application deadline is April 13, 2018.

Other Funding

Aviation Infrastructure Funding: The British Columbia Air Access Program (BCAAP), provides capital funding to assist BC aviation facilities, including airports and water aerodromes, for improvements to their infrastructure. Deadline: February 9, 2018.

BikeBC: To encourage healthy living and to help address climate change, the Province of B.C. is cost-sharing cycling infrastructure projects with local government through our BikeBC program. Deadline: February 9, 2018.

Water Conservation and Quality Improvement Program: Offered through the Okanagan Basin Water Board, this program provides funds to local governments, irrigation districts, and non-profit organizations in the Okanagan Basin for projects that conserve and protect water. The application deadline is February 16, 2018, at 4pm.

Real Estate Foundation of BC: The REFBC offers two General Grant intakes per year for projects related to sustainable land use, built environment sustainability, freshwater sustainability, local and sustainable food systems, and professional excellence in real estate. Local governments and First Nations may apply by February 28, 2018.

Green Municipal Fund: The deadline for energy, waste, water and transportation capital projects under FCM's Green Municipal Fund is March 1, 2018. The fund finances capital projects that improve air, water, and soil and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

NDIT Strategic Initiatives Fund: Part of the Trust's ongoing response to mitigate the economic impact of the mountain pine beetle, this new program allows municipalities and First Nations to apply for grant funding to support significant projects that focus on long-term economic transformation and sustainability. Applications will be accepted until March 15, 2018.

EcoAction Community Funding Program: This Environment and Climate Change Canada program provides financial support to community groups for projects that have measurable, positive impacts on the environment. Local governments are not eligible to apply, but are encouraged to partner with non-profit organizations to support a project proposal.

Municipal Asset Management Program: Federal funding is available through FCM to help local governments adopt asset management practices. Eligible applicants may apply to both the FCM MAMP and the UBCM Asset Management Planning program for activities that are eligible under both programs. Applicants can leverage both programs to meet the community contribution requirements.

Environmental Assessment Participant Funding Program: The Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency provides funds to ensure that concerns from the public and Aboriginal groups are taken into consideration during an environmental assessment process.

First Nations Adapt Program: This federal program supports First Nation communities to assess and respond to climate change impacts on community infrastructure and emergency management. It prioritizes communities most impacted by sea level rise, flooding, forest fires, and winter road failures. Applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Climate change and infrastructure planning programs: The federal government and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities have launched two programs to address climate change in communities and to strengthen infrastructure planning and decision-making. The Climate Innovation Program and The Municipal Asset Management Program will deliver funding, training, and learning opportunities to build local government capacity.

Resources

Asset Management Intro Webinars & Workshops: The Canadian Network of Asset Managers is in the process of developing resources to support people who are new to infrastructure asset management. Two webinars are being offered at the noon hour on February 15 and 22, 2018. A 1-Day Infrastructure Asset Management Awareness Workshop is being held on March 12, 2018 in Kelowna.

Wildfire Community Preparedness Day: Communities across Canada are encouraged to participate in projects to help reduce the risk of wildfire damage to homes and neighbourhoods on Saturday May 5, 2018. \$500 awards are also being offered.

Interface Fires Workshop - Risks & Mitigation: This workshop, in Kamloops March 13, 2018, is designed to provide water and wastewater professionals with an overview of interface fires, how to assess risk before and after a fire event, common mitigation practices, and tools (such funding resources) that are available to communities.

Post-Natural Disturbance Forest Retention Guidance: BC's Chief Forester has issued a report to guide decision makers on whether to leave or salvage fire damaged from last year's wildfires. She cautions that yielding to the health of ecosystems may be the most beneficial action in the long-term.

Funding your Community Energy and Climate Initiatives: The Community Energy Association has just released its updated Funding Guide for BC Local Governments, featuring more than 40 funding programs that support local government energy planning, energy efficiency measures, renewable energy projects and sustainable transportation initiatives.

Smart Cities Challenge: The Government of Canada, through Infrastructure Canada, wants innovative solutions to economic, environmental, and social problems. The Smart Cities Challenge is a competition to help solve Canada's biggest challenges. It is open to all municipalities, local or regional governments, and Indigenous communities across the country. Communities have until April 24, 2018 to submit their applications.

Smart Cities Webinars: The Intelligent Community Forum, in partnership with the Province of B.C., is offering two webinars on February 15, 2018. *A Primer on How B.C. Communities can Leverage the Smart Revolution* runs 9:00am – noon and *How B.C. Communities Can Get Involved in the Smart Cities Challenge* runs 1:00pm – 2:30pm.

CivicInfo BC: British Columbia's local government information hub offers comprehensive organizational and grant directories, events listings, tools for training, research and career development, bids & tenders, and other resources.

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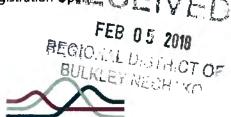

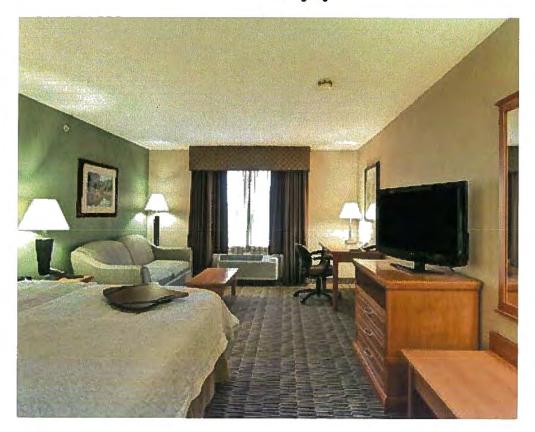

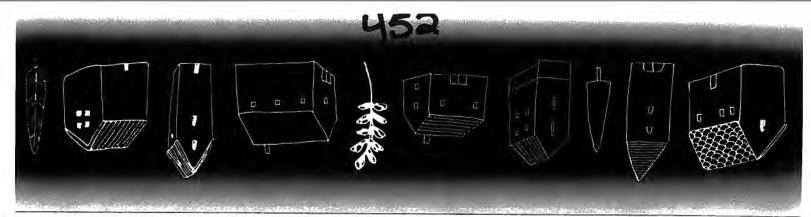
