NEW YORK --- The U.S. foreign relations policy needs more money appropriated for art, according to conductor Leonard Bernstein, who just led the New York Philharmonic thru a 12-country tour of Latin America. "Our concerts resulted in immeasurable good will and a real love relationship with hundreds of thousands of people who understood the universal language of music," says Bernstein,

Official Washington is more aware of the great good done by American artists abroad, agree Bernstein and co-batoner Dimitri Mitropoulos in praising the work of the President's Fund which partially sponsored the tour. But the slow upswing in cultural exchange (and especially export) must be quickened. "One has to revise all previous opinions." they say of their Latin audiences. "We had known there was a primitive group who knew a bit of flute music and a small sophisticated and cultivated group, but there are thousands of middle-class people who adore music," Under the auspices of ANTA and the State Department, over 100 attractions have been sent overseas since the 1954 inception of the Social International Program for Cultural Presentations. Hollywood is particularly record artist-minded this year, since Eivis Presley and Pat Boone are both high on the list of top film box-office draws, and teen-age audiences are practically supporting the picture business.

Numerous recording artists have warbled their latest record hits in various rock and roll movie musicals during the past year, of course. However, ultimate goal of most disk names today is to establish a lasting career, by qualifying as an actor as well as a singer.

The smart ones are preparing for it, via the aforementioned summer. stock stints, and-or private acting lessons. Jimmy Rodgers, for example, took a variety of special lessons -acting, dancing, etc.-as soon as his first record hit.

As a result, he made a much better impression with his guest shots on TV-as compared to the unprofessional, camera - shy awkwardness displayed by too many of the new young record stars today. Following Rodgers' lead. young Bobby Darin, who currently has "Splish Splash" on the charts, has already enrolled in Burton Lane's School of Dramatic Arts.

NEW YORK --- A new department, Audio Products, appears in The Billboard this week, beginning on page 10. This Audio Products department will cover news of all sound reproducing equipment -phonographs, radios, tape recorders, high fidelity components and allied accessories.

Formerly, news of these products was covered in the Record-Equipment Merchandising Section, which is discontinued, The new department is geared to give greatly expanded coverage of the equipment field.

The Billboard considers the expanded coverage necessary in the light of two things: the more complex nature of the business due to the introduction of stereo disks and the varied equipment to play them, and the knowledge as revealed by recent surveys, that an overwhelming majority of disk outlets carry phonos and other sound reproduction equipment.

Merc Meets **Predict Rosy Sales Picture**

CHICAGO--- A rosy picture of continued industry growth was painted for Mercury's distribs and salesmen at its three-city national meetings Friday (27). New stereo business will not replace old monaural sales but will largely be added to current volumes, according to the company theme.

Stereo equipment manufacturers have predicted to Merc execs that by the end of December, 1958, about one million stereo sets will be in consumer hands, Irwin Steinberg, vice-president, told The Billboard on the eve of the company meetings. The company is judging its stereo potential for early 1959 on the basis of this figure. If one is to guess that much of this equipment will be purchased by consumers during the Christmas season, the logical conclusion is that monaural package goods will continue to be the overwhelming factor in fall and Christmas selling. Steinberg emphasized that he

does not foresee any withholding of consumer demand for monaural goods as the stereo picture unfolds.



Sullivan's Tenth a Talent Symphony

Close to 50 separate filmed segs of great moments in the 10year cavalcade of the "Ed Sullivan Show," comprised the anniversary performance of TV's oldest variety show Sunday (22). In all, it was an impressive kaleidoscope of not only individual careers, but of the development of TV itself. Entertainment value was handicapped only by the fact that if anything, too much was squeezed into a single hour's take.

Music high points were numerous. There was the 1949 debut of a pixieish Teresa Brewer, singing "Old Man Mose": the singing by veteran cleffer Harry Armstrong of his "Sweet Adeline": the late W. C. Handy taking a hot chorus of "St. Louis Blues": Rosemary Clooney's debut with the show in 1949, and an appearance by Perry Como (in his pre-NBC days) as a substitute for Sullivan on the emsee end.

But there was more. Younger and more emotional Johnnie Ray screamed his way thru "Cry"; a worried Julius La Rosa appeared in his hour of trial (after being fired by Godfrey); Tony Martin did his TV debut singing "Manhattan" with Ed Wynn at the piano, and there were also brief appearances by Louis Armstrong, Bing Crosby, Julie Andrews, Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein, Lerner and Loewe, Cole Porter, Maurice Chevalier and Sophie Tucker. Another high point was the historic appearance of Elvis Presley, which featured head shots only of the performer in action.

The new "Chevy Show" is above-average summer fare with solid performers-Janet Blair, Edie Adams and John Raitt-smooth production and a proper (for a top-budgeted telecast) air of affluent affability.

The galla musical comedy atmosphere of Miss Shore's show was still strongly in evidence last Sunday (22). Miss Blair scored with the "Honey-Bun" number from "South Pacific," Edie Adams with "Namely You" from "Li'l Abner," and Raitt with "If I Loved You" from "Carousel." Also on hand as guests were opera star Dorothy Kirsten and the comedy team of Dan Rowan and Dick Martin. Miss Kirsten impressed with a rich-voiced version of "I'll See You Again," and was surprisingly effective in a sprightly song and dance routine with Raitt to "Carolina in the Morning." -

Bernstein Formula Solid in Lewisohn Stadium Opener

New York's 41st season of al fresco concerts opened at Lewisohn Stadium with Leronard Bernstein leading the 96-man Stadium Symphony Orchestra (nee Philharmonic), fresh from its Latin-American tour.

Each of the three numbers which preceded the intermission was written in the 1930's. The first two, Carlos Chavez' "Sinfonia India" and Roy Harris' Third Symphony, were staples during the Latin-American tour. They were played with the obvious skill and understanding that derive from such familiarity. In fact, they would, make an interesting tandem for a new album recording-particularly in stereo. The Chavez number (available only on one recording, conducted by the composer) features three themes derived from Mexican Indian melodies. The emphasis on percussion and wind, with plenty of flute, makes it a natural for those who like their hi highest. The Harris opus, (which is available on two albums), is rich in brass sonorities and percussion and is sure-fire stereo, particularly in its final section which is in the form of a three-part fugue. Bernstein took the solo spotlight in the Ravel Piano Concerto in G Minor, with his glowing phrasing in the intense second movement easily the highlight. The Cerswinesque, jazzlike themes in the first and third movements make it strange that no American soloist's recording is available of this work. The post-intermission opus was the Tschaikowsky Fourth Symphony. The neatly rendered, it obviously did not have as much of the conductor's affection as the opening works.

Jim Reeves, summer-sub-emsee for Red Foley on ABC-TV's "Country Music Jubilee," exhibited a pleasant, unassuming mike personality last Saturday (21). 





it is understood, would be negotiable rather than fixed, and would depend upon whether the label takes the entire servicing offered by Allied, or only part of it.

With distribs paying 46 cents per record, and with basic costs estimated at a maximum of 26 cents, there remains 20 cents. Allied's fee for distribution would come out of this. Allied, it is pointed out, shoulders risk of inventory, one-stop and rack jobber deals, etc. With regard to deals in-volving free records, Allied will do this on the basis of distributor consultation rather than hype. "Some fellows go broke shelling out thousands of disks to rack jobbers, and these come back.... We won't eat the records."

Distribution, incidentally, may be done either under the indie label's own name, or under the imprimatur of the Allied label. An example of the latter would be Allied's taking over of Harry Bluestone's "Vienna Rose Polka."

How to Sell a Specific Market For Top Tape Recorder Profits

By BOB LATIMER

The market for audio equipment and tape recorders is sometimes where you least expect to find it.

One wide-awake dealer, W. E. Fortmyer, of Wayne's, in Fort Wayne, Ind., has lately been concentrating sales efforts for tape recorders on what would seem to be a minor market: the city's churches and religious groups

Minor? Not at all, according to the Fort-Wayne retailer. Here's what he told The Billboard:

"We have been carrying full lines of tape recorders ever since they came on the market, including Revere, Bell & Howell, RCA, Crestwood, VM and Masco. Despite the average businessman's fear that churches are poor risks in selling expensive equipment, we have found that there is no better market to keep our tape recording department showing impressive profits."

Many Uses for Tape

A tape recorder, it seems, is one of the handiest things a church can have, altho the uses of it requires demonstration in order to make the sales point.

Some of the in-church uses already established by Fortmyer:

· Recording the church choir in practice sessions, with playback used to correct musical faults.

· Practice sermons by the pastor or priest or rabbi, which he may need to study the effectiveness of his own delivery or material.

· Recording church, plays, as well as activities of Bible school groups, young people's organizations and the like. · Recording special sermons for later reference, or for playback at the bedside of ill parishioners who are grateful for religious contact.

a portable model, with two hours' recording capacity and simple controls. It will often be operated by laymen who have no experience with a tape recorder other than on Sunday. And, it must be carried from place to place, sometime by women."

With this general idea in mind, Fortmyer has been successful, by his estimate, in landing sales with an eye-opening 50 per cent of the churches in the Fort Wayne area.

Sales Tips on Tape

Fortmyer has also learned, from experience, that certain sales techniques are valuable in discussing a tape recorder sale with officials of local churches.

"I have checked the type of services which ~ each church in our community holds," he reports, "and one by one I have phoned them, asking for an appointment and suggesting that we carry out a demonstration in the church."

"Incidentally," he adds, "it is always wise to invite a few of the laymen, deacons, vestrymen and other church members who have a financial say in the church's management to attend where possible. This means evening demonstrations, in many instances, but we have found these quite worthwhile.

"At the appointed time, I set up the tape recorder, ask each member of the audience to listen to his own voice, then discuss some of the practical applications of the machine, and make a recording of the church organ if at all possible.

"We have found it much better to record the everyday sounds likely to be heard in church, rather than to use the demonstration tapes which are provided by manufacturers. The sound of a ping-pong game, a train rushing by, a 300-piece orchestra playing Brahms is not nearly as important to the prospect as to hear his own voice."

TAPE ANACHRONISM DEPT.

Sharp-eyed audiophiles will notice a first-class goof in 20th Century-Fox's expensively produced "Ten North Frederick." There's a scene where Gary Cooper, who aspires to be a Lieutenant-Governor, makes a deal with crooked politician Tom Powers. When Gary has loped off, Powers turns to his secretary. "Did You Get all that?" he asks. "Yes, boss," she says, pulling out a drawer with a concealed tape recorder and removing the reel. Nobody at 20th-Fox, apparently, remembered that the scene was supposed to be taking place in 1940 - about 15 years before the recorder pictured (an Ekotape) was even invented.

HI-FI AND HIGH JINKS

Speaking of tape recorders, there's an item in this week's Time magazine, in the "Miscellany" column, which reads as follows:

"In Ardmore, Okla., three teen-age boys, calling a girl in New York, were arrested for trying to deceive a long-distance telephone operator by using tape-recorded sounds of coins being deposited into a pay phone."

SCOTT IRON CURTAIN LIFTS

The H. H. Scott audio component firm lifted the curtain of secrecy that surrounds new models just a bit last week, with a few enthusiastic war whoops about upcoming stereo units. Said Harold S. Goodstein: "New H. H. Scott Model 130 stereo preamplifier . . . absolutely terrific, without doubt most complete on market. Even has visual fight control panel. Price \$169.95." Other good tidings from Goodstein: A dual 20-watt amplifier that can operate as monaural 40-watter with complete front end; a new 36-watt monaural amplifier with controls; and a new basic 40-watt power amp. "Walnut cabinets new available for all Scot components," he adds.

ONWARD, UPWARD AT ZENITH

Distributors apparently are bullish about the outlook on the new Zenith Radio Corporation line. At the company's recent sales convention, orders for radio, TV and phono units for delivery thru August were "approximately 10 per cent ahead of the orders received at the company's 1957 convention, which in turn was substantially ahead of 1956," Zenith execs report. Adds Zenith: "Distributors were particularly enthused about Zenith's new line of stereophonic high fidelity instruments.

selling, is extremely important, Fortmyer feels. As he puts it:

"We have found it wisest to stay out of the technical aspect of tape recording as far as possible in selling churches, and to concentrate our efforts on comparatively lightweight, medium-priced models which can be readily moved from place to place.

"This means that our No.-1 recorder sale will average around \$160, and usually involves

Ecclesiastical Rivalry

Even the competitive spirit plays a part in Fortmyer's approach to church audio sales.

"One of the points proven wise in demonstrating is to have a recording on hand of a church program in another church, which always stimulates the keeping-up-with-the-Joneses aspect of the prospective sale, and brings high interest from churchmen who seldom have an opportunity to hear their contemporaries in other churches.

"Here, again, asking the organist to listen with a professional ear to the organ work of a rival church organist strikes a responsive chord that helps a sale."

There is even a follow-up market, too. Fortmyer points out that his tape department has been boosted with special editing and indexing jobs, and the sale of additional speakers and mikes.



FOREIGN TUBE INVASION

Imported audio tubes - whose performance often surpasses comparable U. S. models-continue to make gains in the U. S. hi-fi market. Latest line to reach U. S. dealers is that of the European-made VALVO tubes, used widely in German import radios and phonos. They're being imported by Amperex, itself an offshoot of giant Philips of the Netherlands. To calm worried U. S. tube makers, the VALVO tubes are being pushed primarily as "replacements for original equipment tubes." However, knowledgeable audio fans have long since learned that the hum levels and microphonics of VALVO and other import tubes (like Mullard, Amperex, Telefunken, etc.) make many a U. S. production-line counterpart sound pretty low-fi by comparison.





Special Merit Jazz Albums

JAZZ OF THE ROARING TWENTIES (1-12")-Tommy & Jimmy Dorsey, Red Nichols & Various Artists. Riverside RLP 12-801

This is a choice item for collectors. The artists were then known as the California Ramblers, a group which included the Dorsey Brothers and Red Nichols. Despite the tinny sound, the disk does create interest. The tunes are done in the dance style of the '20's. The attractive and imaginative cover adds to appeal. Tunes include "Manhattan," "Charleston" and "Miss Annabelle Lee." There are group vocals on some.

Classical Albums

TCHAIKOVSKY: PIANO CONCERTO NO. 1 (1-12") - Van Cliburn, piano; Orch. Directed by Kiril Kondrashin. RCA Victor LM 2252. This should prove one of the strongest items to hit the market in some time. Cliburn, winner of the Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow last spring, had more than lived up to expectations in his recent American concert appearances. The Tchaikovsky concerto is one of the works that he played in winning the prize. Russian conductor Kondrashin, who conducted for the pianist, heads the symphony orchestra on this disk. Strong potential.

STANLEY HOLLOWAY'S CONCERT PARTY (1-12")-Sung by Stanley Holloway with Arthur Lief, Piano & The Concert Party Four. Riverside RLP 12-824

A hilarious collection of comic songs by Stanley Holloway, noted British comedian who scored such a big hit as Eliza Doolittle's father in "My Fair Lady." They're drawn from the era of the "concert party," those touring British song-and-dance shows that used to play the seaside resorts. There is even one of the famous "Albert Ramsbottom" poems for the Holloway fans.

SOUNDS OF STEAM LOCOMOTIVES NO. 3 (1-12")-Folkways FX 6154

It's very seldom that sound, as such, manages to have nostalgic charm. But this well-recorded album by Vinton Wight manages the difficult task. Both sides contain highlights of train rides on the famous narrow guage railroad that still runs, as it did in the 1880's, out of Durango, Colorado. Engines puff and wheels echo from the sides of river gorges in a riot of old-fashioned train noise. Little boys of all ages will flip over it.

List Fewer Bathhouses **On Boardwalk** ATLANTIC CITY --- The bath-

house, once a colorful and vital part of seashore life, is disappearing from the local scene.

In the 1920's two dozen large bathhouses were in operation on Atlantic City's Boardwalk. In 1957there were eight. With the opening this week of the 1958 bathing season there are only seven.

Latest to exit from the scene is Richards Baths, now being demolished. Largest and most famous resort bathhouse, it had been in operation 77 years, at South Carolina Avenue and the Boardwalk.

The bathhouse business hit its peak in the 1920's, when Richards alone served as many as 7,000 patrons in a single day. It was glorified in musical comedies, vaudeville skits and movies, usually featuring men with handlebar moustachios in knee-length bathing suits, and women in suits covering everything but their faces.

Then came a change in bathing suit styles and a change in policy by hotels, lifting the ban against bathing from the hostelries. This started the eclipse of the bathhouse.



INDIANAPOLIS-For a second time, the Indiana State Fair Board was formally requested to reduce the rental on the Indiana Coliseum.

Mel Ross, general manager of the Indiana Coliseum Corporation, asked the board Tuesday (24) to reconsider its action of June 6 by which it rejected a plea for a cut of \$12,000 in the annual payments by the corporation.

Ross' latest request asks for: Reduction of the Fair Board's share of gross receipts from admissions by 25 per cent and from concessions by 20 per cent.

A three-year lease beginning October 1 with a two-year option. A stipulation postponing the effective date of the new lease until

October 1, 1959, if Cincinnati, a member of the International Hockey League, abstains from using its franchise.

Ross is also manager of the Indianapolis Chiefs, the 1958 winners of the International League Hockey playoff championship.

At the June 6 meeting, he told the board that unless the rental reduction is granted, the team could no longer use the Coliseum as its home base.

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

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



MERIDEN, Conn.-Phil Wirth, former comedy rider with the famed Wirth Family riding act, died here Monday, where the Hunt Bros. Circus was playing. He had been with Hunt since 1937 upon his retirement from the riding profession.

Wirth, brother of May Wirth, leading female bareback rider, was himself among the most accomplished rosinback performers. He took the name Wirth after arriving in this country as Phil St. Leon with the act in 1916. The Wirths were already an established circus family in Australia, where cousins now operate the Wirth Bros.' Cir-

The act played the Ringling show, the Walter L. Main Circus, the Charles Cochrane Circus in Europe, and top international vaudeville spots.

Phil Wirth had been equestrian director and filled in wherever needed by the Hunts. With his wife, Stella, organist, they proved an indispensable pair. Stella Wirth returned to New York last week and her plans were undecided. Services were held in Frederick's Funeral Parlor, Meriden, followed by cremation. The family maintains a crypt in a Jamaica, N. Y., cemetery.

For some 18 months in the 1930's Phil Wirth teamed with Larry Boyd in the booking office of Boyd and Wirth. A brother, Frank, has been prominent in outdoor booking circles since early in the century. Also surviving is a sister, Mrs. Daisy Honey of the former Honey Family act. A niece, Florence, is with the Honey Girls tumbling act. Three cousins now retired in California were the Three Honey Boys, acrobatic and novelty.

Multiple Vending Spurred On By Recent Development

Six Distribs, Two Mfrs. Making New Two-Tiers, All Metal Stands

NEW YORK --- Multiple bulk . vending machine stands, once confined to large chain and supermarket locations, are beginning to make their appearance in candy stores here.

Moe Mandell and Jack Schoebach, a pair of local bulk vending distributors who have stands made for them, report that stand sales are strong and that operators are leaning more and more toward multiple-machine installations.

Mandell carries stands for four, six and eight machines and will deliver units holding 10 and 12 machines on order. Construction is heavy angle iron and steel.

Built to Order

Schoenbach's stands are of similar construction. They hold four and six machines, with eight machine stands built to order.

Sam Eppy, charm manufacturer, makes a four-machine welded steel wire stand, which may be converted to an eight-machine unit by the addition of boards.

Most of these stands sell from \$10 to \$15, depending on size, while the custom-made stands sell for somewhat more.

Mandell and Schoenbach each report that operators are placing more and more stands in variety store locations. They feel that these installations are paying off for the operator.

AN OLD NOTION **GETS NEW LIFE**

For some reason widespread use of multiple stands for bulk venders never really caught on, altho at least four manufacturers began making small racks and consoles a number of years ago.

In the past several months alone multiple stands have become popular as never before. Distributors are leading the way with two-level metal stands taking up to eight machines and more.

Victor, Oak, Northwestern, and Atlas made different types of stands for a long time. Suddenly, Rake and Schoenbach, two distributors, entered the field. Eppy and a Mandell-King combine came along. Nelson, Schaef, and Fraga are entering the field.

RETAILING REVOLUTION

CHICAGO-Two local distributing firms and one manufacturer are entering multiple vending with production of two-level metal stands, while a third distributor on the West Coast recently went into production on a console stand.

Last week Harold Schaef, machine manufacturer, and Jack Nelson, local distributor, announced production of two different types of two-tier stands.

Two weeks ago co-partners Tom King and Paul Crisman, local distributors, joined hands with Moe Mandell, New York distributor, in production of a yet different kind of two-tier, all metal, slender stand. (See adjoining story.)

Fraga Stand

Bert Fraga, California distributor said last week that production on his new console stand is being increased to meet greater demand. Nelson's stand, dubbed "Bi-Level", is made of wrought iron and tapers back at the second tier. (Continued on page 69)

Jimmie Wilkie started in the bulk vending business in 1949 with 25 peanut and ball-gum machines. At present he distributes bulk vending supplies, with headquarters in Memphis, and maintains a route of venders varying from 500 to 1,000 machines.

Wilkie is a native of Crenshaw, Miss., where he was born 49 years ago. While a young man he worked for Gulf Refining Company as a wholesale distributor. In 1938 he took a job with



Tom Houston Peanut Company, working out of Meridian, Miss., servicing 5-cent vending machines. Wilkie stayed with the firm until 1948, and then went into the wholesale jobbing business, handling candy and confections.


The following year he bought his first small number of bulk venders, and by 1954 had built his route into several hundred machines. Last year he bought out the Claude Shute Vending & Supply Company's distribing assets and plans to expand this phase of his business. However, he intends to hold onto his route in order to insure a market for possible surpluses of merchandise purchased.

WILKIE

Wilkie's route is comprised mostly of penny ball gum and nickel and dime charm machines. They are located in Memphis, Shelby County, and in parts of Arkansas and Mississippi. Wilkie's wife, formerly Juanita Hopkins, runs the office and handles bookkeeping.

Good service and equipment are a distributor's best assets, thinks Wilkie. "I want to keep an operator's business," he says. "If he's not satisfied, he won't come back. But if he is, he will be my customer for years.

Wilkie is a Mason and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Altho not actively athletic, he enjoys watching football, baseball, tennis and golf. The Wilkies have no children.



Prime Locations

Eppy, on the other hand, feels that the chain and supermarket are still the prime locations for stand installations, with only the extremely high-traffic variety store location suitable.

He said that sales on his fourmachine stand are only fair, as most of the larger operators prefer to have their stands custom made to suit the individual locations. He said that some of his stands are being placed in variety stores, but that many of these are marginal for multiple vending installations.

But there is one point or which all three are agreed-that the future for multiple installations is bright in chain stores, supermarkets and supermarkets and chain stores. the larger variety stores.

High Yield

According to Eppy, the yield per square foot for a bulk vending battery is much higher than in many chain store departments. Hence the chain executives are satisfied with multiple bulk vending (Continued on page 70)







MONOPOLY U.S.ClubHas **Only Juke** In Moscow

NEW YORK-The fifth largest city in the world currently only has one juke box in operation, according to Theodore H. Silbert, president of the Standard Financial Corporation.

Silbert, who recently returned from a six-day visit to Moscow, reports that the only automatic music machine in the Soviet capital is located in the American Club, which houses male U. S. Army enlisted personnel and civilian employees of the U. S. Embassy.

Silbert was particularly interested in the juke box, as Standard specializes in factoring coin machine accounts receivables and lending money directly to coin machine operating firms.

Drawing Card

The juke box, a late-model 45 r.p.m. unit, is in operation each evening from 10 p.m. until 4 a.m., he said. The juke box is popular not only with Army and embassy personnel, but it is a great favorite with employees of the other Western nation embassies who are guests at the American Club each evening.

The shortage of 45 r.p.m. American records here is severe. While residents at the American Club get most of the amenities of Stateside living, they experience extreme difficulty getting pop records.

Juke box operators, record distributors and one-stop owners who would like to provide pop records for the club may do so by sending partment of State, Washington 25, D. C. Packages should contain not more than 20 records. Moscow residents, said Silbert, are enthusiastic about American dance music, despite the government's policy of discouraging performances of U. 

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Coin Machine Price Index

How to Use the Index

HIGHS AND LOWS Equipment and prices listed below are taken from advertisements in The Billboard for the period shown. Listings are based on the highest and lowest prices on all equipment which have been advertised either at least 10 times for the period shown or at least 5 times together with a computation based on annual average.

PRICES given in the Index are in no way intended to be "standard," "national," "set," or offer an authoritative reflection of what prices should be on used equipment. Prices in the Index are designed, however, to be a handy guide for price ranges. Any price obviously depends on the condition of the equipment, age, time on location, the territory and other related factors.

MEAN AVERAGE. The mean average is a computation based on all prices of which a machine has been advertised for the period indicated and reflects the dominant advertised price level. It is not a simple average between the "high" and "low." High and low indicate price range; mean average indicates the price level at which most of the machines are advertised for. Therefore, when the mean average is nearer the "high," it indicates the "low" is a unique price probably for "as is" on "distressed" equipment.



Average Spends \$25-\$50 Yearly Per Machine on Over-All Upkeep

CHICACO --- Thirty-five game operators from all parts of the country last week furnished the industry with some revealing figures on game servicing and maintenance costs and methods.

While results of the survey are not to be interpreted as facts on the game operating trade as a whole, they do furnish a good cross-section of operating around the nation in general.

The average operator surveyed finds that he spends from \$25 to \$50 per game in a year's time on servicing and repair costs, includphone service and incidentals.

erators get one service call for every five games they have on location. This is perhaps more calls than generally thought.

The average new game, according to operators, holds up from one-half year to one year before major repair is required. Most operators surveyed pegged one year as the trouble-free period.

Operators surveyed split evenly on whether they did their own servicing or had servicemen to do ing costs of labor, transportation, the job for them. Some, 20 per cent, combined the two methods.

Most operators surveyed have their service calls taken directly by themselves or their firms. One out of three depend on outside In a two-week period most op- telephone services to get their calls.







Indications are that the fly-bynight operator problem may resolve itself. Already, the amateur is being forced out by taxation, high costs and low profit margins. Industry sources estimate that the ration of "surplus" operators is in direct proportion to excess taverns, about 50 per cent. Germany's own success with the operator association as the foundation of the industry, combined with the German flair for organization and specialization, is leading operators to ponder the advisability of still tighter centralization. As many leading tradesters in the U. S have come to feel, many German operators believe that the future trend of the business may lie in giant operations, spurred by the complexities of juke box operation.

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

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

Few Rate Loans

"Only two types of situations should ever justify a loan of any 3 kind to a location," Robinson believes. "If a location has had it rough because of illness or he is improving his premises or expand-ing should be the only two reasons to lend a man money. If the location is asking a loan just to pay off back debts, it is a bad risk. It is only a matter of time before he will be back in the jam, and the repayment will not be forthcoming."

Hank Tronick, a veteran in the coin machine business and who joined the Robinson organization last year as a partner after more than a decade as general manager at Minthorne Music, is of the opinion that loans started to get out of hand only two or three years ago. He believes that some large cigarette vending companies which added games and music to their operations, and business opportunity brokers promoted the practice.

"The large vendors have ample financial reserves and many solicitors in the field who began taking the locations away from the regular games and music operators," Tronick declared. "In order to stay in business, the games and music operator had to follow suit. Some business opportunity brokers involved in the sale of cafes, beer parlors, cocktail lounges, etc., urged their clients to get loans from operators to help them to get into business. 




