EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 995

WHEREAS, Mississippi Const., Art. V., Section 125, states as follows:

The Governor shall have the power, and it is hereby made his duty, to suspend alleged defaulting state and county treasurers, and defaulting tax-collectors pending the investigation of their respective accounts, and to make temporary appointments of proper persons to fill the offices while such investigations are being made; and the legislature shall provide for the enforcement of this provision by appropriate legislation; and

WHEREAS, Miss. Code Ann. § 7-1-61 states as follows:

The Governor shall have the power, and it is his duty, to suspend alleged defaulting tax collectors pending the investigation of their respective accounts, whether made under the foregoing sections or otherwise, and to make temporary appointments of proper persons to fill the offices while such investigations are being made; and

WHEREAS, it has been credibly alleged that the Tax Collector of Washington County, Patricia Lee, has defaulted on her lawful duties and responsibilities as Tax Collector of Washington County, on the basis that she is subject to an indictment by a Grand Jury of Washington County, Mississippi, filed on December 15, 2007, on two (2) counts of knowingly and willfully making fraudulent statements and representations with the intent to defraud the state, county, municipality or other subdivision of the state or local government, in violation of Miss. Code Ann. § 97-7-10; and

WHEREAS, the Tax Collector of Washington County, Patricia Lee, has defaulted on her lawful duties and responsibilities as Tax Collector of Washington County, on the basis that Diann Gooden, Brenda Green, Bennie McCain, Mary Jane McClain, Patricia McDuffy, Tammoral Nealon, Deloris Trotter, and Lakeisha Washington, all of whom serve as Deputy Tax Collectors of Washington County, have also been indicted under the Miss. Code Ann. § 97-7-10 of knowingly and willfully making fraudulent statements and representations with the intent to defraud the state, county, municipality or other subdivision of the state or local government, in violation of Miss. Code Ann. § 97-7-10; and

WHEREAS, by letter dated December 19, 2007 and addressed to Governor Haley Barbour, Willie Griffin, acting on behalf of the Board of Supervisors of Washington County, requested the suspension of Patricia Lee, and requested the temporary appointment of an interim tax collector while such investigations are being conducted until such time as the criminal charges are resolved in favor of Patricia Lee; and

WHEREAS, Patricia Lee was re-elected in the 2007 General Election and is set to be sworn in to another term of office on or about January 1, 2008, and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Supervisors has requested the temporary appointment of Mickey Fratesi to serve as the interim tax collector while such investigations are being conducted until such time as the criminal charges are resolved in favor of Patricia Lee; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the citizens of Washington County that the Governor exercise his constitutional and statutory authority with respect to this matter;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 and laws of the State of Mississippi, do hereby suspend Patricia Lee, Tax Collector of Washington County, Mississippi from her duties pending an investigation of her accounts and the resolution in her favor of the criminal charges against her, and do hereby appoint on a temporary basis and until further

WHEREAS, Ms. Gandy's long-time service to the State of Mississippi, marked by dignity, bipartisanship, and a calm effectiveness, has earned her the respect and admiration of the people of the state, for whom she will always serve as an exemplary role model; and

WHEREAS, on the occasion of her passing, Evelyn Gandy's unprecedented service should be honored across the State of Mississippi;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, by the authority vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and laws of the State of Mississippi, do hereby proclaim a period of official mourning in the State of Mississippi and further do hereby order the flag of the State of Mississippi and the flag of the United States of America be flown at half-staff on all buildings and grounds of the State of Mississippi and all areas under its jurisdiction beginning at sunrise on Thursday, Dec. 27, 2007 and ending at sunset on Friday, Dec. 28, 2007.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 991

WHEREAS, beginning on September 20, 2007 and continuing, the State of Mississippi is expected to be adversely affected by tropical weather, which may include sheltering of evacuees from other states, damaging winds, severe thunderstorms, flooding, and possible tornadoes which are expected to occur over wide areas of Mississippi; and state assistance will be necessary to support local government response and recovery efforts; and

WHEREAS, civil authorities will require support from Mississippi National Guard to cope with said emergency:


NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, pursuant to the authority vested in me by Section 119 and Section 217, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, and Sections 7-1-5, 33-7-301, 33-7-305, Mississippi Code of 1972, do hereby direct Major General Harold Cross, Adjutant General of the Mississippi Guard, to order out such officers and enlisted personnel of the Mississippi Guard as requested and for such duration as he deems appropriate to assist state and local civil authorities. Major General Cross will be in direct Command of the troops ordered to active duty and will use such equipment as may be found necessary in his opinion to accomplish the support mission of the National Guard troops.

The members of the Mississippi National Guard ordered to active duty under the provisions of this Order shall be subject to the provisions, privileges, and immunities of the State of Mississippi governing the National Guard.


FURTHER, the pay and expenses of the troops ordered to State Active Duty shall be paid as provided in Sections 33-7-313, 33-7-315 and 33-9-15. Costs not covered by other funds will be reimbursed as authorized by Section 33-15-307 4(g), the Mississippi Emergency Act of 1995, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended.

GULF COAST RENAISSANCE CORPORATION

WHEREAS, Hurricane Katrina devastated the Mississippi Gulf Coast by rendering over 70,000 homes uninhabitable and damaging an additional 160,000 homes; destroying 80 miles of the Mississippi coastline; ruining thousands of small businesses and dozens of schools and public buildings; and destroying highways, ports, railroads and water and sewer system;

WHEREAS, the loss of habitable homes has created a housing and economic crisis in Mississippi, which is exacerbated by the impediments to rebuilding and renewal efforts caused by increased land, insurance, and labor costs;

WHEREAS, it is the State of Mississippi's responsibility to ensure that recovery, rebuilding, and renewal efforts are effectively implemented and the Governor's Office of Recovery and Renewal has been created and tasked with the responsibility of coordinating and overseeing these recovery and renewal efforts;

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi, through the Governor's Office of Recovery and Renewal and the Mississippi Development Authority, has developed recovery and renewal plans, including a comprehensive plan to rebuild safer and stronger housing for those affected by Hurricane Katrina that would:

1. compensate homeowners who relied to their detriment on those who said that they did not need flood insurance;
2. assist uninsured and underinsured lower income homeowners affected by the storm surge;
3. reduce borrowing costs to encourage new homeownership;
4. restore lost public rental housing and rebuild affordable rental units for lower income families;
5. mitigate the increasing cost of insurance for homeowners;
6. pursue innovative housing solutions;
7. help local governments with the burden of inspecting and permitting housing construction; and
8. construct new public water and sewer infrastructure to facilitate new housing developments;

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi has accomplished many short-term successes in accordance with the aforementioned plans, yet much remains to be done to successfully implement the renewal plans in their entirety;

WHEREAS, nonprofit organizations have played and continue to play an important role in the recovery efforts of Mississippi;

WHEREAS, the Gulf Coast Renaissance Corporation is an independent and private Mississippi nonprofit organization that assists with the repair and replacement of lost or damaged housing units, removes barriers to reconstruction, and ensures an adequate supply of decent, safe and affordable housing for low and moderate-income residents in counties of Mississippi that have suffered a major loss of population and jobs due to Hurricane Katrina;

WHEREAS, the programs of Gulf Coast Renaissance Corporation will lessen the burdens placed on the State of Mississippi in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina by helping to secure private funding and other forms of support that assist with rebuilding and renewal efforts;

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



MISSISSIPPI HAZARD MITIGATION COUNCIL

WHEREAS, there are significant opportunities to save lives and reduce future losses resulting from natural and human-caused hazards through hazard mitigation planning; and

WHEREAS, Public Law 106-390, known as the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 (DMA 2000), was signed into law by the President on October 10, 2000; and

WHEREAS, the DMA 2000 provides funding for disaster relief and recovery, and reinforces the importance of mitigation planning and disaster preparation; and

WHEREAS, the DMA 2000 establishes a pre-disaster hazard mitigation program and new requirements for the national post-disaster Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) and is intended to facilitate cooperation between state and local authorities; and

WHEREAS, Section 322 of the DMA 2000 specifically addresses mitigation planning at the state and local level, identifies new requirements that allow HMGP funds to be used for planning activities, and increases the amount of HMGP funds available to states that have developed a comprehensive, enhanced mitigation plan prior to a disaster; and

WHEREAS, state governments have certain responsibilities for implementing Section 322 of the DMA 2000, including: preparing and submitting a standard or enhanced state mitigation plan; reviewing and updating the state mitigation plan every three years; providing technical assistance and training to local governments to assist them in applying for HMGP grants and in developing local mitigation plans; and reviewing and approving local plans if the state is designated as managing state and has an approved enhanced plan.

WHEREAS, the Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan can reduce or eliminate long-term risk to life and property from a hazard event; identify cost-effective and technically feasible mitigation measures that will reduce losses from future disasters in an environmentally sound manner; encourage long-term reduction of hazard vulnerability; build partnerships with sectors not previously involved; protect critical community facilities, reduce exposure to liability, minimize community disruption; facilitate funding priorities, especially following a disaster; and create more sustainable communities.

WHEREAS, establishing a Hazard Mitigation Council is in the best interest of the State of Mississippi;


NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Laws of this State, do hereby:

1. Direct that a Mississippi Hazard Mitigation Council ("Mitigation Council") be established and include representation from the following:
 - a. Governor's Office;
 - b. Mississippi Emergency Management Agency;
 - c. Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality;
 - d. Mississippi Department of Finance and Administration;
 - e. Mississippi Department of Transportation;
 - f. Mississippi Department of Public Safety;
 - g. Mississippi Department of Marine Resources;
 - h. Mississippi Levee Board;
 - i. Mississippi Development Authority;
 - j. Mississippi State Department of Health;
 - k. Mississippi Department of Archives and History;
 - l. Mississippi Municipal League;
 - m. Mississippi Association of Supervisors;
 - n. State Board for Community and Junior Colleges;
 - o. Mississippi State Department of Education; and
 - p. State Institutions of Higher Learning.
2. Declare that the Executive Director of MEMA shall serve as the Chairperson of the Mitigation Council.
3. Declare that MEMA's Executive Director may, as chairperson of the Mitigation Council, designate additional executive and non-executive branch personnel or quasi-governmental and non-governmental personnel to assist the Mitigation Council as needed for their expertise and counsel arises.
4. Declare that the Mitigation Council shall act as an advisory council in all matters related to Mississippi's Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan.
5. Require that the Mitigation Council review issues relating to the creation of Mississippi's Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan, as well as other mitigation efforts, as deemed appropriate by MEMA in cooperation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).
6. Direct that the Mitigation Council shall make recommendations for:
 - a. An overall strategy for the adoption and use of Mississippi's Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan;
 - b. Addressing potential technical, scientific, economic, security, privacy, and other issues related to the adoption of Mississippi's Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan;
 - c. Identifying existing mitigation information resources, including funding sources, to support the development of Mississippi's Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan; and
 - d. Supporting continuing, educational efforts to promote development of a population capable of being self-sustaining before, during and after a disaster event.
7. Direct all Executive branch departments, agencies, boards, and commissions and any other divisions of the Executive branch of state government, to fully cooperate with the Mitigation Council and provide staff support and any other assistance as requested.

8. Direct the Mitigation Council to meet periodically as needed to:
 - a. Review Mississippi's Enhanced Hazard Mitigation Plan;
 - b. Review statewide hazard mitigation goals and objectives; and
 - c. Review priorities for categories of hazard mitigation projects.
9. Authorize the Mitigation Council to seek grants from government or private sources to achieve the goals and objectives set forth.
10. Deem that the Mitigation Council shall continue in existence until all of its objectives are achieved, unless otherwise directed by a future Executive Order.

EXECUTIVE ORDER 979

Mississippi Health Information Infrastructure Task Force

WHEREAS, a presidential executive order "Promoting Quality and Efficient Health Care in Federal Government Administered or Sponsored Health Care Programs" was issued on August 22, 2006, and President George W. Bush directed federal agencies that administer or sponsor federal health insurance programs to:

- increase transparency in pricing;
- increase transparency in quality;
- encourage adoption of health information technology ("IT") standards; and
- provide options that promote quality and efficiency in health care.

WHEREAS, the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina demonstrated the need for timely, secure and accessible health information, particularly for Mississippi's most vulnerable – elderly, disabled, and low income populations – and the potentially life-threatening effects of failure to have the information;

WHEREAS, Mississippi is coordinating a wide-range of efforts directed at recovering from Hurricane Katrina and enhancing its health care delivery system;

WHEREAS, a statewide health information technology infrastructure would improve the quality and reduce the cost of health care in Mississippi by:

1. Ensuring health information is available at the point of care for all individuals;
2. Reducing medical errors and avoiding duplicative medical procedures;
3. Improving coordination of care between hospitals, physicians, and other health professionals;
4. Providing consumers with their health information to encourage greater participation in their health care decisions;
5. Enhancing the confidentiality and privacy of medical information;
6. Improving public health services within the state; and
7. Furthering health care research.

WHEREAS, establishing a *Mississippi Health Information Infrastructure Task Force* will guide legislative and regulatory actions, encourage coordinated efforts in the private healthcare sector, further public and private task forces for the development of interstate health information infrastructure, and maximize federal financial participation to support the goal of early adoption of an interstate health information technology infrastructure;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Laws of this State, do hereby:


1. Create a *Mississippi Health Information Infrastructure Task Force* ("Task Force");

2. Direct the Task Force to review issues surrounding the creation of a statewide and interstate health information technology infrastructure to improve the quality and safety of health care delivery in Mississippi;
3. The Task Force shall be composed of twenty members. Members shall be appointed by the Governor and shall serve at his pleasure;
4. The Task Force shall act by a vote of the majority of its members. A quorum of at least ten members shall be required for an act of the Task Force to have effect. No member may grant a proxy for his or her vote to any other member or member designee, except with the prior approval of the Chairs. The Governor will fill by appointment any vacancy on the Task Force;
5. Provide that the Co-Chairpersons of the Task Force shall be designated by the Governor from among the Task Force's membership;
6. Direct the Task Force to develop recommendations for:
 - An overall strategy for the adoption and use of health information technology and health information exchange to improve health and health care in Mississippi;
 - Identifying the benefits and costs of a comprehensive statewide health information technology infrastructure;
 - Addressing potential technical, scientific, economic, security, privacy and other issues related to the adoption of interoperable healthcare information technology;
 - Identifying existing health information technology resources, including funding sources, to support the development of a statewide health information infrastructure;
 - Identifying technology options to realize a comprehensive health care information infrastructure;
 - Ensuring health information privacy and security in electronic health information exchange.
7. Direct all Executive branch departments, agencies, boards, and commissions and any other divisions of the Executive branch of state government to fully cooperate with the Task Force and provide staff support and any other assistance as requested;
8. Direct the Task Force to submit an Action Plan for Health Information Infrastructure to my office no later than 180 days after constituting the Task Force. This plan should detail recommended actions, staffing requirements, funding options, and key milestone dates to achieve within the next two years as stated in this Executive Order;
9. Provide that the Task Force annually report to the Governor on its plans, activities, accomplishments, and recommendations;
10. The Task Force shall continue in existence until all of its objectives are achieved, but no later than March 6, 2009, unless extended by a future Executive Order;

11. Authorize the Task Force to seek grants from government or private sources to achieve the goals and objectives set forth.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 956

WHEREAS, beginning on August 27, 2005 and continuing, the State of Mississippi was adversely affected by *Hurricanes Katrina and Rita*, which included damaging winds, severe thunderstorms, and flooding over wide areas of Mississippi. The inmates on the attached Exhibits from SMCI, CMCF, Marion-Walthall, Simpson County, and Quitman County, volunteered to participate in the cleanup work detail.

WHEREAS, these inmates satisfactorily performed services for the citizens of Mississippi, and the State's policy is to encourage rehabilitation and a sense of public responsibility on the part of inmates, and to provide urgently needed assistance during emergency situations.


NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, under and by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and applicable statutes of this State, do hereby grant to the above named individuals, as reflected by the work schedule maintained by the Commissioner of the Mississippi Department of Corrections, ten days executive good time for each day worked, not to exceed one hundred eighty (180) days. Persons under sentence for life are prohibited from having time applied toward parole eligibility. All executive good time granted by this Order will count toward parole and/or discharge.

This executive good time is granted at the request of the Department of Corrections and is based upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of the Department of Corrections.

I authorize and direct you, upon receipt of this Order, to take notice and be governed accordingly.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Mississippi to be affixed.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 955

WHEREAS, beginning on August 27, 2005 and continuing, the State of Mississippi was adversely affected by *Hurricanes Katrina and Rita*, which included damaging winds, severe thunderstorms, and flooding over wide areas of Mississippi. The inmates on the attached Exhibits from Hinds, Jefferson, Leflore, Madison, Pike, Quitman, Simpson, Washington, Wilkinson and Yazoo counties, and the City of Flowood, volunteered to participate in the cleanup work detail.

WHEREAS, these inmates satisfactorily performed services for the citizens of Mississippi, and the State's policy is to encourage rehabilitation and a sense of public responsibility on the part of inmates, and to provide urgently needed assistance during emergency situations.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, under and by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and applicable statutes of this State, do hereby grant to the above named individuals, as reflected by the work schedule maintained by the Commissioner of the Mississippi Department of Corrections, ten days executive good time for each day worked, not to exceed one hundred eighty (180) days. Persons under sentence for life are prohibited from having time applied toward parole eligibility. All executive good time granted by this Order will count toward parole and/or discharge.

This executive good time is granted at the request of the Department of Corrections and is based upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of the Department of Corrections.

I authorize and direct you, upon receipt of this Order, to take notice and be governed accordingly.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Mississippi to be affixed.



EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 953

Relating to Unemployment Insurance Services

BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI
January 9, 2006

WHEREAS, on August 29, 2005, and thereafter, the State of Mississippi suffered the worst natural disaster in its history when Hurricane Katrina swept through the state;

WHEREAS, this natural disaster has taken a devastating financial toll on countless businesses throughout the state of Mississippi;

WHEREAS, the state is committed to helping the plight of those businesses adversely impacted by this disaster; as well as revitalizing the workforce of the affected areas;

WHEREAS, this commitment can only be accomplished via the implementation of certain key initiatives;


NOW THEREFORE, BE IT DECLARED, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Mississippi, hereby take the following action:

1. Benefits that have been paid on all unemployment insurance claims directly caused by Hurricane Katrina, a natural disaster declared by the President of the United States, such claims being filed during the disaster filing period, shall not be charged to the individual experience rating record of any employer, but shall be charged to the general experience rate computation.
2. Benefits that have been paid on all unemployment insurance claims directly caused by Hurricane Katrina, a natural disaster declared by the President of the United States, such claims being filed during the disaster filing period, shall not be charged to any reimbursing state agency, political subdivision of the State of Mississippi, municipality, or 501(c)(3) (of the Internal Revenue Code) exempt non-profit employer, if such payments were made based on information that was determined to be inadequate or incorrect, but shall be paid out of the reserve fund for unemployment benefits of the State of Mississippi. The recovery of all such benefits paid shall be deposited into the reserve fund for unemployment benefits of the State of Mississippi. In the event that the recovery of these benefits would cause a hardship on any individual to whom the benefits have been paid no action shall be taken to collect such overpayments.
3. The Mississippi Department of Employment Security shall be empowered with the administrative flexibility to carry out this Executive Order, and shall be granted by this Executive Order the discretion and authority to suspend, amend, or modify any Mississippi Employment Security laws, rules, and/or regulations, which might impede, delay, or otherwise hinder the administration of the unemployment compensation tax and funding mechanisms, including but not limited to assignment of unemployment charges, determination of unemployment insurance tax rates, collection of wage and contribution data, determination of the adequacy of information to establish the basis for tax computation, assessment of interest and penalty, and necessary adjustments of the assessment, penalty, and interest amounts, so long as the changes made by MDES are in conformity and compliance with all applicable Federal laws.

This Executive Order shall be in effect as of August 28, 2005, and shall continue until modified, amended, rescinded, or superseded by this office. Any action taken under this Executive Order prior to the date said order is rescinded, shall remain in full force and effect in perpetuity.



Code Ann. § 7-1-61, and after I determined that it was in the best interest of the citizens of Humphreys County that I exercise my constitutional and statutory authority with respect to this matter, I issued Executive Order No. 925 on September 30, 2004, which suspended Mattie Straughter pending the outcome of the investigation of the accounts of the Humphreys County Tax Assessor/Collector's office and appointed Lawrence Tardy to serve as the interim county tax assessor/collector; and



The authority stated herein shall be valid for a period of one hundred eighty (180) days following the issuance of this Executive Order.

FURTHER, architects and engineers providing the services authorized herein are declared to be agents and representatives of the State of Mississippi for the limited purposes and the limited period stated herein, for purposes of the provisions of Section 33-15-21, Mississippi Code of 1972.

FURTHER, to the degree that the provisions of any statutes, orders, rules or regulations of the State of Mississippi or its agencies might be construed as precluding such services because they constitute the unauthorized practice of architecture or engineering within Mississippi, such provisions are hereby suspended for the limited purposes and the limited period stated herein, in accordance with Section 33-15-11(c), Mississippi Code of 1972.

FURTHER, a copy of this Executive Order shall be filed with the Office of the Secretary of State, in accordance with the provisions of Section 33-15-31, Mississippi Code of 1972.



NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, pursuant to the authority vested in me under the Constitution of the State of Mississippi and Section 33-15-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended, and in the public interest and for the general welfare, do hereby proclaim that from and after August 29, 2005, through December 31, 2007, any political subdivision located in any of the six (6) most southern counties of the state covered by the Presidential Declaration of Major Disaster for the State of Mississippi (FEMA-1604-DR) dated August 29, 2005, and any political subdivision located in Forrest County and/or Jones County, which has issued (and there remain outstanding) any tax increment, special assessment or other special or limited obligation bonds prior to August 29, 2005, if the political subdivision first receives the approval of the State Treasurer based upon written justification therefor, may make principal and interest payments as same accrue and mature on any outstanding tax increment, special assessment or other special or limited obligation bonds issued by such political subdivisions prior to August 29, 2005, from any available funds of the political subdivision, without regard to any limitations and restrictions as to the security and source of payment otherwise imposed by statute or law or that may be provided in the issuing documents of such tax increment, special assessment or other special or limited obligation bonds.

Relating to Unemployment Insurance Benefit Claims

BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI
September 8, 2005

WHEREAS, on August 29, 2005, and thereafter, the State of Mississippi suffered the worst natural disaster in its history when Hurricane Katrina swept through the state;

WHEREAS, up to 500,000 Mississippians are without jobs, income and/or shelter as a result of this natural disaster;

WHEREAS, there will be a significant lack of documentation usually required to file Unemployment Insurance claims;

WHEREAS, many businesses are currently not in a position to verify unemployment insurance wage information;


WHEREAS, the state is committed to the timely processing of all Unemployment Insurance claims in this time of emergency;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT DECLARED, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Mississippi, hereby take the following action:

1. The wage verification information usually required to process unemployment insurance and disaster unemployment assistance claims will be suspended and individuals who qualify for unemployment insurance and disaster unemployment assistance benefits as a result of the events occurring on or after August 29, 2005 will be granted the maximum weekly benefit amount of Two Hundred and Ten Dollars (\$210.00), for the maximum possible period of twenty-six (26) weeks. This directive will apply to all claims effective during the disaster assistance period.
2. The one-week waiting period requirement for receiving unemployment insurance benefits shall be waived for all claims effective during the disaster assistance period. This directive will apply to all counties within the State of Mississippi.
3. Any waivers granted by the United States Congress related to the disaster resulting from Hurricane Katrina may be adopted and implemented by the State of Mississippi.
4. The Mississippi Department of Employment Security shall be empowered with the administrative flexibility to carry out this Executive Order, and shall be granted by this Executive Order the discretion and authority to suspend, amend, or modify any Mississippi Employment Security laws, rules, and/or regulations, which might impede or otherwise hinder the distribution of unemployment compensation benefits to the citizens of the State of Mississippi.







DESIGNATION OF THE NATIONAL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (NIMS) AS THE BASIS FOR ALL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT IN THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

WHEREAS, the President of the United States, in Homeland Security Directive (HSPD)-5, directed the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System ("NIMS"), which would provide a consistent nationwide approach for Federal, State, local, and tribal governments to work together more effectively and efficiently to prevent, prepare for, respond to, and recover from domestic incidents, regardless of cause, size, or complexity;

WHEREAS, the collective input and guidance from all Federal, State, local, and tribal homeland security partners has been, and will continue to be, vital to the development, effective implementation and utilization of a comprehensive NIMS;

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that all Federal, State, local, and tribal emergency agencies and personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management;

WHEREAS, to facilitate the most efficient and effective incident management it is critical that Federal, State, local, and tribal organizations utilize standardized terminology, standardized organizational structures, interoperable communications, consolidated action plans, unified command structures, uniform personnel qualification standards, uniform standards for planning, training, and exercising, comprehensive resource management, and designated incident facilities during emergencies or disasters;

WHEREAS, the NIMS standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities and resources will improve the State of Mississippi's ability to utilize federal funding to enhance local and state agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management processes.

WHEREAS, the Incident Command System components of NIMS are already an integral part of various incident management activities throughout the State of Mississippi, including current emergency management training programs; and


WHEREAS, the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks (9-11 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System;

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 931

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Legislature has established the Mississippi Institute for Forest Inventory and charged this agency with the responsibility to collect forest inventory information from all forested lands in Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, this information will be used to develop an assessment of Mississippi's available forest resources, which will be the cornerstone for the development of a forest-based economic development policy; and

WHEREAS, "assessment contractors" (as defined below) of the Mississippi Institute for Forest Inventory must have the right of entry onto property, public or private, to fulfill the legislative mandates of the Mississippi Institute for Forest Inventory;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 and laws of the State of Mississippi, do hereby grant assessment contractors the authority to enter in or upon public or private lands or waters, except buildings, while in the lawful performance of assessment duties without criminal liability for trespass. However, an assessment contractor shall make a good-faith attempt to announce and identify himself and his intentions before entering upon private property and must present documentation sufficient to identify him as an assessment contractor to anyone requesting such identification. The provisions of this order do not relieve an assessment contractor from any civil liability that otherwise is actionable at law or in equity, and do not relieve an assessment contractor from criminal liability for trespass if the entry in or upon the property extends beyond the property or area that is necessary to actually perform the assessment duties. Assessment contractors shall be personally liable for any damage caused to private property when exercising entry under this section. No cause of action shall lie against a landowner for damages to an assessment contractor while on such lands unless the damage is caused by the intentional tortious conduct of the landowner or his agent. For the purposes of this order, the term "assessment contractor" means a registered professional forester as defined in Mississippi Code Ann. §73-36-3, and any person who is employed by or under the direction supervision of a professional forester registered under §§73-36-3 and 73-36-21.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 925

WHEREAS, Mississippi Const., Art. V., Section 125, states as follows:

The Governor shall have the power, and it is hereby made his duty, to suspend alleged defaulting state and county treasurers, and defaulting tax-collectors pending the investigation of their respective accounts, and to make temporary appointments of proper persons to fill the offices while such investigations are being made; and the legislature shall provide for the enforcement of this provision by appropriate legislation; and

WHEREAS, Miss. Code Ann. § 7-1-61 states as follows:

The Governor shall have the power, and it is his duty, to suspend alleged defaulting tax collectors pending the investigation of their respective accounts, whether made under the foregoing sections or otherwise, and to make temporary appointments of proper persons to fill the offices while such investigations are being made; and

WHEREAS, Miss. Code Ann. § 27-29-25 states as follows:

Every tax collector shall make report to the auditor of public accounts and clerk of the board of supervisors, respectively, as hereinbefore provided; and if any tax collector shall not report to the auditor or clerk, and pay over to the state and county treasurers, within twenty days after the last day of each month during the time of collecting taxes, he shall not only be punishable under the criminal laws of this state, but the auditor and clerk of the board of supervisors, after notice to a tax collector in default and continued failure by him to report and pay over, as above provided, shall report the failure to the governor, who may suspend the tax collector and prohibit him from the performance of his functions, and may appoint some suitable person, being a qualified elector of the county, to collect the taxes, who shall give bond, with sureties, as required of tax collectors, to be approved in the same way. Such substituted tax collector shall proceed to collect the taxes remaining uncollected and to make such reports and payments of state and county taxes as the tax collector is required to make; and, for any failure of duty in this respect, he shall be subject to like penalties and proceedings as provided for in case of default by a tax collector; and

WHEREAS, it has been credibly alleged that the Tax Assessor/Collector of Humphreys County, Mrs. Mattie Straughter, has defaulted on her lawful duties and responsibilities as Tax Collector and Assessor of Humphreys County, on the basis that she is subject to an indictment by a Grand Jury of Humphreys County, Mississippi, filed on August 2, 2004, on four counts of failure to settle accounts as required by Miss. Code Ann. § 27-29-11 and in violation of Miss. Code Ann. § 97-11-47, which indictment is hereby attached; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. § 27-29-25 establishing the duty of a board of supervisors to report certain alleged failures of a county tax collector to the governor, the Board of Supervisors of Humphreys County voted in a recessed meeting on September 24, 2004 to request Governor Haley Barbour to suspend the Humphreys County Tax Assessor/Collector, Mrs. Mattie Straughter, and to appoint a temporary substitute; and


WHEREAS, by letter dated September 24, 2004 and addressed to Governor Haley Barbour, R. D. "Dickie" Stevens, acting on behalf of the Board of Supervisors of Humphreys County, detailed the nature and impact of the alleged errors and omissions committed by Mrs. Mattie Straughter, requested her suspension, and requested the temporary appointment of a person to fill the office of tax assessor/collector while such investigations are being conducted until such time as the criminal charges are resolved in favor of Mrs. Straughter, which letter is hereby attached; and





Major General Cross will be in direct Command of the troops ordered to active duty and will use such equipment as may be found necessary in his opinion to accomplish the support mission of the National Guard troops.

The members of the Mississippi National Guard ordered to active duty under the provisions of this Order shall be subject to the provisions, privileges, and immunities of the Statute of the State of Mississippi governing the National Guard.

FURTHER, the pay and expenses of the troops ordered to State Active Duty shall be paid as provided in Sections 33-7-313, 33-7-313 and 33-9-15. All costs will be reimbursed as authorized by Section 33-15-307 4(g), the Mississippi Emergency Act of 1995, Mississippi Code of 1972. The State of Florida will reimburse the State of Mississippi pursuant to the terms of the Emergency Management Assistance Compact.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 920

State Interoperability Executive Committee Restructuring

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi through Executive Order No. 874, dated February 5, 2003, established the State Interoperability Executive Committee (the "SIEC"); and

WHEREAS, the SIEC is charged with fostering continued coordination across state agencies and providing recommendations for short and long-term improvement of public safety wireless communications interoperability and shared systems development throughout federal, state, and local entities; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to continue the work of the SIEC and to restructure the make up of said SIEC to provide for more input from various agencies in the state and to redefine the functions of said SIEC so as to allow it to function in an even more efficient and effective manner.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Mississippi, hereby take the following action:

Section 1. The Commissioner of Public Safety shall now serve as Chair of the SIEC, rather than have the voting members of the SIEC elect a Chair.

Section 2. The following individuals shall be added to the current list of appointed voting members of the SIEC:

1. Director of the Mississippi Office of Homeland Security
2. Executive Director, Mississippi Association of Supervisors (or his designee)
3. Executive Director, Mississippi Municipal League (or his designee)
4. Deputy Director, Transportation Security Administration, Jackson International Airport

Section 3. The following individuals shall be deleted from the current list of appointed advisory members of the SIEC:

1. Chairman, Mississippi Association of Supervisors (or his designee)
2. Chairman, Mississippi Municipal League (or his designee)

Section 4. The following individual shall be added to the current list of appointed advisory members of the SIEC:

1. A representative of SafeCity Initiative

Section 5. The portion of Executive Order No. 874 relating to the functions of the SIEC shall be replaced with the following, revised provision:

III. FUNCTIONS

The Chair of the SIEC may designate the establishment of sub-committees to counsel the Committee on specific issues, including, but not limited to, technical interoperability solutions, funding strategies, shared system development strategies, local government issues, interoperability assessment requirements and findings.

The SIEC shall make a concerted effort to establish a statewide plan for assessing and instituting voice and data wireless communications interoperability and system development throughout the state. The plan should address both near and long-term wireless communications interoperability and system development solutions, realizing that both are necessary. In forming its recommendations, the SIEC should, at a minimum:


1. Become thoroughly grounded in the fundamentals of interoperability and the technical solutions that currently exist so that they can serve as a central resource for unbiased information within the state
2. Involve as many agencies as possible that have recognized wireless communications interoperability and system development as a necessary capability within the public safety community
3. Examine needs and capabilities on a regional basis throughout the state (e.g., county by county)
4. Focus on leveraging or expanding the reach of existing resources and solutions wherever possible to reduce cost, time to implementation, and the total number of solutions needed
5. Identify appropriate locations to "pilot" solutions currently not in use somewhere else in the state as a way of proving their effectiveness
6. Consider the strategic procurement and placement of existing technical solutions (e.g., multiband switches or cross-system interconnects) as near-term interoperability fixes
7. Outline a method for prioritizing system connections and development both by region and statewide in order to start building a basic level of interoperability and a wireless communications system throughout the state (e.g., implement the connections that connect the most users first)
8. Provide initial estimates for new asset requirements to the Governor and Legislature based on the regional and statewide interoperability and wireless communications system needs and proposed implementation schedules
9. Continue with long-term planning for statewide wireless communications system and interoperability needs
10. Ensure that any near-term interoperability solutions examined could be incorporated into longer-term statewide wireless communications system development plans for infrastructure development
11. Investigate the need for additional state staff to manage and fully implement any shared wireless communications system(s) and/or interoperability solutions, to include mutual aid frequency coordination and management.

The initial report of the SIEC and corresponding recommendations shall be made to the Governor and the House of Representatives and the Senate on or before January 31, 2005, and on that date every year thereafter until the SIEC is dissolved.

Section 6. All other provisions of Executive Order No. 874, dated February 5, 2003, which are not inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Order are hereby confirmed and ratified.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 919

WHEREAS, the health, economic and educational well-being and development of the people of Mississippi are of prime consideration to the State of Mississippi and to the Governor; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi requires a comprehensive and coordinated approach in the administration of human services to the citizens of this state in order to strengthen communication and common purpose among all agencies and groups concerned with human services administration; in order to make full and effective use of existing resources and agency potentials; and, in order to avoid duplication, fragmentation, and waste; and

WHEREAS, the Governor is required by law to transact all the business of this state with the United States government and it is necessary to reconstitute the Department of Human Services in order to accomplish same:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, pursuant to the authority vested in me, do hereby reconstitute within the Executive Branch of Mississippi State Government a Department of Human Services. The chief administrative officer of the Department shall be the Executive Director, Don Taylor, who is presently serving in that capacity. The Executive Director shall establish the organizational structure of the Mississippi Department of Human Services which shall include the creation of any units necessary to implement the duties assigned to the Department and consistent with specific requirements of law. Further, the Executive Director shall appoint heads of offices, and any necessary supervisors, assistants and employees, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Executive Director. The salary and compensation of such employees shall be subject to the rules and regulations adopted and promulgated by the State Personnel Board as created under Section 25-9-101 et seq. The Executive Director shall have the authority to organize offices as deemed appropriate to carry out the responsibilities of the Department.

The Department of Human Services shall have the authority and responsibility to:

- (1) Perform those duties prescribed by Sections 43-1-1 through 43-1-63 of the Mississippi Code of 1972 as Amended;
- (2) Formulate the policy of the department regarding human services within the jurisdiction of the department;
- (3) Adopt, modify, repeal and promulgate, after due notice and hearing, and where not otherwise prohibited by federal or state law, to make exceptions to and grant exemptions and variances from, and to enforce rules and regulations implementing and effectuating the powers and duties of the department under any and all statutes within the department's jurisdiction, all of which shall be binding upon the county departments of human services;
- (4) Apply for, receive and expend any federal or state funds or contributions, gifts, devises, bequests or funds from any other source, including but not limited to the receipt and expenditure of all funds appropriated by House Bill 1747;
- (5) Enter into and execute contracts, grants and cooperative agreements with any federal or state agency or subdivision thereof, or any public or private institution located inside or outside the State of Mississippi, or any person, corporation or association in connection with carrying out the programs of the department;

(6) Discharge such other duties, responsibilities and powers as are necessary to implement the programs of the department;


(7) Promulgate rules, laws, and regulations as necessary for the implementation of this Executive Order.

It shall be the duty of every department, board, commission, agency, office, institution, and political subdivision of Mississippi State Government and the officers thereof to render all possible assistance and cooperation to the Department of Human Services in the Executive Branch of Mississippi State Government and in performing all other duties and responsibilities described therein.

This Executive Order shall be effective as of July 1, 2004.



WHEREAS, since its establishment, the Council has been under the authorization, control and management of the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency ("MEMA"), as an expansion of the Terrorism Policy Group; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi recognizes the need to ensure that the focus of the Council is first and foremost on the prevention of terrorist attacks against our homeland; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Public Safety is best equipped to control and manage the Council in a way that will help prevent terrorist attacks, and should coordinate with MEMA which will remain responsible for the important response functions should an attack occur.



EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 915

WHEREAS, State of Mississippi military installations, infrastructure, and personnel make important contributions to our national security and our State's economy; and

WHEREAS, Mississippi communities have organized teams that have engaged in active efforts to support these military installations; and

WHEREAS, many of these Mississippi communities have achieved success not only in defending their installations but also in enhancing these installations to the benefit of the State of Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, the experience, contacts, and knowledge developed by these community teams can be invaluable to the State of Mississippi and other communities in regard to future efforts to defend and enhance the State's military installations; and

WHEREAS, these communities have worked closely with the State of Mississippi since 1990; and

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has authorized another Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) round that will result in major reductions in military infrastructure starting in 2005; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Defense continues to engage in other initiatives and efforts that may make substantial changes in infrastructure, personnel, and funding for Active Duty, Reserve, and National Guard forces located within the State of Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi would benefit from the involvement of these communities both in seeking to avoid reductions in infrastructure, personnel, and funding and to attract new missions, new facilities, and increased defense-related employment; and

WHEREAS, communities with military installations are desirous of working together with the State of Mississippi for the benefit of the entire State;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, Governor of the State of Mississippi, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Mississippi, do hereby establish the "Mississippi Military Communities Council" to advise executive and legislative officials of the State of Mississippi regarding the ongoing efforts by the U.S. Department of Defense to close, realign, restructure, streamline, or otherwise take actions that would impact military installations located within the State. The Council shall also advise regarding opportunities to enhance, expand, add or otherwise improve missions, programs, facilities, operations on or affecting the military installations in the State. For each active duty military installation and National Guard Training center in the State, community teams organized to monitor federal base restructuring activities and/or to enhance nearby military installations may be represented on the Council. The Council should meet at least quarterly, and conduct itself pursuant to a set of

operating principles approved by the Council. The Governor shall appoint the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Council.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 914

WHEREAS, the maintenance of a fair and impartial judiciary is essential to the protection of the rights and freedoms of the citizens of the State of Mississippi, and

WHEREAS, under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Mississippi, the Governor is authorized to fill, by appointment, certain vacancies in judicial office, and

WHEREAS, it is my firm belief that only the most qualified, conscientious, dedicated and reputable persons available should be appointed to serve the public as judicial officers, and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haley Barbour, as Governor of the State of Mississippi, under and by virtue of the Constitution and laws of this state, do hereby promulgate the following executive order, effective immediately.

There is hereby created and established an advisory council to be known as the Judicial Appointments Advisory Committee. It shall be the responsibility of the Judicial Appointments Advisory Committee to review all applications for judicial appointments and shall recommend to the Governor, in accordance with this executive order, and such rules of procedure developed by the committee, persons qualified and eligible to fill vacancies created by death, resignation, or removal from office in the Supreme Court, Chancery and Circuit Courts, and the County Courts of the State of Mississippi.

The Judicial Appointments Advisory Committee shall consist of thirty-one (31) members to be appointed as follows:

A. The Governor shall appoint ten (10) resident attorneys from each of the Supreme Court Districts of the State of Mississippi. The Governor shall also appoint a Chairman of said Committee who may reside in any Supreme Court District. Each ten member group will function as a Subcommittee independently of the other District subcommittees. The Chairman of the Committee will serve as Chairman of each Subcommittee.

B. Appointments made by the Governor shall be for a term of two (2) years. Any member shall be eligible for reappointment. No person serving on the Judicial Appointments Advisory Committee shall be eligible for an appointment to judicial office while serving on the Committee. The Governor shall designate one person from each Supreme Court District Subcommittee to serve as ex-officio Secretary of the Subcommittee. The Secretary shall maintain all minutes and records of the Subcommittee.

Not later than twenty (20) days after a request by the Governor, the appropriate Subcommittee shall meet, evaluate and classify, by majority vote of its membership, proposed nominees as "fully qualified" or "not fully qualified."

In any emergency situation where a vacancy must be filled immediately, the Governor may make a temporary appointment without a meeting of the Advisory Committee. At the expiration of the temporary appointment, the Advisory Committee shall be called by the Governor to meet, evaluate and select proposed nominees for the filling of the vacancy as provided herein.

The Advisory Committee shall certify and recommend to the Governor for appointment only those nominees deemed "fully qualified," in alphabetical order, and within not more than twenty-one (21) days after the request by the Governor. If any of these persons shall be rejected by the Governor or shall notify the Governor of their unwillingness or

inability to accept appointment, the Governor may request the Advisory Committee to submit additional recommendations.

With the approval of the Governor, the Committee shall adopt such operating rules, forms and notices as it may deem necessary to properly implement this order. All applications and information received from or concerning recommendations and all proceedings of the Advisory Committee shall be held strictly confidential.

Nothing contained herein is intended to in any way impair or delegate the constitutional and statutory duties or prerogatives of the Governor in the filling of vacancies of judicial office. The right to reject any or all of the nominees so selected and recommended is reserved unto the Governor.

Any executive orders relating to the subject matter hereof and contrary hereto are hereby superseded by this order. (See Ex. Order 334)
